HUMANITIES COMMITTEE SEEKS NOMINATIONS FOR 1985 SERVICE AND SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

MISSOULA--

The Montana Committee for the Humanities (MCH) is seeking nominations for 1985 Awards in the Humanities. Nominations must be submitted by Jan. 21.

The awards, one for public service in humanities programming and one for outstanding individual scholarship, will be presented at the second annual Humanities Awards Banquet scheduled March 7 in Bozeman. Each award consists of a silver engraved medallion and \$1,000 in cash.

Anyone in Montana may nominate an institution, organization or individual for an award. Nomination forms may be obtained by calling the MCH at (406) 243-6022 or by writing to the Montana Committee for the Humanities, P.O. Box 8036, Missoula, MT 59807.

Richard Roeder, professor of history at Montana State University, received last year's award for scholarship. He has written several books and articles on topics such as law, taxes, Montana history and the cowboy artist Charles M. Russell. Roeder also served on the Constitution Revision Committee and as a delegate to the Montana Constitutional Convention in 1971-72.

Michael and Lynda Sexson, also faculty members at MSU, received the 1984 award for service in humanities programming for the state, particularly for designing "LOGON '83," a conference held in Bozeman which provided a public forum for discussion of issues related to technology and human values.

"LOGON '83" received the 1984 Schwartz award for excellence, a \$500 cash prize awarded by the National Federation of State Humanities Councils to the "best of projects" of all state humanities councils during calendar year 1983.
