MEDIA INFORMATION

The University of Montana sports information staff looks forward to working with members of the media during the 2001-02 Lady Griz basketball season. The following information is designed to assist the media with its coverage of the Lady Griz. For additional information, please contact Assistant Sports Information Director Kevin Ludwig.

Media Credentials

Requests for media and photography credentials should be received by The University of Montana Sports Information Office no later than two days prior to the scheduled game. Requests should be directed to Assistant SID Kevin Ludwig at (406) 243-5414.

Credentials WILL NOT be mailed. Credentials may be picked up at the UM Sports Information Office on the day of the game or starting one hour before the game at the will call window, located in the main entrance of the Adams Center.

Credentials will be issued to working media only. Credentials are non-transferrable and should be worn in clear view at all times.

Press Row Seating

Seating at press row is limited and will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis. Only authorized personnel will be allowed along press row. Press row is a working area. Cheering for either team is prohibited and is grounds for removal.

Photography

Photographers are limited to the marked areas along the baselines, in accordance with NCAA guidelines.

Visiting Radio

A visiting radio phone line, along with a courtesy line is available. Radio broadcast permission must be obtained no later than one week prior to the scheduled game from Assistant SID Kevin Ludwig at (406) 243-5414.

Weekly Interviews

Members of the media should arrange all interviews with coaches and players with Assistant SID Kevin Ludwig at (406) 243-5414. A 24-hour advance notice is appreciated. Keep in mind that the best time to talk to head coach Robin Selvig is weekday mornings. On game days, NO player interviews will be allowed until the conclusion of the game.

Practices

With the exception of game-day shoot-arounds, most Lady Griz practices are open to the media. Players and coaches will be available for interviews for 20 minutes following practices. Contact Assistant SID Kevin Ludwig at (406) 243-5414 for practice times and locations.

Post-Game Services

Following a 10-minute "cooling off" period, head coach Robin Selvig and Lady Griz players will be available for interviews. Players will be available outside the Montana lockerroom. Coach Selvig will meet with the media in the same area following his post-game radio show. A member of the UM Sports Information Office will be available to assist in arranging post-game interviews. Complete stat packets, including a play-by-play, will be provided.

A working media area is available in the UM Sports Information Office, located on the main level of the Adams Center, to the right of the Ticket Office as you enter the facility.

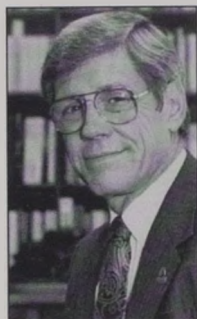

George M. Dennison, President

George Dennison, the 16th president of The University of Montana, begins his 12th year at the University. He served on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors from 1997-2000 and chaired the Big Sky Conference Presidents' Council in 1992-93.

Dennison came to UM from Kalamazoo, Mich., where he served as the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs of Western Michigan University from 1987-90. In earlier years, he spent time at the Universities of Arkansas and Washington

prior to 18 years at Colorado State University in Fort Collins.

At Colorado State, he started as a history professor then served in numerous other positions. He simultaneously held the positions of Associate Dean of the College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences and Associate Dean of the Graduate School for International Development Studies. He also served as Acting Academic Vice President, Associate Academic Vice President and Director of Admissions and Records.

An historian by training, Dennison received his bachelor's degree

with high honors in history from UM in 1962. He received his master's degree from UM in 1963, then earned his Ph.D. in history from the University of Washington in 1967. He has written numerous publications and made several professional presentations in both history and higher education.

Dennison serves on several boards. He chairs the Montana Commission on Community Service and serves on the Board of the International Heart Institute of Montana, the Community Medical Center Advisory Committee, the Campus Compact Executive Committee, the Board of Directors of the International Student Exchange Program, the Steering Committee for America Reads/America Counts, and the Maureen and Mike Mansfield Foundation.

George and his wife Jane have two sons, Rick and Robert. Rick played college football at Colorado State then joined the Denver Broncos. He played linebacker for Denver for nine years and now serves as special teams coach. Robert teaches math and computer programming in Tecumseh, Kan., and coaches football, wrestling, and track. The Dennisons have four grandchildren.



Wayne Hogan, Athletic Director

Unprecedented growth and expansion have been the hallmarks of Athletic Director Wayne Hogan's tenure at The University of Montana. Serving as UM's 14th director of athletics, Hogan is in his sixth year with the Grizzlies. The success of the Montana program comes as no surprise to those who have followed Hogan's 24 years in the field of intercollegiate athletics.

In his association with three collegiate programs, the 45-year-old Hogan has known only victories and championships. He had the rare opportunity to join the Montana program just as the 1995 Grizzlies began their immortal drive to the I-AA Football National Championship, winning their last eight games en route to the title — and then 14 straight games in 1996. All of this came on the heels of a I-A football national title in 1994 while Hogan was serving at his alma mater, Florida State University, where he spent 18 years in various athletic department capacities.

At Florida State, Hogan played an integral role in that program's rise from relative mediocrity in the 70's to one of the nation's premier athletic programs today. Along the way he filled almost every conceivable role, from a volunteer student intern in 1974 to director of athletics in 1994. During that time the Seminoles won 190 football games and 14 of 16 bowl games, joined the Atlantic Coast Conference and saw its basketball teams reach the Sweet 16 and the Elite 8 during the 90's.

Since his arrival at Montana the football program has won 58 of 72 games, five Big Sky Conference Championships and has appeared in the I-AA playoffs every year. The Grizzlies won a national championship in 1995 and have appeared in the national title game an unprecedented three times in Hogan's six years at the helm. Amazingly, the three title appearances were orchestrated by three different head coaches. Perhaps the defining moment of Hogan's tenure occurred both in 1996 and 1999 when both men's and women's basketball teams won league championships along with football. A sweep of those three championships in a single year had never before been achieved in the 35-year history of the conference.

With a knack for marketing and communications, Hogan's contributions probably are best tallied by looking at the numbers. Attendance is up dramatically across the board. In football, season ticket sales, just 6,500 in 1995, topped 12,500 again this year. This provided a complete preseason sellout of Washington-Grizzly Stadium as the new century was ushered in. Average attendance is up from 11,000 at his arrival to better than 19,000. Annual giving is up by more than \$200,000, and corporate sponsorships have also seen a six-digit increase. Hogan has also fostered the University's royalty program which has seen revenues

on licensed products jump from \$20,000 to well over \$100,000. In all, revenue generated by his department has grown from \$2.8 million in 1995 to a projected \$4.4 million this year.

Clearly, Hogan's most visible role has been the undertaking of a \$14.7 million facility project which has converted the antiquated Harry Adams Field House into the sparkling new Adams Center. In addition to transforming the old gymnasium into a true modern-day basketball arena, the project has given Grizzly athletics a roadway to the future. Included in the project are a massive indoor practice and volleyball game facility, a new double-the-size weight-training facility, a new and expanded medical treatment facility, an academic center for student-athletes and remodeled equipment and locker rooms. The crowning jewel of the project is the new John C. Hoyt Athletic Office Complex. UM recently received a gift totaling more the \$600,000 from the late Mr. Hoyt, a longtime UM supporter.

In addition, UM received a \$1,000,000 gift for improvements at Washington-Grizzly Stadium, including a state-of-the-art synthetic grass playing surface. Another Grizzly donor has committed nearly \$500,000 for improvements at the University's track. These gifts have pushed a current fund-raising blitz to more than \$3 million in the last 18 months.

These are just a few examples of Hogan's aggressive style that has the Grizzly program on the move. Somewhat behind the scenes, Montana has received its NCAA certification, satisfied numerous gender equity concerns including the complete equalization of recruiting, travel and equipment budgets, attacked a number of salary inequities and reorganized staff duties and responsibilities. During his 20000 State of the University Address, President George Dennison called Hogan's program "the most efficient I-AA program in America."

After receiving his bachelor's degree in communications from Florida State University in 1979, Hogan worked for two minor league baseball teams as a broadcaster and public relations specialist. He spent one year in Charleston, W. Va. with the Houston Astros AAA farm team before moving to Albuquerque and a stint with the Los Angeles Dodgers AAA club in the Pacific Coast League. While in Albuquerque, Hogan was coaxed back into college athletics when he became the assistant sports information director at the University of New Mexico in 1981. He returned to Florida State in 1982 as the school's sports information director. He was promoted to Assistant Athletic Director in 1992 and served as the interim athletic director in 1994-95.

A native of Tallahassee, Fla., Hogan's father Patrick is a former sports information director and longtime college administrator at FSU. His wife Dawn is a native of Treasure Island, Fla. They have three children: Lindsay, Kelly, and J.P.

Marie Porter

Associate Athletic Director

Marie Porter oversees the olympic and all women's sports plus the areas of academics and rules compliance.

She has served as tournament director for several events, including the 1997 NCAA Women's West Regional Basketball Championship, and currently serves on the NCAA Division I Championships and Competition Cabinet.

Porter was UM's first-ever coordinator of athletic academic services from 1992-96, developing and implementing the inaugural Academic Services program for Grizzly Athletics. She served as the assistant women's tennis coach from 1993-95 and was a Freshman Seminar instructor from 1992-96. She currently advises on UM's Student-Athlete Advisory Board and directs the Griz A.C.E.S. life skills program.

Before arriving at UM in 1992, Porter served as an academic counselor at Washington State from 1990-92. She is a graduate of the University of Kansas, receiving her B.A. in psychology with honors (1988) and her M.A. in social psychology (1990), maintaining a perfect 4.0 grade-point average.

The former Marie Hibbard was a four-year standout on the Jayhawk tennis team. She was the KU Outstanding Woman Student-Athlete in 1986, 1987, and 1988, plus a two-time GTE Academic All-American (1987, 1988). Porter was a recipient of an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship in 1988.

Marie is married to Mark Porter. Marie and Mark have two sons, Henry and Grant.



James Bandy

Assistant Athletic Director, Compliance

James Bandy begins his third year as Assistant Athletic Director for Compliance. He oversees the day-to-day operations of maintaining the athletic department's compliance with NCAA, Big Sky Conference and University rules and regulations.

Bandy came to Montana after serving in the same position at the University of Houston for almost four years. Prior to working at Houston, Bandy was a graduate assistant at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln from 1991 to 1993 before being promoted to assistant compliance coordinator and serving in that role from 1993 to 1995.

He received a bachelor of arts in journalism from Georgia State in 1988 and a M.Ed. in athletic administration from Nebraska in 1993. Before entering collegiate athletics administration, Bandy worked for public relations agencies in Orlando, Fla., and Nashville, Tenn.

Kevin Ludwig

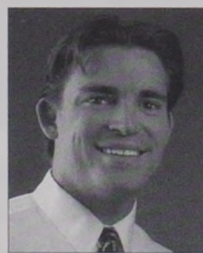
Assistant Sports Information Director

Hawley comes to UM from the University of Wyoming, where he served as the assistant director of marketing for more than a year. Prior to that he was an intern at Wyoming in 1998 and 1999.

While at Wyoming he was responsible for organizing and coordinating the "Sixth Man Club," a student group that supported and promoted Cowboy basketball. The "Sixth Man Club" was the largest student group on UW's campus.

At UW he also assisted in day-to-day marketing, development, event management, as well as ticket and public relations issues. He developed game-day and halftime promotions for football, basketball, and Olympic sports.

