University of Montana



The University of Montana in Missoula is located in a mountain forest setting in beautiful Western Montana. It is halfway between Glacier and Yellowstone national parks.

Four wilderness areas are located near Missoula. The natural surroundings offer excellent opportunities for hunting, fishing, backpacking, river floating, camping and other outdoor recreational pursuits. Two excellent winter ski areas are located within minutes of the University. Several other ski areas are only a couple of hours away by car. UM owns and operates its own golf course adjacent to campus.

The University of Montana is one of the West's pioneers in education and was chartered February 17, 1893. The school opened in September 1895, with 50 students enrolling the first day. Located on 201 acres at the base of Mount Sentinel, UM has grown from 50 students and seven faculty members to a present enrollment of 8,500 and approximately 450 full-time faculty positions.

Through its history, the University of Montana has

sustained a high standard of academic excellence in teaching, research and service.

UM offers associate of arts degrees in two areas and bachelor's degrees in 58 fields. It offers master's degrees in 54 programs and doctoral degrees in 13.

The College of Arts and Sciences, which is the core of the University, includes a full range of programs and courses in the life sciences, physical sciences, social sciences and humanities. The College also offers curricula in interdisciplinary fields ranging from ethnic studies to interdepartmental studies.

Seven professional schools complete the academic program — Business Administration, Fine Arts, Journalism, Education, Forestry, Law, and Pharmacy and Allied Health Sciences.

The aim of the University is to provide its students with relaxing and meaningful learning experience with the best facilities possible. The administration, faculty and staff strive for this goal.

Academics at UM Add Up To Success

The University of Montana was recently awarded its 23rd Rhodes Scholar. This ranks UM 19th in the nation of all American colleges and universities in the number of Rhodes Scholars it has produced, and ranks sixth among schools west of the Mississippi. Students are chosen on the basis of scholarships, community and political involvement, athletic ability and personal character.

The Yellow Bay Biological Station, located about 70 miles northeast of Missoula at Flathead Lake, is the nation's oldest inland station. Among some 70 inland units in the United States, the UM ranks fifth for its program facilities and student population.

KUFM, a noncommercial public radio station operated by the radio-television department of the School of Journalism, is the only National Public Radio station in Montana.

University of Montana education majors compete very successfully for jobs with 93 percent of those with bachelor's degrees and 100 percent of those with graduate degrees finding appropriate positions.

The Department of Social Work is fully accredited by the Council on Social Work Education and is the only Montana school that assures its graduates of a year of advanced standing in graduate schools of social work.

The School of Journalism has had 23 of its students selected as Sears Congressional interns — more than any other journalism school in the country. During the four-month internship, students work for a United States Congressman or Senator and also attend classes.

The Department of Art enjoys a national reputation for excellence in ceramics.

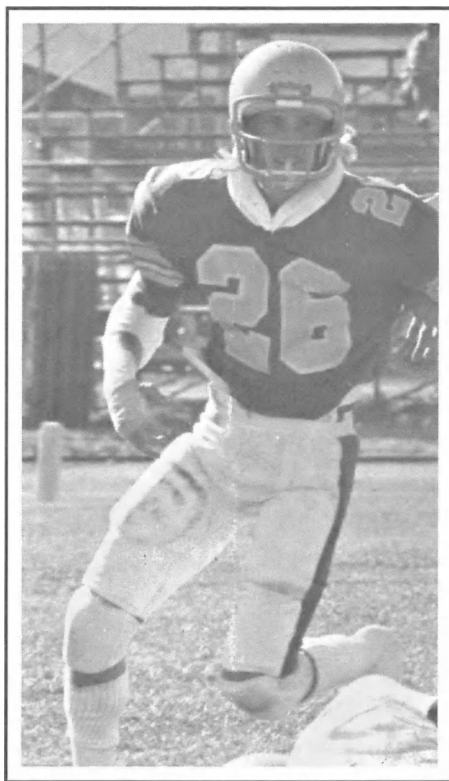
The Department of Drama/Dance has a professional theater group — the Montana Repertory Theater — based on campus. The Montana Repertory Theater, which tours throughout the Northwest, is the only professional Actors Equity company between Minneapolis and Seattle.

A University of Montana student has been chosen to receive a Truman Scholarship eight times. The national scholarship is given annually to students committed to a government career who have superior academic ability and leadership potential.

The Department of Anthropology has the largest collection of artifacts and records of pre-history in the region.

The School of Business is the only business school in Montana to be accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business.

Nearly 47 percent of the business school's accounting graduates pass the Certified Public

Accountant Exam on their first try. This is more than three times the national first-time success rate of 14 percent.

The Department of Geology has an outstanding national reputation. In coopera-

tion with Purdue University, a field station has been set up in southwestern Montana. The department also provides hands-on experience for students in the minerals, rocks and paleontology laboratories at the University's Seismic Station and in the Earthquake Research Laboratory.

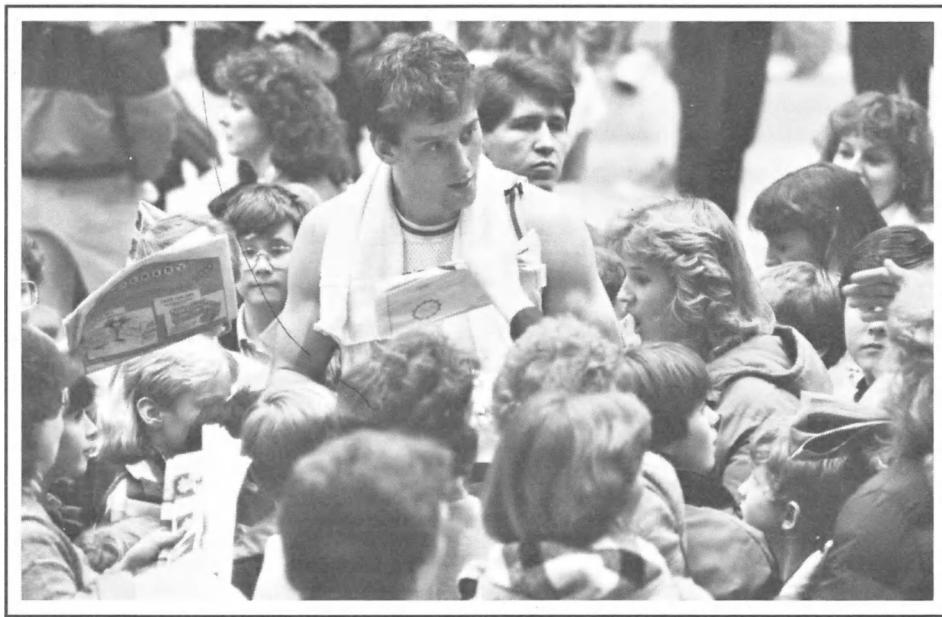
The Department of Geography has one of the region's best cartography laboratories where students learn to make maps and interpret aerial photography.

The Department of Health and Physical Education is one of a handful in the country that trains students to be athletic trainers. And it is the only program in the state to offer a master of science in physical education.

The Native American Studies program at the University of Montana is regarded by Indian educators as one of the four most outstanding in the nation.

Newly remodeled training facilities in the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders are some of the finest in the region. People from all over the state come to the center for speech, language and hearing therapy.

The Grizzlies have had six football Academic All-Americans in the last nine years. Most recently, current Grizzly player Rick Sullivan was named to the second team GTE All-American unit. Montana has had numerous Academic All-Americans in basketball and other sports as well. Last season the UM football team had six All-Big Sky academic selections.



Former Grizzly basketball star Larry Krystkowiak, who now plays professionally for the Milwaukee Bucks, was a two-time 1st team Academic All-American.



President James V. Koch

James V. Koch (pronounced Cook) became the 15th president of the University of Montana on June 30, 1986.

Before coming to UM he had been the provost and vice president for academic affairs at Ball State University, in Muncie, Indiana, since 1980.

Koch, 44, graduated from Illinois State University in 1964 with a B.A. in economics. He earned his Ph.D. in Economics from Northwestern in 1968.

From 1972 to 1978 he chaired the economics department at Illinois State University, leaving to serve as dean of the faculty of arts and sciences at Rhode Island University from 1978 to 1980. He has also been a visiting professor at several schools.

He has written many scholarly articles and four books. Honored as Illinois University Teacher of the Year in 1977-78, he has found time since becoming president to teach an undergraduate economics class. He has also traveled widely throughout Montana lecturing to high school classes and talking to community groups about the University.

He and his wife, Donna, have two children.



Athletic Director Harley Lewis

Harley W. Lewis is in his 11th year as athletic director at the University of Montana.

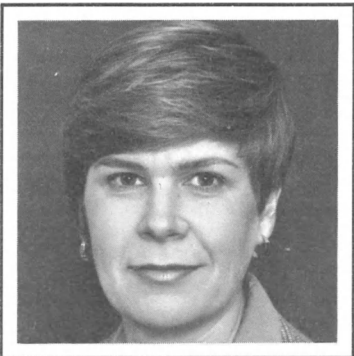
He is involved in numerous organizations at the state and national level. He was the State Director for the Montana Special Olympics in 1980 and 1981. He served as National Director for the USABA Blind Olympics in 1983, when the national championships were hosted by UM.

