Covering the Lady Griz



Tom Stage is the radio voice of the University of Montana Lady Griz. His broadcasts can be heard on KLCY-AM (930) in the Missoula area. Stage's pregame show commences approximately 30 minutes prior to the scheduled tipoff. His postgame show includes a visit from Montana coach Robin Selvig.



Bill Speltz is in his first year covering the University of Montana Lady Griz for the *Missoulian*. He has been covering college basketball for 22 years, including 10 as a beat writer for Division I programs. His most recent beats have been covering men's and women's basketball at Southern Illinois (1997-99) and for the last eight years covering the Iowa men's team.

The following information is designed to assist the media with their coverage of the University of Montana Lady Griz. For additional information, please contact Joel Carlson, assistant sports information director, at 406-243-5414.

• Media Credentials

Requests for media and photography credentials should be received by the Grizzly Sports Information Office no later than two days prior to the scheduled game.

Credentials will not be mailed. Instead they may be picked up at the UM Sports Information Office on the day of the game or starting one hour before the game at the will call window, located at the Adams Center Ticket Office.

• Press Row Seating

Seating at press row is limited and will be filled on a first-requested, first-served basis. Press row is a working area. Cheering for either team is not permitted.

• Photography

Photographers are limited to the marked areas along the baselines, in accordance with NCAA guidelines.

• Visiting Radio

A visiting radio phone line, along with a courtesy line, is available. Visiting radio will also have access to a monitor displaying live stats.

• Weekly Interviews

Coach Robin Selvig and a selected player will be available at the Montana athletics department's weekly press conference early each Tuesday afternoon. Members of the media should arrange additional interviews with coaches and players with Joel Carlson. The best time to talk to coach Robin Selvig via phone is weekday mornings. On game days, no player interviews will be allowed until the conclusion of the game.

• Practices

With the exception of game-day shoot-arounds, most Lady Griz practices are open to the media. Players and coaches will be available for interviews either pre- or post-practice. Contact Joel Carlson for practice times and locations.

• Post-Game Services

Following a 10-minute cooling off period, Selvig and Lady Griz players will be available for interviews. Players will be available outside the Montana locker room. Coach Selvig will meet with the media in the same area following his postgame radio show.

2007-08 UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

ABSTRACT & STORYLINES

The 2007-08 Montana Lady Griz return five starters and their top seven scorers from one of the most successful seasons in program history. Last year's UM team went 27-2 in the regular season, which included a 15-1 run through the Big Sky Conference portion of the schedule. It was the team's 20th regular-season conference championship in coach Robin Selvig's 29th season. The Lady Griz were upset at home in the semifinals of the Big Sky Conference Tournament, 64-59, by Northern Arizona, and three days later were passed over for an at-large spot in the NCAA Tournament. Montana closed out its season with a 78-70 loss at Utah in the opening round of the WNIT.

A youthful team full of questions entering the 2006-07 season, the team returns five upperclassmen starters in seniors Johanna Closson and Dana Conway and juniors Tamara Guardipee, Mandy Morales and Sonya Rogers.

Morales achieved national prominence as a sophomore. She became the Big Sky's first six-time single-season player of the week and was named the league's MVP after leading the conference in assists (6.81/g) and finishing second in scoring (19.7 ppg).

Morales was one of 11 finalists for the Nancy Lieberman Award, which recognizes the nation's top Division I point guard, and capped her season with her second straight Kodak/WBCA honorable

mention All-America award.

Rogers and now-junior Britney Lohman both earned second team All-Big Sky accolades, while Closson was named honorable mention.

Lohman (9.9 ppg, 5.7 rpg) tops the list of returning letterwinners, which also includes senior Laura Cote, junior Betsy Snead and sophomores Lauren Beck and Shadra Robison.

Coach Robin Selvig enters his 30th season at Montana with a career record of 672-192. He ranks among the winningest active Division I women's basketball coaches in both wins and winning percentage (.778).

2007-08 STORYLINES

One of the winningest active Division I women's basketball coaches, Robin Selvig enters his 30th season at Montana.

"The time has gone by fast," Selvig said. "It doesn't seem like it's been 30 years when I look back at it. I never gave much thought to how long I'd be some place when I started, I just started coaching.

"I've loved it here. It's been a great place to be. I try not to reminisce that much, but we've had a lot of great kids and a lot of fun basketball teams."

Will missing the NCAA Tournament a year ago, despite a 27-2 regular-season record, motivate the 2007-08 team?

"When you come so close to having some great things within your reach, then not get them, what I've experienced, both in the kind of players we've had over the years and with me a little bit, is that it does motivate you," Selvig said.

"I think that's the case with this team. They are motivated to get back out on the floor this year and try to get back into that kind of position and get it done right."

With five starters and the top seven scorers returning, is the approach to coaching different?

"You always want to be adding new things, no matter what kind of experience you have on the team," Selvig said. "First of all, as a coach you're always coming up with new wrinkles that you want to try. Second, you want it to be exciting for the players. This year we'll expand on what we can do since we already have a base of things we did well.

"The best thing about a team like this is that it won't be a completely new teaching situation. Last year we were so young, we had a lot of questions. Now we'll have more answered questions than unanswered going in, and as a coach that's a lot more comfortable."

Big Sky Conference MVP, honorable mention All-American and one of the nation's top point guards as a sophomore, what will junior Mandy Morales do for an encore?

"I think Mandy has steadily improved, and I'm expecting she'll keep improving because she is such a hard worker and so motivated," Selvig said. "I think she has become an outstanding point guard, but I think there are some leadership areas where she can still improve a great deal. But that comes with experience, so I'm looking for more of that this year."

With so much returning from last year's 27-win team, can 2007-08 be a success without an NCAA appearance?

"I don't look at things that way or base what a season was like on anything like that," Selvig said. "It's hard to base the success of an entire season on what might happen in a single game, which is what happened last year. I certainly think last year's team had a great season. I don't think you can look at it any other way. Twenty-seven wins doesn't happen very often, and that was with a very good schedule.

"I was as disappointed as the players were (when we didn't make the NCAA Tournament), but I don't judge the success of a season on that small a thing."

Will any of the three incoming freshmen be impact players in their first season?

"I don't know the answer to that question at this point," Selvig said. "If I was asked that question a month and a half from now I'd know a lot more, because we haven't been out on the court with them.

"Even with five starters back, there are always things that are open, but at this point I really don't know. I like the three freshmen we brought in, but there is a chance we could have some redshirts, or there might not be."

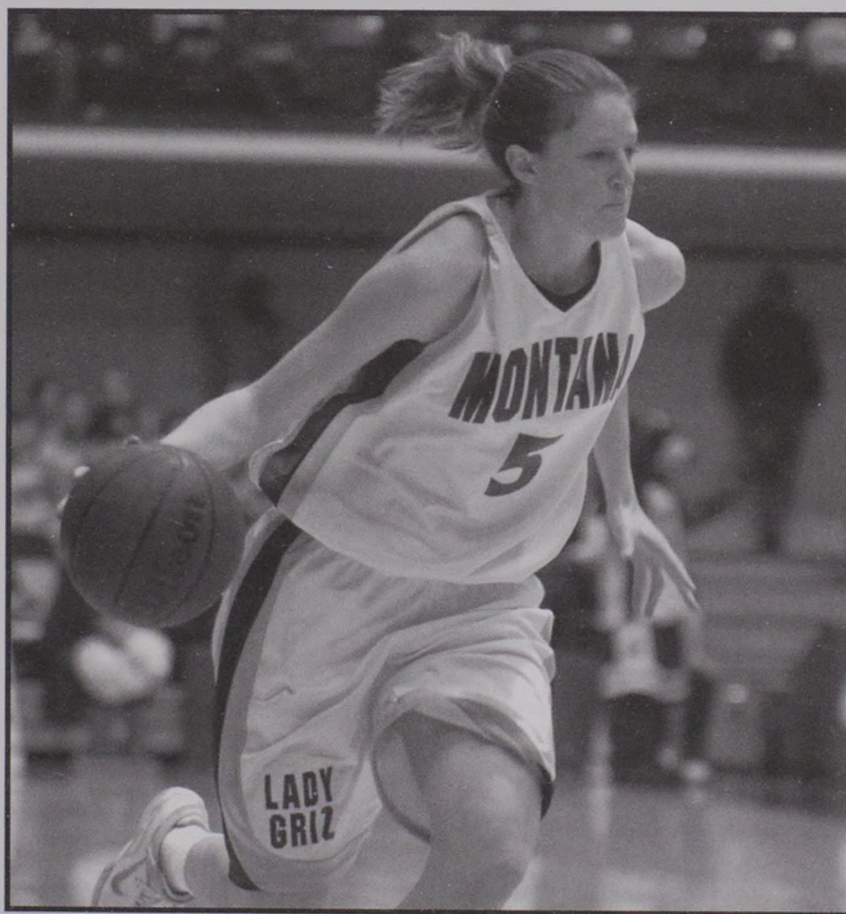

It's rare when a team goes 27-4, wins its league's regular-season title by four games, is the highest scoring team in program history, wins its 20th regular-season championship in the last 29 years and advances to its 21st national tournament, and all people can think to ask is: "What happened?"

Such was the cross that the 2006-07 Lady Griz basketball team had to bear from March to October, even though it produced one of the most successful seasons in the long and storied history of Montana women's basketball.

But that will happen when you have a dominant regular season, run roughshod through the Big Sky Conference but don't make the NCAA Tournament.

After going 27-2 in the regular season, achieving a No. 25 national ranking and establishing a new standard for regular-season wins, the Lady Griz were upset on their home floor by Northern Arizona in the semifinals of the Big Sky Conference Tournament, 64-59.

Seventy-two hours after that disappointment, the NCAA selection committee added to the collective gloom by passing over the Lady Griz for an at-large bid to its tournament, relegating Montana to the WNIT. A national tournament, sure, but not THE national tournament.

A 78-70 loss at Utah in the opening round of the WNIT, a game the Lady Griz led for nearly 35 minutes, ended the season.

