Known as the "Garden City" for its dense trees and lush green landscape, Missoula is nestled in the heart of the northern Rockies in western Montana. A community of approximately 85,000 residents, Missoula lies in a mountain forest setting where five valleys converge. Montana's most culturally diverse city, Missoula is 270 miles from Yellowstone National Park and 140 from Glacier National Park.

The search for gold in the West and the completion of the Mullan Road, which opened up travel from Fort Benton, Mont., to Walla Walla, Wash., brought people to the valley in 1860. Missoula began as a settlement called Hell Gate when C.P. Higgins and Francis Worden began a trading post to accommodate the travelers. The settlement was later renamed Missoula, taken from a Salish Indian word meaning, "near the cold, chilling waters."

Early settlers constructed Fort Missoula in 1877 to combat the perceived threat by Native American tribes. Today the Fort Missoula Museum remains a testament to the West.

Missoula offers a variety of recreational opportunities. Three major rivers run through the area: the famous Blackfoot River to the northeast, the beautiful Bitterroot River to the south, and the Clark Fork of the Columbia River,

which flows adjacent to The University of Montana campus. Rock Creek, known for its Blue Ribbon trout fishing, is just a 20-minute drive from Missoula.

Fly fishermen, rafters, kayakers, and canoers thrive on the waters of western Montana. Flathead Lake, the largest natural, freshwater lake in the western U.S., is just 70 miles north of Missoula. Seeley Lake, Georgetown Lake, Placid Lake and Salmon Lake are less than a few hours away.

Hiking, biking, camping, and rock climbing abound in western Montana. Mount Sentinel, Mount Jumbo, Lolo Peak, and Squaw Peak offer beautiful vistas. Blue Mountain Recreation Area, Pattee Canyon Recreation Area, and the Rattlesnake National Wilderness Area are nearby. The Bitterroot-Selway Wilderness Area, Bob Marshall Wilderness Area, the Mission Mountains, and the Seeley-Swan Range are a short drive from Missoula.

Missoula abounds with skiing opportunities. Snowbowl Ski Area is a 20-minute drive from downtown Missoula and features a continuous vertical drop of 2,600 feet, one of the steepest in the country. Marshall Ski Area, a shorter 10-minute drive from downtown, features night skiing and offers a good student program. Big Mountain, Discovery, Lookout, Lost Trail, and Silver Mountain

provide a variety of options for skiers. Groomed cross country trails can be found at nearly every wilderness area and are especially popular at Lolo Pass.

Other area attractions include A Carousel for Missoula, Garnet Ghost Town, the National Bison Range, the Ninemile Remount Depot and Ranger Station, the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation Wildlife Visitor Center, and the Smokejumper Visitor Center.

Missoula offers a variety of courses for golfing. The Highlands Golf Course, King Ranch Golf Course, Larchmont Municipal Golf Course, The University of Montana Golf Course, Missoula Country Club, and Linda Vista Golf Course provide ample opportunity for both the advanced and the novice golfers.

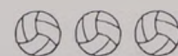
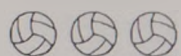
Missoula Parks and Recreation and the YMCA provide a variety of recreational opportunities in basketball, soccer, softball, tennis, volleyball, and ice skating. Little League baseball is popular for both boys and girls, and Missoula teams have consistently advanced to regional competition.

The Missoula Mavericks AA baseball team is a two-time Montana state championship team (1994 & 1995) and placed second at the regional tournament in 1994. Plans are underway to bring a professional ice hockey team to the Garden City in the near future.

Missoula also serves as a center for education, medicine, retail, and the arts. The University of Montana provides educational opportunities for more than 12,000 students, and Missoula's five high schools are among the state's best in both academics and athletics. Community Medical Center and St. Patrick Hospital, along with many clinics, make Missoula one of the state's premier health care communities.

One of the most desirable places to live in the United States, western Montana has become an attractive residence for those looking for pristine beauty and serenity. Even some of America's famous people, such as Liz Claiborne, Tom Cruise, Emilio Estevez, Mel Gibson, Phil Jackson, Huey Lewis, Andie MacDowell, and Charlie Sheen, have made western Montana their home.





The University of Montana was the state's first college. Chartered on February 17, 1893, the school opened its doors to its first 50 students in what is now called University Hall. More than 100 years later, The University of Montana is the center of liberal arts education and research in the state.

The school has gone through numerous changes over the years. In 1913 the school was renamed the State University of Montana, and in 1935, it was renamed Montana State University. It wasn't until 1965 that the institution recaptured its original name, The University of Montana. In 1988 Western Montana College in Dillon became part of UM, and in 1994, the Montana Board of Regents approved a restructuring plan to create two universities within the Montana University System. Today The University of Montana encompasses three other campuses: Western Montana College in Dillon, Montana Tech in Butte, and Helena College of Technology in Helena. Missoula's Vo-Tech is now The University of Montana College of Technology.

The University of Montana provides a high-quality, well-rounded education to students and a wide range of services to Montanans. UM is a major source of research, continuing education, economic development, fine arts and entertainment, and serves as a driving force in strengthening Montana's ties with countries throughout the world.

UM's Missoula campus is comprised of the College of Arts and Sciences, the Graduate School, the Davidson Honors College, the College of Technology, and seven professional schools: business administration, education, fine arts, forestry, journalism, law, and pharmacy and allied health sciences. The University of Montana also has an excellent physical therapy program and offers two-year programs in business, trades and industry, and technical and health occupations.

UM continues to grow, and last year's enrollment of 12,124 students broke all previous enrollment records. The student body is 52 percent female and 48 percent male. Last year Montana enrolled 386 foreign students from 62

countries.

Located at the base of Mount Sentinel and on the bank of the Clark Fork River, the 200-acre campus is one of the most beautiful in the nation.

Campus life offers a variety of choices for the UM student. Dormitory living provides nine halls with various options on campus. Elrod Hall is the male dorm; Turner Hall is the female dorm; and Aber, Craig, Duniway, Jesse, Miller, and Knowles halls are co-ed. Pantzer Hall, which provides four-person suites, was completed in 1995. Family housing can be found just three blocks south of the main campus in University Village, and Toole Village opened last year. Students interested in the Greek life have four sororities and 10 fraternities from which to choose.

The University of Montana offers a variety of facilities for the active student. UM has a nine-hole golf course, located just south of the main campus. The Grizzly Pool is a seven-lane, 25-yard indoor swimming pool which features numerous classes and programs. The recreation annex, adjacent to Adams Field House, features two full-length basketball courts, seven racquetball courts, a climbing wall, weight room, and equipment checkout.

The Outdoor Program provides opportunities for the campus community to participate in recreational activities such as rafting, kayaking, climbing, hiking, backpacking and skiing.

UM owns and operates Lubrecht Forest, a 28,000-acre teaching and research forest. Located approximately 30 miles northeast of Missoula, Lubrecht Forest provides the opportu-

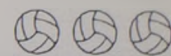
nity for students to learn tree thinning and harvesting techniques in addition to forest and ecological projects.

The Flathead Lake Biological Research Station, located at Yellow Bay on the east side of the lake, is a year-round research facility and academic center for the ecological sciences. The freshwater research laboratory encompasses 80 acres.

UM ranks fourth among U.S. public universities with 28 Rhodes Scholars. UM also has had 37 International Fulbright Scholars, eight Truman Scholars and five Goldwater Scholars. More than \$26 million was received for research in 1996-97. Journalism graduates have won seven Pulitzer Prizes, and the UM Foundation recorded 1995-96 as the best financial year in its 25-year history.

The UM Foundation, Alumni Association, and the Grizzly Athletic Association provide support for the institution through alumni, friends, private gifts, and athletic fans.

The University of Montana offers 14 intercollegiate athletic programs for student athletes in football, men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball, soccer and golf, men's and women's cross country, tennis, and both indoor and outdoor track & field.

Montana competes in the Big Sky Conference and was a charter member in 1963. After several changes, today's Big Sky consists of Cal State-Northridge, Cal State-Sacramento, Eastern Washington, Idaho State, Montana, Montana State, Northern Arizona, Portland State and Weber State.

