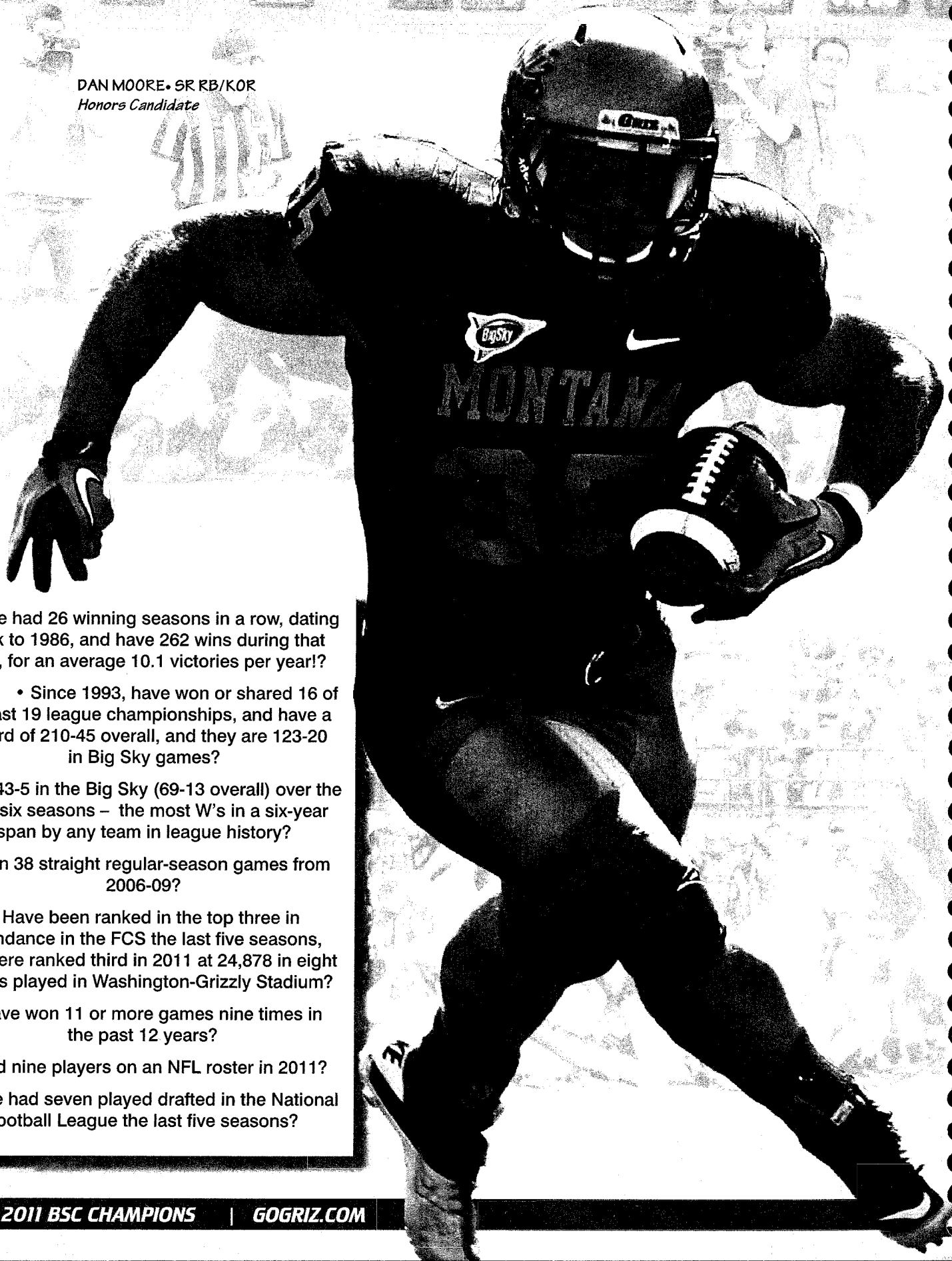

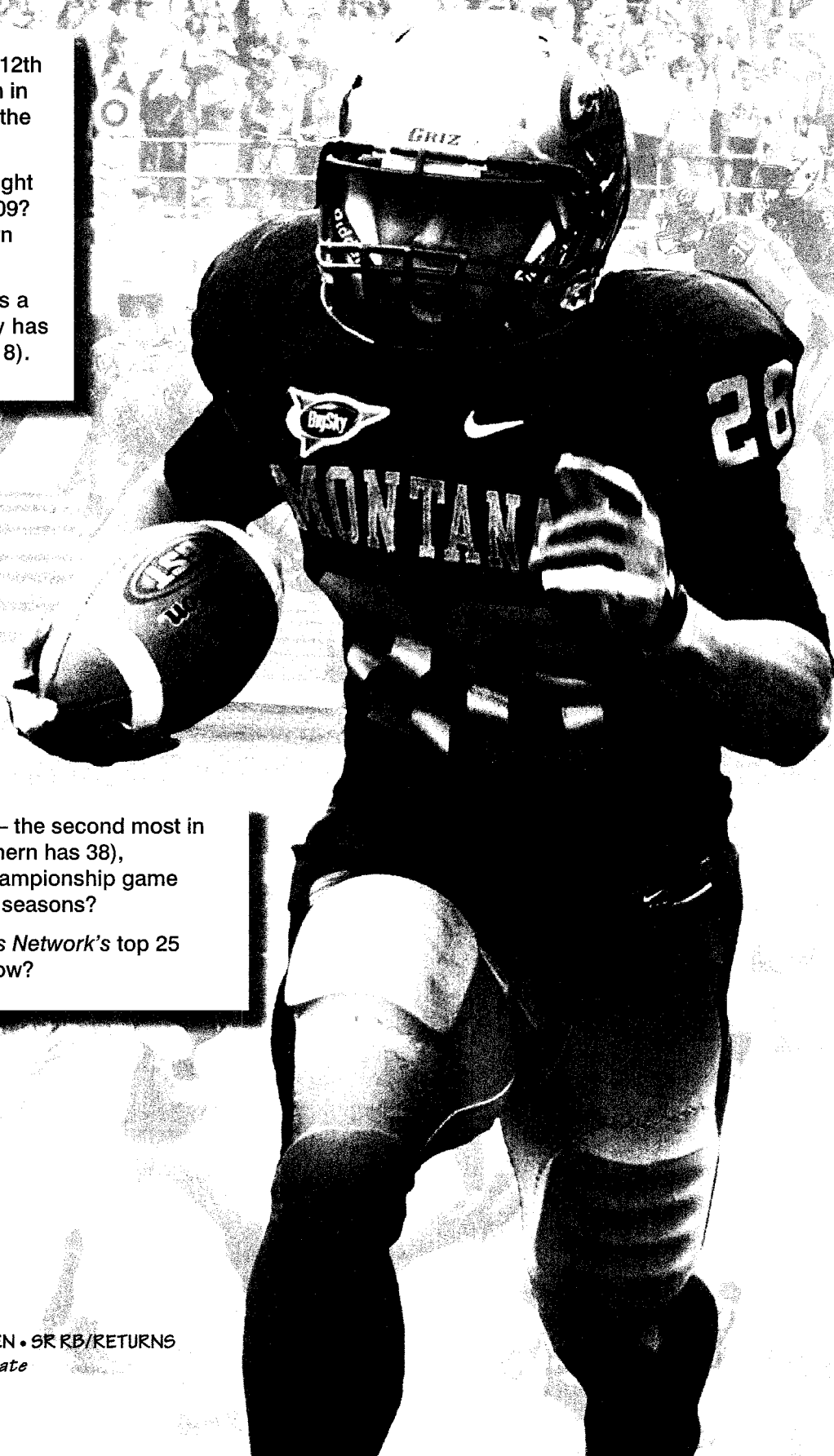

- Have had 26 winning seasons in a row, dating back to 1986, and have 262 wins during that time, for an average 10.1 victories per year!
 - Since 1993, have won or shared 16 of the last 19 league championships, and have a record of 210-45 overall, and they are 123-20 in Big Sky games?
- Are 43-5 in the Big Sky (69-13 overall) over the past six seasons – the most W's in a six-year span by any team in league history?
- Won 38 straight regular-season games from 2006-09?
 - Have been ranked in the top three in attendance in the FCS the last five seasons, and were ranked third in 2011 at 24,878 in eight games played in Washington-Grizzly Stadium?
 - Have won 11 or more games nine times in the past 12 years?
 - Had nine players on an NFL roster in 2011?
 - Have had seven players drafted in the National Football League the last five seasons?

DID YOU KNOW THAT THE MONTANA GRIZZLIES...

- Conference title in 2009 was their 12th straight – the second longest skein in Division 1 history? (Oklahoma has the record of 14, set from 1946-59).
- Hold the FCS record with 17 straight playoff appearances from 1993-2009? (The old record was 10 by Eastern Kentucky from 1986-95)?
- Have participated in the playoffs a record 23 times? (Eastern Kentucky has 19, while Appalachian State has 18).



- Have 32 playoff victories – the second most in FCS history (Georgia Southern has 38), and have played in the FCS's championship game seven out of the past 17 seasons?
- Have been ranked in the *Sports Network's* top 25 for 19 years in a row?

For 13 consecutive semesters, The University of Montana student-athletes have maintained an average cumulative grade-point average above 3.0. In autumn semester, UM's 272 athletes maintained an average cumulative GPA of 3.06, compared to the 2.91 GPA earned by the general student populations. The UM women's cross country team led with a 3.69 GPA.

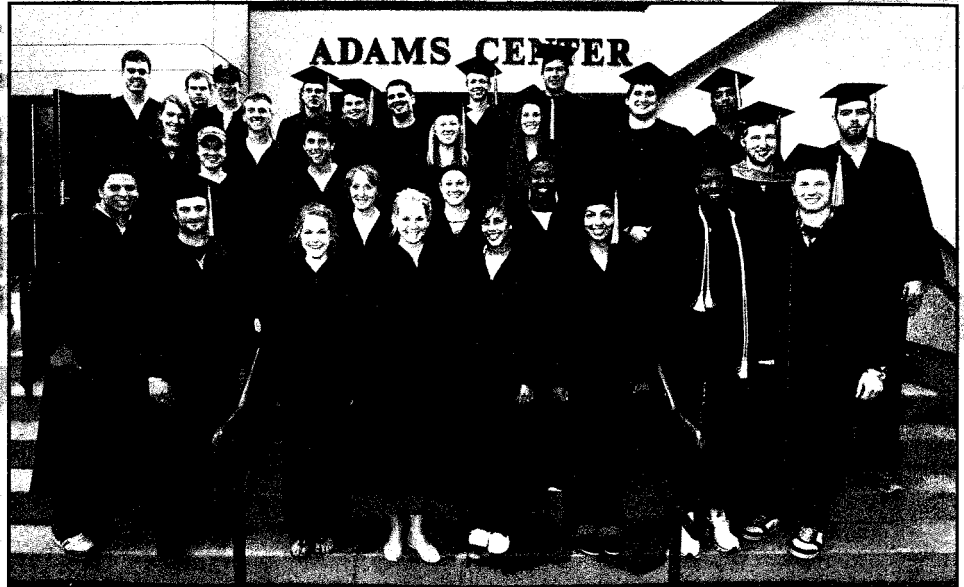
The University of Montana's Katrina Drennen and Bryan Waldhauser were recognized as the school's 2012 Grizzly Cup recipients.

Originally the award was presented annually to one Montana senior (male) student-athlete who excelled athletically on the field/court/track, as well as in academics, and who also represented the University well in the community. Starting in 2009, the Grizzly Cup was awarded to two athletes: one given to UM's male student-athlete of the year, while another goes to the school's outstanding female student-athlete.

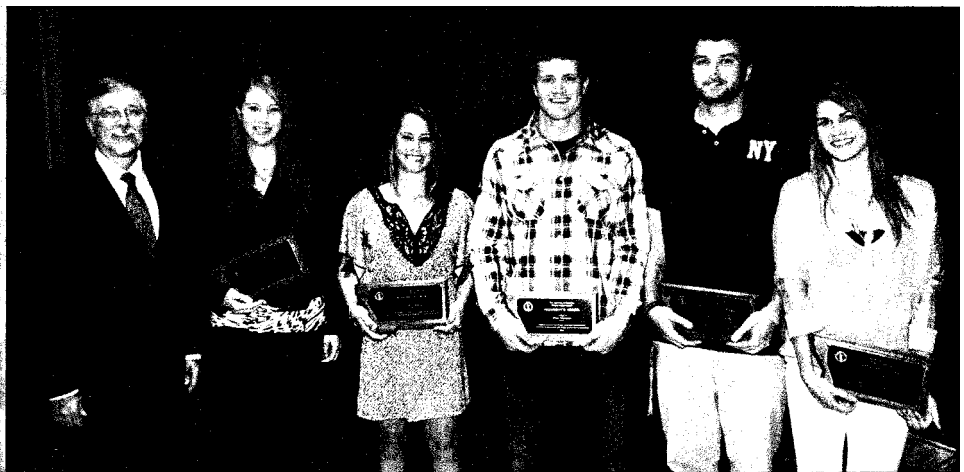
Drennen was a four-time All-Big Sky Conference performer in cross country and a five-time Big Sky track champion.

Waldhauser, a former walk-on, began UM's Master of Business program in the fall of 2011 and maintained a 3.56 GPA in that curriculum. He earned his undergraduate degree in business management at Montana, accumulating a 3.62 GPA. He was voted to the 2011 Capital One Academic All-American Division I football first team (along with teammate Bobby Alt) by Co-SIDA (College Sports Information Director's of America).

An impressive collection of 146 Montana student-athletes were treated to dinner in recognition of having cumulative GPAs of 3.0 or better during the 20th Annual Robert O. Lindsay honors banquet in April of 2012.

Five men and women won the prestigious President's Award for having the Department of Athletics' highest GPA for the spring 2011 and fall 2011 semesters. All five had a perfect 4.0 cumulative GPA for their collegiate careers.

Montana won the 2011-12 Big Sky Conference Men's All-Sports Trophy in May, 2012. It is the first Men's All-Sports Trophy for the Grizzlies since 1970-71 and just their second since the inauguration of the Big Sky Conference in 1963.

Montana is currently in possession of the Sterlings Bank Presidents Cup. The Grizzlies won their second Cup in July of 2011 with second-place finishes in both athletics and academics.

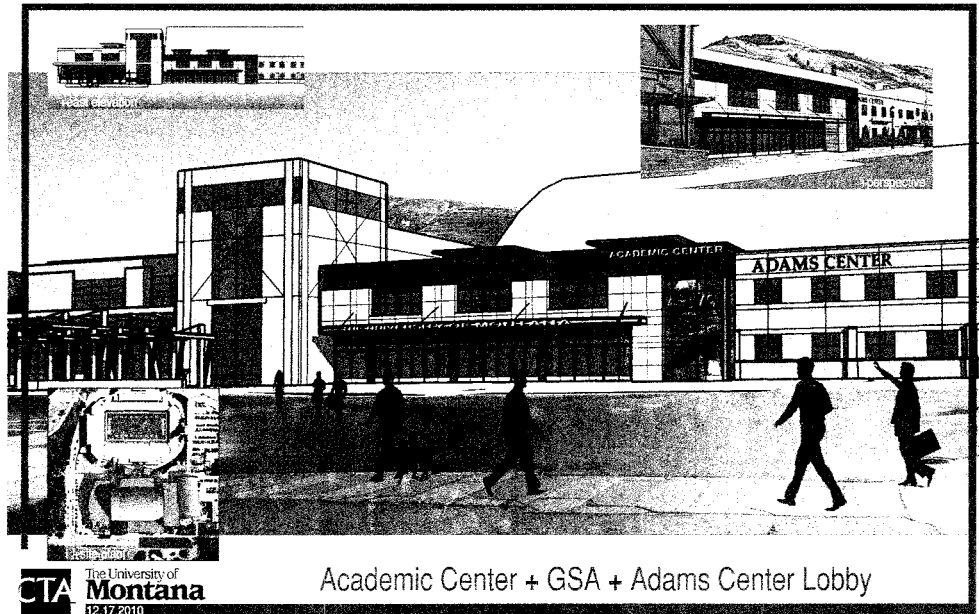
INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS NEW ACADEMIC CENTER (Infrastructure and Student-Athlete Success Go Hand-In-Hand)

With support from the university administration and private donors, the athletic facility improvement plan includes the following:

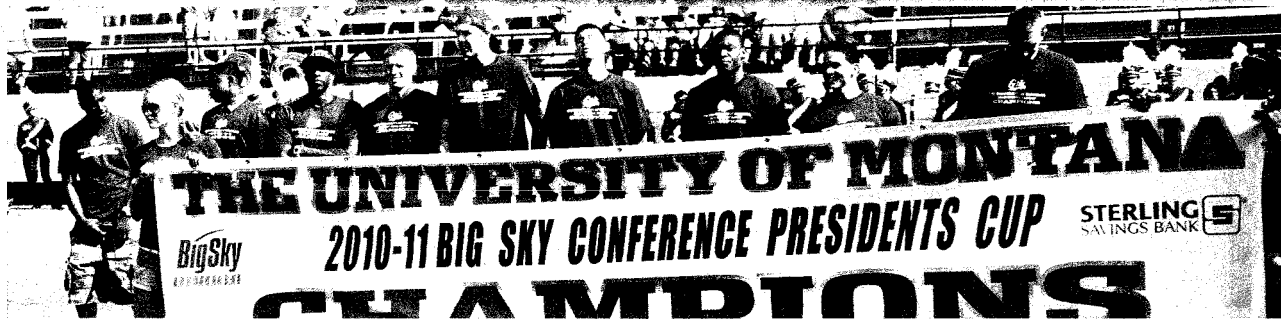
Construct an academic center, meeting rooms and additional offices in the open space between the current athletic complex and the student recreation center (see artist rendition to the left). Lower level will remain a lobby to accommodate fire code restrictions and the Adams Center.

Relocate the current weight room to a site to be finalized. The new strength and conditioning center would feature at least 10,000 square feet of training space to serve all student-athletes.

Renovate space currently used as the men's locker room, academic center and weight room into multiple locker rooms for the sports of men's basketball, football, men's tennis, and men's track and field. Addition of locker rooms will also open space to help the university host more outside events like concerts and high school tournaments. All of these renovations will help the university in its quest to address equity and Title IX issues as well.

Though service activities and outreach to the community have been taking place for years with individual contributions, spring 2008 began the official induction of the "Griz in the Community" service program. The program enables student-athletes to have a holistic college experience by giving back to the surrounding community, speaking to local school children, and serving as role models in the area. 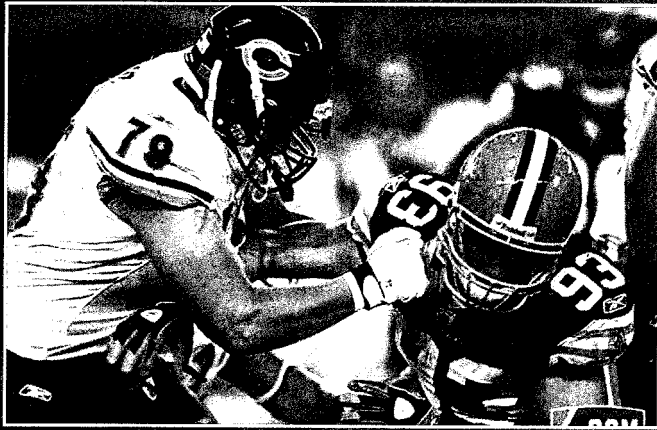

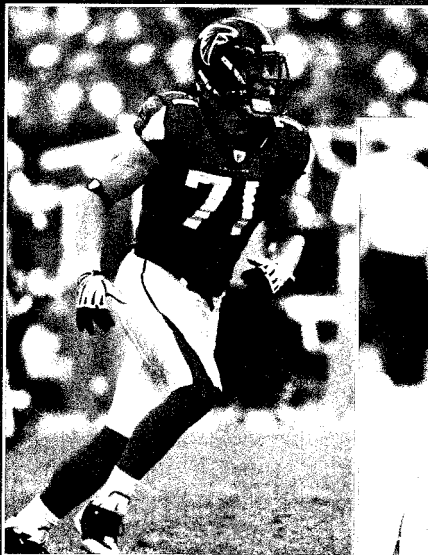

The Home of the Grizzlies

This will be the 27th season that The University of Montana football team calls Washington-Grizzly Stadium (capacity 25,217)/John Hoyt field their home.

Montana was ranked third at the Division 1 Football Championship Subdivision level in attendance, averaging 24,878 fans (201,624) in eight home games, including two playoff contests. (Appalachian State led the nation, averaging 26,211 in seven home games).

The Grizzlies broke their all-time attendance record in 2011, as they drew 26,066 fans in a 17-14 victory over 10th -ranked Eastern Washington, the defending FCS champion. The only other time the Griz have topped the 26,000 mark was in 2010 against Montana State (26,019) – the first time more than 26,000 fans had attended any game in the state of Montana.

The Grizzlies not only broke the Washington-Grizzly Stadium attendance mark in the EWU game, but during the 2011 season they had three of their largest crowds ever: 25,919 (Northern Colorado), 25,855 versus Cal Poly (the largest attendance ever in a home opener), and 25,744 against Portland State. All six attendance marks in UM's 2011 season rank in the top 25 all-time.

In 2010 Montana was second in the country in attendance (averaging a Big Sky Conference record 25,448 fans per game), while three seasons ago, in 2009, Montana led the nation in attendance, at 24,417 in nine home games. The Griz have led the FCS in average attendance in 2005, 2006, and 2009, and was ranked second in 2007, 2008, and 2010.

The Griz played just three games in Washington-Grizzly Stadium in their inaugural season in 1986, and that first game on October 18, 1986 was a 38-31 come-from-behind win over Idaho State. Since that first contest the Grizzlies have an overall record of 171-21 (89.1%). Over the past six seasons the Grizzlies are 37-1 (.974) at home in regular-season games.

Montana is 31-1 (.969) in Washington-Grizzly Stadium over the last four seasons. UM has gone undefeated in 2008, 2009, and 2011. The Griz are 46-3 (.939) in WGS over the past six years.

UM set a conference record with 27 consecutive regular-season wins from 2006-08; that skein ended with a 45-28 setback on Oct. 4 at Weber State in 2008.

No Place Like Home

Not only has Montana won 171 games in its 26 seasons of playing in Washington-Grizzly Stadium, but it has gone undefeated 10 times, including three of the last four years.

Starting the 1994 season, the Griz reeled off 30 straight home victories. The win streak began with a 41-7 win over Sonoma State on Sept. 3 and ended with a 40-35 loss to EWU on Oct. 18, 1997. Montana's 30 consecutive home wins are the fifth longest streak in FCS history.

New Lights For 2012

The Grizzlies don't have any night games this season, but they will still be using the newly installed lights in WGS later in the season on dark and cloudy days and when it gets darker earlier in the day. When the Big Sky Conference recently signed a television contract with ROOTS Sports each school in the league was required to install lights in their stadiums.

The new lights, installed by Musco Lighting based in Oskaloosa, Iowa, made their debut on Saturday, April 14, at UM's annual spring game.

The lights are of the highest quality available, and feature "horizontal footcandles" in the 120-125 range, which means the Washington-Grizzly Stadium has the ability to host all levels of NCAA televised football playoff games. It also includes lighting in the tailgate/parking areas.

The project cost was approximately \$950,000, and includes a 25-year or 20,000 hours service agreement.

Stadium Expansions

Washington-Grizzly Stadium underwent its third expansion, at a cost of approximately \$6.5 million, prior to the 2008 football season. The eastside expansion now houses a 500-seat "Stadium Club" with two membership levels: the "Canyon Room," which has 125 seats inside and 125 seats outside, and the "Hellgate Terrace," which has 250 seats.

The expansion in 2008 provided 375 Grizzly Scholarship Association priority seats, which are located between the 25-and-40-yard lines and on both sides of the 50-yard line, as well as 1,150 non-priority seats located on the 10-to-25-yard lines. This expansion increased the current seating capacity of Washington-Grizzly Stadium to 25,217.