Hawley is a 1999 graduate of the University of Wyoming, majoring in marketing. He is single.

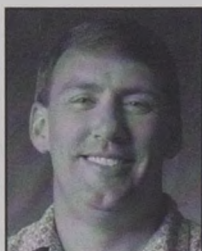

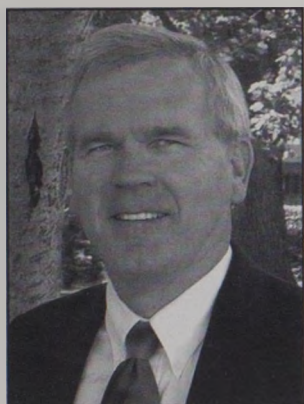

Robin Selvig, Head Coach

When Robin Selvig first appeared on The University of Montana campus as the women's basketball coach, the thought of coaching the Lady Griz at the turn of the century was probably the furthest thought in his mind.

But now as one of 17 active coaches with 500-or-more wins, Selvig has made Lady Griz basketball one of the nation's top teams with 16 postseason appearances in the past 19 seasons. His 23-year career record is 536-148 (.784).

While an amazing streak of 18 20-win seasons was snapped during the 1998-99 season, the Lady Griz rebounded the last two seasons by winning at least 20 games, giving Selvig a total of 20 20-win seasons. During that time, the Lady Griz have won 14 Big Sky Conference regular season titles and have advanced to the NCAA Tournament 14 times.

Born and raised in northeastern Montana, Selvig and the Lady Griz have become Montana landmarks. A number of players he has coached have gone on to emulate his style as they have become coaches themselves. He is not a complicated coach, just one with an overwhelming love of the game and a knack for working with people.

Selvig's success has brought him full circle. Although he has spent 23 seasons as head coach of the Lady Griz, his tenure at UM spans even longer. He came to campus in the fall of 1970 as a quick but gangly college freshman ready to expand his basketball knowledge and game under the tutelage of Jud Heathcote. Selvig would play with the freshmen team that season before earning three varsity letters.

Selvig earned all-conference honors as a senior, leading the Grizzlies to a 19-8 record. He was awarded the John Eaheart Award, given annually to Montana's outstanding defensive player. That emphasis on defense has been a staple of Selvig's

legacy and is now a trademark of his teams.

legacy and is now a trademark of his teams.

Selvig was also the recipient of Montana's top athletic award, the Grizzly Cup, that year. He was later inducted into the Grizzly Basketball Hall of Fame during a 26-4 campaign in 1982-83.

After receiving his bachelor's degree in HPE in 1974, Selvig was appointed coach of the Montana freshmen team along with Kevin Rocheleau, who would later marry Selvig's long-time assistant coach and former point guard, Annette Whitaker.

A year later, Selvig turned to the high school ranks, coaching the girls' basketball team at Plentywood High School from 1975-78, compiling a 38-24 record.

Returning to his alma mater in 1978 as the fourth head coach of the women's basketball team, Selvig would bring stability, success and loyalty to the program. UM's inaugural season was the 1974-75 campaign, but the Lady Griz had three coaches in four years. Looking for both success and stability, athletic director Harley Lewis hired Selvig to lead the program into the 80s. Lewis likely had no idea Selvig would also lead the program in the 21st century.

In his first year at the helm (1978-79), Selvig's team posted a 13-13 record. In his second year (1979-80), the Lady Griz posted a 19-10 record, and the wins continued to pile up over the years.

Selvig has had tremendous success with the Lady Griz. He is the all-time winningest coach in Montana history. Selvig enters the 2001-02 season ranked as the fourth-winningest coach of all-time, according to percentage (.789), behind Louisiana Tech's Leon Barmore, Tennessee's Pat Summitt and Connecticut's Geno Auriemma. He has averaged 23.3 wins per season since his arrival.

Selvig has taken his teams to 16 postseason tournaments, including 14 NCAA Championships. Montana advanced to the 1984 West Region semifinals and has advanced to the second round seven times.

Montana has dominated the Big Sky Conference since its inception in 1982. The Lady Griz's record is 251-31 (.890) against conference foes during the regular season and 34-5 (.872) in league tournaments. Selvig has won 89 percent (285-36) of his games against Big Sky opponents, and his teams have gone undefeated in conference action six times since the 1986-87 season. The Lady Griz went 16-0 in league play for three consecutive seasons from 1988-91, then repeated that feat in 1996-97.

Selvig has guided his teams to 15 regular-season titles and 14 tournament titles in 19 years.

His talent and work ethic have earned him numerous awards. Selvig has been chosen the Big Sky/Mountain West Coach of the Year 13 times and the NCAA Division I District 7 Coach of

the Year nine times. In addition, he was also one of three finalists for the 1991 NCAA Division I National Coach of the Year. In February 2001 Selvig was inducted into The University of Montana Athletic Hall of Fame.

And one thing has remained constant, defense. Every year Montana is ranked among the nation's top 10 teams in the defensive statistical categories. The Lady Griz have been ranked among the top three defensive teams five times in the past seven years. UM also was third in scoring defense during the 1999-2000 season.

The Lady Griz led the nation in field-goal percentage defense (.333) in the 1995-96 season. UM set the NCAA Division I record (.317) in that category in the 1992-93 campaign and kept that ranking for several seasons.

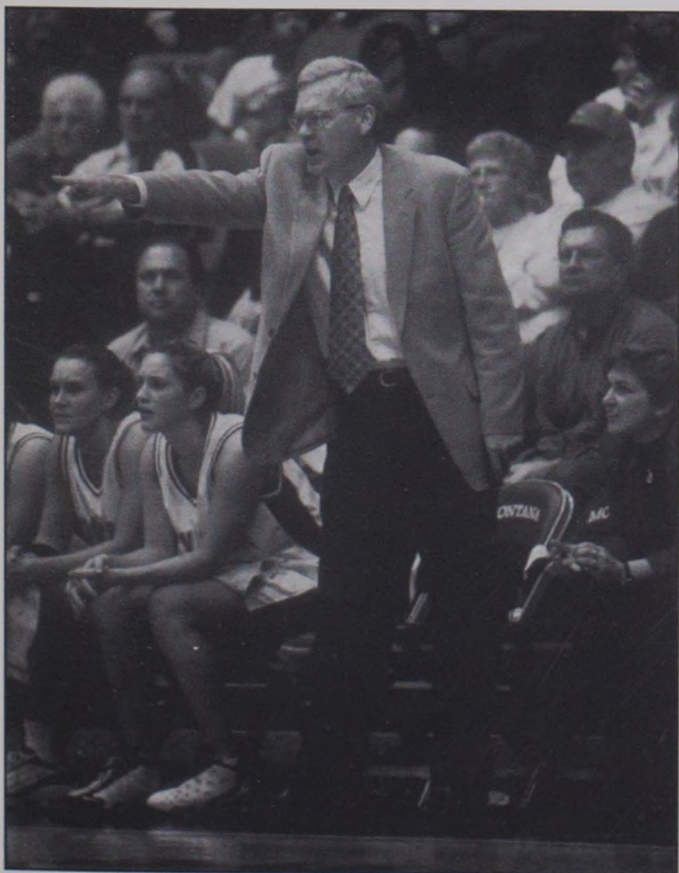
Selvig's success on the court has carried over into the grandstands. Montana has been consistently ranked among the top programs in the country in attendance since 1984. The Lady Griz were ranked 16th nationally for the 1997-98 season after finishing in the top 15 for 13-straight seasons. The team's return to the renovated Adams Center and Dahlberg Arena in 1999-2000 has put Montana once again among the nation's top schools in attendance. Last season, the Lady Griz averaged 3,449 fans, which ranked the team among the top 30 programs in the nation. When Selvig began coaching at UM, Montana averaged just over 200 fans per home game.

Selvig has served on several NCAA committees and is a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches' Association.

Outside of Grizzly Athletics, Selvig has served as the Director of the Montana Special Olympics and has been a spokesperson for Missoula Youth Homes.

A native of Outlook, Selvig comes from a family of eight children. His brother, Doug, was a four-year letterwinner for the Grizzlies' men's basketball team from 1981-84, and currently coaches at Glendive High School. A sister, Sandy (Sullivan), played for the Lady Griz from 1978-81.

Selvig is married to the former Janie Hagan, originally from Redstone. They have two sons, Jeff and Dan.

Annette Rocheleau, Assistant Coach

One of the most experienced assistant coaches in the country, Annette (Whitaker) Rocheleau enters her 21st season as Robin Selvig's top assistant. She has helped bring the Lady Griz program into national prominence through her primary responsibilities of recruiting, game strategy, conditioning, scouting, and

travel arrangements.

Formerly Annette Whitaker, she first came to Montana as a walk-on. She made the team and became the starting point guard and team captain that first season. Rocheleau was also the team captain as a senior and was the team's "Most Inspirational" player. In her two seasons, she recorded 132 assists.

After completing her playing days, Rocheleau turned her attention to coaching, directing the Lady Griz junior varsity team for the 1981-82 and 1982-83 seasons. She was appointed Montana's first full-time assistant coach in September 1983, and the Lady Griz have become one of the nation's top teams.

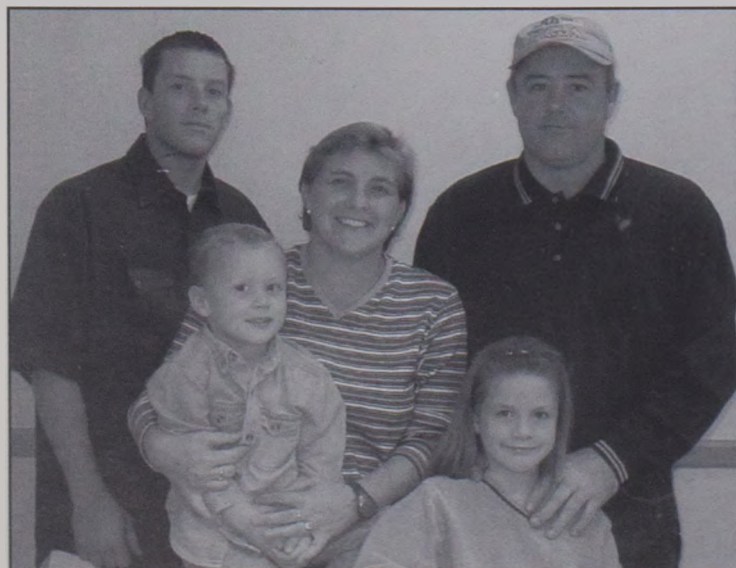
She transferred to Montana from Wenatchee Valley Junior College. Rocheleau, and fellow teammate Jill Greenfield, led Wenatchee Valley to two state junior college championship titles. She also was a team captain.

A 1977 graduate of Cashmere (Wash.) High School, she was a four-year letterwinner in both basketball and tennis from 1974 to 1977. She received her bachelor's degree from UM in health and physical education in 1982.

An outstanding golfer, Rocheleau served as the assistant golf coach from 1992-94, the first two seasons of collegiate women's golf at UM.

She is a member of the WBCA Coach of the Year committee. She also served as the assistant director of the Montana Special Olympics in both 1990 and 1991.

She is married to Kevin Rocheleau, a former Grizzly basketball player. They have three sons, Beau, Brian and Ty, and a daughter Trae.