The Grizzly football team won the 1995 I-AA National Football Championship and advanced to the title game in 1996. In their fifth straight appearance in the playoffs, the Grizzlies lost to McNeese State 19-14 in the closing minutes of the first-round game. McNeese lost to Youngstown State 10-9 in the title game. Senior linebacker Jason Crebo earned All-American honors for the third straight year and signed a free-agent contract with the Buffalo Bills.

The Grizzly basketball team posted its 22nd consecutive winning season last year and won the Big Sky Conference Championship in 1996. Montana has advanced to the NCAA Championship four times in school history and three times

consecutive 20-win season last year. With a 24-6 record and its 13th Big Sky Championship trophy, the Lady Griz advanced to their 13th NCAA Championship. Lady Griz mentor Robin Selvig, a 1974 UM graduate, has a 20-year record of 481-115 and is ranked fourth in the nation in winning percentage (.807) among active coaches.

The Lady Griz volleyball team has advanced to the Big Sky Conference Championship in 15 of the last 16 years and has made three NCAA Championship appearances in the last eight years. Head coach Dick Scott earned his 500th career victory during the 1997 season.

The Montana women's soccer team has posted a 50-24-1 record in four years under the direction of Betsy Duerksen, a four-time All-American from Boston College. Last year the Grizzlies went 16-5 and won the inaugural Big Sky title. Lisa Oyen was tabbed the Big Sky MVP, and Karn Hardy joined Oyen on the All-West Region team. Courtney Mathieson was tabbed the NSCAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Women's golf, coached by third-year Joanne Steele, finished fifth at the Big Sky Golf Championship last year, and senior Brittney Bacon earned all-conference honors.

The Montana tennis teams fared

in the 1990s. The Griz own four Big Sky trophies, including back-to-back titles in 1991 and 1992.

The Lady Griz basketball team recorded its 18th

well last year. The women's team posted a 13-6 record, and Jessica Redding and Jen Canuso earned all-conference honors. Sophomore David Froschauer posted a 13-9 record and was named to the Big Sky all-conference team.

The UM cross country teams both finished fifth at the 1997 Big Sky Championships. Freshman Jesse Barnes placed second in the USA Track & Field National Junior Championship.

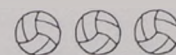
The Montana track & field teams posted seventh-place finishes at both the Big Sky indoor and outdoor meets. Senior Troy McDonough won the Big Sky decathlon title with a school-record 7,473 points, and freshman Kyle Wies won the 800m at the indoor meet. Three Lady Griz won Big Sky individual titles: Stacy Fournier (javelin), Brooke Stinson (200m), and Nicole Zeller (pole Vault).

The Grizzly athletic department is temporarily located in Washington-Grizzly Stadium, as Adams Field House is currently undergoing renovation.

Dahlberg Arena, built in 1953, will receive a facelift during the renovation project, which will include new backed seating. Washington-Grizzly football stadium was finished in 1986, and last year seating was added to accommodate a total of 18,845 fans. Dornblaser Stadium, located on the south campus, was refinished in 1990 and is now one of the nicest outdoor track facilities in the Big Sky Conference. The UM South Campus Soccer Stadium was completed in 1996 and features a fully fenced venue, a new scoreboard, remodeled lockerrooms, and seating for 1,000. The varsity weight room for UM athletes was built in 1989 and will be expanded during the renovation. The University also has its own swimming pool, golf course, racquetball courts, several soccer fields and several other amenities.

Grizzly athletes receive outstanding support services in the areas of academics, athletic treatment, equipment, financial aid, and sports information.





The University of Montana not only has an outstanding athletic program, but it is also one of the best in the country in academics. UM student athletes excel in the classroom with the help of an academic coordinator, who works directly with approximately 250 student athletes in all 14 sports.

UM's commitment to academic excellence was reinforced in 1992, when Marie Porter was hired as Montana's first Coordinator of Athletic Academic Services. She implemented a program to help student athletes with weekly tracking of academic progress, advising of course curriculum, tutoring, referring to campus support services, and upholding NCAA compliance regulations. When Porter was named UM's associate athletic director in February of 1996, student assistant Angie Valdez assumed the responsibilities of academic services and served in that role until July 1998.

Montana's newest coordinator of athletic academic services is Kyla Glass, who previously served as the Orientation Director for UM New Student Services. No stranger to athletics, she is married to Marc Glass, who played basketball for the Grizzlies from 1980-85.

Another significant sign of UM's commitment to academics came in 1993 when former Faculty Athletic Representative Dr. Robert Lindsay developed a

program at UM to honor student athletes who excel in the classroom. Since then, UM has recognized student athletes who earn a 3.0 grade-point average or higher. Last year 122 UM athletes were invited to the Dr. Robert O. Lindsay Scholar-Athlete Banquet, and several athletes earned academic awards.

The 1997-98 Athletic Director's award, given to the team with the highest GPA over the previous two semesters, was awarded to the women's soccer team for the third consecutive year. Coached by Betsy Duerksen, the UM kickers recorded a 3.33 team GPA last year. Soccer edged out volleyball (3.25 GPA), golf (3.19), and women's basketball (3.18) for the trophy.

The President's award is given to the male and female student athletes with the highest GPA. Halfback Josh Branen of Moscow, Idaho earned the award for the third consecutive year, maintaining a perfect 4.0 grade-point average in psychology and physical therapy. Junior soccer standout Margo Tufts from Seattle, Wash., received her first President's award, maintaining a perfect 4.0 GPA in women's

studies.

Senior soccer standout Courtney Mathieson joined Branen on the GTE Academic All-American second team for the 1997-98 school year. In addition, Mathieson was the recipient of the Scholar Athlete of the Year, awarded by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

Branen and senior basketball player Skylla Sisco were recipients of NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship awards in 1998. Branen plans to attend medical school, and Sisco will pursue a physician's assistant degree following her first year with the WNBA.

UM's Big Sky Conference Scholar-Athletes were Branen and Mathieson.

During spring semester of 1998, 49 percent of Montana's student athletes earned a 3.0 GPA or higher. Forty-eight athletes were on the Dean's List, and 14 earned a perfect 4.0 GPA. UM student-athletes recorded a 2.89 GPA last spring, and 70 athletes earned Big Sky all-academic honors in 1997-98.

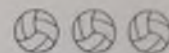
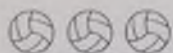
Montana has had 31 Academic All-Americans in football and men's basketball since 1970, three times more than any other Big Sky member institution.

The University of Montana is committed to academic excellence for its student athletes and provides the services needed to set and reach their goals.

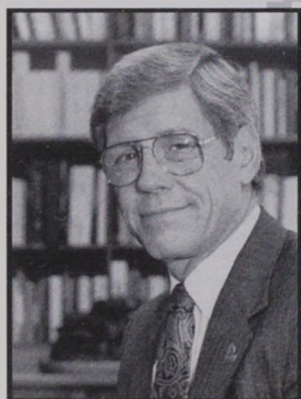

## George M. Dennison President



George Dennison became the 16th president of The University of Montana on August 15, 1990. During his tenure at Montana, he has been very supportive of athletics. He serves on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors and chaired the Big Sky Conference Presidents' Council in 1992-93.

Dennison came to Montana from Kalamazoo, Mich., where he served as the Provost and Vice

President for Academic Affairs of Western Michigan University from 1987-90. In earlier years, he spent time at the Universities of Arkansas and Washington prior to 18 years at Colorado State University in Fort Collins. At Colorado State, he started as a history professor then served in numerous other positions. He simultaneously held the positions of Associate Dean of the College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences and Associate Dean of the Graduate School for International Development Studies. He also served as Acting Academic Vice President, Associate Academic Vice President, and Director of Admissions and Records.

A historian by training, Dennison received his Bachelor's degree with high honors in history from UM in 1962. He received his Master's degree from UM in 1963, then earned his Ph.D. in history from the University of Washington in 1967. He has written numerous publications and made several professional presentations in both history and higher education.

Dennison serves on several boards. He chairs the Governor's Council on Community Service and serves on the Board of the International Heart Institute of Montana, the Community Medical Center Advisory Committee, the Campus Compact Executive Committee, the Maureen and Mike Mansfield Foundation, and the Plum Creek Board of Directors.