The second expansion occurred in the spring and summer of 2003, and approximately 4,000 seats were added to the north end zone section, increasing the stadium capacity to 23,183, with a cost around \$3.5 million.

In the spring of 1995 the stadium underwent its first expansion in the north and south end zones. At that time there were 12,500 permanent seats, and seating was available, weather-permitting, in the grass end zones, which made the capacity around 15,000. The cost of that expansion was about \$2.5 million.

GrizVision, a state-of-the-art video and message center, was added in 2002. GrizVision displays game statistics, player profiles, digital replays, and shots of the crowd. The screen is one of the largest in the FCS, measuring 26 feet by 36 feet, and it came from New York City and Times Square.

A natural-grass stadium gave way to SprinTurf prior to the 2001 season at a cost of about \$1 million, which was paid for by an anonymous donor. The field was named "John Hoyt Field" in 2001 at the request of the anonymous donor, in honor of Hoyt, a long-time Grizzly booster, who passed away in March of that year.

The locker rooms measure 4,000-plus square feet. Adams Center features a 7,000-square foot weight room, a 4,500-square foot athletic treatment center, the Jacobson Academic Center, and a meeting room with big screen videos. The women's locker room covers 4,000 square feet. There are also three other meeting rooms totaling 2,000 square feet.



Stadium History & Namesake

The plans for an on-campus football facility at Montana came to fruition in August of 1985 when Missoula businessman Dennis R. Washington and the employees of Washington Corporations provided a gift of \$1 million, hence the name of Washington-Grizzly Stadium. The initial cost of the stadium was around \$3.2 million.

There are 49 private boxes located on the east and west sides of the stadium, and they are individually decorated and furnished.

DIRECTV Sports Networks & Big Sky Conference Ink Five-Year Television Pact

SEATTLE, WA (January 17, 2012) DIRECTV Sports Networks and the Big Sky Conference have entered into a five-year agreement making DIRECTV Sports Networks and its ROOT SPORTS (formerly known as Fox Sports Northwest) branded regional sports networks the league's official TV partner and the home of Big Sky football and basketball. Financial details of the agreement were not disclosed.

DIRECTV Sports Networks will produce and televise up to 18 Big Sky football games each season, including the 112th annual Montana-Montana State rivalry game in 2012.

The Grizzlies' conference football games not televised by ROOT SPORTS™ will be available on a bid basis through the Big Sky office by any interested parties. The televising rights for Montana's two home non-league games are owned by Learfield Sports (aka: Grizzly Sports Properties) and Grizzly Athletics, and they were made available on a bid basis.

The Grizzlies' 11-game schedule in 2012 features six home games, including four Big Sky foes, along with two FCS squads. (Montana's 2012 schedule is located on add 2 of this release).

Montana opens its 2012 season at home on Sept. 1, and welcomes back former Griz head coach Joe Glenn and his South Dakota Coyotes team, which was 6-5 last season and had wins over nationally ranked Eastern Washington (30-17) and Southern Utah (24-19).

UM's second home game (Sept. 15) pits the Griz against another outstanding FCS team, the Liberty Flames, a 7-4 team a year ago. The Grizzlies play their third home game in four weeks, and their Big Sky opener, on Sept. 22 against the Northern Arizona Lumberjacks in their annual Homecoming contest.

The Grizzlies host three other conference games, beginning with a new league member, Southern Utah on Oct. 13, followed by an Oct. 27th contest against Idaho State. Montana ends its regular-season on Nov. 17, hosting a Montana State team that was 10-3 last season.

On Sept. 8 the Griz travel to Boone, North Carolina, to take on the Appalachian State Mountaineers in a game which will highlight two of the nation's most successful FCS programs over the past decade. The Griz have an open week on Nov. 10, the week prior

to the Griz-Cat contest.

The rest of the schedule includes conference road games at Eastern Washington (Sept. 29), Northern Colorado (Oct. 6), and at inaugural Big Sky member North Dakota (Oct. 20) and Weber State (Nov. 3).

DIRECTV Sports Networks owns and operates three regional sports networks branded as ROOT SPORTS™. The three ROOT SPORTS networks reach more than 8.7 million viewers across 18 states, including Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho, North Dakota, Utah and Colorado in the Big Sky footprint.

Big Sky games will be distributed primarily to the Northwest and Rocky Mountain ROOT SPORTS networks, which are carried by all major distributors in those territories, including Comcast, DIRECTV, DISH Network, Cablevision and many others. In addition, as the national television rights holder for Big Sky athletics, DIRECTV Sports Networks will have the ability to distribute Big Sky games both regionally and nationally.

Under the agreement, it may also broadcast up to 12 regular season conference basketball games as well as Big Sky quarterfinal and semifinal conference men's basketball tournament games. All events will be produced and distributed in High Definition with new state-of-the-art graphics elements customized for the Big Sky and its teams.

"Our agreement with DIRECTV Sports Networks and ROOT SPORTS solidifies our position as a major player in Division I football in the western United States," said Big Sky Commissioner Doug Fullerton. "This is a landmark deal for the Big Sky Conference, as it will increase our exposure regionally and nationally in football and basketball. We are very excited to begin this partnership with DIRECTV Sports Networks. We know our fans will appreciate the high production values, which will be second-to-none."

"We are proud to partner with the Big Sky Conference," said Patrick Crumb, President of DIRECTV Sports Networks. "Our distributors and viewers in the Northwest and Rocky Mountain regions have consistently requested Big Sky match-ups and we are excited to bring these rivalries to a broader audience."

About DIRECTV Sports Networks:

Seattle-based DIRECTV Sports Networks is a wholly owned subsidiary of DIRECTV and operates three regional sports networks branded as ROOT SPORTS™. The Big Sky is one of the premier leagues at the Division I Football Championship Subdivision Level.

The conference has advanced teams to the FCS championship game for three straight seasons from 2008-2010. Eastern Washington won the national championship in 2010.

Last season Montana advanced to the semifinals and finished third in the final poll. Montana State advanced to the quarterfinals and finished seventh in the final poll.

Multiple Big Sky teams have qualified for the FCS postseason 13 consecutive seasons.

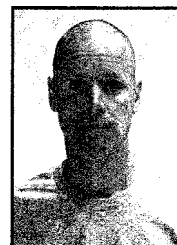

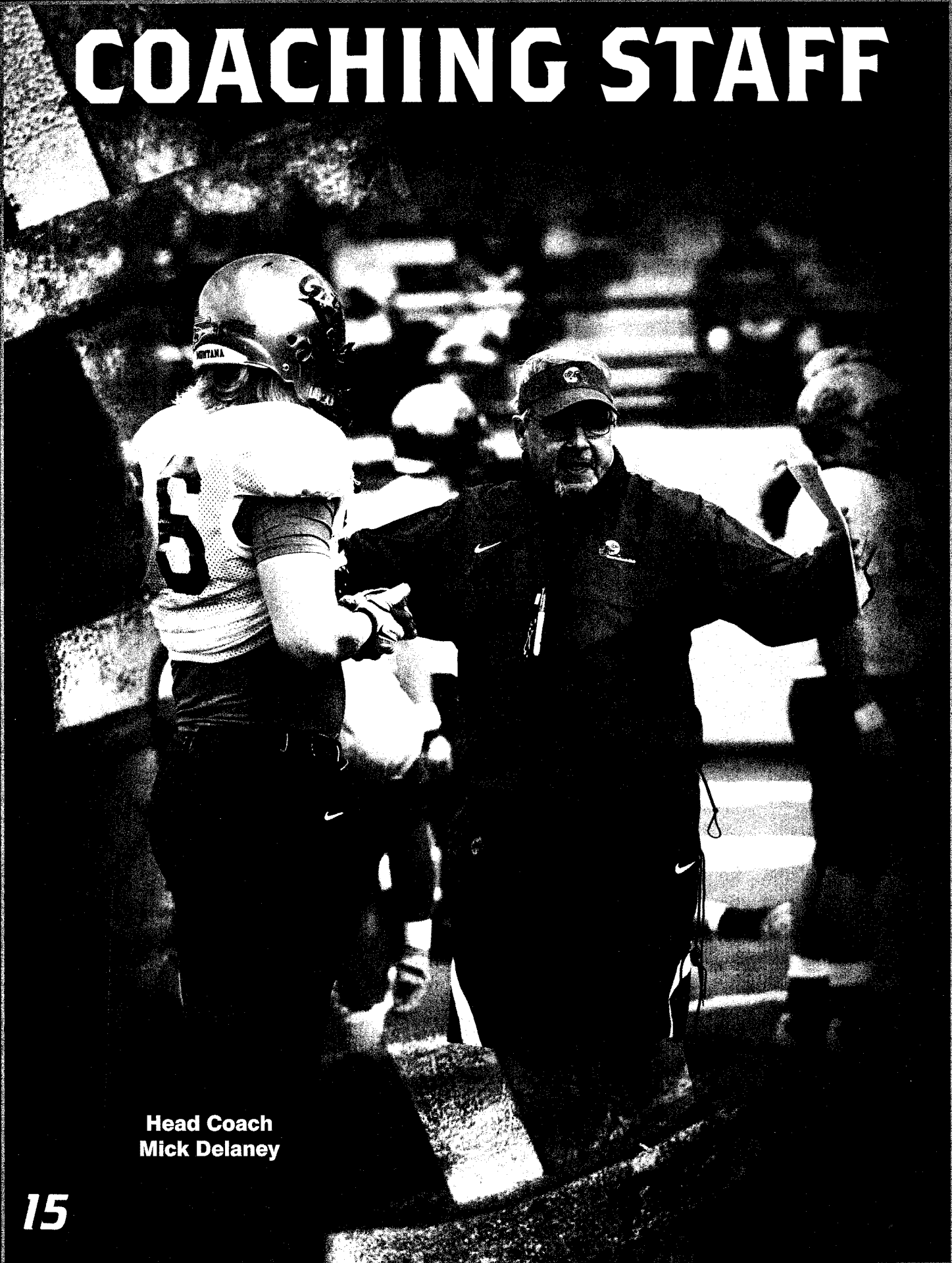

Head Football Coach Mick Delaney

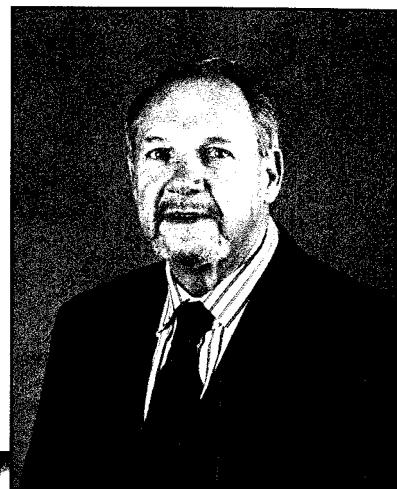
Mick Delaney was named the interim head football coach at The University of Montana in March of 2012 and became the permanent head coach in July of 2012. He replaced Robin Pflugrad whose contract was not renewed after serving as UM's mentor the previous two seasons.

Delaney recently completed his fourth season as an assistant coach at Montana, working with the running backs, and was also an associate head coach. He had retired from coaching two months prior to assuming the position as interim head coach. He was instrumental in the development of running back Chase Reynolds, who rushed for 4,067 yards and a school-record 52 touchdowns from 2008-10.

Delaney began coaching football in 1964, and this will be his 28th at the collegiate level.

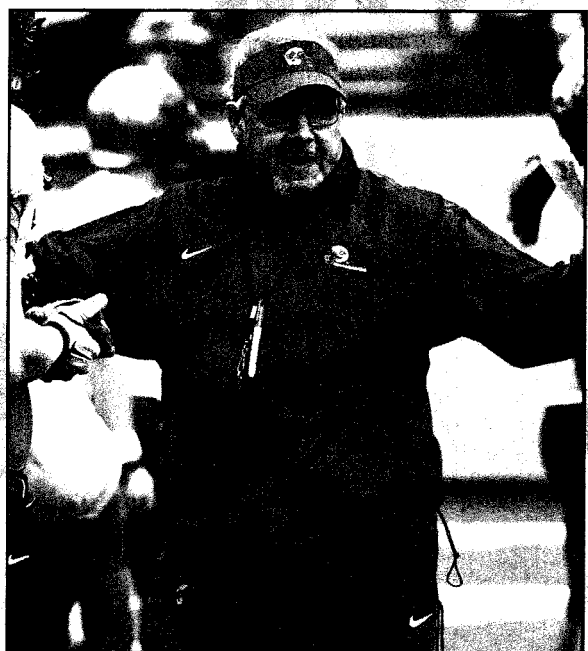
Originally from Butte, he came to Montana from Colorado State where he was an assistant coach for former head coach Sonny Lubick for 15 seasons from 1993-2007.

Former Griz head coach Bobby Hauck hired Delaney in 2008. Pflugrad retained Delaney as the lone official holdover from Hauck's staff.



While at CSU, Delaney coached some of the finest running backs in school history, including five first-team all-conference selections such as Cecil Sapp (2000). Sapp was a finalist for the Doak Walker Award as the nation's most outstanding running back and set a school rushing record with 1,601 yards in 2002. Sapp went on to play with the Denver Broncos.

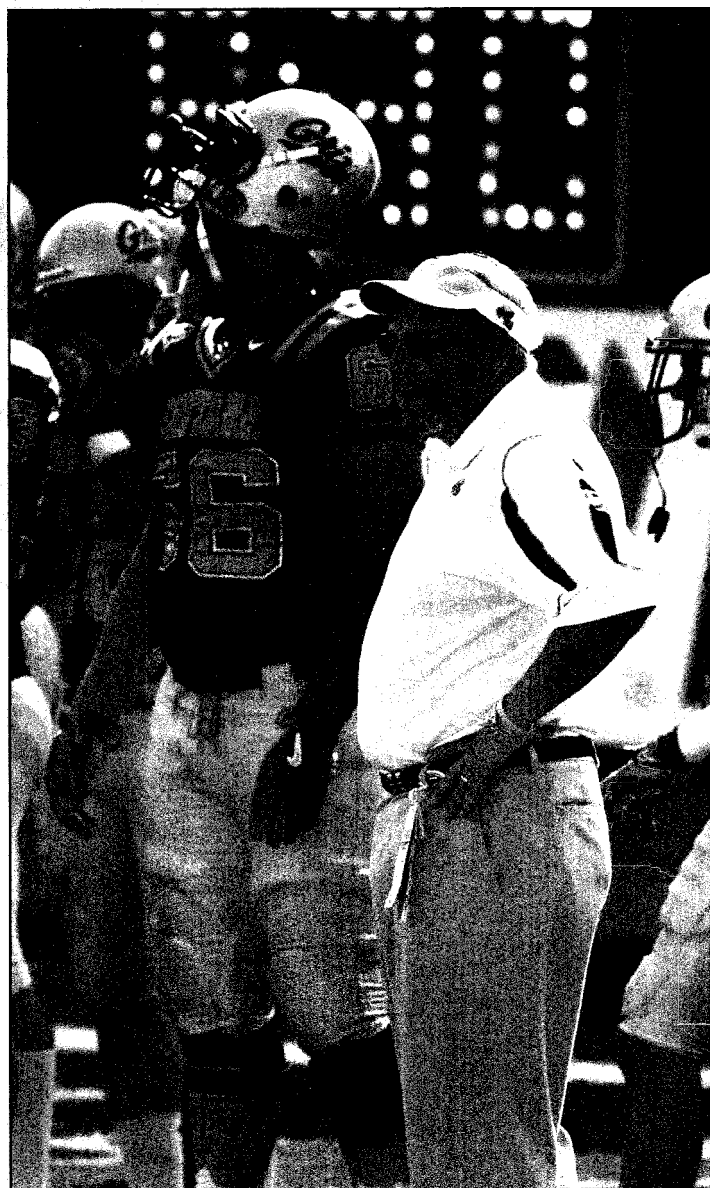
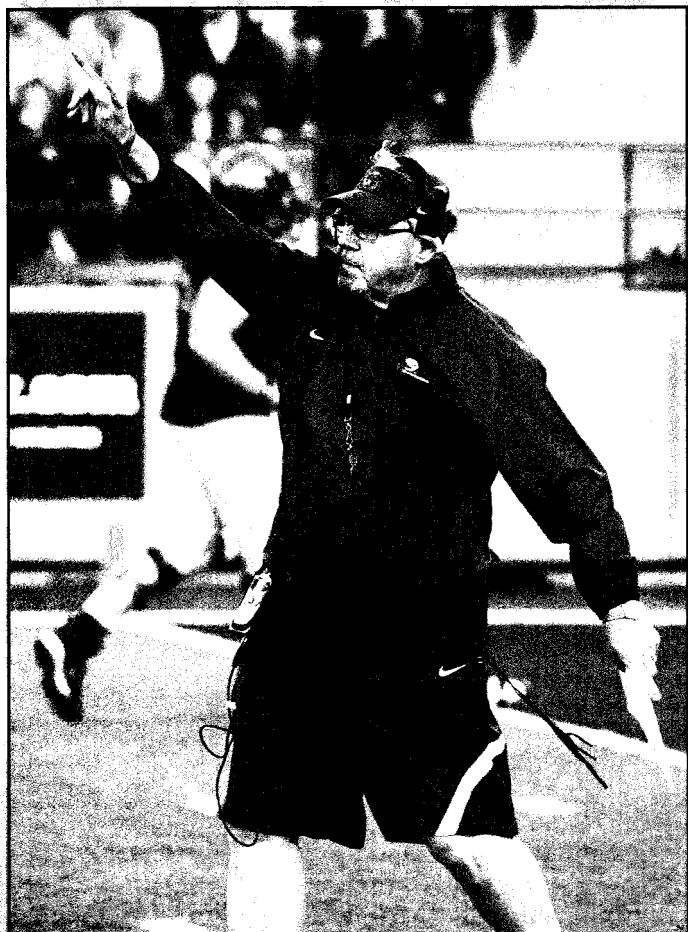
Prior to coaching the Rams, Delaney was the head football coach and athletic director at Western Montana, Dillon, in 1991 and 1992. He served as the athletic director at Montana Tech in Butte from 1983-85.



HEAD COACH MICK DELANEY

Delaney began his coaching career at Butte Central High School (1964-67) as head wrestling coach and assistant football coach. He also taught English at Central.

Delaney was an assistant football coach under former UM head coach Jack Swarhout from 1968-69. He was the head wrestling coach at UM at that time as well. He then moved on to Great Falls High School (1969-76) where he taught English and was the assistant wrestling and track and field coach. He coached on Lubick's staff at Montana State from 1978-81.



He earned his B.A. in education at UM-Western (Western Montana College) in 1964. He is an inaugural inductee into the Western Montana College Sports Hall of Fame and was honored by the Montana Coaches Association in 1972 as the Wrestling Coach of the Year. In 1974 he was named the Football Coach of the Year by that organization. He also belonged to many associations during his athletic career including the Montana Coaches Association from 1968-1985.

Mick and his wife Cheri have three children, son Mike, daughters Shauna Basile and Melissa Ossello, and nine grandchildren.

Shalon Baker Wide Receivers

One of the most prolific receivers in Grizzly history, Shalon is now in his third season at his alma mater, coaching the wide receivers.

From Vancouver, Wash., and Evergreen High School, he had an outstanding career with the Grizzlies from 1991-94 at receiver and as a punt returner.

When he played at Montana, his position coach was former Grizzly head coach Robin Pflugrad.

He returned to Montana in 2010 from Chandler High School in Arizona, where he had served as the passing game coordinator/wide receiver coach since 2006.

Baker is currently ranked third in school history in career receptions (182), fifth in career receiving yards (2,561), and is tied for second for the most career receiving touchdowns with 26.

He is ranked sixth in school history with 3,478 all-purpose yards. He averaged 4.33 catches per game, which rank him eighth on the career list. He averaged 11.64 yards (78 for 908) per punt return, which is the fourth highest career average in school history. His 416 punt return yards in 1992 are the seventh most ever in a season at UM.

He was a team captain in 1993 and 1994. He was one of three recipients of UM's Steve Carlson Award (MVP) at Montana in 1994.

The 5-7, 185-pounder was a wide receiver/linebacker in the Arena Football League from 1998-2005, playing for the San Jose (Calif.) SaberCats. He also coached with the SaberCats from 2003-05, working with the offense and wide receivers.

In seven seasons in the AFL, he had 261 catches for 3,551 yards and 61 touchdowns. He played in the CFL for the Edmonton Eskimos from 1995-97 and was named "Outstanding Rookie" in '95.

His first coaching stint was at Desert Mountain High School in Scottsdale, Ariz., where he was the offensive coordinator in 2003 and 2004.



He earned his B.A. degree at UM in business administration and a master's in business administration in sports management at Canterbury University in 1998.

Shalon has three daughters: Kailyn, 17; Quincy, 13; and Kendal, 9.



Rob Oviatt Strength Coach

Rob Oviatt (pronounced oh-vee-ott) is in his third season at Montana, and he brought a wealth of experience to the Grizzly football program when he joined the program in 2010.

He has been involved in strength and conditioning for the past 32 years at several different universities. He worked in that capacity for 19 seasons in the Pac-12 Conference.

"Coach O" is more than a strength and conditioning coach at UM. He is also heavily involved in the Grizzlies' daily practice sessions during spring ball and during the season.

He came to Montana from Washington State University, where he served as the assistant athletic director for strength and conditioning from 2000-08. During his time with the Cougars, they had a three consecutive 10-win season, and appeared in the Rose, Sun, and Holiday Bowls. He received the Admiral Ulysses Grant Sharp Award at the 2003 Holiday Bowl, which was voted on by WSU players.

Prior to his stint in Pullman, he was the director of strength and conditioning at Louisiana State University (1999) and the head strength coach for football at Kentucky (1995-98). He was chosen the SEC Strength Coach of the Year in 1997 and 1998.

His first stint in the Pac-10 was at Oregon State, where he was the director of strength and conditioning for all sports including football from 1985 to 1994.

He has also worked in the strength and conditioning field at the University of Houston (1984), Texas A&M (1983), and the University of Mississippi (1981-82). He began his career as a voluntary assistant strength coach at the University of Alabama, working for the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant.

Oviatt is a member of the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association and served as president of that organization from 2004-08. He was selected to the USA Strength & Conditioning Coach Hall of Fame in June of 2002. He received the Master Strength and Conditioning Coach Award in May of 2001.

He earned a B.S. degree in education at Alabama in 1980. He received a M.E. at Mississippi in 1982.

His wife's name is Kathleen. Rob has four children: daughters Lindsay, Allison, April and son William.

ASSISTANT COACHES



Scott Gragg Assistant Head Coach/ Offensive Line

Scott, who is one of three UM assistants who were standouts at Montana, returned to his alma mater two years ago. He was recently elevated to assistant head coach and also will oversee the offensive line.

He also held the crucial position as Montana's recruiting coordinator the past two-plus

seasons.

He was one of the most outstanding football players in Grizzly history, earning All-America accolades at offensive tackle, and he also played in the National Football League for several seasons.

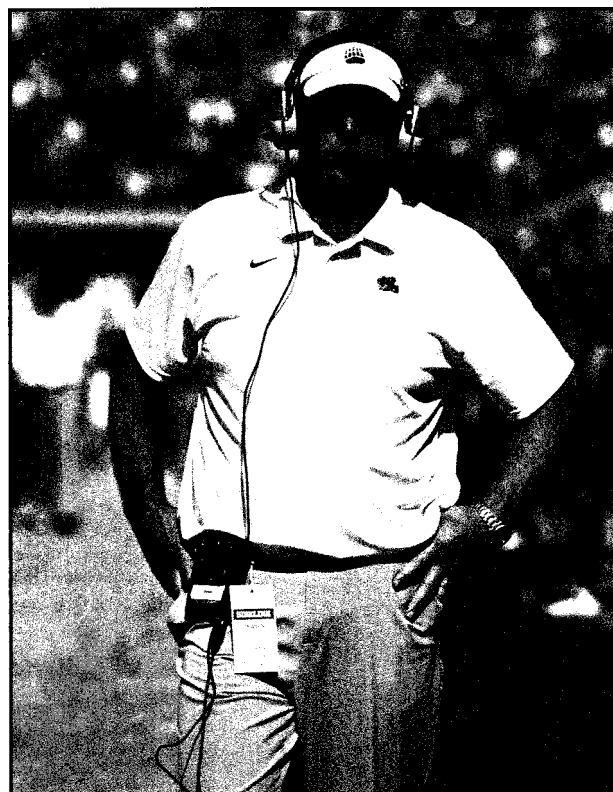
He returned to UM after serving a four-year stint as the head football coach at the high school in his hometown of Silverton, Ore. He took his Silverton High School teams to the state playoffs twice (2007 and 2008). His 2008 prep squad won a first-round playoff game, the school's first since 1995.

