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

GENERAL INFORMATION

Montana State University

Location — Missoula, Montana, city of more than 30,000 residents on the western slope of the Rocky Mountains. Missoula is nicknamed the "Garden City" and is the hub of five great valleys that reach into surrounding mountains. The city is served by the main lines of the Milwaukee and Northern Pacific railroads as well as by Northwest Airlines and Greyhound and Intermountain bus lines. It is also located at the crossroads of the main east-west and north-south U. S. highways 10 and 93.

Chartered — On February 17, 1893, by the third Montana Legislature.

President - Dr. Carl McFarland.

Campus — Consists of 125 acres, located in the heart of the residential area, at the base of the 2,000-foot Mt. Sentinel which adds another 520 acres. The University also has 20,000 acres of experimental forest, 40 miles from Missoula, and a 160-acre biological station on Flathead Lake, 80 miles north of the University.

Stadium — Dornblaser Field, capacity 10,000. Named in honor of Paul Dornblaser, Grizzly hero and captain of a great 1912 team, who was killed in action during World War I.

School Colors — Copper, silver and gold.

Team Names — Grizzlies, Silvertips.

Schools — There are twenty-three departments at the University and seven separate professional schools — Business Administration, Education, Forestry, Journalism, Law, Music, and Pharmacy. There is also a Graduate School and a Summer College for both regular and graduate students.

Grizzly Marching Band — Under the direction of J. Justin Gray is expected to have over 100 members.

The Director

When Montana needed a new director this spring the logical choice was "The Professor," hard-working, dependable "Jiggs" Dahlberg, a man with 30



years coaching experience. Since he returned to his alma mater in 1937 Jiggs has been head basketball coach, assisted in football and baseball, and been the department's top proselytor. He will continue his head basketball coaching duties along with his director's work. The friendly, humorous Swede is a natural at meeting the public.

Dahlberg graduated from the University in 1925 with

athletic honors in basketball and football and he was captain of the cage team. Following graduation he spent 12 years coaching high school teams at Miles City and Anaconda, Montana, and at Hoquiam, Puyullup, and Chehallis, Wash., all with considerable success. He spent two years in the service coaching baseball, basketball, and boxing at Fort Lawton, Wash., 1943-44.

Actually a full professor on the University staff, Jiggs is well known in the mountain country for his hustling, fast-breaking basketball teams. He developed the Grizzly's greatest basketball squad in 1949. He is married and has a young son and daughter.

Head Football Coach

Affable Eddie Chinske took the Grizzly football reins when Montana was at the bottom of the Skyline heap. In two years he has brought them two



steps up from the cellar and Silvertip fans believe he will go higher. He was well known by Montanans as he moved to the top position from seven years as head baseball coach and assistant football and basketball coach.

Chinske came to the University for the first time as a student back in 1926 from Winona Normal in Minnesota. He played halfback and quarterback for three grid sea-

sons and captained the 1928 eleven. He also lettered in basketball, baseball, and golf and is still an

avid golfer and one of the state's best.

Eddie's first coaching job was handling the 1929 Grizzly Cubs. He coached five years at Miles City and ten years at Missoula County high before returning to the University. His high school teams won four football championships, were runnerup twice, and finished in the semi-finals two years. In basketball he won three state titles and seven conference crowns. He closed his high school coaching career with 22 straight football victories. As freshman coach at the U. his Cub teams won 13 and lost 3.

He was born in Michigan City, Ind., one of nine sons. Married and has four children, Edward, a serviceman; Mary Margaret, 15; John, 13, and Lewis, 11.

Football Assistants

A bouncing ball of fire on the practice field is Line Coach **John Zeger**, Coach Chinske's top-notch

assistant. Young and aggressive, John has been at the University two years and demonstrates a thorough knowledge and deep love for the game.

He was known as "Pappy" in 1946 when he captained the Huskies and was chosen as an All-Pacific Coast Conference guard. Zeger entered the University of Washington in 1939 and played football



under Jim Phelan in 1940 and '41. During the war he played with the Fourth Air Force football team, finishing his eligibility with the Huskies, played a season of pro ball with the New York Giants, and returned to Washington as an assistant coach. During the illness of Howie O'Dell in 1948, "Big Jawn" held down the head line coach duties.

