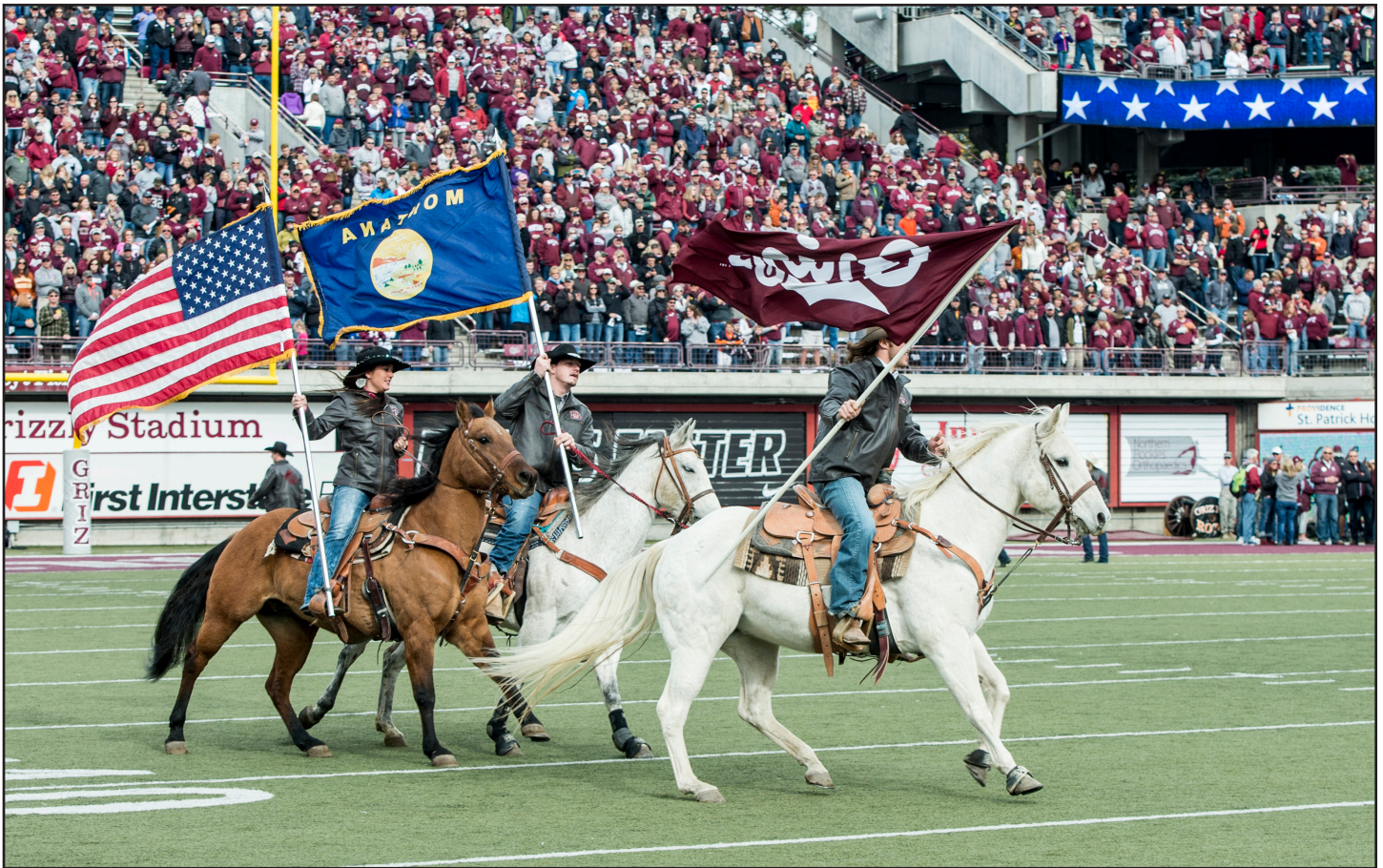

**GRIZ FOOTBALL 2016:
OFFENSE PREVIEW**

Flashback to a year ago when the Montana Grizzlies' 2015 spring season was underway with first year head coach Bob Stitt at the helm and more questions than answers regarding the new-look Griz.

Those questions were answered over the course of a solid 2015 campaign that saw Montana (8-5, 6-2 BSC) make its 23rd foray into the DI-A/FCS playoffs using Stitt's high-octane offense, quarterback Brady Gustafson's NFL caliber arm, some of the top receivers in the FCS, and a stifling defense that boasted the best pass rusher in the nation.

Fast-forward to 2016, a new season that brings a new set of questions, namely how to replace 23 lettermen lost from last season. But to find an answer to those questions, Coach Stitt has a powerful tool: a comfort and continuity with this year's crop of student-athletes that only comes with shared experience on and off the field.

"This is a fun team. 2016 is a really driven disciplined football team," says Stitt. "They're fun to go out and coach every single day. Our strength coach is having a blast with them. Everybody's doing the right thing. Everybody is

doing what's asked of them. We're getting a lot accomplished in the film room and in the weight room and on the field. It's a completely different feeling."

Only ten starters from the 2015 Griz return, seven on offense and three on defense, but UM returns a robust 28 lettermen, including five all-conference selections.

Bolstering a strong, if inexperienced, returning group is one of the largest recruiting classes in Montana history. Coach Stitt and his staff have brought in 38 new Grizzlies in the class of 2016, including 13 transfers and 25 incoming freshman. The Griz have also added one new player from the spring walk-on class making it 39 new names this year.

- QUARTERBACK -

The quarterback plays a central role in Coach Stitt's offense, and Montana's 2016 crop of signal callers look as deep and capable as ever, with Gustafson returning to lead the group after throwing for 1,194 yards in just seven games last year.

Adding depth are two former FBS quarterbacks, in returning Idaho transfer Chad Chulich (who threw for 908 yards in four games last year in Gustafson's absence), and Reese Phillips, an

SEC transfer from the Kentucky Wildcats.

Even more depth at quarterback comes from Connor Kaegi, the 6-7 JC transfer from Feather River College in California.

While competition has increased, Stitt has indicated that the starting quarterback position will remain with Gustafson, allowing the senior from Billings to develop as one of the Big Sky's top returning passers.

"It's huge in our offensive scheme to have somebody that understands what we're doing and you can continue to progress as you get more reps and you can bank more knowledge," said Stitt.

You can't have a successful quarterback without a successful offensive line to provide pass protection.

Coach Chad Germer's offensive line returns four starters from 2015 including all-Big Sky honorable mention Devon Dietrich at right guard. Also making his return to the O-line is senior Ben Weyer who sat out the 2015 season with an injury after playing in every game of the 2014 season. As a group, the 2016 offensive line brings 92 career starts worth of experience back to the field.

"Another key to the deal would be the O-line returning so many guys. That was a huge question mark last year, it was rough for a while, and now we've got all these guys back and they're bigger and they're stronger. So I'm excited about that group," added Stitt.

While Gustafson and the Grizzly quarterbacks bring plenty of experience back for 2016, one of Stitt's keys to executing Montana's pass-heavy offense is a consistent and deep receiving corps.

- WIDE RECEIVERS -

The 2016 Griz bring a virtually all-new, but highly skilled, crop of wide receivers after the departure of some of the best ball catchers in UM history in NFL prospects like Jamaal Jones, Ellis Henderson and Ben Roberts.

Stitt has brought in three transfers, six incoming freshman, and welcomes back 11 returners from 2015, and already the group has impressed.

"Every time I talk about the receivers I forget one of them because we've got so many exciting young guys, and we add a couple transfers with these guys, and it's really going to be a nice group," said Stitt.

