TWO unidentified Negroes have been shot to death by police in a car chase following the alleged arson at a radio station and a store in Montgomery, Ala. Two others, both identified as New Yorkers, are in custody. . . . E even school districts in Mississippi put racial integration into effect today. There were no incidents as Negroes entered the schools while federal marshals looked on.

AP INTERNATIONAL

AMERICAN Peace Corps volunteers in Afghanistan plan to protest U.S. involvement in Vietnam during vice-president Agnew's visit to the country. Peace Corps officials say the volunteers plan to wear black armbands during the two-day visit, beginning tomorrow. . . . The South Vietnamese Senate has approved a resolution saying a regrettable incident that cost civilian fatalities occurred at My Lai, but it stops short of calling it a massacre. The resolution also calls it the single act of a U.S. unit and it demands action by President Thieu to protect the lives of civilians.

AP STATE

THE frozen body of a 20-year-old Blaine County jail escapee has been found in a borrow pit, five miles north of Chinook. Sheriff Murdo McLean said Glen Azure Jr., of Chinook, and Daniel Morsett, 24, of the Rocky Boy Reservation, had escaped from the facility Saturday and traveled north in a car. Morsett was hospitalized for frostbite.

THE Vietnam Moratorium Committee has announced a fast and rallies for April 15, the deadline for filing income tax returns. It will be a protest on the use of tax money for the war in Vietnam. . . One of the girls who attended last summer's cookout on a Massachusetts island began testifying today in the closed inquest into the death of Mary Jo Kopechne. . . An attempted airplane hijacking was thwarted today in Jacksonville, Fla.

AP INTERNATIONAL

THE Viet Cong and the North Vietnamese made more heavy attacks today in the Northern provinces of South Vietnam. First reports say 15 Americans were killed and 72 wounded in the coastal lowlands south of Da Nang, with at least 26 of the enemy reported dead. . . Israeli planes pounded military targets in Egypt and Arab guerrilla bases in Lebanon today. A military spokesman in Tel Aviv says all Israeli planes returned. Today's air action follows in Israeli report of an Egyptian commando attack across the canal Morday night north of Port Taufiq.

AP STATE

A spokesman for Glacier National Park says a decision may be made tonight on whether to continue the search for five missing mountaineers. Meanwhile, 20 skilled climbers remain on the higher slopes of Mount Cleveland in hopes of finding some trace of the five youths. . . The chief aide to Gov. Forrest Anderson says if inflation continues at its present rate it will erode \$16-million in spending power from the state's general fund next biennium.

INFORMANTS in Saigon say top American military officers will meet in Honolulu next Monday to work out final arrangements for the third-round withdrawal of 50,000 U.S. troops from Vietnam. . . Michele Jacot of France has captured the special slalom race of the Women's International Ski Series on the basis of provisional, unofficial results. Miss Jacot flashed down a steep slope at the foot of the Eiger Mountain in Switzerland for a combined time of 97.49 seconds for two legs.

A GOVERNMENT-APPOINTED task force says heart transplant surgery is worth continuing, even though such surgery is still mostly in the investigational stage. . . The city of Alexandria, Va., has decided what to do with 25,000 used Christmas trees. They'll be shredded by a machine at a scrap metal company and used for land fill. . . An inquest has opened in Chicago into the slaying of two Black Panther leaders during a police raid.

Great Northern Railway announces its company directors have approved a 1970 capital improvements program totaling nearly \$41 million. The student to receive the award will be named by the UM Scholarship and Loan Committee.

THE DEPARTMENT OF GEOLOGY has been awarded a National Science Foundation grant of \$50,900 for continued study of the Flint Creek Range, 70 miles southeast of Missoula near Philipsburg. During the grant's two-year duration, two members of the geology faculty, Dr. Arnold J. Silverman and Dr. Donald W. Hyndman, will research a type of rock known as granitic pluton, which has never previously been studied in any great detail in the Flint Creek area.

THE TENNESSEE SUPREME COURT has refused to grant a new trial to James Ray, under 99-year sentence for the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King. . .The five young women who attended an island cookout with Mary Jo Kopechne returned today to the courthouse where the inquest into Miss Kopechne's death is under way.

AN INVALID, WHEEL-CHAIR-BOUND woman died in her Spokane home last night after a cigarette-caused fire broke out and she was unable to escape. . .The American Forest Institute reports Montana has more than 1 million acres in the Tree Farm System, an industry sponsored program using modern forestry practices to assure repeated crops of timber to meet the nation's increasing needs. . .Final arguments are being heard today in Jackson, Wyo., in the trial of 25-year-old Russell Payne, who has pleaded guilty to two counts of manslaughter in the deaths of his parents. A New York doctor said yesterday Payne was under the influence of a powerful drug which curbs behavioral problems the night his parents were shot and could not control himself. Payne said he was taking the drug to control excessive drinking.

A LAOTIAN government spokesman says Pathet Lao and North Vietnamese forces fired 15 rockets into that country's second largest city (Pakse) today. . . North Vietnam's 21 million people, who've been living on a war footing for nearly three decades, have been told by their defense minister that the end is not yet in sight. Vo Ngyuen Giap says victory is not near, and the war can be expected to continue indefinitely. . . An American task-force has clashed for the second day in a row with North Vietnamese troops 55 miles north of Saigon.

THE NATION'S capital had its coldest Jan. 9 on record today--a +4⁰, and most of the nation is shivering along with Washington. . . A tanker with 41 men aboard, which was reported sinking slowly in the storm-tossed Pacific 250 miles west of Los Angeles, is now reported to have stopped taking on water. . . Unemployment throughout the country remained at the relatively low rate of 3.4 per cent of the labor force in December. . . The triple slaying of union reformer Joseph Yablonski, his wife and daughter was called a "deed of infamy" at joint funeral services in Washington, Pa., today.

BIAFRA HAS surrendered after fighting 30 months in an effort to enforce secession from Nigeria. The man left in charge after Biafran leader Odumegwu Ojukwu left the country, Maj.-Gen. Philip Effimng, made the announcement in a broadcast to Biafrans. . . In Vatican City, Pope Paul voiced concern for the second day in a row over the plight of civilian war victims in Nigeria and Biafra. . . The 26th Marine Regiment, which withstood the 77-day siege of the Khe Sanh nearly two years ago, will be among some 50,000 U.S. troops scheduled to pull out of S. Vietnam by mid-April.

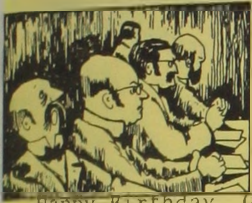
