The extra credit will be worth 30 possible points per book. The assignment is due the last lecture day of class. No late assignments will be accepted after that day.

Graduate Students: Graduate students are required to select one book from the above Recommended Reading list and write a critical book review of three to five pages. Graduate students also must write a problem-oriented or theoretical paper on any topic about museum studies from an anthropological context. The paper must be a minimum of 20 pages excluding bibliography. It also must be written in the <u>American Anthropologist</u> format. The goal is to write a paper that is potentially publishable or worthy of presentation at a professional conference. **Due: Last day of lecture.**
