





University of Montana



The University of Montana in Missoula is located in a mountain forest setting in beautiful Western Montana. It is halfway between Glacier and Yellowstone national parks.

Four wilderness areas are located near Missoula. The natural surroundings offer excellent opportunities for hunting, fishing, backpacking, river floating, camping and other outdoor recreational pursuits. Two excellent winter ski areas are located within minutes of the University. Several other ski areas are only a couple of hours away by car. UM owns and operates its own golf course adjacent to campus.

The University of Montana is one of the West's pioneers in education and was chartered February 17, 1893. The school opened in September 1895, with 50 students enrolling the first day. Located on 201 acres at the base of Mount Sentinel, UM has grown from 50 students and seven faculty members to a present enrollment of 9,679 and approximately 408 full-time faculty positions.

Through its history, the University of Montana has

sustained a high standard of academic excellence in teaching, research and service.

UM offers associate of arts degrees in two areas and bachelor's degrees in 58 fields. It offers master's degrees in 54 programs and doctoral degrees in 13.

The College of Arts and Sciences, which is the core of the University, includes a full range of programs and courses in the life sciences, physical sciences, social sciences and humanities. The College also offers curricula in interdisciplinary fields ranging from ethnic studies to interdepartmental studies.

Seven professional schools complete the academic program — Business Administration, Fine Arts, Journalism, Education, Forestry, Law, and Pharmacy and Allied Health Sciences.

The aim of the University is to provide its students with relaxing and meaningful learning experience with the best facilities possible. The administration, faculty and staff strive for this goal.

Academics at UM Add Up To Success

The University of Montana was recently awarded its 25th Rhodes Scholarship. UM ranks 18th of all American colleges and universities in the number of Rhodes Scholars it has produced, fifth among public universities. Students are chosen on the basis of scholarship, leadership, energy, community and political involvement and character.

The UM Biological Station at Flathead Lake, located about 85 miles northeast of Missoula, is the nation's oldest inland station. The UM research station is one of the finest facilities in the country for freshwater research.

KUFM, a non-commercial public radio station operated by the radio-television department of the School of Journalism, is the only National Public Radio station in Montana.

University of Montana education majors compete very successfully for jobs with 88 percent of those with bachelor's degrees and 95 percent of those with graduate degrees finding appropriate positions.

The Department of Social Work is fully accredited by the Council on Social Work Education and is the only Montana school that prepares its graduates to apply for advanced standing in graduate schools of social work.


The School of Journalism has had 25 of its students selected as Sears Congressional interns — more than any other journalism school in the country. During the four-month internship, students work for a United States Congressman or Senator and also attend classes.

The Department of Drama/Dance has a professional theater group — the Montana Repertory Theatre — based on campus. The Montana Repertory Theatre, which tours throughout the Northwest, is the only professional Actors Equity company between Minneapolis and Seattle.

Eight University of Montana students have been chosen to receive Truman Scholarships. The national scholarship is given annually to students committed to a government career who have superior academic ability and leadership potential.

The Department of Anthropology has the largest collection of artifacts and records of pre-history in the region.

The School of Business is the only business school in Montana to be accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business at the graduate level.



Bridget Clarke is the University of Montana's 25th Rhodes Scholar.

More than 55 percent of the business school's accounting graduates pass the Certified Public Accountant Exam on their first try. This is more than three times the national first-time success rate of 18 percent.

The Department of Geology has a national reputation. In cooperation with Purdue University, a field station has been set up in southwestern Montana. The department also provides hands-on experience for students in the minerals, rocks and paleontology laboratories at the University's Seismic Station and in the Earthquake Research Laboratory.

The Department of Geography has one of the region's best cartography laboratories where students learn to make maps and interpret aerial photography.

The Department of Health and Physical Education is one of a handful in the country that trains students to be athletic trainers. And it is the only program in the state to offer a Master of Science in Physical Education.

The Native American Studies program at the University of Montana is regarded by Indian educators as one of the four most outstanding in the nation.

Montana had four Academic All-Americans in 1988 in Mike McGowan, Rick Sullivan, Brad Salonen and John Huestis—the most by any Division I program in the nation. Last season the UM football team had 17 players named to the All-Big Sky Conference academic team, more than any other conference school. Montana has had numerous Academic All-Americans in other sports as well.