He was also chairman of a local school board, on the State Board of Directors for the Special Olympics, and on the Board of Directors for the YMCA. He is on several Big Sky Conference committees and on the NCAA's Track & Field Rules Committee.

He served as track and cross country coach until 1976 and his teams won nine league titles. Lewis was named the Big Sky's track and cross country Coach of the Year 10 times during his tenure. He coached several All-Americans and continues to work with the Montana Olympic Committee, of which he is on the State Board of Directors.

Lewis is a 1964 graduate of UM with an M.S. in Health, Physical Education and Recreation. He became track and cross country coach at Montana in 1966. Prior to that he coached for two seasons at the University of Portland. He is a 1959 graduate of Butte High School.

Lewis and his wife, Marilou, have two children.



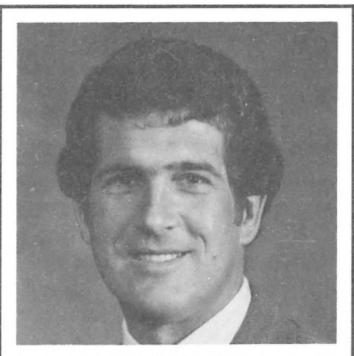
Associate Athletic Director Kathy Noble

Kathy Noble was named Associate Athletic Director at the University of Montana, August 20, 1987. She replaced Barbara Hollmann, who was named Dean of Students at UM after serving as associate athletic director for the past seven years.

Most recently Noble was the Assistant Director of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Public Facilities in Miami, Florida. She had been there for about two years.

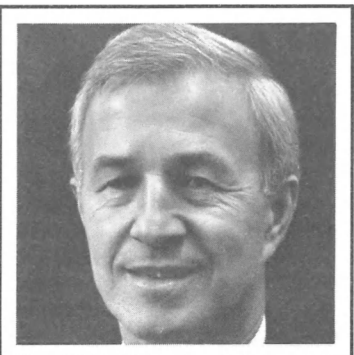
She has 14 years of experience in college administration. She was the Associate Athletic Director at the University of Miami from 1983-86. Prior to that she was an Academic Counselor in athletics at Boise State (1982-83) and the Residence Hall Director at Washington State (1976-82).

Noble earned her B.A. degree in Social Sciences at Central Washington University in 1971. She received a Master's Degree in Counseling at Washington State in 1979 and is currently a Ph.D. candidate in Counseling at WSU. She began her career in college administration at her alma mater, CWU, in 1971.



Manager of Athletic Services Gary Hughes

Gary became athletic ticket manager at UM in 1966. In 1978 he was appointed Manager of Athletic Facilities and Revenue. He manages all scheduling in Adams Field House, Washington-Grizzly Stadium and Dornblaser Track and Field in addition to overseeing the new TIC-IT-E-Z Ticketing System, all athletic revenue, concessions operations, all event staffing, and various other duties. He is a native of Ronan, Montana and graduated in accounting from Missoula Business College in 1962. He gained experience in accounting and auditing before assuming his responsibilities at Montana. Gary and his wife Judy have six children, Christian Ann, Dustin, Lance, Christopher, Sara and Cary.



Faculty Representative Robert Lindsay

Bob is beginning his 2nd year as UM's faculty representative to the National College Athletic Association.

Dr. Lindsay has been a faculty member at UM since 1967. He is a professor of History and served as the department chairman from 1975-78. His specialty is Early Modern European History. Lindsay won the Distinguished Teacher Award at UM in 1985. He has taught overseas for UM in France in 1970-71 and 1981.

He previously taught at Ohio University. He earned a Ph.D. and M.A. at the University of Oregon and an M.A. at the University of Minnesota. He received his B.A. at Nevada-Reno in 1953.

As the NCAA Representative, he will determine eligibility for UM athletes, make NCAA rulings at the institutional level and is UM's representative to the NCAA. He has served on UM's University Athletic Committee for numerous years and was once chairman of the committee as well.

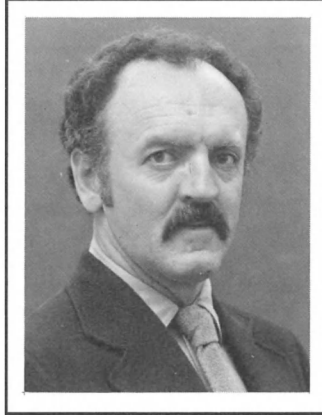

He was the media director for the United States Association for Blind Athletes 7th Annual National Championships in 1983. He is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CO-SIDA). He is a 1975 graduate of Fresno State and received a B.A. in Journalism. 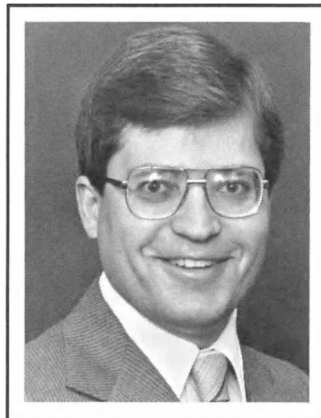
Carol Sharkey Taylor

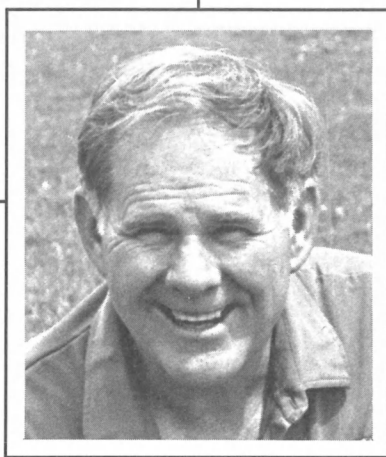
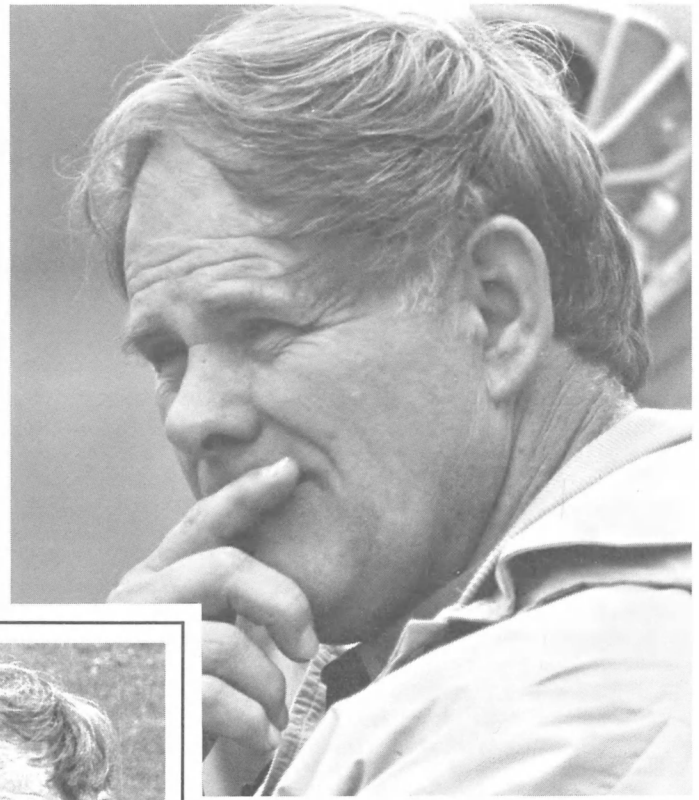
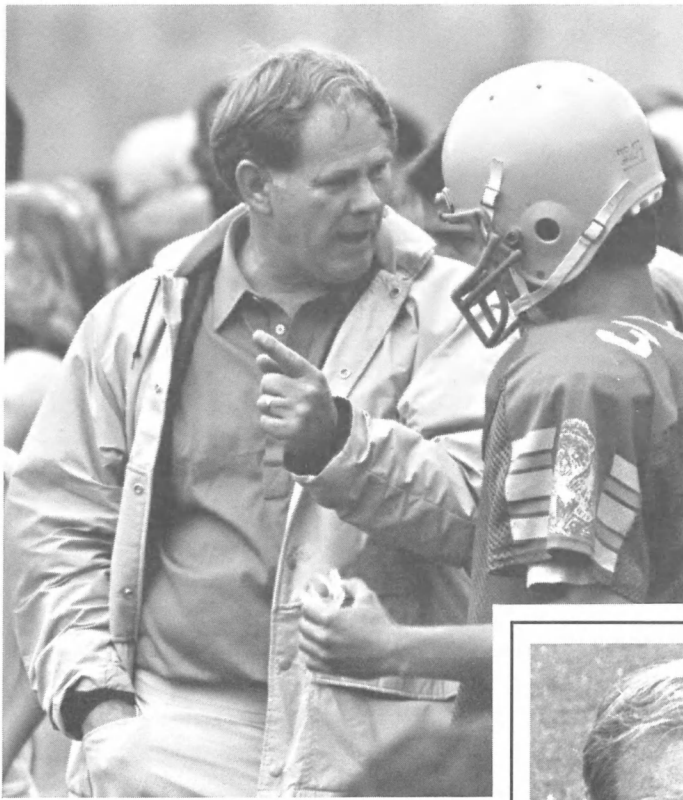

Chuck Maes
Assistant to the Athletic Director, Business Affairs

Chuck joined the Grizzly athletic department in June of 1988. As assistant to the athletic director he oversees all business affairs of the University of Montana athletic department. He also makes all departmental supply orders, manages the budget and gives budget approval. He is a 1985 graduate of UM with a B.A. degree in Business Administration, graduating with degrees in Accounting and Management. He came to work at Montana immediately after graduation from his alma mater as an accountant. In that capacity he was responsible for financial transactions in Intercollegiate Athletics and the Plant Fund accounting per state and local policies. He graduated from Anaconda High School in 1978 and was a track letterman as a prep. Maes, 28, is single.