Just priod to coming to the University, Zeger was head coach and an instructor in health and physical education at Olympic JC. His football teams there won the Washington-Oregon Junior College title three years in a row. A native of Chicago, he was born Feb. 6, 1919, and attended Harrison Tech high.

The man who travels the long scouting circuit for the valuable data needed for next week's strategy, who helps map out that strategy, and who is considered one of the top scouts in the West is Harry



F. Adams, the Grizzly's head track coach and assistant director of athletics. Without a doubt one of Montana's Greatest of Old, Harry starred in in football, basketball, and track, graduating from the U. in 1921. He was head coach of all sports at DePaul University, 1921-22, and returned after one year as assistant football, basketball and track coach. He became head track coach in 1933.

He was a member of the 440-yard sprint relay team which at one time held the world's record. Aams served in both World Wars, in the last as a colonel. He is a member of the Advisory Board for the National Collegiate Track Coaches Association.

Newest member of the Grizzly coaching staff is 25-year-old R. L. (Lefty) Byrne who joined the staff a year ago and had terrific success with freshman football and basketball teams and the varsity base-

ball squad. He was undefeated in football, lost one game in basketball, and won the Western Division baseball title.

Lefty earned nine letters in football, basketball and baseball, 1949-50-51, while wearing the Silvertip colors. He was All-Skyline and All-American honorable mention in football his senior year. He played professional baseball

with the Spokane Indians and the Salt Lake Bees before returning to the University.



Everything Montana's training facilities are today can be attributed to Naseby Rhinehart, athletic trainer, who took over the injury treating duties as a part-time job in 1935. His know-how and his training techniques make him one of the most respected among the training fraternity around the nation. Besides his training duties Rhinehart teaches classes in the care and prevenetion of injuries for



the department of health and physical education.

He came to the University from Milwaukee and was an outstanding end in '32, '33 and '34 . . . he is still rated on the All-Time Grizzly team. He also lettered three years in basketball and track.

When not in the training room, Nase's greatest enjoyment is watching his son Pete (Nase, Jr.) perform in some field of athletic endeavor. A

1954 Missoula County high school graduate, Pete was All-State in football, basketball and track and was selected at end of the All-American high school team.

Business Manager

Another Montana graduate (1939) and outstanding athlete for the Grizzlies is Paul J. Chumrau who took over athletic business manager duties in December, 1952.

The department has found their new money-man

a capable and valuable addition; his background includes coaching and teaching in high school; army personnel work; a business of his own, and director of the University placement bureau (a iob he continues to supervise).

Chumrau was a member of Anaconda high school's "Wonder Team" of 1934. He was co-captain and played guard on the Grizzly cage



team, playing under Director of Athletics Jiggs Dahlberg in high school and in college.

Montana University was admitted as a member of the Mountain States Athletic Conference in July, 1950, changing their affiliation from the Pacific Coast Conference. The Grizzlies started their first new conference competition with swimming, winter quarter 1951, and have competed in the full conference sports program since that time. In football each member institution must play at least five conference games to qualify for the championship.

PROSPECTUS

One might think you'd find discouragement and pessimism in the Grizzly lair, considering the fact that Montana has finished at or near bottom of the heap annually since joining the Skyline league...but not so with Head Coach Eddie Chinske who speaks encouragingly about his 1954 prospects.

"Maybe I'm sticking my neck out, because all of the Skyline teams will be improved this year," Chinske says, "or maybe I'm just too optimistic...but I feel that we'll give any of our league opponents a peck of trouble if we stay in good physical con-

dition."

Chinske points out his qualifying "IFS" in terms of an unknown schedule. "We don't know what we'll be up against with Fort Lewis," he says. "They could show up for our first game with 11 All-Americans or 11 pros. We know our second go, against lowa, will be a rough tussel...mighty rough... and we won't come home but go right on to Denver for our third game. That'll give us two weeks on the road, but if we can get a few breaks and survive through without key injuries, I think we'll be fairly troublesome for our conference schedule."

