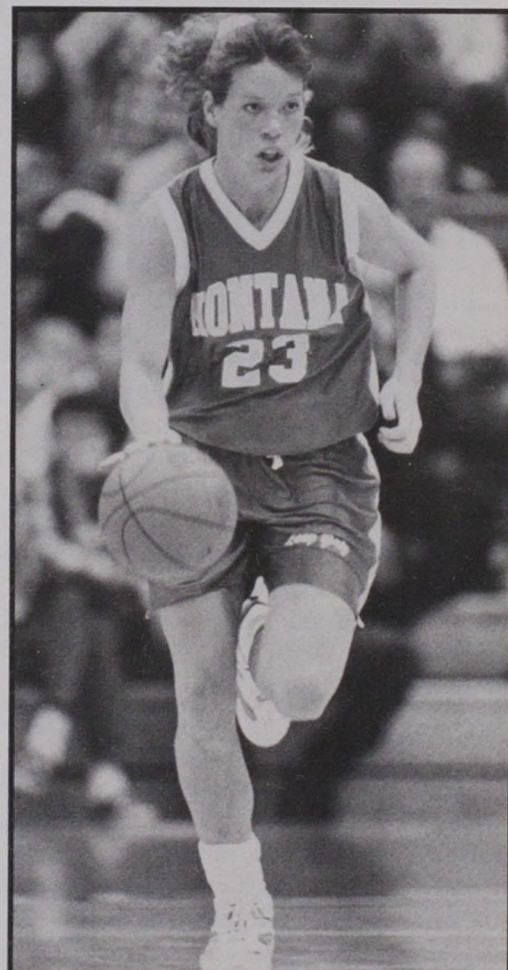

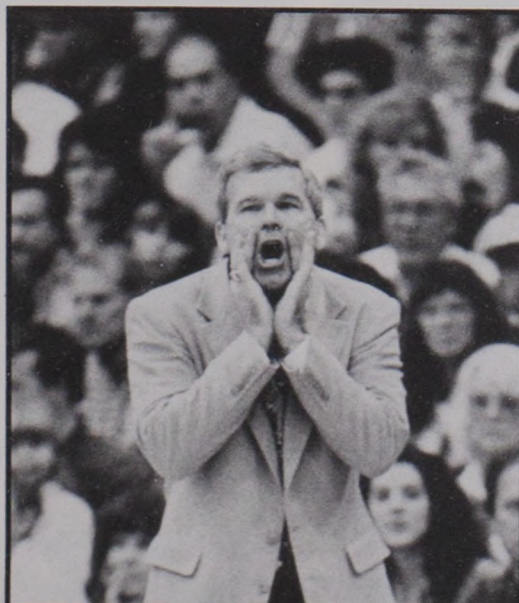

The University of Montana



The University of Montana in Missoula is located in a mountain forest setting in beautiful western Montana. It is halfway between Glacier and Yellowstone national parks.

Four wilderness areas are located near Missoula. The natural surroundings offer excellent opportunities for hunting, fishing, backpacking, river floating, camping and other outdoor recreational pursuits. Two excellent winter ski areas are within minutes of the University, and several other ski areas are only a couple of hours away by car. UM owns and operates its own golf course near the campus.

The University of Montana is one of the West's pioneers in education and celebrated its Centennial last year, as it was chartered February 17, 1893. The school opened in September 1895 with 50 students enrolled the first day. Located on 207 acres at the base of Mount Sentinel, UM has grown from 50 students and seven faculty members to a present enrollment of over 11,000 and approximately 450 full-time faculty positions.

Throughout its history, the University of Montana has sustained a high standard of academic excellence in teaching, research and service.

UM offers a general associate of arts degree and bachelor's degrees in 50 fields. It offers master's degrees in 45 programs and doctoral degrees in nine.

The College of Arts and Sciences, which is the core of the University, includes a full range of programs and courses in the life sciences, physical sciences, social sciences and humanities. The college also offers curricula in interdisciplinary fields such as ethnic studies and liberal studies.

The University also has schools of business administration, fine arts, journalism, education, forestry, law, and pharmacy and allied health sciences.

The University aims to provide its students a humane and productive learning experience with the best facilities possible. The administration, faculty and staff strive for this goal.

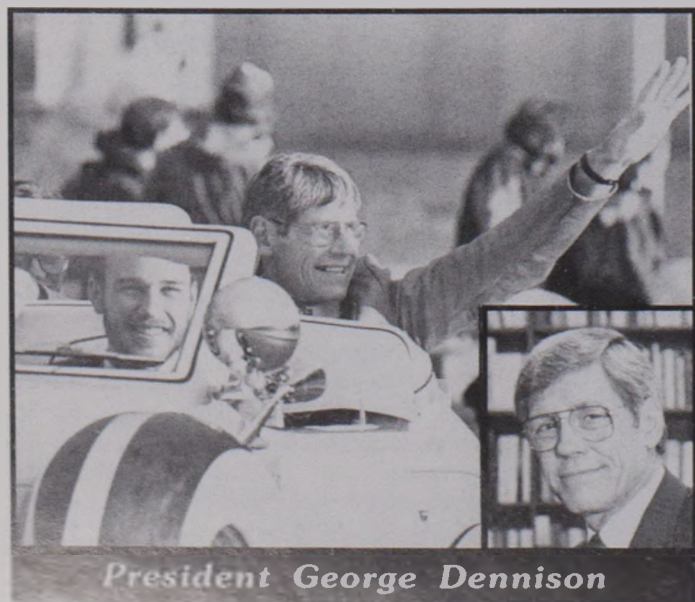
George Dennison became the 16th president of The University of Montana on August 15, 1990.

Before coming to UM, Dennison was provost and vice president for academic affairs at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, a post he had held since 1987.

He is a former resident of Kalispell, and a UM alumnus. A history professor, he earned two degrees in that field at Montana: a master's in 1963 and a bachelor's with highest honors in 1962. In 1967, he completed a doctorate in history at the University of Washington.

Before joining Western Michigan's administration, he held a number of positions at Colorado State University between 1969 and 1987. They include history professor, admissions and records director, associate academic vice president, graduate school associate dean and associate dean of the college of the arts, humanities and social sciences.

Dennison and his wife, Jane, also from Kalispell, have two children.

Administration

Bill Moos is in his fifth year as Athletic Director at The University of Montana. During his first four years at UM, Moos has overseen a program that has produced nine Big Sky Championships and eight teams that have qualified for NCAA postseason play.

Moos has been instrumental in generating revenue for Grizzly athletics by incorporating the Grizzly Athletic Association into the department and by creating a new position that concentrates on corporate sponsorships.

He has twice served as Director of the Big Sky postseason men's basketball tournament and is a member of the NCAA Division I-AA Football Committee.

Moos came to UM from his alma mater, Washington State, where had been an associate athletic director since 1982.

He graduated from Washington State in 1973 with a degree in History. As a Cougar athlete, he was an all-Pac 10 and all-Pacific Coast selection in football. He played in the East-West Shrine Game in 1972.

Bill, and his wife, Kendra, have three children: Christa, Brittany, and Bo.

Bill is beginning his second year as Assistant Athletic Director at The University of Montana. His duties include the identification and solicitation of potential corporate sponsors; evaluation and development of radio and television rights contracts; and committee chairman of UM's annual men's basketball tournament.

He was the assistant director of the Grizzly Athletic Association at UM from 1988 to July of 1991. Bill also served as the Sports Information Director at Montana from 1967 to 1969. He was the sports editor at The Missoulian from 1969-71.

"Grizzly Bill" was the "voice" of Montana football and men's basketball for 20 years, before retiring from those duties in the spring of 1993. He has been named Montana's Sportscaster of the Year six times.

Schwanke is a 1967 graduate of Montana, earning a B.A. degree in Journalism. He received Montana's Alumni Award on Centennial Charter Day, Feb. 18, 1993.

Bill and his wife, Lynn, have four children: Amber, Myka, Corbin, and Genna.

Al is beginning his 17th year as Executive Director of the Grizzly Athletic Association, formerly known as the Century Club.

In 1977 Century Club raised approximately \$70,000 for intercollegiate athletics. Last year the G.A.A. generated over \$650,000 in private support with emphasis primarily on athletic scholarships, but the G.A.A. assists in all phases of athletic department operations.

Kempfert came to UM from California Lutheran University, where he had served as the Director of Alumni/Parent Relations from 1971 to 1977. He served in the U.S. Army from 1968-71 and in Vietnam from 1969-70, receiving many commendations. He is an alumnus of C.L.U., where he was a three-sport letterman and voted the Outstanding Senior Athlete in 1967.

Al has three children: Kim, Matthew, and David.