Shannon Cate-Schweyen, Assistant Coach

Shannon Cate-Schweyen is in her 10th season as a full-time assistant coach under mentor Robin Selvig. She joined the UM coaching staff as a student assistant in 1992 and was appointed to a full-time position in 1993. Her primary responsibility is recruiting, but she also assists with conditioning, game strategy, scout-

ing and public relations.

The Big Sky Conference's first-and-only Kodak First Team All-American, Schweyen led the Lady Griz to a 103-18 overall record. She was a three-time all-region pick, a two-time Big Sky MVP, a three-time Big Sky tournament MVP and a three-time Lady Griz MVP. She was also a four-time Big Sky all-academic pick.

Probably the Big Sky's most prolific player, Schweyen left the court as the league's all-time leading scorer among both men and women with 2,172 career points.

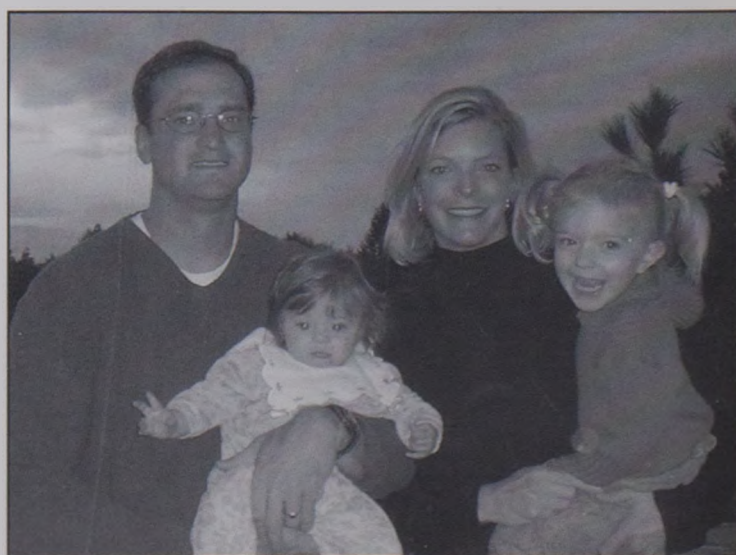
She still owns 12 school records and nine Big Sky Conference records, averaging 18.7 points, 7.6 rebounds and 3.6 assists per game over the course of four years and was consistently ranked among the NCAA Division I leaders in scoring, field-goal percentage and free-throw percentage during her playing days.

Schweyen was a three-time state tournament MVP for her Billings Central prep team. She was also the Montana *USA Today* Player of the Year in 1988.

She spent a short period of time playing basketball for a Spanish national team following college but returned after a shoulder injury. She dislocated her shoulder seven times during her senior season, requiring two surgeries.

Her No. 21 jersey was retired following her collegiate career. It now hangs in the southwest corner of the upper concourse in the Adams Center.

She received a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1993. She is married to Brian Schweyen, a former Big Sky all-conference decathlete from Montana State. He is an assistant track and field coach for the Grizzlies. Shannon and Brian have two daughters, Jordyn and Shelby.

Trish Duce, Assistant Coach

Trish (Olson) Duce is in her eighth year as an assistant coach under Robin Selvig. She is primarily responsible for computer support and administration. However, Duce also wears another hat, serving as part of the group responsible for the athletic department's official web site, www.montanagrizzlies.com

Duce had a successful basketball career with the Lady Griz, despite being plagued by broken bones in her right foot. The former Trish Olson came to UM from Missoula's Big Sky High School in 1989 and played in 28 games as a true freshman. She started in 29 games as a sophomore and was a Big Sky Conference all-tournament selection after leading the Lady Griz to a 77-49 victory over Montana State in the championship game.

In 1991-92, she broke a bone in her foot and was granted a medical redshirt season after competing in only three games. The following season she missed nine games due to another broken bone in her foot. However, she was named to the Western States Showdown all-tournament team after tallying a school-record eight blocks against Western Carolina, a record that still



stands. As a fifth-year senior in 1993-94, Duce started 24 games and finished her career ranked 11th with 89 blocked shots.

Duce received her bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1993 and her master's degree in computer science in 1995. She was a four-time Big Sky all-academic selection during her career.

She is married to Kirk Duce, a former Grizzly football kicker who still holds the career scoring record (298 career points). They have a daughter Lexi and a son River.

2001-02 LADY GRIZ SEASON OUTLOOK

Heading into the 2001-02 season, University of Montana head women's basketball coach Robin Selvig knows his team has all the pieces for a successful season. What he doesn't know is just how the pieces will fit together.

Gone from last year's 21-9 team are three-time All-Big Sky Conference selections Lauren Cooper and Linda Cummings. The duo, who finished their careers ranked among the school's top 10 all-time scorers, were Montana's go-to players a year ago. They led the team in scoring and rebounding, combining for over 27 points and 13 rebounds per game.

Replacing that type of production won't fall upon the shoulders of two individuals. Instead it will be spread out among a roster that features eight returning letterwinners, three returning starters and several talented newcomers.

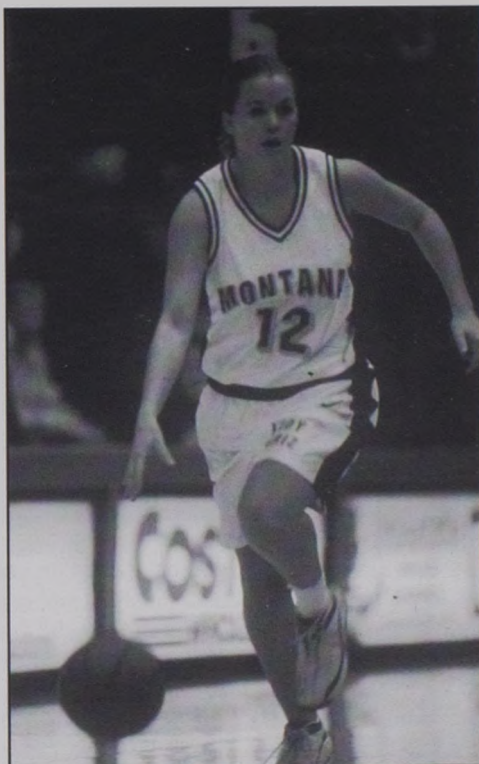
"I'm excited about this team," said Selvig, who enters his 24th season at the UM helm. "There are several interesting questions that need to be answered. We have a lot of new kids in the program, and there is going to be a lot of competition for playing time and starting jobs. It will be interesting to watch this team develop and find out what roles everyone ends up being asked to play.

"We have five seniors who we expect to get stability and leadership from, and we have five new players," added Selvig. "It's a nice blend of experience and youth. But I anticipate some of the younger kids playing this year."

With so much talent and potential on the roster, Selvig said he hopes that can translate into a balanced lineup where one or two individuals aren't counted on to carry a majority of the workload.

"I hope we have a chance to be a deep team," Selvig said. "Early in the year we will be looking at several different combinations, but by the time we get to conference play, hopefully we will have some roles defined."

Montana returns its entire starting backcourt in senior **Cheryl Keller** and sophomore **Brooklynn Lorenzen**. Keller is the team veteran, entering her third season in the starting lineup. She also is the team's top returning scorer after averaging 9.6 points per game during her junior campaign. One of the top shooters

in the Big Sky Conference, she made 42 percent (36 of 85) of her 3-point field goals and 84 percent (42 of 50) of her free throw attempts last year. But her talent extends to the defensive end of the court as well. She led the team with 52 steals and was named the team's Defensive Player of the Year for the third straight season.

"We are expecting some great leadership and contributions from Cheryl," Selvig said. "We need her leadership at both ends of the floor. With so many young players on the team, they'll look to her to set the tone."

Selvig will look to Lorenzen to direct the Lady Griz offense. She started all 30 games last year as a true freshman and recorded a team-high 120 assists while averaging 4.2 points per game.

"She had an outstanding season last year," Selvig said of his

court general. "She was as good as you could hope for as a freshman in terms of understanding the offense and handling the ball. As the year went along she improved defensively quite a bit."

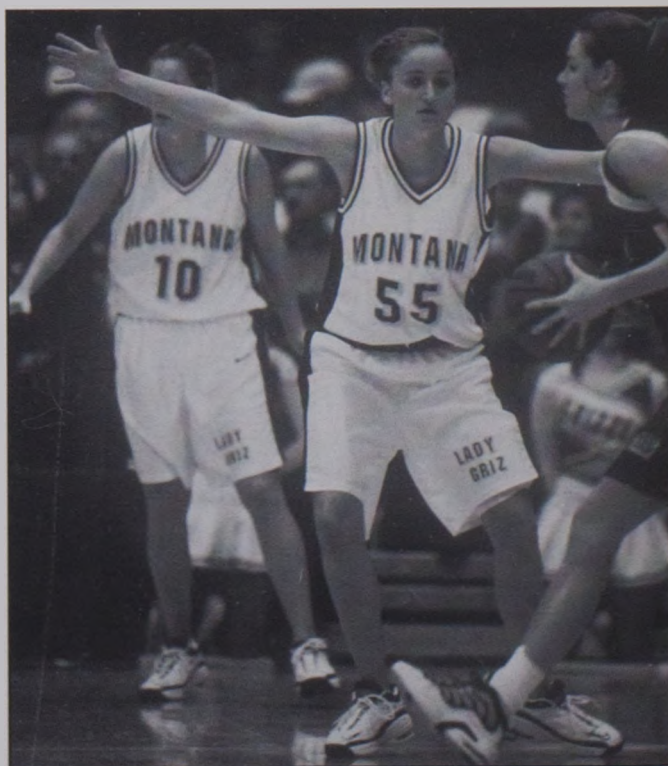
Junior **LeAnn Montes** backs up Lorenzen. Filling that same role last year, Montes averaged just over 3 points per game and was second to Lorenzen with 80 assists. Selvig indicated that Montes has improved over the offseason and could push Lorenzen for more minutes.

Selvig also said he hopes to see more scoring from his point guards this season. He said Montes didn't shoot the ball as well as she is capable of last season, and that Lorenzen should look for her shot more with a year of experience under her belt.

Other players who could also see playing time this season at the point include sophomore **Cami Schenk** and freshmen **Lynsey Monaco** and **Aimee Montes**, LeAnn's younger sister.

Schenk, Monaco and senior **Amy Phillips** are among the players who will also battle for action at shooting guard.

Versatile junior **Julie Deming** will contend for a starting job this year after averaging 6.4 points and 3.0 rebounds per

game off the bench last season. At 5-foot-10, she provides good size on the perimeter. Her athletic ability and shooting touch could also enable her to see some time at shooting guard.

"We are looking for good things from Julie this year," Selvig said. "She should be playing more minutes. She's had a big role for us in the past, and she should have an even bigger role this season."

Senior **Simarron Schildt** should see her role expand in 2001-02 as well. A former Big Sky Conference Outstanding Sixth Player, Schildt averaged 6.5 points and 5.7 rebounds last season. She was also fourth on the team with 20 3-pointers. That mixture of strong rebounding and outside shooting will make her valuable at both forward positions.

Phillips and freshman **Juliann Keller**, Cheryl's younger sister, will vie for playing time at small forward. The younger Keller was Montana's *USA Today*/Gatorade Player of the Year last year.