Chinske's enthusiasm is founded: 1. The Silvertips had the best spring turnout in recent years (for the first time in three years had enough for an intrasquad game). 2. They have a more potent offense

than the past two seasons.

3. A fine array of running backs.

4. Over - all team speed and adequate frontline replacements to give regulars a needed rest.

5. And prospects of an improved running and passing attack, and a good line.

"We have more backs this season, and any we spring has the ability to go all the way," Chinske states. "We have the threat of our pass-

ing attack and will throw as much if not more than last year. In Dick Heath we have a fine T-quarter-back to throw short or long. If passing is improved as it should be, we'll keep opponents' halfbacks honest and open the secondary for our running attack."

BACKFIELD — (All eight lettermen return plus an offensive left half from the 1952 team.) Led by All-Conference Halfback Dick Imer, and veteran Co-Captains Heath and Murdo Campbell, competition for berths in the Silvertip secondary will be keen. The staff expects great things from Dale Shupe, letterman right half; from Don Bissell, and Bobby Powell, sophomore fullbacks, and Earl Shaw, junior,

and Pat Monno, sophomore halfbacks, all newcomers. For speed the Grizzlies have Bissell and Billy Gue, letter winning dashmen, and Imer, Monno, and Shupe, top intramural sprinters, plus Campbell, Shaw and Powell, who are break-away types — crafty in an open field, and Kaiserman with break-away speed. Heath's passing ranked nationally last season.

LINE — (All six letterman losses were in the forward wall. Eddie Anderson, end; Jim Burke, guard, and Capt. Joe Roberts, center, all regulars, gradu-

ated. Owen Deuchler, regular, and Vince Barone, semiregular, both junior tackles, to the service. Ken Leuthold, sophomore reserve tackle, dropped football). The Griz zlies should have a big, agile line with better reserve strength than last year. Look for Joe DeLuca, senior guard; Paul Weskamp, junior tackle, and Doug Dasinger, junior guard, to be the most promising veterans. Bob Miles, huge

tackle; Buck Gehring, junior tackle, and Bob Mc-Gihon, sophomore guard, should prove to be the most promising newcomers. Sophomores and newcomers will have to come through or line could be chief weakness. Weskamp, DeLuca, and Miles should all receive top All-Skyline consideration.

BY POSITION — ENDS: Could be the weakest position in the line, or could strength considerably if questionable pass-receivers develop. Need offen-

sive work. Have good defensive ends. Veterans Samuelson and Peterson should start.

TACKLES: Hardest hit position by losses but still should be main line strength. Miles, Weskamp, and Gehring topcalibre tackles. Should start in that order.

GUARDS: Has depth in letterman guards but needs offensive polish. Should be the strongest defensively. DeLuca

and Dasinger or Burke appear as likely regulars.

CENTERS: Situation is good. Jensen plays fine offensive center and fair defense, is two-year veteran and should start. Small will help termendously and could move in as regular. Sophomores Simon and Stone will come.

QUARTERBACKS: Heath has only experience. Potential but untied depth in sophomores Enochson and Schulz. Campbell could be moved back to quarterback if necessary.

LEFT HALFBACKS: Great runner in All-Conference Imer. Have depth and inexperience, but outstanding possibilities in Monno and Kaiserman.

RIGHT HALFBACKS: Campbell has the most experience, a three-year letterman who should have a great year. Also look for Shupe to go. Shaw will come through if he loses weight and Gue can be counted on. All are veterans except Shaw.

FULLBACKS: Anyone of four could draw starting assignments. Dantic, a two-year veteran, is most experienced, fast starter for quick openers, best faker, but is small for linebacking duties. Bissell is big, fast, tough, and most improved, but lacks experience. Powell has great possibilities, could be the explosive-type



Dasinger

fullback, but will be in a new role as he played halfback. Milne can do the best linebacking job and was strong on offense at close of '53 season, was injured during spring drills.