The rapid turn of events, from Friday's loss to Northern Arizona to Montana's NCAA Tournament snub on Monday to Wednesday's WNIT game at Utah, left fans' minds reeling and collectively wondering, "What happened?"

"I went home and people brought it up all the time," junior guard Sonya Rogers said, simply repeating the story that most of the players could just as easily tell. "I told them there is no other way to explain it except we had a bad game at the wrong time. I think people knew we were a much better team than the one that performed that night (at home against NAU)."

Unfortunately the Big Sky Conference is a one-bid league, meaning that Idaho State, the eventual conference tournament champion, was the only team that was going to go to the NCAA Tournament.

Perhaps a victim of their own regular-season success, fans were certainly hoping for nothing less than a trip to the program's 17th NCAA Tournament for the Lady Griz, especially since Montana was hosting the tournament and entered the NAU game sporting a 31-1 all-time conference tournament record at home.

Leave it to the experienced coach to put it in perspective.

"Sure, it was a big disappointment to lose that game and not make the NCAAs, but I don't judge the success of a season on that small a thing," coach Robin Selvig, who enters

his 30th year at Montana, said. "When I look back on that year as a whole, it was a great season. You don't put 27 wins together very often, so I'm very proud of what we accomplished last year.

"But you don't get those back. You go on to the next one. And the next one that we can control is this year."

Eventually the events that put a decisive end to the 2006-07 season lost their sting and became a source of motivation for the players who would be returning.

"You could tell this summer that (losing to Northern Arizona) made a difference in how we went about our preparation," senior Johanna Closson says. "Now we're always telling each other that we've got to work harder and get better so we can be ready for that situation if it comes our way again."

"It's been keeping us going in the off-season," junior Mandy Morales says.

"Everybody wants to know what happened last year. I just tell them we choked, and then we get back to working even harder."

Now October is here and bouncing balls and squeaking shoes will soon sound throughout the Adams Center fieldhouse on a daily basis. A new season dawns.

With five starters, the top seven scorers and 10 letterwinners returning from the 2006-07 team, the perspective changes 180 degrees. No longer is the focus on the past, but on the future.

The question is no longer, "What happened?" but "Is the 2007-08 season here yet?"

kids, all three are really good competitors and all three have had very good careers up to this point," Selvig said. "I think they'll be able to give us a real sense of urgency this year because this is their last go.

"I'm hoping they are hungry after having such a great year last year, then not being able to win the (Big Sky Conference) tournament at the end. It'll be a plus for us if this group sets a tone that says, 'Hey, this is our last year and we're going to do everything we can to make sure it ends up right this time.' That's the attitude they can bring this team."

Johanna Closson has had a steady, consistent career. After playing in all 30 games as a freshman and averaging 7.2 points per game, then seeing action in all 28 games as a sophomore while averaging 7.4 points per game, Closson upped her scoring to 9.9 points per game and her rebounding to 6.5 boards per game as a junior to earn honorable mention All-Big Sky Conference honors. Her rebounding and scoring averages ranked first and third on the team, respectively.

"It'll be a plus for us if this group sets a tone that says, 'Hey, this is our last year and we're going to do everything we can to make sure it ends up right this time.' That's the attitude they can bring this team."

"We're really counting on Jo to be a leader this year," Selvig said. "She really improved her overall game the second half of last year, in particular her rebounding. Now we expect her overall game as a senior to be even better. She's going to be one of our key players."

Closson showed her ability to be a big scorer on a number of occasions last winter, scoring 25 points on 5-of-6 3-point shooting against Gonzaga and scoring 19 points twice and 17 points twice, but she also scored six or fewer points in 11 of Montana's 31 games.

"Consistency is really what we hope to see more out of Jo this year," Selvig said. "She's shown she can have big games. Now we need her to help us in a lot of areas every night out."

After averaging 9.8 points and 4.6 rebounds while playing over 30 minutes per game as a sophomore, Dana Conway's num-

bers dipped to 6.4 points and 4.0 rebounds per game as a junior as she battled a season-long foot injury. Despite being hampered, the 5-10 guard/forward still started all 31 games and played 27 minutes per game.

Conway had eight double-figure scoring nights. One of those games, a 74-54 victory over Portland, included 10 rebounds to go along with her 15 points, her first career double-double.

"She basically was never healthy last year and is just now getting cleared to play, so we're just hoping to get Dana healthy," Selvig said. "She's a really good defender, she's a good shooter and she's a great competitor, so she still saw a lot of minutes last year when she wasn't 100 percent."

"Now we just need her back healthy. That'll be the key with Dana."

Making it hard for Selvig to keep her off

the floor is 5-8 guard Laura Cote. Cote came off the bench in all 31 games as a junior but still averaged more than 20 minutes per game. She averaged 5.5 points and 2.4 rebounds per game while shooting 44.0 percent from the floor.

Seeing time at both guard positions, Cote finished third on the team with 41 assists and was one of three Lady Griz players, along with Mandy Morales and Lauren Beck, to finish the season with a positive assist-to-turnover ratio.

Five times Cote scored in double figures, with career-high 18-point efforts in Montana's 85-54 win over Northern Colorado and its 76-43 victory over Sacramento State. Cote was an efficient 16-for-22 from the field in those two games.

"Laura is just a really good basketball player," Selvig said. "She came off the bench for us last year, but she played a ton of minutes because I am confident she can play the one or the two for us."

"She gives us speed and quickness on the floor, and she's our best perimeter defender. She's explosive, she's a good creator and she's good in the open court. I think she's going to be an even better player this year."

"Obviously this is a very talented class for us," Selvig said. "Most of them had major roles on the team last year and had lots of playing time, and now that they are going to be juniors you look for them to continue to improve. That will be a key for the team."

"Their prominent roles last year make this year's team a very experienced one. And the bright thing is you're looking at another very experienced team again the next year."

Guardipee started every game last year at the five, except for Senior Night when she stepped aside for the graduating Sara Gale. She was fifth on the team in scoring at 8.5 points per game and second on the team in rebounding at 6.3 boards per game. Guardipee led the team in blocked shots for the second straight season with 40.

Guardipee matched Morales for the team high in double-doubles with five. One of those included a 25-point, 15-rebound effort, both career highs, in Montana's 90-87 victory at Idaho State when she was matched up against Natalie Doma, the Bengals' honorable mention All-America post player.

"Tam has really developed," Selvig said. "I'm really happy with the progress she's made. And we're hoping that she keeps steadily improving."

"Offensively she has improved a great deal to where she is now a very good offensive threat. On the defensive end she is a great shot changer and shot blocker.

"Tam has had some big offensive games, but now we're looking for her to become more consistent. We want her to be consistently good and steady every night."

If the success of the 2006-07 season was a surprise, a major reason was the play of 6-1 forward Britney Lohman. After averaging 1.9 points and 1.9 rebounds while playing less than eight minutes per game as a freshman, Lohman increased her averages to 9.9 points and 5.7 rebounds per game, both third on the team, as a sophomore. She shot a team-high 52.5 percent from the floor and was the team's most accurate 3-point shooter at 45.8 percent.

Lohman had four double-figure scoring efforts during Montana's pre-Big Sky Conference schedule, averaging 7.5 points and 5.3 rebound per game through UM's first 13 games. Those averages jumped up to 11.6 points and 5.8 rebounds per game during league play, earning Lohman second team All-Big Sky honors.

"Britney emerged as an outstanding player last year and that was a real key in our success," Selvig said. "Probably the biggest surprise is how quickly she came on offensively. She turned out to be a very consistent scorer for us.

"And she is a great defender. I really like her ability at that end of the floor. She's strong enough that she can defend inside, yet she is also quick enough that she can defend on the perimeter. She is very versatile defensively. I love that."

The expectations for Mandy Morales entering her second season were pretty high considering she was an honorable mention All-American, a unanimous All-Big Sky pick and the league's co-Outstanding Freshman in 2005-06.

But Morales still managed to exceed even the loftiest expectations in 2006-07.

Consider:

* She averaged 19.7 points and 6.8 assists per game, ranking 18th and third nationally in those categories.

* She was a Kodak/WBCA and Associated Press honorable mention All-American, the Big Sky Conference's first six-time player of the week (including five straight in December and early January), the Big Sky's MVP and one of 11 finalists for the Nancy Lieberman Award, which recognizes the nation's top Division I point guard.

* She had four games with at least 30 points, 14 with at least 20 and posted five double-doubles, four of which were of the assists-points variety.

* In December, which Montana rolled through with an 8-0 record, Morales averaged 27.9 points, 6.9 assists and 5.3 rebounds per game while shooting 50.0 percent from the field, 53.2 percent from 3-point range and 91.2 percent from the free throw line.

That the loss to Northern Arizona in the Big Sky tournament fueled the already driven Morales to work even harder in the off-season, the ceiling has officially been removed from what is possible in 2007-08.

"Mandy is just a very talented player, a complete player," Selvig said. "She can help the team and hurt the opponent in a lot of different ways. She is a great offensive weapon because of the different ways she can score: from the perimeter, off the dribble and she's good around the basket because she's so strong.

"As a playmaker at the point, she's got great vision and she's a great passer. She's got great quickness, with the basketball in particular. She really has the complete package as a player."

Like Lohman, another player who increased her role in 2006-07 was 5-7 guard Sonya Rogers. Rogers had a solid freshman campaign in 2005-06, averaging 4.8 points per game and finishing second on the team in assists with 59. Playing at the two guard as a sophomore, Rogers' scoring went up to 11.0 points per game, second on the team, while playing nearly 30 minutes per game.

The team's top perimeter threat, Rogers shot 46.1 percent from the field, 38.2 percent from 3-point range. Also keeping her playmaker mentality, Rogers was second on the team once again in assists with 53.

Rogers made it clear that she was a burgeoning scoring threat in Montana's second game of the 2006-07 season when she scored a then career-high 16 points against Gonzaga.

