Notes from the Director

The Women's Studies Program enters its eighth year with a challenge grant and the invitation to all who support the program to consider donating to meet the challenge. Two donors have offered to match any contributions made through the Excellence Fund Drive or otherwise before December 1, 1998, up to \$15,000 to the Louise Greene/Elizabeth Smith endowment. Gifts of \$500 or more will be matched again by the College of Arts and Sciences.

These are extraordinary gestures of support and confidence from past contributors, seeking to broaden the base of "Friends of Women's Studies." Why should you give, particularly this fall when good causes, electoral politics, and capital campaigns abound? Three reasons. First, Women's Studies uses resources well. This year alone, the program is cosponsor for two Presidential Lecture series speakers, the Five Rivers Film Festival conference, as well as guest lecturers with Asian Studies, African American Studies, Film Studies, Fine Arts, Journalism, History, English, Anthropology, Sociology and Recreation departments. In addition to the new scholarship and faculty prize, we also have two new supplemental travel grants for faculty to present their research at national or international conferences.

Second, Women's Studies is catalyst to change and social equality in many ways. Two years ago, only one woman was featured for Homecoming alumni; this year Homecoming featured equal numbers of male and female distinguished alumni. Also this year, cross-listed courses include more male faculty teaching 'content' courses on women and gender issues than ever before. Outreach is effectively stimulating innovation in curriculum and debate about scholarship in women's studies, not as a separate concern, but one interwoven in course work on human rights, social movements, international studies and constitutional law. The recently formed student group, Women in Science and Engineering, called the program and asked if we could collaborate on a speaker series for spring; I was delighted. The Women's Law Caucus has a liaison member for the Women's Studies Program to coordinate jointly sponsored events as well. The best outreach is that which takes place of its own accord, by women in all fields of the liberal arts and sciences. The program exists to support them.



Third, Women's Studies adapts to address the current intellectual and activist interests of women on campus and in the state. Twenty-five years ago UM students had to organize their own courses to study women. This year we enter with a major, a minor, and expanded opportunities for Work-Based Learning Internships. When I advise students—prospective, undergraduate, nontraditional and those returning to the university—they ask me what internships and careers they can pursue with a degree in Women's Studies. Faculty ask about resources for new course development, and how to connect with faculty and branch campuses in Dillon and Butte. If Women's Studies is to make a difference, not only for this university, but for the state of Montana, we need to invest in these women: as students, faculty, staff, and community leaders. G.G. The current issue includes more than 14,000 records published from 1992 to the present. Quarterly updates each contain about 2,000 new records. Shohini Ghosh to Visit Women's Studies

Shohini Ghosh, feminist activist and teacher of film making in India, will present a lecture "Current Crises, Distant Dreams: Independent Film making in India" on Friday, October 23 from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. in room 138 of the Liberal Arts Building at The University of Montana. This lecture is free and open to the public. From 8:40 to 10:00 a.m., she will visit the School of Journalism to present an informal discussion of her observations about censorship in India and views about how the Indian media portray women, for the Radio-TV Senior Seminar in room 205 of the Gallagher Business Building.

Shohini Ghosh teaches Video and Television Production at the Mass Communication Research Centre at Jamia Millia Islamia in New Delhi, India where she also coordinates and teaches the course on media studies. Between 1991 and 1996, Ms. Ghosh was Visiting Associate Professor at the Department of Communication at Cornell University. She taught two courses titled Video for Development and Social Intervention; and Gender, Media and Representation. She is co-founder and a member of India's first feminist film collective, Mediastorm, and co-director of the Centre for Feminist Legal Research in New Delhi. Ms. Ghosh is currently a special consultant for UNICEF in Dhaka, Bangladesh for gender and media training. Ms. Ghosh has also worked as producer/director of educational films for the University Grant Commission, where she produced 12 documentary films in 1987-88 for nationwide telecast. Her recent production involvement (as on-location director and interviewer) was on the documentary film "Three Women and a Camera" about women photographers in India.

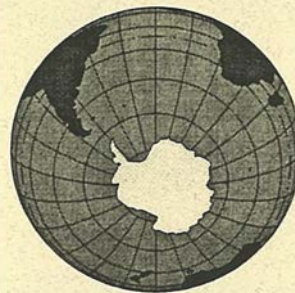