Don Read

With winning seasons his first two years at the University of Montana, Don Read has already established himself in Grizzly coaching history. He is only the second coach to start his career at UM with back-to-back winning seasons. The last time that feat was accomplished was in 1910-11.

His two-year Big Sky Conference record is 9-7, compared to five league wins the previous three years. When Read became the 31st head coach at UM in December of 1985, he promised it would be a wide open pass-oriented team that he would put on the field. He and offensive coordinator Tommy Lee lived up to their pre-season promises as the Grizzlies broke virtually every UM passing record in 1986.

Since coming to Montana, Read's teams have continually ranked among the national leaders in several offensive categories, especially passing and scoring. In 1987, the Grizzlies were 13th in the nation in passing and 15th in scoring and were rated even higher in those categories the previous season.

In Montana's 91-year football history, the Grizzlies have won six or more games 14 times, and Read has accomplished that twice.

Read, 54, came to UM from Portland State University, where he was head coach from 1981 to 1985 and 1968-71. Sandwiched between the PSU stints were head jobs at Oregon (1974-76) and Oregon Tech (1977-80). In his first three head coaching jobs at PSU, Oregon and Oregon Tech, he turned losing programs around. His Oregon Tech teams were nationally ranked in 1979 (9th) and 1980 (7th).

In the 1984 season, Read led PSU to an 8-3 record and was named the Division II Coach of the Year after the Vikings won the Western Conference title.

Read's overall head coaching record is 114-107-1 and he is 81-100-1 at the collegiate level. He has 29 years in the coaching profession, beginning in 1959 as an assistant at Placer High in Auburn, California. His first head job was at Petaluma High in California in 1962.

He lives and coaches by personal philosophies. Some of these include:

"Success is a byproduct of hard work; expect players to make a positive commitment to football and other aspects of school life; football shapes character; a team must always play with emotion and intensity."

Read has written a book, *The Complete Passing Game*, worked football camps in eight states, and written almost 100 articles for athletic and coaching magazines.

At Oregon, he coached former All-Pro quarterback Dan Fouts of the San Diego Chargers and former pro QB June Jones at PSU. At Montana, he coached QB Brent Pease, now backup quarterback to Warren Moon of the Houston Oilers. Pease led the nation in total offense in 1986. This past season, UM quarterback Scott Werbelow was second in the nation in passing efficiency.

Read earned his undergraduate degree in Social Science in 1960, and his Master's degree in Health and Physical Education at Sacramento State two years later.

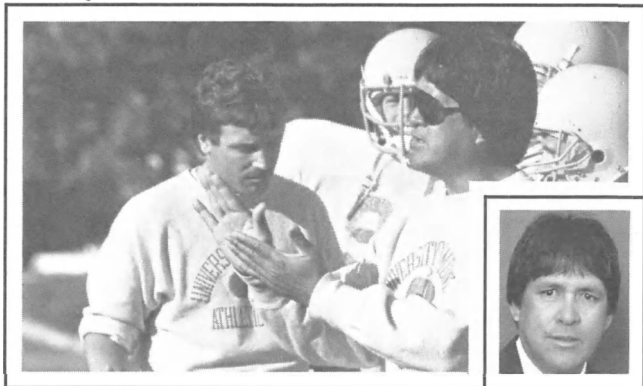
Don and his wife, Lois, have a daughter, Beth and son, Bruce. Bruce serves as UM's special teams coach.

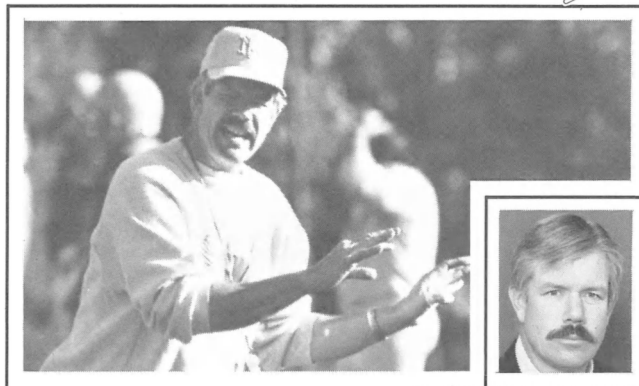

Tommy Lee

Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

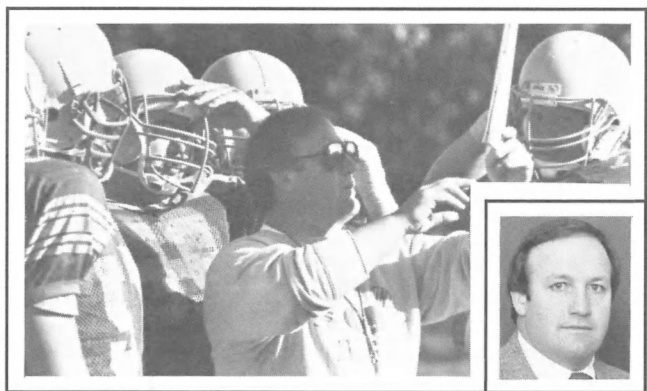
Montana's national ranking in offense the past two seasons, especially in the passing game, was largely due to the creative mind of Tommy Lee, and the time and effort he spends in fine-tuning UM's quarterbacks. At Portland State he was the offensive coordinator and in charge of recruiting for two seasons before coming with Don Read to UM. He was head coach at Willamette University from 1974 to 1982 and an assistant there the previous two years. He has three years of head coaching experience at Central Catholic High School in Portland. At Willamette he was an N.A.I.A. All-American quarterback in 1962, and received his B.A. degree there in 1963 in Physical Education. He later earned his Master's degree in education at Willamette. He played for Ottawa in the Canadian Football League. He served as athletic director at Willamette from 1974-82 and was an associate professor there as well. "I like a pro type of offense with emphasis on the passing game, involving the running backs," Lee said. "That offense has multiple sets with motion. I like to keep things simple with the end results being sound execution," Lee continued. Lee and his wife, Haunani, have three children. One son, Pohai, is a wide receiver at UM.



Bill Smith

Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Front

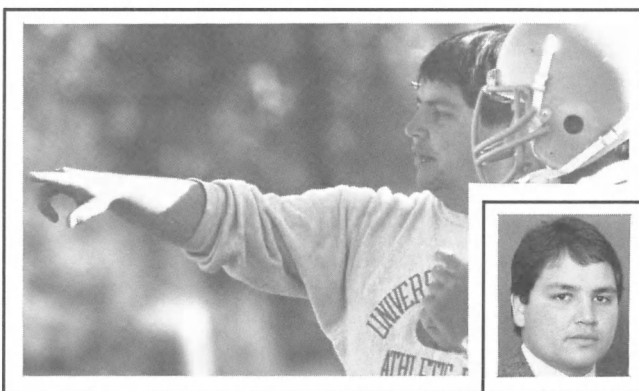
Smith was at Portland State with Read since 1980, and was defensive coordinator there, until coming to UM in 1986. He has coached virtually every defensive position during his tenure. He has nine years of coaching experience in the prep ranks in Idaho, Oregon and California. His 1984 PSU team gave up no touchdowns in league play. The 1987 Grizzlies were first in the Big Sky in scoring and rushing defense, interceptions, touchdowns allowed, completion percentage and second in overall defense. UM was ranked 7th in the nation against the rush in 1987. Smith also handled some of the administrative duties at PSU and does the same at UM, especially in the area of financial aid. He was an All-Coast center at the University of Oregon and graduated from there in 1967, earning a B.A. in History. He received a Master's in Education at UO. Smith, 43, played professionally for the Pittsburgh Steelers before being sidelined with an injury. He played junior college ball for his father, Lyle, a former athletic director at Boise State. BSU's football field was renamed the Lyle Smith Field in his father's honor. "We try to create a situation defense anticipating what the offense is going to do, then overplay that situation," Smith said. "I like to put pressure on the quarterback with our four front people," he said, "and play zone coverage behind them." Bill and his wife, Janine, have two children, a son, Riley, 13, and daughter, Ashley, 11.