Another senior, **Laura Valley**, will move to power forward this year after starting all 30 games at center a year ago. She averaged 8.2 points and 4.7 rebounds from that spot. Valley will battle Schildt for the starting job, while freshman **Jody McLeod** could also see some action.

With Valley making the transition to power forward, it opens the door for a freshman to start at center. Redshirt freshman **Crystal Baird** will battle incoming freshman **Hollie Tyler** for the starting job early in the season. Tyler was the *USA Today*/Gatorade Player of the Year for the state of Idaho last year. Senior **Jamie Fariss** will also figure into the mix, but she will miss the first few weeks of the season recovering from a severely sprained ankle. Fariss gave the Lady Griz some valuable minutes off the bench last year, but injuries have limited her playing time throughout her career.

"One area we want to be better at is rebounding," Selvig said. "If someone can get a rebound, she will find time on the court. We feel good that we have some strong inside post players."

The 2001-02 schedule will test the Lady Griz throughout the season. The team opens the season at the Texas-Pan American Lady Bronc Classic against Southeast Missouri State. Montana will face either Texas-Pan American or Arkansas-Little Rock in the consolation or championship game.

In December UM will participate in the Mississippi State Classic where the Lady Griz will play Houston in the opening round and either Mississippi State or Jacksonville State on the second night.

Montana's home schedule features a pair of games against nationally-prominent programs. The Lady Griz entertain Western Kentucky on Nov. 24 and Utah on Dec. 21. UM defeated Western Kentucky 74-65 on the road a year ago, but the Lady Hilltoppers rebounded to finish with a 19-14 record. WKU qualified for the Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT) where the Lady Hilltoppers advanced to the quarterfinals. Utah, 28-4 in 2000-01, defeated Montana last season in Salt Lake, and advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament.

In mid-December Montana will play two intrastate games against Western Montana and Montana State-Billings.

The Lady Griz Holiday Classic features one of its strongest fields with Provi-

dence College, St. Louis University and Idaho standing in the way of Montana's 19th Classic title in 22 years.

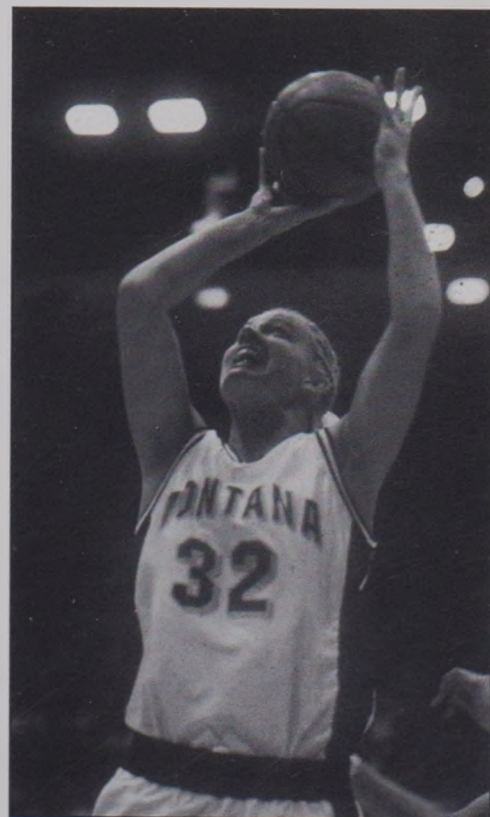
Montana's non-conference road schedule isn't easy either. The Lady Griz will travel to Washington State, Portland and Gonzaga.

The Big Sky Conference shapes up to be a wide open race with several teams, including the Lady Griz, having legitimate title chances. Defending champion Idaho State returns last year's Player of the Year, Mandi Carver, while Weber State returns a majority of players from a team that came within a point of upsetting Idaho State in the semifinals of the conference tournament.

Montana State, which tied Montana for second place last year, returns a strong nucleus, as do Northern Arizona and Eastern Washington.

Selvig said he anticipates Portland State and Sacramento State to be much improved over last season after being decimated by injuries last year.

"I think it's a pick 'em," Selvig said of the conference race. "There are a lot of reasons for a lot teams to believe they can win the conference."

2000-01 SEASON REVIEW

Every season the goal for the Montana Lady Griz remains the same. Win the Big Sky Conference championship and advance to the NCAA Division I Tournament.

The Lady Griz have accomplished this goal more times than not, with 14 NCAA Tournament appearances under their belts. Montana's bid to add a 15th appearance to its list of accomplishments nearly became a reality in 2000-01. The Lady Griz posted a 21-9 record, their 20th 20-win season in 21 years, and tied for second in the Big Sky Conference standings with an 11-5 league mark.

The No. 3 seed for the Big Sky Conference Tournament, Montana needed to win three games in three days in order to achieve its season-long goal.

Following an impressive 76-55 win over Eastern Washington in the first round, the Lady Griz set their sights on a semi-final matchup against second-seeded Montana State.

Montana had something to prove against the Bobcats. In a 64-52 loss in Bozeman in mid-February, Montana shot only 29 percent from the field, including a dismal 12 percent in the first half.

The Lady Griz made sure that did not happen again as they shot 51 percent from the floor en route to an 84-67 victory. The victory propelled UM into the tournament finals for the 12th time in 13 years. It also set up a third meeting against Idaho State, a team who defeated Montana twice during the regular season after losing 37 straight games to the Lady Griz over a 20-year span.

In the finals, Idaho State, the tournament host, outrebounded UM 27-8 in the first half, including 15 offensive boards, to take a 35-28 halftime lead. The Bengals' performance also excited the 5,000-plus fans in attendance.

Montana regrouped at halftime and began the second half by outscoring ISU 13-6 to tie the game at 41-41. But it was not to be, as the Bengals pulled away from the Lady Griz down the stretch for a 68-59 win. For Idaho State, it was the perfect ending to a magical season. The Bengals swept through the Big Sky undefeated in earning their first NCAA berth.

As for Montana, it was the premature end to an otherwise successful season.

"I thought we had a pretty good year," UM head coach Robin Selvig said. "We were in position to get to the NCAA Tournament, but we came up one game short. The girls were disappointed, but you have to take your hats off to Idaho State. They won every close game they played. I thought we were capable of winning the tournament. But you can't win a championship every year."

To say the least, the 2000-01 season was filled with highs and lows for the Lady Griz.

Montana started the season in strong fashion, racing out to a 5-2 record. Included in this mark were impressive road wins at Western Kentucky and Brigham Young. In addition, the Lady Griz held a halftime lead against Utah, a team that eventually advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16.

UM appeared headed to a 7-2 record against Gonzaga in mid-December, but the game featured a very improbable ending. Gonzaga overcame a 12-point deficit in the final 1:24 to escape Dahlberg Arena with a 74-73 victory.

A loss such as that could have had lingering effects. But the Lady Griz quickly erased the disappointment. UM bounced

back by defeating Robert Morris and Washington State in its next two games to win the Lady Griz Holiday Classic for the 18th time in 21 years.

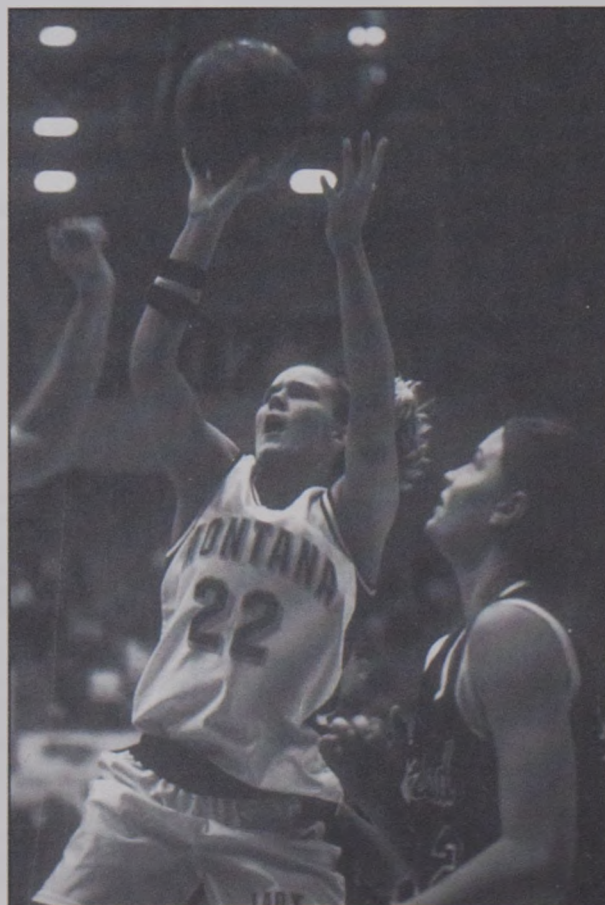
Montana appeared to have righted the ship. The Lady Griz reeled off three more wins, all in the Big Sky Conference, to improve to 11-2 and 3-0 in the league.

The Lady Griz then went 4-4 over the next eight games to fall to 7-4 in the Big Sky and 15-6 overall. A common thread in all four of the losses was UM's inconsistent offense. In three of the four losses the Lady Griz failed to score 60 points. Despite that fact, Montana still had a chance to win all four of those games. The largest margin of defeat in these contests was eight points.

"It's the nature of basketball. We were a little inconsistent offensively last season," Selvig said. "But at the same time, we didn't play a game where we didn't have a chance to win in the final two minutes. I'm not going to look at 21 wins and say we had a down year. We had a good season. At the end of the year we were playing good basketball. We just came up a little short."

Montana played some of its best basketball down the stretch. Following a 62-54 loss at Montana State, UM won four of its final five regular season games, scoring at least 70 points in all four wins.

Montana's late-season surge, along with its success early in the year, put the Lady Griz in position to be considered for the Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT). Selvig waited by the phone, but when it did ring, the news was not

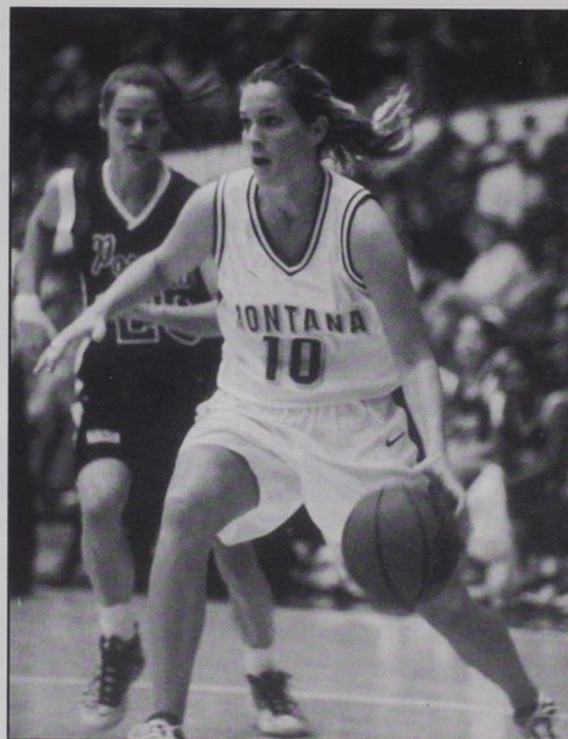
good.

"I felt we were on the bubble," Selvig said. "We had some goods wins, particularly at BYU and Western Kentucky. But we also had some bad losses. I would have liked to have played more with that team. We were playing good basketball at the end of the year, so I would have liked to see what we could do. But I can see why we weren't invited."