THUMBNAIL SKETCHES BY POSITIONS

Quarterbacks

**DICK HEATH — senior. A brilliant T-general and a straight A student in the School of Education, Heath was the busiest back in the Skyline last season. He averaged 101 yards per game on passes, completed 9 TD tosses, and played sixty full minutes in five of the Grizzly's eight ball games. With good passer protection and capable receivers Dick could have a great season, being the league's top QB and also one of the best in the nation. An old-fashioned triple-threat, the kid with the "rifle arm" can pass, bootleg, tuck-and-run when trapped, placekick and punt. He won a defensive starting berth on the Silvertip squad as a sophomore and also alternated on offense until an early injury sidelined him for most of the season. Was outstanding last year. At one time he held the state small-bore rifle championship. Is married, has a son over one year old, and hails from Miles City. Elected co-captain for the 1954 season.

PAUL ENOCHSON — sophomore. Came to the University with an outstanding high school reputation. An injury to his throwing arm kept him out of frosh competition last year. Looked fair in spring drills. Paul is a good ball handler, can pass, kick and run if necessary, and is extremely cool-headed. Played in Montana's East-West Shrine game for high school seniors and was All-State at Havre.

CLAYTON SCHULZ — sophomore. Was a surprise find on the frosh team last season and piloted the Cubs to two victories. Fakes well, throws well, and can tackle. Has desire but is small. Caught for freshman baseball team and is talented artist and cartoonist. From Beaverhead county high in Dillon.

Right Halfbacks

***MURDO CAMPBELL - senior. Mr. Versatile, Murdo came to the U as All-State quarterback and lettered his freshman year. Won offensive and defensive starting assignments as sophomore, but ability to run was reason for shift to halfback last season . . . played a lot of good ball at QB, HB, and FB on an under-manned team in 1953. Like Heath, he is a triple-threat and can play defense exceptionally well. Though not fast, Campbell is a clever, brokenfield runner and the team's second leading ball carrier. Has led the squad in punt returns for the past two seasons. Should play the season at right half unless needed at the T-server spot. Murdo is the youngest of four Campbell brothers to play for the University. Brother Ken was captain and center of 1950 team. Murdo lettered this spring as first-string shortstop for the Silvertips' Western Division Champs in baseball. Brother Tom, returned from service, is expected to crowd Murdo for the SS position next diamond season. "Tub" spent the summer in Scotland, on a visit with his parents. He is team cocaptain, major in journalism, comes from Great Falls.

**BILLY GUE — senior. Another Great Falls high school product. Has speed, earned varsity track letter as a freshman. Wears contact lenses, is small and short for pass defense but should see considerable action because of ball carrier abilities. Ranked fourth in rushing last year and will be a keen competitor for '54. Major: Business Administration.

*DALE SHUPE — junior. A powerful runner, rugged, works hard on assignments, and has come a long

way from six-man football days at Harlem, where he was sensational in small high school conference. Looked very good at close of '53 season and was great in spring drills. Has good stamina, loves to run, and is one of University's top intramural sprintmen. Could draw starting role and may be only a year away from being one of Skyline's best running backs. Married. Sociology major.

EARL SHAW — junior. An outstanding fullback at Olympic Junior College, Shaw reported for spring practice after two years in service. He made the longest runs in spring game but is slowed down by over-weight. Will be used at halfback and cannot be counted out for considerable action. Earl loves to tackle, plays good defense as well as offense, but needs work on blocking. Home town: Auburn, Wash.

DICK GREGORY — sophomore. A six-man football product from Alberton, Gregory has great deal to learn. Played good ball as freshman fullback, but will be switched to halfback. Dick is big, fast, loves contact, and has definite possibilities for bright future with the Grizzlies.

Fullbacks

**BOB DANTIC — senior. A starter for two years and pound for pound a great fullback, Dantic lead the Grizzlies in ground-gaining as a sophomore, averaging 5.2 yards in 83 carries . . . but top underclassmen candidates will push him all the way this season, and anyone of four could make first string. Competition in fullback spot will be very keen. Dantic has two years experience, is quick on his feet, is probably the best faker, and can drive up the middle. Consider that he will play at 160 pounds and he is top candidate for SMALL-AMERICAN. From Laurel, Montana.

