





"He Had a Heart as Big
as a Grizzly's"

A lot of people knew Al Manuel as "The Mayor of Alberton." Al was born, raised and lived in Alberton until his death in July of 1993. He lived there all of his 65 years, except for a stint in the Navy in the mid-40's. He could also be known as "The Mayor of Western Montana," or, even more appropriately: "The Ambassador of Montana (Grizzly) Athletics."

Al's second home was The University of Montana. He attended virtually

every home football game of his alma mater (1952) since returning home from World War II and the Navy in November of 1947. That's 45 years of Grizzly football -- a total 229 straight games!

In 1957, Al became an integral part of Grizzly football, basketball, and track. He kept statistics in football and basketball, and was a timer at track meets. He broke me in on the stat crews in 1978 when I came to UM as sports information director. "The Mayor" continued working at Grizzly games and meets until he passed away.

Al always had a smile on his face. That smile and his love for life were contagious, as thousands of people know. Folks took an instant liking to this kind, unpretentious man, who gave so much of himself to all of us, adults and children alike.

I couldn't help thinking of Al during last year's 1993 football season as the Grizzlies went 10-1 in the regular season and a perfect 7-0 in the Big Sky Conference enroute to the league crown. I know "Big Al" was smiling for coach Don Read and his teams' success. Al may not have been watching from his usual spot in the press box – but you know he was watching.

You can be a cheerleader up there, Al, and criticize the officiating – and not worry about being tagged with that "homer" label. As a matter of fact, we understand that a lot of your new friends have traded in their U of H(eaven) shirts for U of Montana attire.

Al will remain an integral part of Grizzly Athletics and be recognized for his five decades of service to UM. Starting in 1995, Montana's annual invitational track meet will be called "The Al Manuel Invitational." Also, a likeness of him will be on permanent display in the Washington-Grizzly Stadium press box.

The University of Montana



The University of Montana in Missoula is located in a mountain forest setting in beautiful western Montana. It is halfway between Glacier and Yellowstone national parks.

Four wilderness areas are located near Missoula. The natural surroundings offer excellent opportunities for hunting, fishing, backpacking, river floating, camping and other outdoor recreational pursuits. Two excellent winter ski areas are within minutes of the University. Several other ski areas are only a couple of hours away by car. UM owns and operates its own golf course near the campus.

The University of Montana is one of the West's pioneers in education and is celebrating its Centennial this year, as it was chartered February 17, 1893. The school opened in September 1895, with 50 students enrolled the first day. Located on 207 acres at the base of Mount Sentinel, UM has grown from 50 students and seven faculty members to a present enrollment of almost 11,000 and approximately 450 full-time faculty positions.

Throughout its history, the University of Montana has sustained a high standard of academic excellence in teaching, research and service.

UM offers a general associate of arts degree and bachelor's degrees in 50 fields. It offers master's degrees in 45 programs and doctoral degrees in nine.

The College of Arts and Sciences, which is the core of the University, includes a full range of programs and courses in the life sciences, physical sciences, social sciences and humanities. The college also offers curricula in interdisciplinary fields such as ethnic studies and liberal studies.

The University also has schools of business administration, fine arts, journalism, education, forestry, law, and pharmacy and allied health sciences.

The University aims to provide its students a humane and productive learning experience with the best facilities possible. The administration, faculty and staff strive for this goal.



President George Dennison

George Dennison became the 16th president of The University of Montana on August 15, 1990.

Before coming to UM, Dennison was provost and vice president for academic affairs at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, a post he had held since 1987.

He is a former resident of Kalispell, and a UM alumnus. A history professor, he earned two degrees in that field at Montana: a master's in 1963 and a bachelor's with highest honors in 1962. In 1967, he completed a doctorate in history at the University of Washington.

Before joining Western Michigan's administration, he held a number of positions at Colorado State University between 1969 and 1987. They include history professor, admissions and records director, associate academic vice president, graduate school associate dean and associate dean of the college of the arts, humanities and social sciences.

Dennison and his wife, Jane, also from Kalispell, have two children.

Academics at UM Add Up To Success

The University of Montana has had 28 Rhodes Scholars. Charlotte Morrison is UM's fifth Rhodes Scholar winner in six years. UM ranks 15th of all American colleges and universities in the number of Rhodes Scholars it has produced, fourth among public universities. Students are chosen on the basis of scholarship, leadership, energy, community and political involvement, and character.

The Flathead Lake Biological Station, located about 80 miles north of Missoula, is the oldest biological station west of the Mississippi. The UM research station is one of the finest facilities in the country for ecological studies and freshwater research.

KUFM, a non-commercial, public radio station operated by the Telecommunications Center reaches an estimated 400,000 Montanans in central and western Montana.

School of Education graduates compete very successfully for jobs. A high percentage of those with bachelor's degrees and graduate degrees find teaching, administrative and other education-related positions in Montana and many other states.

The Department of Social Work is fully accredited by the Council on Social Work Education, making UM the only Montana public school that prepares its graduates to apply for advanced standing in graduate schools of social work.

The Department of Drama/Dance has a professional theater group – the Montana Repertory Theatre – based on campus. The Montana Repertory Theatre, which tours throughout the Northwest, is the only touring professional actors equity company between Minneapolis and Seattle.


Eight University of Montana students have received Truman Scholarships. The national scholarship is given annually to students committed to a government career who have superior academic ability and leadership potential.

The Department of Anthropology has the largest collection of artifacts and records of prehistory in the region.

The School of Business is the only business school in Montana to be accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business at the graduate level.

Year in, year out, a high percentage of the school's accounting graduates pass the Certified Public Accountant Exam on their first try.

The Department of Geology has a strong, nationally known program in traditional geology and environmental geoscience. Because the solution to most geologic problems involves a combination of field and laboratory study, the department offers a wide range of field and laboratory courses

and encourages a broad, multi-disciplinary program of study.

The Department of Geography has one of the Northwest's best cartography laboratories, where students learn to make maps and interpret aerial photography.

The Department of Health and Human Performance is one of a handful in the country that prepares students to be athletic trainers.

UM's graduate creative writing program, started in 1919 by H.G. Merriam, is the second oldest program of its kind in the country. Well-known for graduates like Montana writer and poet James Welch, the

program has flourished to the point that last year it received 400 applications for 20 openings.

Montana has had four Division I, All-District 7 (which includes Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming, Alberta and Saskatchewan) academic selections four of the last six years. Last season sophomore quarterback Dave Dickenson and sophomore receiver Matt Wells were named to the All-District 7 team. Dickenson maintains a 3.88 GPA in Pre-Medicine, while Wells has a 3.49 GPA in Business. The all-district team requires a minimum GPA of 3.20.

Dickenson was named first team Division I GTE Academic All-American last year. Three years ago former Grizzly linebacker Mike McGowan was given a prestigious NCAA post-graduate scholarship, while former hoop star Daren Engellant was sohonored by the NCAA that athletic season as well.

McGowan was a first team Academic All-American choice three times (1988-89-90), with a 3.97 GPA in History. In 1988, Montana had an unprecedented four players named to the GTE Academic All-American first or second team.

Last season 27 Montana football players were named to the All-Big Sky Conference's academic squad, which requires a 3.0 GPA or above. The Grizzlies have ranked first or second in number of all-league academic picks the last eight years in-a-row, and have had the most selections six times during that period.

Bill Moos is in his fifth year as Athletic Director at The University of Montana. During his first four years at UM, Moos has overseen a program that has produced nine Big Sky Championships and eight teams that have qualified for NCAA postseason play.

Moos has been instrumental in generating revenue for Grizzly athletics by incorporating the Grizzly Athletic Association into the department and by creating a new position that concentrates on corporate sponsorships.

He has twice served as Director of the Big Sky postseason men's basketball tournament and is a member of the NCAA Division I-AA Football Committee.

Moos came to UM from his alma mater. Washington State, where had been an associate athletic director since 1982.

He graduated from Washington State in 1973 with a degree in History. As a Cougar athlete, he was an all-Pac 10 and all-Pacific Coast selection in football. He played in the East-West Shrine Game in 1972.

Bill, and his wife, Kendra, have three children: Christa, Brittany, and Bo.

Bill is beginning his second year as Assistant Athletic Director at The University of Montana. His duties include the identification and solicitation of potential corporate sponsors; evaluation and development of radio and television rights contracts; and committee chairman of UM's annual men's basketball tournament.

He was the assistant director of the Grizzly Athletic Association at UM, from 1988 to July of 1991. Bill also served as the Sports Information Director at Montana from 1967 to 1969). He was the sports editor at The Missoulian (1969-71).

"Grizzly Bill" was the "voice" of Montana football and men's basketball for 20 years, before retiring from those duties in the spring of 1993. He has been named Montana's Sportscaster of the Year six times.