In Montana's opening scrimmage of spring, Blinn College (Texas) transfer James Homan caught a 50-plus yard touchdown pass on his first touch as a Grizzly, and redshirt freshman Kobey Eaton hauled in a 73-yard TD pass, and nearly had another, as the Federal Way, Wash., product led all receivers with 133 yards.

While big plays are the daggers of Stitt's offense, the goal remains to rack up 90 or more plays per game, and the receivers will play a key role in that.

"In this type of offense, you've got to execute perfectly because we're looking for 10, 12, 14-play

drives. As soon as the ball is dropped, then you're second and 10 or third and long, and it makes it difficult and hard to go for it on fourth down," added Stitt.

Montana's leading returning wide receiver is Josh Horner, a 6-5 product out of C.M. Russell High in Great Falls, who played in every game in 2015, starting in three at the "H" position. Horner was the Grizzlies' fourth-leading receiver that season, catching 22 passes for 294 yards and a touchdown.

Also returning in the wide receiver corps is sophomore Keenan Curran, who worked his way into a starting position in one game as a true freshman, and saw action in each of UM's final nine games, catching four passes for 55 yards.

Redshirt sophomore Caleb Lyons also returns to the Grizzlies' only other returning wide receiver, having caught four balls for 16 yards last year, and figures to work into the "Z" slot position.

A solid all around athlete, former quarterback Makena Simis has made the transition to wide receiver this season, and will look to be on the receiving end of touchdown passes this season. As a backup for Gustafson last season, Simis tied a school record with six touchdown

passes in a single game against NAU, passing for 740 yards and completing 63 of 115 attempts.

– RUNNING BACKS –

As opposed to the wide receivers, Montana returns all of 2015's running backs, led by senior John Nguyen who rushed 184 times for 855 yards and three touchdowns.

"We've got to continue to move forward with the run game," said Stitt. When we run the ball, we've got to get three yards per carry, and when we throw the ball, it needs to be caught. When you don't get three yards, or you drop a pass, then it's hard to keep the drive going, so it's all about execution."

Sophomore Jeremy Calhoun returns in the backfield as well after being thrust into action as a true freshman due to injury. He didn't waste any time acclimatizing to college football though, bashing his way to 291 yards and nine touchdowns in only nine games.

Calhoun returns visibly bigger and stronger this year, and will once again be a red zone threat for the Griz.

"It's everybody, not just Jeremy," said Stitt of his team's off-season gains. "A lot of the re-

ceivers that came in look great and you can tell they have a lot more confidence now that they've physically improved so much."

Senior Joey Counts returns as well, looking to build on his shortened season of six games last year, highlighted by the game-winning touchdown in the final seconds against North Dakota State.

**GRIZ FOOTBALL 2016:
A RELOADED DEFENSE**

In 2015 defensive end Tyrone Holmes completed his tenure as a Montana Grizzly with the crown jewel of FCS player awards, the STATS Defensive Player of the Year. With a national-best 18 sacks it's easy to see why the all-American earned the title of best defender in all of FCS football and now seems to be destined for the NFL, but that was 2015, and this is 2016.

While replacing 180-sack performers isn't easy, this year's Grizzly "D" is reloading with a young but physical unit that works smarter, not harder, under new defensive coordinator Jason Semore, spreading the pressure around the field.

"With our scheme last year, you just had to be good," says Montana head coach Bob Stitt. "Now, we can bring it from all these places, and the offense doesn't know where it's coming from. It's just more difficult from an offensive protection standpoint, and identifying the personnel up front."

Luckily for the Griz, Montana's defense returns the brains (and brawn) of three key starters in defensive tackle-turned-defensive end Caleb Kidder, safety Yamen Sanders and cornerback JR Nelson. The trio made a combined 36 out of 39 starts last season, and will each feature prominently in 2016.

The Griz bolstered the defense in their massive 39-player recruiting class, signing FBS transfer linebacker James Banks from Alabama-Birmingham. The D-line also added heft to the interior with Brandt Davidson, a 295-pound tackle from Scottsdale CC, and Myles Mckee-Oshibodu, a 270-pound tackle from Santa Ana College. Also transferring to Montana is Justin Strong, a safety out of Oregon State who will join the team in time for summer workouts.

The 2016 recruiting class also consisted of 11 new defensive specialists that will make their way to Montana for fall camp as true freshmen.

– DEFENSIVE LINE –

Kidder, who dons Montana's traditional No. 37 legacy jersey, will lead the D-line as the heir-apparent to Holmes at defensive end. The 6-5, 259-pounder from Helena is the Grizzlies' leading returning tackler from last season with 82 total takedowns.

Bookending the D-line is 6-3, 255-pound defensive end Ryan Johnson who picked up two starts and 33 tackles last year, and Tucker Schye, who looked solid in the team's first scrimmage of spring with three sacks. Also looking to make

a name for himself at Montana will be 6-4, 240 pound redshirt sophomore transfer from Rutgers, Donald Bedell, who picked up a tackle against Eastern Washington last year.

With size and speed on the outside, and the bulk of returners Zach Peevey and Nate Bradley paired with Davidson and Mckee-Osibodu on the inside, the D-line will be as formidable as ever.

“Up front is the most impressive. We’ve added a few transfers there, but the returning guys have really, really looked good,” adds Stitt.

– LINEBACKERS –

Also showing flashes of brilliance in the team’s first scrimmage of spring were the Griz linebacker corps, who lost all four starters to graduation, but boast a young group that isn’t lacking in physicality.

“We’re really young at the linebacker position this year, but we’ve got a lot of talent,” says Stitt.

Joining Banks as the only other junior of the group is Connor Strahm, who was selected as last year’s Golden Helmet Award winner for the team’s hardest hitter, as well as the Special Teams Player of the Year.

Strahm put in 23 tackles last season (the sixth most of any returner), including five tackles for loss and a pair of half sacks.

Josh Buss will also make an impact in the linebackers. Buss, a 6-2, 203-pounder from Boise put in 18 tackles last season, and turned heads with his physical style. Of the younger linebackers, redshirt freshman Dante Olson made his presence known in the first scrimmage

of spring this year, leading all tacklers with nine takedowns, five of which were solo tackles. Olson was also recognized as last year’s Defensive Scout Team Player of the Year.

– DEFENSIVE SECONDARY –

With Strong joining Montana from Oregon State, the Grizzly secondary now boasts three Pac-12-caliber athletes roaming the backfield in safety Yamen Sanders, who transferred last season from Arizona, and cornerback Markell Sanders who came to UM from Washington State.

Sanders and JR Nelson are UM’s second-and-third leading returning tacklers, respectively, with Sanders putting in 64 tackles and Nelson 49, providing ample experience in the backfield.

“Secondary wise, we’re playing very well,” says Stitt. “They’re covering long enough to allow our D-line to get to the

quarterback, which is huge.”

Safety Jerrin Williams also turned heads during Montana’s opening scrimmage of spring, intercepting a Reese Phillips pass and returning it 60 yards for a touchdown.

– SPECIAL TEAMS –

After graduating both record setter Daniel Sullivan and Chris Lider, the Griz are on the search for the next great kicker and punter. The staring positions are still wide open during spring ball, with eight players all vying for a spot.

Redshirt freshmen Tim Semenza and Brandon Purdy continued to battle it out through fall camp to see who coach still will place on top of the rotation, with both hitting from distance.

Missoula Lyola product Eric Williams will handle the puntin after returning to his hometown from Carleton College in Minnesota.

“We’re going to continue to give guys a lot of reps,” says Stitt. “That’s a big group, and we’re going to have to cut it down to at least three for the next couple weeks, and then get down to two for fall camp.”

– SCHEDULE –

Perhaps Montana’s most difficult opponent in the 2016 season will be the road itself. UM has a brutal away-game schedule, starting with FCS quarterfinalists Northern Iowa in Cedar Falls on Sept. 10. It doesn’t get any easier from there, as the Griz visit Cal Poly on Sept. 24 in a rematch of Cal Poly’s upset win in Missoula last season.