He is the only player in school history to receive Montana's Paul Weskamp Award (Outstanding Offensive Lineman) three times, earning the award in 1992, 1993, and 1994.

He was a three-year starter for the Grizzlies and started in 38 games in a row his sophomore, junior, and senior seasons. He was an All-Big Sky Conference first team selection all three of the seasons that he started, and was also a three-time all-league academic team pick.

He started in the 1994 East-West Shrine Game and in the Senior Bowl. To date he is the only Montana player ever selected to play in the Senior Bowl. He was named to several All-American teams following his junior and senior campaigns.

"Lurch" played 11 seasons in the National Football League with the New York Giants, San Francisco 49ers, and New York Jets. He started in 151 NFL games, including 112 in a row. He was named to the NFL's All-Pro team in 2002 and received the Bobb McKittrick Award (Outstanding Offensive Lineman) while playing for the 49ers. Scott was a second round NFL draft pick in 1995 by the Giants.

Legi Suaiaunoa Defensive Line

Legi Suaiaunoa (pronounced: Lang-ee... SOW-uh-No-uh) is in his second season on Montana's football coaching staff. He coaches the defensive line.

Last season Griz senior defensive tackle Bryan Waldhauser was a first team All-Big Sky Conference selection, while ends Bobby Alt and Ryan Fetherston were honorable

mention picks.

Suaiaunoa is now in his 11th season of coaching college and junior college football. He came to Montana from fellow Big Sky Conference school Portland State, where we worked with the defensive line during the 2010 season.

Prior to his recent stint at PSU, he spent the 2009 season at Eastern Oregon as the defensive coordinator. Before that he was at Western Washington for four seasons, from 2005-08, serving as the defensive line coach. He was a graduate assistant at the University of Nevada in 2004.

Suaiaunoa began his coaching career at Palomar (Calif.) Junior College in 2002 and 2003, working with the linebackers. The Comets were 8-3 in 2003, reaching the first round of Southern California JC playoffs and were 10-1 in 2002, winning the Mission Conference championship and finishing fourth nationally in the final JC Grid-Wire Poll.

He was a starting linebacker for the Nevada Wolfpack, playing there from 1998-2001.

A native of Oceanside, Calif., he won a junior college national championship in 1997 as a player at Palomar JC, and he was named all-conference that season.

He attended El Camino High School in Oceanside, where he was a three-time letterman in three sports. He was chosen second-team all-state, first-team all-county and first-team all-league as a senior in football. He helped the Wildcats to state football playoffs three times, reaching the semifinals as a senior. In basketball, he helped ECHS to three straight league undefeated seasons. He also lettered in track.

He earned a degree in general studies administration from Nevada in 2002. Legi and his wife, Rose, have a son, Lawrence, 3.

Aric is in his third second season at Montana and coaches the cornerbacks. He was a collegiate standout at corner in college.

The past two seasons Grizzly cornerback Trumaine Johnson was named to numerous All-American teams, and was a first team all-league pick.



Last year senior cornerback Houston Roots was a second team all-conference selection, while two seasons ago senior corner Brandon Dodson earned all-conference honorable mention recognition.

Prior to coming to Montana Aric was at Arizona State University, where he oversaw defensive quality control and assisted with cornerbacks and special teams.

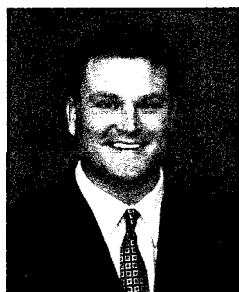
Before his position at ASU, he served as an assistant coach in his hometown at Diamond Bar High School in California in 2007-08. While there he worked with the defensive backs, wide receivers, as well as the kickoff and punt returners.

Williams was a standout cornerback at Oregon State and four-year letterman there from 2001-04. He was a first team All-Pac-10 selection at cornerback for the Beavers his senior year in 2004 when he had 56 tackles, five interceptions, and 14 pass break-ups.

He was a second team all-conference pick his junior season at cornerback and as a kick-off returner at OSU. His junior year he had 39 tackles, four interceptions, and 12 pass deflections.

Following his playing days at OSU, he played for the Philadelphia Eagles for a season (2005), and then played in NFL Europe for the Cologne Centurions (2006). After that he played two seasons of Arena Football for the Philadelphia Soul (2007) and Arizona Rattlers (2008).

Williams earned his B.A. degree at OSU in fine arts with an emphasis in graphic design in 2005. He is single.

Defensive Coordinator/
Linebackers**

Ty, who just wrapped up his eighth season as an assistant coach at Montana in 2011, was named defensive coordinator by former head coach Robin Pflugrad in February of 2012. He replaced Mike Breske, who is now the defensive coordinator at Washington State.

Gregorak, 33, returned to Montana in 2011 after a one-year stint at Central Washington. In 2010 he worked with the tight ends for the 8-3 CWU Wildcats, and that season CWU was the Great Northern Athletic Conference champion.

Prior to his one-year stint at CWU, he had a seven-year tenure at Montana under the tutelage of former mentor Bobby Hauck.

In his eight seasons with the Griz they have won eight league championships, and advanced to three (2004, 2008, 2009) FCS title games and two semifinals (2006 and 2011).

In his eight-year tenure at UM he has coached 17 all-conference players. This past season Griz senior Caleb McSurdy was chosen the Big Sky Conference's defensive MVP and named to several All-American teams. McSurdy finished 10th in school history with 293 career tackles. Also a year ago, sophomore linebacker John Kanonagta'a was a second team all-league pick, while senior Alex Shaw was an honorable mention selection.

Other standout linebackers he coached at Montana include Tyler Corwin, Brandon Fisher, Shawn Lebsock, Tyler Joyce (ranked second in UM history with 356 career tackles), Shane MacIntyre, Kyle Ryan,

and Loren Utterback – all of whom were All-Big Sky picks.

Gregorak coached the secondary in his first season (2003) at Montana. Before coming to Montana, Ty served as a graduate assistant coach at the University of Washington in 2001 and 2002.

He was a three-year letterman at linebacker for the University of Colorado, from 1997-2000. He was the recipient of the Lee Willard Award (outstanding freshman) for the Buffaloes in 1997. In 1998, CU played in the Aloha Bowl, while the 1999 squad played in the Insight.Com Bowl. He was a 2000 Academic All-Big XII selection, and a finalist for the National Academic-Athletic Achievement Award that year.

He was a standout prep athlete at West Valley High School in Spokane, Wash., where he was a first-team all-state selection in 1995 and 1996. In 1996, he was chosen the state of Washington's Defensive Player of the Year and voted Super Prep magazine's West Coast Defensive Player of the Year.

In 1997, Gregorak was named West Valley High School's Student-Athlete of the Year. He was named to several All-American teams that year, including USA Today. He was named team captain of the East squad in the Washington State All-Star game in 1997. He was team captain for the West in the 1997 High School All-American Game in Orlando, Florida.

He earned a B.A. degree at Colorado in communications in 2001. He recently married former Montana State volleyball standout Kandice Kelly. Kelly was a four-time all-conference player at MSU and led the Big Sky Conference in digs in three seasons. Last season Kelly was the head women's volleyball coach at North Idaho College and her team placed ninth in the nation, and she was voted the conference "Coach of the Year." Ty has a son, Gage, who will be four in February.

ASSISTANT COACHES



Justin Green Running Backs/ Recruiting Coordinator

Former University of Montana and National Football League running back Justin Green was named the running backs coach at his alma mater in February of 2012.

Green, 29, who is from San Diego, was a student assistant coach at Montana in 2011 and replaced Mick Delaney who became the

head coach in July, 2012.

Green had an outstanding two-year career at Montana, rushing for a total of 1,784 yards in 2003 and 2004, which ranks him eighth in school history. Prior to his senior season he was touted by UM as a Walter Payton candidate. As a junior in 2003 he rushed 252 times for 1,146 yards and 14 touchdowns and was chosen the Big Sky Conference's "Newcomer of the Year." His rushing yards and touchdowns that season rank him fourth in Montana's single-season history. He was a second team all-league pick as a junior.

After his Griz career he was a fifth round draft pick by the Baltimore Ravens, and had a four-year career in the NFL. He played three seasons at fullback for the Ravens, and then moved on to the Phoenix Cardinals, and played there for one season.

Between his stint with the Ravens and Cardinals, he coached for one season at Berean High School in Walnut Creek, Calif., working with the running backs, linebackers, and cornerbacks. He returned to Berean High School again after his season with the Cardinals, once again working with the running backs, linebackers, and cornerbacks.

He came to Montana from San Diego Mesa College where he played for one season (2002), and was team captain and co-MVP, rushing for 874 yards and 7 TDs, and was a JC Gridwire All-America honorable mention that season. He started his college career at San Diego State, where he redshirted in 2000. He lettered one season for the Aztecs in 2001.

He was a standout running back at University of San Diego High School where he rushed for 5,397 career yards – which at the time was the most in San Diego County history. He was a first team All-C.I.F. selection as a junior and senior. His junior year in high school he rushed for 2,385 yards, which was the fifth most in California prep history. His senior season he rushed for 1,801 yards and 20 touchdowns and was tabbed a USA Today honorable mention All-American.

He recently earned a degree in sociology at UM. Justin and his wife, Meghan, have a two-year-old daughter, Giana.



Leon Burtnett Safeties

Leon is in his first season on the Montana staff, and brings a wealth of experience to the Griz football program. He has been in the coaching profession almost five decades.

He began his career at the high school level, coaching preps from 1965-68. He moved to the college ranks in 1969, and coached at that level from 1969-86, with stints at seven different colleges. He was the head coach at Purdue from 1982-86.

Most recently he concluded his fourth season at the University of Houston, and served as the Director of Player Personnel and Quality Control there in 2011. He coached the linebackers at UH from 2008-10. He spent his first three seasons at UH as the linebackers coach. Burtnett came to UH in December 2007 after five seasons at Washington State.

Burtnett grew up in Meade, Kansas, graduated from Southwestern College in Kansas and coached for four years in the Kansas high school ranks before getting his first collegiate position at Colorado State as a graduate intern on Mike Lude's staff. A year later he joined the staff at Montana State as the secondary coach.

In the spring of 1971 he left MSU to coach Washington State's defensive backs. In 1972, he went to Wyoming. He then joined Darryl Rogers' staff at San Jose State in 1974, and then moved with Rogers to Michigan State in 1976. From there Jim Young at Purdue hired him in 1977. Six years later Burtnett was named the Boilermakers' head coach, replacing Young.

In 1984, Burtnett was named Big Ten Coach of the Year after guiding Purdue to a 7-5 record and a berth in the Peach Bowl. That season Purdue defeated Notre Dame, Ohio State and Michigan, the only time in school history the Boilermakers have defeated all three teams in one season.

In 1987 he joined the Indianapolis Colts and had five seasons there, the first four as running backs coach and the fifth season as offensive coordinator. He then rejoined the college ranks, making stops at Fresno State, Northeast Louisiana, Arkansas State, and Washington State.

Burtnett spent two seasons at Fresno State, three years at Louisiana-Monroe and three years at Arkansas State, serving as defensive coordinator at all three schools.

Leon's wife's name is Karen.



Kefense Hynson
Tight Ends/Special Teams

Kefense Hynson (pronounced: ka-FIN-say...hen-SON) was hired as the tight ends and special teams coach at UM in June 2012.

Hynson comes to Montana from Yale University, where he recently coached the receivers for the past three seasons.

Prior to his stint at Yale he spent the past three years as an assistant coach at Western Washington. He was the Western Washington offensive coordinator for his final two seasons there, and his 2008 Vikings' offense averaged 404 yards of total offense and nearly 30 points a game, while his quarterbacks threw 29 touchdown passes.

Hynson, who has experience working with collegiate quarterbacks, receivers, running backs and defensive backs, was an assistant at Minnesota State in 2005 and director of football operations at Boise State in 2004, the year the Broncos went 11-1, won the WAC title and were ranked in both major polls.

He has also had assistant jobs at Quincy (2004) and Willamette (2003) and did an NFL minority coaching fellowship with Seattle in 2008, Oakland (2009), and Kansas City (2010), where he worked with the receivers.

Hynson participated in the 2009 NCAA Coaches Academy, which reinforces various aspects of securing, managing and excelling in head football coaching positions at the intercollegiate level. In 2011 he was one of 20 selected to participate in the NCAA Expert Coaches Academy, which helps develop the necessary skills to be a successful head coach.

As a player he was an honorable mention All-American defensive back at Willamette College (Oregon). He was a three-time Northwest Conference All-Star, Willamette's Freshman of the Year and team captain before graduating in 2003.

A native of Oakland, Calif., he and his wife, Shanina, have three children: Jade, Myles, and Layla.



Timm Rosenbach
Offensive Coordinator/
Quarterbacks

Timm Rosenbach begins his first season at UM. He replaces Jonathan Smith, who left UM to become the quarterbacks coach at Boise State.

Rosenbach, 45, coached at New Mexico State in 2009 and served as the Aggies' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Prior to NMSU, Rosenbach was the quarterbacks coach from 2003-07 at his alma mater Washington State. During his time with the Cougars, Rosenbach mentored second team All-Pac-10 selection Matt Kegel, who racked up 2,947 passing yards and 21 touchdowns in his first season as a starter. The Cougar passing offense finished third in the Pac-10 and 21st nationally, while WSU ranked eighth in the nation in total offense in 2005. Under Rosenbach's tutelage, Alex Brink (2004-07) became WSU's all-time leader in passing yards, completions, attempts and touchdowns.

Rosenbach (Rose-en-bah) set WSU single-season records in 1988 for total offense (3,422), passing yards (3,097), touchdown passes (24) and touchdowns responsible for (34) as the Cougars' quarterback. His total offense yards and passing yards per game were also Pac-10 records. He also had the highest quarterback rating in the nation that year, completing 218 of 338 passes with just 11 interceptions and 24 TD throws. He led the na-

tion in passing efficiency his final season at WSU and finished seventh in the 1988 Heisman Trophy voting that year and was an honorable mention All-American that season.

He was the second pick in a supplemental NFL draft, taken by the Arizona Cardinals. Rosenbach was with the Cardinals for four years, and then spent 1994 with Hamilton of the Canadian Football League. In 1995, he signed a contract to play with the New Orleans Saints, but had to give up his career before the season because of injury.

After a few years in private business, Rosenbach began coaching in 1999 at St. Ambrose University in Iowa as quarterbacks coach.

Rosenbach joined the Eastern Washington staff as a part-time coach in 2000 and then moved into a full-time role as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2001. In his first season as offensive coordinator the Eagles led the nation in total offense, averaging 514.5 yards per game, plus nearly 42 points per contest.

Rosenbach's father, the late Lynn Rosenbach, was a long-time football coach in the state of Washington, and coached the running backs at Montana from 1980-82. Lynn left UM to become an assistant athletic director at Washington State. Timm was a three-sport star at Missoula's Hellgate High School before moving to Pullman, Wash., with his family.

Timm is married to former professional volleyball player Kim Exner. Kim and Timm have a five-year-old daughter, Reece Tammy. He earned his B.A. degree at WSU in social sciences in 2005.

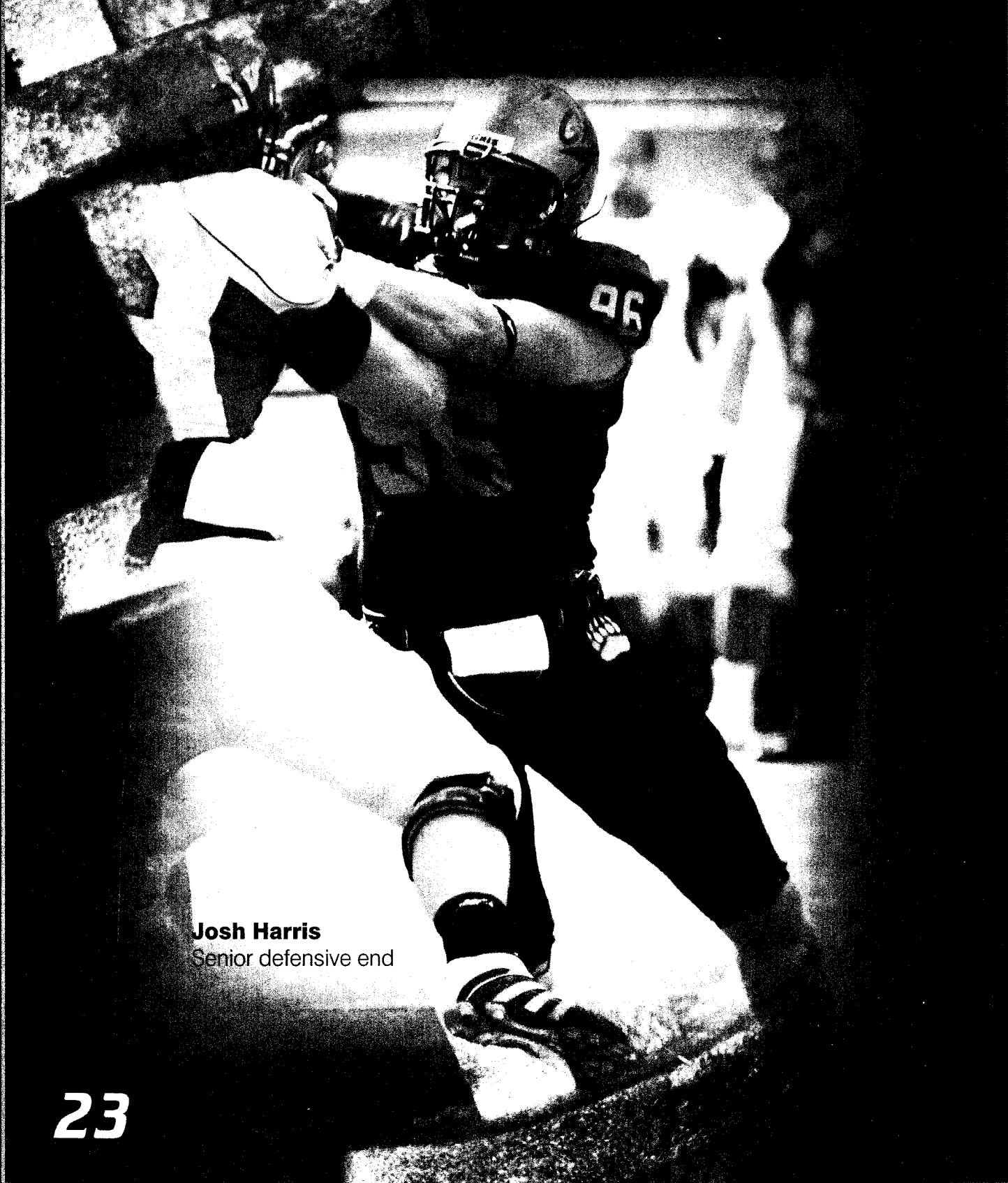

MONTANA GRIZZLIES: 2012 SEASON OUTLOOK

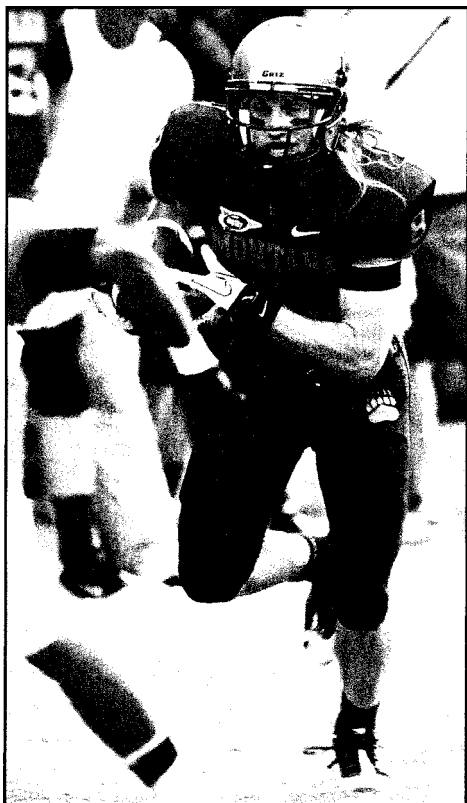
MISSOULA, MONTANA — The University of Montana Grizzlies, who return just seven starters this season, be tested early in 2012, as three of their first five opponents were nationally ranked in the preseason polls. (See page 28 for more information on UM's opponents this season).

After just a one-year hiatus, the Grizzlies returned to their old form, as in 2011 they went 11-3, advanced to the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs for the 18th time in the last 19 seasons, and won (or shared) their 16th Big Sky Conference title in the past 19 years.

Nationally, the Grizzlies were ranked third in the *The Sports Network's* final poll, and fourth in the FCS Coaches' Poll.

UM employs the spread offense and has five starters back on that side of the football. Last season the offense was ranked 16th in the Football Championship Subdivision in scoring (33.86 ppg), 17th in rushing (210.86 ypg), and 21st in total offense (420.36 ypg). Perhaps the most impressive offensive stat is that the Griz allowed just .71 sacks a game, which ranked them sixth in the nation.

"Last season I thought we were a really, really good offensive football team," said head coach Mick Delaney. "We had great balance between the pass and run. Our offensive line was just tremendous; our receivers made big plays and so did our running backs.

"Now, the big question is that we have two new coordinators — what are we going to see that is completely different?" he said. "You won't see anything that's completely different. You will see the same, fast-tempo pace most of the time.

"The next thing that you'll see is coach (Timm) Rosenbach (UM's offensive coordinator, who took over for Jonathan Smith, now an assistant coach at Boise State) who has brought what we call the quick passing game," Delaney said. "If you are under center, it's a three-step drop; if you're in the 'gun,' it's catch, gather, and throw. I think that you will see our passing percentage sky-rocket.

"That lets you do a couple of things," he continued. "It lets you get the ball up and out; they are very quick routes. It also is a way to beat a big-pressure, blitz team. I am really excited about that.

"The other thing that you will see on offense that is a little bit different is we'll probably be a little more tight end oriented at times, or tight end and an H-back," Delaney said. "We will have that capability in short yardage situations and on the goal-line.

"I am really excited about the overall prospect of what we have the potential to be offensively, and that is a team that can move the ball and score a lot of points," he said.

Two of the six starters back on offense were all-conference picks a year ago. Senior tight end Greg Hardy (14 starts) was a first team selection, while junior tackle Danny Kistler (who started 14 games at left guard last season), was named to the second team.

Other starters returning on offense are senior wide receiver Sam Gratton (14 starts) and senior running backs Peter Nguyen (six starts) and Dan Moore (five starts). Gratton and Nguyen were honorable mention All-Big Sky picks last season. The other starter back is junior center Kjelby Oiland, who had 12 starts at right guard a year ago. Gratton had a team-high (tie) 36 catches a year ago, while Nguyen led the Griz with 835 yards rushing.

The Griz defense was a mainstay last season, and was ranked among the FCS in several key categories. UM was 18th in the country in scoring defense (19.93 ppg), 21st in sacks per game (2.57), 23rd in turnover margin (+.79 pg), and 26th in total defense (327.14 ypg).

However, Coach Delaney and his staff have had lot of holes to fill on defense, including the league's defensive player of the year, linebacker Caleb McSurdy. Long-time Griz assistant coach Ty Gregorak is UM's new defensive coordinator, replacing Mike Breske who left UM to take the same position at Washington State.

The two starters back on "D" are junior linebacker John Kanongata'a (11 starts) and junior free safety Bo Tully (eight starts). Kanongata'a was UM's second leading tackler last season with 93 stops, and a second team all-league selection. Tully is the team's third leading returning tackler and had 52 stops in eight starts last season.

