This is an introductory course. No assumptions are made regarding prior knowledge of the topic. Ethical, as well as political and theoretical considerations, will be important to our evaluation of historical and contemporary international issues. The goal of the class is to introduce students to a number of pressing global issues and to encourage critical thinking about them.

Students are strongly encouraged to read all assigned readings <u>carefully and</u> <u>before the class period for which they are assigned</u>. We will discuss and debate issues raised by the readings in class. It will be near to impossible to follow – let alone participate – in these discussions if you have not already read the material.

Your grade will be based on four in-class exams. Each exam will count for ¼ of the grade. Exams will be based on assigned readings, class discussions, and any films we watch or guest speakers that address the class. If you miss a film showing, you are responsible for locating a copy of the film and watching it on your own. If you miss a guest speaker, you are responsible for finding out what was discussed.

It may become necessary, over the course of the class, to rearrange assignments or alter the schedule. Any changes in scheduling will be announced in class. If you miss class, you are responsible for checking with another student or the TA for lecture notes and any announcements that may have been made regarding scheduling or assignments.