After a three-game home stand, the Griz then face two teams in always-hostile environments, Northern Arizona and Eastern Washington on October 22 and 29.

“Playing on the road is something that is difficult. The team has to address it, and the team has to get excited to get on the road, get out of town and go play ball together. They’ve got to have an us-against-the-world mentality,” says Stitt.

“What we’ve talked about, and what the players have to continue to address is that we get to play football, and we have to play the exact same way regardless if there is 26,000 or if there is 5,000. It’s been an issue for a while in the last few years where the road record isn’t very good, and the home record is real good. We’ve got to get to where we’re excited to play on the road too.”

Montana went 3-3 on the road last year, and 2-5 on the road in 2014. Since arriving at Montana just over a year ago, Coach Stitt has talked about returning National Championship trophies to Missoula. In the 2016 season, that trophy needs to be earned outside of the friendly confines of Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

Griz Sports Information Policies

• FOOTBALL PRACTICE

The first 15 minutes of practice is designated for media interviews on select days only. All video/still photography is limited to the first 30 minutes of practice unless otherwise arranged through Sports Information (406) 243-5402. Practice is CLOSED to media after 30 minutes. Members of the media must leave Washington-Grizzly Stadium at that time. Post-practice interviews will not be granted.

All practices are CLOSED to the public, except for members of the QUARTERBACK CLUB. However, if media (social, audio, video or otherwise) originates from a Quarterback Club member after the posted 30-minute media time, practice viewing privileges will be revoked.

Regular-season practices are held every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday starting at 3:15 p.m. in Washington-Grizzly Stadium. The first 15-30 minutes of practice on Tuesday and Wednesday is open to the media. Thursday pre-game practice is CLOSED to all.

• INTERVIEW POLICY

Montana Sports Information will hold a weekly press conference during the season, featuring two or three players and the head coach. The media is encouraged to conduct any in-depth player/head coach interviews at this time.

The 2016 season weekly press conference is scheduled for Mondays at 1:00 starting Aug. 29.

All additional player/coach interview requests must be requested through the sports information office.

Media members are forbidden from contacting players or coaches via phone, email, text, or social media without the expressed consent of the sports information office.

Student-athlete phone interviews are granted on a limited basis and must be scheduled through the sports information office. Phone numbers of student-athletes are not issued to the media.

Interview requests must be submitted 24 hours in advance. This allows the sports information office to contact the student-athlete, get his/her approval and then finalize plans with the media representative. Student-athletes hold the right to refuse interview requests outside designated interview times.

The sports information office takes into consideration the student-athlete's class schedule, practice schedule, team policies and the head coach's rules when considering interviews and media availabilities.

It is understood that all student-athlete living, dining, training and dressing areas (including the player tunnel at Washington-Grizzly Stadium) are considered private areas and that no member of the media is to be present in any of these areas unless they are escorted by a member of the sports information staff.

• BIG SKY FOOTBALL COACHES TELECONFERENCE

During the season, the Big Sky holds a weekly football coaches conference call. It is requested all phone interviews for Coach Stitt be directed during this conference call. See www.bigskyconf.com for details.

• PRESS/PHOTO CREDENTIALS AND PARKING PASSES

All media credentials and photography passes, as well as parking passes, must be submitted via the online form at gogriz.com. Credentials for home games will be available in the sports information office in the Adams Center from Thursday at noon until Friday at 4 p.m. Credentials not picked up by that time will be left at the will call window in the Adams Center box office from 9 a.m. until kickoff on game day. Photographers must comply with NCAA GUIDELINES*. Season credentials and parking passes are distributed in late August prior to UM's first home game.

All credential holders are subject to the Big Sky Conference Media and Credential Use Conditions Agreement. Please read and understand this document before applying for credentials.

Due to limited availability, not all parking requests may be granted.

– MEDIA CREDENTIAL REQUEST FORM –

Please fill out one Media Credential Request form for each member wishing to obtain press credentials. This can be located at gogriz.com.

• VISITING MEDIA CREDENTIALS/PARKING PASSES

All visiting media should make credential/parking requests through the visiting SID.

• PARKING

Media parking is available on a limited basis to visiting media in several lots, all of which are located a short walking distance from Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

• PROFESSIONAL SCOUTS

Pro scouts: Please contact Eric Taber to obtain a press box credential. Please note, press box seating is not available for all games due to limited space. Every effort will be made to provide a working surface and seat.



* = NCAA Football Photography Area Policies:

Photographers working on the sidelines are restricted to behind the limit lines all around the playing field.

No photographers are permitted in the team areas, which are back off the limit lines between the 25-yard lines.

No media personnel or their equipment shall be in the team area, and no media personnel may communicate in any way with persons in the team areas.

Photographers may not place tripods on or beside the playing field or attach strobes to the goal posts.

**CORCORAN NAMED NEW
"VOICE OF THE GRIZ"**

Montana native Riley Corcoran has been named the new "Voice of the Griz." As the voice of Montana Athletics, Corcoran will serve as the play-by-play broadcaster for the Griz football and men's basketball teams, and host those sports' seasonal coaches' shows.

"Riley is incredibly talented, and we are certain Griz Nation will embrace his great work and look forward to hearing him week in and week out over the airwaves," said Tom Boman, vice president, broadcast operations for Learfield, UM Athletics' multimedia rights holder.

"We did not take this lightly. We conducted an exhaustive national search to determine the best candidate. We were fortunate not only to find the best talent but someone who has significant ties to Montana."

Grizzly Sports Properties is Learfield's local team in Missoula that works closely with Boman and Montana Director of Athletics Kent Haslam and his administration, and has direct oversight of talent and station affiliates associated with the Montana Grizzly Sports Network.

"We welcome Riley to the Griz family and look forward to listening to him call football in a few short months," said Haslam.

"We've been communicating with Learfield regularly during this search process and know they've been extremely diligent in identifying the best talent for our program. We are certainly excited about what's ahead."

Corcoran grew up in Billings and joins the Griz from Montana State, where he served the last three years as voice of the women's basketball program. He also called a handful of football and men's basketball games.

Additionally, Corcoran was a member of the football broadcast team and part of the pregame and postgame shows. He also helped host the weekly one-hour coaches' shows that covered all Bobcat sports.

Prior to returning to his home state in 2013, Corcoran was director of media relations and broadcasting for the Wilson Tobs, an amateur baseball club in North Carolina. He hosted the team's pregame show and handled play-by-play duties for the team's 61 games.

His additional experience includes serving as a sports reporter for the Billings Gazette and as sports director for 630 The Fan in Boise, where he hosted a daily two-hour radio show that was awarded "Best Sports Program" in 2012 by the Idaho State Broadcasters Association.

That same year he earned "Best Sports Play-by-Play" honors from the ISBA, and in 2015 he was a finalist for "Montana Sportscaster of the Year" by the National Sports Media Association.

"I am truly honored and extremely excited to be the next Voice of the Griz," said Corcoran. "As a Montana native, driving up to Missoula on weekends for games became a tradition, and I saw the dedication and passion for UM Athletics at a young age.

"I can't wait to work with all of the great people in Grizzly Athletics and be the voice to the Griz faithful for many Big Sky championships in the years to come."

Corcoran brings additional play-by-play experience from his alma mater, Washington State, where he primarily called men's and women's basketball, baseball and volleyball games.

He also was involved with local, regional and national television news reporting at that time, including FSN Northwest's (now Root Sports Northwest) weekly "Cougars All-Access" show.