Bob Beers

Offensive Line

Beers, last year's defensive line coach for the Grizzlies, is looking forward to coaching the offensive line in 1988, a position he is very familiar with, having coached it in the past. A former University of Montana football great, Beers was an inaugural member of the Grizzly Football Hall of Fame in 1982. He has 18 years of coaching experience, most recently as the head coach at West Linn High School in Oregon. He began his coaching career at his alma mater, coaching the linebackers for UM head coach Jack Swarthout in 1970-71. After that he was an assistant at Montana Tech from 1971-73. He has coached in the prep ranks for 12 seasons, beginning at Butte Central in 1974. He was an All-American at Columbia Basin Junior College and at Montana (1967-68). Beers, 40, is a 1970 graduate of UM with a degree in History & Health, Physical Education. His record as a high school coach was 64-35. "I think coaching is like teaching and is an educational experience that you want to make as positive as you can for the young men you coach," Beers said. "I want to make it a positive experience playing football and going to school at the University of Montana." Beers and his wife, Janelle, have a boy, Bobby, 15, and a daughter, Carl, 14.



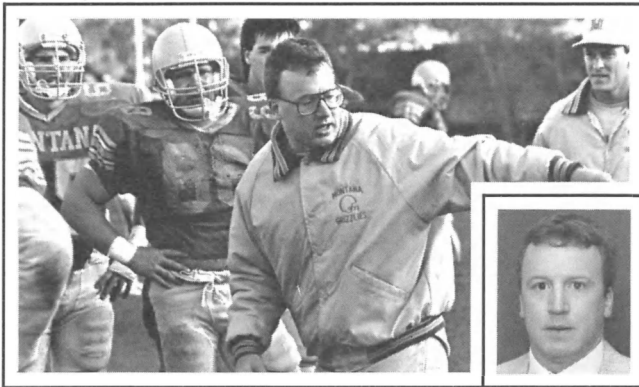
Jerome Souers

Defensive Backs

Souers (pronounced Sow-Ers) has 13 years of coaching experience, beginning at the high school level in Oregon. Before coming to UM, the 30-year-old was the secondary coach at Portland State for two seasons. He was the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Western Washington for a season before coming to PSU, and he coached at "AAA" prep level for eight years before that. His high school stints were at North Eugene and Willamette High schools. His father, Dwight, was a successful, well-known coach in Eugene. Jerome earned a B.A. in Physical Education at Oregon in 1983 and earned his Master's in P.E. at PSU in 1985. He and his wife, Paula, have a baby daughter, Anna. "We believe in playing aggressive, hard-nosed defense," Souers said. "We keep it simple, work hard at technique, and keep the emphasis on execution of our coverage responsibility."

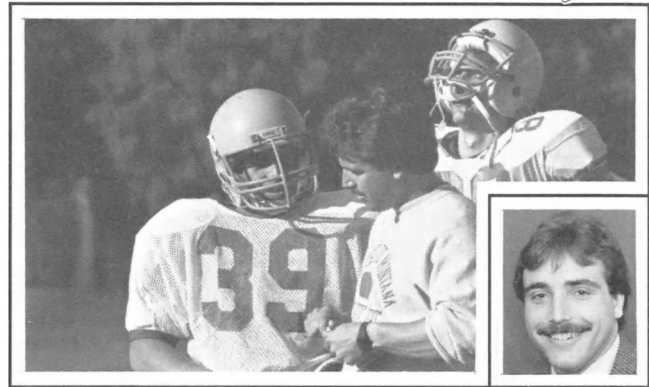

Wide Receivers/Running Backs

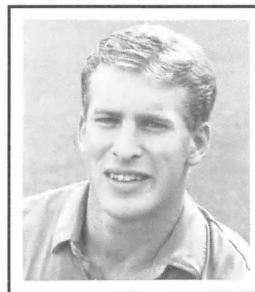

From 1983-85, he coached the wide receivers, was responsible for the skill positions in the kicking game and Director of Football Promotions at PSU. His Mt. "We go beyond players being just eligible to play and push them to realize they can also be an academic All-Big Sky player. We strive for academic as well as athletic excellence."

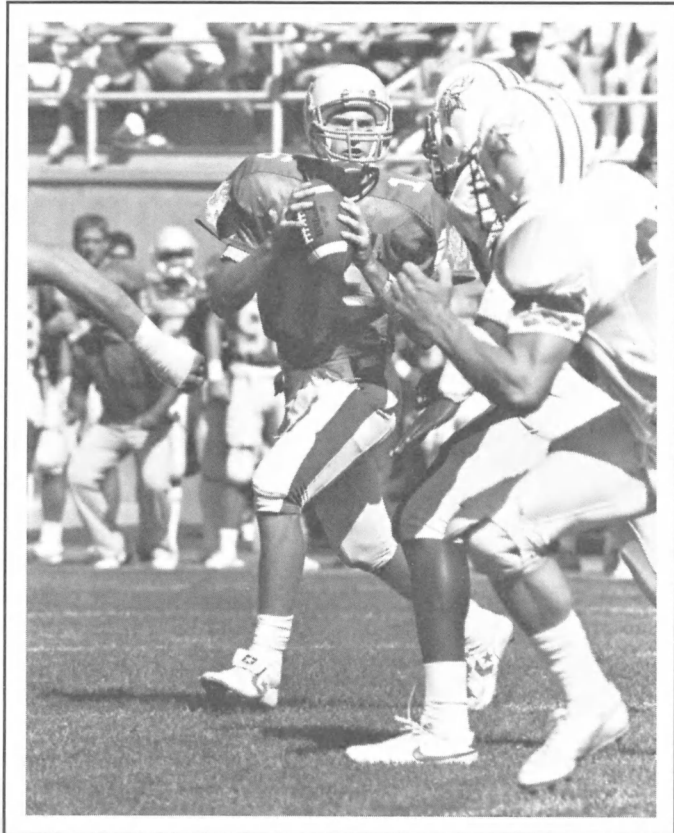


Griz Return 14 Starters In 1988



The University of Montana Grizzlies—the “Giant Killers” last season, know one thing for sure in 1988—they won’t sneak up on anybody. Last year UM was third in the Big Sky Conference at 5-3 and 6-5 overall.

Third year head coach Don Read returns 14 starters, eight of whom are on offense. The starters lost, especially on defense “will be impossible to replace, we’ll just have to get stronger in other areas instead,” Read said.



Sophomore quarterback Scott Waak will battle fellow soph Grady Bennett and frosh Brad Lebo for the starting job this fall at Montana.

After stumbling early to eventual Division II runnerup Portland State and Big Sky member Northern Arizona in their first two games, the Grizzlies caught fire. First Montana knocked off No. 1 ranked Reno, then traveled to Northern Iowa, defeating the 4th ranked Panthers 33-16.

A dramatically improved defense, led by All-Americans Pat Foster and Scott Camper, enabled UM to win six of its last nine games.

Montana ended its season on a winning note for the second straight year, winning three of its last four (the loss at 1-A Cal-Fullerton) games. In 1986 the Grizzlies won five of their last six games.

“We should be able to do a lot of the things we did last year,” said Read, who has a 12-9 mark at Montana. “The difference is at quarterback where we don’t have the experience but we have the talent.”

As in the past two seasons UM’s pass-minded offense was dependent on the development of an inexperienced QB. Last season fifth-year senior Scott Werbelow surfaced after getting his chance to play in the Northern Iowa game. He responded with a school record 65.8 passing percent, along

with 1,883 yards and 16 TDs, and was rated second in the nation in passing efficiency (161.6). Two seasons ago Brent Pease came on strong, passing for school records 3,056 yards and 30 TDs, and leading the nation in total offense (309.4 ypg).

Sophomores Scott Waak and Grady Bennett battled for the starting quarterback berth last spring and that competition carried over into the fall and opened the door for highly touted frosh Brad Lebo, from Lewistown, Idaho.

There was a big concern on offense with the loss of All-American and Blue-Gray Game participant Larry Clarkson at offense tackle, as well as All-Big Sky first team center Bill Venard.

However, the offensive line was one of the highlights of spring ball, as were running backs Renard Coleman, Jody Farmer and John Huestis. Young receivers Matt Clark and Mike Trevathan also return, along with tight ends Brad Salonen and Rob Kunka.

Back on the offense line are All-American candidate Kirk Scrafford and Jay Fagan at guards, along with fellow returning starters Tim Bradford at tackle and Honors Candidate Scott Hartman (1986 letterman) at center. Much experienced Tim Polich is at the other tackle spot.

The primary concern for Read and defensive coordinator Bill Smith is how to replace Foster and Camper, who together had 114 tackles, including 18 sacks and 30 tackles for losses. Those two players were a big reason Montana was 7th in the nation against the rush (111.0 a game) and second in the Big Sky in total defense (allowing 359.1 yards a game).

The good news is that first team all-leaguer Mike Rankin is back at middle linebacker, along with fellow defensive Honors Candidates Grey Nygren and Tim Hauck in the secondary.

Veterans Jason Ray and Rick Sullivan, also Honors Candidates, are returning starters on the defensive front. Ray was moved to end because of his quickness. Also starting on the line are senior lettermen J.C. Campbell at end and Greg Giannini at tackle. There is quality youth on the D-line, but they need experience.

Inside linebacker also has good quality with Rankin, Clay Clausen, Kevin Bartsch and Alex Hunter. The secondary will be improved with Nygren and Hauck, along with returning starter Quinton Richardson at cornerback and Dwayne Hans, an honorable mention All-Big Sky pick in 1986, and sophomore Mike McGowan.