She finished the season with 17 double-figure scoring games, with a career-high 27 coming against Portland State in the Lady Griz' Big Sky opener.

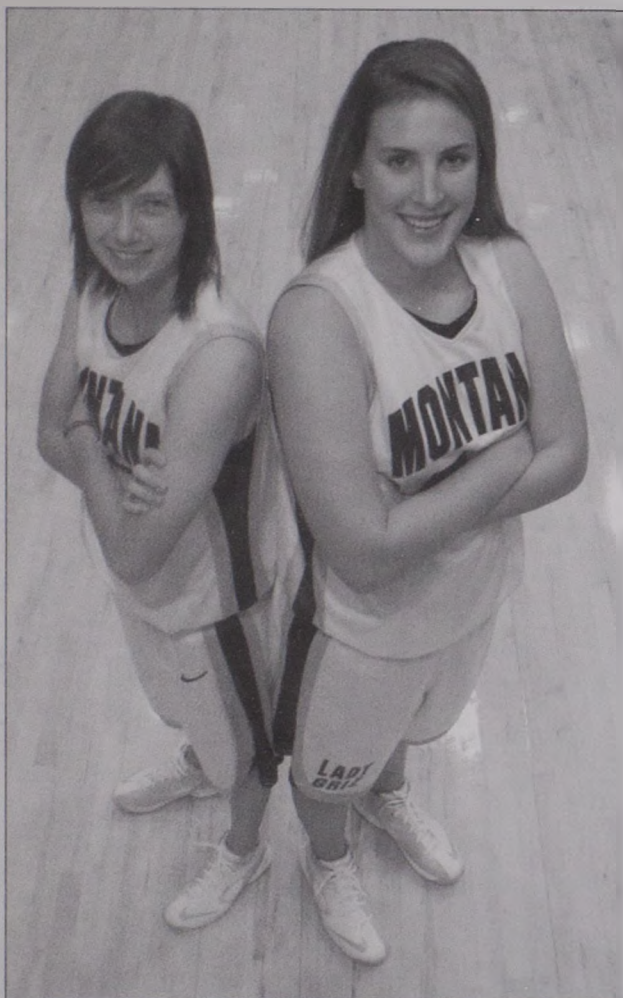
She joined Lohman in earning second team All-Big Sky honors.

"Sonya had a great year last year," Selvig said. "She's our best perimeter player, and even though she's not very big, she is crafty, which allows her to score around the basket. And her defense improved last year.

"One thing I really love about Sonya is that she plays extremely hard. She just doesn't seem to tire. She's in great physical condition and can play a lot of minutes without letting up."

In her first season of eligibility after transferring from Xavier, 6-2 forward/center Betsy Snead averaged 1.0 point and 1.2 rebounds while playing 5.6 minutes in 21 games.

She had a season-high five points in

Montana's victory over Utah State and grabbed a season-high four rebounds on three occasions.

"We're looking for Betsy to continue to improve, and then we need to find a spot for her," Selvig said. "She's a good perimeter shooter and she has good size, but she really isn't a post player. To develop a role on this team, she needs to show us where she can play and then battle for time at that spot."

The Sophomores Lauren Beck [6-0, G/F] Shadra Robison [6-3, C]

"Lauren and Shadra are two good kids and they both have good futures," Selvig said. "Their time is coming."

The six-foot Lauren Beck got a chance to show her versatility early in the 2006-07 season. She opened some eyes with a 14-point, five-assist, two-steal, one-block performance in Montana's annual Maroon and Silver scrimmage, then had a season-high 10 points, seven

boards and three assists in the Lady Griz' season opener against MSU-Billings.

She played 9.0 minutes per game for the season, averaging 1.9 points and 1.3 rebounds while dishing out 28 assists.

"Lauren is a very versatile player for us. She is someone that can definitely help us in a number of different places," Selvig said. "We can work her anywhere from the one to the small forward.

"She gave us good minutes last year. Now we're looking for her to get a little stronger in all areas."

Shadra Robison averaged just under five minutes per game while seeing action in 18 games as a freshman. Her time was limited playing behind Gale and Guardipee.

When she saw action, Robison showed the ability to be a presence in the post. In a season-high nine minutes against Canisius at the Lady Griz Holiday Classic, she went 3-for-4 from the field to score a season-high seven points. She also grabbed a season-high six boards in that game.

Possessing a soft touch away from the basket as well, Robison was perfect from the free throw line for the season. She averaged 1.3 points and 1.6 rebounds per game for the season.

"Shadra will be battling for more time at the five this year, because we lost some minutes at that spot with Sara Gale's graduation," Selvig said.

"Shadra had a good year last year while seeing limited minutes. She's a good scorer and someone who is an outstanding perimeter shooter for her size. Her overall game keeps steadily improving."

The Freshmen Misty Atkinson [5-10, G/F] Sarah Ena [5-11, F] Jessa Linford [6-1, F] Stephanie Stender [5-11, G/F] Dvera Tolbert [6-0, F]

Montana's five-player freshman class is made up of two redshirt freshmen in Jessa Linford and Stephanie Stender and three true freshmen in Misty Atkinson, Sarah Ena (Enah) and Dvera (duh-VUR) Tolbert.

"It's tough to analyze this group as a whole at this point because they are two different years of players," Selvig said. "What I would say is that this group is made up of some exciting young players and we look forward to

them having a bright future."

Linford and Stender both have a year of practice under their belts after redshirting in 2006-07. The athletic Linford also spent the spring competing for the Grizzly track and field program. The 6-1 forward placed third in the high jump at the 2007 Big Sky Conference Outdoor Championships with a season-best height of 5-5.

"Steph had a good redshirt year, and now she'll be vying for time on the perimeter, mostly at the three position," Selvig said. "The problem is we have so many kids back, it will be tough for anyone coming in to break into those spots.

"Steph is a good shooter and a pretty good rebounder. She just needs some more experience to work on her overall perimeter skills.

"Jessa will move exclusively to the inside this year after practicing on the perimeter last year. That move allowed her to develop her perimeter skills and it also helped us out personnel-wise in practice.

"Jessa is an athletic kid on the inside and has a lot of things going for her."

The 5-10 Atkinson, a 2007 graduate of Clarkston (Wash.) High, is Selvig's type of perimeter player: she's versatile. A four-year starter, she led CHS to three state tournament appearances, earning All-Great Northern League first team honors as a senior.

Atkinson also competed in soccer and cross country for the Bantams.

"Misty will have the ability to play the one, two or three in her career," Selvig said. "She is a versatile-type player on the perimeter, which is what I like to have. She has good size if she is at the point, and she's big and strong enough to play the three.

"Misty is a good shooter, but she's also good around the basket."

The 5-11 Ena is a 2007 graduate of Inglemoor (Wash.) High. A three-year basketball letterwinner, she averaged 15.0 points, 10.0 rebounds and 1.5 blocks per game as a senior to earn first team All-KingCo 4A League honors. Ena was selected to play in the 2007 Washington Class 4A All-State game.

Also a track standout, the two-time USA Track and Field All-American is a sub-59 second 400-meter runner.

"Sarah has done a great job in the preseason," Selvig said. "She's quick, strong and just has a nose for the basketball. She's going to be a very athletic interior player for us. She reminds me of (former Lady Griz standout) Ann Lake.

"Sarah was an inside player in high school, so she'll begin her career at the four for us, then maybe play some three some day. But I look at her as a power forward, that's her strength. She's good around the basket and is a really good rebounder."

The 6-0 Tolbert, a 2007 graduate of Hardin High, is the most likely of the three true freshman to have an immediate impact in 2007-08.

"This group is made up of some exciting young players, and we look forward to them having a bright future."

The all-time leading scorer and rebounder at HHS, Tolbert averaged 19.4 points, 10.1 rebounds and 3.4 blocks per game while shooting 56 percent from the floor for her four-year prep career.

The four-time Class A all-state selection averaged 27 points, 12 rebounds and four blocked shots as a senior and capped her career by playing in the annual Montana-Wyoming All-Star basketball series last summer.

"Dvera is a very talented freshman, and we're really happy with her through the pre-season," Selvig said. "Mostly I love her instincts. She just has great basketball sense."

"Dvera has got tremendous potential. She can score, she can rebound and she's a good passer, especially for a big kid. She can play the four or the five, but we're looking more at the five at this point."

The Coaches

Selvig enters his 30th year in 2007-08, and the incredible numbers he's compiled show no signs of leveling off.

In 29 seasons, the winningest coach in Big Sky Conference history has:

- * Won 672 games and lost just 192, a victory total and winning percentage (.778) that place him in the upper echelon of the winningest active Division I women's basketball coaches.

- * Had 27 winning seasons and 25 20-win seasons.

- * Won 17 conference coach of the year awards.

- * Led the Lady Griz to 21 national tournament appearances (16 of those being the NCAAAs), 20 regular-season conference championships and 16 postseason conference champi-

onships.

- * Coached 11 conference MVPs, 75 all-conference players and 99 academic all-conference players.

Joining Selvig on his coaching staff will be the same trio of assistants he's had the last 13 years. All are former Lady Griz players.

Annette Rocheleau (Lady Griz from 1979-81) enters her 27th year as Selvig's top aide-de-camp, while Shannon Schweyen (1988-92) begins her 16th year and Trish Duce (1989-94) her 14th season.

"It's nice to have assistants who have been here for so long," Selvig said. "Their experience, knowledge and dedication to this program are invaluable. I really think the stability of the coaching staff is a plus."

"I have people that know how I think, which is probably both a good and bad thing. But I really think everybody just complements one another real well."

Closing Thoughts

The Lady Griz entered the 2006-07 season with what seemed like four unanswered questions for every one sure thing. That wouldn't last long.

After starting 3-0, the team lost by 40 points at Ohio State. Instead of creating more questions, Montana's response to that game, a 70-59 victory over Wyoming (which would go on to win the WNIT title), provided a glimpse of what was to come.

"I think the key point last season was bouncing back and beating a good Wyoming team after the shellacking we took at Ohio State," Selvig said.