Corcoran's first play-by-play assignment will be Saturday, Sept. 3, when Montana hosts Saint Francis at Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

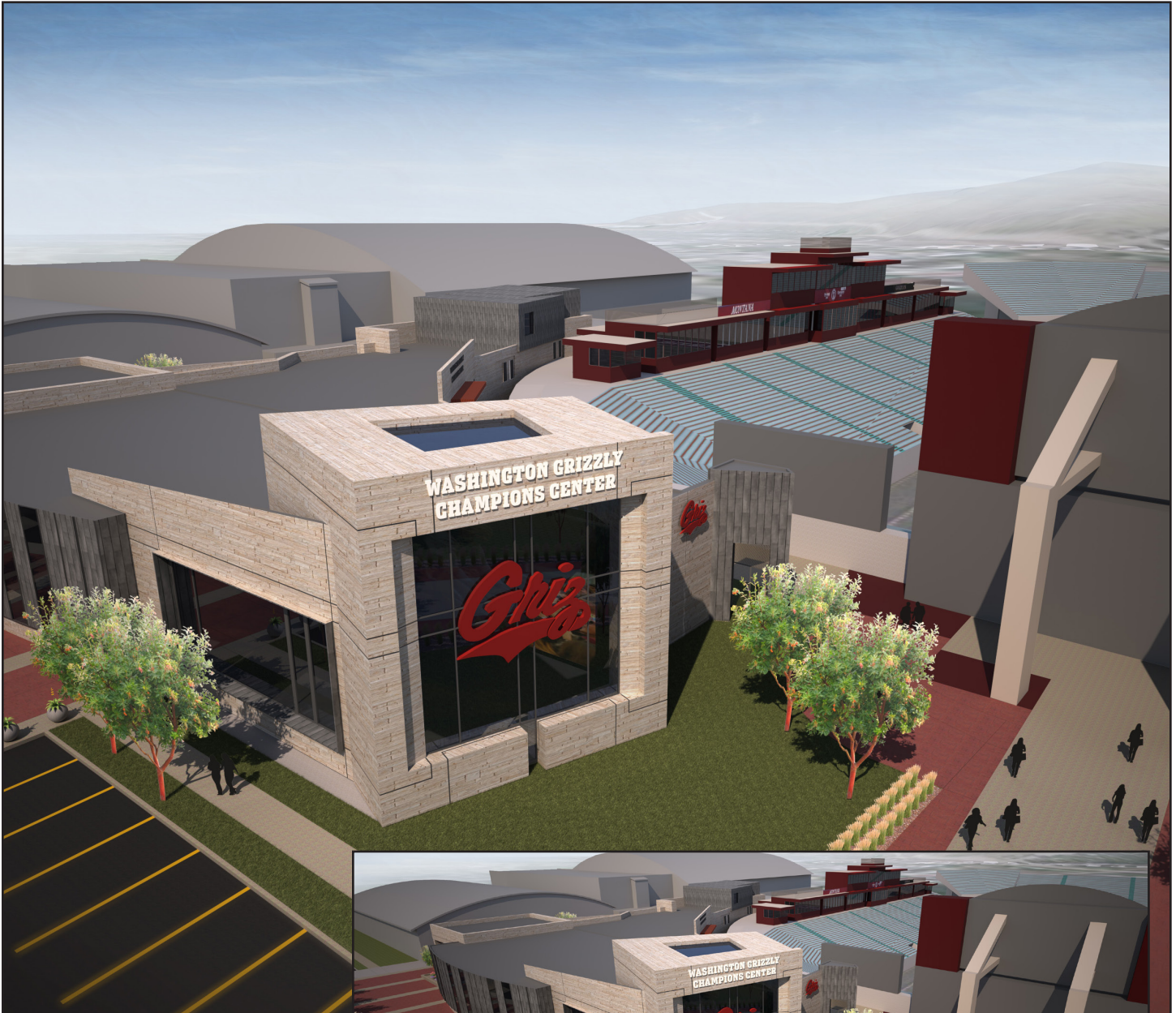

Champions Center Renderings

Work on the Champions Center

has begun! Trench work to relocate the campus main electrical was completed in early April. With the power relocated, construction on the new facility moves into full swing. The project completion is set for late summer/early fall of 2017.

The 46,000-square-foot facility, which will be located hard against the southwest side of Washington-Grizzly Stadium, will provide the department a new football locker room and two-level weight room, which will become the training home of all 15 of Montana's teams. In addition, there will be student-athlete meeting rooms, a football team room and space for additional concession stands and restrooms on the expanded concourse in the southwest corner of the football stadium.

When the Washington-Grizzly Champions Center is complete, the football locker room will expand from 2,400 square feet at its current location to 7,000. What was a space avoided immediately will become a highlight of recruiting visits. The size of the weight room, currently a dysfunctional arrangement encompassing three different areas, will more than double, from 7,500 square feet to more than 17,000. Multiple teams will be able to train at once instead of stacked one at a time on a tight schedule that's booked from sunup to sundown.

None of these exciting new facilities are a reality without the generous support of all the donors to Grizzly Athletics. We would like to take this time to thank those who have given as well as those who are considering a gift. THE HOME OF THE GRIZZLIES

Washington-Grizzly Stadium (capacity 25,217) celebrates its 30th anniversary in 2016, serving as the home of the Montana Grizzlies since 1986.

The Grizzlies set broke the stadium's all-time attendance record in 2015, packing 26,427 fans in to see UM's 38-35 win over North Dakota State on ESPN. Griz fans also packed the house for two more of the top-25 all time attended games in 2015, with 26,137 fans at the homecoming game against NAU, and 26,065 fans in a night game against Cal Poly.

For the second-straight season and the fifth time in the last decade, the Grizzlies also packed in more fans than any other program in FCS football, and in 2015 drew more fans than 44 FBS programs as well.

When compared to FBS schools, Montana drew more average attendance than over 34 percent of the 128 total FBS programs, including seven teams from the regionally comparative Mountain West Conference.

The Grizzlies averaged 24,139 fans per-game over the course of a seven-game home slate last year, for a total of 168,975 fans. That's over 16 percent of Montana's population.

The first game played in WGS was on Oct. 18, 1986, a 38-31 come-from-behind win over Idaho State. Since that first contest the Grizzlies have an overall record of 185-28. Montana's 8-5 mark last season was its 28th winning season over the past 29 years (since the Griz have been playing in Washington-Grizzly Stadium).

Montana has set numerous Big Sky Conference attendance records. The Griz hold the standards for single-season, regular-season home attendance average (26,472 in 2015): and single-season, regular-season total home attendance (174,236, seven games, 2008). UM also holds the league record for the largest crowd at a non-conference road game of 94,661, set at Tennessee in 2011.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME

Not only has Montana won 185 games in its 29 seasons of playing in Washington-Grizzly Stadium, and it has gone undefeated 11 times.

Starting the 1994 season, the Griz reeled off 30 straight home victories. The win streak began with a 41-7 win over Sonoma State on Sept. 3 and ended with a 40-35 loss to EWU on Oct. 18, 1997. Montana's 30 consecutive home wins are the fifth longest streak in FCS history.

RENOVATION AND CONSTRUCTION PLANS

With support from the university administration and private donors, the athletic facility improvement plan includes the following:

A new academic center was the first of these facility upgrades with construction completed in the summer of 2015. This facility provides student-athletes with ample space to study and meet regularly with their academic advisors. The lower level remains an entrance/exit for the Adams Center and Dahlberg Arena, and houses offices for Montana's media rights partner, Grizzly Sports Properties.

The next phase of improvements got underway in the summer of 2016 with ground being

broke on the Washington-Grizzly Champions Center on the south end of the stadium. This building will house a new student-athlete weight room, football locker room, football lounge and football meeting rooms. It will connect to the Adams Center and allow the football team to continue to access the field through the existing player tunnel. The weight room and locker room will sit below grade and make up the first level while the second will include a mezzanine for the weight room, the football lounge and meeting rooms as well, and a wider concourse in the football stadium complete with additional rest rooms and concession stands.