Kathy has been the Associate Athletic Director at Montana for the past six years, and in 1989 she served as interim Athletic Director. She has overseen three I-AA football playoff games, six Big Sky Conference women's basketball tournaments, as well as several NCAA women's basketball games.

She was instrumental in UM's successful hosting of the Division I Women's Basketball West Regional Championship held in Dahlberg Arena in March of 1993.

Prior to her arrival at UM, Noble was the Assistant Director of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Public Facilities in Miami, Florida.

She has 19 years of experience in college administration. She was the Associate Athletic Director at the University of Miami from 1983-86. Prior to that she was the Academic Counselor in athletics at Boise State (1982-83) and a Residence Hall Director at Washington State (1976-82).

Noble earned her B.A. degree in Social Sciences at Central Washington University in 1971. She received a master's degree in Counseling at Washington State in 1979 and is currently a Ph.D. candidate in Counseling, also at Washington State.

Gary is the veteran of Montana's athletic department and is starting his 29th year at UM. He became Athletic Ticket Manager in 1966 and was appointed Manager of Athletics Facilities and Revenue in 1978.

He manages all scheduling in Adams Field House, Washington-Grizzly Stadium and Dornblaser Track and Field. In addition, he also oversees the TIC-IT-E-Z Ticketing System, all athletic revenue, concessions operations, event staffing, and various other duties.

He is a native of Ronan, Montana and graduated in accounting from Missoula Business College in 1962. He gained experience in accounting and auditing before assuming his responsibilities at Montana.

Marie also serves as an assistant tennis coach.



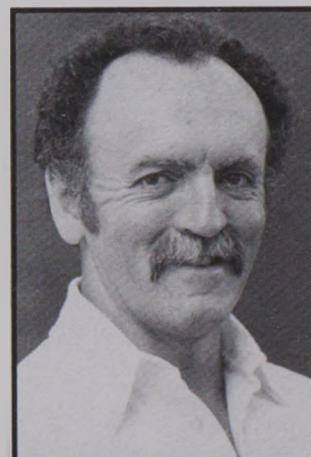
DENNIS MURPHY

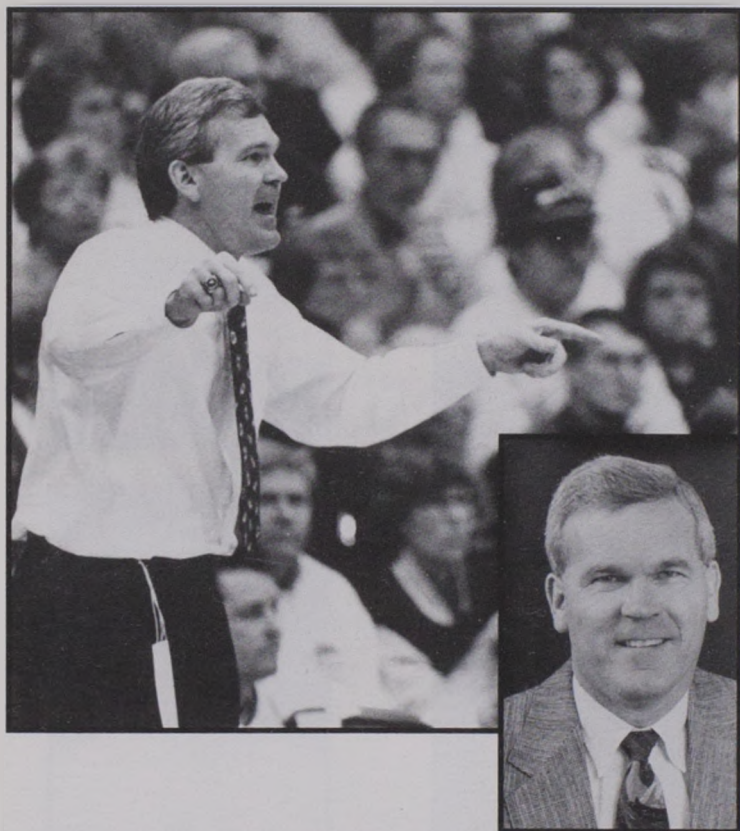

ROBIN SELVIG
383-93, 16 Years

The all-time winningest coach in Montana history, Robin Selvig has developed the Lady Griz basketball program into one of the most successful in the nation. Entering his 17th year at the helm of the program, he is the fifth winningest active coach in Division I women's basketball, winning 80 percent of all the games he has coached at The University of Montana.

Selvig was appointed the fourth head coach of the Lady Griz program in 1978, and since then he has brought national prominence to UM.

Robin has led his teams to 12 postseason tournaments, including nine NCAA Championship appearances. Montana advanced to the West Regional in 1984, and has advanced to the second round five times. He has coached his teams to 14 consecutive 20-win seasons, dating back to 1980-81.

Selvig's teams have dominated the Big Sky Conference since its inception in 1982. Montana's record is 164-12 against conference foes during the regular season and 21-3 in league tournaments. Selvig has won 93 percent (185-15) of his games against Big Sky opponents. Robin and his teams have gone undefeated in conference action five

times, including three consecutive seasons in which Montana went 16-0. He has guided his teams to 10 regular-season titles and nine tournament titles in 12 years. No other coach in the Big Sky Conference has come close to that success.

Selvig's talent and work ethic have earned him many awards. Robin is a 10-time Big Sky/Mountain West Coach of the Year (1983, 84, 86, 87, 88, 89, 90, 91, 92, 94) and an eight-time NCAA District 7 Coach of the Year (1984, 85, 88, 89, 90, 91, 92, 94). He was also one of three finalists for the 1991 NCAA Division I National Coach of the Year.

Selvig's trademark is defense, and last year Montana was second in the nation in field-goal percentage defense (.354). In 1992-93 Montana set a new NCAA Division I record in that category, holding opponents to .317 shooting from the field.

Selvig's success on the court has carried over into the bleachers. Montana has been consistently ranked among the top 10 programs in the nation in attendance for the past five years. Last year Montana was ranked 10th in the nation in attendance, averaging a school-record 5,123 fans per home game. When Selvig began coaching the Lady Griz in 1978, Montana averaged just over 200 fans per home game.

Robin has served on several NCAA committees and is a long-time member of the Women's Basketball Coaches' Association. He also votes on the Associated Press Poll. Extending himself beyond UM Athletics, Selvig was the Director of the Montana Special Olympics in 1991 and 1992, and he has been a spokesperson for Missoula Youth Homes.

A native of Outlook, Mont., Selvig came to UM in 1970. He played his first season on the freshmen team, then earned three varsity letters under Jud Heathcote. He was a 1974 Big Sky all-conference guard as a senior, leading the Grizzlies to a 19-8 record that season. The following year Selvig coached the UM freshmen team, along with fellow teammate Kevin Rocheleau.

Selvig was the recipient of the 1974 John Eaheart Award, given annually to Montana's outstanding defensive player. That same year he received Montana's top athletic award, the Grizzly Cup, and he was inducted into the Grizzly Basketball Hall of Fame in 1983.

He received his bachelor's degree in health & physical education in 1974. After graduation, he returned to northeastern Montana to coach girls' basketball at Plentywood High School. During his stint there from 1975 to 1978, he compiled a record of 38-24.

Robin's brother, Doug, was a four-year letterman for the Grizzly hoop team from 1981-84, and he currently coaches at Westby High School. His sister, Sandy (Sullivan) was a member of the Lady Griz basketball team from 1978-81.

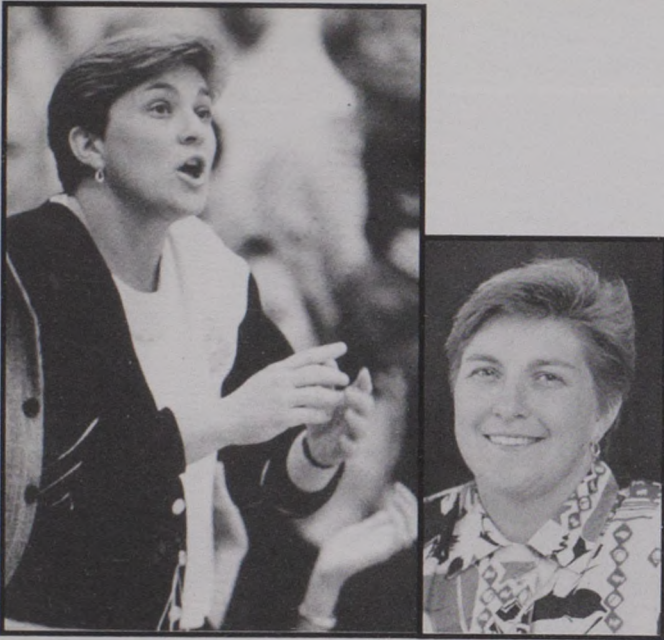

Annette Rocheleau has been Robin Selvig's assistant coach for 13 years, and she is entering her 14th season as Selvig's number-one assistant. She has helped bring the Lady Griz program into national prominence. Her primary responsibilities are game strategy, conditioning, scouting, and travel arrangements.

