FOR RELEASE SUNDAY, AUGUST 29

Private landowners and representatives of federal and state agencies will gather Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at the University of Montana's Lubrecht Forest Camp at Greenough to plan for a 1966 institute on design, development and use of recreational lands.

Thomas J. Collins, U of M director of statewide services, said registrants will arrive at Lubrecht Forest Wednesday evening and begin formal meetings Thursday morning.

U of M forestry dean, Dr. Arnold W. Bolle, will open the program with an outline of meeting objectives. He will discuss the need for the proposed regional institute to deal with the development of lands for the best recreational uses and to devise ways to avoid overcommercialization of recreational lands.

Other Thursday morning speakers and their topics are Reg Pragnell, regional landscape architect, U. S. Forest Service, Missoula, "Recreation Site Planning"; T. S. Wrath, consulting landscape architect, Billings, "Private Planning"; and C. Richard Steeves, resident landscape architect, National Park Service, Glacier National Park, "Area Planning."

The group will visit Seeley Lake and Clearwater Valley Thursday afternoon and will attend a session on "Problems in Recreation Planning," conducted by the USFS.

Friday meetings, which will end at noon, will be devoted to discussion of the scope, subject, dates and participants of the proposed 1966 institute.
