#### HEAD COACH DICK SCOTT



Dick Scott is in his ninth year as head coach of the University of Montana volleyball team.

In eight seasons at UM, he has posted a 163-156 record. The Lady Grizzlies have finished second in the Mountain West Conference twice in the league's four-year history.

Before taking the UM position, Scott was head volleyball coach at

Santa Monica Junior College from 1972 to 1978. His record was 110-20 overall and 52-1 in conference play. During that time, he was also the head scout for UCLA.

Originally from Denton, Mont., Scott was the head coach of the Maccabi Volleyball Club for two years and taught physical education and general science at a junior high in Santa Monica.

Scott has considerable international coaching experience. He served as an assistant coach for the United States Olympic men's volleyball team when it participated in the U.S.A. Championship Series two summers ago. Previously, he had served as an assistant coach for the men's national team in the 1981 World University Games and was the head coach of the U.S.A. Junior National Team for three years

Scott, 43, attended Montana State University on a basketball and track scholarship. He graduated in 1965 with a B.S. in physical education. After serving in the Air Force from 1965-69, he earned his master's degree in physical education at UCLA in 1971.

Dick and his wife, Mary, have three children: Jean, 15, Patty, 11 and Jack, 4.

### ASSISTANT COACH WENDY (HOYT) RIGONI

A former Lady Griz volleyball standout, Wendy Rigoni returned to UM as an assistant coach in 1985.

She still holds the school singleseason record for assists with 1,359 in 1982. She also ranks second in career assists with 2,336.

Wendy was an all-conference selection in 1982.



## THE OUTLOOK

Coach Dick Scott wouldn't mind a repeat of the first half of the 1985 season, but he'd definitely like to rewrite the ending.

The Lady Grizzlies got off to a roaring start, winning the University of Houston Invitational and their first seven conference matches. But after upping the season record to 20-8 with a victory over Eastern Washington, UM stumbled and finished the year at 22-15.

This season, with four starters and four other letterwinners returning, Scott hopes the team's experience will prevent another late-season slump.

The leading returnees include middle blocker Cindy Pitzinger, outside hitters Allison Yarnell and Cheryl Hanson and setters Ian Dempsey and Michele Hall,

Pitzinger, a first-team all-conference selection, led the team in kills with 422 and blocks with a school record of 206.

Yarnell was a second-team all-league pick and ranked second behind Pitzinger in kills with 394 despite a nagging knee injury. Her health could be a key to UM's success this year.

Hanson, a part-time starter, came on late in the year and finished the season with 162 kills and 34 service aces.

Dempsey and Hall shared the setting duties last season and will again battle for the starting job. Dempsey led the team in assists (771) and assist percentage (.413). Hall was close behind in both categories with 541 assists and a .375 percentage.

The other returnees are technique hitter Debbie Carter and outside hitters Sheri Bauer and Mary McManigal.

Carter was the team's starting technique hitter two years ago and held that job early last year but was plaqued by injuries throughout the season. Both Bauer and McManigal were parttime starters at outside hitter.

Scott's recruiting priority was finding a replacement for graduated middle blocker Nan Kuenzel and three of the four newcomers are middle blockers. They are Julie Hoffman of Missoula, Angie Rais of Anchorage, Alaska and Anne Tarleton of Littleton, Colo. The final recruit is outside hitter/setter Mari Brown of Spokane, Wash.

The strongest position on the squad will probably be outside hitter where returning starters Yarnell and Hanson will be pushed by Bauer, McManigal and Brown.

The setting situation also looks solid with Dempsey and Hall battling it out. Brown will be trained at this position, but probably will not see action there this season.

Carter looks like the leader at the technique hitter. Both Hanson and Brown could see time there also.

The biggest area of concern is middle blocker. Pitzinger is coming off an outstanding season, but one of the freshman recruits will have to step into the other starting spot. Rais, Hoffman and Tarleton all have good skills but it remains to be seen how quickly they will adjust to the collegiate game.

The schedule includes three strong pre-season tournaments—at BYU, New Mexico State and Colorado State—as well as a double round-robin within the Mountain West Conference.

Only one thing is for sure as far as the conference race goes. There will be a new champion. Four-time conference winner Portland State has withdrawn from the MWAC and that leaves things wide open for the other seven schools.

Bauer was the volleyball MVP and Athlete of the Year as a senior at Rogers High School.

# DEBBIE CARTER Technique Hitter . . . 5-8 . . . Senior . . . Missoula, Montana

Carter was the team's starting technique hitter two years ago, but was slowed by injuries last season.

As a sophomore, Carter had 127 kills and 51 blocks and was selected as the Co-Most Im-

proved Player (along with Cindy Pitzinger).

tinel High's state championship team in 1982.

# JAN DEMPSEY Setter . . . 5-8 . . . Junior . . . Spanaway, Washington

Jan was chosen as the team's Most Improved Player and Outstanding Setter last season

She is fourth in career assists at UM with 893.

# CINDY PITZINGER Middle Blocker . . . 5-8 . . Junior . . . Puyallup, Washington

She led the team in kills with 422 and set a school record in blocks with 206. Because of her jumping ability, she hits from the back row guite a bit.

Pitzinger was the MVP of the South Puget Sound League as a senior at Rogers High.

#### ALLISON YARNELL Outside Hitter . . . 5-10 . . Junior . . Spokane, Washington

She is already ranked eighth in career kills with 703 and

second in career hitting percentage at 22.8.

ing career at Eisenhower High. She was an all-conference player and helped lead her team to two-straight district titles in high school.

# University Montana

University of The Montana boasts a proud tradition of academic excellence in teaching. research and service. Located in Missoula on 201 acres at the base of Mount Sentinel, UM was chartered February 17, 1893. Since then, it has grown from 50 students seven faculty members to a present enrollment of 9,100 and about 450 full-time state faculty supported positions.

Bachelor's degrees

are available in 58 fields, and associate of arts degrees may be obtained in two areas. UM offers master's degrees in 54 programs and doctoral degrees in 13.

The College of Arts and Sciences is the core of the University. It includes a full range of programs and courses in the life sciences, physical sciences, social sciences and humanities.

Seven professional schools complete the academic program—Business Administration, Fine Arts, Journalism, Education, Forestry, Law and Pharmacy and Allied Health Sciences.

Missoula is in the midst of an area noted for its spectacular scenery and recreational opportunities. It is within easy driving distance of four wilderness areas and Glacier and Yellowstone National Parks. The natural surroundings offer excellent opportunities for hunting, fishing, backpacking, river floating, camping and other recreational pursuits. Two winter ski areas are within minutes of the University, and several others are only a couple of hours away by car. UM owns and operates a golf course near the campus.

Downtown Missoula is within blocks of the University and is easily accessible to UM students. Other parts of the city can be reached by using Mountain Line, the

city's mass transit system.