Rocheleau coached the junior varsity team in her first two seasons as a UM assistant coach from 1981-83. She was appointed Montana's first full-time assistant women's basketball coach in September of 1983.

Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Whitaker-Rocheleau was Montana's starting point guard from 1979-81. She was the team captain during both of those seasons, and she was selected UM's Most Inspirational Player as a senior. Rocheleau is currently 17th on Montana's all-time assist list with 132 career assists in only two years.

Annette transferred to Montana from Wenatchee Valley Junior College and walked on the Lady Griz team. She and fellow teammate Jill Greenfield led Wenatchee Valley J.C. to two state junior college championship titles, and she was team captain there as a sophomore.

Rocheleau is a 1977 graduate of Cashmere High School in Cashmere, Wash., where she was a four-year letter winner in both basketball and tennis from 1974 to 1977. She received her bachelor's degree from UM in health & physical education in 1982.

Last year Rocheleau was appointed the assistant coach for the inaugural women's golf team at The University of Montana and is in her second year in that position.

Annette is a member of the Converse Coach of the Year committee, and she was the assistant director of the Montana Special Olympics in 1990 and 1991.

She is married to Kevin Rocheleau, a former Grizzly basketball player who played with Robin Selvig, and they have one daughter, Trae, who was born on April 18, 1994.



SHANNON CATE
Assistant Coach

Shannon Cate is in her second season as a full-time assistant coach under mentor Robin Selvig. She joined the UM coaching staff as a student assistant in 1992 and was appointed to a full-time position in July 1993.

Her primary coaching responsibility is recruiting, but she will also assist with conditioning, game strategy, and scouting.

Cate was the Big Sky's first and only national Kodak All-American after leading the Lady Griz to a 103-18 overall record from 1988-92. She was a three-time District 7 All-American, a two-time Big Sky MVP, a three-time Big Sky tournament MVP, and a three-time Lady Griz MVP. She was also a two-time Big Sky all-academic selection.

Probably the Big Sky's most prolific player, Cate left the court as the Big Sky's all-time leading scorer among both men and women. She owns 14 school records and nine Big Sky Conference records, averaging 18.7 points, 7.6 rebounds and 3.6 assists per game over the course of four years. She was consistently ranked among the top Division I players in the country in scoring, field-goal percentage and free-throw percentage.

Cate was a three-time state tournament MVP for her Billings Central prep team. A native of Billings, she was also the Montana USA Today Player of the Year in 1988.

Cate spent a short period of time playing basketball for a Spanish national team, but returned to the states because of her shoulder injury. She dislocated her right shoulder and had surgery in April of 1991, then after dislocating it seven times during her senior season, she had her second surgery in April of 1992.

Shannon received her B.A. degree in Business Administration in May of 1993. She is single.



TRISH DUCE
Restricted Earnings Coach

Trish (Olson) Duce returns to the court this season in a different capacity, as she has been appointed Montana's restricted-earnings coach, replacing Joy Anderson. She will primarily be responsible for film exchange and administrative duties.

Duce had a successful career at Montana, despite being plagued by broken bones in her right foot. She came to UM from Missoula's Big Sky High School in 1989 and played in 28 games as a true freshman. She started in 29 games as a sophomore and was a Big Sky Conference all-tournament selection after leading the Lady Griz to a 77-49 victory over Montana State in the championship game.

In 1991-92, Trish broke a bone in her foot and was granted a medical redshirt season after competing in only three games. The following season she missed nine games due to another broken bone in her foot; however, she was named to the Western States Showdown all-tournament team after tallying a school-record eight blocks against Western Carolina. Last year as a fifth-year senior, Olson started 24 of 25 games and completed her career as Montana's 11th all-time leading blocker with 89.

Trish completed her B.S. degree in Mathematics in May of 1993 and began working on a Master's degree in computer science last year. She is a four-time Big Sky all-academic selection.

She married Kirk Duce, a former Grizzly football kicker, on July 30, 1994.

Lady Griz Basketball...A Real Crowd Pleaser

The 1994-95 Lady Griz basketball team enters the season with hopes of repeating the success of last year. Although Montana is still unproven this year, the Lady Griz plan to bring Coach Robin Selvig his 15th 20-win season and his 400th career victory.

The Lady Griz hoopsters provided Missoula with one of its most popular entertainment events last year, averaging a school-record 5,123 fans per home game. With a 10th-place finish in the Division I attendance rankings, Montana was invited to compete in the second annual Women's Basketball Attendance Challenge this season.

Increasing the average attendance isn't the only challenge facing the Lady Griz this season. Montana must replace three starters from last year's 25-5 team. Lost are Big Sky all-conference players and co-MVPs Ann Lake and Kelly Pilcher, both of whom started all 30 games and averaged 27 and 31 minutes per game, respectively. Lake's rebounding expertise and Pilcher's ability to run the offense are not easy to replace. Montana also lost Trish Olson, the starting center for 24 of 25 games last season, plus back-up guard Kristin Omlid, Montana's most accurate three-point shooter. In addition, the Lady Griz are without center Jill Frohlich, who decided to forego her final season of eligibility because of knee problems, and reserve guard Dawn Sievers, who gave up basketball for a curriculum in medicine in North Dakota. Six players are gone, leaving only two starters plus five other letter winners to continue the success of the Lady Griz tradition.

"The scary thing about going into this season is that we lost three very good starters and three other players who contributed a lot to this program," said Selvig. "The exciting thing, however, is that we have athletes who are ready to step forward and accept the responsibilities that lie ahead."

Stepping up to accept the responsibility of being nationally competitive has been a tradition with Lady Griz athletes. Selvig's players have challenged each other year-in and year-out, striving for improvement and consistency. This year is no different, as the Lady Griz will embark on a tough schedule from the very beginning.

Montana opens the season on November 15, when it hosts Oklahoma in the first annual Women's National Invitational Tournament. Montana's 32-game home winning streak will be on the line, as the Sooners return all five starters

from a team that won the NIT postseason tournament last March. Then in mid-December the Lady Griz will host Tennessee, a perennial power in women's basketball.

"Like last year, we need our four seniors to provide leadership," Selvig said. "When we step on the floor against Tennessee, we have to expect that we have the opportunity to win, and the seniors need to show that kind of confidence."

GUARDS: Montana has five guards on the roster, but only two who have previous experience. **Sherri Brooks** started all 30 games at the two spot as a sophomore last year. She was the Outstanding Defensive Player and returns as Montana's third-leading scorer (7.4 ppg). **Carla Beattie** played in all 30 games last year as a junior and is Montana's second-leading returnee (7.7 ppg). Freshman **Skyla Sisco**, who redshirted last season, looks very promising and should see some time at the point. The Lady Griz have two new incoming freshmen this season. **Catie McElmurry** hails from Troy, Mont., where she was her team's all-time leading scorer and made 59 percent of her three-pointers. Missoula native **Jill Rasmussen** was a three-time all-state point guard at Sentinel High School.

FORWARDS: Montana's leading returnee is **Kristy Langton-Schlingen**, who averaged 11.4 points and 6.0 rebounds as a junior last season. The Big Sky all-conference pick will provide leadership and consistency in her senior season. Sophomore **Greta Koss** is probably Montana's most versatile player and could play any position from guard to center. Last year she played in all 30 games behind Langton. Senior **Lora Morast** played in 29 games last season as a back-up to Ann Lake, and she probably averages more rebounds per minute than any other returnee. Freshman **Dawn Sackman**, who redshirted last season, is one of Montana's strongest players and will add quickness to the forward positions. Newcomer **Allison Turner** is one of the most talented incoming freshmen and could vie for playing time right away.

CENTERS: Veteran **Jodi Hinrichs** returns for her fifth and final season and is in the best physical shape she has ever been in. Her experience makes her a viable candidate for the starting position. Newcomer **Angella Bieber**, who hails from Spokane, is the only other true center on the team, and she will provide quality depth for Montana. Junior **Malia Kipp** has contributed quality minutes at the center position, but she could also play forward. Sophomore **April Sather**, a letter winner on the women's volleyball team, is another versatile athlete who can play both center and forward.

All told, Montana has four seniors, two juniors, two sophomores, and six freshmen. This season the Lady Griz will sport one of their most versatile teams, as a number of players will see time at several positions.

"I'm excited to see what kind of personality this team will take on," Selvig said. "Who will be our leaders? How will everyone blend together? That's the challenge of coaching. I think this team has a great opportunity for another outstanding season."

