THE SCHOOL OF LAW

State University of Montana

Midyear Announcement 1918 - 1919




THE opening of the present school year in September, 1918, found practically every former student of the School of Law at the State University of Montana in the military service of the United States. Those who had been planning to enter the school for the

first time were within the draft and were expecting immediate call. The result was that, with the exception of one course in which five students were enrolled and the course in International and Military Law which was required of all men in the Student Army Training Corps, all law courses were suspended.

The signing of the armistice and the prospect of an early return to normal conditions leads to the belief that Montana law students now in service will desire to resume their work in this school as soon as possible. Also, it is believed that those who desire to enter upon the study of law but who have been delayed will be anxious to get started.

It has, therefore, been decided to reopen the school January 4, 1919.

Not all courses will be offered, but a sufficient number will be given to enable students to carry full work. The following tentative program is announced, for the rest of the school year, subject however to changes to meet the conditions which may develop prior to January 4th.

All regular courses will be resumed at the opening of the school year next September, by which time all members of the faculty now employed in war work will have returned.

EQUIPMENT

The school occupies one floor of the Library building. It is provided with a large library reading room, class rooms and offices. The library contains over 6,000 volumes.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Candidates for degree are required to have two years of college work. Students who are twenty-one years of age and graduates of accredited High Schools may enroll as special students and take the regular course leading to a certificate.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION

The course extends over a period of three years and is standard. The school is a member of the Association of American Law Schools. Special attention is given to Montana Practice and to Mining and Irrigation Law.

ADMISSION TO THE BAR

Holders of degrees or certificates from the school are admitted to the bar of Montana without examination.

FEES AND DEPOSITS

No tuition fee is charged. All students pay the registration fee of \$10 and must make a library deposit of \$3 which is returned at the end of the year.

CONCLUSION

The school feels that it has done its share in furnishing man power to the Nation in the great crisis which is just passing. It has been glad of the opportunity to render this service and to make the sacrifice which it has involved. It is hoped that students and friends will give their support in the trying period of reconstruction. The school is deeply indebted to the people, and particularly to the lawyers and judges of the state for the rapid progress made by the school before the war, and a continuance of their support is solicited.

The young men and women of Montana need not leave their native state to study law.