George and his wife, Jane, have two children. Their son, Rick, played college football at Colorado State then joined the Denver Broncos. He played linebacker for Denver for nine years and now serves as special teams coach. Their son, Robert, teaches math and computer programming in Tecumseh, Kan., and coaches football, wrestling, and track. The Dennisons have four grandchildren.

## Wayne Hogan Athletic Director



Wayne Hogan was named the 14th athletic director at The University of Montana and began his duties November 1, 1995. Under his guidance, UM Athletics has continued its successful tradition, and the Grizzly football team captured its first national championship just 46 days after Hogan's arrival.

The 41-year-old Florida native came to Montana after serving for 14 years in various positions at

Florida State University. On the heels of FSU's first national championship in football in 1994, Hogan was named interim athletic director at his alma mater.

Hogan brings a diverse background in communications, media and public relations, as well as promotions and marketing skills. He began his career in athletics as a broadcaster and public relations chief for a pair of AAA baseball teams.

After receiving his Bachelor's degree in communications in 1979, he spent one year with the Houston Astros' affiliate in Charleston, W. Va., and one year with the Los Angeles Dodgers' farm team in Albuquerque, N.M.

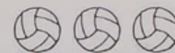
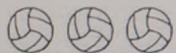
Hogan began his career in collegiate athletics as the assistant sports information director at New Mexico (1980-82). He returned to FSU as the sports information director that year and served in that position for 10 years.

He was promoted to assistant athletic director, then associate athletic director, and served as interim athletic director between 1993 and 1995. During that time the Seminoles became a perennial powerhouse in football, joined the Atlantic Coast Conference, and made significant strides in gender equity and facilities improvements. Hogan was responsible for all external affairs by 1994.

He is the son of Patrick Hogan, a former sports information director and college administrator at Florida State. Hogan and his wife, Dawn, have three children: Lindsay (16), Kelly (14) and J.P. (7).







## Marie Porter

### Associate Athletic Director

Marie Porter is in her third year as UM's associate A.D. She oversees the areas of academics and compliance, plus a number of sports.

She has served as tournament director for several events, including the 1997 NCAA Women's West Regional

Basketball Championship.

Porter was UM's first-ever coordinator of athletic academic services from 1992-96, developing and implementing the inaugural Academic Services program for Grizzly Athletics. She served as the assistant women's tennis coach from 1993-95 and was a Freshman Seminar instructor from 1992-96. She currently chairs UM's Student-Athlete Advisory

Board and directs the Griz A.C.E.S. life skills program.

Before arriving at UM in 1992, Porter served as an academic counselor at Washington State from 1990-92. She is a double graduate of Kansas, receiving her B.A. in psychology with honors (1988) and her M.A. in social psychology (1990), maintaining a perfect 4.0 grade-point average.

The former Marie Hibbard was a four-year standout on the Jayhawk tennis team. She was the Outstanding Student-Athlete in 1986, 1987, and 1988, plus she was a two-time GTE Academic All-American (1987, 1988). Porter was a recipient of an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship in 1988.

Marie is married to Mark Porter, an area businessman who recently developed a French Press for camping and backpacking. They are expecting their first child in September.



## James Lopach

### Faculty Athletic Representative

James Lopach was named Montana's Faculty Athletic Representative in September of 1995, replacing Bob Lindsay, who served in that post for seven years.

Dr. Lopach has been a faculty member in the UM political science department since 1973. He has also served as UM's associate provost as well as acting director of the Maureen and Mike Mansfield Center. In addition, Lopach served as the associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and special assistant to the

President for the semester conversion project.

Lopach received his degree in philosophy and English from Carroll College in 1964. He has two Master's degrees from Notre Dame: one in American Studies and one in English-Education. He received his Ph.D. from Notre Dame in American Government & Public Law in 1973.

A native of Great Falls, Jim has two children: Christine and Paul, a 1997 graduate of the UM law school.

### Assistant to the Athletic Director

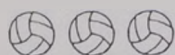

Kempfert formerly served as the Executive Director of the Grizzly Athletic Association for 19 years.

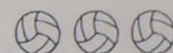

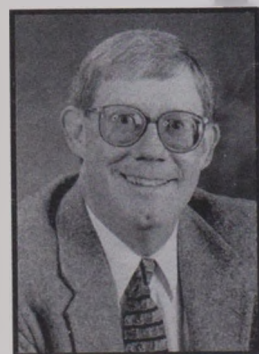
**Dave Guffey**

**Development**

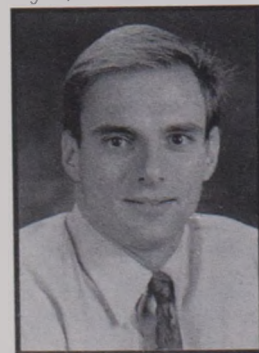

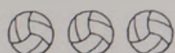
Glass replaced Angie Valdez, who is pursuing a medical degree at UNC-Asheville.

Prior to her appointment with athletics last June, Glass served as the UM Orientation Director from 1992-98, coordinating on-campus recruitment events and new student orientation programs.

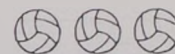

## Head Coach



### Dick Scott

390-289, 20 Years at UM  
501-309, 26 Years Overall



A veteran of Grizzly Athletics, Dick Scott is in his 21st year as head coach of the Montana volleyball team. He has coached in the Big Sky Conference longer than any other and has guided

his teams to 15 of 16 Big Sky Championship tournaments. No other coach in Big Sky history has accomplished that feat.

Although last season was not a good one in the eyes of Scott, it will be a memorable one, as the veteran earned his 500th career victory vs. Idaho State in mid-November.

Scott's most outstanding season with the Lady Griz was 1994, when he led Montana to a 25-6 record and the second round of the NCAA Championship.

The Lady Griz own three Big Sky Conference regular-season titles, winning the crown in 1991, 1992, and 1994. Scott's 1991 team posted an undefeated 16-0 record in league action, then won Montana's first Big Sky tournament title. That team also won a school-record 26 matches and advanced to the NCAA Championship.

Scott has taken his teams to a national postseason tournament four times in the last eight years. He and the Lady Griz have made three appearances in the NCAA Championship (1990-91-94), and his 1992 squad participated in the National Invitational Volleyball Championship.

Dick was the AVCA Northwest Region co-Coach of the Year in both 1991 and 1992, plus he was the 1991 Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year.

A native of Denton, Mont., Scott returned to his home state in 1978 from southern California, where he coached at Santa Monica Junior College and UCLA. He led Santa Monica to an overall record of 110-20 and a league

record of 52-1 from 1972-78. While working as a graduate assistant at UCLA, Scott earned his Master's Degree in health and physical education. He also taught physical education and general science at John Adams Junior High from 1970 to 1978.

During his time in Los Angeles, Scott led the Maccabi Volleyball Club team to two national open titles. His 1976 team won the USVBA national title and took second in the AAU national tournament, and his 1977 team won the AAU national title and took second in the USVBA tournament.

Scott has also coached at the international level. He was the head coach for the USA Junior National team from 1977-79. His 1977 team

placed third at the Pacific Rim International Championship. In 1978 and 1979, Scott's teams won the Pacific Rim Championship. It was the first time the U.S. won a Gold Medal in volleyball since the 1967 Pan-American Games.

Scott served as an assistant coach for the Junior National Team, which advanced to the

NORCECA tournament in 1976 and qualified for the World Junior Championship the following year.

Scott served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Olympic men's volleyball team when it participated in the USA Championship Series in 1985.

He also served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team in the 1981 World University Games in Rumania and the USA Cup in 1985.

Scott was the assistant coach of the 1976 American National Team which defeated the Suntory Club from Japan, the first time a U.S. team beat a team from Japan.

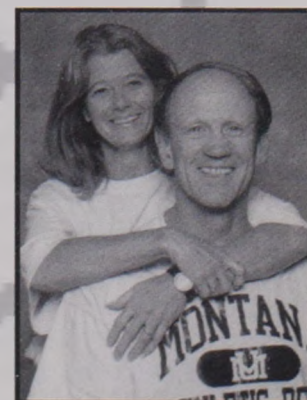
Scott received his

Bachelor's Degree in physical education in 1965 from Montana State, where he lettered in both basketball and track. He served in the Air Force from 1966-69.