SCHEDULE: Certainly one of the toughest challenges that lie ahead for the Lady Griz is the schedule. After the women's NIT tournament,

Montana will travel to Virginia for the Old Dominion Dial Classic. ODU has been picked to win its league title again, and both Duke and Syracuse will field strong teams.

The following weekend Montana will compete in the Southwest Texas State Classic, along with Texas-El Paso and Southwestern Louisiana.

"After the NIT, we have four straight road games at the beginning of the season," Selvig said. "Southwest Texas State won 20 games last year, and UTEP, whom we open against, also has a good team."

"Our schedule is very challenging early on. After those road games, we come home and play Tennessee, which has been picked No. 1 in several preseason polls. It's a great challenge for us as a team, and it's a great event for our community and our state to have the No. 1 team in the country come to Missoula to play us!"

After a road game at Nevada, Montana will host the Western States Showdown December 29-30. Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, Northeast Louisiana and Illinois State are participants in the third annual event.

"Illinois State is a quality program," Selvig said, "and Northeast Louisiana has been very successful in the past. Last year they advanced to the NIT."

Montana will host Gonzaga, then travel to Utah before the conference schedule begins.

BIG SKY: As always, Montana is expected to defend its Big Sky title, but Boise State and Montana State will presumably challenge the Lady Griz. The Broncos lost four starters and return this season with only one senior. The Bobcats lost only two starters and return with a solid nucleus of players.

There are a number of other teams that could jump into the battle for the Big Sky tournament. Idaho and Eastern Washington have new coaches this season. Weber State finished strong last year, and Idaho State is typically in the hunt down the stretch. Northern Arizona is improving, as well.

Montana's schedule will bring a lot of exciting teams to Missoula, and Selvig hopes the community will continue its support of the program.

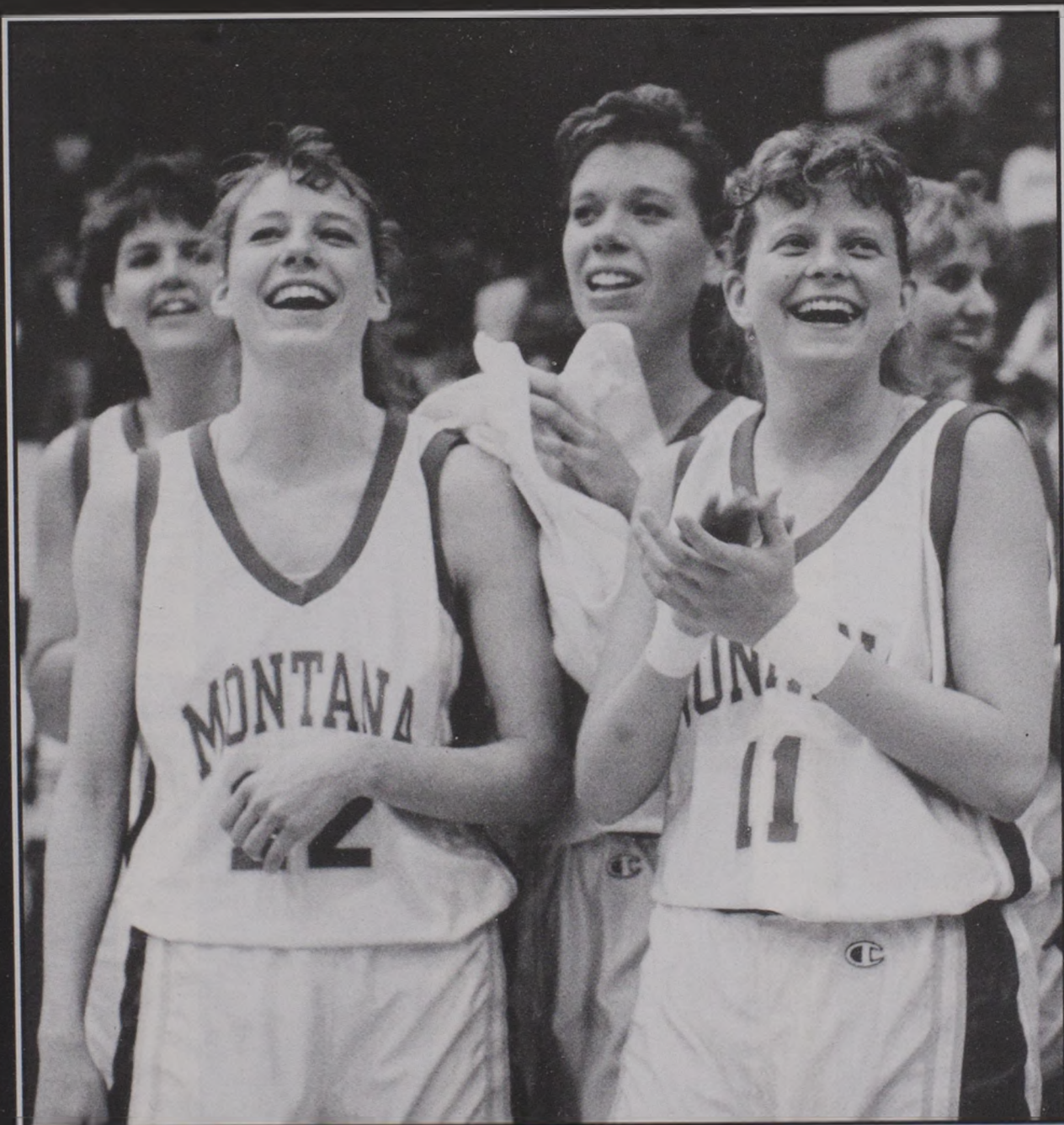

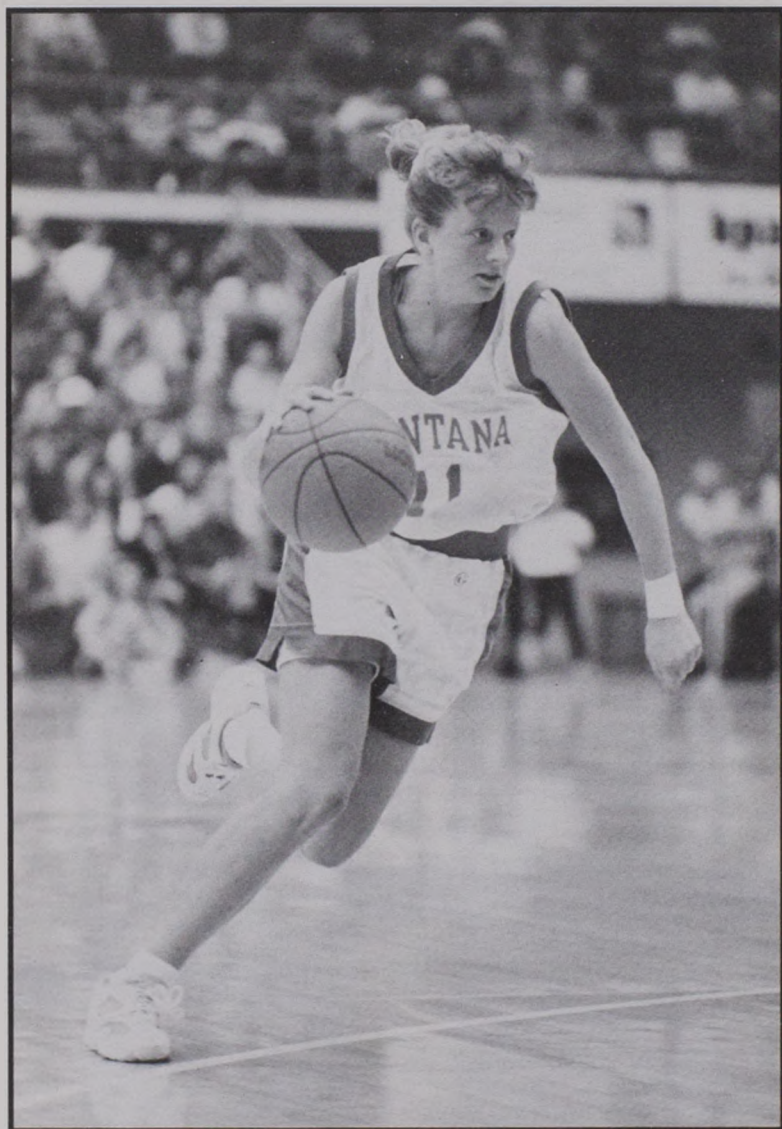

CARLA BEATTIE
5-7 SENIOR GUARD
PHILIPSBURG, MONTANA

Carla Beattie is in her fourth and final season as a Lady Griz and has established herself as one of Montana's top outside shooters. A spark off the bench last season, she is Montana's second-leading returning scorer. This season Beattie is expected to be one of Montana's prime leaders. She is also a leader in the classroom, earning Big Sky all-academic honors three times in her career.

