Course Description

ANTY 352 introduces students to the prehistory of Montana and the Northwestern Plains and Rocky Mountains. The class begins with an overview of regional environments and history of archaeological research, as well as a review of Native American hunter-gatherers in Montana and vicinity. In the first section of the course, we will read *Imagining Head-Smashed-In*, Jack Brink's excellent study of buffalo hunting in the Northern Plains. This book is available as a free digital download on our class' Moodle site. The class then delves into the prehistory of the State of Montana and vicinity, including in-depth reviews of important archaeological sites dating to the Paleoindian, Plains Archaic (including Early, Middle, and Late sub-periods), Late Prehistoric, and Plains/Plateau Village periods. During this section of the course, we will read *Montana Before History* (purchase at bookstore, \$20 or download the Amazon kindle version for \$9.99). We will also occasionally read a few important articles that I will put on Moodle. In the last few weeks, students will learn about rock art of Montana, as outlined in Keyser and Klassen's *Plains Indian Rock Art* book (purchase at bookstore, \$25). After the course, students will have a well-grounded knowledge in the prehistory of Montana and vicinity. Videos will be shown on moodle in lieu of class lecture on occasional Fridays (review the syllabus for those dates).

Course Requirements

Students will take 2 moodle exams (a midterm of <u>100 points</u> and final exam of <u>100 points</u>). There are five online Moodle quizzes worth 40 points each (<u>200 total</u>). These quizzes must be taken on Moodle by the deadline, after which they are permanently closed. In sum, there are <u>400</u> points available in the class, with grading based on a standard percentage of 100 (e.g., 360 points is 90% and is an A-).