Schwanke is a 1967 graduate of Montana, earning a B.A. degree in Journalism. He received Montana's Alumni Award on Centennial Charter Day, Feb. 18, 1993.

Bill and his wife, Lynn, have four children: Amber, Myka, Corbin, and Genna.

Al is beginning his 17th year as Executive Director of the Grizzly Athletic Association, formerly known as the Century Club.

In 1977 Century Club raised approximately \$70,000 for intercollegiate athletics. Last year the G.A.A. generated over \$650,000 in private support with emphasis primarily on athletic scholarships, but the G.A.A. assists in all phases of athletic department operations.

Kempfert came to UM from California Lutheran University, where he had served as the Director of Alumni/Parent Relations from 1971 to 1977. He served in the U.S. Army from 1968-71 and in Vietnam from 1969-70, receiving many commendations. He is an alumnus of C.L.U., where he was a three-sport letterman and voted the Outstanding Senior Athlete in 1967.

Al has three children, Kim, Matthew, and David.

Kathy has been the Associate Athletic Director at Montana for the past six years, and in 1989 she served as interim Athletic Director. She has overseen three I-AA football playoff games, six Big Sky Conference women's basketball tournaments, as well as several NCAA women's basketball games.

She was instrumental in UM's successful hosting of the Division I Women's Basketball West Regional Championship held in Dahlberg Arena in March of 1993.

Prior to her arrival at UM, Noble was the Assistant Director of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Public Facilities in Miami, Florida.

She has 19 years of experience in college administration. She was the Associate Athletic Director at the University of Miami from 1983-86. Prior to that she was the Academic Counselor in athletics at Boise State (1982-83) and a Residence Hall Director at Washington State (1976-82).

Noble earned her B.A. degree in Social Sciences at Central Washington University in 1971. She received a master's degree in Counseling at Washington State in 1979 and is currently a Ph.D. candidate in Counseling also at Washington State.

Gary is the veteran of Montana's athletic department, and is starting his 29th year at UM. He became Athletic Ticket Manager in 1966, and was appointed Manager of Athletics Facilities and Revenue in 1978.

He manages all scheduling in Adams Field House, Washington-Grizzly Stadium and Dornblaser Track and Field in addition to overseeing the TIC-IT-E-Z Ticketing System, all athletic revenue, concessions operations, event staffing, and various other duties.

He is a native of Ronan, Montana and graduated in accounting from Missoula Business College in 1962. He gained experience in accounting and auditing before assuming his responsibilities at Montana.

Gary and his wife, Judy, have six children: Christian Ann, Dustin, Lance, Christopher, Sara and Caru.

 B_{ob} is in his seventh year as UM's faculty representative to the National College Athletic Association.

Dr. Lindsay has been a faculty member at UM since 1967. He is a professor of History and served as the department chairman from 1975-78. His specialty is Early Modern European History. Lindsay won the Distinguished Teacher Award at UM in 1985. He has taught overseas for UM in France in 1970-71 and 1981.

He previously taught at Ohio University. He earned a Ph.D. and M.A. at the University of Oregon and an M.A. at the University of Minnesota. He received his B.A. at Nevada-Reno in 1953.

As the NCAA Representative, he determines eligibility for UM athletes, makes NCAA rulings at the institutional level and is UM's representative to the NCAA. He has served on UM's University Athletic Committee for numerous years and has been chairman of the committee as well.

Bob and his wife, Joyce, have four children.





Head Coach





Don Read is the all-time winningest coach in Montana history with 61 victories in just eight seasons. Last year he passed former Griz head coach Jack Swarthout, who had 51 wins in nine seasons, from 1967-75.

Since taking over the Grizzly football program in 1986, Read's teams have never had a losing season, going 6-4, 6-5, 8-4, 11-3, 7-4, 7-4, 6-5, and 10-2 in 1993, for a mark of 61-31 (.663). During those seasons UM has been 43-19 (.694) in Big Sky Conference games. His winning percentage of .663 is the best of any Montana coach with more than three years of tenure and the 6th best in Big Sky history. His 61 overall wins and 43 league victories are the second most in Big Sky history, and the most by any active coach.

The '93 team was the third one in Read's tenure to advance to the I-AA playoffs. It was UM's fourth appearance in school history. The Grizzlies have participated in the playoffs in 1993, 1989, and 1988, as well as in 1982.

Montana's 10 wins this past year tied the school record for the most regular-season wins. The 1969 and 1970 teams each went 10-0. Also in '93, UM set a school record with 11 straight conference wins, dating back to the 1992 season when they won their last four conference games of the year. It broke the record of 10 league wins in-a-row set by the 1969 and 1970 teams.

In just his fourth year (1989) at Montana, Read brought the Grizzly program to new heights, as UM won a school-record 11 games, and advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA semi-final playoff game.

Read was recognized for that success in 1989, as he was named the Big Sky Conference's Coach of the Year, and he was so-honored again last year, becoming the second coach in Montana history to be named the league's coach of the year twice. Swarthout was the Big Sky's Coach of the Year in 1969 and 1970.

In Montana's 94-year-old football history, the Grizzlies have won seven or more games 10 times, and Read's teams have accomplished that feat five times during his eight-year stint at UM.

The veteran coach came to Montana from Portland State, where he headed up that program from 1981 to 1985, and 1968 to 1971. Between his PSU stays were head jobs at the University of Oregon (1974-76) and Oregon Tech (1977-80). His Oregon Tech teams were ranked ninth in the nation in 1979, and seventh in 1980.

In 1984 he led PSU to an 8-3 record and was named the Division II Coach of the Year after his Viking team won the Western Conference championship.

Read's college coaching record is 130-122-1, and his overall coaching mark is 163-128-1. He has been in the coaching profession for 35 years, beginning in 1959 as an assistant at Placer High School in Auburn, California. His first head coaching job was at Petaluma High School in California in 1962.

He lives and coaches by many personal philosophies. Some include: "Success is a by-product of hard work; expect players to make a commitment to football and other aspects of school life; football shapes character; and a team must always play with emotion and intensity."

Read wrote a book, *The Complete Passing Game*, has worked football camps in several states, and has also written more than 100 articles for athletic and coaching magazines.

While coaching at Oregon, he worked with former All-Pro and current TV color analyst, Dan Fouts. At PSU he worked with former pro quarterback (and current NFL coach) June Jones. During his tenure at Montana, he has coached quarterbacks Grady Bennett, Brad Lebo, and Dave Dickenson — the top three career passers in school history.

He earned his undergraduate degree in Social Science in 1960 at Sacramento State, and his master's degree in H.P.E there in 1962. Don and his wife, Lois, have a daughter, Beth, and a son, Bruce. Bruce has been UM's special teams coach the past seven seasons.



Assistant Coaches





Mick begins his fourth year at his alma mater. He has 21 years of coaching experience, including seven at the college level. He came to UM from Western Montana College, where he was the head coach.

Dennehy serves as Montana's offensive coordinator and also coaches Montana's talented offensive line.

A native of Butte, the 44-year-old Dennehy had been the head coach at WMC for three seasons. In 1990 he coached the Bulldogs to a 5-3 record, and was named the Frontier Conference Coach of the Year. He also coached in the Big Sky Conference, as an assistant for Sonny Lubick at Montana State from 1980-81.

A 1973 graduate of Montana with a B.A. degree in Education, he earned a M. Ed. in Educational Administration at Washington State in 1977.


He was a standout safety for the Grizzlies in 1971-72. He is tied for second in single-season league history with 10 interceptions in 1972, when he led the Big Sky. That year he was named first team all-conference. He is ranked among the conference leaders with 16 career interceptions.

Dennehy started his coaching career at Colton High School in Washington, where his teams won state championships in 1975 and 1976, and he compiled a four-year record of 40-4. He then moved on to Helena High School, and was head grid coach there for three seasons, before serving the two-year stint at MSU. He was head football coach at Campbell County High School from 1983 to 1987, before he took the head job at Western. At Campbell High he was Coach of the Year in 1983 and had a 29-25 record.

In his prep coaching career he had an 88-60 overall record, was named coach of the year four times, and was twice selected to be a Shrine Game coach.

Mick and his wife, Sheila, have two sons: Jake, 19, who plays football for the Grizzlies, and Mark, 16.

"We have always been wide open offensively. This year will be no exception. We will utilize more motion and formations, but what you've seen, is again what you'll get. Our emphasis this past spring was to move the ball more efficiently on the ground, and at times we had great success. This will help our offense overall a great deal."



Jerome is in his fifth season as Montana's defensive coordinator, and is starting his ninth year as the Grizzlies' secondary coach.

Last year Montana was among the national leaders (26th) in rush defense, and was ranked third in the conference in overall defense.

In 1992, the Grizzlies were nationally ranked in several defensive categories. That year Montana was third in the nation against the rush, allowing 98.7 yards a game. UM's passing efficiency defense had a league-leading 101.8 rating per game, which placed them 17th in the country.