Scott was the recipient of the 1993 Ed Chinske award, given annually by the Missoula Athletic Council to the outstanding professional in sports. In 1990 he became a published author, writing a chapter in "Volleyball's Cadre Collection-Volume II," a collection of coaching techniques written by some of the most prestigious volleyball coaches.

The 1990 recipient of Montana's Outstanding Official, Scott recently began his three-year appointment as the District 2 delegate for the Montana Officials Association.

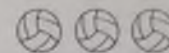
Dick married Melodee Wolf on May 10, 1998. They have six children and three grandchildren.

**Colleen Frohlich**  
Assistant Coach

After serving as a graduate assistant coach for the last two years, Colleen Frohlich was promoted to the lead assistant coach's position last spring. She replaces Mary Klueber, who left UM for opportunities in Australia.

Frohlich will assist Coach Scott in virtually all areas of coaching, including recruiting, scouting, conditioning, travel arrangements, budgeting, scheduling, player counseling, and game management.

The former Colleen Jantz played for Montana from 1988-91 and was a starter on the 1991 Big Sky Championship team that posted a 26-4 record and went undefeated in Big Sky Conference action.

Frohlich was Montana's Outstanding Blocker in 1989 and 1991 and was the Most Improved Player in 1989. She remains ninth on Montana's all-time block list with 295 career blocks.

Colleen came to UM from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, where she earned all-state honors in both basketball and volleyball as a senior. She and her prep teammate, Ann Schwenke, led the Vikings to the 1988 Idaho state title before arriving at UM.

During her playing days with the Lady Griz, Montana posted a 16-10 record in 1988, then went 21-10 in 1989, 24-7 in 1990, and 26-4 in 1991. Their combined four-year record was 87-31 (.738), and Montana averaged 22 wins per season during that time. The Lady Griz advanced to the NCAA Championship twice during Colleen's tenure, earning an at-large bid in 1990 and an automatic bid in 1991.

Frohlich earned Big Sky all-conference and all-tournament honors as a senior in 1991, plus she was twice named the Big Sky Athlete of the Week that season.

Colleen received her B.A. degree in communication studies in 1992. After graduation, she spent the summer in Coeur d'Alene, serving as restaurant manager at Arrowpoint Bar & Grill. She was the assistant volleyball coach at Florence-Carlton High School in 1992-93 and at Whitefish High School in 1994-95.

Colleen returned to The University of Montana in the fall of 1995 to pursue a teaching certificate for K-8.

She married Mark Frohlich on September 24, 1994. Mark's sister, Jill, played basketball for the Lady Griz from 1990-94.

Colleen and Mark have one son, Brayden, who turned one-year old on April 19.



**Cindy Willey**  
Assistant Coach

Cindy Willey begins her first season as an assistant coach for the Montana volleyball team, returning to a program she led on the court from 1984-87.

Willey will be responsible for assisting Coach Scott in all areas, including conditioning, video exchange, travel arrangements, and game management.

Formerly known as Cindy Pitzinger, she was Montana's first AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches' Association) Northwest All-Region selection in 1987, plus she was a three-time Mountain West all-conference selection from 1985-87. She is still Montana's all-time leading blocker with 578 career blocks, and she ranks third in career kills (1,343), second in hitting percentage (.263), and eighth in digs (1,024). In addition, she still holds the single-match school records for kills attempts (84) and solo blocks (11); both records were set against New Mexico State in 1986.

Willey was Montana's Outstanding Blocker in 1985, 1986, and 1987 and UM's Outstanding Hitter as a senior in 1987. She also earned UM's Outstanding Backcourt Player in 1986 and the Most Improved Player, along with Debbie Carter, in 1984.

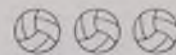
During her tenure, the Lady Griz went 14-22 in 1984, 22-15 in 1985, 21-11 in 1986, and 23-10 in 1987. Montana's overall record was 80-58 (.578), and the Lady Griz finished second in the Mountain West in 1985, 1986, and 1987. Willey was selected as an alternate for the 1988 U.S. National Team.

"We are fortunate to have one of the top athletes in our program coming back to help us," said UM head coach Dick Scott. "Her expertise will be greatly appreciated both from a physical and tactical standpoint. She is extremely outgoing and very aggressive, and she's a very energetic person. She really wants to coach, and she's committed to this program. I'm very excited to get an opportunity to work with her again, and she will help take our program to another level."

Prior to joining the coaching ranks at UM, Willey worked for Travel Express in Hamilton from 1996-97, and she was employed by Recht, Greef, & Recht Law Firm from 1989-92 and Rocky Mountain Log Homes from 1989-90. Willey served as Hamilton High School's head volleyball coach for two seasons (1989-90) and coached the Bronco girls basketball freshmen team in 1989.

Cindy is married to Walt Willey, and they have two children: McCoy (6) and McKenzie (4).





## A Fresh Look - A New Facility

The Lady Griz, coming off a season of strife, will have a new look this season, and Montana head coach Dick Scott is excited about the changes.

"We have a refreshed mentality, and we are really looking forward to the season. We've made some personnel changes, and this year is kind of a new beginning for us."

Montana returns seven letter winners from a team that went 7-23 last year and finished seventh in the Big Sky Conference.

Leading the Lady Griz will be lone senior Paige Merritt, a middle blocker who has been hampered by leg injuries throughout her career. Merritt had surgery on her ankle last winter to remove some bone chips, and she returned to action during the spring season.

Supporting Merritt in the middle will be sophomore Kodi Taylor, who saw significant playing time last year as a true freshman. Two of Montana's incoming freshmen could also contribute to the game plan this season. Freshman Teresa Stringer is a solid all-around athlete from Phoenix, Ariz., and freshman Joy Pierce is a very experienced volleyball player from Ft. Collins, Colo.

Scott feels like his team is solid at the setter position, but he'd like to see junior Jamie Wolstein increase her leadership role and take charge of the starting position. Wolstein is very athletic, and at 5-10, she can block a ball. Montana's other setter, sophomore Tara Conner, saw significant playing time last year as a true freshman. Her strength is her mental toughness, but she's such a solid player that she can play any number of positions. Regardless of who earns the starting spot, the Lady Griz have two solid setters to run the offense.

Scott has some questions regarding the strong-side hitting position, but he feels good about the personnel he has to work with. The Lady Griz have three solid returnees in Erin Adams, Katie Almquist and Sarah Parsons.

Adams had an outstanding fresh-

man year in 1996, but was sidelined with a back injury that required surgery just over a year ago. She will be back in action after redshirting last year, and Scott expects that it will take some time for Adams to return to true form.

Almquist enters her fourth year in the program and had worked extremely hard to put herself in a leadership position. She gained some confidence last season, and she saw some solid playing time after an injury kept her out her redshirt freshman season in 1996. The highest leaper on the team, Almquist will battle for a starting position.

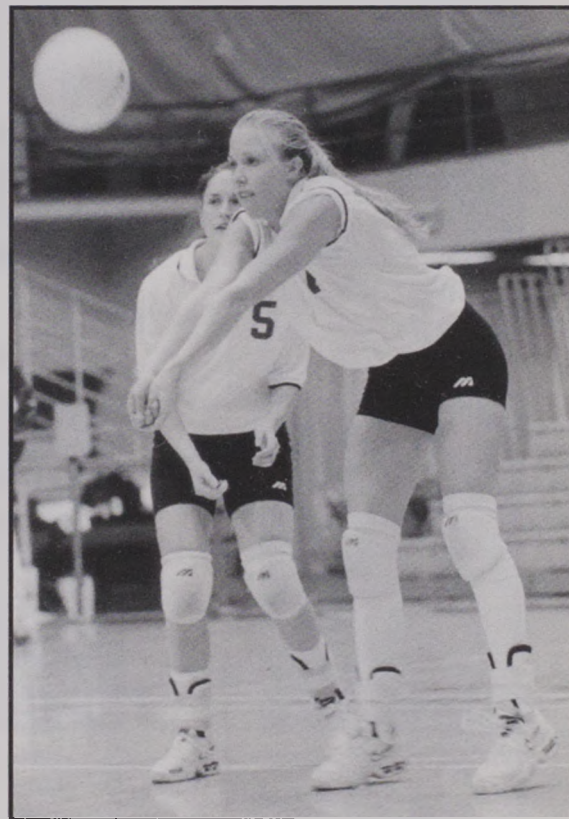
Parsons started out as a middle for the Lady Griz, but moved to outside last year. She suffered through a shoulder injury, but had surgery following the season. Montana's MVP last season as a sophomore, Parsons hasn't played volleyball for almost 10 months, so her return to action is tentative. Her doctors are optimistic, however, as she has worked extremely hard rehabbing.

