

HEAD COACH DICK SCOTT



Dick Scott is in his seventh year as head coach of the University of Montana volleyball team.

Before taking the UM position, Scott was head volleyball coach at Santa Monica Junior College from 1972 to 1978. His record was 52-1 in conference play and 110-20 overall. During that time, he was also the head scout for UCLA's volleyball team.

Scott, from Denton, Montana, was also head coach of the Maccabi Volleyball Club for two years and taught physical education and general science at a junior high in Santa Monica.

Scott has considerable international coaching experience. He served as an assistant coach for the men's national team which participated in the World University Games in 1981. Previously, he had served as the head coach of the USA Junior National Volleyball Team for three years.

Scott, 41, attended Montana State University on a basketball and track scholarship. He graduated in 1965 with a B.S. in physical education. After serving in the Air Force from 1965-69, he earned his master's degree in physical education at UCLA in 1971.

Dick and his wife, Mary, have two daughters, Jean, 12, and Pat, 8, and a son, Jack, 2.

ASSISTANT COACH PAT BENSON

Benson begins her first season as assistant volleyball coach at UM after serving as volunteer coach with the Lady Grizzlies last season.

A four year starter at UM, Benson ranks second in career kills and blocks. She was the 1982 team MVP.

Benson has served as junior varsity volleyball coach at Missoula's Sentinel High for each of the past three season.



THE OUTLOOK

Even head coach Dick Scott may need a roster to keep the University of Montana volleyball players straight the first few weeks of practice. A record 16 players will report to fall camp and the competition for playing time should be intense, to say the least.

"There's nobody on the team who can say they have a starting spot wrapped up," Scott said. "The returning starters will be pushed by the newcomers as well as the other returnees. Right now, I'd say at least two positions are wide open. We have more depth then we've ever had and the competition within the team should make everyone better."

UM has eight letterwinners back from last season's 25-10 squad. However, the key to the team's success could be how the seven newcomers and one redshirt blend in with the veterans.

The top returnees are seniors Mary Beth Dungan and Mary Pederson and juniors Laura Slanec and Nan Kuenzel.

Dungan, a 5-foot-10 outside hitter was the team's MVP last season and was a USVBA (United States Volleyball Association) all-regional selection last spring. Pederson, a 5-7 setter, was a second team all-conference choice last year. Slanec, a 6-2 middle hitter, was the team's leading blocker and an honorable mention all-conference pick. Kuenzel, a 5-10 middle hitter, was chosen as the Lady Grizzlies' Most Improved Player last season.

The newcomers are junior setter Vicki Opstad, freshman outside hitters Cindy Pitzinger and Mary McManigal, freshman middle hitters Allison Yarnell and Tina Holmberg, freshman outside and middle hitter Cheryl Hanson and freshman setter Kelly Price. Freshman setter Jan Dempsey will see her first collegiate action after redshirting last season.

Montana will once again try to dethrone twotime Mountain West Conference champion Portland State. UM handed Portland State its only conference loss in three seasons last October in Missoula.

MARY BETH DUNGAN Outside Hitter . . . 5-10 . . . Senior . . . Kent, Washington

The 1983 team MVP, Dungan played every point of every conference match last season. She led the team in kills (331) and hitting percentage (24.6%). She was also chosen as the team's Outstanding Backcourt Player. Dungan con-

tinued to play well during the USVBA season and was named to the Evergreen Region all-tournament team.

MARY PEDERSON

Setter . . . 5-7 . . . Senior . . . Medical Lake, Washington

Pederson won the starting setter job early last season and finished the year with a team-leading 939 set assists. That ranks her second in single-season assists and third in career assists. Pederson was a second team all-Mountain West

Conference selection last season. Before coming to UM, she played on two state championship teams at Spokane Falls (Wash.) Community College.

Ziemba saw quite a bit of action in the backcourt before earning a starting spot late last season. She is a strong server and had 19 aces in just 87 games last year. She spent her freshman season at Clackamas (Ore.) Community

College and her sophomore year at Southern Oregon State College. She was a starter at both schools.

NAN KUENZEL

Middle Hitter . . . 5-10 . . . Junior . . . Missoula, Montana

Kuenzel started at three different positions last season, but will probably just play the middle hitter position this year. She was named the Most Improved Player on the squad in 1983 and continued to progess well during the USVBA



season. Nan was an all-state selection as a senior at Hellgate High.

JODENE KYLE

Outside Hitter . . 6-1 . . . Junior . . . Missoula, Montana

Kyle showed great improvement during the collegiate and USVBA seasons last year and is expected to contend for the starting job at technique hitter. Her biggest strengths are her height and blocking ability. She was named MVP

and Best Blocker as a senior at Hellgate High.



LAURA SLANEC Middle Hitter . . . 6-2 . . . Junior . . . North Riverside, Illinois

An honorable mention allconference selection in 1983. Slanec was UM's leading blocker with 101 stuff blocks. She was also fourth in kills (190) and third in hitting percentage (18.6%). She has the height and power to become a

dominant force in the middle.

DEBBIE CARTER

Outside Hitter . . . 5-8 . . . Sophomore . . . Missoula, Montana

Carter moves to outside hitter after spending her freshman year at setter. She saw quite a bit of action during the USVBA season and has improved rapidly She redshirted her first year at UM. She was a member of the 1982 state championship team at Sentinel High.





JANET STEWART Outside Hitter . . . 5-10 . . . Sophomore . . . Kent, Washington

The third player to come to UM from Kent-Meridian High (along with Dungan and Assistant Coach Benson), Stewart saw limited playing time last season. She is an excellent server and has been progressing well in the other areas

of the game.

JAN DEMPSEY

Setter . . . 5-8 . . . Freshman . . . Spanaway, Washington

Dempsey was redshirted last fall, but played quite a bit during the USVBA season. She is a lefthander and could play outside hitter as well as setter. She was the South Puget Sound League MVP as a senior at Bethel High.

University of Montana

The University of Montana boasts a proud tradition of academic excellence in teaching. research and service. Located in Missoula on 201 acres at the base of Mount Sentinel, UM was chartered February 17, 1893. Since then, it has grown from 50 students seven faculty members to a present enrollment of 9,100 and about 450 full-time state supported faculty positions.

Bachelor's degrees

are available in 58 fields, and associate of arts degrees may be obtained in two areas. UM offers master's degrees in 54 programs and doctoral degrees in 13.

The College of Arts and Sciences is the core of the University. It includes a full range of programs and courses in the life sciences, physical sciences, social sciences and humanities

Seven professional schools complete the academic program-Business Administration, Fine Arts, Journalism, Education, Forestry, Law and Pharmacy and Allied Health Sciences.

Missoula is in the midst of an area noted for its spectacular scenery and recreational opportunities. It is within easy driving distance of four wilderness areas and Glacier and Yellowstone National Parks. The natural surroundings offer excellent opportunities for hunting, fishing, backpacking, river floating, camping and other recreational pursuits. Two excellent winter ski areas are within minutes of the University, and several others are only a couple of hours away by car. UM owns and operates a golf course near the campus.

Downtown Missoula is within blocks of the University and is easily accessible to UM students. Other parts of the city can be reached by using Mountain Line, the city's mass transit system.