Beattie holds the school record for three-point field goal attempts in a single game (9) and a single season (88). She is second on Montana's free-throw percentage career list (.813), fifth on the three-point field-goal career list (.360), and 19th on the UM career assist list (131).

1993-94: Beattie played in all 30 games last year as a junior, averaging 17 minutes per game. She led Montana in free-throw percentage (.833) and made more three-pointers (31) than any other player. She averaged 7.7 points and 2.0 assists per game.

1992-93: Beattie led Montana in free-throw percentage (.845) as a sophomore and averaged 7.6 points per game. She was 30-of-88 from the three-point line for a .327 shooting percentage. Beattie played in all of Montana's 28 games, averaging 16.8 minutes per game.

1991-92: Beattie received votes for Big Sky Freshman of the Year, averaging 5.3 points in all 30 games. She was Dick Vitale's ninth-best recruit in the nation in 1991.

High School: Carla came out of Granite High School as the highest-scoring girls' basketball player in the state of Montana with 2,508 career points. She was a three-time MVP and averaged 33.9 points, 6.2 rebounds and 5.9 assists per game for GHS, which posted a 23-3 record in 1990. A three-time all-state and four-time all-conference player, Beattie once scored 50 points in a prep game. She also competed in volleyball and track & field.

Selvig says: "Carla definitely had her best year last season. She has improved her game in every phase, and I know she is confident going into this year. She is going to be an important factor on our team. Her ability to shoot the ball, her leadership, and her confidence are important ingredients for Carla and this team. I really look for Carla to be an outstanding leader this year."

The daughter of Jim and Eileen Beattie, Carla has a twin sister named Crista. Her brothers, Ken and Steve, both played basketball for Montana Tech.

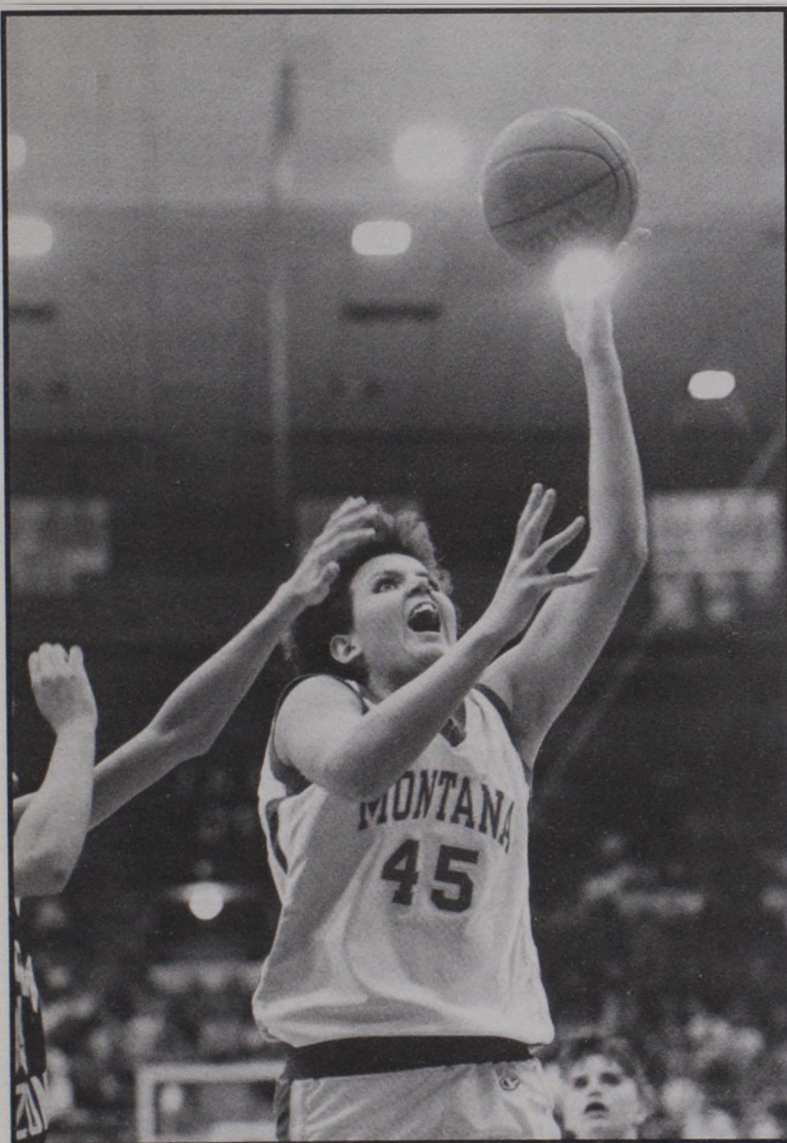

6-3 SENIOR CENTER
FAIRFIELD, MONTANA

Jodi Hinrichs enters her fifth year this season and should be a powerhouse in the middle. Although she has had health troubles in the past, she returns this season in great shape.

Hinrichs is currently fifth in career blocks (108), 13th in rebounding (555) and 20th in scoring (704).

1993-94: Last season Hinrichs played in 23 games as a junior and started six, averaging 15 minutes per game. She sprained her knee against Utah and missed the following seven games. She was Montana's sixth-leading scorer (5.5 ppg) and averaged 3.6 rebounds per game, as well.

1992-93: Hinrichs was granted a medical redshirt after suffering an Achilles' tendon injury, as she competed in only three games. Hinrichs had her first surgery in December 1992 and a second surgery in July 1993.

1991-92: As a sophomore, Hinrichs was Montana's leading rebounder (9.1 rpg) and second-leading scorer (11.1 ppg), starting all 30 games. She was the recipient of the Theresa Rhoads Award and was named to the Domino's Classic all-tournament team. She also earned Big Sky Athlete of the Week honors. Hinrichs was second in the Big Sky in both scoring and rebounding that year.

1990-91: Hinrichs was the 1991 Big Sky Freshman of the Year, and she earned Big Sky all-tournament honors after averaging 7.6 points and 6.2 rebounds in 30 games as a true freshman.

High School: At Fairfield High School, Hinrichs was a two-time MVP and a three-time all-state and all-conference player. She was the state class "B" MVP as a junior, plus she earned MVP honors in track & field as a sophomore. Hinrichs was the top scorer and rebounder at Power High School her freshman year.

Selvig says: "Jodi is in the best physical shape she has ever been in. The injury problems she has had are gone. We can expect great things from Jodi this year. She's had a very good career here, despite her injuries. Jodi is a great post player, and we are excited about having her ready for action."

Jodi is the daughter of Bill and Cheryl Hinrichs. Her brother, Josh, played basketball for Montana Tech in Butte.