"Wyoming had a very good team and we had just had a miserable performance against a great team. It left me wondering how good we could be."

"But we got a win and then went through the rest of the non-conference schedule without a loss (including another defeat of Wyoming in the title game of the Lady Griz Holiday Classic). At that point we obviously started to think this might be a pretty good team."

Morales carried the team with her consistency during the pre-Big Sky schedule, including her huge month of December, but she had plenty of help.

"Mandy was on a roll, but it was amazing how different kids kept stepping up and having big games," Selvig said. "The team just kept coming together with a lot of different kids in big roles."

The only misstep in Big Sky play in 16 games was a 15-point loss at Weber State on the back end of the Idaho State-Weber State road trip.

"One of the things that I think was remarkable about last year was how we didn't slip up in Big Sky play," Selvig said. "We were beating teams capable of beating us all the time. We were just very consistent."

A 27-3 record after the conference tournament loss to the Lumberjacks still left the Lady Griz wondering if they might make the NCAA Tournament. But an at-large bid to the NCAAAs hadn't come from the Big Sky since 1994.

"I didn't have much hope after the loss (to NAU), but a couple of web sites that cover women's basketball had us in, so that got my hopes up," Selvig said. "But in the end it did not surprise me that we weren't in."

"It was disappointing. Obviously when you have a year like that you want to be in the NCAAAs, but when I look back on that year as a whole, it was a great season. I'm very proud of what we accomplished."

Can the personnel that returns — and a motivated group at that — match what last year's team accomplished?

"We can be a better team," Selvig says without hesitation.

"Like you do every year, the first thing you try to do is get the Big Sky Tournament at your place so you can play in front of your fans. We did that last year, but we didn't get the second thing done, which is to win the thing."

"Hopefully we can get back in that position again and this time do it right."

The 2007-08 season marks Robin Selvig's 30th year as head coach of the Lady Griz and his 35th year of affiliation with University of Montana athletics. Selvig was a four-year member of the Grizzly basketball team (1970-71 to 1973-74), coached the men's freshman team in 1974-75 and was named UM's women's basketball coach June 6, 1978.

Entering his 30th year on the Lady Griz sideline, Selvig's monumental career numbers and coaching accolades not only continue to grow, but show no signs of leveling off. In 2006-07, Selvig guided a young, inexperienced Lady Griz team to a 27-4 record and the program's 20th regular-season conference championship and 21st national tournament appearance.

In his first 29 seasons, Selvig has posted 27 winning seasons, 25 20-win seasons and 672 victories. He has coached the Lady Griz to 21 national tournament appearances (16 NCAA Tournaments) and 20 regular-season conference championships, for which he has been recognized as the conference coach of the year 17 times. He has coached one Kodak all-American, 11 conference MVPs, 75 all-conference selections and 99 academic all-conference players.

Selvig's .778 career winning percentage and 672 victories both rank him among the top seven winningest active Division I women's basketball coaches.

Upon his hiring in 1978, Selvig inherited a team that had gone 11-27 in the two seasons

prior to his arrival. Success came quickly for the Lady Griz program under Selvig's guidance and has continued with few interruptions for 29 years.

That success has placed his name among the woman's game's most recognized figures in coaching today, and he recently joined the rarified air of Kentucky's Adolph Rupp, UCLA's John Wooden, Kansas's Phog Allen and North Carolina's Dean Smith.

When Montana defeated Portland State on March 6, 2004, Selvig reached 600 career wins, doing so in just 772 games. That made the Lady Griz coach the sixth-fastest coach in NCAA history to reach No. 600, in all NCAA divisions, men's or women's, trailing the likes of Rupp (704).

Tennessee's Pat Summitt (734) and Wooden (755), but reaching the milestone faster than Smith (773) and Allen (780).

Selvig's quarter-plus century of success has been impressive in its consistency and has been done with similar methods year after year: superior team defense, turning great crowd support into a dominating home-court advantage and remarkable league performance.

Seven different Montana teams have led the nation in a defensive category. The trend started early in Selvig's career, when his fourth team, 1981-82, led the country in points allowed (53.3/g). Four more times the Lady Griz led the nation in scoring defense. Twice they have ranked first in field goal percentage defense.

Selvig's 2006-07 team led the Big Sky Conference in field goal percentage defense at 35.6 percent and ranked 14th nationally. Montana was second in the league in scoring defense, allowing just 62.5 points per game while scoring an average of 77.5. UM's +15.0 scoring margin ranked 11th nationally.

Prior to Selvig's first year, Montana women's basketball games were attended by an average of fewer than 200 fans per game. The support the Lady Griz enjoy today (Montana's average home attendance of 3,965 ranked 31st in the nation last year) did not happen overnight, but rather was a gradual process.

By 1982-83 UM had cracked the 1,000 mark for average attendance (1,180). Just five years later, 1987-88, the average had jumped to 3,119 fans per game, which ranked sixth in the nation that year, and the fans have continued flooding into Dahlberg Arena.

Montana averaged a program-high 5,235 fans per game in 1994-95.

The Lady Griz have won 90 percent of their home games under Selvig, going 397-44 (.900).

Montana's success in league play (first the Northwest Women's Basketball League, then the Mountain West Conference and now the Big Sky Conference) under Selvig, on the other hand, was far from gradual. He took a team that went 4-19 in league play in '77 and '78 and turned it into a second-place finisher in the NWBL with his first team in 1978-79.

Selvig's first 20 teams would finish either first or second in their respective conferences. To date Selvig's teams have gone 356-62 in league play, an .852 winning percentage. Perhaps more impressive than the Lady Griz' 192-18 (.914) record at home in those games is their 164-44 road record, a .788 winning percentage.

While Selvig is entering his 30th season as coach of the Lady Griz, his association with the university goes back to the fall of 1970, when the Outlook, Mont., native matriculated at UM as a student-athlete himself.

Selvig was a four-year member of the

Grizzly basketball team, earning second team All-Big Sky honors as a senior. In his final year of competition he was also presented the John Eaheart Award as the team's top defensive player and the Grizzly Cup, given to UM's best all-around athlete, scholar and person.

Selvig graduated in the spring of 1974 with a degree in health and physical education. He was inducted into the Grizzly Basketball Hall of Fame in February 1983.

After coaching the Montana men's freshman team to a 10-8 record in 1974-75, Selvig took over the girls' basketball program at Plentywood (Mont.) High School, where he totaled a 38-24 record over three seasons.

Selvig was hired by UM athletic director Harley Lewis as Montana's fourth women's basketball coach on June 6, 1978, taking over a team that had gone 7-13 the previous season.

Selvig's first Montana team finished 13-13 and in second place in the NWBL Mountain Division and, in a sign of things to come, led the league in scoring defense.

Montana's modest improvement to .500 in Selvig's first year blossomed into a stretch of success that rivals any team's in the country.

After going 19-10 in 1979-80, Montana went 22-8 in 1980-81, winning the program's first league title. Those years started a string of 19 consecutive winning seasons and 18



straight 20-win seasons.

Montana made its first of 21 national tournament appearances in 1981-82, losing a tight 57-52 decision to Wayland Baptist in the opening round of the AIAW national tournament in Berkeley, Calif.

After coaching Montana in the NWBL for four seasons, Selvig and the Lady Griz moved to the Mountain West Conference in 1982-83. Montana dominated that league for six seasons, going 78-6 in conference play, winning five regular-season

league titles and four postseason conference championships and earning four NCAA Tournament trips.

In 1982-83 Montana made its first trip to the NCAA Tournament, losing at Louisiana-Monroe, 72-53.

In 1983-84 the No. 4 seed Lady Griz had a breakthrough victory when they won their first-ever NCAA Tournament game, a 56-47 home-court victory over No. 5 Oregon State.

Starting with his 1987-88 team, Selvig would take Montana to the NCAA Tournament 10 of the next 11 seasons.

When the Lady Griz began Big Sky Conference play in 1988-89, the success they had in the NWBL and MWC did not stop. Montana won the first three Big Sky Conference titles with perfect 16-0 marks and has gone 245-41 (.857) in league play overall, winning 12 more conference titles.

In February 2001 Selvig was inducted into the Grizzly Sports Hall of Fame.

Selvig has been recognized often for his coaching. He won his first conference coach of the year award after the 1981-82 season when the NWBL gave Selvig his first honor. Sixteen more league accolades followed, with five Mountain West Athletic Conference and 11 Big Sky Conference

coach of the year awards.

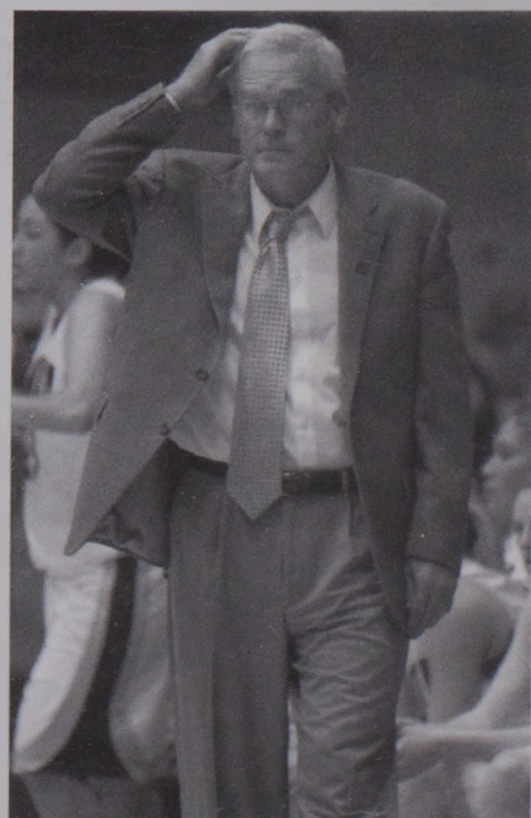
Selvig has also been named the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) District VII Coach of the Year nine times.

Following the 1990-91 season, Selvig was one of three finalists for national coach of the year honors.