During Souers' tenure over the past eight years, Montana has led the Big Sky in rushing defense four times, and has been nationally ranked in that category the last eight seasons in-a-row. Also during that time, UM has led the league in a defensive category nine times.

In 1988, the Grizzlies led the conference in defense, allowing just 279.9 yards per game. It was the third time in the Big Sky history that a Montana team has accomplished that feat. Also in '88, Montana tied a school record with 28 interceptions.

Montana led Division I-AA in rush defense in 1989, allowing just 70.2 yards a game.

Before coming to UM, Souers, 36, was the secondary coach at Portland State, and was at Western Washington for a season prior to that.

He coached at "AAA" prep level for eight years at North Eugene and Willamette High schools. His father, Dwight, was a successful, well-known coach in Eugene. Jerome earned a B.A. in Physical Education at Oregon in 1983 and earned his master's in P.E. at PSU in 1985.

He and his wife, Paula, have two daughters, Anna, six, and Alaina, four.



In 1992, defensive tackle Sam Davidson was named to the Big Sky Conference's first team, while the previous season, ends Kirk Murphy (first team) and Gregg Smerker (second team) were All-Big Sky selections.

Paulson was a graduate assistant in 1987 at Montana, working with the secondary and special teams. He began as a full-time coach at UM in 1988, overseeing the linebackers.

He was a four-year letterman in football for the Grizzlies, playing fullback from 1982-86. He received the Terry Dillon Award in 1986, given annually to the outstanding back or receiver.

In 1984 Kraig was named the Grizzlies' Outstanding Sophomore. As a prep at Plentywood High School, he was a two-time all-state pick in football, and lettered four times in football and track. Kraig's three brothers, Kevin, Kerry and Keith, all ran track for the Grizzlies, and another brother, Kent, competed in track for Western Montana College.

He is a 1987 graduate of UM, earning a B.A. in Education.

Kraig, 30, and his wife, Jody, have a year-old son, Keogh.

"We are excited about the upcoming season. We will try to rise to the challenge that each week will bring this fall. This will be very important in order to have success in the Big Sky Conference."



Brent Pease Running Backs


Brent is beginning his fourth season at his alma mater, and will again be coaching the running backs, as well as assisting with offense.

Pease played professional football for seven years, including stints in the National Football League and the World League of American Football. He was an 11th round draft pick by the Minnesota Vikings, and played in the NFL for three seasons. He was the first quarterback taken in the WLAF draft by the Birmingham Fire in 1991.

His senior year at UM, in 1986, he led Division I-AA in total offense, averaging 309.4

yards a game. Brent set nine (former) school records in '86. Some of those include most single-season passing yards (3,056), touchdown passes (30), and most yards in a game (469 vs. Weber State).

He was UM's co-MVP in 1986, along with receiver/punter Mike Rice. Pease is fourth in career passing yards at UM with 3,665 yards. Brent is married to former Lady Griz track star Paula Good.



Assistant Head Coach/QBs/WRs

Besides coaching the quarterbacks and receivers, Robin Pflugrad also has several administrative duties relating to Grizzly football. He oversees many of the day-to-day operations of the football program: the budget, scholarships, compliance rules for the NCAA and the Big Sky Conference, and team travel, among other administrative responsibilities.

"Pflu" is starting his fourth year as Montana's assistant head coach and his ninth season overall at UM. Pflugrad's main responsibility is UM's highly-touted passing attack, which was ranked first in the nation in passing last year (359.0 yards a game) and second in scoring (41.2 ppg).

Montana was second and fourth in the nation in 1991 and 1992, averaging 325.6 and 329.5 yards per game passing, respectively.

He has coached several of Montana's current and former leading career receivers and quarterbacks, including current players Scott Gurnsey and Shalon Baker, as well as former standouts Bill Cockhill and Mike Trevathan. He also coached former quarterback Brad Lebo, UM's second-ranked passer, as well as junior QB Dave Dickenson, last year's Big Sky offensive MVP.

He also coached top-ranked receivers Matt Clark, Mike Rice, and Marvin Turk, UM's former single-season leader (1,047 yards in 1991).

Also known for his recruiting ability, Pflugrad's recruiting areas are Oregon, Hawaii, and California, at the high school and junior college levels.

Robin was a standout wide receiver at Portland State, team captain, and an Academic All-American in 1979. Before coming to Montana he was wide receiver coach and director of football promotions at PSU from 1983-85. Pflugrad earned his B.S. degree in Business at PSU in 1980.

He began his coaching career in 1981 at South Eugene High School, where he was receiver and secondary coach, as well as a counselor in football camps.

As a player, his Mt. Hood Junior College football teams went 20-2 in 1976-77, and was ranked first in the nation in 1977, when he was named all-conference.

Rob, and his wife, Marlene, have two children, Amanda, seven, and, Aaron, six.




The Grizzlies have excelled in special teams during Read's tenure, setting numerous school records. Last year UM was first in the I-AA ranks in punt returns, averaging 14.6 yards an attempt. He is no stranger to the UM program, as he was a four-year letterman at strong safety for the Grizzlies from 1984-87. He started his junior and senior seasons, and was one of the teams' leading tacklers and interceptors with 97 tackles and six interceptions those two seasons.

In 1986, his junior season, Reeves had four interceptions, ranking him eighth (tie) in the Big Sky Conference. He was the recipient of the Pat Norwood Award in 1987, which is given to UM's "Most Inspirational Player."

Reeves, 28, came to Montana from Sedro Woolley High School in Washington. As a prep he was an all-state selection on defense as a senior and was all-conference both his junior and senior years. He was team captain at Sedro Wooley in 1983 for a 12-1 squad that was runner-up for the state championship.

He earned his B.A. degree at Montana in History in 1989. David married the former Sara Mates in July of 1993.

"I think 1994 should be an exciting year for Grizzly football. We have a talented group of veteran linebackers (four seniors), as well as young players who will be battling for playing time. We have the most athletic and competitive group we've had here in years."

MONTANA FEATURES VETERAN TEAM WITH 16 STARTERS BACK

An encore might be too much to expect this season for The University of Montana, but with 16 starters and 46 lettermen returning, the Grizzlies should be in the hunt for the 1994 Big Sky Conference crown and the automatic Division I-AA playoff berth that comes with it.

Montana was 10-2 last season and a perfect 7-0 in league en route to the conference championship. The season ended abruptly on a 49-48 first round playoff loss to Delaware. Montana was ranked third in the nation in the final Sports Network poll.

"We were a junior team last year and we are senior-oriented this year," said ninth-year head coach Don Read, who has never had a losing season at Montana.

"We have most of the leadership from last year's team returning," Read said. "With the wins we had last year there is a good feeling of confidence, people expect us to perform very well this year, and I'm sure it's going to be tough every Saturday.

"We're going to have to play tough and there is not any chance of sneaking up on anyone," said Read, who is 61-31 at Montana. "None-the-less, we feel like we have a good team, we're excited about the schedule, and excited about the potential of our team."

Read's optimism is based on the return of eight starters on offense, seven on defense, and both kickers, as well as a school-record seven regular-season home games.

"The schedule that we have is spread out in a way that is really advantageous, in terms of non-conference and conference games, as well as road and home games," Read said. "I like the attitude and chemistry of our team."

Back to lead the offense is junior quarterback Dave Dickenson (5-11, 175), the 1993 Big Sky offensive MVP. Last season he passed for a school-record 3,640 yards and 32 touchdowns, and he set a school record with 14 rushing TDs.

OFFENSE: POSITION-BY POSITION

Quarterback: Dickenson led the nation in total offense, averaging 361.0 yards a game—the second best average in league history. He also set nine school records and was the reason Montana led the country in passing yards per game (359.0). Senior Bert Wilberger (6-3, 188), a veteran with two career starts, and redshirt freshman Josh Paffhausen (6-0, 175) who has a speed of 4.50 in the 40, make this a solid position.


Offensive Line: Senior right tackle Scott Gragg (6-9, 305) is an All-American candidate (along with Dickenson) and was second team all-league last year. Junior left tackle Eric Simonson (6-5, 291) is another returning starter. "Super" sophs Mike Agee (6-5, 285) and Jeff Zellick (6-5, 296) will start at left and right guard, while David Kempfert (6-4, 278) gets the nod at center.

Wide Receiver: The school's all-time receiver, Bill Cockhill is now a student-coach at UM. However, seniors Scott Gurnsey (6-0, 202) and Shalon Baker (5-7, 165) combined for 18 touchdown catches last year and are two of the top receivers in Montana history. Gurnsey

set a school record with 1,079 receiving yards and was first team all-league last year. Baker holds UM's record with 17 career TD catches.