Another key player back is junior Jordan Tripp, a Buck Buchanan Award candidate, who was a starter in 2011 (he started all 11 games in 2010), but lost for the year due to an injury, and was ably replaced by Kanongata'a.

"We're going to have some growing pains on defense," Delaney said. "We are not going to pressure quite as much like we did with coach Breske, but we will still be a pressure team. I look for the personality of our defense to take over the personality of (defensive coordinator) Ty Gregorak — which is high energy, high emotion, play fast, play hard, be a tough guy, and just go out and make plays."

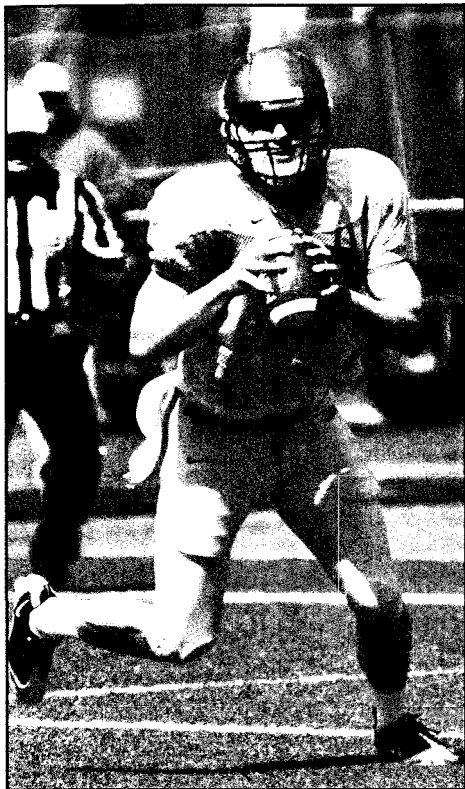
OFFENSE: POSITION-BY-POSITION

• QUARTERBACK

The Griz have two returnees at quarterback, sophomore Shay Smithwick-Hann (6-4, 214) and redshirt freshman Trent McKinney (6-0, 198). Joining the team in call camp is promising youngster Brady Gustafson, a signee from Montana's Billings West High School.

"Trent McKinney, a freshman, had an outstanding spring, and Shay Smithwick-Hann, who is so intelligent, and every time he comes in a game he is able to move the football team. I think McKinney's going to be a special guy, and he just got better each day during spring drills.

"Brady Gustafson is coming in as a true freshman, and he's a drop-back guy," Delaney said. "He has a tremendous strong arm. He's 6-7, 225, and he can throw the football as well as anybody. I compare him a lot, and maybe that's unfair, to Brock Osweiler (former Arizona State quarterback) coming out of high school. I think Brady probably has as strong, or a little stronger arm than Brock did back at that time."

Quarterback Jordan Johnson, a junior who started 13 games a year ago, will more-than-likely miss the 2012 season due to personal reasons. Last season Johnson had 21 touchdowns passes and rushed for four scores.

• RUNNING BACK

The Grizzlies have their top four rushers from a year ago back this season, led by Nguyen (5-8, 182). Sophomore Jordan Canada (5-9, 170) was slowed by injuries, but rushed for 580 yards and a team-high 9 touchdowns. Senior halfback/fullback Dan Moore (5-11, 235) also missed action due to an injury, but was fourth on the team with 430 yards and 7 TDs. Sophomore Brett Kirschner (5-10, 195) also looked good in spring drills, as did redshirt freshman Gavin Hagfors (6-2, 212).

"I feel really, really good about our running backs," Delaney said. "It should be, along with our three (returning starters) offensive linemen and our tight end, strong points for us on the offensive side of the ball."

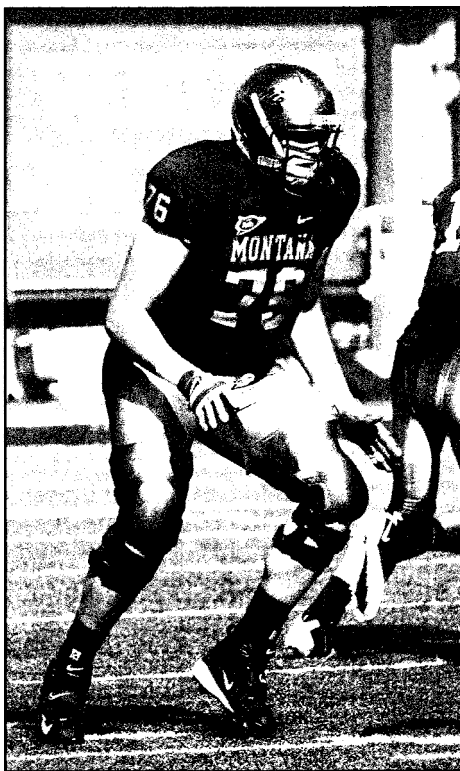
"Obviously, Peter is a little guy who has quick feet, great vision, and is physical and a great pass blocker for his size," Delaney said. "He also catches the ball very well - he's the whole package. Then Dan, on the other hand, has the size at 230-plus pounds, and he can be tremendously physical. He's a guy that you send in the game on third-and-one and tell him to get the first down and he can do that."

"Then you throw Jordan Canada in, and he's so much different than either one of them," Delaney said. "The only thing is that Jordan Canada has not played much yet. He's been injured off and on, but he's had some flashes of being a big-time college running back. He has speed; he has vision; he has great change of direction. We are going to move him around and try to get him the ball in space."

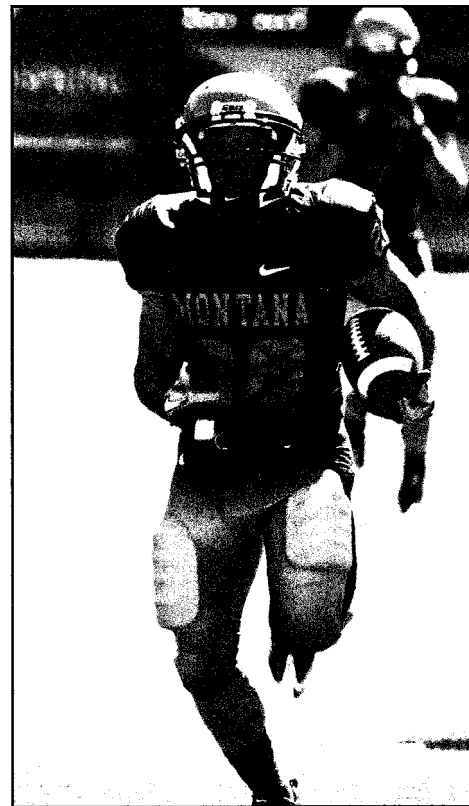
"Those are our three main guys there, but then you add Brett Kirschner, who I think had an outstanding spring and is very capable of helping us," Delaney said. "He got better, stronger, and faster. Adding Gavin Hagfors in the mix - he's more of a Danny Moore type of guy. I see him as an H-back, fullback type of guy, a blocker and really good pass receiver."

• OFFENSIVE LINE

Fellow junior William Poehls (6-8, 320) will be joining Kistler (6-8, 325) and Oiland (6-4, 295), as a starter on the O-line. Senior Jake Hendrickson (6-3 ½, 300) should get the nod at left guard, and sophomore Trevor Poole (6-5, 290) earned the starting job at left tackle in spring drills.

"I am so excited and optimistic about that offensive line," Delaney said. "Let's start at the center position with Kjelby Oiland, who I expect to be one of the best in the conference. We have one of the (Logan) Hines twins there as well, and Jake Hendrickson can play center too."

There's solid depth on the offensive line with the likes of redshirt freshmen John Schmaing (6-7, 265) and Zachary Taves (6-4, 260) at tackle, and Samson Kaleikini (6-5, 280) at guard. Also in the mix will be junior Jordan Hines (6-4, 295) at guard. The Griz signed five preps, and one or two of whom could vie for playing time.

"In our interior there are a lot of possibilities, and we've got to figure out a way to get the five best players there," Delaney said. "Trevor (Poole) is a little under-sized for a Big Sky tackle, but he has great leverage and strength and runs very well, so I am excited about his potential."

"We've got Max Kelly coming in from Spokane (Gonzaga Prep), who is around 6-7, 275, and I really expect him as a true freshman to add depth to the offensive line," Delaney said. "Overall, offensive line-wise, we will be led by the great example provided by Kistler, who plays hard on every single play and will bring that work ethic to his fellow linemen."

MONTANA GRIZZLIES: 2012 SEASON OUTLOOK

• TIGHT END

Hardy (6-5, 245), who has started 25 games in a row, missed spring drills due to an injury, but is expected to be 100 percent by fall camp. Hardy is Montana's second leading returning tackler and had 22 receptions a year ago, although he did not score a touchdown.

The Griz moved junior defensive end Clay Pierson (6-3, 239) to tight end (he played several positions in high school, including wide receiver) and he definitely shores up that spot. Highly touted incoming freshman Hayden Craig, a 6-5, 246-pounder from Dayton (Ore.) High School could be an impact player. Senior Jacob Haas (6-5, 225) also missed spring drills to recover from an injury, and also returns.

"I think as people looked at us going into the spring that tight end might be an area a little bit weak, because Greg Hardy had to have surgery so he missed the entire spring, and that was a blessing in disguise for the offensive football team," Delaney said. "Clay Pierson is a tremendous athlete, and I think that we finally found the right position for him, and he's made great progress.

"Hayden is a freshman coming in, but he's a big, physical kid," Delaney said. "We had him in (Grizzly football) camp, and he runs and catches as good as anybody. "We are excited about

those three players, and we also have Jacob Haas coming back, along with Aschan Richards (6-6, 227), who has made tremendous strides."

• WIDE RECEIVER

This was an area hit hard by graduation with the loss of Jabin Sambrano and Antwon Moutra, who each started all 14 games last season, combined for 72 catches (36 each), 1,091 yards, and 13 touchdowns, but Gratton, who also did not participate in the spring because of an injury, tied those two for the team lead with 36 receptions and he is also an excellent downfield blocker and leader.

Senior Bryce Carver (6-1, 180) was slowed by injuries last year and was outstanding this past spring. Two sophomores, Dean Haynes (6-3, 190) and Mitch Saylor (6-5, 217) will be factors in 2012 and are vying for starting berths.

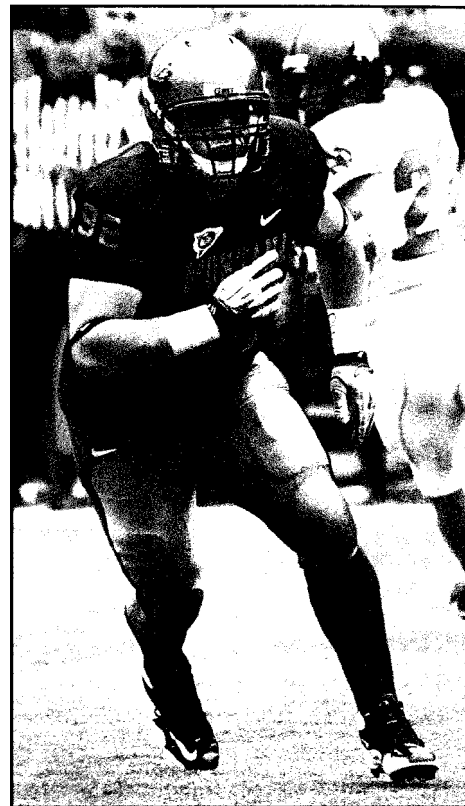
Junior Cam Warren (5-7, 160) proved this past spring he can contribute. Speedy redshirt freshman transfer (University of Hawaii) Ellis Henderson (6-0, 185) could be a factor as well.

Three preps are joining the team in fall camp and could figure into the mix. That trio includes sprint standout Taylor Walcott (6-0, 175), from Marist High School (Eugene, Ore.); Ryan Burke (6-4, 195, Billings' Central Catholic HS); and Chase Naccarato (5-8, 160, Mt. Spokane HS).

"Again, like the offensive line and the tight end position, we lost a lot of good players there and people thought that maybe we would not be as good as we have been at wide receiver for the Griz as we have had in the past," Delaney said. "As we came out of the last two weeks of spring (drills) I couldn't be happier with our wide receiver crew.

"Sam was unable to play in the spring and that put a lot of pressure on us finding a guy who can stretch the field like Sambrano did," he said. "I think we found that guy in Sean Haynes. He's young and has not been on the field much, but he has Jabin's speed, and he's probably an inch-and-a-half taller and 20 pounds heavier than Jabin was. He got better every single day. He has to get much more consistent, and you put him with Sam and Bryce Carver - that's a very good nucleus there.

"Cam Warren is a lot like Peter Nguyen, and not real big or real fast, but he has great quicks, and he has a heart that will not quit," Delaney said. "He will go over the middle and catch every ball, and make that big first down when we need it. Mitch Saylor, at 6-4 or so will go up and get the ball, and is a big, strong physical guy with better than average speed. Walcott is a speed guy who has run 10.5 in the 100 meters this past spring, and I think he will help us."

DEFENSE: POSITION-BY-POSITION

• DEFENSIVE LINE

To call the 2012 defensive unit young might be an understatement, as only one senior is expected to start this season.

There will be four new starters in the "D" front this season for the Grizzlies, although the projected starters do have limited experience. Also, two outstanding players from the high school ranks are expected to contribute right away as true freshmen. That's not to say that the loss of defensive tackles Tyrone Duncan, Ben Hughes and Bryan Waldhauser, along with ends Bobby Alt and Ryan Fetherston will be easy to replace. Waldhauser was a first team all-league pick, while both ends were honorable mention selections.

The heirs-apparent at end are senior Josh Harris (6-5, 251) and sophomore Zach Wagenmann (6-3 ½, 240), while junior Alex Bienemann (6-2, 295) and sophomore Tonga Takai (6-2, 301) have the inside track at the tackle spots.

Also expected to help are redshirt freshman Derek Crittenden (6-3, 250) at end and Jesse Ginn (6-5, 203, RS Fr.), Trevor Rehm (6-3, 244, So.), and Taylor Tuliapupu (6-0, 265, So.) at the tackle position.

"Josh is the only one really who has been on the field of that whole crew, and" Delaney said. "Both Alex and Tonga are big, big guys, not real

tall, but very physical.

"Again, I'm probably crazy, but I am excited about our defense," Delaney continued. "Zach Wagenmann is a local guy who has worked hard and got his weight up to around 245 pounds, and has good get-up. Derek Crittenden will be able to play both the open side defensive end and the close side.

"Caleb Kidder, from Helena Capital (high school), I believe will really help us as a freshman," he said. "He was the Gatorade Player of the Year on defense in our state, and he was this and he was that, and every bit of it is well-deserved.

"We do have a lot of young guys there, along with Josh Harris, and I think that we will be very formidable on the inside," Delaney said. "They are young, but we've got some talented players on the front."

• LINEBACKERS

When you consider McSurdy had a team-high 131 tackles and was a seventh round draft pick of the Dallas Cowboys, and Alex Shaw the team's third leading tackler (75) has graduated, it seems hard to believe that UM's linebacker position could be even stronger this season. Believe it.

With the experience of Kanongata'a (5-11, 230), Tripp (6-3 ½, 244), plus veterans Brock Coyle (6-2, 240, Jr.) and Josh Stuberger (6-2, 223, Sr.), and an impact player from the junior college ranks, some talented, young newcomers, you've got the makings of a very impressive group at this position.

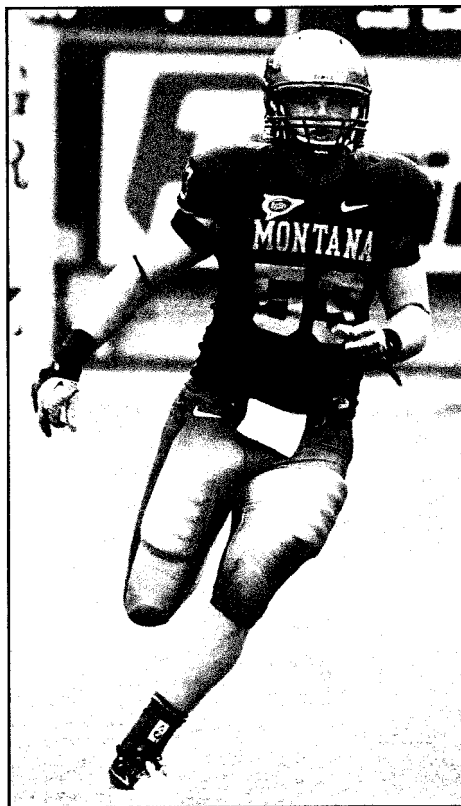
A possible impact player will be sophomore Jeremiah Kose (6-2, 225) who was an all-conference pick at Palomar College last season, where he was second on the team with 88 tackles.

Three freshmen - transfer (Washington) Nick Holt (6-0, 215), and redshirts Addison Owen (6-2, 220) and Jonathan Richards (6-3, 208) - provide good depth and have outstanding potential.

"Linebacker will definitely be the strength of our defense," Delaney said. "I don't know if there is a better group of linebackers in our whole division throughout the country. I think we have three to four guys, maybe even five, who can help us, and help us win.

"In the middle there is great competition between Josh and Brock, and the cool thing is that they can both play outside too, so we could move one of them out there if we need to," he said. "So you have great competition inside, and then on the outside with Jordie Tripp on one side and 'JP' Kanongata'a on the other, you've got a lot of talent. Whichever three of those four players on the field make it a very, very solid group.

"And then you take the freshmen, starting with Addison Owen, who I think will be a tremendous football player for the Griz," Delaney continued. "He has size, he has speed, and he has toughness. Jonathan Richards will continue to work hard and improve, and Kose has a chance to help us."

• CORNERBACK

The Griz lost starters Trumaine Johnson and Houston Roots as well as back-up Donny Lisowski to graduation, and Johnson was a third round NFL draft pick by the St. Louis Rams.

Junior Sean Murray (6-1, 195) looks like the starter on the right side, while redshirt freshman Nate Harris (5-10, 180) and sophomore Josh Dennard (5-11, 180) are competing for the other spot. Dennard played wide receiver as a true freshman (he played both ways in high school) last season and was moved to defense in the spring. Also in the mix is junior college transfer Anthony Goodwin (6-1, 190), who is expected to play right away.

"As far as experience goes, that is by far the least experienced position," Delaney said. "As far as the whole scheme of the defense goes it might be the most important position. When you make a mistake at corner it's not like you give up a 10 or 15 yard run - it's a touchdown.

"We've got two young guys who really have never played, and one who has played in Sean Murray," he said. "Sean has really impressed me this spring and this summer. He could be a top-notch cornerback in our division. He's not there yet - not even close. He has to walk-the-walk instead of talk-the-talk, and I think he's going to do that. Both Nate and Josh are smart, talented players, and they have that corner mentality. What they need is to play, and that's going to come quickly and early for them."

• SAFETIES

Sophomore strong safety Matt Hermanson (6-1 192) is a real talent and was fifth on the team in tackles with 65 last season and tied for the most interceptions (three) as a true freshman despite starting in just one game. Tully (6-2, 197) was also one of the team's leading tacklers a year ago.

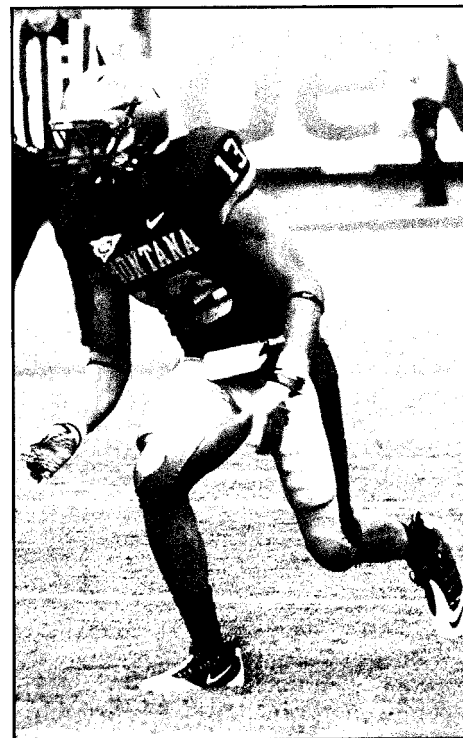
Quality depth will be provided by junior Steven Rominger (5-10, 186) and redshirt freshman Connor Lebsock (6-2, 198). Lebsock would have played last season as a true freshman but was injured in fall camp. Jacob Coogan (6-2, 205, Jr.) was one of the leading tacklers at Southwestern College (Calif.) last season and is expected to contribute.

"Matt Hermanson just got better and better last season, and Bo has done a very good job at safety for us the past couple of seasons," Delaney said. "Rominger is one of our most improved players and he adds solid depth, as does Connor Lebsock. We will be very, very young at that position."

• SPECIAL TEAMS

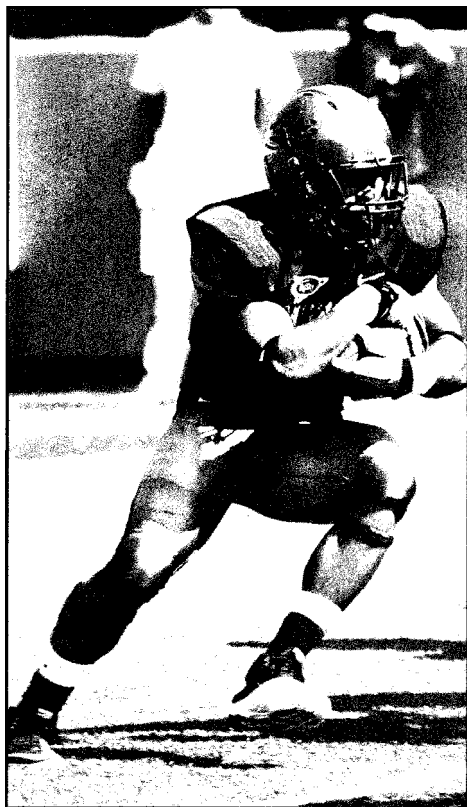
Montana has a huge void to fill in its kicking game, as Brody McKnight who handled both the place-kicking and punting duties for the Griz the past two seasons is gone. Last season McKnight tied for sixth in the FCS with 1.5 field goals a game, and he was ranked eighth in punting, averaging 42.75 yards per attempt.

A pair of redshirt freshmen, Chris Lider (6-1, 200) and Stephen Shaw, (6-3, 235) are hoping to earn the starting kicking and punting jobs.

"You've got two freshmen who have never been on the field," Delaney said. "We pressured them and put them in a ton of really different situations in the spring, and I honestly believe talent-wise that we have two outstanding freshmen there in Chris Lider and Stephen Shaw. Can they do it? I know they can."

Incoming freshman Harrison Greenberg (5-8, 155), from Lake Oswego (Ore.) High School, made 85-of-89 PAT attempts in his career, was a kicker and punter as a prep. Senior running back Caleb Walden (5-9, 198) also has the potential to earn the punting job.

Sambrano was UM's primary return man a year ago, but Nguyen averaged 23.8 yards per kickoff return and 9.6 on punt returns in limited action last season. Canada, Moore, Kirschner and Dennard will all be looked at in the return game.

"I did tell our players that I expect every starter to be on a special teams somewhere," he said. "We will put our best players there. Special teams, as they have been at Montana in the past, are going to be special."

2012 SCHEDULE

Montana will know where it stands in the FCS picture after the first month or so of the season. The Griz open with South Dakota at home on Sept. 1, a team coached by former

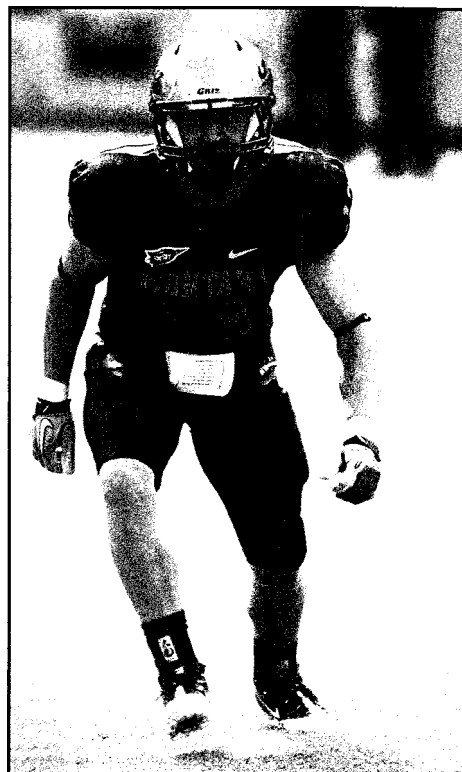
UM mentor Joe Glenn. Next (Sept. 8) they play FCS powerhouse and nationally-ranked Appalachian State on the road, and then come back home the following Saturday (Sept. 15) to play Liberty, a team that is also nationally ranked in the preseason polls.