Suzanne Krings, an incoming freshman from Helena, Mont., is an outstanding all-around athlete and could see some playing time at the outside position, despite the strong returnees UM has there.

If Adams, Almquist and Parsons all return strong and healthy, Parsons could potentially start at the right-side hitter's position. If not, two incoming freshmen could be called upon. Freshmen Lindsay Kaiser from Stockton, Calif., and Katy Kubista from Tacoma, Wash., both had solid prep careers, and each could step into a solid role right away.

Another newcomer to the team is Andrea Thomas, an outstanding player from Moscow, Idaho. She will likely see time as a back court specialist this year.

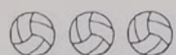

and fire to the program. The former Cindy Pitzinger played volleyball for the Lady Griz from 1984-87 and was one of the best players in UM history.

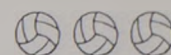
Part of Montana's new life this season will be playing in a facility off campus. Since Dahlberg Arena is being renovated, the Lady Griz will play in the Loyola High School Ram Activity Center just down the road. Following a year off their home court, the Lady Griz will open a new facility in 1999, so the volleyball team's playing days in Dahlberg are over. When Scott and company return to campus, the team will have its own 1,000-seat auxiliary gym for home matches, making for a much more intimate atmosphere for volleyball.

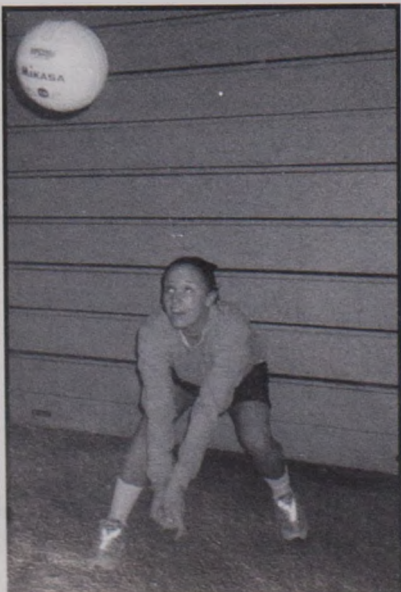
Andrea Thomas decided to walk on the Montana team late last spring. Although her height may limit her ability to play front row, she will be able to contribute as a back row specialist.

**1997:** Parsons played in 28 of 30 matches last year, missing two with a shoulder injury. She led Montana in kills (3.33 kpg) and was second in digs (3.23 dpd). She was voted the team's MVP, and she earned Big Sky all-conference honorable mention honors. She recorded career highs of 27 kills, 26 digs, and seven aces.

**1996:** Parsons saw time in all 26 matches as a true freshman and earned a starting position midseason. 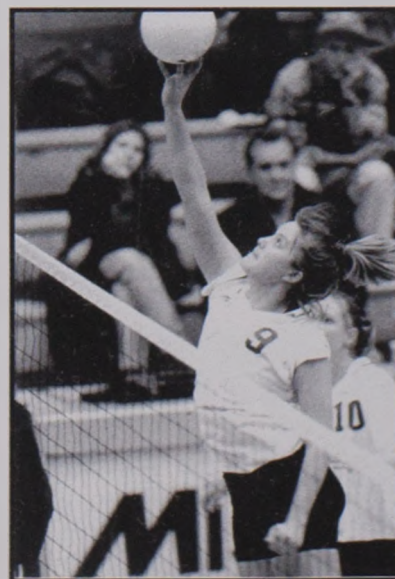
**Scott Says:** "Paige made some huge strides during the spring,

as she, too, is just returning from surgery. She appears to remain strong and in good shape. We expect Paige to lead this team."

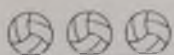

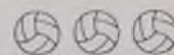

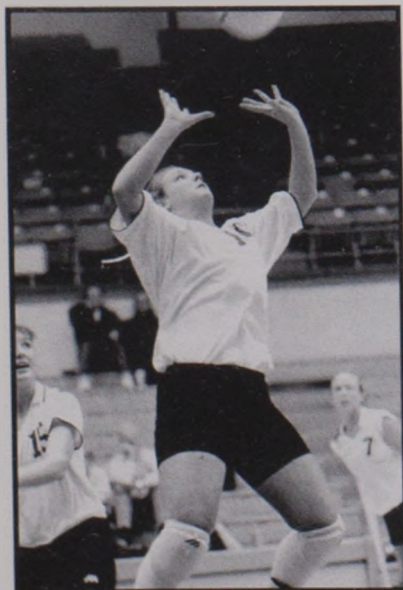

Katie gained a lot of confidence last year. This year she'll step forward and start strong early."

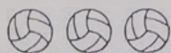

**High School:** Pierce led Ft. Collins High School to a 26-3 record as a senior, and the Lambkins were ranked first in the state of Colorado and seventh in the nation by *USA Today*. Pierce's team won the 5A Northern Conference and placed fifth at state, as she led the team in kills, hitting percentage, and aces and was second in both digs and blocks. She was twice voted her team's Most Valuable Player. She is a two-time all-conference and two-time all-state selection and earned numerous other awards.

Pierce also played club ball for the Ft. Collins Club, a first-year club team that qualified for Junior Nationals by placing third at the Crossroad National Tournament.

In addition to volleyball, Pierce competed in both basketball and track & field. She also played in the Orchestra and earned all-state honors twice.

**Scott Says:** "Joy had a truly outstanding club season last spring. She played very well in a lot of the major tournaments, and she qualified for the Dallas Junior Olympic tournament. I think Joy has made some huge strides in the last year, and I believe she has the potential of helping us out immediately,

particularly with depth in the middle. She has a wonderful attitude. Her father comes from a coaching background, and her mother is a teacher. Joy is extremely personable and very easy to talk to. I'm really looking forward to her being in our program."

Joy is the daughter of Mike and Holly Pierce. Her father played football at Northern Colorado. Joy has two siblings: Matthew (15) and Laura Sue (9).

Kodi Taylor had a solid freshman season at Montana and will continue improving during her tenure. She could earn a full-time starting position, but may be challenged by incoming freshmen.

**1997:** Taylor saw ample playing time as a true freshman, playing in 23 matches and averaging 1.4 kills, 1.0 digs, and 0.8 blocks per game. She shared the team's Outstanding Rookie Award with Tara Conner, and had season highs of 10 kills and 15 digs.

**High School:** Taylor led Bridger High to a 100-9 (.917) between her sophomore and senior seasons (29-5 in 1995, 35-1 in '96, and 36-3 in '97). Under the direction of Wayne Moorman, the Scouts won three state class "C" titles, three divisional titles and four district titles. Taylor was a four-time all-conference and all-state player, and she was tabbed the MVP of the state class "C" tournament. She holds the state class "C" record for career kills (1,899), plus she tallied 704 digs and 603 blocks in her prep career.

Taylor was also a standout in basketball (forward), earning four letters in hoops. She was a four-time all-conference pick and earned all-state honors as a senior. She was her team's leading scorer and leading rebounder for two years.

She was also a three-year letter winner in track & field, specializing in the discus, shot put, and high jump. As a senior she qualified for the state class "C" meet in the high jump.

An outstanding student, Taylor earned academic all-state honors 11 times in her career, and she was the 1997 Valedictorian for Bridger, maintaining a perfect 4.0 GPA. Taylor was chosen the 1997 Gatorade Player of the Year for the state of Montana.