An influential member of the Missoula community, Selvig has served as the director of the Montana Special Olympics and as a spokesman for Missoula Youth Homes.

A native of Outlook, Mont., Selvig came from a family of eight children. His brother, Doug, and sister, Sandy, were both University of Montana basketball letterwinners. His nephew, Derek, is a freshman on the Grizzly men's basketball team.

Selvig and his wife, Janie, have two adult sons. Jeff and his wife Mariana are based out of Missoula. Dan currently resides in Boston.



Coach Robin Selvig: 30 Years of Perspective

Montana's coaching staff: When I started (in 1978) it was just me. I had a part-time assistant, but we also had a JV team that they worked with, so sometimes I had practice alone, sometimes I had help.

It's been really nice getting the additional coaches because the rules of recruiting have changed over the years. In the old AIAW you didn't used to be able to go out and recruit much and there weren't as many things you could do. There wasn't summer recruiting and so on.

As things have changed, there was a lot more to do. And if you wanted to do it well, you needed help.

The calendar: I think the number of actual games is similar, it's just getting spread out since we can play games sooner. I think that's a good thing. We used to have four to six weeks of just practice with no games at the start of the season, and that was tough. That's a long time to be beating on each other. I remember we used to go play some intrasquad games in different towns just to make it more of a game atmosphere.

Recruiting: Totally different. Initially, if kids were interested they would pay their own way to come see the school. There were no summer events to go watch, which is such a big thing now. You basically had to get videos on out-of-state kids.

The one thing that was good at the time was Montana high school girls' basketball was in the fall and we weren't busy yet, so I'd be able to get around the state.

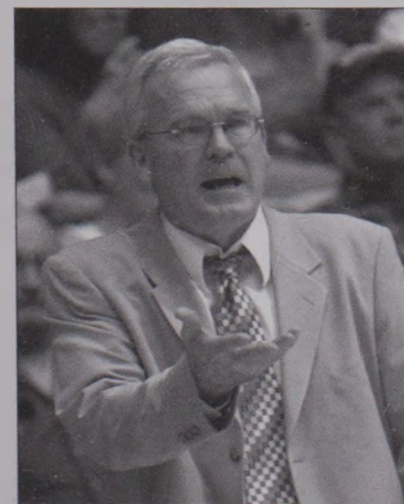
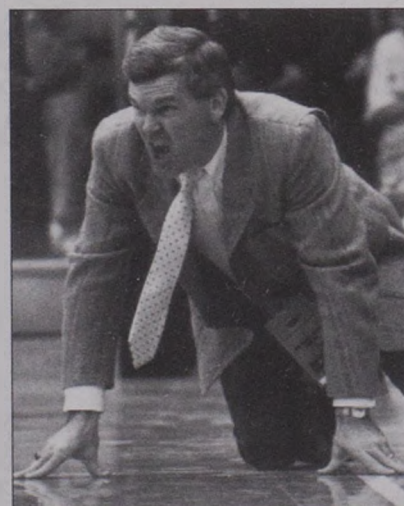
Now you get a chance to see kids play in the summer. That's been the biggest change. Now you're busy in the summer because that's when you see kids. And kids are committing earlier so you need to see them when they're younger. It's grown to where it's similar to the men's game.

You can't be actively doing something with them all year, but recruiting never really ends.

The Lady Griz players: I've always been blessed with good kids. Because it was 30 years ago when I first started, women were just cracking the door to getting things, and they were pretty happy to get anything. They were excited just to have the opportunity to play and have a scholarship and get a pair of tennis shoes. They were just grateful for everything.

Not that the players of today aren't grateful for what they get, but in this day and age you just get more.

Road trips: There is a big difference. Now we stay in awfully nice places and eat well. I remember a bonus for kids used to be getting them the 25-cent key for the Motel 6 TV if we



did well. Of course that was probably a violation.

We didn't have a budget, so we were probably four to a room. Now we and the men are essentially the same. The kids are treated well now, as they should be.

The NCAA Tournament: The NCAA taking over women's basketball was a huge deal for the development of women's basketball.

The AIAW was great, it really got women's basketball going, but you didn't get any money (to play in its tournament), so financially you were almost hoping you didn't make it. It's bad when it costs you money to win.

The NCAA came in and started paying for your way (to the national tournament). They treat you well and you stay at nice places. It's grown to be a pretty big deal, which is why it's so exciting for the ladies to be a part of it.

The level of play in women's basketball: The level of play keeps getting better all the time because kids are starting younger. Not that there weren't some great teams that we had in the old days, and we faced teams like USC that had Cheryl Miller and the McGees, but as with every sport, it's getting better because players are starting younger and they are getting bigger, stronger and faster. It's getting to the point where I can't dominate them in practice anymore.

Media: That's certainly grown over the years. It's the chicken and the egg thing. Has more coverage helped women's basketball grow, or has better women's basketball resulted in more coverage?

We're fortunate to be covered well here because there are still places in the country where they don't cover women's basketball. There are some awfully big programs that don't get the kind of coverage we get.

Scouting: Originally you could live scout, but the NCAA stepped in and ruled there was no live scouting, that it could only be through video exchange. That was a good rule. Schools with tons of money and tons of coaches at the time were able to get out and watch their opponents and schools like us with limited budgets couldn't. That's helped balance things out.

The game: The game has gotten much more physical as athletes have gotten bigger, faster and stronger. I just hope it continues to remain somewhat of a finesse game. It's getting to the point where it you're bigger and stronger you win. It should be because you're a better basketball player. Bigger and stronger should be a factor, but basketball should still be about finesse and skills.



ANNETTE ROCHELEAU

Assistant Coach
27th season • Montana, '82

The 2007-08 season marks Annette Rocheleau's 27th year as Robin Selvig's top assistant. Rocheleau, a former two-year Lady Griz player (1979-80 to 1980-81), joined the UM coaching staff as the junior varsity coach for the 1981-82 and 1982-83 seasons before becoming Montana's first full-time assistant coach in September 1983.

As a player, junior varsity coach and full-time assistant coach, Rocheleau has been part of all but 13 of Coach Selvig's 672 career victories.

Formerly Annette Whitaker, Rocheleau arrived at Montana as a walk-on in 1979 and made the Lady Griz team and became the starting point guard and team captain her first season. Rocheleau was also the team captain as a senior and was named the team's most inspirational player. In her two seasons she totaled 132 assists.

Rocheleau transferred to Montana from Wenatchee Valley (Wash.) Junior College,

where she won two state junior college championships.

A 1977 graduate of Cashmere (Wash.) High School, she was a four-year letterwinner in both basketball and tennis.

Rocheleau received her bachelor's degree from UM in health and physical education in 1982.

Rocheleau served as the Grizzlies' assistant golf coach from 1992-94, the first two seasons of collegiate women's golf at UM. She served as the assistant director of the Montana Special Olympics in both 1990 and 1991 and was the 2005 Ed Chinske Memorial Award winner at the Smurfit-Stone/KPAX Sports Banquet, which recognized her for services as a professional in athletics.

Rocheleau is married to Kevin Rocheleau, a former Grizzly basketball player. They have three sons, Beau (28), Brian (28) and Ty (9), and a daughter, Trae (13).

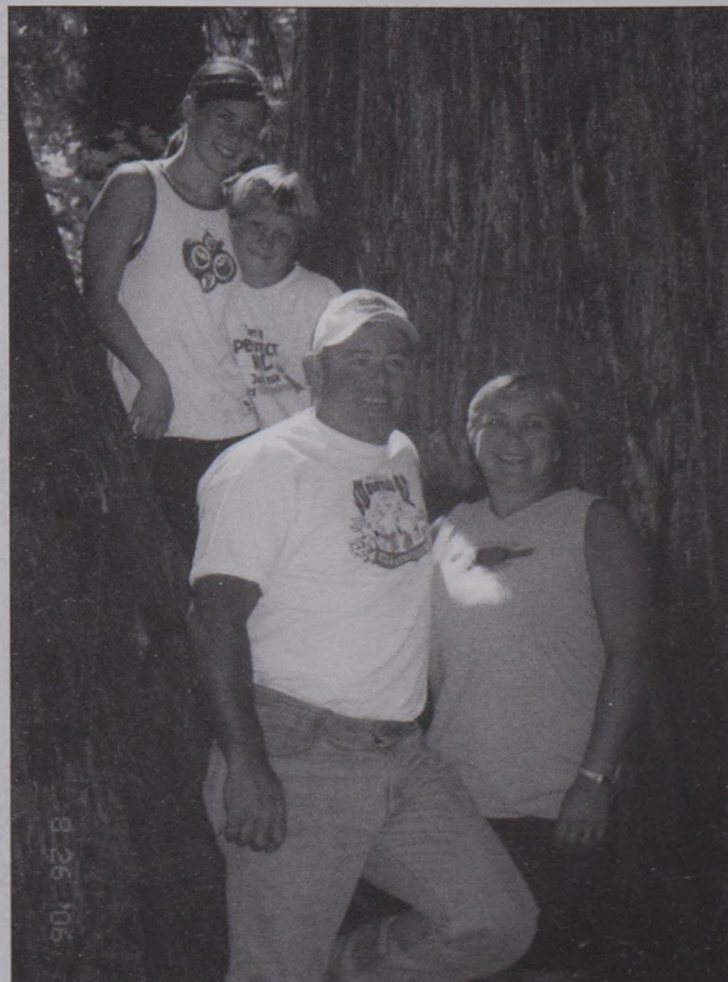

SHANNON SCHWEYEN

Assistant Coach

The 2007-08 season marks Shannon Schweyen's 16th year as an assistant coach under Robin Selvig. A Kodak All-American as a player for the Lady Griz (1988-89 to 1991-92), Schweyen joined the UM coaching staff as a student assistant in 1992 and was appointed to a full-time position in 1993.