At kicker senior letterman Jake Schloesser returns, but is expected to be in a fight for his job with freshman Kirk Duce from Missoula’s Hellgate High School. Duce or Farmer will handle the punting duties.

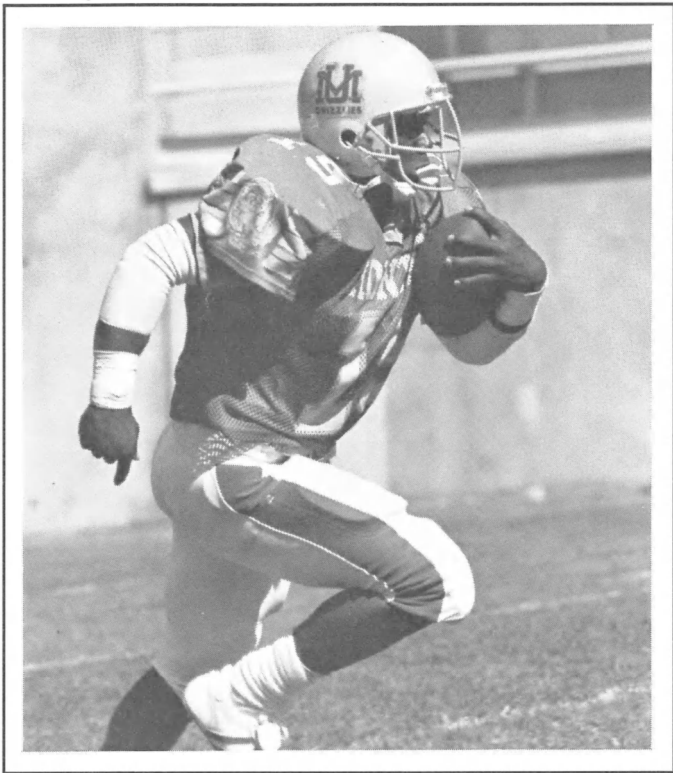
“I think we should be as good or better as last year on defense,” Read said. “The secondary will be improved and we have good linebackers with depth. There’s also pride there now—they play as a unit. We have physical kids on defense and better speed than we have had the past two years.”

With three wins over nationally ranked teams, their own national ranking (15th), another winning season, and six first team All-Big Sky picks, 1987 was a good one for Grizzly fans.

Read, his staff and players, hope the 1988 football slogan is indicative of what’s ahead—Oh, What A Feeling!



All-American Candidates



RENARD COLEMAN, HALFBACK/KOR 5-9, 190, Senior from Renton, Washington

The leading kickoff returner in 1-AA football in 1987, Coleman was also one of the top all-purpose runners in the nation.

His versatility can be seen in several areas. He averaged 29.4 yards on 20 kickoff returns, rushed for 477 yards and two TDs, and caught 24 passes for 149 yards in Montana's pass-oriented offense. He was co-winner of the Grizzlies' Terry Dillon Award, given to the "Outstanding Back."

"Two words best describe Renard and those are versatile and explosive," said head coach Don Read. "He is a big-play guy who is capable of winning a game anytime he touches the ball. He has super quickness and can run well inside and outside and catch the ball well too."

"He is tough and durable," Read continued. "We think he will once again be among the nation's leaders in kickoff returns. We see him as a professional football prospect because of his all-around ability."

"He is bigger than he's (he played at around 180 pounds last season) ever been at over 190 pounds, and he's also stronger, which will help this year. He had a super spring."

"Reno" was first in the Big Sky Conference in kickoff returns and was second team all-league in that category. He was 12th in the league in rushing and 5th in all-purpose yards with 110.4 a game. His long return was a 71-yarder against Nevada-Reno.

He was named Big Sky Offensive Player of the Week for his game against fourth ranked Northern Iowa. At UNI he had 12 carries for 93 yards and touchdown runs of 70 yards and one yard. He also had two catches for 10 yards and a TD.

KIRK SCRAFFORD, OFFENSIVE GUARD 6-7, 274, Junior from Billings, Montana

The University of Montana Grizzlies have had their share of professional offensive linemen in recent years with the likes of Steve Okoniewski, Barry Darrow, Terry Falcon and Guy Bingham, and others, and Kirk Scrafford could be headed in that direction too.

At 6-7, 274, the amiable "Scraffy" definitely has the size it takes to play in the National Football League. He also has the athletic ability and intelligence.

"The reason Kirk has so much tremendous potential as a pro prospect and college player is because he has all the ingredients it takes to make it," said head coach Don Read. "He can run very well (4.9 in the 40), he's tall and rangy at 6-7, so he has good leverage all of the time."

"He is smart (a two-time All-Big Sky Conference academic pick), extremely aggressive and hates to lose," Read said. "And one thing above and beyond all of that, he is so coachable. He learns fast."

"He's probably our No. 1 pro prospect and that's two years away," Read continued. "He's also a leader, and has taken up the slack as a leader this past spring. He is a player others watch, learn from and respect and is popular with the coaches and players."

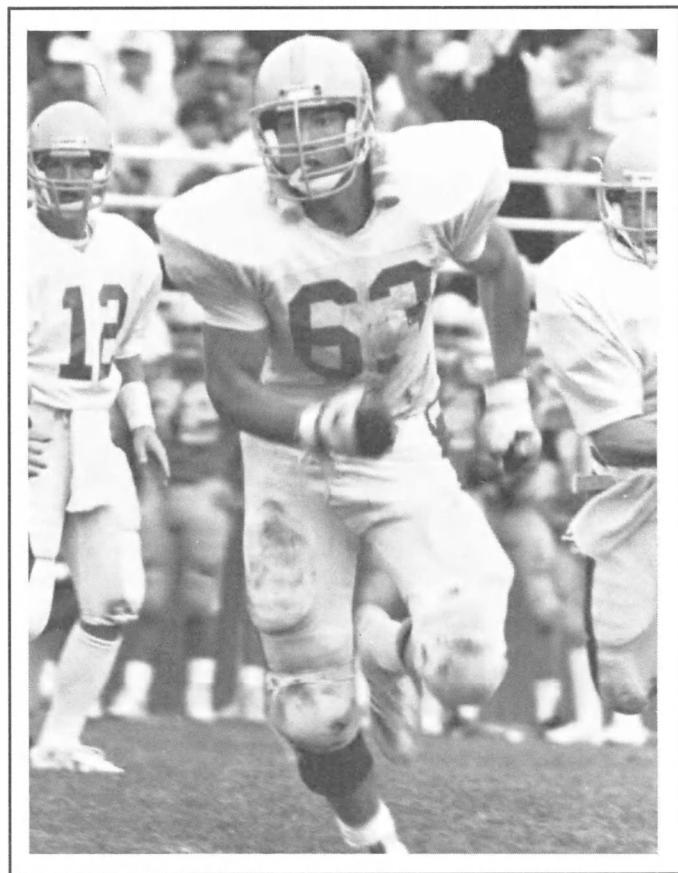
Not only does he have good speed, but continued hard work in the weight room has moved his bench press up to around 410 pounds, he runs the 20 in 2.81 and has a vertical jump of 33 inches.

He is a two-year letterman in track at UM and placed third in discus in the Big Sky Track & Field Championships last May in Moscow, Idaho, despite participating in football spring drills, and only throwing the discus a few times a week.

An Academic All-American candidate, he maintains a 3.41 GPA in Geology at Montana.

This will be Scrafford's third year as a starter.

He runs the 40 in 4.63.

Jason is the fourth leading returning tackler from last season when he had 57 tackles, including five for losses. He also recovered a team-high three fumbles, and blocked two kicks.

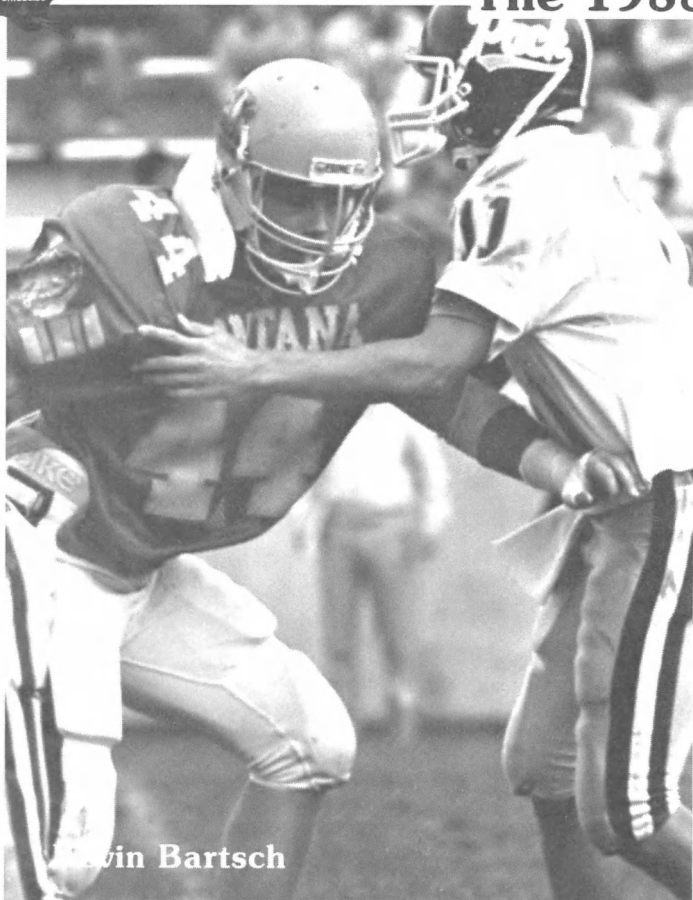

The date was October 25, 1969 in Portland, Oregon as two of the four undefeated Division II football teams faced off. The 6-0 Montana Grizzlies defeated the 6-0 Portland State Vikings 49-14 on their way to an undefeated regular season. Portland State would go 8-2 that year under their young, second-year head coach Don Read. . . .