**Scott Says:** "Kodi is certainly a likely starter in the middle position. She struggled a little with a sprained ankle during the spring season, however. Kodi is very tough mentally. She is truly a student of the game. We're looking for her to take her game up

an notch. There were times last fall when she single-handedly took control of the court. I think she'll have a big impact on this team."

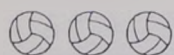

An outstanding student, as well, Krings has earned academic all-state honors nine times.

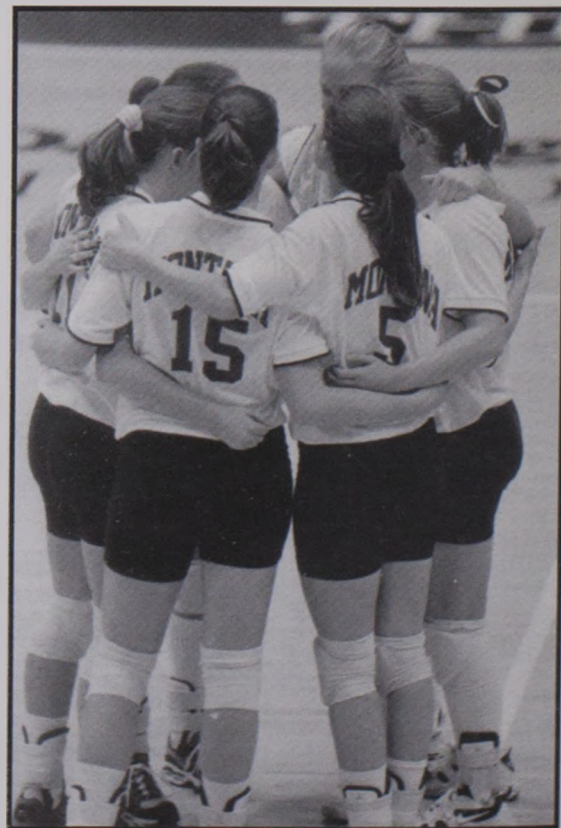

# Dahlberg Arena



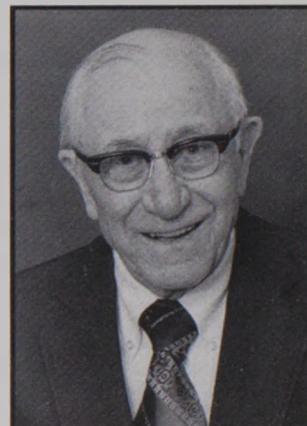
## "Home of the Lady Griz"

Dahlberg Arena - home of the Lady Griz volleyball team - was named after George "Jiggs" Dahlberg in 1979, and since then it has carried the legacy of its namesake.

The University of Montana field house became a reality in 1953. Legislation for the field house

was first signed on March 1, 1951, enabling construction without cost to the taxpayers. Montana Governor J. Hugo Aronson broke ground on March 12, 1953, and construction began the following day.

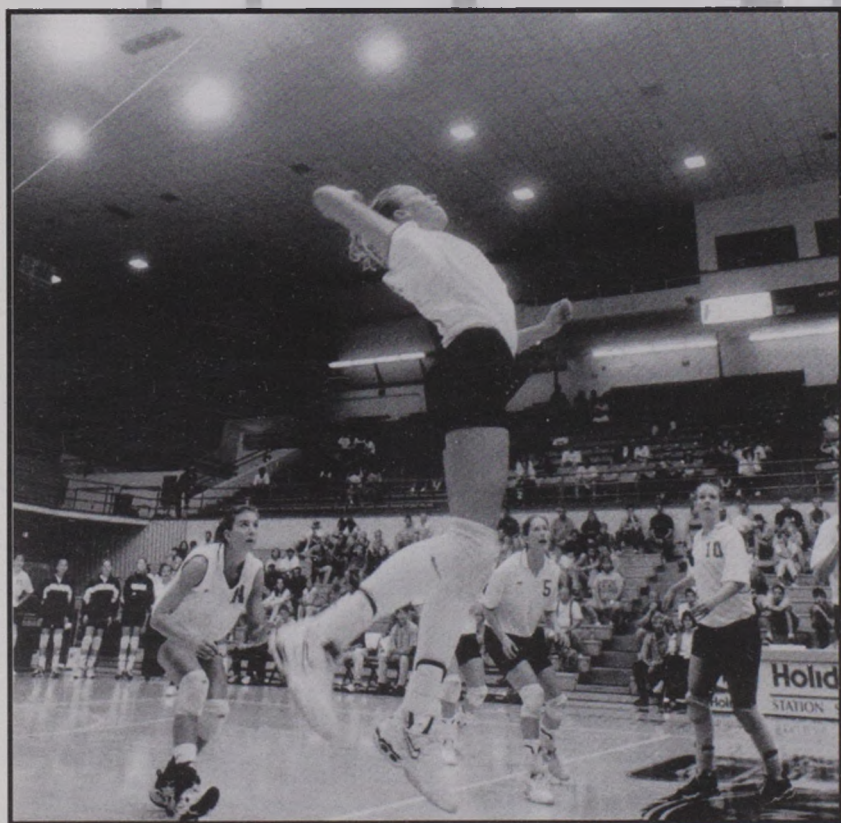
The historic opening of the field house was on December 18, 1953, nearly 45 years ago. The Grizzly basketball team hosted the Indiana Hoosiers, a team that had won the 1953 NCAA Championship crown. It was the first time a national championship team appeared in Missoula and the first time Montana hosted a Big Ten team.

The arena was officially named on February 24, 1979 during half-time of the Grizzly-Bobcat men's basketball game. When the field house was built, "Jiggs" Dahlberg was in his 15th season as the head coach of the Grizzly basketball team, and he was 79 years old when UM dedicated the arena to him. His plaque, which hangs in the entrance to the arena, proclaims, "the personal example of Jiggs Dahlberg is an everlasting model for students and athletes at the University of Montana."

Dahlberg passed away in September of 1993 at age 93, just weeks after he was inducted into the inaugural Grizzly Sports Hall of Fame.

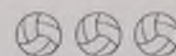

## Grizzly Weight Room

Weight training is extremely important to the health and success of Grizzly student-athletes, and The University of Montana has a top notch weight training facility in Adams Events Center.

The weight room was completed in 1991 at an estimated cost of \$220,000. All of the funding for the facility was provided by private donors. One of the largest among Big Sky Conference members, the weight room covers approximately 4,000 square feet and is located between Adams Events Center and Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

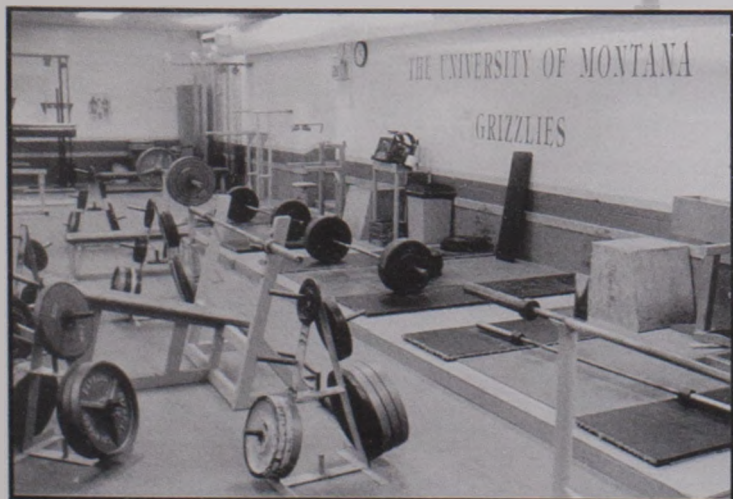
Bruce Wallwork has served as Montana's strength and conditioning coordinator since March of 1988, and Erik Oman is in his third year as the assistant strength and conditioning coordinator.

The Grizzly weight room is divided into three separate areas of apparatus:

**AREA 1:** This section of the weight room emphasizes free weight training. It houses nine benches for bench pressing, including both incline and decline pressing. It also has five squat and power racks, three lifting platforms, three squat and leap machines, a calf machine, and four-way neck machines.