The Big Sky Conference's only first team Kodak all-American, the former Shannon Cate led the Lady Griz to a 103-18 overall record over her four-year career. She was a two-time Kodak honorable mention all-American, a three-time all-region pick, a two-time Big Sky MVP, a three-time Big Sky tournament MVP and a three-time Lady Griz MVP. She was also a four-time Big Sky all-academic pick.

Schweyen was a member of four NCAA Tournament teams as a player. As a senior in 1992 she scored 34 points to lead No. 11 seed Montana to an 85-74 upset victory at No. 6 Wisconsin.

Schweyen finished her career as the Big

Sky's all-time leading scorer among both men and women with 2,172 points. She still owns numerous school and Big Sky Conference records after averaging 18.7 points, 7.6 rebounds and 3.6 assists per game for her four-year career.

Schweyen, who had her No. 21 jersey retired following her collegiate career, spent a short period of time playing professionally in Spain in 1992 before returning to Montana to join the Lady Griz as an assistant coach.

Schweyen was a three-time state tournament MVP for Billings Central High and was the Montana *USA Today* Player of the Year in 1988.

She received a bachelor's degree in business administration from UM in 1993.

Schweyen is married to Brian Schweyen, a former All-Big Sky Conference decathlete at Montana State and a former assistant track and field coach for the Grizzlies. They have three daughters, Jordyn (8), Shelby (6) and Sheridan (5).

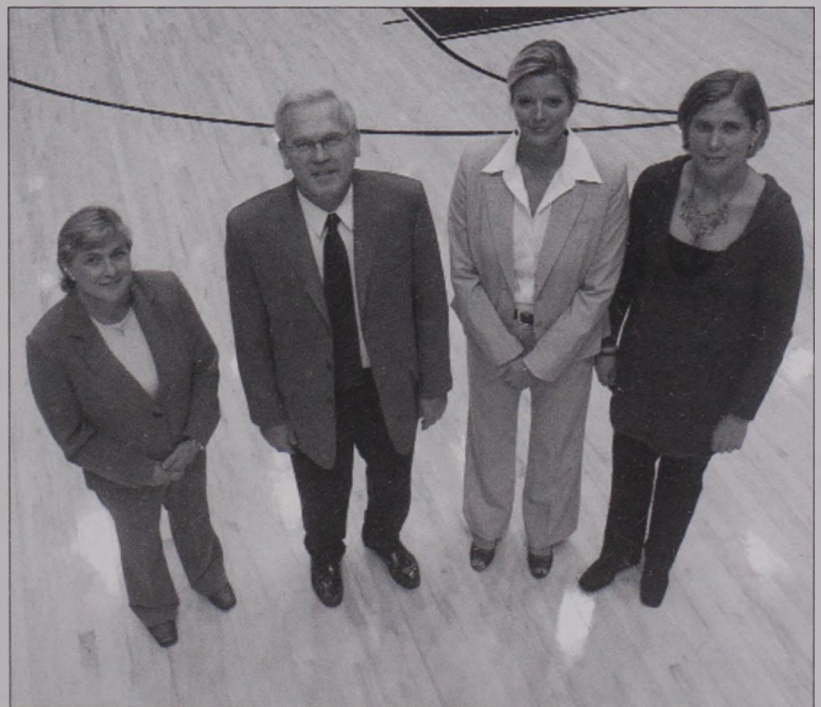

The 2007-08 season marks Trish Duce's 14th year as an assistant coach under Robin Selvig. Duce was a five-year player for the Lady Griz (1989-90 to 1993-94) then joined the UM coaching staff prior to the 1994-95 season.

As a player Duce was a member of four NCAA Tournament teams and part of 124 wins over five seasons. As an assistant coach she has been on the sideline for seven more NCAA Tournament appearances and 290 additional wins.

The former Trish Olson was recruited out of Missoula's Big Sky High and played in 28 games as a true freshman in 1989-90. She started 29 games as a sophomore and was a Big Sky Conference all-tournament selection after helping the Lady Griz to a 77-49 victory over Montana State in the championship game.

A foot injury forced Duce to redshirt the 1991-92 season, and another broken bone in

her foot caused Duce to miss nine more games in 1992-93.

As a fifth-year senior in 1993-94 Duce started 24 games. She finished her career with 89 blocked shots and was a four-time Academic All-Big Sky Conference selection.

Duce received her bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1993 and her master's degree in computer science in 1995, both from UM.

She is married to Kirk Duce, a former Grizzly football kicker who ranks fourth on the school's career scoring list. They have a daughter, Lexi (10), and two sons, River (7) and Reggie (4).

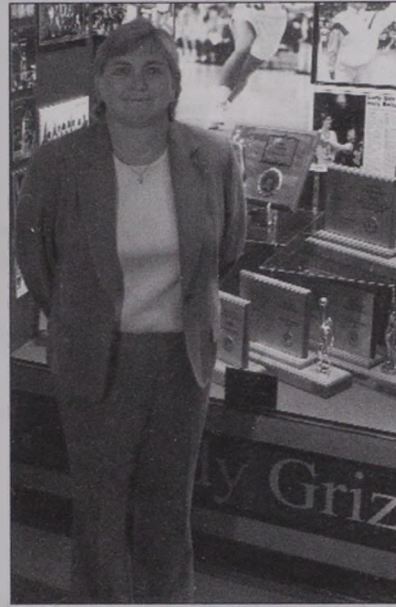

DAHLBERG ARENA ... HOME OF THE LADY GRIZ

The Lady Griz have had tremendous success in the confines of Dahlberg Arena, which was named after George "Jiggs" Dahlberg, an athlete, coach and athletic director at Montana.

Dahlberg earned six varsity letters at UM in football and basketball in the early 1920s. He was the Grizzly basketball coach for 16 years (1937-54) before becoming Montana's athletic director (1954-70).

Dahlberg was inducted into the Grizzly

Sports Hall of Fame in 1993.

The Lady Griz have posted a 397-44 (.900) record at home in Robin Selvig's 29 years on the Montana sideline, including a 15-1 mark last year. Only a few teams in the entire nation enjoy more home-court advantage.

Montana has had seven perfect seasons at home and another nine with just one loss.

UM averaged 3,965 fans per game last year to rank 31st in the nation.

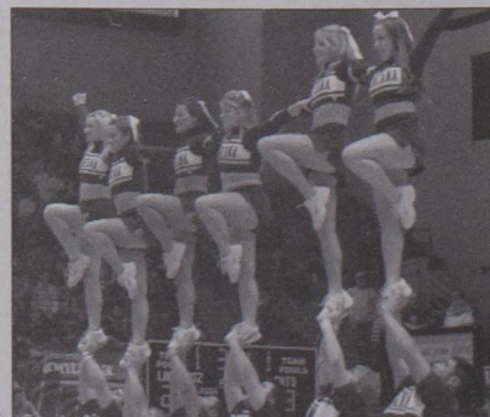
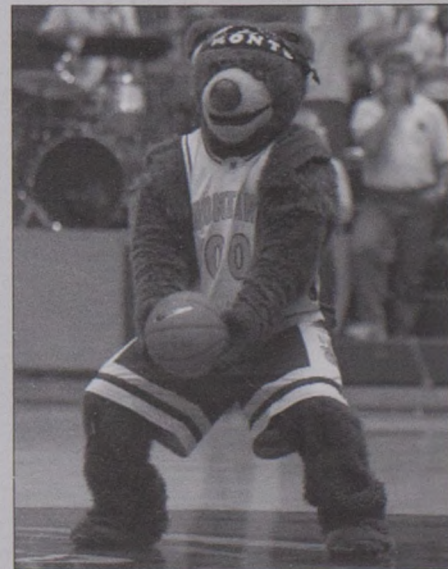

(March 5, 2007) MISSOULA, Mont. — The University of Montana women's basketball team is ranked 25th in this week's Associated Press Top 25 poll the organization announced Monday afternoon. It is the first time the Lady Griz have been nationally ranked since the 1993-94 season.

Montana, which hosts the 2007 Chinook Wireless Big Sky Conference Women's Basketball Tournament this week at Dahlberg Arena, finished the regular season with a record of 27-2, setting a program record for regular-season victories. The Lady Griz went 15-1 in league play, finishing ahead of Idaho State, Weber State and Northern Arizona, all of which tied for second at 11-5.

The 2006-07 title is Montana's 20th regular-season conference championship in coach Robin Selvig's 29 years at UM.

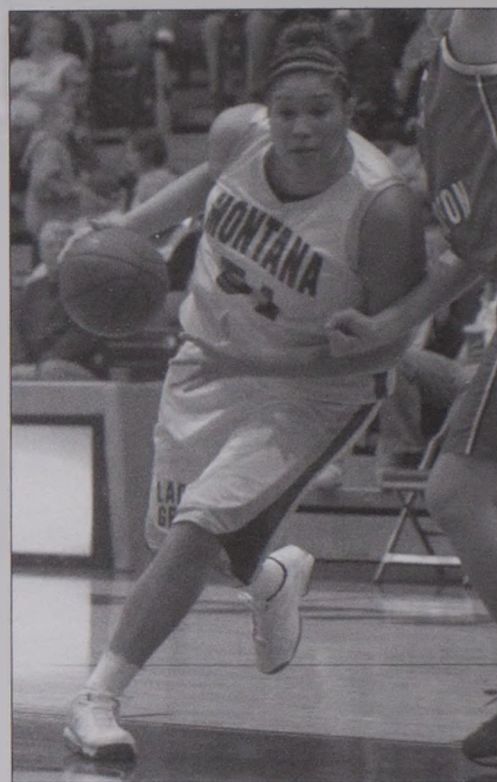

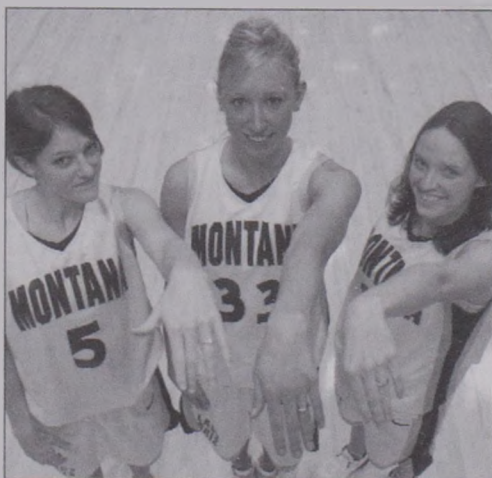

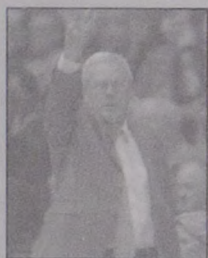

The Big Sky Conference enters its 45th year of athletic competition in 2007-08, continuing to expand its footprint across the West. The University of Northern Colorado accepted an invitation to join the Sky in July 2005 and officially became a member prior to the 2006-07 year.