A new generation of Washingtons, Dennis and Phyllis's sons Kyle and Kevin, on behalf of the Dennis and Phyllis Washington Foundation, gifted \$7 million to the University of Montana's Department of Athletics to be used for the \$14 million Washington-Grizzly Champions Center.

It is the largest gift to the Department of Athletics in its history.

The remaining \$7 million will come from private sources.

Over the years the Dennis and Phyllis Washington Foundation has been one of the university's most generous benefactors. The foundation has given more than \$150 million to various causes since it was established in 1988.

Fans will also notice a new Griz vision jumbotron, with ancillary screens to its left and right that were installed during the summer of 2016. The new screen features HD-quality video, and measures 32 feet high by 55 feet wide, approxi-

mately twice the size of the old display. Featuring live video, team branding and statistics, the video screen will transform the game-day experience at Washington-Grizzly Stadium. The original Griz vision was added in 2002. That screen came to UM from New York City and Times Square. The new Griz vision system was paid for entirely by UM's media rights partner, Grizzly Sports Properties and Learfield Sports.

NEW LIGHTS FOR 2012

New lights were installed in WGS in the spring of 2012. When the Big Sky Conference signed a television contract with ROOT Sports, each school in the league was required to install lights in their stadiums. The new lights, installed by Musco Lighting based in Oskaloosa, Iowa, made their debut on Saturday, April 14, 2012, at UM's annual spring game.

The lights are of the highest quality available, and feature "horizontal footcandles" in the 120-125 range, which means the Washington-Grizzly Stadium has the ability to host all levels of NCAA televised football playoff games. It also includes lighting in the tailgate/parking areas. The project cost was approximately \$950,000, and includes a 25-year or 20,000 hours service agreement.

STADIUM EXPANSIONS

Washington-Grizzly Stadium underwent its third expansion, at a cost of approximately \$6.5 million, prior to the 2008 football season. The eastside houses a 500-seat "Stadium Club" with two membership levels: the "Canyon Room," which has 125 seats inside and 125 seats outside, and the "Hellgate Terrace," which has 250 seats.

The expansion in 2008 provided 375 Grizzly Scholarship Association priority seats, as well as 1,150 non-priority seats, and increased the current seating capacity of Washington-Grizzly Stadium to 25,217. A new Sprin turf playing surface was also installed with the expansion in 2008.

The second expansion occurred in the

spring and summer of 2003, and approximately 4,000 seats were added to the north end zone section, boosting the stadium capacity to 23,183, with the cost at around \$3.5 million.

In the spring of 1995 the stadium underwent its first expansion in the north and south end zones. At that time there were 12,500 permanent seats (weather-permitting, which allowed for seating on the grass in the end zones, which made the capacity around 15,000). The cost of that expansion was about \$2.5 million.

A natural-grass stadium gave way to SprinTurf prior to the 2001 season at a cost of about \$1 million, which was paid for by an anonymous donor. The field was named "John Hoyt Field" in 2001 at the request of the anonymous donor, in honor of Hoyt, a long-time Grizzly booster, who passed away in March of that year.

STADIUM HISTORY & NAMESAKE

The plans for an on-campus football facility at Montana came to fruition in August of 1985 when Missoula businessman Dennis R. Washington and the employees of Washington Corporations provided a gift of \$1 million, hence the name of Washington-Grizzly Stadium. The initial cost of the stadium was around \$3.2 million.

Dennis Washington was brought in early in the process to be among the small group of visionaries who would examine what was possible with the new facility and who better than the man who started with a small loan and a bulldozer in the mid-1960s, turned it into Washington Construction and eventually into the global Washington Companies.

There are 49 private boxes located on the east and west sides of the stadium, and they are individually decorated and furnished.

BOB STITT
Head Coach/Offensive Coordinator

Bob Stitt enters his second season at the helm of the Montana Grizzlies football program in 2016, after leading the Griz back to the NCAA FCS Playoffs for the 23rd time in school history during his 2015 inaugural season.

Stitt's Grizzlies went 8-5 in his first season, and finished the season tied for 2nd place in the Big Sky Conference with a 6-2 league

record. Highlights of his first season as a Grizzly include an upset of defending National Champion North Dakota State on ESPN and a late-season run that included a 57-16 rout of Eastern Washington and UM's 72nd defeat of Montana State.

Players earning special accolades under Stitt that season include the STATS FCS Defensive Player of the Year Tyrone Holmes, and Jamaal Jones, who became UM's leading receiver of all time, finishing his career at Montana with 3,021 receiving yards. Stitt coached 18 players who were named to All-Big Sky Conference teams as well.

Coach Stitt was formally introduced as the 36th head football coach in University of Montana history on Friday, Dec. 19, 2014. He signed a three-year contract, which will take him through the 2017 season.

Before coming to Montana, he had a 15-season stint as the head football coach at the Colorado School of Mines (CSM) where he had an overall record of 108-62 (a 63.5% winning percentage) and a 83-44 mark (a 65.4% winning percentage) in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

Stitt's CSM teams had 13 winning seasons in his 15-year tenure and registered eight winning seasons in a row. His teams won conference titles in 2004, 2010, and 2014. He is widely known in national coaching circles as having a very creative offensive mind and is the innovator of the fly-sweep play.

His 2014 Orediggers were 10-2 overall and 8-1 in the RMAC and advanced to the Division II national playoffs. The Orediggers posted an 8-3 record in 2013.

He was named the league's coach of the year in 2004 and 2010. Stitt was selected the Division II Football.com Southwest Region Coach of the Year in 2004 and was also tabbed the AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year following that season.

During his tenure at Mines, Stitt coached a grand total of 129 All-RMAC performers, 31 All-Region selections and 16 All-Americans. His .635 winning percentage during 15 seasons at the helm of the Oredigger football program is the highest in school history for a coach with at least 20 games under his belt.

A 1987 graduate of Doane College (Nebraska), Stitt received various accolades as a running back and a return specialist when he played for the Tigers in the mid-80's, including All-State College Offensive Player of the Year in 1985. Stitt also played left field for the Doane baseball squad and was a sprinter on the track & field team.

Stitt returned to coach at his alma mater after receiving his master's degree in physical education from the University of Northern Colorado in 1989.

He served as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach for four years at Doane from 1990-93, and he produced three NAIA Division II All-Americans and 19 All-NIAC offensive players during his tenure there.

Stitt went on to coach at Austin College (Texas) from 1994 to 1999, serving as the assistant head coach and the coordinator of offense and special teams.

Prior to his time at Mines, Stitt served as an offensive coordinator at Harvard University, helping the Crimson set school records in total offense in a game (640 yards), passing yards in a game (405), first downs in a game (34) and points scored in an Ivy League game (63). Stitt's 1999 offense ranked first among Ivy League teams in rushing, third in scoring and fourth in total offense.

He is a native of Tecumseh, Nebraska. Stitt lettered in football, basketball, track & field and baseball at Tecumseh High School.

Bob and his wife, the former Joan Scherrer, have two sons, Joe and Sam.

JASON SEMORE Defensive Coordinator

Jason Semore enters his first season as the Grizzlies' defensive coordinator in 2016 after serving one year as Montana's special teams coordinator and secondary coach under head coach Bob Stitt.

He joined the Grizzly football staff in December of 2014 after a one-year stint with Stitt at the Colorado School of Mines where he served as the defensive coordinator. Last season the Orediggers went 10-2 overall and tied for the league title with an 8-1 record.

