Three new appointments to the Montana State University history faculty have been announced by MSU President H. K. Newburn. Dr. Allen H. Kittel will be an assistant professor; Dr. Martin Kilcoyne, a visiting lecturer, and Benjamin G. Rader, an instructor.

Dr. Kittel was an instructor at Stanford University in 1953-53 and from 1955 to 1957, and an assistant professor at Montana State College from 1957 to 1962. He was a lecturer in American civilization for the Association Belgo-Americaine, Brussels, Belgium, in 1954-55. He has published articles in scholarly journals and has written many book reviews. He holds B. A., M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from Stanford.

Dr. Kilcoyne, who taught at MSU in 1958, has been on the faculty of the University of Wisconsin at Milwaukee for the past three years. He has also taught at East Texas State University. He earned B. A. and M. A. degrees at New York University and a Ph. D. at the University of Washington.

Rader was an instructor at Oklahoma State University last year. He has taught in the summer session at the University of Maryland, where he has been working for a doctorate. He has a bachelor's degree from Southwest Missouri State and a master's degree from Oklahoma State.