Senior linebacker Mike McGowan sacks Jackson State quarterback Shawn Gregory in UM's 48-7 first round playoff win over the Tigers last season. McGowan has been a first team GTE Academic All-American the previous two seasons and maintains a 3.97 GPA.



Administration



George Dennison became the 16th president of the University of Montana on August 15, 1990. He replaced James V. Koch, who is now the president at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Va.

Before coming to UM Dennison was provost and vice president for academic affairs at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, a post he had held since 1987.


He is a former resident of Kalispell, and a UM alumnus. A history professor, he earned two degrees in that field at UM: a master's in 1963 and a bachelor's with highest honors in 1962. In 1967, he completed a doctorate in history at the University of Washington.

Prior to joining Western Michigan's administration, he held a number of jobs at Colorado State University between 1969 and 1987. They include admissions and records director; associate academic vice president; graduate school associate dean; associate dean of the college of the arts, humanities and social sciences; and history professor.

Dennison and his wife, Jane, also from Kalispell, have two children.

Athletic Director

William H. "Bill" Moos became athletic director at UM in April of 1990. He replaced Harley W. Lewis, who is now the assistant director of championships for the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Moos was most recently an associate athletic director at his alma mater, Washington State University. In that position his responsibilities included fundraising, marketing and promotions, ticket sales, public relations, and management of the regional Cougar Club offices.

At Montana Moos' primary duties will be to oversee the entire athletic department operation.

He graduated from WSU in 1973 with a degree in History. As an athlete he was all-conference and All-Pacific Coast in football. He capped his Cougar career by playing in the East-West Shrine Game in 1972.

Following graduation, Moos worked for a short time in the nation's capital before going into private business. He then returned to WSU as an assistant athletic director in 1982, and remained there until coming to Montana.

Bill and his wife, Kendra, have three children: Christa, 9, Brittain, 6, and Bo, 1.


Kathy became associate athletic director at Montana in August, 1987. Last year she served as interim athletic director, overseeing two I-AA football playoff games, as well as the Big Sky Conference women's basketball tournament, and an NCAA first round game in women's basketball.

She was instrumental in UM's bid for a Women's Western Regional Basketball Tournament, recently granted to Montana in March of 1993.


Most recently Noble was the Assistant Director of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Public Facilities in Miami, Florida.

In 1977 Century Club raised approximately \$70,000 for intercollegiate athletics. Last year the G.A.A. generated over \$500,000 in private support with emphasis primarily on athletic scholarships, but the G.A.A. assists in all phases of athletic department operations.

He came to UM from California Lutheran University, where he had served as the Director of Alumni/Parent Relations from 1971 to 1977. He served in the U.S. Army from 1968-71 and in Vietnam from 1969-70, receiving many commendations. He is an alumnus of C.L.U., where he was a three-sport letterman and voted the Outstanding Senior Athlete in 1967.


Al and his wife, Chris, have three children: Kim, 21, Matt, 18, and David, 16. Matt will play basketball at UM this year.

Gary became athletic ticket manager at UM in 1966. In 1978 he was appointed Manager of Athletic Facilities and Revenue.





Bob and his wife, Joyce, have four children.




Athletic Personnel


Carol Sharkey






Chuck Maes

Chuck joined the Grizzly athletic department in June of 1988. As assistant to the athletic director he oversees all business affairs of the University of Montana athletic department. He also makes all departmental supply orders, manages the budget and gives budget approval. Head Coach



Don Read

Don Read has rejuvenated University of Montana football in his four years, as his teams have gone 6-4, 6-5, 8-4, and 11-3. During that time UM has been 22-10 in Big Sky Conference games, after winning a total of three league games the previous three years.

The Grizzly football program reached new heights in 1989. UM won a school record 11 games, advanced to the I-AA semi-finals, and finished the season ranked sixth in the nation.

Read was recognized for UM success last season, as he was named the Big Sky's Coach of the Year. He became the second coach in UM history to win the award and the first since Jack Swarthout was honored back-to-back years in 1969-70.

Read's UM teams have never had a losing season, and his 31 career wins are third most in school history. In Montana's 93-year football history, the Grizzlies have won six or more games 16 times, and Read has accomplished that all four of his seasons at UM.

His 66.0 winning percentage is sixth best in Big Sky history, and the second highest of any active conference coach.