Prior to his position at Mines, he had a two-year stint (2012 and 2013) as a defensive assistant at Oklahoma State University where the Cowboys were ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation in five defensive categories, including 14th in scoring defense. OSU competed in the 2013 Heart of Dallas Bowl and the 2014 Cotton Bowl, finishing 10-3 overall and ending the season ranked No. 17 in both the Associated Press Top 25 and the USA Today Coaches' Poll.

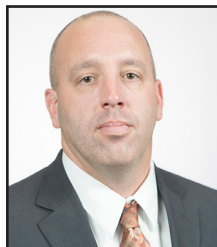
Prior to his time at OSU, he spent two-and-a-half years at the University of Tulsa as an outside linebackers coach. His Golden Hurricane defensive unit led the country in interceptions and in turnover margin and advanced to the 2010 Hawai'i Bowl and the 2011 Armed Forces Bowl.

Semore served as the co-defensive coordinator, secondary coach and special teams coordinator at his alma mater, Adams State, for three seasons.

He got his collegiate coaching start at Mines where he served as a secondary coach with the Orediggers in 2007. His first coaching berth was in 2006 when he served as the defensive coordinator for Round Valley High School in Springerville, Arizona. His defense led Arizona's Class 3A in total defense, scoring defense and pass defense.

He played linebacker at Adams State from 2001-05, and earned a B.A. in History, Government and Philosophy from there in 2005. He got an M.S. in Criminal Justice Administration from the University of Phoenix in 2007. He later received his M.A. in Educational Methods from the University of Tulsa in 2012.

He has two daughters, Paityn and Palmer.



TRAVIS NIEKAMP Special Teams Coordinator/LBs

Travis Niekamp (pronounced: NEE-kamp) joined the staff at Montana in January of 2016, coming to Montana from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and serves as the Grizzlies' special teams coordinator and linebackers coach.

Niekamp served as Louisiana-Monroe's co-defensive coordinator in 2015, as well as the Warhawks' special teams coordinator and linebackers coach from 2013-2015. In 2012, Niekamp served as ULM's tight ends coach.

No stranger to the Northwest, Coach Niekamp served as linebackers coach at Washington State from 2007-2011 in addition to serving as the Cougars' director of football development. Prior to his time in Pullman, he was the linebackers coach/special teams coordinator at Eastern Washington from 2004-2007.

Before coaching at Eastern Washington, Niekamp served as tight ends coach at the United State Military Academy in West Point, N.Y., from 1999 - 2003, and outside linebacker coach, safeties coach and defensive tackles coach at his alma mater, Illinois State University in 1998 and 1999.

A native of Stevens Point, Wis., Niekamp and his wife, Tracy, have three children -- Tye Dalton, Dexter Kole and Brooke Ryan.



CHAD GERMER Run Game Coordinator/O-Line

Veteran mentor Chad Germer returned to his alma mater for the third time in 2015, and in 2016, enters his second season serving as the Grizzlies' run game coordinator and offensive line coach. The 2016 season will be his 19th year of coaching at the college level.

Germer (pronounced "JUR-mur") came back to Montana from UNLV in 2015, where he coached under former Griz mentor Bobby Hauck for the past five seasons (2010-14). He returned to Montana and coached for one season in 2009 and joined Hauck's staff the following year at UNLV.

In his first season back at Montana under Coach Stitt (2015), he coached offensive tackle John Schmaing to a place on the second team all-Big Sky Conference squad.

At UNLV, he coached second team All-Mountain West honoree and four-year starter Brett Boyko, who became the first Rebel offensive lineman to be honored by the league since 2004. Boyko was invited to play in the 90th East-West Shrine game, Jan. 17, 2015.

He also coached three-time honorable mention all-league center and Rimington Trophy Watch List selection Robert Waterman at UNLV.

Germer's lines helped produce the school's all-time leading rusher as Tim Cornett finished with 3,733 yards, which is also the second-most in conference history.

Prior to taking the position at UNLV, Germer spent six seasons coaching the offensive line at the University of Wyoming from 2003-08, working for former Griz head man Joe Glenn.

He began his coaching career at Montana as a restricted earnings coach in 1998 and was elevated to full-time status the following season. He coached for the Grizzlies from 1998-2002.

At Montana, his lines opened up holes for standout running back Chase Reynolds who rushed for 1,502 yards and 22 touchdowns and was a second team All-America pick in 2009 as a senior. That season the Grizzlies ranked 18th in the FCS in fewest quarterback sacks allowed.

A 1991 All-America center at Montana, he began his coaching career at his alma mater and went on to coach four All-Americans during his first stint at UM, which lasted five years.

Germer earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from UM in 1993. Chad and his wife, Amy, have two sons, Nicholas and Alex.





JUSTIN GREEN

RBs/Recruiting Coordinator

Coach Green is in his sixth season at his alma mater coaching the running backs, and serving as the Grizzlies' recruiting coordinator.

Green, from San Diego, Calif., has worked with the running backs at UM the past five seasons. He worked as a student assistant coach at Montana in 2011, also working with the running

backs.

He coached one of the most prolific halfbacks in school history in Jordan Canada. Canada is ranked fourth at Montana in rushing yards (3,435) and rushing touchdowns (40). In his senior season of 2014 he rushed for 1,207 yards the seventh most ever in a year. In 2014 he became the second player in UM history to have back-to-back 1,000-yard rushing seasons (he gained 1,062 in 2013).

Three seasons ago, Canada and was an honorable mention all-league pick, while four seasons ago senior running back Peter Nguyen was a second team selection. Nguyen is ranked sixth in school history with 1,985 career rushing yards. Peter's brother John Nguyen is currently starting at running back for Coach Green, and received an honorable mention from the Big Sky Conference in the 2015 season.

Green had a stellar two-year career at running back at Montana, and he also played for four seasons in the National Football League.

He rushed for 1,784 career yards in his two seasons at Montana in 2003 and 2004, which ranks him 11th in school history. As a junior, he rushed for 1,146 yards and 14 touchdowns, and was chosen the Big Sky "Newcomer of the Year."

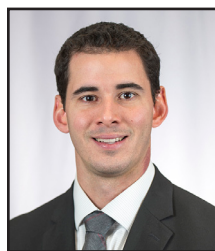
He was a fifth round draft pick by the Baltimore Ravens in 2005, and had a four-year career in the NFL. He played three seasons at fullback for the Ravens, and then played one year for the Phoenix Cardinals for one season.

Between his stint with the Ravens and Cardinals, he coached for one season at Berean High School in Walnut Creek, Calif., working with the running backs, linebackers, and cornerbacks. He returned to Berean High School again, after his final NFL season with the Cardinals, once again working with the running backs, linebackers, and cornerbacks.

He came to Montana from San Diego Mesa College where he played for one season (2002), and was team captain and co-MVP, rushing for 874 yards and 7 TDs, and was a JC Gridwire All-America honorable mention. He started his college career at San Diego State, where he redshirted in 2000, and he lettered for the Aztecs in 2001.

He was a standout running back at University of San Diego High School where he rushed for 5,397 career yards which at the time was the most in San Diego County history. He was a first team All-C.I.F. selection as a junior and senior. His junior year in high school he rushed for 2,385 yards, which was the fifth most in California prep history, while his senior season he rushed for 1,801 yards and 20 TDs, and was tabbed a USA Today honorable mention All-American.

He earned a degree in sociology at UM. Justin and his wife, Meghan, have two daughters, six-year-old Giana, and Karis, who is one year old.



NOLAN SWETT

Pass Game Coord./Outside Receivers

Swett is in his second season as an assistant coach at Montana and serves as the Grizzlies' pass game coordinator and oversees the outside receivers.

He came to UM after working for current Griz mentor Bob Stitt for five seasons as an assistant coach at the Colorado School of Mines.