Nonetheless, the season contained several memorable moments. Seniors Lauren Cooper and Linda Cummings both scored their 1,000th career point. They shared Most Valuable Player honors at the Lady Griz Holiday Classic, and they both were named to the All-Big Sky Conference Team for the third time. The duo concluded their careers by being named to the All-Big Sky Conference Tournament Team.

Individually, Cooper ended her career third on the all-time scoring chart with 1,396 points. Already UM's career 3-point field goal leader, Cooper broke the Big Sky career record, finishing with 212 career treys. She also became the most prolific free throw shooter in school history, finishing with an all-time percentage of 83.8 percent (212-for-253).

Cummings, meanwhile, finished her career 10th on the all-time scoring list with 1,165 points. She also added her name to the list of the best shooters in UM history. She finished the season second on the career 3-point percentage list (40.0 percent) and fourth on the career free throw percentage chart (79.8 percent.).

Montana's season came to an end with a 68-59 loss to Idaho State in the Big Sky Tournament finals. It was UM's third loss to ISU.

Rebounding was a key in the game. Idaho State outrebounded the Lady Griz 27-8 in the first half, including 15 offensive boards. As a result, ISU led 35-28 at the break.

In the second half, Montana used a 13-6 run to pull even at 41-41, thanks to a 3-pointer from Cheryl Keller. But UM never took the lead.

Lauren Cooper led Montana with 18 points. She sank five 3-pointers to finish with a tournament record 12 in three games. As a team, Montana set a tournament record with 26 3-pointers.

Cooper and Cummings were named to the all-tournament team. They were joined by three Idaho State players - Mandi Carver, the tournament MVP, Sarah Nelson and Ashley Toner - and Weber State's Kristen Clyder-Gardner.

The 2001-2002 athletic season marks the 39th year of the Big Sky Conference and, although still youthful in the world of NCAA Division I athletic conferences, the Big Sky has solidified itself as one of the strongest leagues in the West as well as the nation. This year will also see the conference with one team less; Cal State Northridge entered the conference in 1996 and left it in the spring of 2001.

With its roots established in 1963, the Big Sky Conference began with six charter members: The University of Idaho, Idaho State University, Gonzaga University, The University of Montana, Montana State University and Weber State University.

On July 1, 1970, the league experienced its first expansion, adding Boise State University and Northern Arizona University to the fold to create an eight-member league. On July 1, 1979, charter member Gonzaga left the league and was replaced by the University of Nevada. In 1987, Eastern Washington was admitted to the league to create the first version of a nine-member Big Sky Conference. The University of Nevada's departure in 1992 moved the league to eight members until July 1, 1996 when both Boise State and Idaho left the Big Sky, but the three additional institutions moved the league into a nine-member scenario for the second time.

The Big Sky conference sponsors championships in 15 sports, including men's and women's cross country, golf, basketball, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, in addition to football, women's volleyball and soccer. The Big Sky is a NCAA Division I member in all sports, with member institutions classified as I-AA in football.

The 2000-2001 athletic season also marks the twelfth year in which the Big Conference will sponsor championships in women's sports. Twelve years ago the Big Sky Conference merged with



the Mountain West Athletic Conference, forming one league for both men's and women's athletics. The Mountain West had been in existence since 1982, sponsoring championships for women's athletics at the same institutions the Big Sky had sponsored men's programs.

The eight Big Sky Conference member institutions are located in seven states that span from the Pacific Ocean to the Rocky Mountains and from the Canadian to the Mexican borders. The entire west coast is now represented by the Big Sky with members in Washington, Oregon and California, and of the eight western-most states in the contiguous United States, only one (Nevada) does not contain a Big Sky member. League members can be found in Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and Utah.

The name BIG SKY originated in a novel written in 1947 by the late A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont., entitled *The Big Sky*. Jack Hollowell, former Montana advertising director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State, and Harry Missildine of the Spokane (Wash.) *Spokesman-Review* called for the newly formed league to be named "The Big Sky Conference" in his column dated Feb. 20, 1963. Five days later, on Feb. 25, the name Big Sky was adopted by the six presidents of the newly formed league.

On July 1, 1995, Doug Fullerton became the fifth commissioner of the Big Sky Conference and was given the reins to lead the league into the changing world of intercollegiate athletics. Fullerton replaced longtime commissioner Ron Stephenson, who retired after 14 years in the position. The first commissioner of the Big Sky was Jack Friel, who served from the league's inception until 1971. After Friel, John Roning directed the conference for six years until 1977 when Steve Belko assumed the commissioner's role. Belko was with the league for five years.

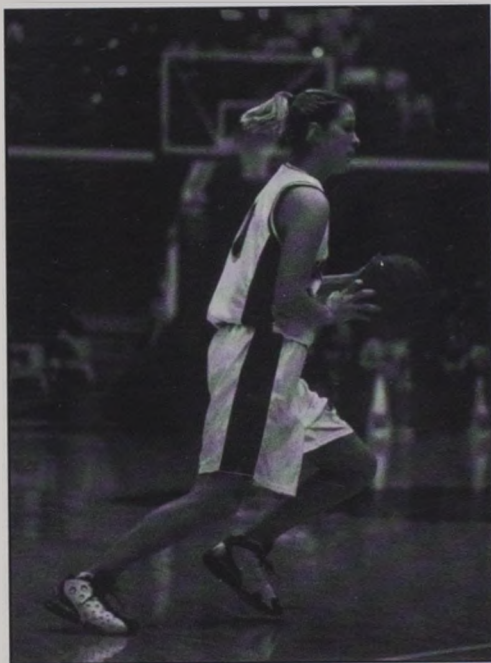

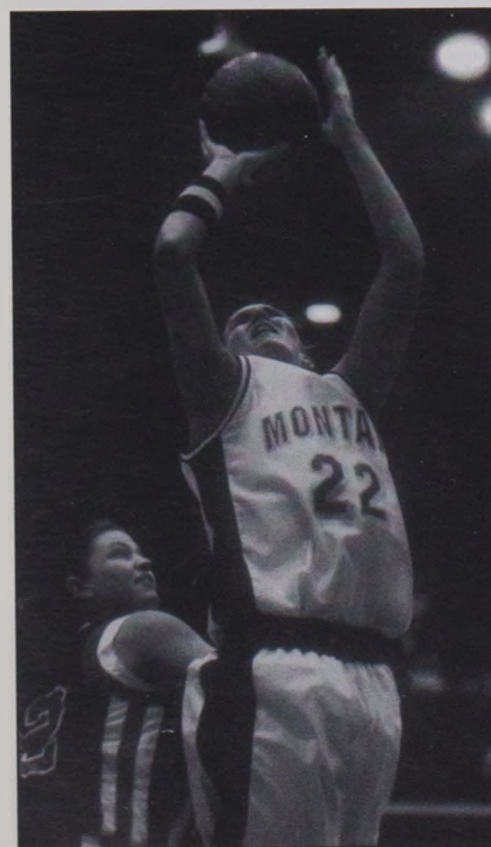

LADY GRIZ IN THE BIG SKY TOURNAMENT

Montana has compiled a 24-3 all-time record in 13 appearances in the Big Sky Conference Tournament. The Lady Griz have made the semifinals all 13 years, have advanced to the championship game 12 times and have won 10 titles. The only years Montana has not won the tournament are 1993, 1999 and 2001. In 1993, the Lady Griz lost to Montana State in the finals. In 1999, Portland State knocked off the Lady Griz in the semifinals, and in 2001, the Lady Griz fell in the championship game to Idaho State.

The Lady Griz have hosted the Big Sky Tournament nine times, and they won the tournament championship in each of those seasons.

Prior to the formation of the Big Sky Conference in the 1988-89 season, Montana participated in six Mountain West Tournaments. The Lady Griz went 10-2 in those six tournaments, claiming four titles -- in 1983, 1984, 1986 and 1988. Five times Montana faced Eastern Washington in the MWC Tournament, four times in the finals. Montana won four of the five meetings and three of the championship games.

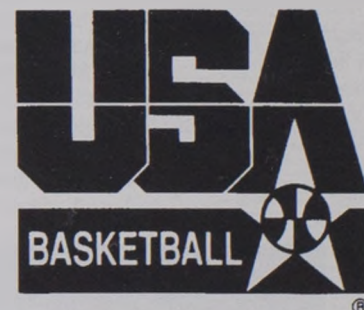

MISSOULA, MONTANA

Birthplace and hometown of author Norman McLean, who wrote *A River Runs Through It*, Missoula is also known as the "Garden City" for its dense trees and lush green landscape. Missoula is nestled in the heart of the northern Rockies in western Montana. A community of approximately 57,000 residents, Missoula lies in a mountain forest setting where five valleys converge. Missoula is Montana's most culturally diverse city. It is 140 miles from Glacier National Park and 270 miles from Yellowstone National Park.

The search for gold in the West and the completion of the Mullan Road, which opened up travel from Fort Benton, Mont., to Walla Walla, Wash., brought people to the valley in 1860. Missoula began as a settlement called Hell Gate when C.P. Higgins and Francis Worden began a trading post to accommodate the travelers. The settlement was later renamed Missoula, taken from a Salish Flathead Indian word, *Imisuletiku*, "At the stream or water of surprise." (*Missoula, the Way It Was*, Lenora Koelbe, 1972).

Early settlers constructed Fort Missoula in 1877 to combat the perceived threat by Native American tribes. Today the Fort Missoula Museum remains a testament to the West.

Missoula offers a variety of recreational opportunities. Three major rivers run through the area: the famous Blackfoot River to the northeast, the beautiful Bitterroot River to the south, and the Clark Fork of the Columbia River, which flows adjacent to The University of Montana campus. Rock Creek, known for its blue ribbon trout fishing, is just a 20-minute drive from Missoula.

Fly fishermen, rafters, kayakers, and canoers thrive on the waters of western Montana. Flathead Lake, the largest natural freshwater lake in the western United States, is just 70 miles north of Missoula. Seeley Lake, Georgetown Lake, Placid Lake and Salmon Lake are less than a few hours away.

Hiking, biking, camping, rock climbing, and hang gliding are a few activities enjoyed in western Montana. Mount Sentinel, Mount Jumbo, Lolo Peak, and Blue Mountain offer beautiful vistas. Blue Mountain Recreation Area, Pattee Canyon Recreation Area, and the Rattlesnake National Wilderness Area are nearby. The Bitterroot-Selway Wilderness Area, Bob Marshall Wilderness Area, the Mission Mountains, and the Seeley-Swan Range are a short drive from Missoula.

Missoula abounds with skiing opportunities. Snowbowl Ski Area is a 20-minute drive from downtown Missoula and features a continuous vertical drop of 2,600 feet, one of the steepest in the country. Marshall Ski Area, a short 10-minute drive from downtown, features night skiing and offers a good student program. Big Mountain, Discovery, Lookout, Lost Trail, and Silver Mountain provide a variety of options for skiers all within close proximity to western Montana. Groomed cross-country trails can be

found at nearly every wilderness area and are especially popular at Lolo Pass, about 40 miles southwest of Missoula.

Other area attractions include "A Carousel for Missoula" (one of the first fully hand-carved carousels to be built in America since the Great Depression), Garnet Ghost Town, the National Bison Range, the Ninemile Remount Depot and Ranger Station, the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation Wildlife Visitor Center, and the Smokejumper Visitor Center.