*CURT MILNE — junior. Converted from quarter-back last season Curt averaged 5.2 yards in 17 tries. Is at his best as defensive linebacker and looked great both ways in the final three games of the '53 season. Was slowed down in spring drills by an injury, but should be in top shape and a tough competitor for the plunging position this year. Hails from Glendive. Is married.

DON BISSELL — sophomore. Coaches and prognosticators say this lad is destined to be great. He played six-man ball in high school at Belt Valley and played with the frosh in 1952, laying out last year because of inexperience. He is big, fast, rugged,

hard-running, and has learned to tackle and play defense. Has a great deal of desire and was one of most improved players in spring practice. He lettered as a dash-man on varsity track squad as a freshman. KEEP YOUR EYES on this boy...he has three years to go. Figure him to start out of sheer desire, until Dantic, Milne, or Powell prove otherwise.

BOBBY POWELL — sophomore. Top Cub halfback, but will be run at fullback because of explosive speed. Was All-State and All-American halfback for Missoula high school's 1952 state football champs. Bobby missed spring practice, but as a frosh displayed speed, good defense, and good running and passing abilities. He is a top prospect and could break into starting lineup as a sophomore. Also outstanding on top frosh basketball team. Was married during the summer.

Left Halfbacks

*DICK IMER - senior. All-Skyline, All-American honorable mention halfback, and voted the Grizzlies' most valuable player for 1953. Imer averaged 8.2 yards per try last year and ranked 18th in the nation as a ballcarrier. He also led the Silvertips in kickoff returns and points-after-touchdown and was second in punt returns and pass receiving. "The Little Penguin" missed most of three games because of injury last season, but was a giant at 5'6" and 166 pounds. If he holds together this season should be the league's best running back. Slippery and powerful at running, Dick lost yardage only twice in 86 carries...losing 10 yards. He netted 703, and his 221 yards in 22 tries against Denver was the best in the nation for regular season. Imer is fast, tricky, has a good change of pace, loves competition, and above all likes to win. All-State prep at Highland. Indiana. He was married last winter.

*ED STOCKING — junior. Lettered as a sophomore in 1952 but an operation kept him out of competition last year. Ed is a top javelin artist on the track team and has missed spring drills the past two years. He was strictly an offensive halfback under two-platoon, so still has defense to master. Has good speed and drive. Comes from Whitefish.

PAT MONNO — sophomore. Another sophomore back that will bare watching along with Bissell and Powell... Monno is big, fast, can play tough defense, and has one idea when he gets his hands on the ball — to put it in the end zone. Pat scored 26 touchdowns in one year for Anaconda high school — he

scored 12 TD's in 3 games, 4 in each game. He is an intramural top sprinter along with Shupe and Imer, and like Powell was honorable mention All-American halfback in high school. Was All-State 3 years. He was outstanding on a good Cub team and came fast in spring workouts. Monno has terrific potential...good enough that he may alternate with Imer as a starter!

BILL KAISERMAN — junior. A good, big boy who can run and kick, Kaiserman starred as a prep and had a bright football career marred by a back injury. He tried frosh football in 1951 but couldn't cut it. Seems recovered from injury and looked fine in spring drills. Ran very well in spring game and if back stands up could be front-line reserve. Married, his home town is Livingston.

Centers

**MARLYN JENSEN — senior. "Huz" is a fine offensive center, with two years varsity experience, and a pretty fair defensive linebacker. He puts his heart into the game, plays heads-up ball, and should be set for a good year. Experience gives him the nod as starter, but he should be pushed for the berth by Small. Jensen played football and baseball with Quarterback Heath at Custer County high school in Miles City. He is a newlywed, married in August.

BOB SMALL — junior. A hometown boy who brought smiles to the coaches' faces when he returned to Missoula, Small transferred from Seattle University where they play no football. He laid out last year and is bigger and much improved over high school. Bob was a rough customer in spring workouts and displayed great defensive promise. Has the size and the know-how of a good college center. Could be regular.