In 1970 when the two teams met again the Grizzlies were 7-0 and PSU was 6-1 and they were once both nationally ranked. The Vikings were thwarted at the goal line by a Robin Peters interception to preserve a 31-25 Montana win, but not before Portland State had amassed 358 passing yards and Grizzly fans had seen the offense of the future. . . .

With Montana's women's basketball team playing the Stanford women in the NCAA last March and the men's basketball team scheduled to host the Cardinal here Nov. 17 in the pre-season NIT, it's interesting to note that the two schools last met in football 40 years ago this fall when Stanford prevailed in Palo Alto 39-7. . . .

Each of the last two seasons the Grizzlies have recorded three road wins, marking the first time in 16 years that the Grizzlies have won that many road games in consecutive seasons. The record for road wins is six, set in 1969. . . .

Grady Bennett is the third former All-State quarterback from Flathead High in Kalispell to attend the University of Montana on an athletic scholarship in the last 15 years, but the first to attend on a football scholarship. Both Rick and Scott Zanon earned All-State signal-caller status for the Braves, but both chose basketball, although Scott played football for the Griz in 1987 and shined in the Idaho State game with a near record-setting performance (six for 124 yards) returning punts.

Jack Swarthout recruited some outstanding athletes to the University of Montana in his nine years as head football coach (1967-75), but four years ago he had a significant part in recruiting Cheryl Brandell from Olympia High School in Olympia, Washington to come play for the Lady Griz basketball team. Swarthout coached nine years at Olympia's Capitol High after leaving Missoula. . . .

Fifty years ago among the Grizzlies' five home games was an encounter with De Paul, which is now famed for its basketball. The Grizzlies prevailed over the Blue Demons 7-6. Among the Grizzlies' road games that year were contests at University of San Francisco and Gonzaga—none of which still have football teams.

A win over the Bobcats this year would mark the first time in 17 years that the Grizzlies have beaten the Bobcats three years in-a-row. The Grizzlies did that in their "wishbone" years of 1969-71, when they didn't allow the Bobcats to score a touchdown for three straight years. . . .

A win over the Bobcats would also make Don Read the first Grizzly head coach to beat the Bobcats his first three years since Ed Chinske pulled the "Hat Trick" from 1952-54. . . .

The Grizzlies' season opener against Eastern New Mexico will be Montana's second meeting with a school from the Lone Star Conference. The Grizzlies opened the 1984 season by defeating Abilene Christian of the Lone Star, 42-28. . . .

Last year's 63-0 win over Idaho State marked the first Grizzly shut out of an opponent since a 27-0 whitewash of Northern Arizona in 1974. The win also marked the widest margin of victory by a Montana team since a 106-6 pounding of Montana Tech in 1924. . . .

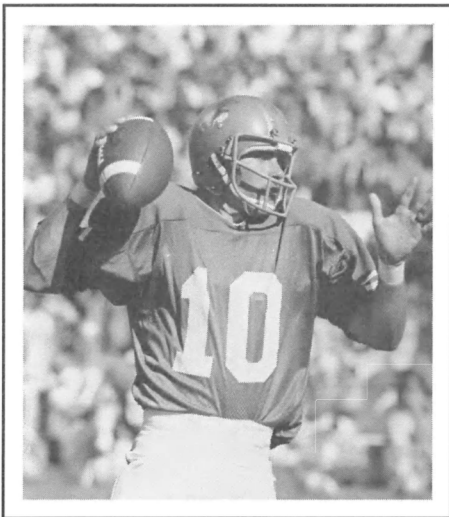
The Grizzlies have beaten Idaho State the last four times the two teams have met. The last time the Grizzlies beat an opponent more than four consecutive times was a string of eight straight defeats of Weber State from 1969-76. . . .

The Grizzlies have had only two undefeated regular seasons (1969 and 1970). The Grizzlies have played South Dakota State only twice, 1969-70! On September 10th South Dakota State ventures into Washington/Grizzly Stadium. . . .

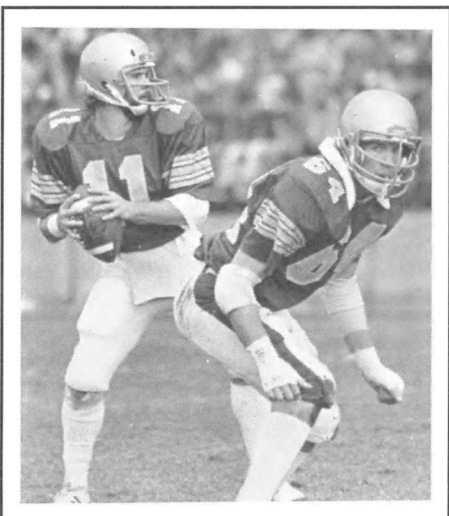
South Dakota State was the last non-Big Sky opponent the Grizzlies shut out, by a 24-0 decision in 1970. . . .

An ironic note on the South Dakota State game. The contract with SDSU was signed Easter week, rather appropriate for a game against the Jackrabbits. . . .

Grizzly fans will be treated to six home football games this fall for only the third time in modern Grizzly football history. Having bountiful home games at Montana has not always been the case with UM playing only four home dates in 1982 and a mere trio of home appearances as recently as 1973. . . .

Grizzly Trivia



Eight years ago the Big Sky Conference went to a sudden death playoff format for all conference football games. Montana and Eastern Washington are the only two schools not to have ever been in a sudden death game in the league. Of course Eastern just became a member of the league in 1987. Oddly enough Montana's last tie game was against Eastern Washington in 1984, a 14-14 deadlock. . . .

Montana's last tie game in conference play was a 35-35 contest with Idaho in 1974, which also was a "family tie." Montana quarterback Van Troxel's dad, Ed, was the Vandals' head coach. . . .

During the first 65 years of Grizzly football, Montana at various times played a variety of non-collegiate military or club teams. The Grizzlies' non-college opponents included Faraguet Naval Base, Butte Centervilles, and Anaconda Anodes. Before the rule was changed to ban non-college opponents for NCAA football teams in 1965 the Grizzlies closed out their 1964 schedule against the San Diego Marines, losing 33-7.

Head coach Don Read is an alumnus of Sacramento State. The Grizzlies played Sacramento St. in Missoula in 1926 with the Grizzlies winning 21-0.

It was 25 years ago this season that Montana began Big Sky Conference play, but their 1963 schedule is still heavily dotted with their former Skyline conference foes. The 1963 season saw Montana play schools like BYU, New Mexico, Colorado State and Wyoming for the last time. . . .

Speaking of BYU, Montana was the last team to hold the Cougars to "0" passing yards when the two teams met in 1960 (Montana's pass defense ranked second in the nation that year in fewest yardage allowed). . . .

This year marks the 10th Anniversary of one of the "cherished" Grizzly victories, a 24-8 decision over the MSU Bobcats. The Bobcats came into the game with a 7-1 record and No. 2 in Division 1-AA. The Grizzlies (who were 3-5) used the "Flexbone" offense and Rocky Klever and Tim Kerr ran wild over the Bobcats. . . .

This year marks the 40th Anniversary of the Grizzly-Bobcat game returning to a home-and-home format after being held in Butte every year from 1927 to 1947. . . .

Don Read made his college head coaching debut 20 years ago this September. The game was noteworthy beyond Read's debut. The contest at ISU Minidome was the first Division II game ever played indoors or on artificial turf. . . .

The lowest passing percentage the Grizzly defense has allowed in a Big Sky Conference game was .179 by Montana State (5-28) in 1971. Part of Montana's defensive secondary that day was a sophomore from Polson named Rob Stark, who is now the MSU track coach. The Grizzlies won that 1971 game 30-0. . . .

