Frost Scholarship Awarded at MSU

The first Marjorie Frost Scholarship given at Montana State University, Missoula, was awarded Friday to Konnilyn Feig, business administration junior from Conrad. The scholarship, amounting to about \$750, will begin spring quarter and continue through Miss Feig's senior year, according to Dr. Maurine Clow, associate dean of students, who announced the selection.

An honor student, Miss Feig carries a full academic schedule and works 34 hours a week on two jobs. She is secretary of the Young Republican Club and of the Future Teachers Assn. and rush chairman of Sigma Kappa social sorority. She is active in the Lutheran Students' Assn. and is a member of Panhellenic Council.

The late Miss Marjorie Frost of Los Angeles, Calif., gave \$12,000 to the University Endowment Foundation in 1955 to establish a scholarship for "a woman student of high academic standing who has completed her freshman year at MSU and is unable to finance fully the completion of her studies." The annual income from the gift constitutes a continuing scholarship fund for this purpose. Miss Frost stipulated that the scholarship was to continue for the remainder of the recipient's work at the University if she proved deserving of the award. The gift was prompted by her own disappointment in not being financially able to continue her college education beyond the freshman year.

Miss Frost attended the University during 1916-17, and when lack of money forced her to quit school, she worked for a year in the office of MSU President Edward O. Sisson. Her former University teachers and classmates remember her as an attractive girl who was popular with her fellow students. She was an A student and a member of Kappa Alpha Theta sorority and of other campus groups.

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