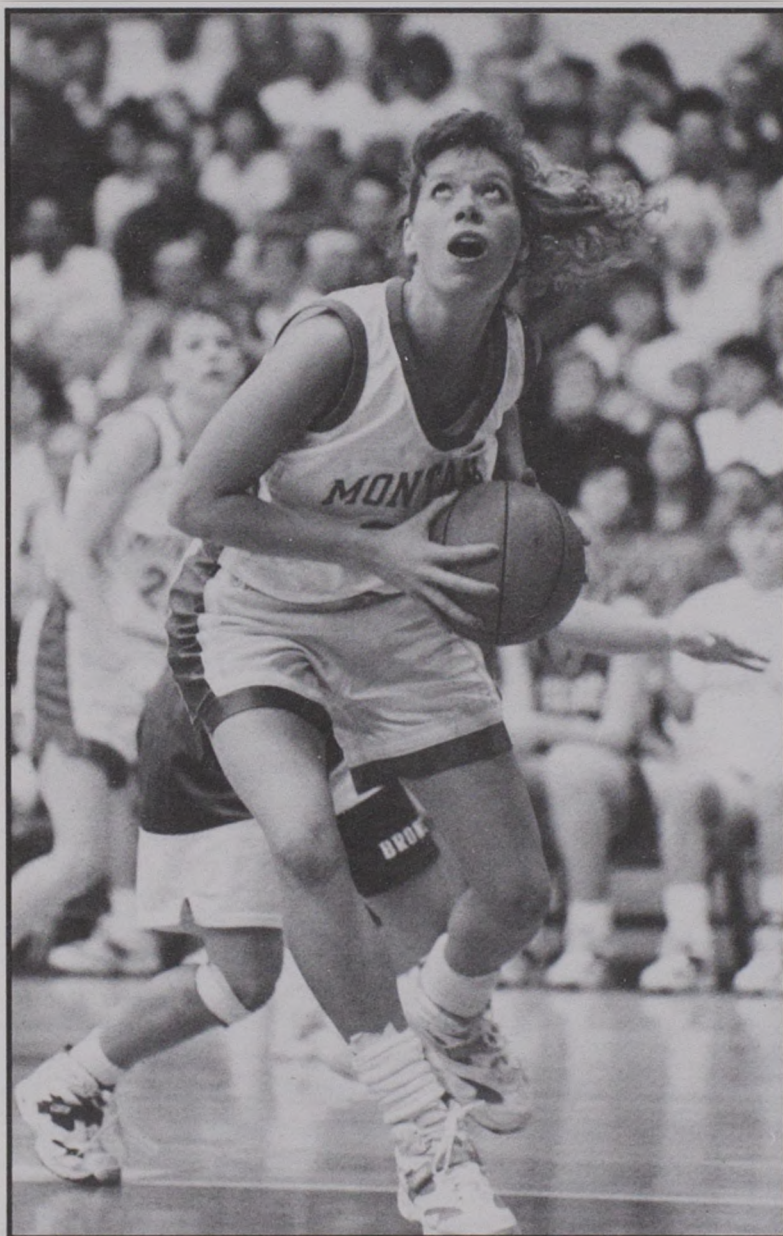

23 KRISTY LANGTON-SCHLIMGEN 5-11 SENIOR FORWARD STEVENSVILLE, MONTANA

Kristy Langton-Schlimgen is one of only two starters returning this season, and she is the leading returning scorer (11.4 ppg) this season. She will continue to provide leadership and consistency for Montana.

Kristy is among the top 20 in every UM career list: 17th in scoring (748), 16th in field-goal percentage (.431), seventh in three-point field-goal percentage (.324), 15th in free-throw percentage (.664), 17th in rebounds (465), 15th in assists (155), 20th in steals (85), and 15th in blocks (44).

1993-94: Langton was a Big Sky all-conference and all-academic selection and was also named to both the Big Sky and Western States all-tournament teams. She was Montana's second-leading scorer (11.4 ppg) and rebounder (6.0 rpg). Langton was also a member of the inaugural women's golf team, finishing among the top 20 golfers at the Big Sky Championships.

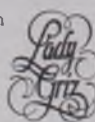

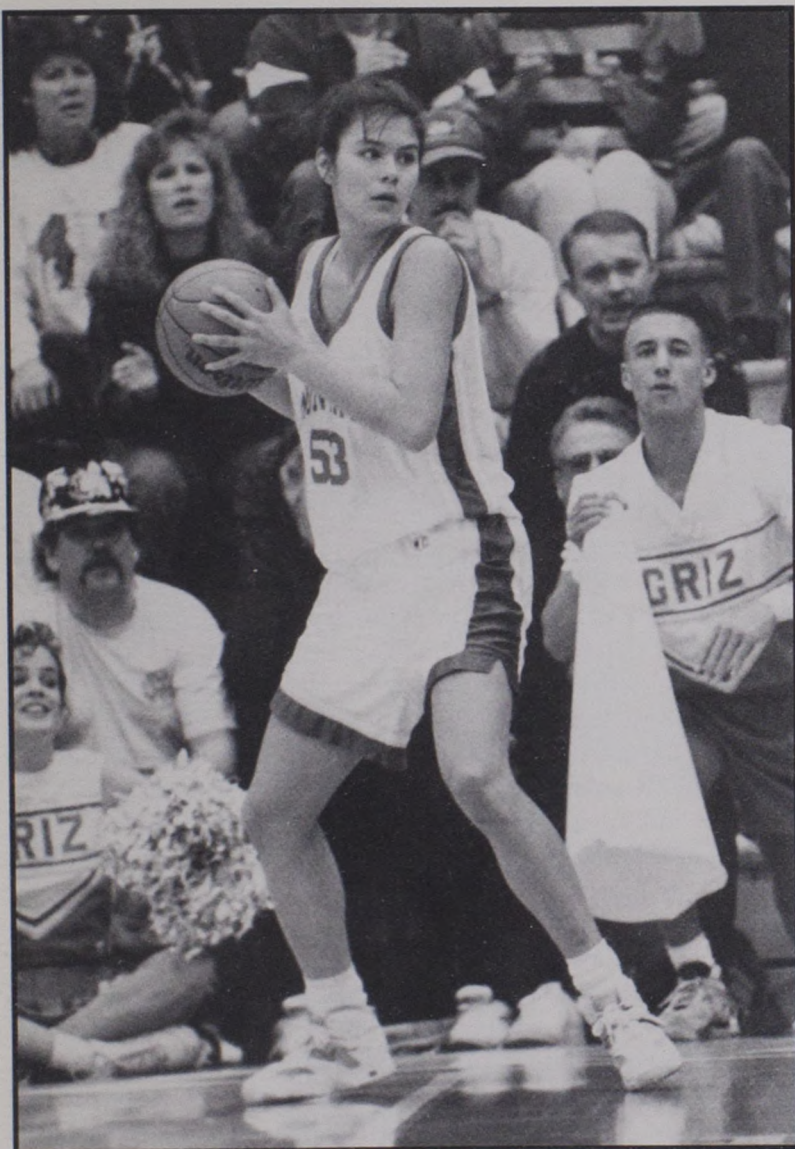

Malia is going to be one of those players battling for starting spots. I think we can look to Malia to continue improving. In addition, she will have the opportunity to play forward, as well as center, this year."

1993-94 - Lady Griz Among Top Teams in the Nation

The University of Montana Lady Griz basketball team boasted one of its best seasons in the history of the program in 1993-94. When the season was over, Montana had recorded a 25-5 season record and spent 12 consecutive weeks in the *Associated Press* Top 25 Poll.

Selvig's "Made in Montana" team won its 10th Big Sky regular-season title in 12 years, sharing the honor with Boise State. The Lady Griz won their ninth Big Sky Championship title and advanced to the NCAA tournament for the ninth time in 12 years.

The season began with the loss of starting center Jill Frohlich, who tore the ACL in her right knee in a scrimmage with Portland AAU. Center Trish Olson followed, missing five of the first six games with back spasms. It appeared that Montana could suffer another injury-laden season.

Despite the early-season concerns, the Lady Griz launched their toughest schedule ever, opening at Tennessee, the No. 1 team in the nation. Montana came within six points of the Lady Vols, an amazing comeback after trailing by 20 in the first half.

Montana returned home to beat Eastern Montana, Iowa State and Drake, then defeated Southern Utah 61-60 on the road in the closest game of the season. The Lady Griz picked up a road win over Brigham Young, and senior Ann Lake was subsequently named Big Sky Athlete of the Week.

Back in Dahlberg Arena, Montana soundly defeated a struggling Utah team 71-30. Junior center Jodi Hinrichs sprained her knee in that game and sat out the following seven, but Olson returned to the line-up.

Southwest Missouri State, the 17th-ranked team in the nation, came to Missoula during the Christmas break, and a 64-57 win over the Bears launched Montana into the AP Poll. Lake scored her 1,000th career point in that game, becoming the 11th player in the program to do so.

The 25th-ranked Lady Griz won the second annual Western States Showdown title, beating top teams Providence and Old Dominion. Senior point guard Kelly Pilcher recorded a school-record 14 assists against ODU. Lake was tabbed the tournament MVP, while both Pilcher and Kristy Langton

earned all-tournament honors.

After four straight home games, Montana travelled to Spokane where Gonzaga picked up its first-ever win over the Lady Griz 70-62. The following night the Lady Griz were losing to Portland by 18 points, when Pilcher scored a career-high 18 to lead Montana to a 76-65 victory.

Montana entered the Big Sky Conference race ranked No. 20 in the nation. Montana swept Idaho and Eastern Washington on the road during the opening weekend behind yet another career-high from Pilcher. She scored 19 points and had a school-record seven steals against the Vandals. With home wins the following weekend over Northern Arizona and Weber State, the Lady Griz improved their home winning streak to 24 games, the third best in Division I behind only Tennessee and Virginia.

Then came the big test. Could Montana beat Boise State in Boise? Montana State upset the Broncos the night before and with a win over Boise State, the Lady Griz could take sole possession of the Big Sky title. But a Big Sky record-crowd of 11,558 fans gave the Broncos the inspiration needed for the 70-61 victory.

The following weekend the 23rd-ranked Lady Griz picked up a 74-58 win over the Bobcats behind Pilcher's career-high 19 points.

Montana picked up four more Big Sky victories and moved up to No. 18 in the AP Poll. That set up "the game of the season," as Boise State came to Missoula with a No. 17 ranking. Both teams were tied for first place in the Big Sky with a 10-1 record and a 20-3 overall record, and the game was aired regionally by Prime Sports Northwest.