Read, 56, came to UM from Portland State University, where he was head coach from 1981 to 1985 and 1968-71. Sandwiched between the PSU stints were head jobs at Oregon (1974-76) and Oregon Tech (1977-80). In his first three head coaching jobs at PSU, Oregon, and Oregon Tech, he turned losing programs around. His Oregon Tech teams were nationally ranked in 1979 (9th) and 1980 (7th).

In the 1984 season, Read led PSU to an 8-3 record and was named the Division II Coach of the Year after the Vikings won the Western Conference title.

Read's overall head coaching record is 133-114-1. He has 31 years in the coaching profession, beginning in 1959 as an assistant at Placer High in Auburn, California. His first head job was at Petaluma High in California in 1962.

He lives and coaches by personal philosophies. Some of these include: "Success is a by-product of hard work; expect players to make a positive commitment to football and other aspects of school life; football shapes character; a team must always play with emotion and intensity."

Read has written a book, *The Complete Passing Game*, worked football camps in eight states, and written almost 100 articles for athletic and coaching magazines.

At Oregon, he coached former All-Pro quarterback Dan Fouts of the San Diego Chargers and former pro QB June Jones at PSU. At Montana, he coached quarterback Brent Pease, who led the nation in total offense in 1986.

Read earned his undergraduate degree in Social Science in 1960, and his master's degree in Health and Physical Education at Sacramento State two years later.


Don and his wife, Lois, have a daughter, Beth, and a son, Bruce. Bruce serves as UM's special teams coach.


Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

Montana's national ranking in offense, three of the last four seasons, was largely due to the creative mind of Tommy Lee, and Montana's pass-minded offense. He works in close proximity with the quarterbacks, and in his four seasons at UM he coached QBs Brent Pease (formerly with the Houston Oilers) and current QB Grady Bennett. Both players set single-season passing records during their careers.

At Portland State he was the offensive coordinator and in charge of recruiting for two seasons before coming with Don Read to UM. He was head coach at Willamette University from 1974 to 1982 and an assistant there the previous two years. He has three years of head coaching experience at Central Catholic High School in Portland. At Willamette he was an N.A.I.A. All-American quarterback in 1962, and received his B.A. degree there in 1963 in Physical Education. He later earned his master's degree in education at Willamette. He played for Ottawa in the Canadian Football League. He served as athletic director at Willamette from 1974-82 and was an associate professor there as well.

Lee and his wife, Haunani, have three children.

"We are a pro-type of offense with emphasis on the passing game. We like to use multiple formations and also include motion from our receivers and running backs. We try to keep things simple with the end result being sound execution."



Jerome Souers


Defensive Coordinator/Secondary

Jerome Souers (Sow-Ers) begins his second season as defensive coordinator and his fifth as secondary coach. Last year the Grizzlies were first in the nation against the rush, allowing 70.2 yards a game. In 1988 UM led the Big Sky Conference in pass defense and total defense for the first time in school history, and tied a school record with 28 interceptions.

Before coming to UM, he was the secondary coach at Portland State for two seasons and served in a similar position at Western Washington for a season prior to the PSU job. He coached at "AAA" prep level for eight years at North Eugene and Willamette High schools. His father, Dwight, was a successful, well-known coach in Eugene. Jerome earned a B.A. in Physical Education at Oregon in 1983 and earned his master's in P.E. at PSU in 1985.

He and his wife, Paula, have a two-year-old daughter, Anna.

"We believe in playing aggressive, hard-nosed defense. We keep it simple, work hard at technique, and keep the emphasis on execution of our coverage responsibility."



Bob Beers


Assistant Head Coach/Offensive Line

Montana's offensive line has been a focal point at UM for the past three seasons, and Bob Beers is one of the big reasons for that. Last season both tackle Kirk Scraford and guard Jay Fagan earned All-American status. They were also all-league, along with fellow starters Tim Polich, Rick Erps and Chad Germer. Bob worked with the defensive line in 1986-87.

A former Grizzly football great, Beers was an inaugural member of the Grizzly Football Hall of Fame in 1982. He was an All-American at Columbia Basin Junior College and at Montana (1967-68). He has 19 years of coaching experience. Before returning to UM as a coach, he was the head coach at West Linn High School in Oregon. He began his coaching career at his alma mater, working with the linebacksers for UM head coach Jack Swarouth in 1970-71. After that he was an assistant at Montana Tech from 1971-73. He coached in the prep ranks for 12 seasons, beginning at Butte Central in 1974. His record as a high school coach is 64-35. Beers, 42, is a 1970 graduate of UM with a degree in History & Health, Physical Education.