Missoula Parks and Recreation and the YMCA provide a variety of recreational opportunities in basketball, soccer, softball, tennis, volleyball, and ice skating. Little League baseball is popular for both boys and girls, and Missoula teams have consistently advanced to regional competition.

Missoula also serves as a center for education, medicine, retail, and the arts. The University of Montana provides educational opportunities for more than 12,000 college students, and Missoula's five high schools are among the state's best in both academics and athletics. Community Medical Center and St. Patrick Hospital, along with many clinics, make Missoula one of the state's premier health care communities.

The Missoula community supports the arts in all its forms: theater productions, dance, art, and music. The Missoula Children's Theater, founded in 1970, has recently moved into a newly renovated building near campus

and produces plays and musicals by national and local playwrights for both adults and children. The theater also has an International Tour Project, bringing theatrical productions to audiences outside the Missoula area. The Garden City Ballet and Missoula Symphony, which is in its 50th season, bring performances and concerts to the community year round. The Missoula Museum of Arts, located in the old Carnegie Library in downtown Missoula, sponsors changing exhibits and also has a permanent collection which focuses on Western contemporary art.

One of the most desirable places to live in the United States, western Montana has become an attractive residence for those looking for pristine beauty and serenity. Even some of America's famous people, such as Liz Claiborne, Tom Cruise, Emilio Estevez, Phil Jackson, and Charlie Sheen, have made western Montana their home.

American Heritage Magazine selected Missoula as the 1999 Great American Place, and *Sunset Magazine* selected Missoula as the "Best Community" in the West in 1999.

Missoula is easily accessible by either Interstate 90 from the east and west or by Highway 93 to the north and south. Missoula International Airport has a number of flights daily in and out of Missoula by the major airlines Delta, Northwest, United, and Horizon. Big Sky Airlines also lands in Missoula several times a day. It serves throughout Montana, Spokane, Wash., North Dakota and Denver.

THE UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA



University (Main) Hall

The University of Montana was the state's first college. Chartered on February 17, 1893, the school opened its doors to its first 50 students in what is now called University Hall. More than 100 years later, The University of Montana-Missoula is the center of liberal arts education and research in the state.

The school has gone through numerous changes over the years. In 1913 the school was renamed the State University of Montana, and in 1935, it was renamed Montana State University. It wasn't until 1965 that the institution recaptured its original name, The University of Montana. In 1988 Western Montana College in Dillon became part of UM, and in 1994, the Montana Board of Regents approved a restructuring plan to create two universities within the Montana University System. The University of Montana also includes The University of Montana Western, Montana Tech in Butte, Helena College of Technology in Helena, and The University of Montana College of Technology in Missoula.

The University of Montana provides a high-quality, well-rounded education to students and a wide range of services to Montanans. UM is a major source of research, continuing education, economic development, civic engagement, fine arts and entertainment, and serves as a driving force in strengthening Montana's ties with countries throughout the world.

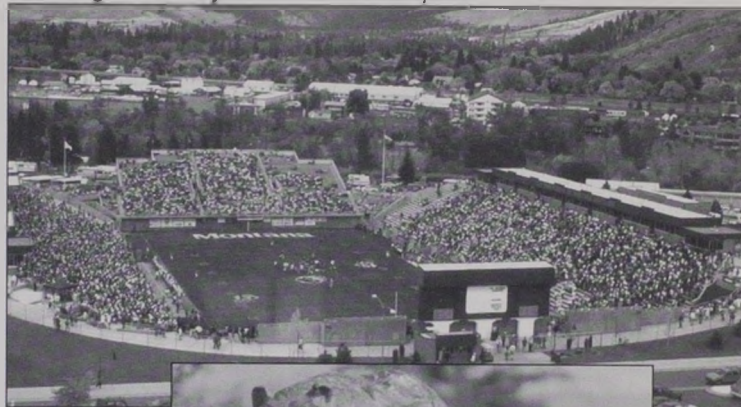
UM's Missoula campus comprises the College of Arts and Sciences, the Graduate School, the Davidson Honors College, the College of Technology, and seven professional schools: business administration, education, fine arts, forestry, journalism, law, and pharmacy and allied health sciences. The University of Montana also has an excellent physical therapy department and offers two-year programs in business, trades and industry, and technical and health occupations.

UM continues to grow with 12,413 students. The student body is 52 percent female and 48 percent male. Last year Montana enrolled 215 foreign students from 60 countries.

Located at the base of Mount Sentinel and on the bank of the Clark Fork River, the 200-acre campus is one of the most beautiful in the nation.

Campus life offers a variety of choices for the UM student. Dormitory living provides nine halls with various options on campus. Elrod Hall is the male dorm; Turner Hall is the female dorm; and Aber, Craig, Duniway, Jesse, Miller, and Knowles halls are co-ed.

Pantzer Hall, which provides four-person suites, was completed in 1995. Family housing can be found just three blocks south of the main campus in University Villages and Toole Village. Students interested in the Greek life have four sororities and seven fraternities from which to choose.

The University of Montana has a nine-hole golf course, located just south of the main campus. The Grizzly Pool is a seven-lane, 25-yard indoor swimming pool which features numerous classes and programs and has been recently upgraded. The Student Recreation Center, adjacent to the Adams Center, has undergone a major renovation. Finished in Fall 2001, it provides students with three levels of state-of-the-art exercise equipment, racquetball, handball and basketball courts, and a two-story glass enclosed climbing wall, "the wall with a view."

The Outdoor Program provides opportunities for the campus community to participate in recreational activities such as rafting, kayaking, climbing, hiking, backpacking and skiing.

UM owns and operates Lubrecht Experimental Forest, a 28,000-acre teaching and research forest. Located approximately 30 miles northeast of Missoula, Lubrecht Forest provides the opportunity for students to learn tree thinning and harvesting techniques in addition to forest and ecological projects.

The Flathead Lake Biological Station, located at Yellow Bay on the east side of the lake, is a year-round research facility and academic center for the ecological sciences. The freshwater research laboratory encompasses 80 acres.

UM also has had 47 international Fulbright Scholars, eight Truman Scholars, five Goldwater Scholars and 28 Rhodes Scholars.

The University was listed among the top 25 universities and colleges in the nation for Peace Corps recruiting, was named one of the nation's best paddling colleges in Paddler magazine and is profiled in *America's 100 Best College Buys* and *Barron's Best Buys in College Education*.

GRIZZLY ATHLETICS

The University of Montana offers 14 intercollegiate athletic programs for student-athletes in football, men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball, soccer and golf, men's and women's cross country, tennis, and both indoor and outdoor track and field.

Montana is a charter (1963) member of the Big Sky Conference, which consists of eight teams: Cal State-Sacramento, Eastern Washington, Idaho State, Montana, Montana State, Northern Arizona, Portland State and Weber State.

The Montana Grizzlies have always been a force to reckon with, particularly in the revenue sports. The Grizzly football team has had unprecedented success in the 1990s, winning the 1995 NCAA Division I-AA National Football Championship title and advancing to the title game again in 1996. UM began the new millennium by advancing to the national championship in 2000 and set a conference record by making its eighth straight appearance in the playoffs.

The Grizzly basketball team has posted 22 winning seasons in the past 24 years. Forwards Jared Buckmaster and Dan Trammel were both honorable mention all-conference selections following the 2000-2001 season.

Montana has advanced to the NCAA tournament four times in school history and three times in the 1990s. The Griz own four Big Sky trophies, including back-to-back titles in 1991 and 1992.

The Lady Griz basketball team recorded its 20th 20-win season in the past 21 years, going 21-9 and advancing to the final game of the Big Sky tournament. The Lady Griz have won 14 Big Sky titles and advanced to the NCAA tournament 14 times.

Lady Griz head coach Robin Selvig (UM, 1974), who played hoops for the Griz, has a 23-year record of 536-148. In 1999-2000 he became the seventh coach in NCAA Division I women's basketball to win 500 games at one school.

Senior forwards Lauren Cooper and Linda Cummings were named to the all-conference first team, and Linda Cummings was named to the Verizon Academic All-District Second Team. Lauren Cooper made her 200th 3-pointer in the final game of the season, breaking the conference's 3-point field record.

The Lady Griz basketball team was ranked 27th in the nation in attendance last season with an average of 3,449 fans and has been among the top 20 for 16 of the past 17 years.

In 2000, the Grizzly volleyball team went 16-14 under first-year head coach Nikki Best and advanced to the Big Sky Conference Championships once again. Although the team lost its first-round match in five games, Lindsay Kaiser was selected to the all-tournament team. Montana has made it to the conference tourney 11 times in the 13-year history of the tournament, and the Griz qualified for the Mountain West Conference's post-season tourney all six years of its existence prior to joining the Big Sky.

The women's soccer team has gone 93-40-4 since Betsy Duerksen began UM's inaugural program as the head coach seven seasons ago. Duerksen guided the Grizzlies to a 16-5-1 record in 2000 and a Big Sky title once again. For the second consecutive year, Montana advanced to the NCAA Championships, advancing to the second round of the tournament and losing to second-seed Washington in Seattle. Five players made it to the first and second

all-conference teams, while senior Jodi Campbell was named the offensive MVP, and freshman Amy Wronski was named the Top Newcomer.

Coach Kris Nord led the men's and women's tennis teams to the Big Sky Championships, where they faced tough competition from the Big Sky Conference. Junior Sarah Blain had an outstanding year, going 12-4 on the season and leading the Lady Griz as they won their last seven dual matches of the season.

The Lady Griz golf coach, Joanne Steele, has consistently put together competitive teams for the past five years. This past year the Lady Griz won the Montana State Invitational and placed second in the Boise State Tournament.

The Grizzly cross country women and men's teams finished the conference second and third, respectively. Sabrina Monro and Brad Treat were both named to the women's and men's all-conference teams. Monro earned All-America honors as she finished second at the NCAA Division I championships.

The Montana track and field teams had a solid 2001 season, with coach Tom Raunig and his assistants sending 34 athletes to the Big Sky Championships. The Griz had three NCAA qualifiers for the indoor season: Sabrina Monro, 3,000 meters; Heather Anderson, 5,000 meters; and Suzanne Krings, pole vault. Both Krings and Monro earned All-America honors. Adam Bork earned All-America honors at the outdoor championships by placing in the decathlon. He became UM's second All-America decathlete in three years.

Athletic facilities at The University of Montana have improved dramatically over the last few years. The most recent addition is a \$14.3 million renovation to the field house, which created the new Adams Center. The Adams

Center features two new auxiliary gyms, a major facelift for Dahlberg Arena, a new weight center, an athletic treatment center, locker rooms, and an academic center for student-athletes.