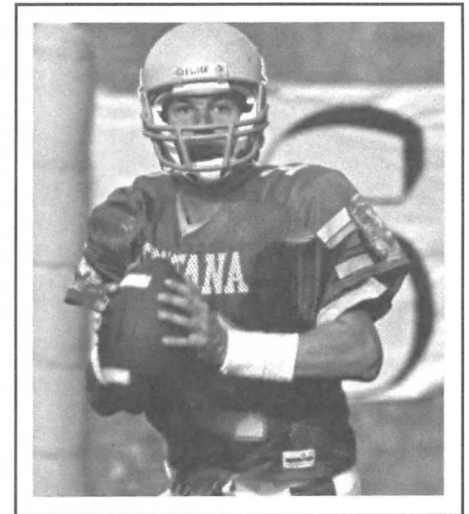
While the Grizzlies have never faced a Heisman Trophy winner in football (Montana did play against Heisman Trophy winner Terry Baker of Oregon State in basketball in 1963), they have faced an Outland Trophy winner (the award given to the outstanding college lineman). In 1954 Montana traveled to Iowa City to take on the University of Iowa and their star defensive demon Alex Karras. Then in 1961 Montana faced Merlin Olsen and Utah State. . . .

One of the great teams in Grizzly football history was the 1937 team which went 7-1, losing only to Idaho (when future Big Sky Commissioner Steve Belko intercepted a pass and scored the game's only TD). The Idaho loss cost the Grizzlies a Cotton Bowl bid that went to the University of Colorado, led by future Supreme Court Justice Byron "Whizzer" White. An added note on that Colorado team is their coach in 1937 was Bernard Oakes, who had been the Grizzlies' head coach from 1931-34 before taking over Colorado from 1935-40. Oakes compiled an 8-22 record at Montana before compiling the third winningest record in Colorado Buffalo history. Oakes also was head coach at Wyoming from 1941-43. . . .

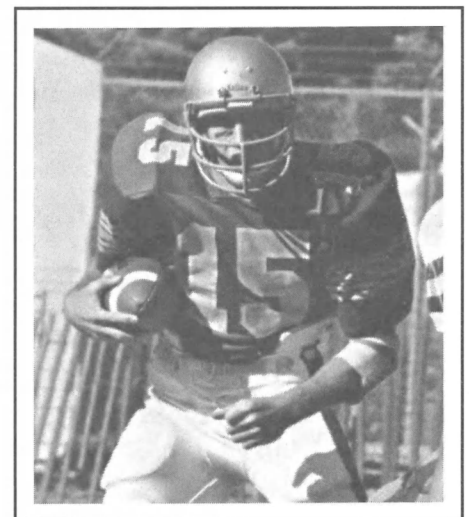
Another Grizzly coach that went on to have success at other colleges was Bernie Bierman, who besides putting together three national championships at Minnesota also won league titles for Tulane and Mississippi State. Both of those schools would have to wait over 30 years to win another league title after Bierman left.

During the 1980's the Grizzlies had recorded 37 victories, their intrastate rivals the Bobcats have recorded 32. The most wins in a decade for the Grizzlies occurred in the 1970's when they won 48 games. . . .

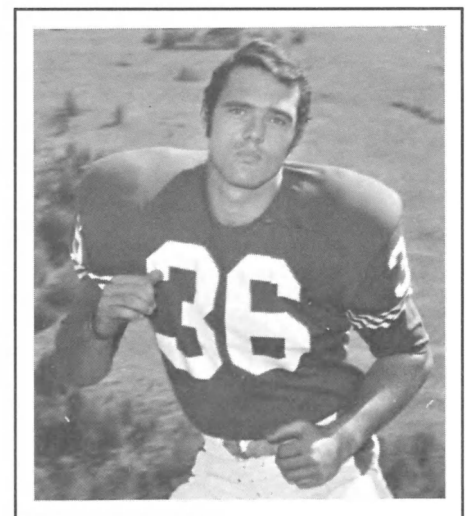
In the middle of the first quarter of last November's Montana Cal-Fullerton game Matt Clark of the Grizzlies caught a 43-yard scoring pass from Scott Werbelow to record the 25,000th point scored in a Grizzly football game since the sport was instituted at Montana in 1897.

Lorenzo Glenn, 5-10½, 165, *Fullerton JC, Fountain Valley, CA* . . . Leading receiver at Fullerton JC, where he was all-league for former Grizzly great and coach Hal Sherbeck . . . Was on team when coach Sherbeck recorded 200th victory . . . Joined Grizzlies last spring and suffered injury, but should be OK this fall . . . Prepped at Fountain Valley High . . .

John Ives, 6-0, 171, *North Valley High, Grants Pass, OR* . . . Led state in receiving and was only player in the state to make first team all-state on offense and defense two straight years . . . In two years he had 105 catches for 2,020 yards and 22 TDs and had 11 interceptions . . . Also lettered in baseball and track . . . His prep football coach was Roger Freeborn . . .

Throws the discus 175 feet and the shot put 55 feet . . . Also lettered in basketball . . . Deep snapper as well . . . Coach was Bob Bartlett . . . Prepped with UM's Tim Farley . . .

Corey Pilsch, 6-5, 262, *Flathead High, Kalispell, MT* . . . First team all-state and Shrine Game pick . . . Tabbed as the top lineman in Mon-

tana by Grizzly coaches . . . Also very good kicker and could be Griz kickoff man in future . . . Track letterman and avid weight lifter . . . High school coach was Bob Raeth . . .

Big Sky Conference



The Big Sky Athletic Conference is currently in its 26th season of operation with championships being conducted in 12 sports including men's and women's cross country, basketball, indoor track and field, tennis, outdoor track and field, women's volleyball and men's football. The Big Sky Conference has nine member institutions and is affiliated with NCAA Division I in all sports. In football the league competes in Division I-AA.

The 1988-89 athletic season in the Big Sky Conference is the first in which the league will sponsor championship competition in women's sports. On July 1, 1988, the Mountain West Athletic Conference, located in Cheney, Washington, merged with the Big Sky, moving and combining office staffs in Boise, Idaho. The Mountain West Conference had been in existence since 1982.

The Big Sky Conference consists of Boise State University, Boise, Idaho; Eastern Washington University, Cheney, Washington; University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho; Idaho State University, Pocatello, Idaho; University of Montana, Missoula, Montana; Montana State University, Bozeman, Montana; University of Nevada, Reno, Nevada; Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, Arizona; and Weber State College, Ogden, Utah. Formed in 1963, the Big Sky Conference consisted of charter members Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga (Spokane, Washington), Montana, Montana State and Weber State. Boise State and Northern Arizona joined the league July 1, 1970, in the Big Sky's first expansion. Nevada-Reno was admitted to the league July 1, 1979, replacing former charter member Gonzaga. On July 1, 1987, Eastern Washington became the Big Sky's ninth member. When all nine members of the Mountain West Conference and Big Sky Conference were parallel the way was paved to merge the two leagues.

The Big Sky Conference has member institutions in six states and covers more than 220,000 square miles (or almost 1/12th the total square miles in the continental United States). The six states included in the Big Sky Conference (Arizona, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Utah and Washington) span from the Canadian to Mexican borders. The Big Sky Conference is one of two major conferences located in the Rocky Mountain region.

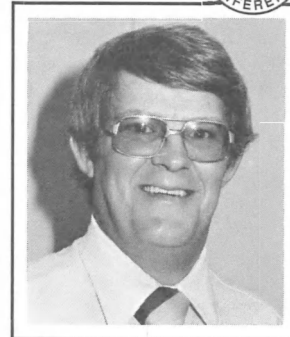
The name BIG SKY originated in a novel authored in 1947, by A. B. (Bud) Guthrie, of Great Falls, Montana, entitled THE BIG SKY. Jack Hollowell, former Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. Harry Missildine, of the Spokane SPOKESMAN-REVIEW, called for the Conference to be named "The Big Sky Conference" in his column of February 20, 1963. On February 25, 1963, the Conference name was adopted by the presidents of the newly formed league during a meeting in Spokane, Washington.

Ron Stephenson is the current Conference Commissioner, taking over the post July 1, 1981, from Steve Belko, who had served since 1977. John Roning was the league's second Commissioner, serving from 1971 until 1977. Jack Friel was the Big Sky's first Commissioner, serving from 1963 to 1971.

Dr. Sharon Holmberg currently serves as Co-Commissioner of the Big Sky Conference after guiding the Mountain West Athletic Conference from its beginning in 1982 until its recent merger with the Big Sky.

Arnie Sgalio serves as the Big Sky's Information Director beginning his 10th year in that position while Dale Kile is an Assistant to the Commissioner, coming to the Big Sky from the Mountain West Athletic Conference.

Art Mendini is in his first year with the Big Sky as the league's first full-time Supervisor of Officials while Kay Johnson is in her second year as the Conference Administrative Assistant.

Grizzly Awards



Each year seven outstanding University of Montana football players are recipients of awards.

The Terry Dillon Award, honoring the outstanding back, was established in 1964 following the accidental death of former Grizzly Terry Dillon. Dillon played defensive and offensive halfback for UM from 1960 to 1962. He started at defensive halfback for the National Football League Minnesota Vikings.

The Paul Weskamp Award was established in memory of Paul Weskamp, a tackle on Ed Chinske's 1954 Grizzlies. The award honors UM's outstanding lineman and was established by the citizens of Ronan, Mont.