The Big Sky Conference was established in 1963 by six charter members – Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga, Montana, Montana State and Weber State. Those six schools formed the foundation of the Big Sky before the league expanded in 1970 when it added Boise State and Northern Arizona. Gonzaga left the Sky in 1979 and was replaced by Nevada. The conference grew to nine schools in 1987 with the addition of Eastern Washington.

The 1990s saw change in the makeup of the league, beginning in 1992 when Nevada departed and put the Big Sky back at eight teams. In 1996 Boise State and Idaho left and at the same time the conference added Portland State, Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge. The Big Sky maintained nine teams for five years before Cal State Northridge departed in the spring of 2001.

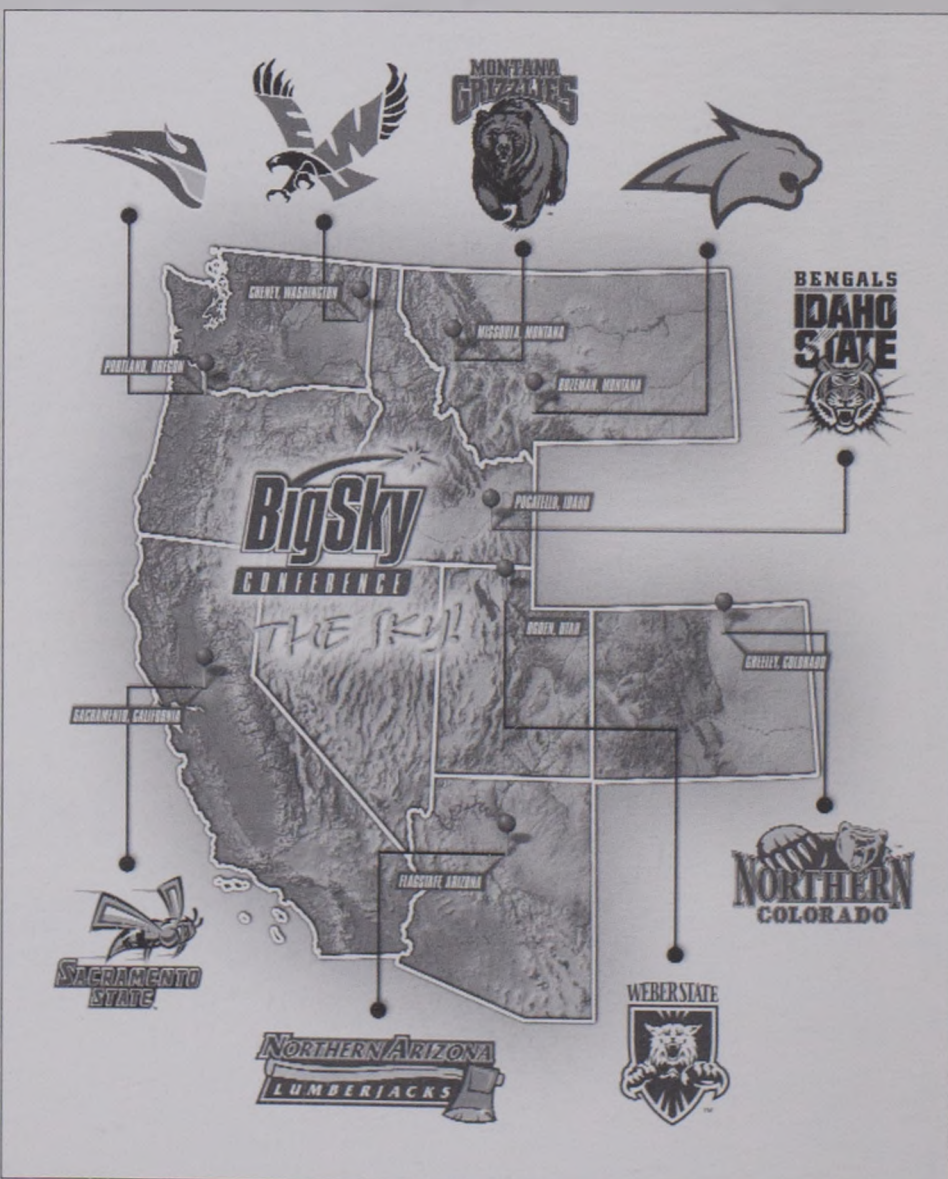
With the addition of Northern Colorado, the Big Sky will spread across seven states spanning from the Pacific Ocean to the Rocky Mountain Front. The Big Sky is represented along the

entire West Coast with schools in Washington, Oregon and California. League schools also range up and down the Rocky Mountains with institutions in Montana, Idaho, Utah, Arizona and Colorado.

The Big Sky sponsors championships in 14 sports, including men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, basketball and tennis. In addition, there are also championships in football, and women's volleyball, golf and soccer.

The 2007-08 season will mark the 20th year that the Big Sky Conference will sponsor championships in women's sports. The former Mountain West Conference existed from 1982-88, sponsoring championships for women's sports at the same institutions the Big Sky had men's programs. The Big Sky merged with the Mountain West in 1988, forming one league for both men and women.

Doug Fullerton, the fifth commissioner of the Big Sky Conference, will enter his 13th year at the helm in 2007-08. Fullerton took over the Big Sky on July 1, 1995, replacing longtime commissioner Ron Stephenson.

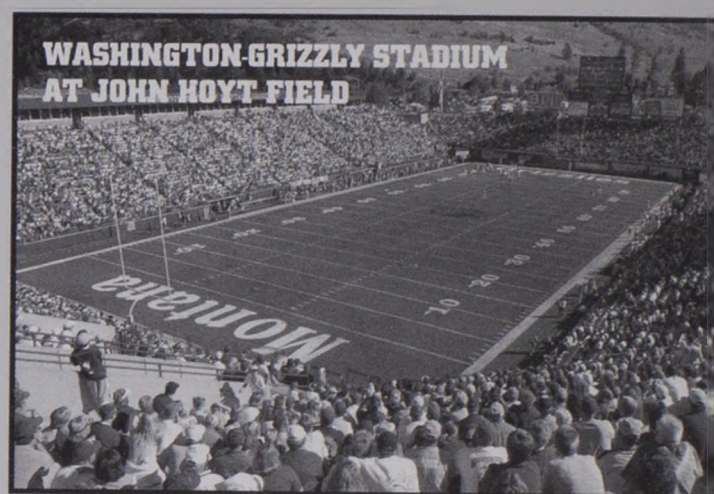


DORNBLASER STADIUM

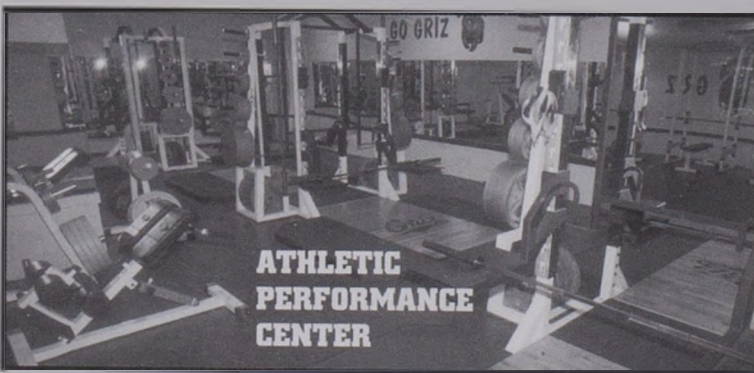

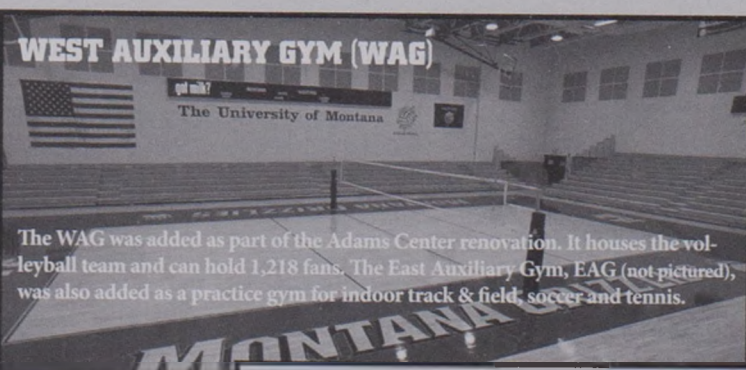

ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE CENTER

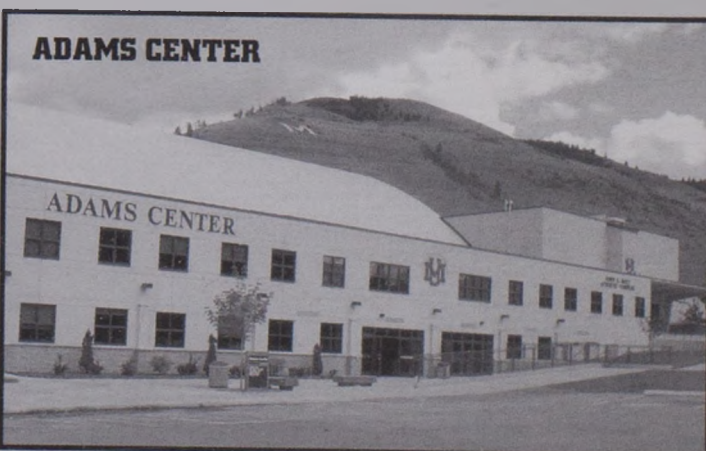

President George M. Dennison

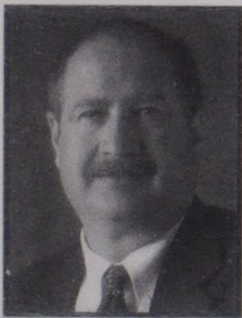
George Dennison, the 16th president of The University of Montana, begins his 17th year at the University.