South Dakota returns 13 starters from a 6-5 team. Appalachian State was 8-4 last season and ranked 12th in the final Sports Network's final poll, and has 17 starters back, while Liberty (7-3) finished ranked 25th and returns 16 starters.

The Griz open Big Sky play on Sept. 22 in Homecoming against a Northern Arizona team that returns 15 starters. The fifth game of the season is on the road on Sept. 29 against league nemesis Eastern Washington, also ranked in the preseason polls. The Eagles have 17 starters back from a 6-5 squad that was decimated by injuries last season and won their final six games of the year.

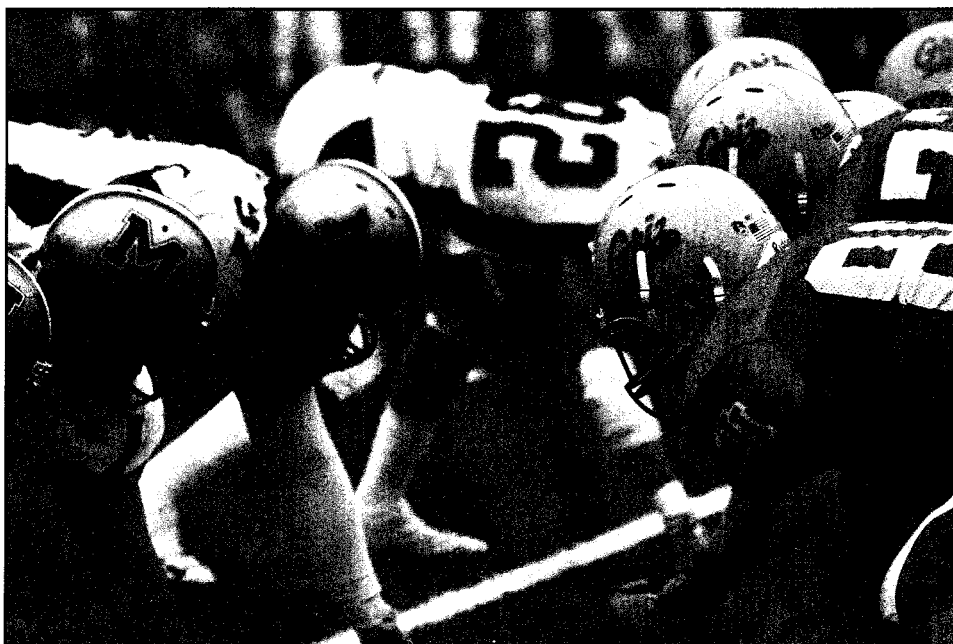
The second half of the slate includes league home games versus Southern Utah (Oct. 13), Idaho State (Oct. 27), and the 112th meeting of the Griz and Cats in the teams' regular-season finale on Nov. 17. Conference road contests are at Northern Colorado (Oct. 6), North Dakota (Oct. 20), and Weber State (Nov. 3).

"We've got a challenge, but you know anymore, almost any conference you look at there are no more patsies on the schedule sort-of-speak," Delaney said. "Now we are playing all Division 1 schools, and they are all quality Division 1 schools. Is that good or bad? Well, we're going to know after five weeks whether we're in the hunt."



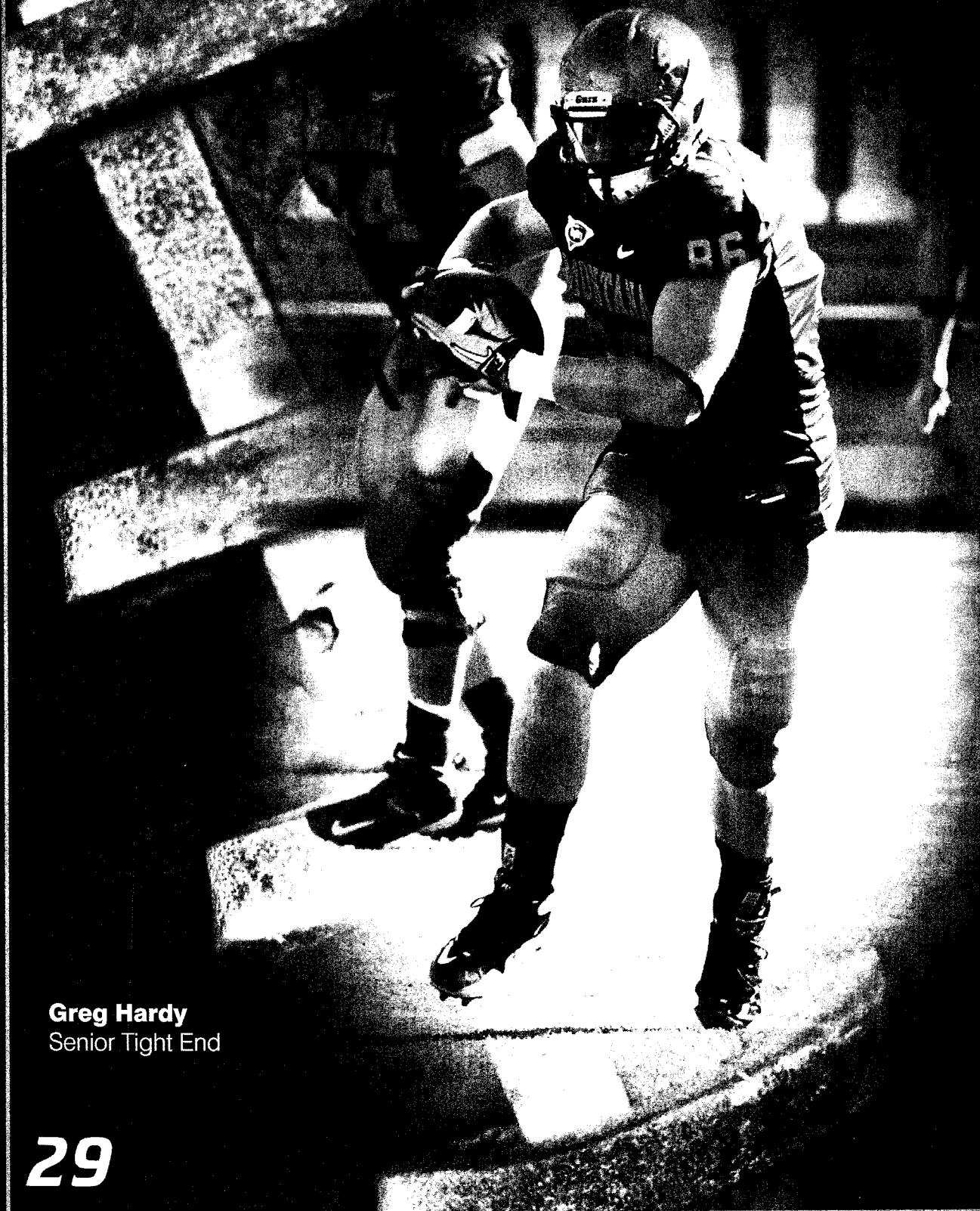

KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE -- The Grizzlies struggled to get the offense on track after a 99-minute lightning and rain delay, and the Tennessee Volunteers used the momentum to cruise to a 42-16 victory. The game was scheduled to start a 6:07 p.m. EST but a severe thunder storm moved kickoff back to 7:40 p.m. EST. The storm was so severe that fans were asked to leave their seats and get out of the weather.

The Grizzly defense stifled the Volunteer offense on their first possession and forced a three-and-out. But, on the ensuing punt Peter Nguyen failed to field the ball and UT recovered the punt on the Montana 47 yard line. UT sophomore quarterback Tyler Bray hit sophomore receiver Da'Rick Rogers for a 47-yard touchdown on the first play after the fumble.

On the ensuing Tennessee drive Bray connected on an 81-yard touchdown, this time with sophomore receiver Justin Hunter.

On their next drive the Vols went 96 yards and scored on another Bray pass, this time to tailback Marlin Lane. After another short Grizzly drive led to a punt, UT once again made a long drive for a TD, as tailback Tauren Poole scored on an 8-yard run.

The Grizzly offense finally got on the board when Johnson found senior receiver Jabin Sambrano open, and after evading a defender Sambrano outran the defense for an 81-yard touchdown bringing the score to 28-7. The Vols led 28-7 at halftime.

In the first possession of the second half the Grizzlies appeared to be on the move but after two first-downs the drive once again stalled. Sean Wren's ensuing punt was downed on the one yard line, and on the Vols first offensive play of the second half Poole was tackled by senior defensive tackle Ben Hughes in the end zone for a safety, making the score 28-9 UT.

The Grizzlies appeared to be gaining some momentum, but after a quick first down Johnson's throw was intercepted by senior defensive back Art Evans who returned the pick for a 37-yard touchdown. The interception extended the Tennessee lead to 35-9.

The fourth quarter saw the Vols and Griz trading touchdowns. Tennessee scored first on 1-yard run by Lane to push the UT lead to 42-9. The Grizzlies answered with a 7-yard touchdown by redshirt freshman running back Jordan Canada to cap the scoring at 42-16.

The Montana defense struggled to keep UT out of the end zone and failed to capitalize on any of the Vols six fumbles, all of which were recovered by Tennessee. The Griz played tough against the run and held the Tennessee backs to just 2.8 yards-per-carry.

Senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy led the Grizzly defense with 13 tackles and a sack, while Hughes was close behind with 10 stops, and he also forced two fumbles, had two tackles for loss, and a sack. Hughes was named the Big Sky's "Player of the Week" on defense in his first career start.

Griz senior cornerback Trumaine Johnson added 7 tackles and a forced fumble and a PD, and senior end Ryan Fetherston also had 7 stops along with 1.5 sacks.

Johnson ended the game with a touchdown and 226 yards on 19-of-36 passing with the one interception.

Antwon Moutra led UM with 4 catches for 30 yards, while Gerald Kemp and Sam Gratton had three receptions each.

Nguyen rushed nine times for a team-high 67 yards, while Canada had eight totes for 25 yards and Montana's only rushing touchdown.

MISSOULA, MONTANA -- The University of Montana Grizzlies dominated the second half and went on to register a hard-fought 37-23 victory over the Cal Poly Mustangs in UM's Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

There were 25,855 fans on hand for UM's 2011 home opener - the third largest crowd ever in Washington-Grizzly Stadium in the 185 games played there since 1986.

The Grizzlies (1-1) out-scored the Mustangs (0-2) 23-6 in the second half, holding them to just two field goals. Montana out-gained Cal Poly substantially in the final 30 minutes, as the Griz picked up 273 total yards and the Mustangs had 121. UM also held Cal Poly to just nine first downs in the final two stanzas.

There were seven lead changes and just one tie in the contest. Montana finally took the lead for good when sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to senior tight end Kavario Middleton, giving UM a 29-23 advantage with 58 seconds to go in the third quarter. After his TD pass Johnson rushed for the two-point conversion.

Montana got an insurance touchdown with 8:30 remaining on a 1-yard run by junior running back Dan Moore. The Griz then scored another two-point conversion, this time on Johnson-to-Middleton pass.

Jabin Sambrano got the crowd on its feet early, as he broke away on the opening kickoff for a 96-yard touchdown. It was the fifth longest kickoff return in school history.

Cal Poly of the Great West Football Conference came right back though, as senior fullback Jake Romanelli scored on a 4-yard run, making it 7-7 with 9:02 to go in the first quarter. Sophomore kicker James Langford's 38-yard field goal gave the Mustangs a 10-7 edge with 2:54 left in the opening stanza.

Moore got the lead back for the Griz on his first touchdown run, this one from four yards out, giving his team a 14-10 lead with 9:51 to go until intermission. Cal Poly took a 17-14 lead on a 1-yard run by junior quarterback Andre Broadous with five seconds left until halftime.

Cal Poly took its largest led (20-14) of the game at the 10:19 mark of the third stanza on a 36-yard field goal by Langford. The Griz went ahead again in less than two minutes, as Sambrano scored again, this time on a 58-yard pass from Johnson. Senior kicker Brody McKnight's PAT gave the Griz a 21-20 lead.

The Mustangs took their fourth and final lead (23-21) with 4:21 left in the third quarter on a 50-yard field goal by Langford.

Johnson was 25-of-39-0 for 240 yards and two touchdowns. He was 19-of-27 for 205 yards and threw both of his TD passes in the second half. Johnson also led the Griz in rushing with 54 yards on 10 carries, while Moore had 13 totes for 30 yards and two scores. The Griz O-line did not give up a sack for the second game in a row.

Sambrano had 5 catches for 70 yards, while junior tight end Greg Hardy had 4 catches, and senior receiver C.J. Atkins, junior halfback Peter Nguyen, and Moore had three receptions each. Sambrano had 244 all-purpose yards, 174 on returns and 70 receiving.

Griz senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy tied his career-high with a game-high 17 tackles. Senior linebacker Alex Shaw had 11 tackles, while senior safety Mike McCord and senior tackle Bryan Waldhauser had 10 stops apiece.

Cal Poly's option offense rolled to 265 yards rushing on 64 carries, but they had just 67 yards passing. Romanelli gained 98 yards on 20 carries, while Broadous had 90 on 22 rushes. He had 356 total yards (240 passing and 116 rushing).

MISSOULA, MONTANA -- A record crowd was on hand as The University of Montana Grizzlies started their 2011 Big Sky Conference season with a hard-fought 17-14 victory over defending FCS national champion Eastern Washington in UM's Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

There were 26,066 in Washington-Grizzly Stadium, breaking the old record of 26,019 set in the Montana State game last season.

It was a defensive slugfest, as there were just 15 points scored in the second half.

The Grizzlies got all of the points that they needed with 6:14 left in the third quarter, when Gerald Kemp lined up at a wide receiver position and scored on a 1-yard pass from sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson. Kemp's touchdown catch gave Montana (2-1/1-0) a 17-6 lead over the Eagles (0-3/0-1), which proved to be all the points they needed.

It wasn't an easy win, though.

EWU cut the UM lead to 17-14 with 10:32 left in the contest when senior quarterback Bo Levi Mitchell connected with junior wide receiver Nicholas Edwards for a 4-yard TD. Those two hooked up again for the two-point conversion and the Eagles were back in the hunt.

But, the Grizzly defense withstood three more possessions by the Eagles, and ended the comeback with an interception by sophomore linebacker John Kanagata'a on EWU's 17-yard line with 25 seconds left.

The Griz scored on their first possession on a 1-yard scoring run by junior halfback Dan Moore. The TD was set up thanks to a 44-yard run by Johnson, who advanced the ball to EWU's four-yard line, and Moore scored two plays later.

Montana took a 10-0 lead with 3:29 remaining in the first quarter on a 35-yard field goal by senior kicker Brody McKnight.

EWU had 212 total yards and dominated time of possession (21:36 to 8:24) in the first 30 minutes, but was held to two field goals by senior kicker Mike Jarrett, who connected from 41 and 42 yards out, making it 10-6 Griz at halftime.

The final touchdown by Kemp, who is also the Grizzlies' back-up quarterback, gave his team an 11-point cushion, and UM's defense did the rest, holding EWU to just eight second-half points.

The Griz rushed 46 times for 316 yards, led by Johnson's 102 yards on just 10 carries. Redshirt freshman Jordan Canada gained 76 yards, while junior Peter Nguyen added 59, and Kemp had just one attempt but picked up 50 yards. Kemp's burst led to McKnight's first quarter field goal.

Senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy led the Griz with 12 tackles, along with Kanagata'a, who also had 12 stops. Kanagata'a, who also had a sack to go along with his pick, was filling in for junior linebacker Jordan Tripp, who left the game with an injury. Waldhauser added eight stops, including 1.5 sacks, while senior cornerback Houston Roots had seven stops and a TFL.

Mitchell was 26-of-49-2 for 237 yards and a TD. Freshman halfback Jordan Talley had game-highs of 19 carries for 114 yards. Senior linebacker Zack Johnson led EWU with a game-high 13 tackles.

SACRAMENTO, CALIF. - Senior quarterback Jeff Fleming ran for two touchdowns and passed for two more to lead the Hornets to the win over the 10th-ranked Griz. The win was the first for the Hornets over the Grizzlies in 17 tries.

Sac State never trailed in the game and controlled the clock with a balanced attack. The Hornets ran for 254 yards and threw for 224 yards, and held the ball for more than twice as long (40:43 to 19:17) as the Grizzlies.

Another big factor in the game was turnovers. The Grizzlies turned the ball over five times including a muffed punt and a blocked punt which both lead to Hornet touchdowns. Sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson struggled to find his groove and threw three interceptions.

Sac State (2-2/1-1) never trailed, and started the scoring off with a 13-play, 82-yard drive that took 7:20 on their first possession, capping it off with a 9-yard pass by Fleming to senior receiver Chase Deadder for a 7-0 Hornet lead.

The Grizzlies (2-2/101) traded short possessions with the Hornets before tying the game at 7-7 on a one yard run by junior running back Dan Moore after a 73-yard drive.

The Grizzlies then forced Sac State to punt, but the short kick deflected off of a Grizzly player, and the Hornets recovered the ball on the Montana 14-yard line, and five plays later Fleming ran for a 7-yard score to give Sac a 14-7 lead.

The Grizzlies responded quickly with a 75-yard drive that culminated in a 33-yard touchdown pass from Johnson to junior receiver Bryce Carver to even the score at 14-14.

Sac State punched back, though, this time scoring on another Fleming run from nine yards out to again take the lead (21-14) for good, and led by that score at halftime.

Both teams traded possessions, but the Hornets ended the half with a missed 25-yard field goal as time expired.

Things started snowballing for the Grizzlies on the first possession after halftime. After one first down the drive stalled on the UM 40-yard line and the ensuing punt by senior Sean Wren was blocked by Deadder. The ball was picked up by sophomore defensive back Markell Williams and returned 30 yards for a TD, giving the Hornets a 28-14 lead.

After a first down by the Griz, a promising possession was stalled by penalties, and Montana was forced to punt. Sac State took full advantage of their next possession and drove 69 yards in just three plays to take a commanding 35-14 lead.

Johnson scored on a 4-yard run on the Grizzlies next possession to close the gap to 35-21, but the Hornets put an end to the Grizzlies' comeback hopes with a 14-play, 80-yard drive that ate up nearly nine minutes (8:50) and culminated in a 37-yard touchdown pass from Fleming to senior receiver Brandyn Reed.

The Griz scored once more with 28 seconds left on another Moore 1-yard touchdown run.

For the second week Johnson led the team in rushing with 64 yards on seven carries and a touchdown, Moore gained 43 yards on 15 carries and scored two TDs.

Senior running back Bryan Hilliard had 22 carries for 100 yards. Junior running back Sam McCowan came in for Hilliard in the second half while he was receiving medical attention for his ankle and ran for 71 yards and a touchdown. Fleming ran for 62 yards on nine carries and two touchdowns.

Fleming was 18-of-27 for 224 yards with no interceptions, while Johnson was 9-of-19 for 148 yards with 3 picks.

MISSOULA, MONTANA — The University of Montana Grizzlies turned on the after-burners in the third quarter and went on to register a 55-28 Big Sky Conference and Homecoming victory over the visiting University of Northern Colorado Bears.

It was Montana's 19th Homecoming win in a row, dating back to 1993.

Leading 24-12 at halftime, the Grizzlies (3-2/2-1) scored 28 unanswered points in the third stanza to take a commanding 55-14 lead over the Bears (0-5/0-3).

Junior quarterback Gerald Kemp was instrumental in Montana's third quarter surge. He rushed for a 7-yard touchdown to open the scoring in the third period. He then threw a 19-yard touchdown pass to junior halfback Peter Nguyen, and then followed that up with another 7-yard scoring run, and the Griz led 48-14 with 4:42 remaining in the quarter.

Redshirt freshman halfback Brett Kirschner scored the final points of the game for the Griz on a 1-yard run with 2:21 to go in the third quarter-his first career touchdown.

It was a game of a lot of firsts by Griz players. Kemp had his first career rushing and passing touchdowns. Last season he mostly played running back out of the wildcat formation. It was also the first touchdown reception by Nguyen.

It was also the first start for junior quarterback Nate Montana, who threw a 39-yard scoring pass to senior wide receiver Antwon Moutra on a flea-flicker on the Grizzlies' first play from scrimmage.

The Bears answered UM's opening score, though, as sophomore quarterback Seth Lobato connected with senior receiver Patrick Walker on a 7-yard TD pass with 5:55 left in the opening quarter.

Montana took the lead for good a couple of minutes later when senior kicker Brody McKnight nailed a 47-yard field goal, which gave the Griz a 10-7 first quarter lead.

The teams traded touchdowns after that via big plays on special teams. The Griz took a 17-7 lead when Jabin Sambrano broke free and scored on a 43-yard punt return (his first punt return TD). But seconds later UNC's Dominic Gunn returned the ensuing kickoff 94 yards for a touchdown, which cut the UM lead to 17-14 with 9:36 left until intermission.

The Griz tacked on 10 more points prior to the half, as Kemp hit senior wide-out Antwon Moutra for a 32-yard scoring pass, and McKnight kicked a 27-yard field goal as time expired to give the Griz a 27-14 half-time lead.

The Bears' final two scores in the fourth quarter were due to a pair of Griz fumbles. The first was a 6-yard fumble recovery for a TD by senior safety Chuks Nweke. The second was on a 4-yard pass from Lobato to junior receiver Chris Morris with one second left in the contest. That second TD was set up when sophomore linebacker Clarence Bumpas scooped up a fumble and return it to the UM 16-yard line. Four plays later Lobato and Morris hooked up for the score.

Kemp rushed 11 times for a career-high 79 yards and two scores, and completed 7-of-8 passes for 112 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Junior halfback Dan Moore had eight carries for 43 yards, while redshirt freshman Jordan Canada added 41 yards on eight totes.

Montana completed 7-of-10 passes for 138 yards and a TD. Moutra had 71 receiving yards, and both of his catches resulted in touchdowns.

The Griz defense was stellar against the run, giving up 21 net yards on 24 carries, and sacked Lobato five times. UM senior linebackers Caleb McSurdy and Alex Shaw led the way with 8 and 7 tackles, respectively. Shaw also had two tackles for loss and a sack. The "D" racked up 12 tackles for loss.

Nguyen (164) and Sambrano (144) combined for 308 all-purpose yards.

Sobato was 30-of-46-1 for 252 yards and two TDs. Walker had 9 catches for 94 yards and a touchdown, while Morris had 7 grabs for 32 yards and a score. Bumpas had a game-high 14 tackles. Gunn had 215 all-purpose yards.

The Griz had 194 net yards rushing and 250 passing for 444 yards of total offense, while the Bears had 21 yards rushing and 254 passing for 275 total yards.

POCATELLO, IDAHO - The Griz had their most dominant defensive performance of the season in the win.

The Montana defense held ISU to just 121 yards of total offense and five first downs. The Bengal offense only progressed into Grizzly territory on their last possession of the first half. That possession ended with an interception, one of the seven turnovers on the evening for the Bengals.

Montana started the dominance early when sophomore safety Bo Tully intercepted ISU junior quarterback Kevin Yost on the Bengals' first play from scrimmage. The Grizzlies turned the interception into a 44-yard field goal by senior Brody McKnight and a 3-0 lead with 13:31 remaining in the opening frame.

Special teams have had a negative impact on Montana in the Griz-Bengals games the last two seasons, but the story was different Saturday night, as ISU had three of their seven turnovers on special teams including the Grizzlies' ensuing kickoff after a McKnight field goal.