Despite missing two games with injuries last year, junior Matt Wells (5-7, 160) was the third leading receiver with 43 catches. Sophomore Mike Erhardt (6-4, 205) should start, while transfer Ryan Blanchard (6-2, 190) from Orange Coast JC had an excellent spring.

Halfback: Three veterans make this a solid position in UM's one-back alignment. Senior Damon Boddie (5-9, 175) led the team in rushing with 444 yards, while juniors Kelly Stensrud (5-11, 185) and Scott Spraggins (5-10, 185) each rushed for more than 200 yards. Boddie and Stensrud combined for 49 receptions.



Senior linebacker Dan Downs has twice been a first team All-Big Sky Conference selection.

Waiting in the wings are powerful redshirt freshman Joe Lehman (6-3, 230) and junior redshirt Chris Morton (5-10, 210).

DEFENSE: POSITION-BY-POSITION

Linebacker: First team All-Big Sky selections Dan Downs (6-4, 225) and Kurt Schilling (6-0, 202), both seniors, are back at inside and outside linebacker, respectively. Seniors Garrett Venters (6-3, 232) and Dennis Scates (6-3, 229) have both started at the other inside spot.

Depth comes with sophomores Mike Bouchee (6-2, 231) and David Sirmon (inside), Mike Kowalski (5-10, 181) and Mark Hampe (6-2, 224) outside. Redshirt freshmen Jason Crebo and Greg Fitzgerald should also see action at inside linebacker.

Secondary: Keith Burke (5-11, 185), an honors candidate, is back at right corner. Fellow senior Acen Chiles saw a lot of action at left corner, and will be pushed by highlytouted transfer Billy Ivey (5-10, 180) from Mt. Sac Junior College. JC transfer Mike Temple (5-11, 185) from Grossmont JC had a solid

spring, and is expected to contribute this season.

At free safety, sophomore Blaine McElmurry (6-0, 195) and junior Ryan Palma (6-0, 205) have good instincts. Senior Mike Goicoechea (6-0, 185) started at strong safety early last year, while his brother, Mike (6-0, 185), saw a lot of playing time in '93.

Defensive Line: Starters Keith Jones (6-4, 248), a senior, and junior Yohanse Manzanarez (6-3, 251) are back at the end positions. Corey Falls (6-2, 230, Jr.) and Randy Riley (6-3, 230, So.) have very good speed and add quality depth at end.

Veterans Jay Turner (6-4, 251, Sr.) and Troy Lucas (6-3, 259, Jr.) ended spring drills as the starters at the tackle spots. But, junior college transfer (Ricks JC) Marty Duffin (6-2, 260), sophomore lettermen Brian Toone (6-2, 230) and Ryan Thompson (6-3, 255), along with transfers (Northern Arizona) Marc Lamb (6-6, 20, Jr.) and Bernie Sopp (6-3, 265, Jr. from Mendocino JC) add top-notch depth.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Both punter Gurnsey and sophomore place-kicker Andy Larson (6-1, 180) are back. Gurnsey averaged 39.9 yards a punt. Larson made a school-record 49 (of 54) PATs and 10-of-14 field goals, with a long of 46 yards.

Boddie led the Big Sky and was 13th in the nation in kickoff returns, averaging 25.9 yards an attempt. Baker was ninth in the country in punt returns with a 12.0-yard average. Newcomer Ivey and Chiles could both return kicks, while Wells, sophomore Nathan Dolan, and Paffhausen could be called on to return punts.

COACH READ ON THE BIG SKY

"It seems like I say the same thing every year, and I'll say it again — I believe that the league has more talent and is more balanced than ever before," Read said.

"When you look at Idaho's talent last year and what they did with it," he said. "You can see that they know how to win. So, even though they've got a new quarterback, they have the capability to be an excellent football team, and you'd better look out for Idaho.

"I think Northern Arizona has had good talent over the years and now they know how to win, and will be a team to be reckoned with," Read said. "Montana State has been a dominate team in recent years on defense, and now is really coming on offensively to give them balance. It's that balance that makes them stronger. Look out for Montana State.


"I would lump Idaho State and Boise State together in that they have a wealth of new upper-class talent that they have brought in the last two years, and they are very capable teams," Read said. "Eastern Washington is always a major challenge for us considering they've beat us three of the last four years. Weber is the unknown with the loss of some key players, but they have proven they can rebuild quickly."


"It's hard to look at our conference and say tht someone can't beat someone else," Read said. "it just has tremendous balance right now."






DAVE DICKENSON, 2V Quarterback 5-11, 175, Junior from Great Falls, Montana

The 1993 Big Sky Conference MVP, Dave set nine school records in leading the Grizzlies to the Big Sky championships last season. He was the first player in Grizzly history to be named the league's offensive player of the year. He was named the Big Sky Player of the week three times last season, and the National Player-of-the-Week twice by the Football Gazette.

He led Division I-AA in total offense with 361.6 yards a game – the second highest yards per game average in the 31-year history of the Big Sky Conference. His 3,978 total yards was also the second most in conference history, as was his passing efficiency rating of 168.0.

He was named first team All-American by the <u>Football Gazette</u>, and third team by The Sports Network.

Dickenson set a Montana school record with 3,640 passing yards – fifth most in conference history. He also broke the oldest record in Montana history, rushing for 14 touchdowns. He broke the record of 11 rushing touchdowns, set by Steve Sullivan in 1920

"Dave Dickenson is about as creative a quarterback as there is around," said Montana head coach Don Read. "His strength is in the many things that he can do, rather than the one thing. He is extremely intelligent and has a quick delivery. One of his biggest assets is that he sees the entire field. He has great peripheral vision and is also very mobile.

"He can change directions and has the ability to make people miss when he is running with the football," Read continued. "He has a very good touch on the football and gets the ball to the receivers on time - when it's supposed to get there.

"He has a ton of assets, as I've mentioned; and most

of those assets have to do with his ability to operate under pressure in critical situations," Read said. "He's just at his best when the pressure is on him, and we need the big play. He's a big-play maker, without a doubt.

"Dave is also extremely coachable and absorbs technical information, utilizes it, and changes tactical procedures in a ball game as well an anyone I've ever been around," Read said. "He makes those adjustments without missing a beat. This young man is just outstanding in every way.

"He really has a competitive spirit and wants to succeed, and wants people around him to succeed," Read said. "He has the ability to lift the performance level of those around him. That is the characteristic of a great quarterback."

Dickenson is also an outstanding student. He was named a Division I first team GTE Academic All-American in 1993, maintaining a 3.86 GPA in Molecular Biology in a Pre-Medicine curriculum. He was also Montana's male recipient of its annual Presidential Scholar-Athlete Award, and was named the football teams' outstanding scholar-athlete in 1992 and 1993.


Although the Grizzlies' first round playoff statistics against Delaware don't count towards single-season or career totals, Dickenson continued his stellar play in the post-season


He set a I-AA playoff record against the Blue Hens, completing 37-of-44 passes for 84.1 percent, breaking the old mark of 79.2 percent set by Delaware's Bill Vergantino against James Madison in 1991. Dickenson also passed for 409 yards and four TDs in that game. The loss snapped a 33-game winning streak Dickenson had as a starter, dating back to his junior year in high school. (He did not start at Oregon last season).

Success on the playing field is not new to Dickenson. At C.M. Russell High School he led his team to consecutive "AA" championships, going 24-0. Both of those seasons he was named Montana's Gatorade Player of the Year.

His senior year he passed for 2,892 yards and 32 touchdowns for coach Jack Johnson. Career-wise, Dave passed for 5,212 yards. He was named the State's offensive MVP in football as a junior and senior.

Dave lettered in football, basketball and golf, and was team captain in all three sports. He was second team all-state in basketball as a senior.

SCOTT GRAGG, 3V Offensive Tackle 6-9, 305, Senior from Silverton, Oregon

I he tallest player in Grizzly history, Scott had a very solid junior season, and was named second team All-Big Sky Conference, as well as third team All-American by The Sports Network.

Scott is one of the main reasons that Montana led Division I-AA in passing (359.0 yards a game), was second in scoring (41.2 points a game), and finished fifth in total offense (468.6) in 1993.


As a sophomore, he was named honorable mention All-Big Sky Conference. He will start at right tackle for the third consecutive season.


Gragg was selected as Montana's Paul Weskamp Award winner in 1992 and 1993. The award is given annually to the teams' outstanding offensive lineman. Two years ago he was also chosen as the Grizzlies' co-Sophomore of the Year, sharing the honor with linebacker Dan Downs.

"Lurch" has started 24 games in-a-row (counting the playoffs), going back to his sophomore season. He was a redshirt at Montana in 1990.

"Scotty Gragg is a leader by his actions," coach Read said. "He's one of the first ones to practice and one of the last ones to get off the field. He works hard in the weight room. He's extremely good with other players. He always lending a hand, and he's a coach on the field. He's not afraid to make suggestions and help the younger players.

