HEAD COACH DICK SCOTT



Dick Scott is in his eighth year as head coach of the University of Montana volleyball team.

Before taking the UM position, Scott was head volleyball coach at Santa Monica Junior College from 1972 to 1978. His record was 110-20 overall and 52-1 in conference play. During that time, he was also the head scout for UCLA.

Originally from Denton, Mont., Scott was the head coach of the Maccabi Volleyball Club for two years and taught physical education and general science at a junior high in Santa Monica.

Scott has considerable international coaching experience. He served as an assistant coach for the United States Olympic men's volleyball team when it participated in the U.S.A. Championship Series this past summer. Previously, he had served as an assistant coach for the men's national team in the 1981 World University Games and was the head coach of the U.S.A. Junior National Team for three years.

Scott, 42, attended Montana State University on a basketball and track scholarship. He graduated in 1965 with a B.S. in physical education. After serving in the Air Force from 1965-69, he earned his Master's Degree in physical education at UCLA in 1971.

Dick and his wife, Mary, have three children: Jean, 12, Patty, 9 and Jack, 3.

ASSISTANT COACH WENDY HOYT

A former Lady Griz volleyball standout, Wendy Hoyt returns to UM as an assistant coach this season.

Hoyt still holds the school single-season record for assists with 1,359 in 1982. She also ranks second in career assists with 2,336.

Wendy was an all-conference selection in 1982.



THE OUTLOOK

The 1985 Lady Griz volleyball team should feature a strong starting lineup, but depth is a major concern.

"I feel good about the players I expect to start this season. They're all fairly experienced and I'm confident that they can get the job done," Coach Dick Scott said. "However, we don't have much depth. If one or two of our key players get hurt, we could be in real trouble."

The team's strongest position is outside hitter where five players will battle for playing time. Sophomore Allison Yarnell is the top returnee here. She earned a starting position early last season and finished second on the team in kills with 304. Another sophomore, Cheryl Hanson, is likely to take over for the graduated Mary Beth Dungan as the other starter. She saw quite a bit of playing time, especially in the backcourt, last season. Junior college transfer Sheri Bauer, redshirt freshman Mary McManigal and new freshman Mindy Allred will all push Yarnell and Hanson.

Two experienced players — sophomore Cindy Pitzinger and junior Debbie Carter — make technique (right side) hitter another good position for UM. Pitzinger, the team's best jumper with a 30-inch vertical leap, started at middle hitter late last season, but played technique during the USVBA (United States Volleyball Association) club season. Carter was the starter at this position most of last season, but was bothered by a knee injury late in the year. She had arthroscopic surgery during the off-season and appears to be back to full strength.

Middle hitter is an area of strength and of concern. Seniors Nan Kuenzel and Laura Slanec could be two of the premier players in the conference at this position. But, both were bothered by injuries last year and their health is a big key to the team's success because they are the only true middle hitters on the squad. Slanec led the team with 83 blocks last season and Kuenzel was right behind with 81. Pitzinger, Bauer and Allred could fill in here if necessary.

The most inexperienced position on the team is setter. Senior Vicki Opstad, sophomore Jan Dempsey and freshman Michele Hall will battle for this starting spot vacated by Mary Pederson. Opstad was used primarily as a backcourt specialist last season and Dempsey was the backup setter. Hall won team and league MVP honors as a senior at La Jolla Country Day School.

"The only position I'm really worried about is middle hitter because of the lack of depth," Scott said. "The setters are inexperienced, but as the season goes on, I think that will be a strong position. One thing is for sure. No matter who the starter is, we will have the best blocking setter we've ever had. The other two positions — outside and technique hitter — are solid."

Scott said the Lady Griz would experiment with some new offensive and defensive patterns this year. The most exciting addition will be backcourt hitting. Backcourt players must take off from behind the three-meter line in order to spike the ball and, with her jumping ability, Pitzinger should be especially effective in this capacity.

The schedule features three tournament appearances as well as a double round-robin within the Mountain West Conference. Three-time defending champion Portland State looks like the team to beat again this season in the MWC. Portland State won the Division II national title last season.

Kuenzel was the Lady Grizzlies' Outstanding Blocker with 81 blocks in just 67 games last season. She finished second in the conference in blocks per game. She also ranked second on the team in hitting percentage (26.8%). Nan missed several matches with ankle injuries last season but seems to be fully recovered. Nan was the MVP and Outstanding Blocker and Hitter as a senior at Hellgate High. She was also an all-state selection that season.

University of Montana



The University of Montana boasts a proud tradition of academic excellence in teaching, research and service. Located in Missoula on 201 acres at the base of Mount Sentinel, UM was chartered February 17, 1893. Since then, it has grown from 50 students and seven faculty members to a present enrollment of 9,300 and about 450 full-time state supported faculty positions.

Bachelor's degrees are available in 58 fields, and associate of arts degrees may be obtained in two areas. UM offers master's degrees in 54 programs and doctoral degrees in 13.

The College of Arts and Sciences is the core of the University. It includes a full range of programs and courses in the life sciences, physical sciences, social sciences and humanities.

Seven professional schools complete the academic program—Business Administration, Fine Arts, Journalism, Education, Forestry, Law and Pharmacy and Allied Health Sciences.

Missoula is in the midst of an area noted for its spectacular scenery and recreational opportunities. It is within easy driving distance of four wilderness areas and Glacier and Yellowstone National Parks. The natural surroundings offer excellent opportunities for hunting, fishing, backpacking, river floating, camping and other recreational pursuits. Two winter ski areas are within minutes of the University, and several others are only a couple of hours away by car. UM owns and operates a golf course near the campus.

Downtown Missoula is within blocks of the University and is easily accessible to UM students. Other parts of the city can be reached by using Mountain Line, the city's mass transit system.