OTTO SIMON — sophomore. A good defensive center up from the freshman team. Should come. Otto's a tough boy, can back the line and tackle. Needs to improve offense and needs experience. From Butte.

JIM STONE — sophomore. Like Simon, Stone is up from the Cub team. He also tackles well, but needs blocking work and experience. Has the interest and attitude. A definite prospect for future. Comes to U. from Billings.

Guards

**JOE DELUCA — senior. A boy who has won admiration and acclaim throughout the Skyline because of his outstanding performances as a guard and linebacker for the Silvertips the past two seasons, Joe should be set for his biggest year. Barring injury could be one of top guards in the league. Was an honorable mention choice last season. Is determined to go and will be out for a crack at the Skyline Seniors first appearance in the Salad Bowl. Has been regular for two seasons, should hold it. Has also been a top heavyweight boxer in the University M-Club tourney the past two years. Attended Olympic JC. Home is Weed, California.

*HOWARD BURKE — senior. Saw a lot of action last year and is a proven guard whose strongest suit is defense. Could be regular but will be pushed by junior lettermen. Has benefit of more experience, is conscientious and "football-smart." Howard is the brother of Jim, a standout at a guard slot last season. Livingston is his home town.

*DOUG DASINGER — junior. With a reputation as one of the toughest and the squad's keenest competitor, "Daz" left to join the service last year but returned to school — much to coaches' satisfaction. Small, but a good linebacker and a hard tackler, Doug could draw starting assignments. He comes from Wolf Point.

*WALT LAIRD — junior. An ex-serviceman and a good, tough mate for Dasinger at guard, Laird is a questionable for this season. A shoulder injury in the Grizzly's final game kept Walt on the sidelines even through spring drills. IF Laird is set to go, Montana will have little worries for capable guard depth. Walt is an older brother of "Bo," Grizzly fullback of 1950-51-52 seasons. Is married and from Miles City.

GENE DOWNEY — senior. An outstanding guard for Montana State College two years, Gene is back from a 24-month service hitch. Displayed possibilities in spring practice, should round back to form. Is strong on defense. Married, he comes from Butte.

BOB McGIHON — sophomore. Has the ability to be the "surprise" sophomore. McGihon is big, tough, fairly fast, and plays a good defensive game. He has the right object in mind — to tackle the man with the ball. Was outstanding with the Cubs and during spring drills. Bob came to the University with seven

years' Air Force service and is older and more mature than average sophomore. Could make competition interesting for the veterans at the guard posts, and could possibly be one of the league's top sophomore linemen. He also plays basketball, is a star softball player, and refused a college scholarship to play volleyball. He is married, became a father the end of July, and calls Great Falls home. Attended high school in Webster, N. Y.

DAVE DONTIGNY — sophomore. A small guard up from the frosh team, Dave can tackle and play the defense but offensive blocking leaves something to be desired. Lacks experience, but high school, freshman, and spring ball indicate definite possibilities for development as future guard mainstay. From Hayre.

EDDIE GRON — sphomore. Another boy who put in his service hitch before starting college, Gron may be a year away. Needs offensive development to go with his good defensive work. Has good size, fair speed, and was All-Conference in city of Chicago, at Senn high school. Played a little service ball and has frosh and spring practice experience.

Tackles

**DON LITTLE — senior. A quiet, steady, serious type ballplayer. Don was an All-State high school center, lettered as a sophomore guard, and last year as a tackle. An honor-roll student, but has not reached football capabilities. Staff feels he is in for his best year. Is big and has know-how. He is married, becames a father this summer, and hails from Helena.

*PAUL WESKAMP — junior. The team's fastest lineman. Big and rugged, Paul had a great sophomore year spoiled by injury. Well recovered, he should be set to establish himself as one of the league's top tackles. He was voted the outstanding lineman on the field in the Grizzly's first game last year. Had his uniform thrown off the train on one trip, mistaken for a mail sack by trainman. He played fullback as a freshman. Is a farm boy from Ronan. Definite All-Conference candidate.