In his first season at UM, Swett coached wide receiver Jamaal Jones into the UM history books, as Jones became the Grizzlies' all-time leading receiver with 3,021 career receiving yards. He also coached receiver Ellis Henderson, who caught 817 yards in his final year at UM, one of the top-20 best seasons in Grizzly history.

He coached the Orediggers' tight ends during his first season (2010) at Mines. From 2011-14, he coached the wide receivers and tight ends. In 2014 he also served as Mines' recruiting coordinator.

In 2014 the Orediggers went 10-2 overall and tied for the league title with an 8-1 record. A year ago Mines had a prolific offense and was ranked second in the nation in passing yards (378.3 ypg), fourth in total offense (522.5 ypg) and tied for 17th in scoring offense (39.0 ppg).

In 2013, the Orediggers also finished inside the top 25 in several NCAA statistical categories, including: passing offense (10th, 319.0), total offense (11th, 494.1), time of possession (13th, 32:52).

In 2012 Mines averaged 84 plays and 455.7 yards per game. The offense averaged 366.1 passing yards per game (fifth nationally) and 39.27 points per game (15th in Division II). The Orediggers finished sixth in the nation in passing offense (351.67 ypg) in 2011.

During his coaching stint at Mines, he coached three All-American tight ends (2010, 2012, 2014), eight all-conference wide receivers and one academic All-American tight end (2013).

Swett spent the 2008 and 2009 seasons as the wide receivers coach at Grinnell College in Grinnell, Iowa.

During his four-year collegiate career as a tight end at Colorado College (2004-07), he established four records for the Tigers' now-defunct football program, including single-season touchdown receptions (10), career TD catches (31), career receiving yards (2,758), and career receptions (199).

He served as a team captain his senior season at Colorado College and was a first team All-West Region and first team All-American selection by d3football.com that season.

Swett earned his Bachelor's Degree in History from Colorado College in 2008. He earned an M.A. in Education at Regis University. He is a 2004 graduate of Catalina Foothills High School in Tucson, Arizona.

Swett resides in Missoula with his wife Laurie.





JOE "JB" HALL JR. CBs/Defensive Quality Control

"J.B." Hall is in his second season at Montana, serving as cornerbacks coach as well as overseeing defensive quality control.

Before coming to Montana in 2015 with Coach Stitt, Hall was a defensive graduate assistant at the University of Colorado for two seasons, where his primary role was assisting with

the linebackers along with general overall duties in the entire defense. In his first season he assisted in coaching the defensive line.

He lettered four years as a wide receiver for the Adams State University Grizzlies and head coach Marty Heaton, where he had 39 receptions for 450 yards (11.5 per catch) and a touchdown. He also threw a touchdown pass that covered 13 yards as a senior against Western New Mexico. A team captain, he earned Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference academic team honors.

He was a youth sports camp coordinator at Boulder's Family Learning Center for four summers (2009-12), involved in management, organization, teaching and education. He also was a volunteer coach at Centaurus High School in Lafayette, Colo., the summer of 2012, where he completed over 50 hours of coaching-related duties.

Hall graduated from Adams State University with a degree in human performance and physical education in May 2013 and a minor in marketing and coaching.

He is from Boulder, Colo., and graduated from Boulder High School where he lettered in football, basketball and track (sprints).



ANDREW SELLE QBs/Offensive Quality Control

Selle is in his second year as an assistant coach at Montana, working with the quarterbacks as well as serving as the Grizzlies' offensive quality control coach.

He returned to his alma mater in 2015 after a three-year stint as a quarterbacks coach and mathematics teacher at Billings West High

School.

He played at Montana from 2007-10, and was a four-year letterman with a record of 13-3 as a two-year starter (2009 and 2010). He is ranked 11th in school history with 4,131 career passing yards, and his 38 career passing TDs tie him for the ninth most in school history.



Selle was instrumental for the Grizzlies in 2009 when they advanced to the FCS national championship game, a 23-21 loss to Villanova in Chattanooga, Tenn. He was 27-of-35-0 passing for 351 yards and three touchdowns in UM's title loss to the Wildcats. His 3,043 passing yards in 2009 rank him 13th in single-season history.

A 2010 All-America candidate, his playing career ended abruptly when he was injured in the fourth game of the season against Sacramento State on Sept. 25, 2010. After the injury he served as player/coach, working closely with fellow signal caller Jordan Johnson.

Selle was an honors student in mathematics at UM (a 2010 graduate) where he maintained a 3.79 GPA. He earned a Master's Degree in Education at Montana in 2014.

He was a standout quarterback at Billings West and led the Bears to the State AA championship in 2005. He was the co-MVP in AA that year, and guided West to its first unbeaten (13-0) campaign. He was ranked first in his high school (507 students) with a 4.0 GPA.



MIKE FERRITER Inside Receivers

Coach Ferriter is in his second season coaching at his alma mater, overseeing the inside receivers.

He came back to Montana in 2015 from fellow Big Sky Conference member Idaho State, where he also coached the inside receivers.

In his first year he coached Luke Austin, who earned second-team all-Big Sky Conference. Austin's 951 receiving yards were the seventh most in program history, and his 11 touchdown receptions tied for the second most in ISU history.

Ferriter (pronounced: Fair-it-ter) came to ISU after spending two years as an offensive graduate assistant at UNLV under former head coach Bobby Hauck, who was Montana's mentor from 2003-2008.

He was a stand-out receiver for the Grizzlies, and was a three-year starter and served as a team co-captain on offense as a senior in 2008. He is the 11th Grizzly player to reach the 2,000-yard receiving yards plateau.

He finished his playing career at Montana ranked 12th in school history in both receptions (147) and receiving yards (2,089). His 15 career receiving touchdowns rank him 11th (tie) on the career list.

After earning his bachelor's degree in human biology, he spent the 2009 season coaching receivers at his alma mater, Helena High School.





BRIAN HENDRICKS

Defensive Line

Hendricks begins his first season as Montana's defensive line coach in 2016 after serving as the defensive ends coach in his first season with the Grizzlies in 2015.

Before coming to Montana he was an assistant coach for Griz mentor Bob Stitt at the Colorado School of Mines coaching the defensive line.

In Hendricks' first year at UM coaching the defensive ends, he coached the 2015 STATS FCS Defensive Player of the Year Tyrone Holmes to a national-best 18 sacks.

In 2014, Mines had an overall record of 10-2 and tied for the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference title with an 8-1 league mark. The Orediggers participated in the NCAA playoffs, and their 10-2 record was the 13th winning season in 15 years for Coach Stitt, and also added to the program's record with an eighth consecutive winning season. With Hendricks coaching the defensive front, the Orediggers' defense ranked second in the RMAC in scoring defense (23.4 pts/game), first in the RMAC and 36th in DII in rush defense (124.9) and first in the RMAC and 12th in DII in sacks (38). Sophomore defensive tackle, Dallas Fields, finished his season with First Team All Rocky Mountain Conference honors while junior defensive end, Emmanuel Graves, finished with second team honors. Hendricks helped an Orediggers defense in 2013 that ranked first in the RMAC and 7th in DII in scoring defense (17.0 pts/game).

Hendricks, a native of Burlington, Colo., joined Bob Stitt's staff in 2013 following a short stint as a defensive graduate assistant at Colorado State University.

Hendricks was a four-year letterman at inside linebacker for the University of Wyoming from 2008-2011. Hendricks earned a pair of 2nd Team All-Mountain West accolades and led the team in tackles his sophomore and senior seasons. He served as a team captain during his junior and senior campaigns and was named the team's most valuable linebacker following his sophomore, junior and senior seasons. Hendricks also holds the Wyoming single-game record for most tackles (23), which was also the best single-game performance in the nation in 2009. He was named the Mountain West player of the week on two separate occasions and earned the 2011 Brent Schieffer Most Inspirational Player Award for the Cowboys as well as the Larry Birleffi Outstanding Senior Football Player Award. Hendricks finished his career as the 12th leading tackler in Wyoming team history. Wyoming played in the New Mexico Bowl in 2009 and again in 2011. Additionally, Hendricks served on the UW Leadership Council and



earned an invitation to the 2012 Washington Redskins mini-camp. Hendricks graduated in 2011 with a bachelor's degree in agricultural business.