He and his wife, Janelle, have a son Bobby, 17, and daughter Cari, 16.

"I think coaching is like teaching and is an educational experience that you want to make as positive as you can for the young men you coach. I want to make it a positive experience playing football and going to school at the University of Montana."



Robin Pflugrad

Wide Receivers/Running Backs/Administrative Assistant

Pflugrad (pronounced Flew-Grad) wears several hats as he coaches the wide receivers/running backs, and is the academic coordinator, which involves eligibility for all of UM's football players. He is also in charge of compliance rules for the NCAA and the Big Sky Conference.


He was a standout wide receiver at Portland State during the Neil Lomax era and was team captain and a second team Academic All-American in 1979. For three seasons at PSU he coached the wide receivers and was also director of football promotions. His Mt. Hood Junior College teams were 20-2 in 1976-77, and first in the nation in '77 when he was all-conference. He was receiver and secondary coach at South Eugene High School in 1982 and has served as a coach and counselor in football camps since 1981. He received his B.S. degree at PSU in Business Administration in 1980 and his Oregon Teachers Certificate in Business Education in 1984. He and coach Jerome Souers played high school basketball together at North Eugene High.

Pflugrad, 32, and his wife, Marlene, have a daughter Amanda, 3, and a son, Aaron, 1.

"I feel it's important for the receivers and running backs to have a very positive experience in football. Within our offensive system, they have the ability to stand out, while also having fun, because they're so involved in our pass-oriented offense."



Assistant Coaches



Kraig Paulson
Linebackers

Kraig begins his third season as a full-time Grizzly assistant coach and his fourth season at UM.

He is a four-year letterman for the Grizzlies, from 1982-86. This will be his second year working with the linebackers.

In 1987 he served as a graduate assistant working with the secondary and special teams.

His sophomore season at UM he was named the Outstanding Sophomore. As a prep at Plentywood High School, he was a two-time all-state pick in football and lettered four times in football and track.

Three brothers, Kevin, Kerry and Keith, all ran track for the Grizzlies, and another brother, Kent, ran track at Western Montana College. Kent is the current head boy's basketball coach at C.M. Russell High in Great Falls.

"Kluey" began his coaching career at Rocky Mountain College, where he served as secondary coach from 1985-87.



Special Teams




He and his wife Christina have a three-year-old son, Justin.

"There is no other phase of the game more exciting or big-play oriented than special teams," Read said. "Our players know this, and we place a lot of emphasis on the kicking game."



1990 Grizzly Football Outlook



With back-to-back appearances in the I-AA football playoffs, the University of Montana football team will be hard-pressed for an encore performance for the 1990 season.

Last season the Grizzlies not only won a school record 11 games, going 11-3, but they also advanced to the national semi-finals, losing to eventual champion Georgia Southern, and finished the season ranked sixth in the country.

There are 16 starters back from that record-setting team, along with 47 lettermen and nine All-Big Sky Conference selections.

However, gone from the '89 team are two-time conference defensive MVP Tim Hauck at safety, as well as three-time first team all-

league leader, and is one of the best athletes in our program," Read said. "We also have a lot of confidence in Brad (Lebo), who brings us a pro-type throwing dimension."

With the return of Clark, Trevathan, Whitney, Shannon Cabunoc and Joe Farris at receiver, "our depth there is better than ever." Junior speedster Tony Roberts could be a factor, along with JC transfer Marvin Turk, and redshirt freshmen Bill Cockhill and Chris Jenkins.

Sophomore letterman Rice, junior college transfer Marc Monestime and redshirt freshman Ted Riddall make running back a very solid position, with a couple of other JC transfers also vying for playing time. "This position is a lot like the defensive line depth-wise," Read said.

On the offensive line, Erps and senior Rick Kuhl are at guards, Gilbreth and redshirt junior Steve Premock are at tackles, and Germer will start at center. There is decent depth at tackle with Bryan Payne and JC transfer Jason Barker. Veteran Scott McCoy is a solid player, and redshirt freshman Frank Garrett is a fine, young prospect.

Six of Montana's seven-plus starters back on defense are 1990 honors candidates. That group includes Tripp, OLB Mike McGowan, safety Galen Lawton, cornerback Kevin Morris, and linemen Joe Kalafat and Kirk Murphy.

