#### Introduction

This course on World Regional Geography introduces the latest ideas, concepts, and theories in geography while also developing a strong foundation in the fundamentals of world regions. It is an issues-oriented program that explicitly recognizes the vast geographic changes taking place because of globalization. With this focus we will join the many schools that consider globalization to be the most fundamental reorganization of the world's socioeconomic, cultural, and geopolitical structure since the Industrial Revolution. As a core course in the geography curriculum, it will assist the students in understanding and taking a critical perspective on two interactive themes: the consequences of converging environmental, cultural, political, and economic systems inherent to globalization and the persistence — and even expansion— of geographic diversity and differences in the face of globalization. These two opposing forces, homogenization and diversification, will be permanently revisited over the course.

A total of 13 quizzes (10 questions each) will be offered through the semester, to be completed in the class period. Quiz format is a combination of multiple choice/true-false answers, short answers and location of a number of features on a map. Questions will refer to content in the textbook and/or treated in class.

The research paper (~4,000 words) will consist of a literature review about the geography, history and present conditions of one of the regions in the course program, to be submitted on Moodle by December 20<sup>th</sup>, 11:55 PM.

Guidelines to prepare the quizzes and the research paper will be provided on the course Moodle site.

On quiz days, bring your Griz card, a ball pen, a pencil and an eraser. You should not need more for the quiz. At the time of the quiz you may not use anything else, which includes your cell phone, ball caps and other hats, books, notebooks, etc.