"He's also very active in helping us in the recruiting process," Read said. "Scott is very dedicated and likes to win. He is a very, very fine football player, especially when you really need him. He rises to the occasion.





"The physical attributes of the guy are pretty obvious — he's so darn big," Read said. "He is an extremely capable run and pass blocker. He has excellent feet so that he can stay in front of people, which is so important in our pass-blocking scheme.

"I've not coached a better tackle in my coaching career," Read said. "He has the potential to be something extremely special, and certainly play beyond his college career."

"I don't think there has been a season, whether it's fall when we're playing, or in the off-season months that Scott has not improved himself in some way," said Mick Dennehy, Montana's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach.

"I've known Scotty ever since his redshirt freshman year, and I've seen unbelievable improvement, and that just does not happen automatically," Dennehy said. "He has every attribute, I feel, that it takes to be a good football player. He is such a well-rounded individual and good human being. He is a credit to his family and a credit to our program. He's a credit not just on the football field, but in so many other areas. He's great in the classroom, and is just such a mature kid.

"Scott has such pride in everything he does," Dennehy said. "It's important to him to be a good person. He's a peer counselor on campus, which is a real honor. He is just such an ambassador for our school and his community. I know that sounds a little bit corny, but we should all have players like that sometimes." He's just a great, great person, as well as being a great football player.

"Scott has excellent feet for his size and takes great pride in the offensive success that our team has had in recent years, as do all of our offensive lineman," Dennehy said. "Because we pass the ball so often, we do have breakdowns, but it doesn't happen very often with Scotty. He is a very fine athlete for his size.

"We do just enough with him in the running game, as far as blocking for sweep or screens, and Scotty gets really excited when he has those opportunities and is not in a back-pedal mode, blocking for the quarterback," Dennehy said. He really has a lot of fun when he gets the chance to block someone in the open field. When you talk about Scott Gragg, having fun is a big part of his game."

Gragg proved himself early at Montana, as he was named the Most Valuable

Player of the Grizzlies' offensive scout team his redshirt year (1990), sharing the honor with two others.

An all-conference player on offense and defense at Silverton Union High School, Gragg lettered three times in football. He lettered twice


An all-conference player on offense and defense at Silverton Union High School, Gragg lettered three times in football. He lettered twice in basketball and once in track, and was team captain in football and basketball as a senior. Scott was named a Cascade All-American in basketball and was all-conference as a senior. His high school football coach was Jim Brueneker.

Scott is a Chemistry/Education major, and has been selected to the Big Sky Conference's all-academic team the last two years, with a 3.13 GPA.

2 SHALON BAKER, 3V 5-7, 165, RECEIVER/PUNT RETURNER Senior from Vancouver, Washington

Shalon is already Montana's all-time career leader in touchdown receptions with 17. He is ranked fourth in career receiving yards with 1,676. He needs just 582 yards to break Bill Cockhill's career mark of 2,257 career yards. He has 127 career receptions, and needs only 32 grabs to break Cockhill's career record of 158 catches.

He had 39 catches for 595 yards and nine touchdowns last year, making him Montana's third leading returning receiver. He and teammate Scott Gumsey led the Big Sky in TD catches with nine each.

"The Touchdown Maker" was 9th in Division I-AA in punt returns, averaging 12.0 yards on 18 attempts. He was honorable mention All-Big Sky as a returner and a receiver. Baker was named UM's special teams Player of the Year, sharing the award with Damon Boddie.

"He really plays with a lot of heart," said head coach Don Read. "Shalon is now one of the veterans in our program, and I know we'll want to get the ball to him in clutch situations. That's where he's at his best — in clutch situations.

"He's an excellent returner because he has quick feet," Read said. "He has that ability to explode at any time. We like to throw to him in shorter routes so he can use his speed. He gives us a variety of attributes which allow us to use him in a way to put pressure on the defense.

"Shalon reads coverage extremely well," Read said. "He can play inside at one of our flanker positions, or he can play outside; which is another on of his strengths. I really believe that he is capable of breaking a lot of school records this year, and maybe even beyond. He's as good as anyone we've ever had around here."

Baker was Montana's leading receiver as a sophomore, with 40 receptions, and averaged 11.0 per punt return, which ranked him 21st in the nation.

As a "true" freshman in 1991, he was the runner-up for Big Sky's Top Newcomer of the Year award, edged out by Nevada receiver Bryan Reeves. Shalon was the Grizzlies' "Freshman of the Year" in 1991. That year he had 48 receptions for 702 yards and five touchdowns. His 702 yards in 1991 rank him 10th in school history in single-season receiving yards.

Baker came to Montana from Evergreen High School, where he was all-state, all-conference, team MVP, and a Shrine Game participant.

As a prep he had 81 catches for 1,442, averaging 17.8 yards per reception for coach Joe Eagle.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: A starter in 27 games, Shalon has had at least one reception in 29 of the 31 games that he has played in. He had a career-high 10 catches against Idaho (1992), and at McNeese State in 1991. He had a career-best 123 yards at Idaho last year. He has had four 100-yard receiving games, the most recent being at Idaho in '93. Shalon has had four or more catches in 18 career games. His longest touchdown reception was a 68-yarder at Eastern Washington in '91, and that is also his career-long catch. His career-long punt return is 82 yards vs. South Dakota State last year, which he returned for a TD. Business Administration major.

DAMON BODDIE, 1V 5-9, 175, Halfback/Kickoff Returns Senior from Sacramento, California

Big things were expected of Damon because of his impressive junior college and high school careers, and he didn't disappoint anyone. He led the Grizzlies in rushing with 444 yards, and was also one of the leading kickoff returners in the nation.

"What is amazing about Damon Boddie is that he did not join our program until fall and played immediately, and was productive from day one," Read said. "That is rare for a junior college guy to be that productive.

"Damon finished the season extremely strong, as he learned the offense," Read said. "He became an outstanding runner and returner for us, as well as an outstanding receiver. He's a threat in so many ways, because he can run up inside with a fierce, tenacious, toughness about him. Yet, he has the quickness to get outside.

We have not had a more complete back, Damon may be comparable to a (Jody) Farmer we had a few years ago," Read said. "I don't think we've had a back with more speed since we've been here."

Boddie led the Big Sky Conference in kickoff returns and was ranked 13th in the country, averaging 25.9 yards a return on a league-high 24 attempts. He had the longest return for a touchdown in modern-day history with a 99-yarder at Idaho. He also returned a kickoff 80 yards for a touchdown against Delaware in the I-

He was named All-Big Sky Conference honorable mention as a returner. Damon averaged 4.7 yards rushing on 94 carries, ranking him 14th in the league. He also had 18 receptions.

Damon was selected as Montana's "Top Junior," sharing the award with defensive lineman Jay Turner. He was also chosen the Grizzlies' special teams Player of the Year, along with Shalon Baker.

His career long rush is a 57-yarder against Cal-Sacramento, while his longest catch was a 26-yarder versus Jackson State.

He transferred from American River Junior College in his hometown of Sacramento. Boddie was all-state, all-conference and offensive team MVP as a sophomore there. He rushed for 1,100 yards and 17 touchdowns in just seven games that season. As a freshman, he rushed for 750 yards and 12 touchdowns. He was an all-league pick both of those seasons.

At Cordova High School, he rushed for 3,350 yards and 48 touchdowns in an illustrious prep career. He had an unbelievable senior year, rushing for 2,400 yards and 33 touchdowns, and was all-state, as well as league and team MVP.



Keith's excellent speed and tenacious attitude make him one of the most outstanding cornerbacks at Montana in recent years.

He is Montana's third leading returning tackler. Last season he had 54 tackles along with a team-high five interceptions and 10 pass deflections. He also forced three fumbles. His five interceptions ranked him 37th in the nation and second (tie) in the Big Sky Conference.

He was an honorable mention All-Big Sky Conference selection last year.

"I couldn't be higher on anyone than I am on Keith Burke," Read said. "He grew last year as the season went on. As he became more comfortable with our system, he just played better and better.

"Keith made so many big plays for us; whether it was tackles, getting his hands on the ball, or interceptions," Read said. "It seems like he is where he needs to be at the right time and the right place.

"The other thing about Keith is that he is a very, very physical player," Read said. "He'll really hit you and comes up to support against the run," Read said. "He is very competitive and likes to win.

"He practices just like he plays on Saturdays," Read said. "Keith always has his foot on the floor - going 100 miles an hour all the time. He's likeable, smart, and a leader in the secondary. I don't know if we've had a better corner at Montana since I've been here, and I'm excited about his potential this season."

Burke had a career-high seven tackles against Jacksonville State. His best all-around game was versus Boise State when he had five tackles, a pass deflection, and an interception, and forced two fumbles.

He was a second team All-American at Orange Coast College in Costa Mesa, Calif. He was also first team All-Mission Conference there for coach Bill Workman.