The Grizzlies were among the I-AA leaders in numerous defensive statistics. UM was first in the nation against the rush, allowing 70.2 yards a game, and first in the Big Sky in scoring defense, allowing 19.3 points per game.

Other starters back on "D" are linebackers Steve Collins and Paul LeProwse, and linemen Nels Kludt, Thad Huse and Wade Thoemmes. Junior Gregg Smerker could start left end, and sophomore Kelly McCallum is just one of several up-and-coming young players.

"We have lots of depth at end and tackle, with an extreme variety of styles," Read said. "We have strength and quickness, and more depth than any other position on the team."

McGowan is UM's leading returning tackler, with 82 stops last year, while Tripp is second with 70. Collins, LeProwse and sophomore Chad Lembke are all big-play calibre players. One or more of the four quality incoming freshmen linebackers could see playing time in their initial seasons.

Sophomore letterman Sean Dorris is the heir-apparent at free safety. He replaces Hauck, who was a finalist for the Walter Payton Award, given to the I-AA Player of the Year. At strong safety Lawton is the third leading returning tackler, as he had 57 stops and four interceptions in '89. He was a second team all-league pick last year.

Morris is the incumbent at right corner, while Don Graves, also a senior, will get the nod at left corner. Transfers Clarence Reese and Dethrick Slocum were quality corners in their junior college programs, and could be impact players.

With Farmer gone the punting job is up for grabs between Whitney and Kirk Duce. Farmer has been an All-American punter the last two seasons, and was ranked third in the nation last season and second the previous year.

Duce has been among the league leaders in field goals the past two seasons. His 157 career points is the fifth most in UM history. In last year's playoffs he was a perfect six-for-six in field goal attempts, making all four tries against Eastern Illinois.


Cabunoc, a junior, was one of the top returners in the league last year, as he was second in kickoff (21.8 average) and punt returns (9.4 average).

Read said the 1990 schedule, "starts out awfully tough at Oregon State, but if we've ever had a team with enough talent, this is the one. McNeese State will also be a tough non-league game for us."

The Grizzlies open their Big Sky season at home against Eastern Washington, Sept. 29, and also play Northern Arizona, Montana State, and Idaho at home.

"Eastern came on strong the last half of the season last year, and are a difficult conference opener," Read said. "But, we play three of our first four games at home, and that's a positive."

"If you're going to win the Big Sky, momentum is a big factor, and our schedule gives us a chance for that momentum," said Read, who was chosen as the Big Sky Coach of the Year in 1989. "The league will again have good balance, and although Idaho should be good, the gap between Idaho and the rest of the league has closed."

league linebacker Mike Rankin. On offense UM lost All-Americans Kirk Scraftord and Jay Fagan from the offensive line, and punter/halfback Jody Farmer.

"The interesting thing about the 1989 team is that it was basically a no-name team, except for a couple of players, and the '88 team (which went 8-4) had a lot of sophomores and juniors," said fifth-year UM head coach Don Read.

"We made some changes last year, but the big thing was that we had the offense rise to the occasion one day, and then the defense would come through in the next," Read said. "I feel there is room for improvement on this football team, and we have many key players back for their senior seasons."

One of those key players is senior quarterback Grady Bennett, a second team All-Big Sky selection, who set UM single-season records with 3,091 yards passing and 3,281 total yards. The 6-3, 205-pounder was fifth in the country in total offense with 298.3 yards a game. He passed for 20 touchdowns and ran for five more.

UM was one of the top offensive teams in I-AA last season, ranked 15th in the nation in total offense, averaging 412.1 yards a game. UM was fourth in I-AA in passing, averaging 300.1 yards a game.


All-league honorable mention players back on offense are senior receivers Mike Trevathan and Matt Clark, and junior linemen Chad Germer and Rick Erps. Another starter back on offense is receiver Craig Whitney, as well as half-time starters Tony Rice at halfback and Damon Gilbreth at tackle.

Three of UM's four 1990 All-American candidates are on offense. They include Bennett, Trevathan and Germer. The Grizzlies' defensive nominee is inside linebacker Bryan Tripp.

"We have potential to improve, but that doesn't relate to the win-loss column," Read said. "The big thing for us is that we don't just have players with experience, but we have players who have won, too. The combination of the two is a double plus."



All-American Candidates



GRADY BENNETT 6-3, 205, QUARTERBACK, SENIOR from KALISPELL, MONTANA

Grady came into his own as one of the premier quarterbacks at the Division I-AA level last season, starting all 14 games in Montana's record-setting, 11-3 year.