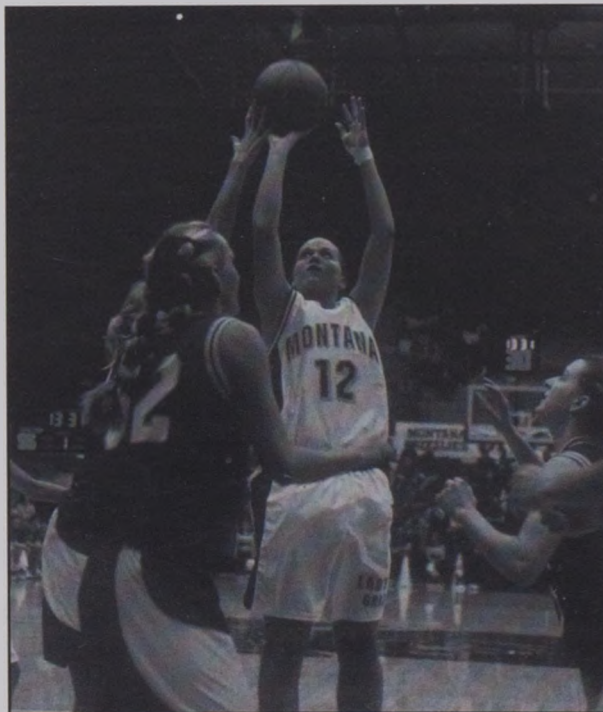
Washington-Grizzly Stadium was completed in 1986. In 1995, end zone seating was added to accommodate a total of 18,845 fans. In 2001, the natural grass playing surface was replaced with SprinTurf, a state-of-the-art artificial turf.

Dornblaser Stadium, located on the UM south campus, is going through a complete refurbishing and will soon be one of the nicest outdoor track facilities in the Big Sky Conference.

UM's South Campus Soccer Stadium was completed in 1996 and features a fully fenced venue, scoreboard, remodeled locker rooms, and seating for 1,000.

The University also has its own golf course, several soccer fields, and a newly remodeled swimming pool. A renovated four-floor campus recreation and fitness facility, adjacent to the Adams Center, opened in Fall 2001. It features racquetball and basketball courts, aerobic/cardio-vascular workout rooms, expanded weight room, locker rooms, a climbing wall, juice bar and day care.

Grizzly athletes receive outstanding support services in the areas of academics, athletic treatment, equipment, financial aid, and sports information.

GRIZZLY ACADEMICS

The University of Montana has had 28 Rhodes Scholars. UM ranks 15th among American colleges and universities in the number of Rhodes Scholars it has produced, fifth among public universities.

School of Education graduates compete very successfully for jobs. A high percentage of those with bachelor's degrees and graduate degrees find teaching, administrative and other education-related positions in Montana and many other states.

The Department of Social Work is fully accredited by the Council on Social Work Education, making UM the only Montana public school that prepares its graduates for advanced standing in graduate schools of social work.

The Department of Drama/Dance has a professional theater group—the Montana Repertory Theatre based on campus. The Rep, which tours throughout the nation, is the only touring professional actors equity company between Minneapolis and Seattle.

KUFM, a non-commercial public radio station operated by the UM Broadcast Media Center, reaches an estimated 400,000 Montanans in central and western Montana. KUFM-TV is a non-commercial public television station also operated by the Broadcast Media Dept. It is the western partner in the Montana Public Television network that serves more than 106,000 Montana households.

Eight UM students have received Truman Scholarships. The national scholarship is given annually to students committed to a

government career who have superior academic ability and leadership potential.

The Department of Anthropology has the largest collection of artifacts and records of prehistory in the region.

UM's Museum of Fine Arts has the largest art collection in the state.

The School of Business is the only business school in Montana to be accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business at the graduate level. Year in and year out, a high percentage of the school's accounting graduates pass the Certified Public Accountant Exam on their first try.

The Department of Geology has a strong nationally known program in traditional geology and environmental geoscience.

The Department of Geography has one of the Northwest's best cartography laboratories, where students learn to make maps and interpret aerial photography.

The Flathead Lake Biological Station, located about 80 miles north of Missoula, is the oldest biological station west of the Mississippi. The UM research station is one of the finest facilities in the country for ecological studies and freshwater research.

The Department of Health and Human Performance is one of a handful in the country that prepares students to be athletic trainers.

The School of Journalism has had seven Pulitzer Prize winners. UM journalism student Bruce Ely was named College Photographer of the Year in the 1998 national competition for the Hearst Journalism Awards Program.

UM's graduate creative writing program, started in 1919 by H.G. Merriam, is the second oldest program of its kind in the country and is consistently ranked among the top 10 programs nationwide. Well-known Montana writer and poet James Welch is a graduate of the program.

Three members of the Lady Griz were selected to the Big Sky Conference All-Academic Team for the 2000-01 season. It was the fourth time Cummings has earned a spot on the team, while Keller and Schildt became three-time honorees.

Cummings is the 11th Montana women's basketball player to be named to the academic all-conference squad four times. She also became the eighth Lady Griz player to earn UM's Big Sky Conference Scholar-Athlete Award.

Six UM women's basketball players have earned the NCAA Woman of the Year Award for the state of Montana. Megan Harrington was the last recipient, earning the honor in 2000.

Shannon Cate is not only the program's all-time leading scorer, but also one of the top academic performers. A four-time academic all-conference pick, she also was the Big Sky Scholar-Athlete in 1992.

Last season, football players Matt Thuesen and Vince Huntsberger were nominated to the Verizon Academic All-American first team and the All-District first team. Soccer player Shannon Forslund was voted to the All-West Regional NSCAA second team. Basketball players Linda Cummings (second team) and Jared Buckmaster (first team) were both nominated to the Verizon Academic All-District team. Track and field standout Katie Kneeshaw was named to the Verizon Academic All-District Fall/Winter At-Large Team.

The Big Sky Conference has had 46 NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship selections since 1965, and of those players, 12 have been Grizzlies. Last season football player Matt Thuesen received an NCAA postgraduate scholarship, and Montana has had 10 athletes so honored in the last 10 years. During the 2000-01 season, 61 UM athletes from all sports earned Big Sky All-Academic honors.

Another significant sign of UM's commitment to academics came in 1993 when former faculty athletic representative Dr. Robert O. Lindsay developed a program at UM to honor student athletes who excel in the classroom. Since then, UM has recognized student athletes who earn a 3.0 grade point average or higher. Last year 137 (out of approximately 250) UM athletes were invited to the banquet.

ATHLETIC SUPPORT PROGRAMS

Athletic Performance Center

As part of the recent renovation to the Adams Center, a 7,000-square foot Athletic Performance Center was created. The current facility is twice as large as the previous weight room that had been used in the Adams Center over the years.

The new center, which is home to the Griz student-athletes, is geared to enhance the overall athletic performance of the teams.

The Athletic Performance Center staff designs, implements and evaluates strength and conditioning programs for all Grizzly athletes.

Chris Wieseman, director of the Athletic Performance Center, oversees the women's basketball team's training efforts.

Sport-specific weight training, coupled with movement-specific conditioning results in a greater overall training effect that transfers to the court during the season.

Lifting is also a focus during the season. The student-athletes focus on several core lifts to maintain their strength levels during the long and grueling season.



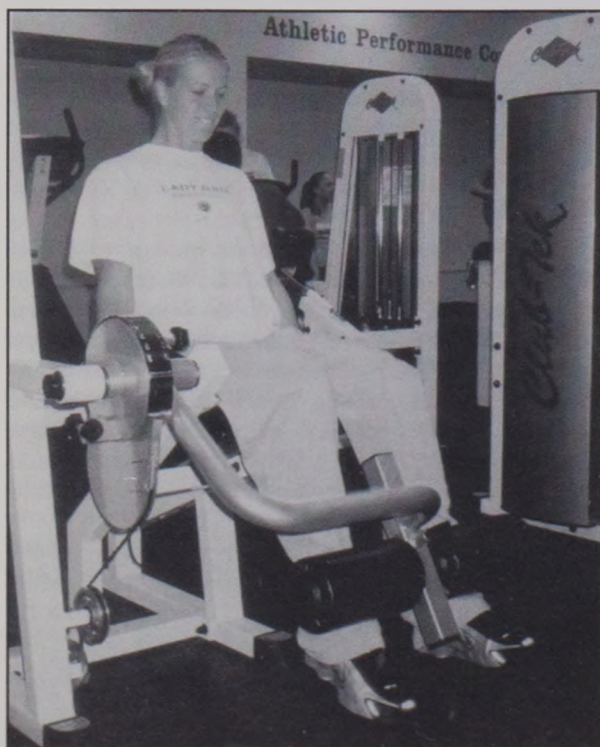
Jill Henkel works on her upper body strength on a Pec-Deck machine. The Lady Griz's work in the Athletic Performance Center has translated into increased performances on the court.

The women's basketball team also takes part in an extensive off-season program during the summer. The 10-week program focuses on increasing overall, full-body strength to form the foundation in which the sport-specific exercises and drills are built upon during the preseason

conditioning program.

Wieseman said the goal of the Athletic Performance Center is to be as sport specific as possible. He added the student-athletes train with the latest techniques to stay ahead.

"Our goal is to make them better basketball players," said Wieseman.

ATHLETIC SUPPORT PROGRAMS

Naseby Rhinehart Athletic Training Center

Completed in the fall of 1999, the newly-remodeled Rhinehart Athletic Training Center boasts 7,200 square feet of space and includes an enlarged rehabilitation area. Also included are athletic trainers' offices, six hydrotherapy units and a consulting office where nutritionists and doctors can meet with athletes. There are also classrooms for the athletic training curriculum.

Jennifer Mason, an assistant certified athletic trainer, serves as the primary contact for the Lady Griz. She is in her fourth year at Montana.

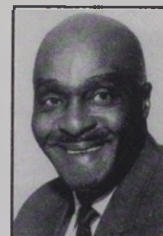
The RATC provides numerous ways to treat injuries: electrical stimulation units, whirlpools, free weights and balance boards. The primary goal of the athletic training staff is to provide quality care for stu-

When a student-athlete is injured, an athletic trainer evaluates the severity of the in-



Naseby "Doc" Rhinehart came to Missoula in 1931 from Milwaukee, Wis., to play football and basketball. He also competed in track and field where he had bests of 23 feet in the long jump and 140 feet in the discus.

After graduating in 1935 from the University of Montana, Rhinehart was asked if he was interested in becoming the UM head certified athletic trainer. He did and stayed at the University for 47 years, retiring in 1982. He was one of the first people in the nation to develop an athletic training curriculum (1971) at a university.

jury and renders whatever care is needed. Depending on the extent of the injury, the student-athlete visits the center daily, at least two to three times, for treatment and rehabilitation exercises. The athletic training staff works together with the Athletic Performance staff to monitor the student-athlete's strengthening exercises. Once student-athletes have regained strength and function, they are allowed to return to the playing field or court.

Although athletic trainers provide injury care, they also promote injury prevention. Preventative maintenance occurs in the form of injury-screening processes, flexibility, taping and strengthening exercises.

Montana has a well-established athletic training curriculum which allows instructors to work directly with the student-athletes.

As an assistant certified athletic trainer, Jennifer Mason's responsibilities include primary athletic training duties for volleyball and women's basketball in addition to teaching various athletic training courses.

Mason spent a year as an assistant athletic trainer at Vanderbilt from 1997-98. She received a B.S. in kinesiology and biology from Colorado in 1995 and earned a master's degree in physical education and kinesiology from Cal State-Hayward in 1997. While working on her M.S. degree, she served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer at Cal-Berkeley from 1995-97. She also served as a student athletic trainer at Colorado from 1992-95.

A native of Genoa, Nevada, Mason was a middle hitter for the Colorado women's volleyball team in 1990 and 1991. She received a NACDA Sears Directors' Cup Postgraduate Scholarship in 1995. She has been certified by the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA) since 1995.