Montana scored its first touchdown when sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson found junior wide receiver Sam Gratton in the end zone for the 10-0 lead with 6:58 remaining in the first quarter. The score held into the second quarter when a 23-yard pass from Johnson to junior Gerald Kemp set up another McKnight field goal, this one a 51-yarder.

The Grizzlies held ISU to just two first downs and 76 yards in the first half, over half of that coming on one pass play, a 43-yard completion from Yost to junior wide receiver Rodrick Rumble. Three plays later senior safety Mike McCord intercepted Yost's pass and returned it 28 yards. The Grizzlies lead 13-0 at halftime.

The Montana offense started the first half with a 74-yard drive, capped with a 28-yard touchdown run by senior receiver Jabin Sambrano on a reverse with 11:08 remaining in the third quarter to give UM the 20-0 lead.

The Grizzly "D" forced the Bengals to punt on their first possession of the second half and their second drive led to another McKnight field goal, and Montana pushed the lead to 23-0 with 6:26 left in the third quarter.

Montana would score 10 more points in the fourth frame on another McKnight field goal with 8:42 remaining and a touchdown by freshman tailback Jordan Canada with 5:20 left in the game.

Coming into the game Yost was second in the nation in total offense with 343.6 yards per game. Rumble led the nation in receptions and receiving yards per game with 11 and 151.4 respectively.

Yost passed for only 147 yards and was 21-of-46 with three interceptions, he was also sacked four times and had -22 yards rushing. Rumble had six receptions for 73 yards, 43 of which came on the catch late in the first half.

The Bengals ran only nine times the entire game with -26 rush yards, as Yost was sacked four times.

Montana gained 211 yards rushing on 55 attempts, led by junior running back Dan Moore who had 21 carries for 62 yards.

Johnson was 18-of-31-1 for 267 yards and one touchdown. Kemp had career-highs of 8 catches for 82 yards.

Senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy had a team-high six tackles for the Griz, along with two stops for loss and a sack.

MISSOULA, MONTANA -- The Grizzlies played an outstanding second half and were led by the "D" and running back Jordan Canada, and registered a 30-24 come-from-behind victory over the visiting Vikings in a key Big Sky Conference game in UM's Washington-Grizzly Stadium (attendance, 25,744 - the eighth largest in WGS history).

The 14th-ranked Grizzlies (5-2/4-1 Big Sky) had to overcome a 21-10 halftime deficit to defeat the Vikings (3-3/2-2).

In the final half Montana's defense gave up just 109 total yards, six first downs, and allowed PSU's vaunted rushing attack just 38 yards. The Grizzlies out-scored the Vikings, who entered the game ranked third in the nation in rushing (292.8 yards a game), 20-3 in the second half.

Canada, a redshirt freshman from Duarte, Calif., rushed 13 times for 160 yards in the second half. He had one carry for minus-one yards in the first 30 minutes.

In the second half, the Grizzly offense racked up 254 yards of total offense, along with 11 first downs.

Canada started the Montana comeback when he scored on a 5-yard touchdown run with 3:51 remaining in the third quarter. That cut the PSU lead to 21-16. The key play in that drive was a 22-yard pass from quarterback Jordan Johnson to senior wide receiver Jabin Sambrano, which advanced the ball to the PSU two-yard line.

The Vikings widened their lead to 24-16 when junior kicker Zach Brown connected on his third field of the game, this one a 31-yarder with 3:45 left in the third stanza.

But, the Grizzlies came right back and tied the contest up for the first time, 24-24, on a 1-yard run by junior halfback Dan Moore, plus a two-point conversion on a Johnson to Kavario Middleton pass. Those game-tying points came with 1:37 to go in the third quarter.

Canada was the main man in the Grizzlies' game-tying drive, as he broke loose for a 75-yard run, moving the ball from the UM 7-yard line to the PSU two. Three plays later Moore scored his TD.

Montana took the lead (its first) for good with 10:06 left in the game on a 24-yard field goal by senior kicker Brody McKnight. McKnight added three more points on his third field goal of the game - this one from 42 yards out, giving the Griz a 30-24 lead with 1:49 remaining.

PSU jumped to an early 6-0 first-quarter lead on back-to-back field goals by Brown, who nailed one from 53 yards out, and then hit a 28-yarder.

The Vikings went ahead 13-0 with 13:10 to go in the second quarter on an 8-yard run by senior quarterback Connor Kavanaugh. The Griz answered the PSU score with a 6-yard touchdown rush by sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson, cutting the Vikings lead to 13-7 with 7:39 left until intermission.

PSU came right back, though, this time on a 3-yard TD run by senior halfback Cory McCaffrey with 1:32 to go until the half, giving the Vikings a 21-7 lead. McKnight scored the final points of the first half on a 27-yard field goal with 12 seconds left until the break. It was 21-10, PSU, at halftime.

Canada led the way, averaging 11.4 yards on his 14 carries, and a couple of key first downs in UM's final possession. Junior halfback Peter Nguyen added 10 carries for 68 yards. Unfortunately, Moore, who was limited to eight yards on 10 carries, was injured late in the game.

Johnson was 10-of-18-0 for 128 yards. Sambrano, who also left the game with an injury, had two catches for a team-high 73 yards. Juniors Sam Gratton and Gerald Kemp had two receptions each, and Kemp also had to leave the game due to an injury.

Junior end Josh Harris had a career-high 9 tackles, along with 2.5 tackles for a loss and a sack to pace Montana's defense. Linebackers John Kanongata'a and Caleb McSurdy added 9 and 8 tackles, respectively. Senior cornerback Houston Roots had two interceptions - the first of his career.

McKnight's three field goals give him 48 in his career, tying him with Kirk Duce (48, 1988-91) for the third most in school history.

McCaffrey, who also unfortunately suffered an injury late in the game, rushed 25 times for 103 yards, while Kavanaugh had 23 totes for 97 yards. Passing-wise Kavanaugh was 10-of-20-2 for 100 yards. PSU senior linebacker Ryan Rau had a game-high 18 tackles.

FLAGSTAFF, ARIZ. -- Senior defensive tackle Bryan Waldhauser sacked Northern Arizona quarterback Cary Grossart on fourth down with 1:02 left in the game to seal a 28-24 come-from-behind victory for the Montana Grizzlies at the Walkup Skydome.

It was the second last-quarter rally in a row for the Grizzlies, who overcame a 21-10 halftime deficit the previous Saturday in a 30-24 victory over Portland State.

The victory was Montana's sixth of the season -- which guarantees the Grizzlies their 26th straight winning season, a streak which started in 1986.

Montana (6-2, 5-1) allowed NAU (2-5, 1-4) to jump out to a 14-0 lead just 4:26 into the game. The Lumberjacks scored on a 77-yard pass play from Grossart to receiver Khalil Paden on the first play from scrimmage.

NAU's second touchdown, a 37-yard run by running back Zach Bauman, gave the Jacks a 14-0 lead with 10:32 left in the opening quarter.

The Grizzlies didn't score until the 7:17 mark in the second quarter when running back Peter Nguyen caught a screen pass and followed his blockers into the endzone for a 20-yard touchdown.

Montana scored again with just 37 seconds left in the first half on a 1-yard run by running back Jordan Canada, knotting the game up at 14-14.

The Grizzlies took their first lead (21-14) with 2:57 left in the third frame when receiver Jabin Sambrano scored on an 80-yard reverse.

The Grizzly defense stiffened after the big offensive start by the Lumberjacks and held NAU scoreless until 12:40 left in the fourth quarter when Paden got his second touchdown reception of the night on a 51-yard pass from Grossart.

NAU took the lead back on their next possession when kicker Matt Myers hit from 40 yards out to give the Jacks a 24-21 advantage with 4:45 left in the game.

Nguyen returned the ensuing kickoff 49 yards to the NAU 46-yard line, and Canada scored his game-winner on UM's first play from scrimmage after Nguyen's big return, giving the Grizzlies a 28-24 lead with 4:26 to play.

The Jacks had one more opportunity to score and they moved the ball to the UM 44-yard line, but their final drive ended with Waldhauser's sack.

Griz fans had a scare when quarterback Jordan Johnson went down in the third quarter with an injury, and although the injury looked like it might be serious, Johnson went into the locker room for the rest of that series but returned for the next one.

Johnson finished the game with 216 yards passing, going 15-of-25-0, with one touchdown and no interceptions. Sam Gratton led UM's receivers with 3 receptions for 93 yards.

Sambrano's 80-yard TD run tied him with five other players for the longest scoring run in school history.

Canada led the Grizzlies with 98 yards rushing on 17 carries and two TDs. Waldhauser had a team-high 10 tackles, which ties his career-high, along with two sacks and three stops for losses.

Grossart was 12-of-27 for 321 yards and two touchdowns and no interceptions but was sacked six times. Bauman led NAU with 148 yards and a TD.

MISSOULA, MONTANA- Montana sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson tied a school record with six touchdown passes and senior wide receiver Jabin Sambrano tied a touch mark with four scoring grabs, as the 11th-ranked Grizzlies rolled to a key Big Sky Conference victory.

The convincing win improved the Grizzlies record to 7-2 overall and 6-1 in Big Sky play, while the Wildcats are now 3-5/3-2. The Washington-Grizzly crowd of 25,401 was the 16th largest in 189 games played there.

It was an excellent all-around offensive and defensive effort by the Grizzlies, who have had to come from behind in a pair of recent wins over Northern Arizona (28-24) and Portland State (30-24). Montana has now won five games in a row.

Montana rolled to 545 yards of total offense and 29 first downs, and held Weber State to 290 yards and 19 first downs (six of them coming on the Wildcats' last drive).

The Wildcats had an impressive opening drive and went 73 yards on 11 plays en route to a 34-yard field goal by sophomore kicker Shaun McClain, taking a 3-0 lead with 9:13 to go in the first quarter.

The Griz went three-and-out on their first series, but then scored on their next two possessions, and took a 14-3 first-quarter lead when true freshman Josh Dennard scored his first career touchdown on an 18-yard pass from Johnson. Dennard's scoring grab was set up on three consecutive completions to Sambrano covering 33 yards and moved the ball to the WSU 18-yard line.

Montana took a 7-3 lead with 7:34 left in the opening period on a 31-yard screen pass from Johnson to junior halfback Peter Nguyen, and the Griz led the rest of the way.

The Grizzlies dominated the second quarter, out-gaining the Wildcats 252 to 35 in total yards, and jumped to a 38-3 halftime lead. UM had 13 more first downs (15 to 2) than WSU in the second quarter.

It was the Johnson to Sambrano combination that put the game away early for the Grizzlies, as they hooked up for three straight touchdowns, covering 11, 17, and 8 yards, the third one giving them a commanding 35-3 lead with 3:36 to go until intermission.

Montana's final score in the first half was a 41-yard field goal by senior kicker Brody McKnight. That was McKnight's 49th career field goal, moving him to third all-time, and breaking a tie with Kirk Duce (48, 1989-91).

Montana went to its running game in the second half and picked up 196 yards on 22 carries, and was 6-of-8 passing for 60 yards in the final 30 minutes. The Grizzlies tacked on one more score with the fourth Johnson-to-Sambrano touchdown pass, this one good from 25 yards out, giving UM a 45-3 advantage with 11:28 left in the third quarter.

WSU scored its only touchdown of the game with 42 seconds remaining on a 3-yard run by junior halfback C.J. Tuckett.

Johnson completed 23-of-32-0 passes for a career-high 299 yards en route to his record-tying six touchdown passes. He tied Brian Ah Yat (6 TD passes at Stephen F. Austin, 1998) and Dave Dickenson's (6 TDs throws versus Boise State, 1995) with his six scoring throws. He also rushed eight times for 53 yards to finish with 352 yards of total offense.

Sambrano's four scoring grabs tied him with four other players: Marc Mariani versus Southern Utah, 2008; Joe Douglass at Eastern Washington in 1996; Marvin Turk at Idaho in 1991; and Mike Rice against Idaho State in 1986.

Nguyen had career and game-highs of 15 carries for 85 yards. Sambrano finished with 7 receptions for 94 yards and the four TDs, while junior tight end Greg Hardy had 5 grabs for 36 yards.

Senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy led the defense with 10 tackles. Senior cornerback Houston Roots had 5 tackles, an interception, a tackle for a loss, and a pass break-up.

WSU was without injured starting quarterback Mike Hoke. His replacement, sophomore Jordan Adamczyk was 18-of-40-2 for 196 yards and was sacked just once, but was forced out of the pocket throughout the game.

MISSOULA, MONTANA -- Kicker Brody McKnight connected on a school-record six field goals and halfback Peter Nguyen rushed for a career-high 149 yards to lead The University of Montana Grizzlies to a 32-7 victory over the Western Oregon College Wolves in a non-league game in UM's Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

The Griz (8-2 overall) dominated the Wolves (6-4), and scored all seven times they were in the red zone, but six of those scores came via McKnight's foot in the form of field goals.

The Division II Wolves, who lead the Great Northwest Athletic Conference with a 6-1 record, made things interesting when they scored their only touchdown of the game in the third quarter. When senior quarterback Cory Bean hit sophomore flanker Lucas Gonsalves for a 27-yard TD, it cut the Griz lead to 15-7 with 9:24 left in the third stanza.

The Grizzlies answered the Wolves' touchdown with one of their own, though, as redshirt freshman halfback Brett Kirschner scored on a 1-yard run, giving Montana a 22-7 lead at the 6:37 mark of the third quarter.

Nguyen was instrumental in Kirschner's touchdown run in UM's nine-play, 54-yard drive, as the 5-8, 182-pound junior rushed five times for 33 yards, including a key four-and-one carry that advanced the ball to the Wolves 1-yard line. Nguyen was banged up on that run to the 1-yard line and did not return to the game.

Montana tacked on another score when junior quarterback Nate Montana tossed a 5-yard scoring pass to senior wide receiver Antwon Moutra, making the score 29-7 Griz with 13:12 left in the game.

The Grizzlies final points came on McKnight's sixth record-breaking field goal, this one coming from 24 yards out with 8:30 remaining in the contest, making it 32-7.

The Griz had 53 plays and racked up 282 yards in the first half, but managed only 12 points, as McKnight booted field goals covering 24, 21, 51, and 30 yards.

Montana played four quarterbacks, and starter Jordan Johnson was 11-of-16-0 for 103 yards, but left the game after just one quarter of action due to an injury.

McKnight's four first-half field goals were set up by the running of Nguyen, who gained 84 yards on 13 carries and the passing of Johnson (103 yards) and junior QB Gerald Kemp, who threw for 64 yards and rushed for 24 more in the first 30 minutes of the game. Sam Gratton also contributed a lot in the first half with 6 catches for 72 yards.

The Griz defense was once again stellar, holding the Wolves to 221 total yards and 13 first downs. Sophomore linebacker John Kanogata'a led UM with 8 stops, while true freshman safety Matt Hermanson had 7 tackles and an interception. Senior tackle Bryan Waldhauser added 7 stops and 1.5 tackles for loss. Sophomore cornerback Sean Murray had two interceptions.

Bean and fellow quarterbacks Cody VonAppen and Ryan Bergman were a combined 10-of-31-4 for 156 yards and one TD. WOU had 31 rushes for 65 net yards.

Sophomore linebacker Devin Wells led the Wolves with a game-high 18 tackles.

BOZEMAN, MONTANA -- The University of Montana had two players rush for more than 100 yards and the Grizzly defense stymied Montana State's potent offense en route to a 36-10 key Big Sky Conference victory at MSU's Bobcat Stadium.

The seventh-ranked Grizzlies claimed the league's regular-season championship over the top-ranked Bobcats due to the head-to-head tie-breaker in the league's standings.

It was the 70th Griz victory in the 111th game of the storied rivalry. Montana has now won 22 of the past 26 games and leads the series 70-36-5.

With the regular-season title Montana earned the automatic berth into the FCS playoffs. This will be the 18th season in the last 19 years that the Griz has advanced to the playoffs.

The Grizzly defense set the tone for the game. Montana's "D" held MSU's prolific offense, which had averaged 459 yards and 36.6 points a game before last Saturday, to just 250 yards and 10 points.

The Griz rushed 47 times for 309 yards and two scores, and passed for another 165 yards and a pair of touchdowns, racking up 473 total yards and 24 first downs (18 rushing).

Griz junior running backs Peter Nguyen and Dan Moore rushed for 123 and 116 yards, respectively.

The Cats cut the Griz lead to 12-7 when sophomore quarterback Denarius McGhee connected with senior wide receiver Elvis Akpla on a 7-yard scoring pass with 14:07 to go in the third quarter.

The Grizzlies came right back on their first play from scrimmage in the second half, though, as senior wide receiver Jabin Sambrano hauled in a 79-yard pass from sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson, making the score 19-7 Griz with 13:49 left in the third quarter.

After Sambrano's long TD grab, the Grizzlies tacked on three more points on a 33-yard field goal by senior kicker Brody McKnight, taking a 22-7 lead with 10:05 left in the third.

Moore, who had not played in more than a month due to an injury he suffered in the Portland State game (Oct. 15), rushed 15 times for a career-high 116 yards. His longest run of the game was a 37-yard touchdown scamper, which gave the Griz a 29-7 lead with 5:37 left in the third.

MSU's final points came on a 38-yard field goal by senior kicker Jason Cunningham with 14:16 remaining in the game.

Nguyen capped off his second straight 100-yard rushing game with a nifty, zig-zagging 21-yard touchdown run with 9:28 left in the game, making it the final, 36-10. Two weeks ago, in UM's last game, Nguyen rushed for a career-high 149 yards in a 32-7 home win over Western Oregon.

The game started out slow, with the teams battling between the 25-yard lines for the majority of the first quarter, with neither scoring.

The Grizzlies got on the scoreboard at the 9:10 mark in the second quarter when McKnight nailed a 34-yard field goal to give the Griz a 3-0 lead. MSU stopped the Griz on their next drive, but McKnight's 49-yard punt gave MSU poor field position at their own 3-yard line. On MSU's first possession from the three, McGhee was called for intentional grounding in the end zone for a safety when he was tackled by senior cornerback Trumaine Johnson with 6:12 to play in the half, and the Griz took a 5-0 lead.

Montana pushed the lead to 12-0 on a 2-yard pass from Johnson to senior tight end Kavario Middleton for a touchdown on a 4th-and-2 play with 3:57 left in the half. MSU had Cunningham's 58-yard field goal attempt blocked by senior defensive end Bobby Alt with four seconds left until intermission, and UM took a 12-0 lead at the break.

Johnson was 15-of-31-0 for 164 yards and two touchdowns. Sambrano had 4 catches for 96 yards and a TD, while Middleton had 3 for 15 and a score. Junior tight end Greg Hardy and junior wide-out Bryce Carver had two receptions each.

Senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy and sophomore LB John Kanongata led Montana with 8 tackles each. UM senior linebacker Alex Shaw added 6 tackles and 1.5 stops for loss. Trumaine Johnson had 5 tackles, including the key one in the end zone that led to the safety.

McGhee was 16-of-33-0 for 171 yards and a TD. Akpla had 6 grabs for 113 yards and a score. Junior linebacker Jody Owens led MSU with 13 tackles.

MISSOULA, MONTANA - The University of Montana Grizzlies dominated in all phases of the game en route to a 41-14 victory over the University of Central Arkansas Bears in a 2011 NCAA Division 1 Football Championship Subdivision second round playoff game in UM's Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

The fifth-ranked Grizzlies (10-2) will host the second-ranked Northern Iowa Panthers (10-2) in a quarterfinal playoff game on Friday, Dec. 9. UNI defeated visiting Wofford 28-21 in a second-round contest.

Senior wide receiver Jabin Sambrano caught two touchdown passes from sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson; redshirt freshman Jordan Canada rushed for two scores, and junior half-back Peter Nguyen also ran for a TD to pace Montana's offense.

The Grizzlies jumped to a 17-0 first quarter lead on a 31-yard field goal by senior kicker Brody McKnight, an 8-yard Johnson-to-Sambrano hook-up, and a 2-yard run by Nguyen. Three UCA turnovers led to all three of those opening quarter scores by UM.

McKnight's field goal was set up by a fumble recovery by Griz sophomore cornerback Sean Murray. The TD pass to Sambrano followed a fumble recovery by freshman safety Matt Hermanson, while Nguyen's touchdown rush came after an interception by senior cornerback Trumaine Johnson.

Montana scored twice more before the break, as Canada broke loose on an 11-yard run, and Johnson hit Sambrano for a 22-yard TD pass with 26 seconds remaining in the second quarter, and the Griz took a commanding 31-0 lead at halftime.

Canada's second scoring run came with 9:30 to go in the third quarter, boosting Montana's lead to 38-0. UCA got on the board with 4:54 to go in the third on a 44-yard touchdown pass from senior quarterback Nathan Dick to junior wide receiver Jesse Grandy.

Montana's final points came on a 20-yard field goal by McKnight with 12:08 left to play. McKnight upped his school record streak of consecutive field goals to 16. He also averaged 49.2 yards on four punts.

The 15th-ranked Bears' (9-4) final score came on an 8-yard touchdown pass from Dick to freshman wide receiver Al Lasker, making it the final, 41-14, with 1:58 left to play.

Offensively the Grizzlies rushed 58 times for 229 yards and three touchdowns, and they passed for 135 yards and two scores, and had 27 first downs. Montana also had a huge edge in time of possession: 38:43 to 21:17.

Nguyen had game-highs of 16 carries for 79 yards, while Canada had 10 carries for 58 yards. UM junior halfback Dan Moore picked up 33 yards on 9 totes, and junior Gerald Kemp added 31 yards on seven rushes.

Jordan Johnson was 16-of-25-2 for 135 yards and two TDs. UM senior receiver Antwon Moutra had game-highs of 6 catches for 66 yards, while senior tight end Kavario Middleton had 4 for 65, and Sambrano added 4 grabs for 39 and the two scores.

The Griz "D" held UCA to 290 total yards, 13 first downs, and the Bears were 2-of-10 on third down conversions. The Bears rushed 14 times for 25 net yards. Montana recovered three of UCA's five fumbles, and had one pick.

Sophomore linebacker John Kanongata'a led the Griz with 9 tackles. Hermanson, a true freshman, had 6 tackles, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, and a tackle for loss. Trumaine Johnson's pick was his first this season, but the 14th of his career, ranking him fourth on the career list.

UM's other top tacklers were sophomore safety Bo Tully (5 total tackles), senior cornerback Houston Roots (5 TT), and Murray also had 5 stops and recovered a fumble.

Dick was 26-of-40-1 for 265 yards and two touchdowns. Lasker had 4 catches for 29 yards, and 11 different UCA players had at least one reception. Senior middle linebacker Frank Newsome led the Bears with a game-high 16 tackles.

MISSOULA, MONTANA --The fifth-ranked/fourth-seed University of Montana Grizzlies defeated the visiting second-ranked/fifth-seed University of Northern Iowa Panthers in a NCAA 2011 Division I Football Championship Subdivision quarterfinal game in a dominating fashion, 48-10 Friday (Dec. 9) evening in front of a national television audience on ESPN.

The Grizzlies (11-2) improve to 11-0 at home in FCS quarterfinal games, and advance to the semifinals for the 11th time in school history. It was also the ninth win in a row today for Montana.

A raucous Washington-Rizzoli Stadium crowd of 23,049, saw UNI finish its season with a 10-3 record.

Just as in last week's 41-14 second round victory over the visiting Central Arkansas Bears, the Grizzlies dominated in every phase of the game. In that win over UCA the Griz rushed 58 times for 229 yards, while the "D" held the Bears to 290 total yards, including just 25 rushing.

Against UNI, Montana rushed 49 times for 267 yards and passed for another 196 en route to 463 total yards and 20 first downs. The Griz were 5-of-5 scoring in the red zone and converted 7-of-13 first downs. UNI had 257 total yards and 11 first downs, and the Griz defense sacked Panther quarterbacks five times and also had 10 tackles for loss. UNI was 5-of-16 on third down conversions.