Keith's junior college teams went 6-4 in 1991 and 7-4 in 1992. In '92 his team played in the K-Swiss Bowl.

Burke was a three-sport star at Edison High School, lettering in football, track, and baseball. His senior grid team advanced to the C.I.F. quarterfinal game, going 9-1. He was All-County, all-league, team captain and league MVP as a senior.

Downs was voted Montana's "Outstanding Linebacker in 1993," sharing the award with fellow junior Kurt Schilling.

He is vying to become the fourth player in Montana history to be first team all-league (Greg Anderson, Mike Rankin and Todd Ericson). He has started in 23 games in-a-row, including all 11 games last year, as well as UM's playoff contest against Delaware.

In 1993 he had a team-high 57 assisted tackles, and (tie) five sacks, and was second on the team with six tackles for losses. He had his first career interception last year at Montana State, in the Grizzlies' regular-

Dan was also UM's second leading returning tackler last year. In 1992, he had 82 tackles and a teamhigh four forced fumbles. He was chosen Montana's co-Sophomore of the Year, along with offensive tackle

He has excellent speed and strength, running the 40 in 4.65 and benching 225 pounds 17 times. He also has an outstanding vertical jump at 34 inches.

"The thing about Dan that separates him from many is that he can really run," Read said. "His greatest asset is his ability to be all over the field. He covers sideline-to-sideline. He can come up and support the run, he'll get back into the zones when he's in coverage, and he can run people down when he needs to. He just has excellent range for his size.

"He has a lot of confidence in himself and has really grown as a player," Read said. "He is a strong leader. He is a quiet leader, in that he leads by example. He's also been a player who has really developed positive habits, in terms of preparation. You see him working harder and harder in the off-season to have a great year, particularly this year, his senior year. We





2 1 SCOTT GURNSEY, 3V 6-0, 202, Wide Receiver/Punter Senior from Tumwater, Washington

Scott was one of the premier receivers in the Division I-AA ranks last season, and earned All-Big Sky Conference first team honors. He set a Montana record with 1,079 yards last year. He and teammate Shalon Baker led the Big Sky in touchdown receptions with nine each.

Gurnsey averaged 98.1 receiving yards per game, which ranked him eighth in the nation, and his 6.1 catches a game ranked him 13th (tie) in the country.

He was co-winner of the Terry Dillon Award (Outstanding Back/Receiver), sharing the award with record-setting receiver Bill Cockhill.

Scott, also the Grizzlies' punter, was ranked 20th in the nation, averaging 39.9 yards a punt on 45 attempts. He had 13 punts inside the opponents' 20-yard line, and was the main reason Montana was ranked seventh in I-AA in net punting (37.45 average).

"If you look back at what Scott did last year, whether it was the winning catch in the South Dakota State game or the big play he had against Montana State for a touchdown, he just always seems to make a clutch play when we need it," said head coach Don Read. "When we had to have it and really needed it, he came through. He is a big-play athlete.

"His athleticism carries over into his punting," Read said. "Though he doesn't have the gross yards, his net punting, his hang time, and his ball placement, are very, very, good.

"He's a very fine athlete, and he has a wide range of abilities," Read said. "Whether it is as a punter, as a receiver, as a big-play guy, or as a blocker, his versatility is a big plus for us. He has excelled in all of those areas like no other player in our program has over the past eight seasons."

Gurnsey had five or more catches in 10 of Montana's 12 games last year. He had more than 100 receiving yards in six games (counting the I-AA playoff game).

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: Scott had the winning catch (42 yards) against South Dakota State with 21 seconds left on a fourth-and-two. He had a career-high 176 yards (and seven catches) last season against Boise State, and a career-best nine receptions (for 109 yards) at Eastern Washington in 1993. Scott had two touchdowns in '93 versus South Dakota State, Idaho State, Montana State, and in the I-AA playoffs against Delaware. His longest reception was a 70-yarder for a TD vs. BSU in '93.

He was a member of two state championship teams at Tumwater High School, winning titles in 1987 and 1989. He was all-state three times at defensive back and once at receiver. Scott earned nine letters in high school. He was all-state in football and baseball, and he was all-league twice in basketball. He was team captain in football and basketball. His prep grid coach was Sid Otton. Gurnsey played in Washington's All-Star games in football and baseball, and was selected honorable mention All-America by Street & Smith's in baseball (utility player).

KURT SCHILLING, 3V 6-0, 202, Outside Linebacker Senior from Shelby, Montana

Montana's second-leading returning tackler, Kurt capped a stellar junior season when he was named first team All-Big Sky Conference. He was also selected the co-recipient of the Linebacker of the Year Award, along with fellow honors candidate Dan Downs.

Last season Schilling was second on the team with 42 unassisted tackles and tied Downs for the most sacks with five. He tied cornerback Keith Burke for the most forced fumbles (three), and had three interceptions, and two fumble recoveries.

Last season Kurt had a critical interception with 10:17 left in the game at Northern Arizona (6-0), returning it 45 yards for a touchdown, giving UM a 31-10 lead.

"Kurt is really an under-rated player, even though he's all-conference, and has received a lot of awards and recognition," Read said.

"He's under-rated because he does so many things that you can't measure with a yardstick or statistics," Read said. "I'm talking about motivating the people around him. I'm talking about the versatility we have with him in terms of coverage. He can play man cover, and yet he comes up and supports against the run with the best of them.

"He's very, very capable of doing a lot of things," Read said. "He's an all-around athlete. His dad's a coach and he was raised in an athletic atmosphere, so he understands all the disciplines that are involved.

"Kurt knows the importance of when the timing is right to make a big play," Read said. "He knows what toughness is all about, and how to get tough on the goal-line. He's also an intelligent player. He practices hard in the fall and in the off-season, and has improved every year. He provides a ton of leadership and chemistry on our team."

Schilling was also one of Montana's leading tacklers as a sophomore with 60 stops, and started nine games that year. He has played in 33 of UM's last 34 games (counting the playoffs), and started in 20 of the last 22. He started all 12 games in '93. Kurt was also UM's Scout Team MVP in 1990.










The Grizzly power weight room is divided into three separate areas of apparatus:

AREA 1: This phase of the weight room emphasizes free weight training. It has nine benches for bench press, and incline and decline bench pressing. It also has five squat and power racks, three lifting platforms, three squat and leap machines, a calf machine, four-way neck machines,




AREA 2: Combines all the dumbbells and racks with pairs starting at 15 pounds to 100 pounds, and another set which ranges from 15 pounds to 120 pounds. It also has assorted benches, prone and decline for dumbbell exercising. It incluses three overhead cable lat pulls, and a custom cross-over cable apparatus. Two dip bars, a T-bar, bent over incline and row machines are also located here.


AREA 3: Eight Nautilus and eight universal machines are located here. There are also hip sleds, leg press machines, situp boards and ladder combinations.






Lach year eight outstanding University of Montana football players are recipients of awards.

The Terry Dillon Award, honoring the outstanding back or receiver, was established in 1964 following the accidental death of former Grizzly Terry Dillon. Dillon played defensive and offensive halfback for UM from 1960 to 1962. He started at defensive halfback for the National Football League Minnesota Vikings.

The Paul Weskamp Award was established in memory of Paul Weskamp, a tackle on Ed Chinske's 1954 Grizzlies. The award honors UM's out standing lineman and was established by the citizens of Ronan, Montana.

The Golden Helmet Award honors the hardest hitter on the team. It was set up on a nationwide basis by the CocaCola Company in 1967.

The Larry Miller Award is given in memory of the great Grizzly lineman and wrestler who competed for UM in 1969 and 1970. Miller died in an automobile accident in 1974. The award honors the teams' outstanding defensive lineman.

The Steve Carlson award is given to the teams' most valuable player in memory of the former Grizzly football player who died in 1977. Pat Norwood was a four year starter at offensive tackle for the Grizzlies (197882) from Billings, who died of cancer in 1983. This award is given to the Most Inspirational Player, who often times had to overcome an injury.

The Tony Barbour award is given in memory of a Loyal Grizzly Fan. It is presented annually to a UM player, "who best exemplifies outstanding practice habits and makes an unselfish contribution to the betterment of the Grizzly Football Team. Enthusiasm, dedication and commitment are the key factors sought in the person receiving this award."

The Outstanding Linebacker award was inaugurated in 1990, and is given by an anonymous donor.

GAME NOTES: Montana registered the biggest comeback in I-AA history, scoring 39 fourth-quarter points, and overcame a 37 -7 deficit with 8:12 to go in the third quarter. Sophomore QB Dave Dickenson passed for a (then) career-high 401 yards and 3 TDs, and rushed for 2 scores. SDS capitalized on 3 Grizzly fumbles and an interception, scoring 24 points on UM miscues. Two key plays in the fourth quarter were a 42-yard fumble return for a TD by safety Todd Ericson, and an 82-yard TD on a punt return by Shalon Baker. It was the second longest punt return in Grizzly history (Ron Baines, 83 yards vs. Pacific, 1967). The winning score came on a 4th-and-2 from the SDS 42-yard line, as Dickenson hit Scott Gurnsey on the left sideline and he broke away for the winning TD. UM scored 45 points in the last 18 minutes of the game. Ericson was named the Big Sky's "Defensive Player of the Week." It was Dickenson's first start at Montana.