Dennison came to UM from Western Michigan University where he served as the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs from 1987 to 1990. He spent time at the Universities of Arkansas and Washington before working 18 years at Colorado State, where he served as Acting Academic Vice President, Associate Academic Vice President and Director of Admissions and Records, among other positions.

Dennison received his Bachelor's degree from UM in 1962 and his Master's degree, also from UM, in 1963 and earned a Ph.D. in history from Washington in 1967.

Dennison serves on a number of boards. He chairs the Montana Commission on Community Service and serves on the National Security Education Board, the International Student Exchange Program Board of Trustees, the Institute of Medicine and Humanities, the St. Patrick Hospital Executive Board, the Community Medical Center Advisory Committee, the Maureen and Mike Mansfield Foundation Executive Committee, the Montana Campus Compact Executive Committee, the International Heart Institute of Montana Foundation, the Montana Neuroscience Institute Foundation, and the Montana Cancer Institute. He has been the longest acting president in the history of UM.

Jim O'Day, Director of Athletics

Jim O'Day was named Director of Athletics at The University of Montana by UM President George Dennison on June 30, 2005. Prior to that, he spent almost four years as UM's Director of Development for Intercollegiate Athletics, and three years as Assistant Director of the Grizzly Athletic Association (now the Grizzly Scholarship Association).

As Director of Development, O'Day was responsible for major gift development as it pertains to athletics and served as the liaison between UM Athletics and The University of

Montana Foundation. At the GAA, he was involved in annual gift fund-raising.

O'Day returned to his alma mater in 1998 following a lengthy career in the print media business. After graduating from the UM School of Journalism in 1980, O'Day was the sports editor of the Daily Interlake newspaper in Kalispell, Mont., for two years. Following the death of his father in 1982, he returned to his hometown of Cut Bank, Mont., to assist his mother as a reporter/editor of the twice-weekly, and family-owned, Western Breeze newspaper. In 1987, he purchased the newspaper from his mother and served as owner/publisher until selling the business to his employees in 1998. He then relocated to Missoula to begin work with the GAA.

O'Day was a charter member of the Cut Bank Education Foundation and Alumni Association. He was Cut Bank's Citizen of the Year in 1992 and served on various boards and committees in the community. In 1986, he was selected as a member of the UM Alumni Association's Board of Delegates, and his volunteer work with that organization eventually led to his involvement in other UM activities. He organized the Golden Triangle Chapter of the GAA in 1992 and eventually became the state board president until his appointment at UM in 1998. O'Day was the 1991 recipient of The University of Montana Service Award.

Jim and his wife Kathy have three sons: Chris, Kevin and Brian. Chris and Kevin are students at The University of Montana, while Brian will be a junior at Missoula Hellgate High School in the fall of 2007.

As Director of Athletics at UM, O'Day oversees an athletic department with a \$11.5 million annual budget and a staff of more than 70 people. The challenge each year is to produce almost \$8 million in private funding to support and operate the program. In addition to nationally-recognized teams in football, men's basketball and women's basketball, UM also competes in the Big Sky Conference in the NCAA-sanctioned sports of men's and women's tennis, women's golf, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, women's soccer and women's volleyball.

Along with success on the playing fields, UM student-athletes are excelling in the classroom with an all-time high cumulative GPA of 3.02 in 2006-07.



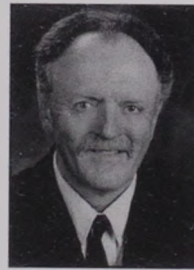

Top 10

Compiling a list of the 100 greatest college basketball programs might be perceived as disrespectful, ignorant and foolish. We know that understanding that a statistical comparison of the 22-history of the women's NCAA championship and history of the men's would produce misleading results. We decided instead to recognize the women with its own top 10 list.

Included in our list are the usual cast of characters: the usual cast of characters.

1 Tennessee

Pat Summitt is Tennessee basketball. The coaching legend ranks among the game's greatest. With six national championships, she trails only John Wooden (10) for the most ever and her 852 wins ranks behind only Dean Smith (879) and Adolph Rupp (876) for most all-time victories.

Summitt has single-handedly, through her recruitment and development of some of the game's greatest players, created a basketball empire in Tennessee. Women like Holly Warlick, Bridgette Gordon, and Chamique Holdseclaw – perhaps the greatest collegian ever – have been the pillars upon which Summitt has built UTV's success.

Other than Wooden's UCLA Bruins from 1967-73, no program has ever been more dominant than the Lady Volunteers were from 1996-98, when UT went 100-14 en route to winning three consecutive NCAA championships. Pat Summitt has not only established herself as the premier college coach in the game today, but has also made the University of Tennessee the premier women's program.

2 Louisiana Tech

Beginning with their first intercollegiate game in 1975, the Lady Techsters of Louisiana Tech have set the standard for consistency. After winning the first NCAA women's basketball championship – beating Cheney in 1982 – Tech has appeared in all 23 NCAA women's basketball tournaments.

Following the guidance of head coach Leon Barmore and the play of All-American Teresa Weatherspoon, the Lady Techsters added to their trophy case in 1988, winning their second NCAA title.

Weatherspoon enjoyed one of the most illustrious careers of any Lady Techster, finishing first in career assists, twice being named All-American, and winning the Wade Trophy, given to the nation's outstanding women's basketball player.

Since 1982-83, the Lady Techsters have gone a staggering 636-92, averaged 29 wins per year and won 30-plus games on 14 different occasions. How's that for consistency?

3 Connecticut

The 1995 season saw the ushering in of a new era in women's college basketball – the UConn era. Over the past ten years, UConn has piled up numbers that border on the absurd: five national championships, seven Final Fours, 10 Big East Championships, six Player of the Year award winners and a .939 winning percentage!

Couch Geno Aurumma and his Lady Huskies have elevated their game above the competition, capturing the last three NCAA championships by winning an average of 35 games a year. As UConn standout and current WNBA star Diana Taurasi points out, "When you win every year, anything less than being No. 1 is kind of a disappointing season."

Because of their recent supremacy, several of the most recognizable names in women's basketball are former Huskies. Players like Rebecca Lobo, Jennifer Rizzotti, Sue Bird and Taurasi have become household names and pushed UConn to the pinnacle of the college basketball world.

Unfortunately for the rest of college hoops, it looks as if the sun will not be setting on the UConn era anytime soon.

4 Old Dominion

The Lady Monarchs of Old Dominion have a knack for going on hot streaks. Playing top-notch basketball

for extended periods of time, ODU has made the NCAA Tournament 13 consecutive seasons, winning 13 consecutive championships.

The current women's basketball team would not be possible without the Three-time Liebman Award winner and women's basketball pioneer, Coach Erwin Center.

7 Montana

Winning conference championships is not supposed to be a forgone conclusion. But for Montana, winning the Big Sky championship has been the norm, not the exception.

In the 20-plus years of the program's history, the Lady Griz have dominated both regular-season play and the conference tournament, winning all but four Big Sky championships since the league's inception in 1982.

Montana's 15 regular-season conference championships and 16 tournament wins are the second-highest totals in women's college history, trailing only Old Dominion in both categories.

Under head coach and Montana-native Robin Selvig, the Lady Griz has won at least twenty games in 22 of the last 24 seasons, a demonstration of prowess few programs can rival.

8 UVA

The University of Virginia women's basketball program owes its rise to one player: Dawn Staley. Staley etched her place UVA history while leading Virginia to a four-year record of 113-21.

During Staley's time on campus, the Cavaliers won two ACC tournament titles, two ACC regular-season championships, made four NCAA appearances and advanced to the Final Four three consecutive seasons from 1990-92.

Although she won two Naismith Player of the Year awards while playing under head coach Debbie Ryan, Staley's greatest achievement may have been being named 1991 Final Four MVP despite playing for the losing team! Staley is the only woman in history to have been so recognized.

UVA has made 20 NCAA Tournament appearances and won 11 ACC regular-season titles, but Dawn Staley was the woman responsible for sending the Cavaliers into the upper echelon of women's college basketball.

9 Stephen F. Austin

The Southland Conference is not the toughest in women's basketball, but since the Stephen F. Austin Ladyjacks joined in 1987-88, they have won 14 conference tournament and 13 regular-season titles while compiling a 258-32 record in league games. Because of the dominating play of stars like Katrina Price

– SFA's all-time leading scorer – the Ladyjacks have been the Southland Conference representative to the NCAA Tournament on 17 occasions, including 15-straight from 1988-2000. On five separate occasions SFA has advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament and 13 times finished in the top 25 of the national rankings.

10 Texas Tech

Texas Tech won an NCAA women's basketball championship in 1993 and has soared under the leadership of Hall of Fame coach Marsha Sharp. However, it is Sheryl Swoopes who remains the most recognizable force in Lady Raider history.

Swoopes capped her illustrious Tech career by being named Final Four MVP after a record-setting 47 point effort against Ohio State in the 1993 title game. Swoopes, twice a unanimous Kodak All-America selection, was also named the National Player of the Year in 1993.

Since leaving Texas Tech, Swoopes has won a gold medal (1996), been named WNBA Defensive Player of the Year three times (2000, '02, '03), has three times been the top vote-getter in the WNBA All-Star game ('99, '00, '02) and has twice been named league MVP ('00, '02).

By retiring her No. 22 jersey in 1994, Texas Tech paid homage to Sheryl Swoopes, one of the greatest – if not the greatest – female basketball player of all time.