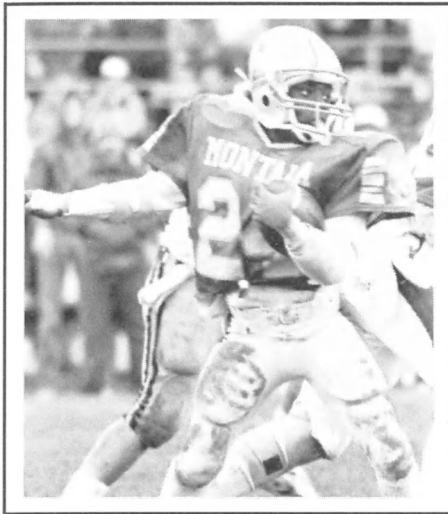
The Golden Helmet Award honors the hardest hitter on the team. It was set up on a nationwide basis by the Coca-Cola Company in 1967.

The Larry Miller Award is given in memory of the great Grizzly lineman and wrestler who competed for UM in 1969 and 1970. Miller died in an automobile accident in 1974. The award honors the teams' outstanding defensive lineman.

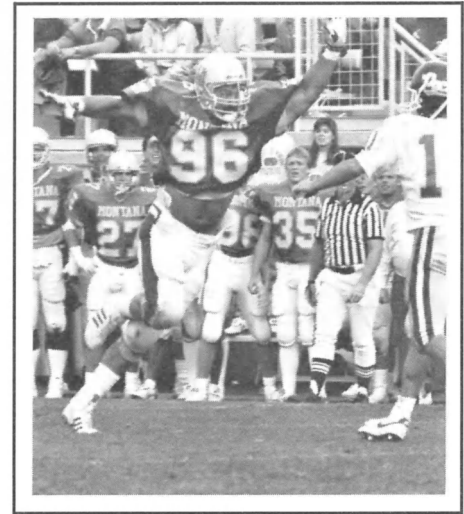
The Steve Carlson award is given to the teams' most valuable player in memory of the former Grizzly football player who died in 1977.

Pat Norwood was a four-year starter at offensive tackle for the Grizzlies 1978-82 from Billings, who died of cancer in 1983. This award is given to the Most Inspirational Player, who often times had to overcome an injury.

The Tom Barbour award is given in memory of a Loyal Grizzly Fan. It is presented annually to a UM player, "who best exemplifies outstanding practice habits and makes an unselfish contribution to the betterment of the Grizzly Football Team. Enthusiasm, dedication and commitment are the key factors sought in the person receiving this award."

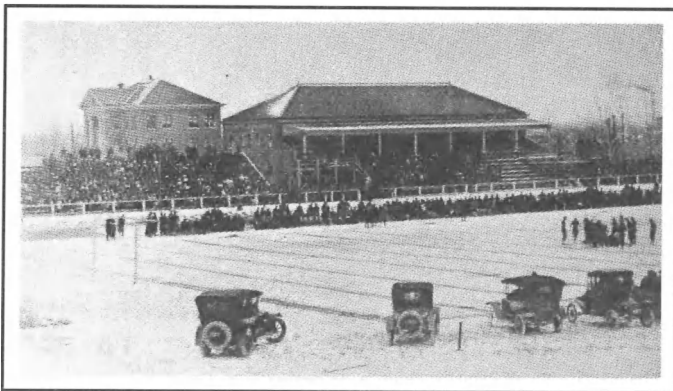

Washington-Grizzly Stadium

The stadium was in the proposal stage in 1976. Four years later — in 1980, a Regional/Urban Design Assistance Team (R/UDAT) study for facility need was implemented.

In January of 1984 UM hired the local architect firm of Fox, Ballas and Barrow.

After the UM Foundation began initial fund raising along with the University of Montana athletic department and Grizzly Athletic Association, the project got the boost it needed to become reality.

In August of 1985 Missoula businessman and stadium namesake Dennis R. Washington donated a major gift of \$1 million in the name of the Washington Corporations. Just four months later, in December of 1985, excavation crews began work.

The stadium excavation consisted of moving 70,000 cubic yards of dirt, which places the stadium playing surface about 20 feet below ground level. An estimated 4,500 yards of concrete was poured in the construction.

At the peak of its construction there were 180 craftsmen employed on the project and 27 con-

tractors, 24 of whom were from the state of Montana.

A 14,089-seat, natural grass stadium, the facility was paid for exclusively by private funds, the majority coming from Montanans, and of course the Washington Corporations.

The field area inside the stadium is 182 feet wide and 402 feet from end-to-end. The locker-room area is about 65 feet by 145 feet and located under the west side.

There are 39 private boxes on the east and west sides, which are awarded for 20-year periods to donors who make gifts of \$30,000 to \$100,000. There are still boxes available.

The press box is located above the private boxes on the west side and includes radio and TV booths, print media seating, coaches' boxes, public address booth and an area for the scoreboard operators. The Missoula Homebuilders Association built the press box, primarily with volunteer labor. Coca-Cola donated the scoreboard which was installed on the South side of the facility.

"There is not a better facility in the Big Sky Conference and Washington-Grizzly Stadium is something all Montanans can be proud of," said UM Athletic Director Harley Lewis, who worked on a major facility for UM since his tenure. "It is especially nice for our students, staff and the community. It was a long time coming, but definitely worth the wait."

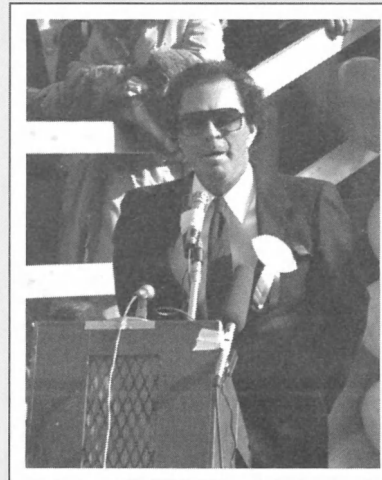
The stadium has the adaptability to be expanded to 20,000 seats and also be domed, Lewis said.

"Washington-Grizzly Stadium has been a tremendous plus for us not only for recruiting, but also from a motivation standpoint," said UM head coach Don Read. "The word is out that

Dennis R. Washington

In August of 1985 Missoula businessman Dennis R. Washington and the employees of the Washington Corporations brought UM's quest for a football facility to reality by contributing the largest corporate gift in the history of Montana — \$1 million. In recognition of Washington and his companies' gift, the stadium was named Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

Born in Spokane, Washington, Dennis Washington began work in the construction business the summer of his 15th birthday, going to work for his uncle, Bud King. The next 15 years saw him rise from foreman to project superintendent and finally Vice President of King-McLaughlin Construction Company.



In 1964 he resigned and formed Washington Construction with a \$30,000 loan and a leased tractor. The rest, as they say, is history. . . .

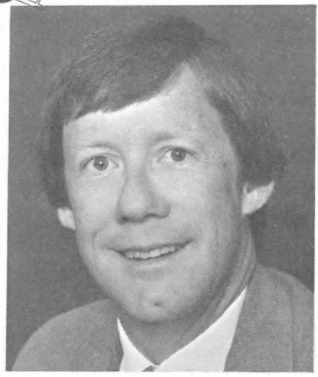
The Washington Corporations have since diversified from highway construction, to rental and transportation of heavy equipment, open pit mining, dam building, and most recently the Anaconda Mineral Companies' Butte properties.

Washington Corporations, headquartered in Missoula, now ranks among the nation's leaders in heavy highway construction. The operation extends in all states west of the Mississippi with 1,200 employees.

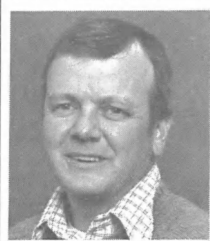

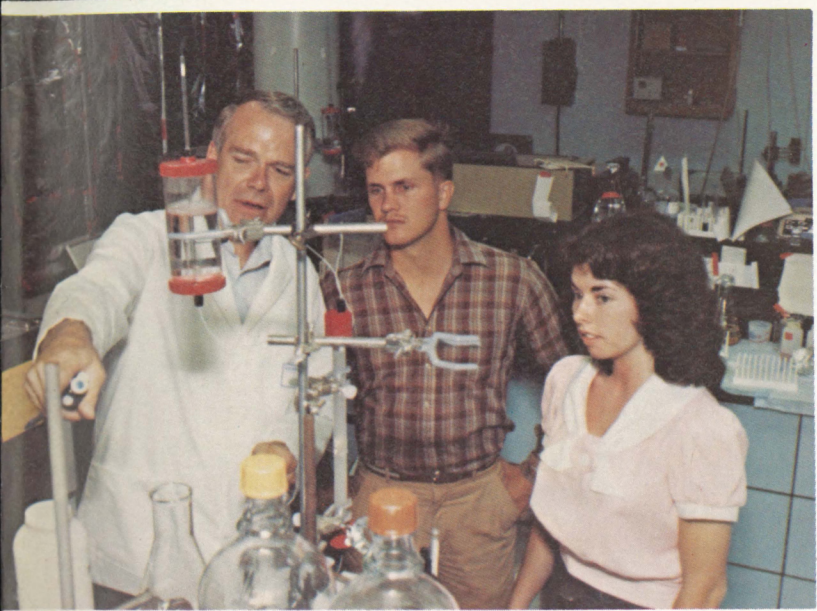