BOB MILES — senior. One of the most football-wise tackles to hit the Grizzly den in the last decade, this boy should be great . . . not only in the Skyline Conference but in the nation as well. He is big, catty (like a big cat), has speed, and can go both ways. Teammates say "you can block him, but you

can't move him." A heady lineman, he was a revelation in spring drills, and a bright star during the spring game. Is also a kick-off artist. Miles played a year at junior college and a year at Tulsa University before entering the service. Most surprising about Mlies...he's a "sleeper" or a "find." He returned from the service, entered school, and walked into the coach's office to ask for an opportunity to try out for the squad. His home town: Anaconda, Mont.

BUCK GEHRING — junior. A tall, rangy tackle — good defensively and an excellent blocker. Could alternate as a regular. Buck was great at Olympic junior college in Washington. Transferred in time for spring drills and looked very impressive in action. Another married man and a recent father, Gehring is from Port Orchard, Washington.

ART DAHLBERG — sophomore. Lack of experience may hold Art back this year. He played only offense in high school and is unproven on defense. Staff liked spirit and determination in spring ball and feel he will develop. He is an accomplished singer and nephew of Athletic Director Jiggs Dahlberg. Art played two years of high school ball in Savanah, Georgia, and two years in Albuquergue, New Mexico, where he was All-State second team for Highland high. He calls Butte, Montana, home.

JIM BLACK — sophomore. A big, 230-pound, six-foot-four sophomore tackle of unknown capabilities. Jim is quick and agile for his size and looked good with the freshmen, but missed spring drills due to his weightman duties with the track squad. Has all the physical qualities to be future great, and is a boy who will receive thorough coaching attention. From Ravalli, Montana, Black attended high school in St. Ignatius and lettered 11 times in football, basketball, track, and baseball.

Ends

**GEORGE SAMUELSON — senior. The big 6-foot-5-inch frame of "Sam" should be the chief target for tosses this year. He was a regular from the start last year, but was lost for the season after the Silvertips' second game. He recovered exceptionally fast from a knee operation and went on to win his second varsity basketball letter as a center. George has nice hands for aerials, has fair speed, and plays good defensive wingman. Should be back at a starting end. From Glendive.

*KEITH PETERSON — senior. A good, steady, deceptive end, "Pete" plays a mean defensive game and is a pretty fair pass-catcher. He had a good season with the Grizzlies last year and also earned a letter as left-fielder with baseball nine. He came to Montana from Centrallia junior college and is from Seattle. Should draw regular starting assignment.

*KEN BYERLY — junior. This converted fullback came a long way as a sophomore wingman last year. Saw considerable action and should continue to improve with experience. He is a good pass-receiver and does well on down-field blocking assignments. From Lewistown.

NELS OLSON — sophomore. Nels transferred from Olympic JC, played spring ball with the Grizzlies in 1952, then entered the service, and returned for '54 summer quarter. He is big, has fair speed, and can clutch passes, but is virtually an unknown quality in the Grizzly lair. From Bellevue, Washington.

JERRY JOHNSON — junior. A new Olson-and-Johnson team. Jerry and Nels are roommates. The same thing can be said about both. Johnson is a summer school student recently returned from service. He went to Portland University on a football scholar-ship before that school dropped the pigskin sport. He is also a basketball prospect. Has nice size and good hands for a wingman. Is from Lewistown.

PETE MURI — sophomore. Not big—not fast, but a good defensive end who knows how to use his hands well. At his best in actual competition, Pete played football, basketball, and baseball for the Cubs last year. He was an All-Stater at Custer county high in Miles City and his home town is Rosebud.

FRED BRAUTIGAN — sophomore. The other first-string end up from the frosh, Brautigan is a good receiver. Coaches feel that he has all the physical qualifications to be a great wingman. A 1953 summer quarter entrant, Fred won his first varsity letter in baseball this spring as a right fielder. He also has great diamond promise. From Billings.

FRANK KOCSIS — sophomore. A boy who came to Montana to play baseball, Frank may turn out to be a football "find" as well. Though he has not played football since high school days and missed the freshman season, Kocsis was the most improved man during spring training. He is fast, has guts, and nobody on the club works harder. He needs blocking