GAME NOTES: The Grizzlies' come-back bid fell short, but Montana overcame 21-0 and 28-3 deficits to give the Ducks of the Pacific-10 Conference a tough game. Junior quarterback Bert Wilberger started the game and played the first quarter, and then yielded to Dickenson, who earned the starting job by rallying the Grizzlies. It was the only game in '93 that Dickenson did not start. Trailing 29-9 at half-time, the Griz outscored the Ducks 21-7 in the final half, as Dickenson completed 20-of-32 for 236 yards and 2 scores He also rushed for a TD. UM out-gained Oregon in total yards with 306 in the 2nd half, compared to Oregon's 143. Freshman kicker Andy Larson converted on his first college field goal attempt from 26 yards out. Dickenson rushed for a game-high 77 yards. Cockhill had game-highs of 7 catches for 123 yards, and it was Cockhill's second straight 100-yard receiving game. Bruce Dotson had a career-long 57-yard kickoff return, which set up UM's second TD. Ericson had a game-high 14 tackles. UM entered the game ranked 21st in the nation in the Sports Network poll, and moved up to 19th despite the loss. Starting strong safety Mike Goicoechea, a junior, injured his leg and missed the next five games, returning against Jacksonville State. Gurnsey had 8 catches for 99

GAME NOTES: The Grizzlies started the 1993 Big Sky Conference season with a hard-fought win over the option attack of the speedy Bengals in the league opener for both teams. Free safety Carl Franks had a key play in the game, scoring the winning touchdown with 5:12 left in the first half, as he returned an interception 29 yards for a touchdown. Franks, who had recently been moved from cornerback to safety because of Mike Goicoechea's leg injury, had a career-high 17 tackles, a pass deflection, and the interception for a score. He also was named the Division I-AA National Player of the Week by the Football Gazette. Both of Dave Dickenson's touchdown passes were to Gurnsey, who had four touchdown grabs in Montana's first three games. Junior halfback Damon Boddie rushed for 80 vards and had a key 51-yard kickoff return which led to Montana's third touchdown. Junior outside linebacker Kurt Schilling had nine tackles, an interception and a sack, while senior defensive tackle Lance Allen also had 9 stops, as well as two tackles for losses. Idaho State freshman guarterback Alfredo Anderson rushed for 162 yards, and the Bengals racked up 295 rushing yards. The Grizzlies had a seasonlow 304 total yards (188 yards passing) and 13 first downs. Idaho State had 418 yards and 21 first downs, and had the ball for 37 minutes.

In 1915, stars like Harry Adams, Christian Bentz (UM's first gridiron All-American), Earl "Click" Clark, Leonard "Dutch" Daems, and Al "Ribs" Robertson went 2-2-2, but tied undefeated Syracuse, 6-6. The game was played on Thanksgiving Day in Missoula, and Syracuse "the champions of the East," had entered the game having outscored its opponents 256 to 2

GAME NOTES: The Grizzlies snapped a three-game Eagle winning streak, and had a 26-14 half-time lead. The Grizzlies contained Eastern Washington's potent ground game, limiting the Eagles to 38 yards rushing, and 274 total yards (UM had 439 total yards). Dickenson passed for three touchdowns and also rushed for two. Baker had touchdown grabs of 31 and 36 yards, including the clincher with 22 seconds left in the first half, which gave his team a 26-14 lead. Halfback Kelly Stensrud had four catches for 42 yards and his first receiving touchdown at Montana, which covered 11 vards. Junior inside linebacker Garrett Venters had a critical interception - his first career pick, and Montana had seven sacks (for minus 47 yards) by seven different players. Gurnsey had his second 100-yard receiving game of the season, with nine grabs for 109 yards. Safeties Franks and Ericson had nine tackles each. Dickenson earned his first-ever Big Sky Offensive Player of the Week award. So far Dickenson has passed for 12 touchdowns in four games, and rushed for six. The Grizzlies were ranked 16th in the nation prior to the

GAME NOTES: Dickenson passed for a (then) careerhigh 407 yards and four touchdowns, and also rushed for a score -- his fifth straight game with at least one touchdown via the rush. Scott Gurnsey had a career-best (at the time) seven catches for 176 yards and a touchdown. His touchdown grab was also his longest ever a 70-yarder. Junior Shalon Baker had three catches for 111 yards and two of his grabs went for touchdowns of 41 and 51 yards, respectively. A record-crowd of 15,696 fans (the previous mark was 15,438 vs. Montana State in 1992) was on hand at UM's Homecoming contest. Sophomore halfback Scott Spraggins rushed for a career-high 63 yards, and had a crucial 63-yard run from the Grizzly one-yard line to the Boise State 36, setting up UM's final touchdown. There were two ties in the game (10-10 and 17-17), and the Grizzlies had to battle back from two deficits. Montana broke a 17-all tie with 21 unanswered points on touchdown passes from Dickenson to Baker and freshman Mike Erhardt, and on a Dickenson one-yard run. Junior inside linebacker Dan Downs had 14 tackles, a sack, a tackle for a loss, a fumble recovery, and two pass deflections, and was named the league's Defensive Player of the Week, sharing the award with Idaho linebacker Jason Shelt. It was Downs' first player of the week award. It was the debut of BSU freshman quarterback Tony Hilde, who passed for 388 yards. Montana was ranked 12th in Division I-AA prior to the game.

GAME NOTES: The Grizzlies improved to 4-0 in the Big Sky and 5-1 overall, and sophomore Matt Wells had an outstanding game. Wells had five catches for 182 yards, and touchdown grabs of 73 and 87 yards. His 87yard touchdown catch from a Dickenson pass tied the school record set by quarterback Shannon Mornhinweg to wide receiver Scott Moe against Weber State in 1985. Wells also returned two punts for 103 yards, with both returns leading to Montana touchdowns. Wells, who replaced Baker as the punt returner because the latter had a hamstring injury, was named the Big Sky's cooffensive Player of the Week. He shared the award with Idaho quarterback Doug Nussmeier. It was the Grizzlies best start in league since 1970. Downs had a team and career-high 15 tackles, a sack, and a forced fumble, giving him 29 tackles in the Grizzlies' last two games. Ericson added 13 tackles, while Schilling had 12 stops, and Franks added 10. Montana was ranked 12th in the nation going into the game.

On October 22, 1943, the football stadium in Butte was dedicated and named "Naranche Stadium," in honor of Eso Naranche, who was killed in action in North Africa in World War II. A former star at Butte High School and UM, Naranche started at fullback in the 1942 East-West Shrine Game. Eso was the fifth player from UM who participated in the East-West Shrine game since the inaugural game in 1927.

GAME NOTES: Four different Montana players rushed for touchdowns, and Dickenson threw for 259 yards. Montana's defense held NAU to 56 net yards rushing in this key Big Sky Conference game. Montana entered the game 5-1 overall and 4-0 in league, and ranked 8th in the nation, while the Lumberjacks were 6-0 overall and 3-0 in conference, ranked 20th. It was the first (and only) game in 1993 that Dickenson did not throw at least two TD passes. It was, however, Dickenson's 7th consecutive game with a rushing touchdown. One of the key plays of the game was in the fourth quarter, as Schilling picked off QB Jeff Lewis' pass, and returned it for a 45yard score, giving Montana a 31-10 lead. Halfback Damon Boddie added an insurance TD with a 35-yard TD run - the Grizzlies' longest scoring run of the year. Schilling also had 9 tackles, 2 stops for losses, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery. He was named the co-Big Sky defensive player of the week, sharing the award with Montana State's Chris Steinbeisser. Senior defensive end Shawn Merz had 6 tackles, 2 sacks and 2 tackles for losses, and a forced fumble. Junior linebacker Dennis Scates had 8 tackles in his first start, as he replaced Garrett Venters who was out with a leg injury. The victory gave Montana head coach Don Read and the Grizzlies their eighth straight winning season, in Read's eighth season at UM.