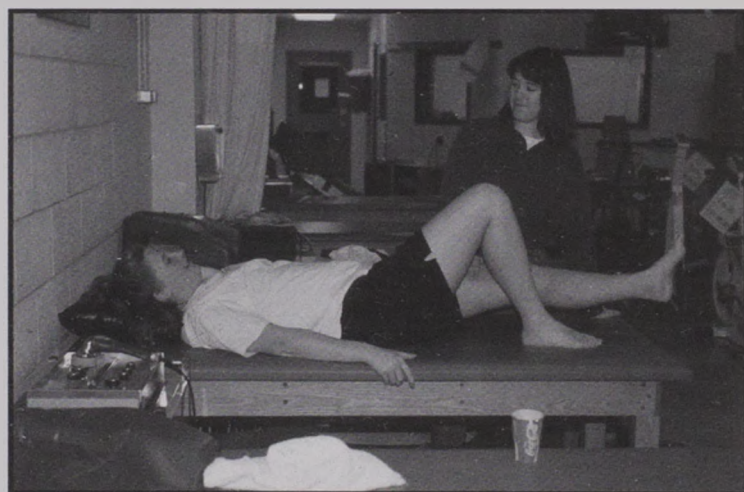
**AREA 2:** This area combines all the dumbbells and racks with pairs ranging from 15 pounds to 100 pounds. Another set is available for use, as well, and ranges from 15 pounds to 120 pounds. Area 2 also has assorted benches, prone and decline for dumbbell exercising. It includes three overhead cable lat pulls, and a custom cross-over cable apparatus. Two dip bars, a T-bar, bent over incline and row machines can also be found in this area.

**AREA 3:** This faction of the weight room houses eight Nautilus machines and eight universal machines. Hip sleds, leg press machines, sit-up boards and ladder combinations complete the Grizzly weight room.

## Athletic Treatment Center

Athletic training services are vital to collegiate athletic programs, and The University of Montana provides outstanding services in the Rhinehart Athletic Treatment Center.

Naseby "Doc" Rhinehart came to Missoula in 1931 to play football for the Grizzlies. He was an honorable mention All-American in 1935 and was later named to the All-Time Grizzly Football Team. Rhinehart was also a two-year starter on the basketball team and was a standout in track and field.

Less than a month after his graduation, Naseby became Montana's first athletic trainer. "Doc" was one of the first athletic trainers in the country to develop an athletic training curriculum (1971) at the university level. Many of his former UM students, including current head trainer Dennis Murphy, now have jobs at universities and high schools throughout the nation. Rhinehart held the position until his retirement in 1982.

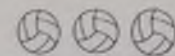
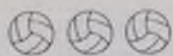
Naseby was UM's beloved trainer for more than 47 years. He passed away June 11, 1991 at the age of 80. Montana's athletic training room was named in Naseby's honor in 1993.

Murphy is in his 17th year as the director of the Rhinehart Athletic Treatment Center. He oversees the athletic training services of all student-athletes, directs the clinical education program for athletic training, and teaches courses related to athletic training.

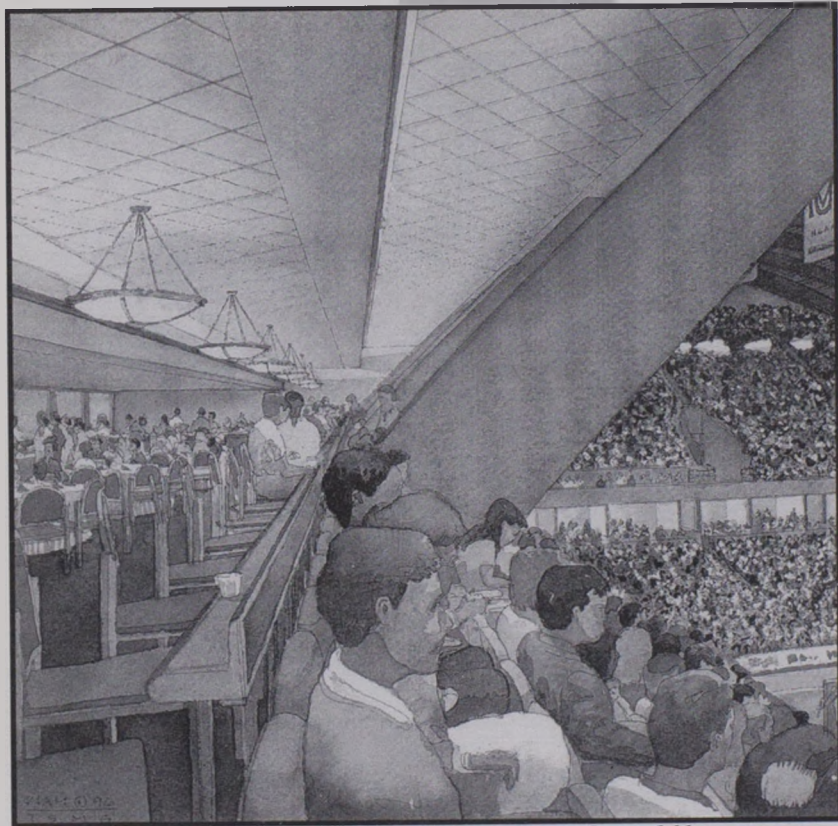
J.C. Wieda and Jennifer Mason serve as full-time assistant athletic certified trainers, and numerous students, both graduate and undergraduate, assist in the training room.

The Rhinehart Athletic Treatment Center will double in size during the renovation of Adams Events Center. Amenities will include a doctor's examination room, an expanded rehabilitation center, and twice as much space for athletic treatment. The athletic treatment center will be located in the new addition on the east side of the building and is expected to be completed by December of 1999.





### Adams Events Center

A \$15-million dollar, two-year renovation will transform The University of Montana's Harry Adams Field House and Dahlberg Arena into a sports and special events center, and the project is scheduled for completion in November 1999.

"We have become increasingly excited about the possibilities for serving the entire Missoula and Western Montana communities with our virtually new arena and associated facilities," said UM President George Dennison. "What we'll have will serve the athletic and cultural needs of the University while also serving the community."

When the renovated facility reopens in 1999, the name will change from Adams Field House to Adams Events Center to reflect the updated changes.

Construction of the Field House began in 1952 and cost \$955,000. The facility opened for the 1953-54 basketball season and was dedicated on December 18, 1953.

Based on advice from consultants, University leaders decided to gut the 44-year-old Field House and turn it into an area that would be an attractive, comfortable place for athletes, entertainers and spectators.

In early planning stages for the renovation, University officials assumed the construction could be done in phases to avoid disrupting sports and other Field House events. The projects' architects and engineers concluded that to do so would not be safe or cost effective.

The Field House was closed on July 14, 1998. The men's and women's basketball teams will compete at the Sentinel High School Gymnasium for the 1998-99 season, and the Grizzlies will also play in Billings, Butte, and Cut Bank. In addition, the Lady Griz volleyball team will call Loyola High School's Ram Activity Center home for the 1998 season.

When the Field House reopens in November 1999, the Missoula community will have its own multi-use facility to accommodate all types of various events, from athletic competitions, to conferences, trade shows, concerts, and lectures.

"The improvement of the Adams Events Center and our departmental offices is vital for us as we move into the 21st century," said UM Athletic Director Wayne Hogan. "The world is changing around us. Our opponents are racing to catch us. Without this commitment to growth and improvement, we are destined to fall behind."

The renovation includes a complete replacement of all seating and services in Dahlberg Arena. Among the amenities are 6,000 theatre seats and 2,000 bleacher seats, plus 13 new restrooms and eight different service areas for food and beverage. Dahlberg Arena will see a new center-hung four-sided

scoreboard, three-sided shot clocks, and a variety of other message centers and scoreboards.

The new Grizzly Sky Club will be a 4,000 square-foot club housing restrooms, elevator services, and upgraded food and beverage services. The Sky Club will provide access to 200 fully padded 22-inch theatre seats.

The Events Center will also have a 7,000 square-foot weight center, a new Rhinehart Athletic Treatment Center, a new athletic equipment center, new locker rooms for women, and an academic center for student-athletes.