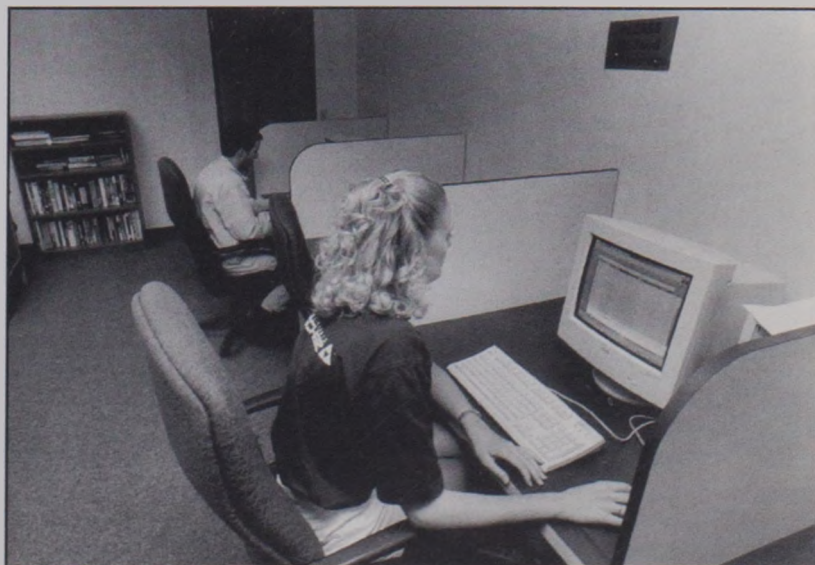
The latest addition to academic services for student athletes is the Jacobson Academic Center. Thanks to the generous contributions of Curt and Lanni Jacobson, student-athletes now have a computer lab/study room to use during the day.

The Jacobson Academic Center has six computers and a laser printer. In addition, there are five additional spaces for individual studying. A small conference room is available for group studying.

The Jacobson Academic Center is a key component in the success of Grizzly student-athletes in the classroom. In addition to student-athletes independently using the Jacobson Academic Center, Athletic Academic Services uses the facility for several of its programs.

Under the guidance of coordinator Jean Cornwall, Athletic Academic Services offers tutoring and advising at the center.

The Jacobson Academic Center is located on the Adam Center's ground floor, down the hall from the weight room.



DAHLBERG ARENA - HOME OF THE LADY GRIZ

The Lady Griz have found tremendous success in the confines of Dahlberg Arena, which was named after the great George "Jiggs" Dahlberg, who was an athlete, a coach and an athletic director at The University of Montana.

Dahlberg earned six varsity letters at UM in football and basketball in the early 1920s. He was the Grizzly basketball coach for 22 years (1937-54) and then became athletic director (1954-70). Dahlberg passed away in September of 1993, just two weeks after he was inducted into the Grizzly Sports Hall of Fame. He will be remembered for his success at Montana and the Lady Griz basketball team continue to carry on that tradition.

Over the last 20 years, the Lady Griz have posted a 298-24 record in Dahlberg Arena for a .9255 winning percentage.

Montana has had 20 crowds with more than 6,000 fans in attendance and ranks among the national leaders in attendance. The Lady Griz program aver-

aged 3,449 fans per home game last season, ranking 27th nationally.

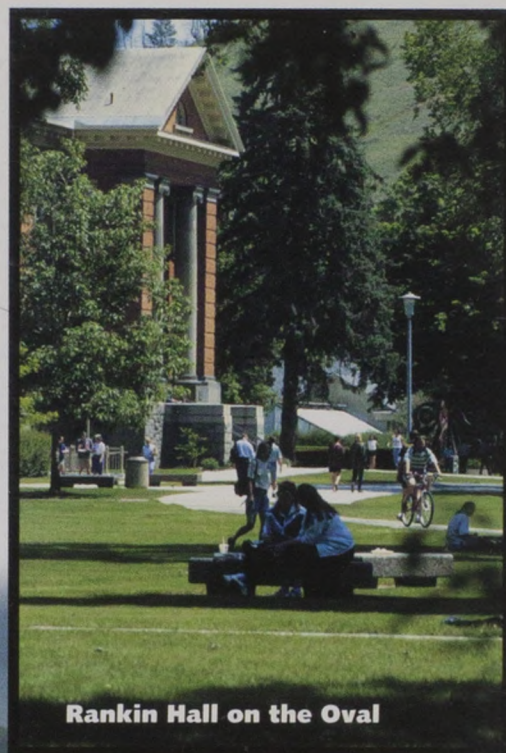

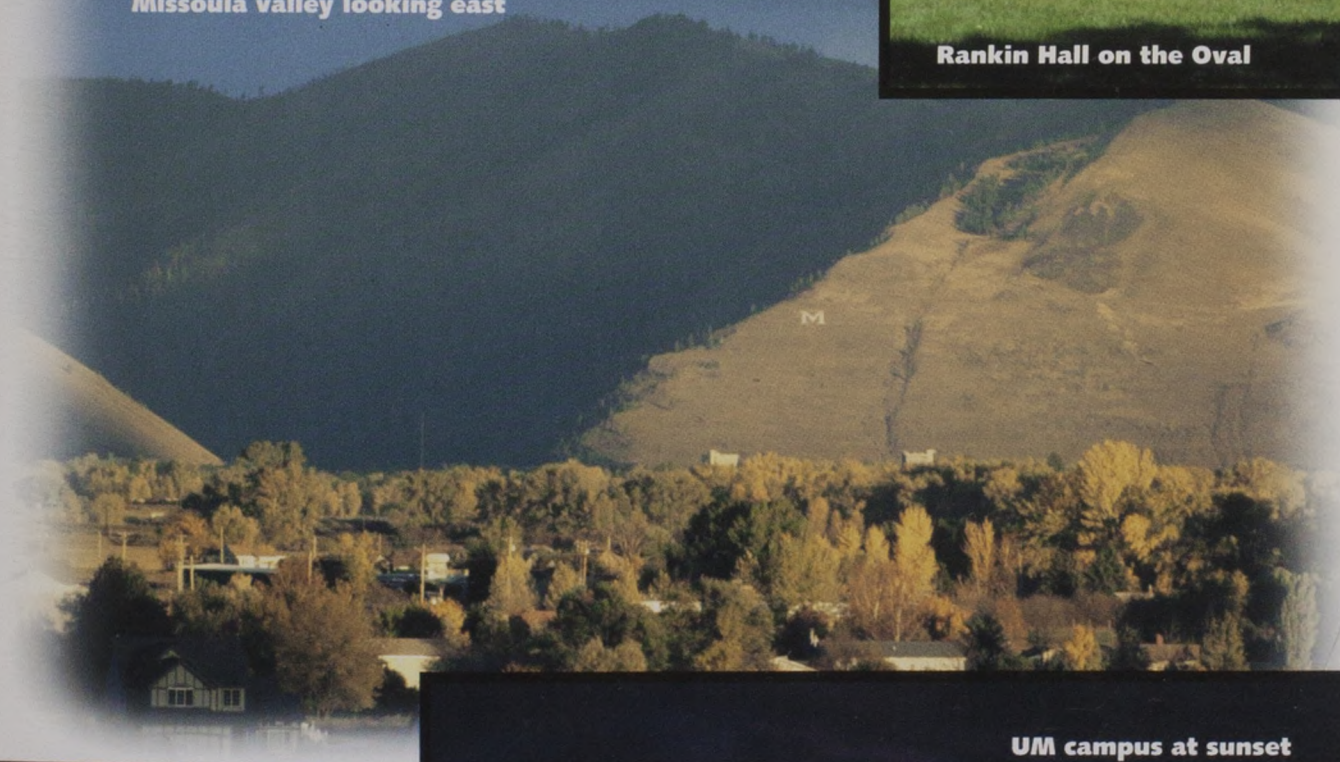

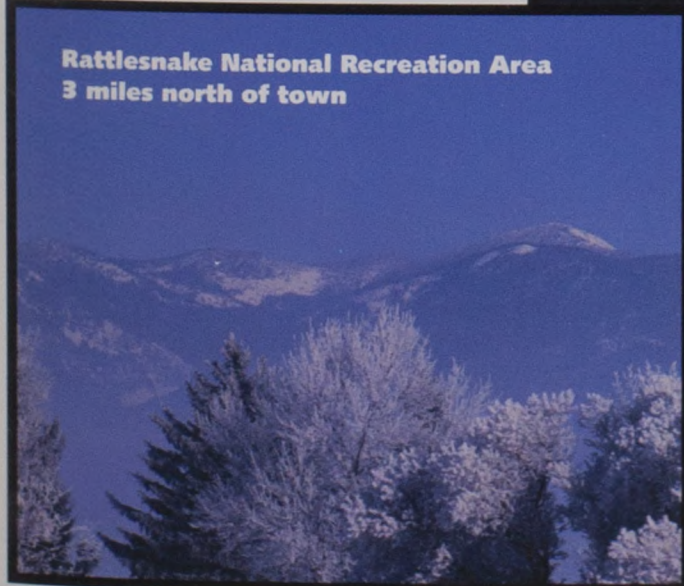

Attendance

The Lady Griz are consistently ranked among the national leaders in women's basketball attendance. In 2000-01 Montana was ranked 27th in the nation, averaging 3,449 fans per game. From 1985 until 2000, the Lady Griz were ranked among the top 18 schools in the nation in 15 out of 16 seasons. In 1988 and 1989, Montana was sixth in the nation in average attendance. During the 1994-95 season, the Lady Griz averaged a school-record 5,235 fans per game.

20-Win Seasons

Montana has won at least 20 games in 20 out of the past 21 seasons, dating back to the 1980-81 season.

Head Coach Robin Selvig

A native of Montana, head coach Robin Selvig has had tremendous success. He has gone 536-148 in 23 seasons. His winning percentage of .784 ranks him fourth in the nation in terms of winning percentage among Division I active head coaches. His 536 wins rank him 14th among active coaches in terms of wins.

Big Sky Domination

The Lady Griz have won 15 of the league's 19 Mountain West/Big Sky Conference championship trophies since the league was formed in 1982. Montana has gone undefeated in league play six times since the 1986-87 season. The Lady Griz are 248-31 (.889) all-time vs. conference foes during the regular season and 36-5 (.878) in conference tournaments.

Postseason

Montana has advanced to postseason play every year under Robin Selvig. Selvig's teams have advanced to the NCAA Championships 14 times. The Lady Griz have also won or shared 15 Mountain West/Big Sky Conference regular season titles and 14 conference tournament crowns.

Rankings

The Lady Griz have been ranked among the nation's top 25 teams numerous times. In 1997-98, Montana received votes throughout the season. During the 1993-94 season, the Lady Griz stayed in the poll for 12 consecutive weeks. The team's highest ranking was No. 13 during the 1987-88 season.



Dahlberg Arena has been the site of 14 Mountain West and Big Sky Conference women's basketball tournaments, three Big Sky men's basketball tournaments, two NCAA West Regional Women's Basketball Championships and seven NCAA First Round games.

The Lady Griz are 314-26 (.924) all-time in Dahlberg Arena and an incredible 132-3 (.978) against conference opponents in Dahlberg Arena. Montana has averaged over 4,100 fans per game since the 1990-91 season.