Montana defeated Boise State 87-81 behind Lake's career-high 36 points. Pilcher broke the school record in assists for the third time in her career with 15, while Montana shot a season-best 57 percent from the field. That win secured at least a tie for first place in the Big Sky.

Montana took its highest ranking of the season (No. 17) to Bozeman for the final regular-season game, but history repeated itself as Montana State downed the Lady Griz 58-52. That loss led to another coin toss for the second year in-a-row to determine who would host the 1994 Big Sky Conference Championships.

The coin flip brought the tournament back to Missoula for the first time in three years.

Montana defeated Northern Arizona 74-41 in the first round, while Boise State downed Montana State 78-68. The Big Sky's two top-ranked teams went head-to-head for the third time during the season, and the Lady Griz came out victorious, winning 81-65. Lake was named the tournament MVP, while Pilcher and Langton earned all-tournament honors. Montana took a 24-4 record to the NCAA Championships.

Montana was happy to return to the "Big Dance" after missing the action in 1993.

The Lady Griz improved their home winning streak to 32 games with a 77-67 victory over UNLV in the first round. A season-high 7,992 fans were in Dahlberg Arena to see seniors Ann Lake, Kelly Pilcher, Trish Olson and Kristin Omlid make their final home appearances. Pilcher scored yet another career-high 20 points against the Runnin' Rebels.

Montana advanced to the second round of the NCAAs for the sixth time in 11 years and travelled to California to take on the 24-4 Stanford Cardinal. Stanford led by as many as 12 points in the second half, but Montana tied the game at 60-60 with 3:15 to go. The Cardinal controlled its own destiny and won the game 66-62, but it was the closest game Stanford had played at home in a long time.

Despite the loss to Stanford, Montana had an outstanding season to remember. Ann Lake be-

came Montana's all-time leading rebounder (886). Pilcher broke Margaret Williams' single-season record in assists with a total of 215 and finished fourth on Montana's all-time list with 475.

Lake was named the Big Sky co-MVP, and was named to the District VII Kodak All-American team. Lake and Pilcher shared Montana's MVP award. Lake, Pilcher and Langton earned Big Sky all-conference honors, as well.

The sixth man proved to be a huge factor for Montana, as the Lady Griz went 17-0 at home and improved their home winning streak to 32 games. Montana set a new school record in attendance with an average of 5,123 fans per home game, breaking the previous record by more than 1,300.

It was a great season for the "Made in Montana" team, posting a 25-5 record and securing the 14th consecutive 20-win season for Robin Selvig. The Lady Griz spent 12 consecutive weeks in the AP Top 25 Poll, their longest appearance there ever.

For the 10th time in his career, Selvig was named the Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year, sharing the award with BSU's June Daugherty. In addition, Selvig was named the Converse District VII Coach of the Year for the eighth time in his career.

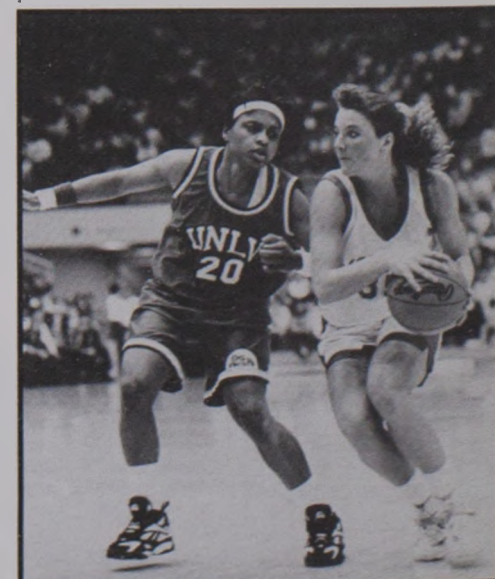
"I feel great about what we accomplished last year," Selvig said. "That team was very motivated to get back into the NCAA tournament because we felt we could compete with the top teams in the nation."

"Some really special things happened last year. We had a big crowd and a big win over Vegas, and although it was disappointing to lose to Stanford, we came real close to winning that game on the road."

"We certainly had quite a battle going with Boise State last year," he said. "The televised game, in which we were both ranked and tied for first place in the league was an extremely exciting night for us. We really had a tough conference battle with both Boise State and Montana State last year."

"The Tennessee game was undoubtedly a great thing for us. It's not very often that you can say this, but I think we really gained confidence and learned some things from that loss. We played very well in the second half at Tennessee, and I think that game was a stepping stone for us to bigger and better things during the rest of the year."

"One of the most exciting things about last year was getting into the Top 25 Poll and then staying there all year long," Selvig said. "That is something that last year's team can look back at with a lot of pride."

Dahlberg Arena - "Home of the Lady Griz"

The Lady Griz have found tremendous success in the confines of Dahlberg Arena. Dahlberg Arena was named after the great George "Jiggs" Dahlberg, who was an athlete, a coach and an athletic director at the University of Montana. Dahlberg earned six varsity letters at UM in football and basketball in the early 1920s. He was the Grizzly basketball coach for 22 years (1937-54) and then became athletic director (1954-70). Jiggs passed away in September of 1993, just two weeks after he was inducted into the Grizzly Sports Hall of Fame. Jiggs will be remembered for his success at the University of Montana, and the Lady Griz basketball team continues to carry on that tradition.

In 16 seasons, the Lady Griz have posted a 223-18 record in Dahlberg Arena for a .925 winning percentage.

Montana's hard work and hospitality were rewarded when the NCAA assigned Montana the 1997 West Regional Championship.