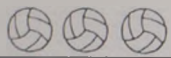
In addition, the new Southwest Auxiliary Gymnasium will feature a volleyball venue with seating for 1,300 and a new practice facility for men's and women's basketball with a new maple wood surface. The Southeast Auxiliary Gymnasium will be a practice facility for all 14 athletic programs at UM.

The final phase of the renovation will focus on the athletic department office complex, which will be expanded and improved. New arena management offices will be added.

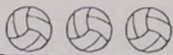
The new Events Center will meet all ADA guidelines in every area, including location of seating, restrooms, snack bars, elevators, and other facilities.

"The reconfiguration of the Field House will provide better seating and maintain the intimacy and crackling excitement generated among the fans, students and athletes," said Dennis Lind, Missoula attorney and community representative.





## Loyola's Ram Activity Center

While Adams Field House is undergoing renovation, the Lady Griz volleyball team will call the Ram Activity Center home during the 1998 season. The Ram Activity Center, or the RAC as it is affectionately known, is located at 1040 South First Street and is the athletic facility for Loyola-Sacred Heart High School. It holds 2,450 people at full capacity.

One of the oldest schools in the Missoula valley, Loyola-Sacred Heart is a private Catholic school with a current enrollment of 240 students. Sacred Heart Academy, a school for girls only, was established in 1873 by the Sisters of Providence. Loyola, the boys school, was founded by the Jesuit fathers in 1909. Although Loyola was closed in 1932 due to a lack of finances and resources, it reopened in 1952. The two schools merged to form Loyola-Sacred Heart in 1974. The 1998 graduating class of 55 received over 1.7 million dollars in college scholarship monies.

The Rams and the Heart Breakers originally competed in the old gym at St. Joseph's Elementary School until the Ram Activity Center was built during the 1980-81 school year. Two individuals who were key in the construction of the RAC were Hazel Marsh and Lloyd Twite, both alumni of Loyola-Sacred Heart. Twite was the General Contractor for the facility and much of the financial arrangements were made possible by Marsh, along with the Missoula business community, alumni and friends of the school. Thousands of hours of volunteer time and resources were necessary to complete the project.

In addition to serving as the home court for the LHS basketball and volleyball programs, the Ram Activity Center houses the locker rooms and weight room, which were added during the

1985-86 season. The RAC received a new coat of paint on its interior and padding on the end walls last year. The floor was refinished last summer.

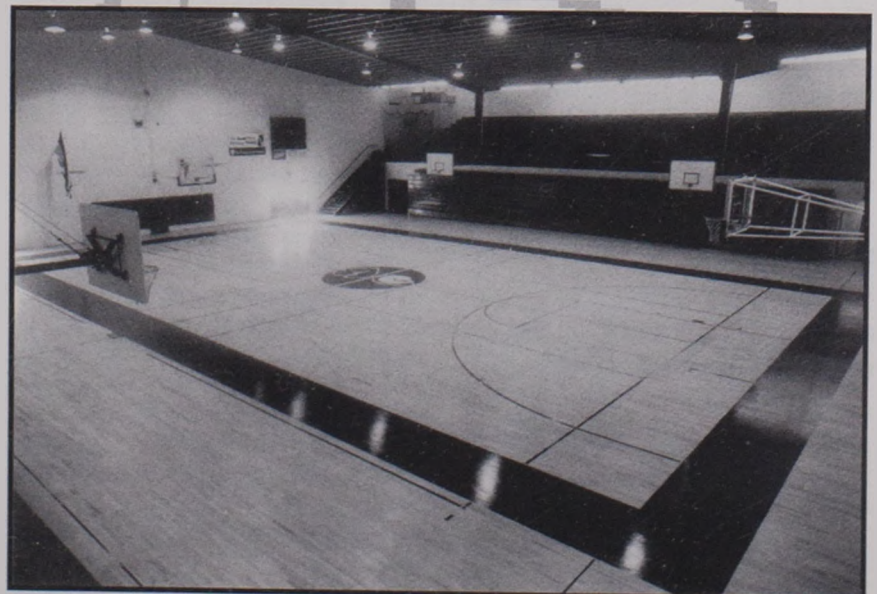
The Ram Activity Center has served as host for countless district and divisional basketball and volleyball tournaments for Class B and Class C. It has also been host to community meetings, concerts, light shows, wrestling tournaments, summer camps, the Big Sky State Games and other miscellaneous events.

Unlike other facilities, all athletic events held in the Ram Activity Center are possible due to the volunteers at Loyola-Sacred Heart. Parents, teachers, alumni, and boosters make themselves available to take tickets, work concessions, provide security, game management, and cleaning services for events.

Loyola-Sacred Heart and The University of Montana have numerous connections. Bob Hauck, athletic director at LHS, has three children, all of whom are UM graduates. His son, Bobby, served as

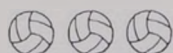
an assistant football coach for the Grizzlies, and his son, Tim, was a two-time All-American defensive back for the Grizzlies. Montana's head volleyball coach, Dick Scott, has a son, Jack, who is a sophomore at Loyola. Steve Hackney, equipment manager for the Grizzlies, has a son, Tyler, who is a junior at Loyola. Grizzly coaches and athletes have staffed camps and volunteered for various events at Loyola, including B.A.S.H., the annual fundraiser for the school.

The Rams and the Heart Breakers have had success at the Ram Activity Center. Both basketball teams have made numerous appearances at state tournaments, and the volleyball team placed second at state in 1996. The girls basketball team has gone 109-9 at the RAC since the 1989 season, and the boys basketball team has posted a record of 112-18 since the 1990-91 season. Last year the Heartbreaker volleyball team posted a 7-2 record. Loyola teams have found success at the RAC, and Montana hopes to find success too.

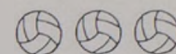

# Big Sky Conference



Although still youthful in the world of NCAA Division I athletic conferences, the 35-year-old Big Sky Conference has solidified itself as one of the strongest leagues in the west as well as the nation. The Big Sky begins its third year of the current nine-institution league membership after adding CSU-Northridge, CSU-Sacramento and Portland State to the family in 1996.

With its roots established in 1963, the Big Sky Conference began with six charter members: the University of Idaho, Idaho State University, Gonzaga University, the University of Montana, Montana State University and Weber State University. On July 1, 1970, the league experienced its first expansion, adding Boise State University and Northern Arizona University to the fold to create an eight-member league. On July 1, 1979, charter-member Gonzaga left the league and was replaced by the University of Nevada. In 1987, Eastern Washington was admitted to the league to create the first version of a nine-member Big Sky Conference. The University of Nevada's departure in 1992 made the Big Sky an eight-member league. On July 1, 1996, both Boise State and Idaho left the Big Sky, but the three additional institutions moved the league into a nine-member scenario for the second time.

The Big Sky Conference sponsors championships in 15 sports, including men's and women's cross country, golf, basketball, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, in addition to football and women's volleyball and soccer. The Big Sky is an NCAA Division I member in all sports, with member institutions classified as I-AA in football.

The 1998-99 athletic season is the 11th straight year the Big Sky Conference will sponsor championships in women's sports. Eleven years ago, the Big Sky Conference merged with the Mountain

West Athletic Conference, forming one league for both men's and women's athletics. The Mountain West had been in existence since 1982, sponsoring championships for women's athletics at the same institutions the Big Sky had sponsored men's programs.

The 1998-99 year marks the second year of Big Sky sponsorship for women's soccer. This year Eastern Washington and Idaho State join the six other institutions sponsoring women's soccer. Montana State is the only Big Sky school not sponsoring soccer.

The Big Sky Conference member institutions are located in seven states spanning from the Pacific Ocean to the Rocky Mountains and from the Canadian to the Mexican borders. The entire west coast is now represented by the Big Sky with members in Washington, Oregon and California, and of the nine western-most states, only two (Hawaii and Nevada) do not contain Big Sky members. League members can be found in Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Utah and Washington.

The name BIG SKY originated in a novel written in 1947 by the late A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont., entitled *The Big Sky*. Jack Hollowell, former Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State, and Harry Missildine of the Spokane Spokesman-Review called for the newly formed league to be named "The Big Sky Conference" in his column dated Feb. 20, 1963. Five days later, on February 25, the name Big Sky was adopted by the six presidents of the newly formed league.
