The Very Rev. Anthony M. Brown, president of Carroll College, Helena, will be the speaker at the Montana State University baccalaureate service Sunday at 8 p. m. in the University Theater, according to Homer E. Anderson, commencement chairman.

Father Brown will speak to the class of 1964 on "Faith and Character in Higher Education." The educator is a native of Anaconda and the recipient of the first earned doctor of education degree granted by MSU.


Commencement activities that began Friday for more than 900 candidates for graduate and undergraduate degrees this year will culminate in the awarding of diplomas Monday at 2 p. m. in the Field House auditorium.

The baccalaureate service includes invocation and benediction by the Rev. James L. Sprigg of the First Baptist Church and a Scripture reading by the Rev. Richard A. Jones of the First Presbyterian Church. The organ processional and recessional will be played by Laurence Perry of the music faculty. The University Choir, directed by Joseph Mussulman, will sing.

Also scheduled Sunday are an art display and a museum exhibit in the Fine Arts building from 2 to 4 p. m., a concert by the University Choir and Symponette in the Recital Hall at 3:30 p. m., and carillon music from Main Hall tower at 5 p. m.

At singing-on-the-steps Saturday the Robert Sibley award "for loyalty and contributions to University traditions" was presented to Jim Erickson, Power. The presentation was made by Rick Jones, Great Falls, immediate past president of the student body.