The Panthers' only touchdown came on their second possession of the game, as senior quarterback Tirrell Rennie hit senior wide receiver Jarred Herring on a 27-yard touchdown pass, which gave UNI a 7-0 lead with 9:22 to go in the first quarter.

But, the Grizzlies scored on five of their eight first-half possessions en route to an impressive 28-10 lead at intermission.

Montana knotted the game at 7-7 with six seconds left in the first quarter on a 1-yard run by redshirt freshman halfback Jordan Canada. The Griz then took the lead for good on their next series, as sophomore quarterback Jordan Johnson broke up the middle for a 6-yard touchdown run, giving UM a 14-7 lead at the 10:50 mark of the second quarter.

UNI scored its final points of the game after Johnson's scoring run on a 21-yard field goal by sophomore kicker Tyler Sievertsen, making it 14-10 Griz with 10:50 to go in the second quarter.

The Griz then scored twice more before halftime, the first TD coming on a 10-yard run by junior halfback Peter Nguyen, and the second on a 5-yard pass from Johnson to senior tight end Kavrio Middleton, the latter coming with just 30 seconds remaining until halftime.

Johnson had two more scoring passes in the third and fourth quarters, both to junior wide receiver Sam Gratton. The first Johnson-to-Gratton hook-up covered 8 yards, while the second came from 25 yards out, making it 41-10 Griz with 10:43 left to play.

UM closed the scoring with 8:56 left when senior cornerback Donny Lisowski picked off a Rennie pass for his first career interceptions and sprinted down the left sideline for a 35-yard touchdown, making it the final, 48-10.

Johnson was 13-of-20-0 for 196 yards and 3 touchdowns. He also rushed for a game-high 86 yards on 10 carries, while Nguyen had 7 totes for 37 yards and a score.

Gratton had 4 catches for 90 yards and the two TDs, while senior wide receiver Antwon Moutra had 3 grabs for 56 yards.

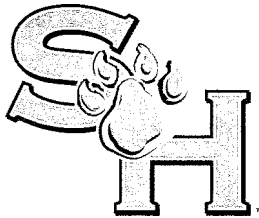
Senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy led UM with 10 tackles, while freshman safety Matt Hermanson had 8 stops, and senior linebacker Alex Shaw added 7. They were followed by sophomore linebacker John Kanongata'a, senior cornerback Trumaine Johnson, and senior safety Mike McCord had 6 tackles each.

Kanongata'a had 2.5 tackles for loss and McSurdy had 2.0. Lisowski had an interception, as did sophomore linebacker Brock Coyle. Trumaine Johnson, a Buck Buchanan Award finalist, also had an interception for the second week in row.

Freshman halfback David Johnson led UNI with 68 yards rushing, while Rennie had 22 carries for 51 yards. Rennie was 9-of-19-2 for 93 yards and one TD. Herring had 5 catches for 67 yards and a score. Senior linebacker L.J. Fort, also a Buchanan Award finalist, had a game-high 17 tackles.

HUNTSVILLE, TEXAS – It was a tale of two halves, and the Grizzlies' comeback effort was impressive, but fell short in a NCAA FCS semifinal game in SHSU's Bowers Stadium.

The Bearkats (14-0) jumped to a 21-0 first quarter lead, but the Griz scored twice in the second quarter and trailed 28-14 at halftime. The scoring plays in the first half by UM were a 30-yard scoring pass from Jordan Johnson to Jabin Sambrano and a 61-yard interception for a score by linebacker Caleb McSurdy.

Montana out-scored the Kats 14-3 in the second half and advanced the ball to the SHSU 49-yard line on its final drive, but SHSU ran out the clock and denied the Grizzlies their eighth trip to the national championship game.

Montana (11-3) had its run of consecutive wins end at nine.

The Griz "D" turned it up a few notches in the final 30 minutes, as Sam Houston State had just two first downs in the second half prior to its final, game-clinching drive.

Bearkat sophomore halfback Tim Flanders was unstoppable, gaining 287 yards on 26 carries -- 11.0 yards per tote. He led a Kat ground attack that rushed 51 times for 383 yards. Flanders had eight rushes for 63 yards, including a key 22-yard gain on a 4th-and-1 from the SHSU 47-yard line in his team's final drive.

The Kats scored on their first three possessions of the game. Quarterback Brian Bell scored on an 11-yard run with 10:36 left in the first quarter; Flanders scored on a 69-yard scamper; and Bell connected with Grant Merritt for a 20-yard touchdown pass, giving the host team a 21-0 lead at the 1:42 mark of the opening quarter.

The Griz finally got on the board when Johnson hit Sambrano for a 30-yard TD pass with 6:27 left in the second quarter to cut the lead to 21-7. The Kats answered with a 27-yard touchdown pass from Bell to Trey Diller with 2:15 left in the half for the 28-7 lead.

Johnson was intercepted on the next play from scrimmage, but when the Griz were in need of a big play, the All-American McSurdy came up big. With a minute left in the half, McSurdy batted down and intercepted Bell's pass and ran it back for the 61-yard TD.

The start of the second half was shaky for Montana, as the Kats pinned the Griz back on their own 13-yard line on their second possession. On the first play of the drive Johnson fumbled the ball and it was recovered by Eric Fieilo on the Grizzly 8-yard line. The Montana defense kept the Kats out of the end zone, but Craig Alaniz connected on a field goal from 25-yards out for the 31-14 lead.

The Grizzly offense then found its rhythm. On UM's next possession it drove 61 yards on 10 plays, capped off with a 3-yard scoring run by Canada with 3:36 remaining in the third quarter, cutting the Sam Houston State lead to 31-21.

The Griz defense forced the Kats to punt on their next possession. The Montana offense took advantage of the opportunity, and drove 80 yards capped off when Johnson had a career-long 54-yard run for a touchdown, which cut the Bearkat advantage to 31-28 with 11:26 left in the game.

Momentum was on the Grizzlies' side, and the Montana defense forced the Kats to punt with 9:10 to play giving the offense plenty of time to work with. A promising Grizzly drive failed to materialize into points after Johnson's pass to an open Sambrano on a post route died in the wind and the pass came up short with 6:00 left in the game.

Johnson led the Griz with 64 yards on the ground and was 21-of-33-1 passing for a game-high 227 yards with one touchdown.

Bell was 11-for-14-1 for 113 yards and two TDs.

The Grizzlies outscored the Kats 28-10 after the first quarter including a 7-3 third quarter -- the first time all year that Sam Houston has been outscored in the third.

"I was proud of how we played the second half," Griz head coach Robin Pflugrad said. "We really dug ourselves a big hole in the first half and credit Sam Houston State with their play."

BIG SKY UNVEILS NEW LOGO, BRAND

Ogden, Utah (July 16, 2012) – The Big Sky Conference unveiled its new logo and branding campaign Monday as part of the leagues' Summer Kickoff in Park City, Utah.



A new era in the Big Sky Conference begins in 2012-13 as the league enters its 50th year of athletic competition, and its 25th sponsoring women's collegiate athletics. The Division I Big Sky Conference welcomes the University of North Dakota and Southern Utah University into the fold as full members. Cal Poly and UC Davis join the league as affiliate members in football, where the league competes at the Championship Subdivision level (formerly I-AA).

The additions of North Dakota and Southern Utah give the stable Big Sky 11 full institutions and 13 football members. The current lineup includes four of the six charter members: Idaho State University, The University of Montana, Montana State University and Weber State. Northern Arizona enters its 43rd season in the Big Sky, giving the conference five members with at least 40 years of continuous membership.

Eastern Washington University joined the Big Sky Conference in 1987, followed by Portland State University and Sacramento State in 1996. The Big Sky became a nine-team league in 2006 with the addition of the University of Northern Colorado.

The league has become one of the strongest Division I conferences in the West and is a national leader in the Football Championship Subdivision. Six times, Big Sky teams have won the Division I National Championship, including Eastern Washington in 2010. A Big Sky team has played for the national championship in three of the past four seasons.

The Big Sky Conference was established in 1963 by six charter members – Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga, Montana, Montana State and Weber State. Those six schools formed the foundation of the Big Sky before the league expanded in 1970 by adding Boise State and Northern Arizona. Gonzaga left the Sky in 1979 and was replaced by Nevada, which gave the league eight members. The conference grew to nine schools in 1987 with the addition of Eastern Washington.

The 1990s saw change in the makeup of the league, beginning in 1992 when Nevada departed and put the Big Sky back at eight teams. In 1996 Boise State and Idaho left and at the same time the conference added Portland State, Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge. The Big Sky maintained nine teams for five years before Cal State Northridge departed in the spring of 2001.

The Big Sky now includes nine states spanning from the Pacific Ocean to the Red River Valley of North Dakota. The league is represented along the entire west coast with institutions in Washington, Oregon and California. League schools also range up and down the Rocky Mountains with institutions in Montana, Idaho, Utah, Arizona and Colorado.

On Feb 25, 1963, the name Big Sky was adopted by the six presidents of the charter members as the name of the new conference. The name Big Sky originated in a novel written by the late A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont., in 1947 entitled "The Big Sky." Jack Hollowell, a former Montana advertising director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. While on a track and field trip from Pocatello, Idaho, to Missoula, Mont., legendary Dubby Holt of Idaho State saw a "Welcome to Big Sky Country" sign as his team entered Montana. Holt, and his athletes thought "Big Sky" would be a perfect name for the new conference. Harry Missildine of the Spokane Spokesman-Review called for the newly formed league to be named the Big Sky Conference in his column dated Feb. 20, 1963.

The Big Sky sponsors championships in 15 sports, including men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, basketball and tennis. In addition, there are also championships in football, and women's volleyball, golf and soccer. This upcoming spring, the Big Sky will sponsor a softball championship for the first time.

In 1988-89, the Big Sky Conference first began sponsoring women's sports. The former Mountain West Conference existed from 1982-88, sponsoring championships for women's sports at the same institutions the Big Sky had men's programs. The Big Sky merged with the Mountain West in 1988, forming one league for both men and women.

Doug Fullerton, the fifth commissioner of the Big Sky Conference, is in his 18th year at the helm. Fullerton took over the Big Sky on July 1, 1995, replacing longtime commissioner Ron Stephenson, who passed away in 2011. Stephenson served the league for 14 years. Steve Belko was the commissioner from 1977-81, while John Roning held the post from 1971-77. The first league commissioner was Jack Friel, who served from 1963-71.

Professor Fred D. Smith, chemistry professor and former football player at Cornell University, volunteered to coach the football team. Twenty-four men turned out. No uniforms were available so many of the players used makeshift clothing."

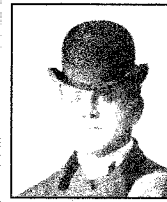

Dewitt Peck, 1902

This season saw the organization of the Northwest Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Nine Northwest colleges were represented at a meeting which was held in Spokane.

"Hiram Conibear coached at Illinois University before coming to UM.

The 1903 team was the first university football team to be sent out of the state to compete in an athletic contest.

Coach Conibear will be remembered by University of Montana fans for at least one contribution, his 1904 team ran up the biggest score in football history against Montana State College, 79-0." -- *The Redbook*

This was the first year that letter sweaters were awarded. University sweater awards were donated by Missoula Mercantile."

Lt. W.C. Philoon, 1912

Lt. Philoon was an All American player (center) at West Point.

A.G. Heilman, 1913-14

"This was the best team that Montana had yet produced, and Montana was undefeated and had one scoreless tie with Idaho in 1914.

Richard Howell of the Law School wrote the song: "Up With Montana" (UM's fight song) in 1914." -- *The Redbook*



Jerry Nissen 1915-1917

"The biggest game of the season and one of the biggest in Montana history came Thanksgiving Day 1915 when the pow-

erful Syracuse University team invaded Missoula for the first inter-sectional game in the state.

Coach Jerry Nissen returned from the Northwest Conference meeting at Seattle in 1916 with the news that Montana had been admitted to the conference.

Coach Nissen resigned at the end of the 1917 season to join the Army. The coach had compiled a record of 14-7-4 in three seasons." -- *The Redbook*



Bernie Bierman 1919-1921

"Bernie Bierman, the new coach, was an All-America half-back at the University of Minnesota in 1915.

Probably no season up to this time saw more "firsts" than in 1920. The Grizzlies beat the University of Washington for the only time in history. Montana's football field was moved and named "Dornblaser Field" in honor of Paul Dornblaser, the great Grizzly tackle, who was killed in action in World War I. Finally, the Grizzlies ran up their biggest score in history, a 133-0 pasting of Mount St. Charles (Carroll College)." -- *The Redbook*



J.W. Stewart 1922-1923

"John W. Stewart, a graduate of Geneva College, Penn., was selected from a list of 50 candidates to

succeed Bernie Bierman. He was to be head coach of the football, basketball and track teams." -- *The Redbook*



Earl Clark 1924-1925

"Earl 'Click' Clark became the second Montana graduate to coach a Grizzly team in 1924.

Coach Clark resigned at the end of the 1925 season to accept the position of trainer at the University of Washington. He held this position until his retirement." -- *The Redbook*



Frank Milburn 1926-1930

"Major Frank Milburn, a West Point graduate and winner of the Athletic Saber, emblematic of the best athlete at

West Point, became head of the R.O.T.C. and head football coach.

The 1930 season highlights were victories over Montana State College, University of Idaho and Gonzaga University.

Major "Shrimp" Milburn closed his coaching career at the University of Montana due to Army orders transferring him to another station."

Bernard Oakes
1931-1934

"Bernard F. "Bunny" Oakes, who had been line coach at the University of Nebraska for the past five years, became Major Milburn's successor as head

coach of football for the 1931 season.

Robert Stansberry and Henry Blastic made honorable mention All Americans.

Bernard Oakes left after the 1934 season to coach football at the University of Colorado." -- *The Redbook*



Doug Fessenden
1935-1941

"Douglas Fessenden, Fenger High School coach in Chicago, was selected as head football coach at the university in April of 1935.

"Man of the Year" was the honor accorded Douglas Fessenden by the Kaimin in 1935 for the distinguished work done by him in raising Montana to a prominent place in Pacific Coast Conference football. Fessenden proved himself to be an able mentor and won the respect and admiration of the entire school.

The 1937 season was the most successful football season since 1914. Montana won six consecutive games in 1937 which is the first time in history Montana won as many games.

The highlight of the 1939 season was the 13-0 win over the University of Idaho, smashing the Idaho jinx and giving Montana possession of the Little Brown Stein for the first time.

The 1941 football season was a successful year as well, UM going 6-3. 1946-1948 (14-15)

Douglas Fessenden returned from the Army Air Corp in time to take over his duties as head football coach.

Montana enjoyed a successful 1947 season winning 7 games and losing 4 and defeated Washington State College and the University of Idaho on their home grounds.

Fessenden resigned in 1948 and the following year received his doctors degree in Physical Education from Columbia University. Fessenden had the best win and loss record in football of any university football coach up until that time." -- *The Redbook*



George Dahlberg
1945

"George "Jiggs" Dahlberg from the University of Montana coached football for the 1945 season.

Dr. J.E. "Burly" Miller, faculty athletic representative ruled that the University of Montana, 'must follow pre-war Pacific Coast Conference rules.'" -- *The Redbook*



Ted Shipkey
1949-1951

"Ted Shipkey began his coaching stint at the University of Montana in 1949.

The passing combination of Ray Bauer (end) and Tom Kingsford (quarterback) in 1950 was one of the best in University history. Montana withdrew from the Pacific Coast Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference which is also known as the "Skyline" Conference.

Ted Shipkey resigned as football coach in 1951." -- *The Redbook*



Ed Chinske
1952-1954

"Edward Chinske became the next UM head football coach in 1952.

Richard (Dick) Imer was selected for All-American honors in 1953. Imer and Joe DeLuca were chosen to several All-American teams in 1954." -- *Redbook*



Jerry Williams
1955-1957

"UM's fund-raising arm, the Century Club, got its start in 1955, the same year as Head Coach Jerry Williams arrived.

Aside from the fact that Stanley Renning was considered one of the greatest sophomores to ever appear in a Grizzly uniform, the 1956 campaign was a dismal one.

Coach Jerry Williams, who had played professional football with the Philadelphia Eagles, left UM to be an assistant coach for the Eagles." -- *The Redbook*



Ray Jenkins
1958-1963

"Ray Jenkins' first year as football coach was a poor debut with an 0-10 record, the worst in Montana history.

The Grizzlies came up with their best passing attack in 10 seasons during 1959, a campaign that also marked the end of a 15-game losing streak when the Grizzlies scored a 12-0 upset over Brigham Young.

Terry Dillon was selected and played in the East-West Shrine game January 1963.

The 1963 football season was unsuccessful - winning one game and losing nine. Ray Jenkins resigned at the close of the 1963 football season." -- *The Redbook*



Hugh Davidson
1964-1966

"In 1964 Hugh Davidson became the new head coach. The Terry Dillon Award was established for the most valuable player on the football team.

Davidson resigned at the end of the 1966 football season." -- *Redbook*



Jack Swarthout
1967-1975

"Since assuming the duties of both head football coach and AD at UM in 1967, Jack Swarthout put a drive into the school's athletic program which had not been seen in Missoula for several years.

Montana won the Big Sky Conference championship in 1969 for the first time since conference football began in 1963.

Coach Swarthout and his staff received considerable praise for the excellent job of coaching Montana to its second consecutive undefeated regular season play in 1970. The team played in the Camillia Bowl, losing to UND 31-16. There were several Grizzlies selected to various All-American teams in 1971.

Swarthout resigned as football coach at the close of the 1975 season. He chose to return to high school teaching and coaching at Capital High, Olympia, Wash. Swarthout left UM as the winningest football coach in the University's history with a nine-year record of 51 wins, 41 losses and one tie. He won two consecutive Big Sky football championships (1969 and 1970)." -- *The Redbook*



Gene Carlson
1976-1979

"The 1976 football season opened with Eugene Carlson as the new head football coach. Carlson inherited the coaching staff of the preceding administration (Jack Swarthout), as well as the offensive system (Wishbone or Texas Y). However, Gene made some changes in the offense formation."

Carlson was an alumnus of UM and was a very successful high school coach in Great Falls prior to coming to the University of Montana. A greater success was expected by those in power so Carlson resigned at the close of the 1979 season." -- *The Redbook*



Larry Donovan
1980-1985

Larry Donovan was selected to replace Gene Carlson. Donovan was a graduate of the University of Nebraska and came to Montana from the University of Kansas where he had been an assistant coach.

The 1981 season was positive, as Coach Donovan was rebuilding the football program, and 1982 saw the Grizzlies in a first-round playoff game at Idaho along with winning the Big Sky Conference title. However, the next three seasons had more L's than W's, and after the 1985 season, Donovan and most of his coaching staff did not have their contracts renewed for the 1986 season.



Don Read
1986-1995

Don Read is Montana's all-time winningest coach. He came to Montana from Portland State in 1986.

Read never had a losing season as head mentor to the Grizzlies. In Montana's 96-year football history. Also during his 10-year tenure, he was 10-0 against the MSU Bobcats. The Grizzlies advanced to the playoffs five out of the 10 years he coached, winning the Division I-AA (FCS) national championship in 1995. He was also selected the Division I-AA Coach of the Year in 1995 and coached Dave Dickenson, the 1995 Walter Payton Award winner

During his tenure, the Griz had an overall record of 85-36, and his 85 overall wins at UM and 54 Big Sky victories rank him second in conference history.



Mick Dennehy
1996-1999

Mick Dennehy became the 31st head coach in April of 1996. Dennehy was Montana's offensive coordinator and O-line coach since 1991. He played football for the Griz from 1969-71 and was elected defensive captain his senior year.

Dennehy took Montana to the Division I-AA championship game in 1996, the second consecutive year the Griz got there, losing at Marshall, 49-29. Dennehy was named the Big Sky Conference football coach of the year, as the Grizzlies posted a conference title, going 11-0 in the regular season.

Dennehy was named the head coach of Utah State on Dec. 3, 1999.



Joe Glenn
2000-2002

Joe Glenn came to Montana after a very long, successful 11-year career at Northern Colorado where the Bears won back-to-back NCAA Division II national football championships in 1996 and 1997.

In Joe's first year as head coach at Montana, he won the Eddie Robinson Award, given annually to the I-AA (FCS) coach of the year. He was also the Big Sky Conference's coach of the year. That year he took the 13-1 Griz to the Division I-AA national championship game, where the Griz lost to Georgia Southern, 27-25.

Glenn repeated the trip to the title game in 2001, this time winning the championship, beating Furman 13-6. The Griz were once again conference champs for the second year in a row. The Griz were co-conference champs in 2002.

Glenn was hired as Wyoming's 30th head football coach Dec. 12, 2002 and is now the head coach at South Dakota.



Bobby Hauck
2003-2009

Bobby Hauck became Montana's 33rd head football coach in Jan. of 2003. He came to UM from the University of Washington where he was assistant coach. Hauck graduated from UM.

Hauck had a successful head coaching career at Montana, taking his teams to the playoffs all seven of his years here, appearing in national championship games in 2004 and 2008, and the semifinals in 2006.

He had 80 wins at UM. Hauck was selected the Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year in 2006, 2007 and 2009. He was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award in 2009. He had nine players selected to the all-conference first team in 2009, and Montana led the conference in rushing offense, scoring offense, total defense and scoring defense that season.

Along with his head coaching duties, Hauck also coached special teams. He was the AFCA Regional Coach of the Year in 2009.

Hauck took over the head coaching position at UNLV in December of 2009.



Robin Pflugrad
2010-11

Robin Pflugrad was named the 34th head football coach at Montana on December 31, 2009. He came to Montana from the University of Oregon.

Pflugrad is a veteran coach who was a mentor in the prestigious PAC-10 Conference for 13 seasons with stints at Oregon, Washington State and Arizona State. He has coached at the collegiate level for 28 years.

Pflugrad had an overall record of 7-4 in his first season as head coach at Montana.

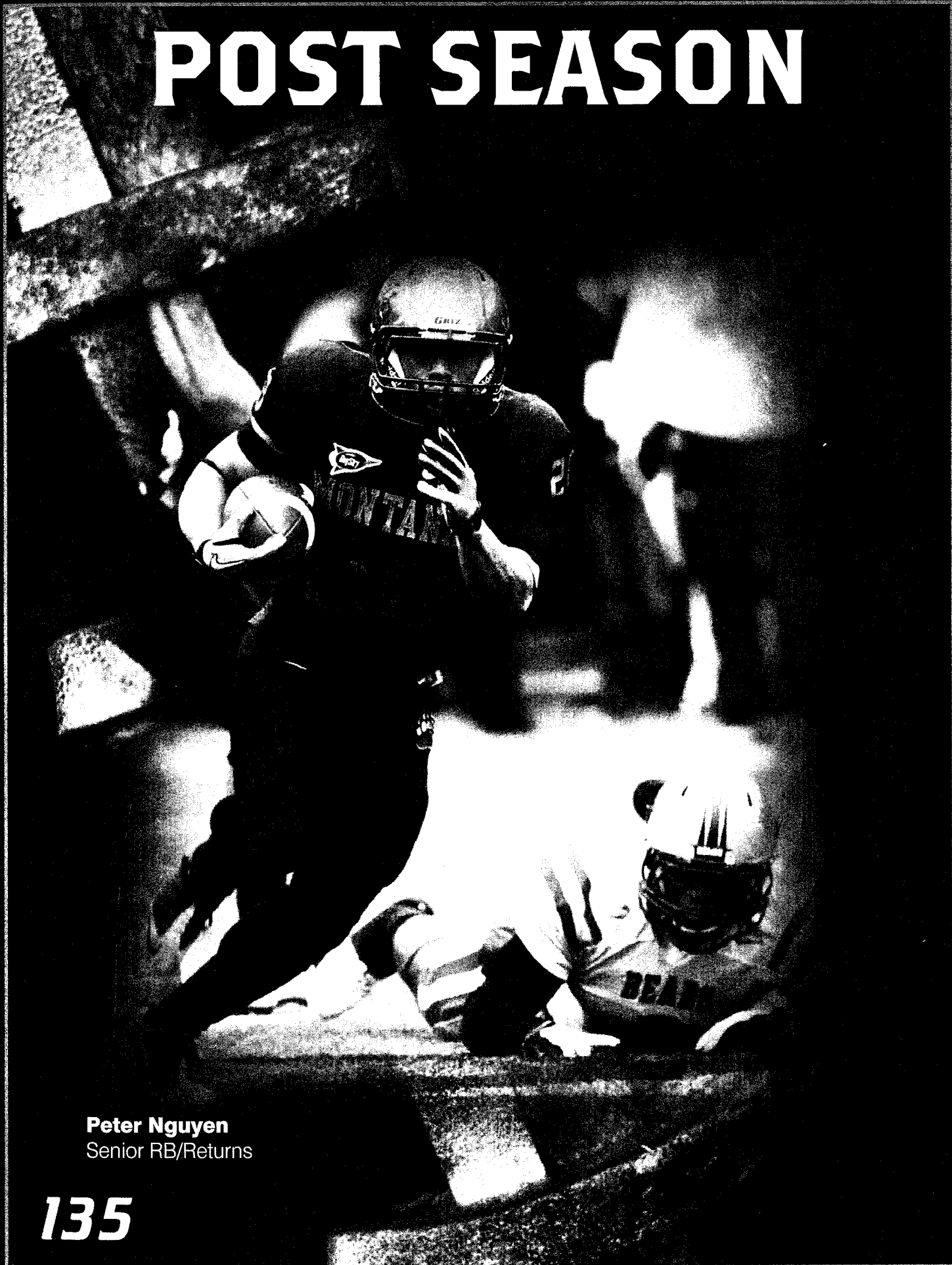
Pflugrad also coached at Montana from 1986-94, working quarterbacks, wide receivers and running backs during his first stint at UM.