He broke four school records last season, including 3,091 yards passing, and his 4,773 yards passing is second most in Grizzly history, trailing only Marty Mornhinweg (6,083 yards, 1980-84). He was fifth in the nation in total offense last year, averaging 298.3 yards a game.

He was rewarded for his consistent play last year, as he was named to the Big Sky Conference's second team. He passed for 200 or more yards in 10 of 11 regular-season games, had five games in which he passed for more than 300 yards, and threw for 350 or more yards four times.

In 1989, he passed for two touchdowns or more in seven games, and had three or more TDs in three contests. He is also a very effective ball-carrier, scoring five times via the rush.

"We have high expectations of Grady for the 1990 season, because he improved drastically last year," said UM head coach Don Read. "He has a ton of confidence. When you size up the conference, Grady's experience and ability add up to an outstanding senior year.

"Grady is a well-balanced quarterback," Read continued. "He's a good passer, sees the field well, thinks well under pressure, and can move his feet very well. He is one of the best all-around athletes I've ever coached, and I think he could be a dominant player in several sports."

He set a school record with 3,281 total yards, rushing for 190, and passing for 3,091. He also set school standards for completions (247) and most plays (531) last year.

His career-bests are 396 yards passing in a 48-13 home win over Boise State in '89, and he rushed for 55 yards in a 40-22 home victory over Nevada last year.

Bennett received the Tony Barbour Award last year, given annually to the UM player "who best exemplifies outstanding practice habits and makes an unselfish contribution for the betterment of the team."

A redshirt in 1987, Bennett transferred to UM from Montana State.

At Flathead High School he was an all-state quarterback, honorable mention all-state in basketball, and all-conference in track. His prep grid coach was Bob Raeth.

He has been an All-Big Sky all-academic choice the past two years, maintaining a 3.13 GPA in Business Education.

This past December he married the former Amy Schuldheiss.

CHAD GERMER 6-6½, 271, CENTER, JUNIOR from THREE FORKS, MONTANA

One of the primary reasons for Montana's offensive success last season was Chad, who was an honorable mention All-Big Sky Conference selection as a sophomore.

In 1989 the Grizzlies were 15th in the nation in total offense (412.1 yards per game), fourth in passing (300.1 ypg), and ninth in scoring (33.0 ppg).

Germer, who started in all 14 games in '89, was named Montana's co-Sophomore of the Year, sharing the award with defensive end Kirk Murphy.

"Chad is one of three great centers I've had in my coaching career," said Grizzly head coach Don Read; "and the other two played in the National Football League. They were Chuck Bradley (Chargers) and Fred Quillen (49ers).


"Chad has tremendous feet, plays aggressively, and has good size which helps him in both run and pass blocking," Read said. "He rarely makes mistakes and plays with a lot of confidence all of the time.

"Last year we had no fumbles due to a center snap, which certainly is an outstanding statistic," said UM line coach Bob Beers. "Chad called all of our signals on the offensive line. He is strong (385-pound bench press) and fast (4.74 in the 40).

"He is just a very, very solid performer, and made very few mistakes as a sophomore," Beers said. "He was not only one of our most consistent players, but he also improved every game."


He was all-state in football and basketball at Three Forks High School, and also lettered in track. His high school football coach was Dan Rask.

MIKE TREVATHAN 6-1, 185, WIDE RECEIVER, SENIOR from THOUSAND OAKS, CALIFORNIA

Great hands, patterns and speed best describe Mike, who had exactly 1,000 receiving yards last season, counting the three I-AA playoff games. He led the team with 710 yards receiving in the regular season.

An honorable mention All-Big Sky Conference pick last year, he was eighth in the league in receiving with 4.2 catches a game. He was UM's co-Junior of the Year, sharing the award with cornerback Kevin Morris.

He enters the 1990 season ranked eighth in career receiving yards with 963, and his 710 yards last year rank him fifth in single-season history.

"Mike's ability to get open and catch the ball is as good as anyone in collegiate football today," said UM head coach Don Read. "He's a big-play kid, who could easily be one of the true outstanding returners in college football today, if we used him there."

"He's smart and tough, and very consistent," Read said. "We throw to a lot of receivers (eight with 10 or more catches in '89), thus he doesn't accumulate the stats that a receiver of his ability would normally have."