GAME NOTES: The Grizzlies scored on 7 of 13 possessions and held the Gamecocks' potent running attack in check, improving to 7-1 overall in this nonleague contest. QBs Dave Dickenson and Bert Wilberger combined for 428 passing yards and 4 TDs, while JSU completed just 5-of-22 passes for 36 yards. Montana out-gained Jacksonville State 587 to 219 in net yards. Sophomore halfback Kelly Stensrud rushed for a careerhigh 64 yards and caught 3 passes for 48 yards, including a 33-yard TD. Sophomore Matt Wells had a game-high 8 catches, and 11 different players caught at least one pass. Freshman kicker Andy Larson was threeof-three in field goal attempts, including a career-long 46-yarder. Junior linebacker Dennis Scates had 10 tackles in his first start of the year, subbing for an ill (appendicitis) Garrett Venters. Dan Downs also had 10 tackles, safety Carl Franks had 7 tackles and a forced fumble, and senior tackle Lance Allen had two sacks. Senior defensive end Shawn Merz injured his leg in the game, and did not return to action until the play-off game against Delaware. Merz had 31 tackles, 4 forced fumbles, and 3 sacks during the season. Venters missed the next two games after undergoing an operation following an attack of appendicitis, and returned to action against Idaho. Montana was ranked 8th in the Sports Network poll prior to the game with Jacksonville State, last year's Division II national champion.

In 1969, head coach Jack Swarthout guided his talented team to an unprecedented perfect (10-0) regular-season. It was Swarthout's third season as head coach, and his 1970 team would also go 10-0. The Grizzlies lost to North Dakota State both years in the Camellia Bowl in the naitonal playoffs, held in Sacramento, California.

GAME NOTES: Montana played a non-league game for the second straight week, and scored on 8-of-10 possessions in the first half, to take a lopsided, 44-7 lead. Senior receiver Bill Cockhill had five catches for 167 yards and a career-high three touchdowns -- his first touchdown receptions of the 1993 season! More significantly, Cockhill became UM's all-time career receiving yardage leader, passing Mike Trevathan, who had 1,969 receiving yards from 1987-90. Junior receiver Shalon Baker had another touchdown catch in the game - the 15th of his career for a school record. Baker passed Mike Rice, who had 14 touchdown grabs from 1985-86. Quarterback Dave Dickenson rushed for a touchdown, giving him 11 for the year, which tied him with Steve Sullivan, who had 11 rushing touchdowns in 1920. Freshmen linebackers Mike Bouchee and David Sirmon each had 8 tackles on defense. Montana did not score in the fourth quarter for the first time this season, but outscored its opponents 128-56 in the final period in its first nine games. Junior cornerback Keith Burke picked off his fifth pass (a team high) of the season. The Grizzlies (8-1) moved up to fourth in the I-AA poll -- their highest ranking since early in the 1990 season.

Safety/returner Greg Anderson became UM's firstever three-time all-Big Sky selection in 1974-75-76.

GAME NOTES: Montana won its first Big Sky championship since 1982. The title game was set up when E. Washington won 16-7 at Montana State earlier in the day. UM's Dave Dickenson completed 32-of-40 passes (80%), and a career-high 512 yards and 4 TDs, and also rushed for 2 scores. Dickenson was almost flawless in the 2nd half, completing 20-of-22 (90.9 percent) passes for 296 yards. For the first time this year, three receivers had more than 100 receiving yards led by Gurnsey with 137. He was followed by Baker with 123 yards, and Wells (104). The lead changed hands six times in the first three quarters, but the Grizzlies broke open a 27-all tie exploding for 27 fourth-quarter points. UM scored 3 TDs on Dickenson passes. The final score came on a 38-vard fumble return by Carl Franks as time expired. Halfback Damon Boddie answered the Vandals' 1st score with a 99-yard kickoff return -- the 2nd longest in school history. Bill Cockhill had 7 catches, breaking Brian Salonen's (1980-83) career record of 151. Dickenson's 2 TD carries gave him 13 rushing TDs for the season, as he broke Steve Sullivan's record of 11, set in 1920! Despite a 47-point win the previous week. UM entered the game ranked 5th, while Idaho was 6th.

GAME NOTES: THE STREAK continued, as the Griz beat the Cats for the 8th straight year. Montana went a perfect 7-0 in the Big Sky Conference en route to the title. The Grizzlies finished the regular-season at 10-1, and their 10 victories is the most in a regular-season since the '69 and '70 teams went 10-0. It was also a record 11th league win in-a-row, dating back to the '92 season, breaking the former mark of 10 in-a-row, by the '69 and '70 teams. The Griz scored TDs on 4 of their first 5 possessions, taking an early 28-3 lead. Gurnsey had 173 receiving yards, giving him 1,079 for the season, breaking Marvin Turk's record of 1,047 yards, set in '91. Dickenson's other single-season records included: completions (262), passing percentage (67.2%), passing yards (3,640 yards), and TDs (32). Senior receiver Bill Cockhill set two career receiving marks with 158 catches for 2,257 yards. Baker improved his career TD record to 17 TD catches. Dickenson also tied a single-season record with 84 points, while kicker Andy Larson finished 4th in single-season scoring with 81 points. Dickenson was named the league's player of the week on offense for the third time, (with WSU halfback Markeith Ross). UM was ranked 3rd in the nation following the win.

The PAT was missed, the Blue Hens moved the ball 70 yards in six plays, winning on a 32-yard pass to Keita Malloy, who also started at cornerback. Malloy's TD grab came over the out-stretched arms of safety Todd Ericson, who appeared to be in position for an interception. UD completed just 5 passes, two to Malloy, and both went for TDs. QB Dave Dickenson set a I-AA playoff record, completing 84.1 percent (37-of-44) passes, good for 409 yards and 4 TDs, and also rushed for a TD, but was sacked 6 times. Sophomore receiver Matt Wells had a career-high 14 catches. Boddie had 309 all-purpose yards: 191 on kick-off returns, 69 receiving, and 49 rushing. Delaware halfbacks Daryl Brown and Lanue Johnson combined for 351 rushing yards and 4 TDs. Safeties Carl Franks and Ericson each had 13 tackles. The Blue Hens lost 33-30 on a last-second field goal at Marshall in the second round of the playoffs.



Big Sky Conference



The Big Sky Athletic Conference is starting its 32nd season of operation with championships being conducted in 13 sports including men's and women's cross country, basketball, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, women's volleyball, women's golf, and football. The Big Sky has eight member institutions and is affiliated with NCAA Division I in all sports except football, which is classified as Division I-AA.

The 1993-94 athletic season in the Big Sky Conference is the sixth in which the league will sponsor championship competition in women's sports. On July 1, 1988, the Mountain West Athletic Conference, located in Cheney, Washington, merged with the Big Sky, moving and combining office staffs in Boise, Idaho. The Mountain West conference had been in existence since 1982.

The Big Sky Conference consists of Boise State University, Boise, Idaho; Eastern Washington University, Cheney, Washington; University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho; Idaho State University, Pocatello, Idaho; University of Montana, Missoula, Montana; Montana State University, Bozeman, Montana; Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, Arizona; and Weber State University, Ogden, Utah. Formed in 1963, the Big Sky Conference consisted of charter members Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga University, Montana, Montana State and Weber State.

Boise State and Northern Arizona joined the league July 1, 1970, in the Big Sky's first expansion. Nevada was admitted to the league July 1, 1979, replacing former charter member Gonzaga (Nevada left the Big Sky on July 1, 1992). On July 1, 1987, Eastern Washington became the Big Sky's ninth member. When all nine members of the Mountain West Conference and Big Sky Conference were parallel the way was paved to merge the two leagues.

The Big Sky Conference has member institutions in five states and covers more than 220,000 square miles (or almost 1/12th the total square miles in the contintental

United States). The five states included in the Big Sky Conference (Arizona, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Washington) span from the Canadian to Mexican borders. The Big Sky is one of two major conferences located in the Rocky Mountain region.

The name BIG SKY originated in a novel authored in 1947, by the late A. B. (Bud) Guthrie, of Great Falls, Montana, entitled THE BIG SKY. Jack Hollowell, former Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. Harry Missildine, of the Spokane SPOKESMAN-REVIEW, called for the Conference to be named "The Big Sky Conference" in his column of February 20, 1963. On February 20, 1963. On February 25, 1963, the Conference name was adopted by the presidents of the newly formed league during a meeting in Spokane, Washington.

Ron Stephenson is the current Conference Commissioner, taking over the post July 1, 1981, from Steve Belko, who had served since 1977. John Roning was the league's second Commissioner, serving from 1971 until 1977. Jack Freil was the Big Sky's first Commissioner, serving from 1963 to 1971.

Dr. Sharon Holmberg currently serves as Assistant Commissioner for Compliance Services of the Big Sky Conference, and is in her seventh year with the league.

Amie Sgalio is the Big Sky's Assistant Commissioner for Information Services beginning his 16th year with the conference, while Stephanie Grimes is in her third year as Assistant Information Director and was a graduate assistant at Iowa State before joining the Big Sky Conference. She interned at the Big Sky office in 1989-90.

Art Mendini is in his seventh year with the Big Sky as the league's Assistant Commissioner for Officiating Services, and Kay Johnson, the Big Sky's Administrative Assistant, has been at that post for eight years.