Robin Pflugrad finished his second season at Montana with an 11-3 record and was named the 2011 Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year. He was also one of 20 finalists for the Eddie Robinson Award, given to the FCS's top mentor. He is 12-4 (.750) in Big Sky games.

His 18 career wins tie him for the eighth most in school history (Frank Milburn, 18-22, 1926-30).

MONTANA GRIZZLIES YEAR-BY-YEAR IN POST-SEASON PLAY



2011: 18th FCS Playoff Berth In Last 19 Years!

The Grizzlies return to the playoffs after a one year hiatus was a memorable one, as they advanced to the Football Championship Subdivision semifinals, losing 31-28 to host, top-ranked, and undefeated (14-0) Sam Houston State Bearkats. Montana has now advanced to the playoffs 18 of the past 19 seasons.

Montana has won (or shared) 13 of the past 14 Big Sky Conference championships.

It was a tale of two halves. The Bearkats scored on their first three possessions of the game and jumped to a 21-0 first quarter lead, but the Griz scored twice in the second quarter and trailed 28-14 at halftime. Senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy picked off a SHSU pass with one minute left until intermission and returned it 60 yards for a touchdown to cut the Kats' lead to 28-14 at intermission, which helped the Griz regain some needed momentum.

The Griz defense was stellar in the second half, holding SHSU to two first downs prior to its final, game-clinching drive. Bearkat sophomore halfback Tim Flanders rushed for 287 yards on just 26 carries, and led a ground attack that rushed 51 times for 383 yards.

Montana out-scored the Kats 14-3 in the second half and advanced the ball to the SHSU 49-yard line on its final drive, but was forced to punt, and Flanders rushed eight times for 63 yards, including a 22-yarder on a fourth down, to ice the victory for the Bearkats. The Grizzlies outscored the Kats 28-10 after the first quarter including a 7-3 third quarter – the first time all year that Sam Houston has been outscored in the third stanza.

McSurdy led a defense that featured nine senior starters, and was chosen the Big Sky MVP on defense, and he finished 10th in career tackles with 293. Senior cornerback Trumaine Johnson set a school record with 35 pass deflections.

Record-setting kicker/punter Brody McKnight, also a senior, made a record 210 PATs, and he finished third in both career field goals made (59) and scoring (387 points). Senior wide receiver/returner Jabin Sambrano ended his career, and is believed to be the second player in school history (the other player being "Will Bill" Kelly in 1926) to score touchdowns rushing, receiving, and via punt and kickoff returns in one season.

Second-year head coach Robin Pflugrad was named the Big Sky's "Coach of the Year," as the Griz went 11-3 overall and placed first in the league with a 7-1 mark.

2010: Playoff Run Halted/Reynolds Ends His Brilliant Career

It had to end some time, and unfortunately that time was in 2010, as 7-4 Montana failed to make the playoffs for the first time in 18 seasons. Senior halfback Chase Reynolds finished record-breaking career by setting school records for total touchdowns (59) and rushing touchdowns (52), and was just four yards short of the mark for career rushing yards with 4,067 – garnering all of those standards in just three seasons.

The Griz suffered a huge loss when senior quarterback Andrew Selle suffered a career-ending injury in the fourth game of the season against Sacramento State.

2009: Another Trip To The FCS Title Game

Montana played in the FCS championship game for the second year in a row and seventh time in the last 15 seasons. But, second-ranked Villanova rushed 51 times for 351 yards in a 23-21 Griz loss. The setback was the top-ranked Grizzlies' only loss (14-1) of the season.

Montana's route to the title game was not easy. Trailing 11th-ranked South Dakota State by 27 points (48-21) with 5:40 left in the third quarter, the Griz out-scored the Jackrabbits 40-0 on the way to a 61-48 victory. Marc Mariani and Chase Reynolds, and an outstanding defense, turned the tide for the Griz in the comeback. Mariani started things off with a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, and he also scored twice on passes from Selle, and Reynolds rushed for two scores in the final quarter. The Griz defense held SDSU to 128 total yards and seven first downs in the final half. A week later UM forced 10 turnovers and crushed 12th-ranked, visiting Stephen F. Austin 51-0 in a quarterfinal contest.

Montana's semifinal showdown against fifth-ranked Appalachian State and dynamic QB Armani Edwards was played in front of a national audience on ESPN, and came down to the last play. With the game knotted 17-all, Selle floated a 25-yard pass to Sambrano in the left corner of the end zone with 1:31 left. Edwards then led his team to Montana's 3-yard line, but a last-second pass was broken up by Johnson and the Grizzlies earned their seventh trip to the title game.

Mariani, who was named to the Pro Bowl as a rookie with the Tennessee Titans in 2010, broke numerous receiving and return records in his career. Reynolds tied his own single-season record by rushing for 22 touchdowns. Selle passed for 28 TDs. On defense, linebacker Shawn Lebsock and safety Shann Schillinger ended their careers as two of the leading tacklers in school history. Schillinger was a sixth round NFL draft pick by the Falcons, while Mariani was tabbed in the seventh by the Titans.

Head coach Bobby Hauck, who left UM for UNLV following the 2009 season, advanced to the FCS playoffs allo seven of his seasons as the head man and won or shared seven league championships.

2008: Montana Plays For Its Sixth National Title

Despite losing 14 starters, Montana made it to the FCS championship game for the sixth time, losing 24-7 to Richmond in Chattanooga.

In the first round Montana handled Texas State 31-13. In the quarterfinals the Grizzlies avenged an early-season league loss (45-28) at Weber State, defeating the 10th-ranked Wildcats 24-13. In the FCS semi-final game Montana had its biggest playoff road win ever, beating top-ranked James Madison 35-27.

For the season, senior quarterback Cole Bergquist passed for 3,156 yards and 28 touchdowns, and wide-out Mike Ferriter finished his career ranked ninth in school history with 2,089 receiving yards. Reynolds rushed for a school-record 22 touchdowns. The defense was led by strong safety Colt Anderson, a Buck Buchanan Award finalist, who was Montana's leading tackler with 129 stops. Anderson, who now plays for the Eagles was named their special teams MVP in 2011.

2007: 15th FCS Playoff Appearance In a Row

This was the Grizzlies' 18th overall playoff appearance and their 15th in a row. That 18th FCS playoff berth moved Montana past Eastern Kentucky for the most (17) in division history. Montana suffered a rare home loss in the playoffs, though, a 23-22 setback to Wofford.

Senior defensive end Kroy Biermann became Montana's first ever Buck Buchanan Award winner. Senior halfback Lex Hilliard set a

record with 50 rushing touchdowns, which Reynolds broke three seasons later. Kicker Dan Carpenter set FCS career records with 75 field goals and 413 points by a kicker. Senior linebackers Tyler Joyce and Kyle Ryan finished second and sixth in UM history with 352 and 304 career tackles, respectively. Biermann is with the Atlanta Falcons, while Carpenter plays for the Miami Dolphins, and Hilliard was recently signed by the Vikings.

2006: A Trip To The Semis

In 2006 the Grizzlies narrowly missed playing for their sixth national title in 12 years. After losing at 16th-ranked Iowa in its opener, Montana won 11 straight games, finishing 12-2 overall and 8-0 in the Big Sky.

Hilliard, a 2006 Walter Payton Award candidate, was lost for the season due to an injury in fall camp. Senior quarterback Josh Swogger threw 17 TD passes, while senior receivers Eric Allen, Ryan Bagley, and Craig Chambers combined for 147 catches and 17 scores. Halfbacks Reggie Bradshaw, Brady Green, and Thomas Brooks-Fletcher combined for 19 rushing touchdowns. A young defense was ranked ninth in the FCS in total defense, allowing 226.4 yards a game.

Host Montana defeated 22nd-ranked McNeese State 31-6 in an FCS first-round game, then knocked off visiting No.10 Southern Illinois 20-3 in the quarterfinals, but were edged (19-17) out to third-ranked and visiting UMass in the semi-finals in a game televised nationally on ESPN2. Hauck became the first Griz mentor in history to win four Big Sky titles.

2005: Griz Lose in First Round

Montana was 8-4 overall and received an at-large bid into the playoffs. UM was led by Hilliard who rushed for 1,322 yards – the second highest total (at the time) in single-season history. The defense was ranked sixth in the country with a turnover margin at +1.08. The ninth-ranked Griz hosted a first-round playoff game, losing 35-21 to 10th-ranked Cal Poly. Montana had defeated Cal Poly 36-27 in Missoula earlier in the season.

2004: Fifth Trip to the FCS Title Game in the Last 10 Seasons

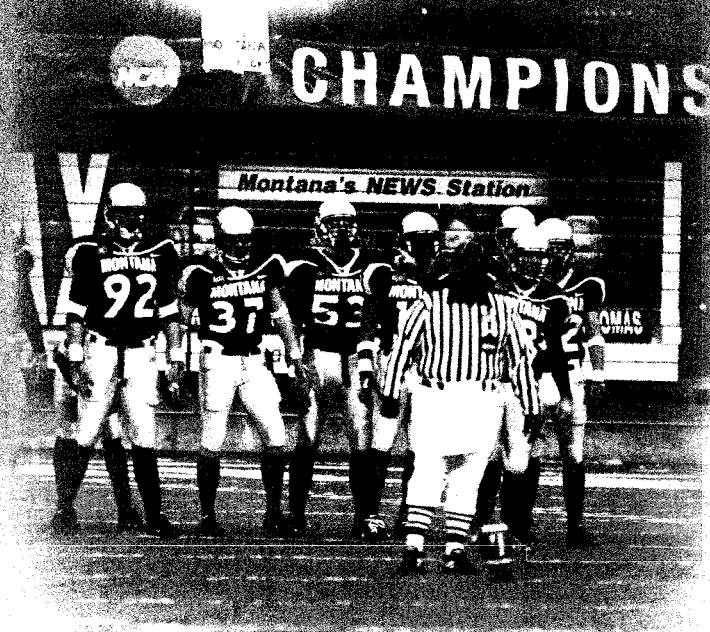
Montana was 12-3 and advanced to the FCS championship game for the fifth time in the last 11 years.

Senior quarterback Craig Ochs passed for 3,807 yards and 33 touchdowns and set a league record by completing 68.7% of his passes. The Griz defense was ranked third in the country in turnover margin (+1.47) with 38 take-aways. Hilliard tied the school record

for touchdown runs with 17, while senior wide receiver Jefferson Heidelberg had the second most receiving yards in single-season history with 1,240.

In the playoffs the host Griz handled their first three opponents at home relatively easy, beating Northwestern State (56-7), New Hampshire (47-17), and Sam Houston State (34-13).

The title game was a 31-21 loss to James Madison in Chattanooga. Sadly, the championship game was played on a field that was a quagmire. The grass playing surface had reportedly recently been re-sodded, and big chunks of grass and dirt were tossed all over the field by the player's cleats whenever they ran or cut on the grass playing surface.

2003: Break Playoff Record With 11th in a row

Montana broke the FCS record by making its 11th consecutive playoff appearance, eclipsing the mark of 10 that it shared with Eastern Kentucky, which played in 10 straight from 1986-1995. UM received an at-large bid into the playoffs, losing a 43-40 double overtime thriller to visiting Western Illinois in the first round.

Senior kicker Chris Snyder set four NCAA career FCS records, scoring 394 points and converting 182 PATs, and a single-season mark scoring 123 points. He also set a record by making 126 consecutive PATs. Senior defensive end Tim Bush finished his career as Montana's all-time career leader in sacks (32.5) and tackles for loss (50).

2002: Tie FCS Mark for Consecutive Wins

The Griz started the season with 10 wins in a row, and, combined with 14 straight wins the year before, they tied the FCS mark for consecutive wins with 24. The streak began on September 22 of 2001, with a 30-0 home win over Western Washington, and was halted on Nov. 16 of 2002, with a 30-21 setback at Eastern Washington in a game played in Spokane.

Montana tied Pennsylvania, which had 24 wins in a row from 1992-95, for the longest winning skein in the division. The Griz also set the record for most consecutive Big Sky wins (25) and most league victories on the road with 13 in a row.

Senior quarterback John Edwards was named the Big Sky's co-MVP on offense and senior safety Trey Young was the league's defensive player of the year.

Montana defeated Northwestern State 45-14 at home in a first-round playoff game, but lost 24-20 at McNeese State in a quarterfinal contest on the road.

2001: Second National Championship

Montana won its second national championship, defeating Furman 13-6. Edwards engineered a 16-play, 99-yard scoring drive for UM's only touchdown in the game. Halfback Yohance Humphery, Montana's all-time career rushing leader, gained 142 yards on 30 carries, and scored UM's only touchdown on a 2-yard run.

The Griz defense limited the Paladins to 121 yards rushing and forced three turnovers. Furman's only score came on a Hail Mary pass as time expired. Humphery wrapped up his illustrious career with 4,070 career yards.

The Grizzlies' 15 victories set a school record (which still stands) for the most wins in a season.

Griz in Playoffs add 2-2-2

2000: Third Trip to the Title Game

The Griz earned a trip to the championship game for the third time in six seasons, losing a heart-breaker, 27-25 to Georgia Southern in Chattanooga.

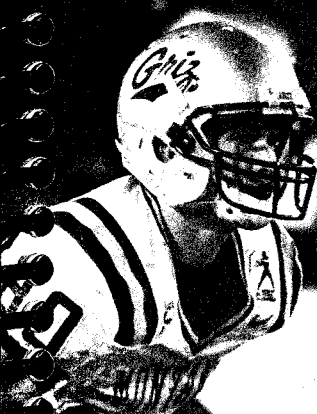
Starting Griz quarterback Drew Miller was injured late in the first quarter, and Edwards, a sophomore, was called into action. The Griz trailed 20-3 at halftime in a rain-soaked Finley Stadium but took a 23-20 lead early in the fourth quarter on a scoring run by Humphery. The lead was short-lived though, as Eagle halfback and 2000 Walter Payton Award winner Adrian Peterson broke loose for a 57-yard touchdown run for the game-winning touchdown.

1999-97: Third Straight First-Round Games

The Griz dropped three first-round playoff games during this time, but in 1999 set the Big Sky record with their seventh straight FCS playoff appearance. (The old standard of six was set by former Big Sky member Idaho from 1985-90).

In 1999, visiting Youngstown State, coached by Jim Tressel, kicked a late field goal for a 30-27 win. In 1998 Montana suffered its worst playoff setback ever, losing 52-9 at Western Illinois. Montana's three-game playoff losing streak in the first round began in 1997 with a 19-14 setback at McNeese State.

1996: Moss Too Much In Quest For Second Title In A Row

Montana reeled off 14 straight wins to advance to the title game. For the second year in a row they played at Marshall. Former NFL star Randy Moss grabbed four touchdown catches to lead Marshall to a 49-29 win. It was the first time ever two undefeated (14-0) teams played for the crown. In the title game Griz sophomore quarterback Brian Ah Yat set (then) playoff records for pass completions with 36 and total plays (67). Senior wide receiver Joe Douglass set a playoff record with 13 receptions. Douglass also set Montana single-season standards with 82 catches for 18 touchdowns (both still school records), along with 1,469 receiving, in just 11 regular-season games.

1995: First National Championship

The Grizzlies won their first national championship with a last-second, 22-20 come-from-behind victory over host Marshall in front of an FCS playoff-record crowd of 32,106 (this is still the record) in Huntington, West Virginia.

Walter Payton Award-winning quarterback Dave Dickenson passed for 1,219 yards and 11 touchdowns in Montana's first three playoff games, when UM out-scored its opponents 163-14. In their first three playoff victories, the host Grizzlies beat Eastern Kentucky (48-0), Georgia Southern (45-0), and Stephen F. Austin (70-14).

In the title game, Dickenson orchestrated a 12-play, 72-yard scoring drive, culminating with a 25-yard field goal by Andy Larson with 39 seconds left for the game-winner. The key play in that winning drive came on a fourth-and-three from the 50-yard line, when Dickenson hit wide receiver Mike Erhardt on a short slant pass for a 20-yard gain and a crucial first down. Senior wide receiver Matt Wells scored both of Montana's touchdowns. Montana set playoff records for first downs (125), pass completions (137), pass attempts (197), and passing yards (1,703).

1993-1994: A Program On the Rise

The host Griz squeaked by Northern Iowa 23-20 in a 1994 first-round contest, and then edged visiting McNeese State 30-28 in a snow storm on a game-ending field goal by Larson. Unfortunately, Dickenson was re-injured early in the win over McNeese, and he was not able to play in the semifinal - a 28-9 loss to host Youngstown State, coached by Tressel.

In 1993, Montana rolled to a 10-1 regular-season record, with its only blemish a 35-30 loss at Oregon. After that loss to the Ducks, the Griz reeled off nine straight wins and won their first league title since 1982. The season ended in a 49-48 first-round shoot-out loss to visiting Delaware. The Grizzlies' 93 victories in the 1990's were the second most in the division (Youngstown State won 103).

1989: Griz Host Playoff Games For First Time

Montana hosted and won its first playoff game in school history, beating Jackson State 48-7 in the first round. The Grizzlies defeated visiting Eastern Illinois 25-15 in the quarterfinals, and then lost 45-15 to eventual national champion Georgia Southern in Statesboro in the semis.

1988 & 1982: In the Playoffs

After a six-year hiatus, in 1988, the Griz earned their first at-large bid into the playoffs, losing (38-19) at Idaho. Montana's initial trip to the playoffs came in 1982 when it won its first Big Sky title since 1970. Despite winning the league championship the Grizzlies had to travel to Moscow, Idaho, losing 21-7 to the Vandals.

1969-1970: Montana Plays For A Pair of College Division Titles

Montana played for the College Division national championship in 1969 and 1970. The Griz went undefeated and untied for the first time in school history at 10-0 and won their first-ever Big Sky title in 1969. Both years Montana advanced to the Camellia Bowl in Sacramento, Calif., but, missing many starters because of NCAA's rules on junior college transfers, the under-manned Griz lost 30-3 to top-ranked North Dakota State in 1969 and 31-16 to the same team a year later.

Montana is a charter (1963) member of the Big Sky Conference, headquartered in Ogden, Utah. There are now 11 schools in the Big Sky Conference plus two football only schools, Cal Poly and UC Davis. The 11 schools are: Eastern Washington, Idaho State, Montana, Montana State, Northern Arizona, Portland State, Sacramento State, Weber State, Northern Colorado and new for the 2011-12 season, North Dakota and Southern Utah.

As part of UM Campus Recreation, the Grizzly swimming pool has seven lanes, a weight room and sauna.



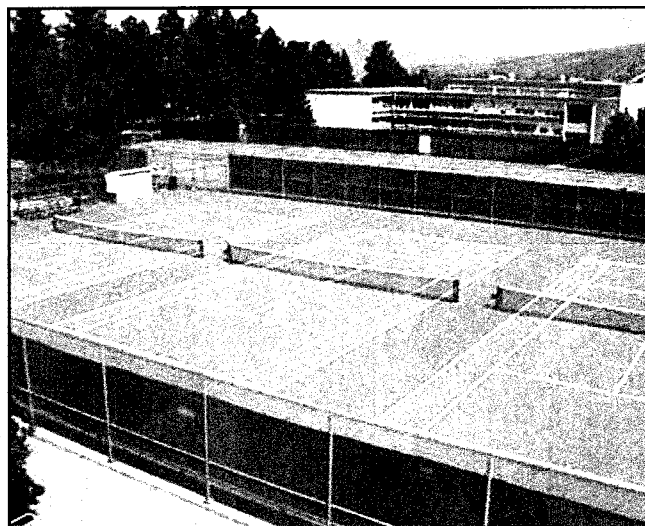

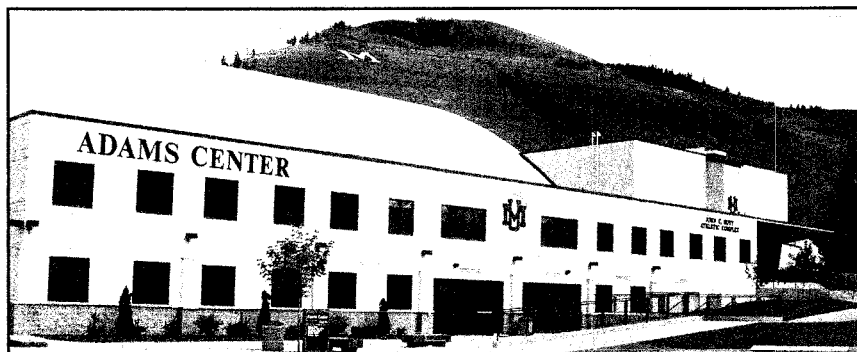

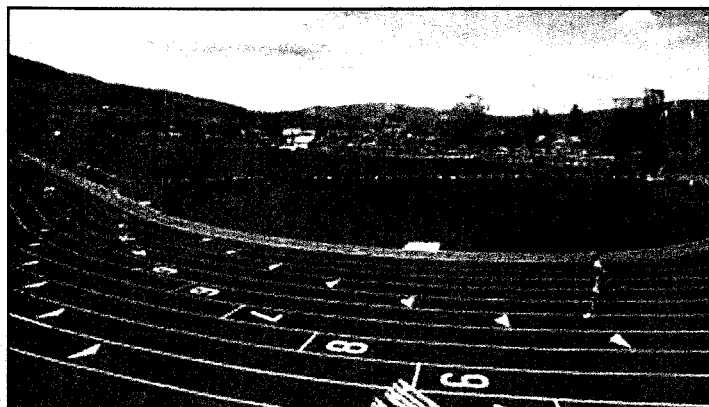

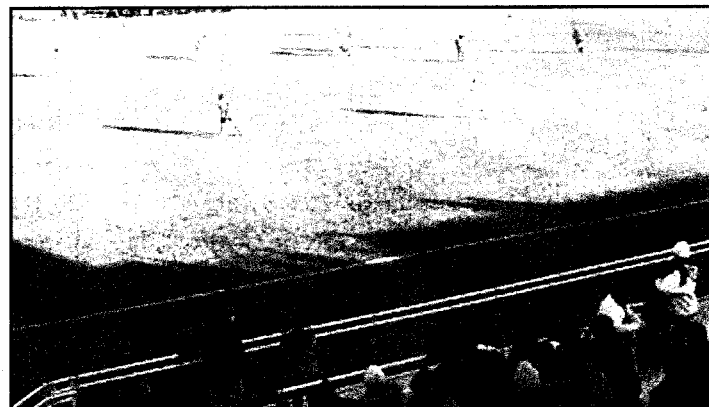