Trevathan had career-highs of 10 catches for 153 yards in Montana's nationally televised game with Idaho last year. In an early-season win over Portland State he had eight receptions for 142 yards and a touchdown.

In the 1989 playoffs he had two 100-yard receiving games against Jackson State (8-147-2) and Eastern Illinois (7-102-0) in first round and quarterfinal games, respectively.

Injuries plagued him his first two seasons at UM, but he started all 14 games in '89.

At Thousand Oaks High School he had an outstanding senior year with 48 catches for 785 yards and six touchdowns, and he had four interceptions. He was first team All-C.I.F., All-Area, All-Valley and first team all-league for coach Bob Richardson.

He capped his senior year in the Ventura County All-Star Game, scoring three TDs, and was named the Offensive Player of the Game. (Pronounced Treh-vay-than)

Montana's second leading returning tackler, Bryan had 70 stops last year, including five sacks and three tackles for losses.

He was in the linebacker rotation prior to the season, and started the last 10 regular-season games and all three playoff games, when starter Paul LeProwse was forced to miss the season with an injury.

In his first collegiate start he had 10 tackles against Fresno State. He had seven or more tackles in six of 11 regular-season games. He had a career-high 14 tackles in a 17-2 road win at Montana State last year.

He was an honorable mention All-Big Sky Conference selection in 1989. He was also named to the conference's all-academic team, with a 3.18 GPA in Business Administration.


"Bryan is as tough as any linebacker we've had at Montana," said Grizzly head coach Don Read. "He's an aggressive, smart, hard-working, competitive player. He's a leader and a team guy, who should have a super year."


"He is also an excellent pass blocker," Read said. "He is an experienced lineman now, and anchors our offensive line. I think he is one of the best in the Big Sky."

Joe was co-winner of the Larry Miller Award last year, which is given annually to UM's Outstanding Defensive Lineman. He shared the award with Dan Edwards.



Kirk Murphy, Defensive End

6-3, 259, Junior from Polson, Montana

One of Montana's top returning tacklers, Kirk had 31 tackles last season, along with three sacks and two tackles for losses. He had a rare interception for a defensive lineman against Boise State, and returned it 18 yards for a touchdown.

"Murph" also had four fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and a blocked field goal in 1989. He was named the Grizzlies' co-Sophomore of the Year, sharing the award with center Chad Germer.



At Polson High School he was first team All-State at tight end and defensive end as a senior for coach Jerry McCullough. He also lettered in basketball, baseball and track as a prep.



Big Sky Conference



The Big Sky Athletic Conference is currently in its 28th season of operation with championships being conducted in 12 sports including men's and women's cross country, basketball, indoor track and field, tennis, outdoor track and field, women's volleyball and men's football. The Big Sky Conference has nine member institutions and is affiliated with NCAA Division I in all sports. In football the league competes in Division 1-AA.

The 1988-89 athletic season in the Big Sky Conference was the first in which the league will sponsor championship competition in women's sports. On July 1, 1988, the Mountain West Athletic Conference, located in Cheney, Washington, merged with the Big Sky, moving and combining office staffs in Boise, Idaho. The Mountain West Conference had been in existence since 1982.

The Big Sky Conference consists of Boise State University, Boise, Idaho; Eastern Washington University, Cheney, Washington; University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho; Idaho State University, Pocatello, Idaho; University of Montana, Missoula, Montana; Montana State University, Bozeman, Montana; University of Nevada, Reno, Nevada; Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, Arizona; and Weber State College, Ogden, Utah. Formed in 1963, the Big Sky Conference consisted of charter members Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga (Spokane, Washington), Montana, Montana State and Weber State. Boise State and Northern Arizona joined the league July 1, 1970, in the Big Sky's first expansion. Nevada-Reno was admitted to the league July 1, 1979, replacing former charter member Gonzaga. On July 1, 1987, Eastern Washington became the Big Sky's ninth member. When all nine members of the Mountain West Conference and Big Sky Conference were parallel the way was paved to merge the two leagues.

The Big Sky Conference has member institutions in six states and covers more than 220,000 square miles (or almost 1/12th the total square miles in the continental United States). The six states included in the Big Sky Conference (Arizona, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Utah and Washington) span from the Canadian to Mexican borders. The Big Sky Conference is one of two major conferences located in the Rocky Mountain region.