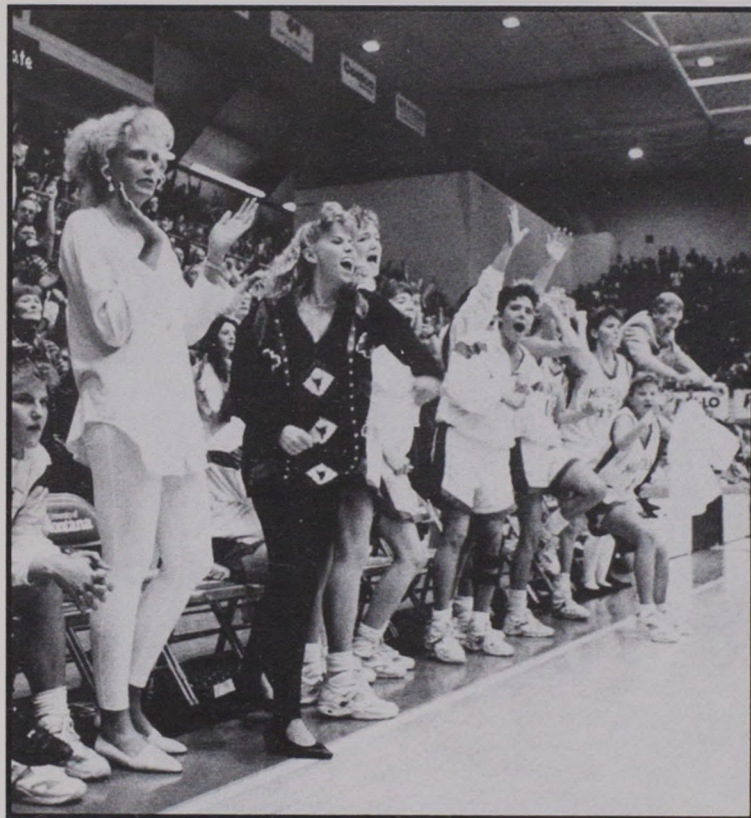
NATIONAL WOMEN'S BASKETBALL ATTENDANCE CHALLENGE

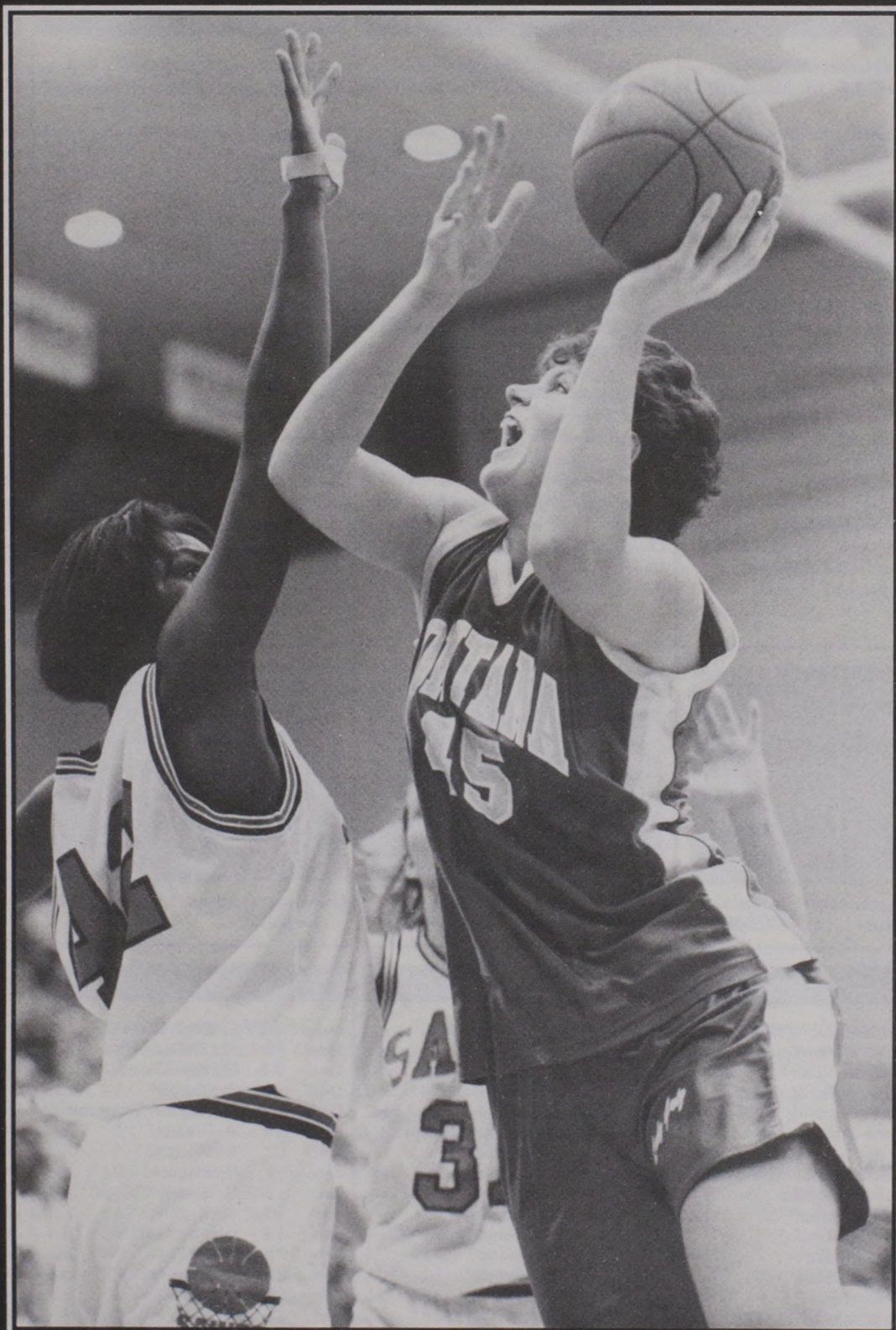

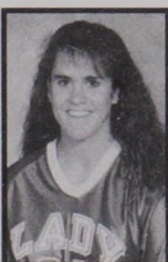

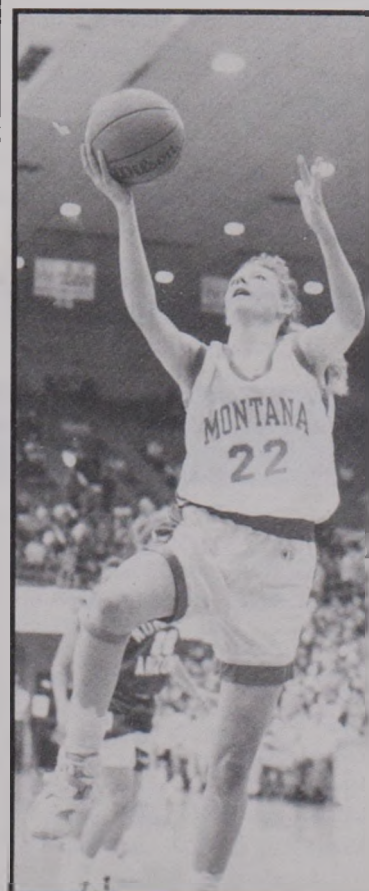

Big Sky Conference

The Big Sky Athletic Conference is starting its 32nd season of operation with championships being conducted in 13 sports including men's and women's cross country, basketball, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, women's volleyball, women's golf, and football. The Big Sky has eight member institutions and is affiliated with NCAA Division I in all sports except football, which is classified as Division I-AA.

The 1994-95 athletic season is the seventh in which the league will sponsor championship competition in women's sports. On July 1, 1988, the Mountain West Athletic Conference, located in Cheney, Washington, merged with the Big Sky, moving and combining office staffs in Boise, Idaho. The Mountain West Conference had been in existence since 1982.

The Big Sky Conference consists of Boise State University, Boise, Idaho; Eastern Washington University, Cheney, Washington; University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho; Idaho State University, Pocatello, Idaho; University of Montana, Missoula, Montana; Montana State University, Bozeman, Montana; Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, Arizona; and Weber State University, Ogden, Utah. Formed in 1963, the Big Sky Conference consisted of charter members Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga University, Montana, Montana State and Weber State.

Boise State and Northern Arizona joined the league July 1, 1970, in the Big Sky's first expansion. Nevada was admitted to the league July 1, 1979, replacing former charter member Gonzaga (Nevada left the Big Sky on July 1, 1992). On July 1, 1987, Eastern Washington became the Big Sky's ninth member. When all nine members of the Mountain West Conference and Big Sky Conference were parallel, the way was paved to merge the two leagues.

The Big Sky Conference has member institutions in five states and covers more than 220,000 square miles (or almost 1/12th the total square

miles in the continental United States). The five states included in the Big Sky Conference (Arizona, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Washington) span from the Canadian to the Mexican borders. The Big Sky is one of two major conferences located in the Rocky Mountain region.

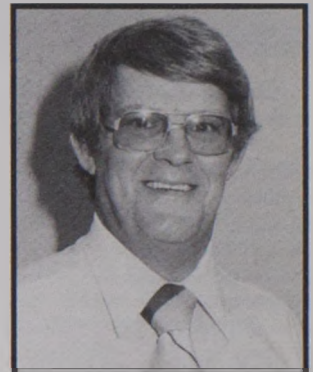
The name BIG SKY originated in a novel authored in 1947, by the late A. B. (Bud) Guthrie, of Great Falls, Montana, entitled THE BIG SKY. Jack Hollowell, former Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. Harry Missildine, of the Spokane SPOKESMAN-REVIEW, called for the conference to be named "The Big Sky Conference" in his column of February 20, 1963. On February 25, 1963, the conference name was adopted by the presidents of the newly formed league during a meeting in Spokane, Washington.

Ron Stephenson is the current Conference Commissioner, taking over the post July 1, 1981, from Steve Belko, who had served since 1977. John Roning was the league's second Commissioner, serving from 1971 until 1977. Jack Freil was the Big Sky's first Commissioner, serving from 1963 to 1971.

Dr. Sharon Holmberg currently serves as Assistant Commissioner for Compliance Services of the Big Sky Conference and is in her seventh year with the league.

Arnie Sgalio is the Big Sky's Assistant Commissioner for Information Services and is beginning his 16th year with the conference. **Stephanie Worrell** is in her third year as Assistant Information Director and was a graduate assistant at Iowa State before joining the Big Sky Conference. She interned at the Big Sky office in 1989-90.

Art Mendini is in his seventh year with the Big Sky as the league's Assistant Commissioner for Officiating Services, and **Kay Johnson**, the Big Sky's Administrative Assistant, has been at that post for eight years.

Ranking The University of Montana Lady Griz were ranked in the **Associated Press Poll** for **12 consecutive weeks** throughout the 1993-94 season. Montana was ranked as high as 13th in the AP Poll during the 1987-88 season.

Postseason The Lady Griz have participated in postseason tournaments the last 16 seasons in-a-row, including **nine NCAA tournaments**. Last year Montana defeated UNLV 77-67 in Missoula then lost to Stanford 66-62 in the second round in Palo Alto, Calif.



Attendance For five of the last six years, the Lady Griz have been ranked in the **top ten in attendance among Division I schools**. In 1993-94, Montana averaged a school-record 5,123 fans per home game, good for a 10th-place ranking in Division I. This year Montana is one of 10 schools competing in the National Women's Basketball Attendance Challenge.



20-Win Seasons The Lady Griz have one of the **Top 5 winningest programs in the nation** over the past decade. Montana has won at least 20 games each of the last 14 seasons and had a record of 254-49 (.838) during the 1980's.



Head Coach Robin Selvig

The **seventh winningest active Division I Coach**, former Grizzly standout Robin Selvig has a school record of 383 victories. His overall record is 383-93 for a winning percentage of 81 percent. His teams have won regular-season titles 10 of the past 12 seasons. Selvig has earned 18 Coach of the Year awards from the conference and the district.