The name BIG SKY originated in a novel authored in 1947, by A. B. (Bud) Guthrie, of Great Falls, Montana, entitled THE BIG SKY. Jack Hollowell, former Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. Harry Missildine, of the Spokane SPOKESMAN-REVIEW, called for the Conference to be named "The Big Sky Conference" in his column of February 20, 1963. On February 25, 1963, the Conference name was adopted by the presidents of the newly formed league during a meeting in Spokane, Washington.

Ron Stephenson is the current Conference Commissioner, taking over the post July 1, 1981, from Steve Belko, who had served since 1977. John Roning was the league's second Commissioner, serving from 1971 until 1977. Jack Friel was the Big Sky's first Commissioner, serving from 1963 to 1971.


Dr. Sharon Holmberg currently serves as Co-Commissioner of the Big Sky Conference after guiding the Mountain West Athletic Conference from its beginning in 1982 until its merger with the Big Sky in 1988.

Arnie Sgalio serves as the Big Sky's Information Director, and is beginning his 12th year in that position.

Art Mendini is in his third year with the Big Sky as the league's first full-time Supervisor of Officials while Kay Johnson is in her third year as the Conference Administrative Assistant.



Grizzly Awards



Each year seven outstanding University of Montana football players are recipients of awards. The Terry Dillon Award, honoring the outstanding back, was established in 1964 following the accidental death of former Grizzly Terry Dillon. Dillon played defensive and offensive halfback for UM from 1960 to 1962. He started at defensive halfback for the National Football League Minnesota Vikings.

The Paul Weskamp Award was established in memory of Paul Weskamp, a tackle on Ed Chinske's 1954 Grizzlies. The award honors UM's outstanding lineman and was established by the citizens of Ronan, Mont.


The Golden Helmet Award honors the hardest hitter on the team. It was set up on a nationwide basis by the Coca-Cola Company in 1967.

The Larry Miller Award is given in memory of the great Grizzly lineman and wrestler who competed for UM in 1969 and 1970. Miller died in an automobile accident in 1974. The award honors the teams' outstanding defensive lineman.

The Steve Carlson award is given to the teams' most valuable player in memory of the former Grizzly football player who died in 1977.

Pat Norwood was a four-year starter at offensive tackle for the Grizzlies 1978-82 from Billings, who died of cancer in 1983. This award is given to the Most Inspirational Player, who often times had to overcome an injury.

The Tony Barbour award is given in memory of a Loyal Grizzly Fan. It is presented annually to a UM player, "who best exemplifies outstanding practice habits and makes an unselfish contribution to the betterment of the Grizzly Football Team. Enthusiasm, dedication and commitment are the key factors sought in the person receiving this award."

A third-and-14 Bennett to Mike Trevathan pass to the MSU five-yard-line was the key play, as Bennett took it in three plays later. LBs Mike Rankin and Bryan Tripp each had a game-high 14 tackles. MSU linebacker Mychal Kempt had 13 stops and a sack.

GAME NOTES: The Thanksgiving vacation crowd of 11,854 (the largest of any I-AA first round game) held its collective breaths when the Tigers capitalized on a UM fumble, as QB Shawn Gregory hit a wide open Tim Barnett for a 48-yard TD to give JSU an early 7-0 lead. The Grizzlies then scored in five of its next seven possessions, and Gregory left the game with an injury early in the second quarter. Bennett and frosh Brad Lebo passed for 450 yards and five TDs. For the first time in history three UM receivers had 100 yards or more receiving. Bennett passed for 239 yards and three TDs—all in the first half. The Tigers had just one net yard rushing as UM had nine sacks (JSU had seven), three by end Dan Edwards, and two by OLB Mike McGowan. Kicker Kirk Duce overcame a hard, frozen field and was perfect on four field goal attempts, and was six-of-six in FGs in the playoffs. Trevathan had his second straight 100-yard receiving game. "True" freshman Mike Rummell had career-highs of seven catches for 85 yards and a TD for the Panthers. GSC scored two TDs in the first half on a blocked punt (Farmer's second of his career) and a "Hail Mary" pass at the halftime gun. Farmer rushed for 66 yards and a score, and also scored on a reception. UM's Glenn had nine catches for 118 yards. Rankin had a game-high 14 tackles (35 in the playoffs), while Hauck had 11 (32 in the playoffs), plus an interception. For GSC it was their 36th straight home win. GSC won the national title with a 37-34 victory over Stephen F. Austin, going 15-0. All four of the Eagles' playoff wins, including the national championship game, were at home.