As a prep athlete in Burlington, Colo., Hendricks was a three-sport letter winner in football, wrestling and track. Hendricks was the recipient of the prestigious 2007 Fred Steinmark Colorado Athlete of the Year Award presented by the Rocky Mountain News in the spring of each year. The Steinmark Award honors the top male and female high school student-athletes in the state of Colorado based on athletics, academics and citizenship. He was also an outstanding wrestler in high school, posting a 102-1 record.



SHANN SCHILLINGER

Safeties

Schillinger returns to Missoula to coach the safeties from the University of Nebraska, where the Baker, Mont., native served as a special teams assistant for the Huskers under former Montana assistant coach Bruce Read, son of legendary Grizzly coach Don Read.

"We're excited, and I know that Montana fans are going to be excited to have Shann back," said Coach Stitt.

"He's a legend as far as Griz football goes. He's one of the best people you'll ever meet, and he's got great experience as far as playing in the NFL as a safety, and getting to coach on Mike Riley's staff this past year. I know our Montana players are going to be excited that a guy they grew up watching play for the Griz will be on the staff."

Prior to coaching the Huskers, Schillinger coached at Dickenson State University in North Dakota where his brother, Jace, is the offensive coordinator. Shann assisted the Bluehawks as a wide receivers and special teams coach.

Schillinger was a safety in the NFL for the Atlanta Falcons and Tennessee Titans from 2010 - 2013. The Tony Barbour Award winner for the Griz was the 171st overall pick in the 2010 draft, signing with the Falcons in the sixth round. He ranked third on the Falcons in special teams tackles in 2010 and second in 2011.

He and his wife, Ericka, have a daughter, Lenex (1) and recently welcomed their second daughter Malloy.





MATT NICHOLSON

Strength & Conditioning

Nicholson is in his second season as the Grizzly football program's strength and conditioning coach.

He came to Montana from Colorado School of Mines in 2015 where he worked with Griz head coach Bob Stitt for two seasons. At Mines, Nicholson coached the linebackers as well directed the strength and conditioning program for the football team, in addition to other sports.

In his last season at Mines, the Orediggers went 10-2 and tied for the conference championship with an 8-1 league record and advanced to the NCAA playoffs. The 10-2 record gave Coach Stitt his 13th winning season in 15 years and program-record eight-straight winning seasons overall. Two of Nicholson's linebackers, Kole Kadavy and Billy Sprague, were selected to the first team All-RMAC.

In 2013, the Orediggers posted an 8-3 record, including a 7-2 record in the RMAC to finish 2nd in the league. Nicholson's pupil, Tyler Denson, was a first team All-RMAC selection.

Prior to Golden, Nicholson spent three years as an assistant coach at his alma-mater, the University of Houston. He spent nine months as a weight room assistant before joining the football staff as a graduate assistant. He assisted with the linebackers in 2011 and helped the club to rank amongst national leaders in sacks, tackles-for-loss and interceptions. Additionally, the Cougars posted a 13-1 record and won the Ticket City Bowl

against Penn State in the 2011 campaign. In 2012, he was a defensive backs assistant before returning back to a linebacker assistant in 2013.

Nicholson also was selected to be the head football coach for the Houston Youth Impact Program in 2011. The Youth Impact Program was designed to mentor at-risk youth by combining academic and life skills tutoring with football skills. Over 100 middle school-aged boys joined the program.

Nicholson played linebacker at Houston from 2006-2010, racking up 179 tackles, despite missing 20 games his final three season due to injuries. Starting his career as a walk-on and progressing to a scholarship player, he played in 47 career games for the Cougars and served as a team captain during the 2009 and 2010 seasons. He was named Tom Wilson Off-season MVP in both 2009 and 2010 and was also named Houston's special teams player of the year in 2006 as a true freshman walk-on. He was also a 2010 Burlsworth Trophy nominee, which is awarded to college football's most outstanding player who began their career as a walk-on.

He received his Bachelor's Degree in Kinesiology/Sport Administration from Houston in December 2010. He graduated with a Master's Degree in Human Resource Development in the spring of 2013 from Houston as well.

A native of Plano, Texas, and a product of Plano Senior High School, Nicholson helped carry the Wildcats to a 13-1 record and an appearance in the regional finals as a senior. Nicholson was an honorable mention 5A all-state selection as a senior for the wildcats in football in addition to being named first-team all-state in lacrosse.

Matt has a son, Ryan.

Bonnicksen is in his second year as UM's director of football operations for coach Bob Stitt's program.

GRIZ OPEN STITT ERA WITH MEMORABLE WIN

To the disbelief of a record crowd, the gambler played it safe. And the end result was a memorable start to the Bob Stitt era at Montana.

Joey Counts scored on a 1-yard run off left tackle on fourth down with two seconds remaining to rally Montana to a 38-35 victory over four-time defending national champion North Dakota State Saturday at Washington-Grizzly Stadium in Missoula.

Counts' touchdown capped a 16-play, 80-yard, game-winning drive that started at Montana's 20-yard line with just 1:39 remaining after its defense forced a critical three-and-out by the Bison.

The game was played in front of a record crowd of 26,472 and a national television audience on ESPN. And was a baptism by fire for Stitt, whose team generated 544 yards of offense. None was more important than the 544th, which brought Stitt a win in his first game as Montana's coach.

The Grizzlies, who allowed just seven second-half points after trailing 28-21 at the break, did what they needed to do and forced a three-and-out, which gave Montana the ball back at its own 20-yard line with 1:39 on the clock.

Montana made it to the North Dakota State 44, but three incompletions left the Grizzlies facing a fourth-and-10. With the game on the line, Brady Gustafson, who was making his first career start, hit Reese Carlson down the middle on a 31-yard strike to the 13.

Gustafson hit Ellis Henderson one play later to bring the ball to the 1-yard line. Just 15 seconds remained.

After a pair of incompletions, one to stop the clock with 15 seconds left, another on second and goal, Counts got the call. He attempted to go up and over the line, but he was stopped a half yard short, setting up an all-or-nothing play. Fourth-and-goal. Six seconds left.

Using a three-man backfield, Stitt called Counts' number again, and this time the back found an opening off left tackle and went in standing up. His scoring run set off bedlam in Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

Montana ran it 35 times Saturday, mostly John Nguyen skittering between the tackles for 86 yards, and threw it 57 times. Gustafson went 30-for-55 for 434 yards and three touchdowns in his first start.

After North Dakota State opened the game with an air-tight and efficient eight-play, 75-yard drive to go up 7-0 less than five minutes into the game, Montana's fans got their first taste of a Stitt-coached offense.

Facing a fourth-and-four from their own 45-yard line -- in the first quarter, on their first drive of the season and already down a touchdown -- the Grizzlies went for it.

Montana tied it 7-7 when Gustafson hit Jamaal Jones on a 7-yard scoring strike across the middle, then took its first lead, 10-7, when Sullivan hit a 22-yard field goal late in the first quarter following a North Dakota State fumble deep in its own end.

The turnover was forced when Tyrone Holmes sacked NDSU quarterback Carson Wentz. The loose ball was recovered by Kendrick Van Ackeren. It was one of the few miscues Saturday for Wentz, who passed for 198 yards and two touchdowns, and ran for 70 yards and two more scores.

Wentz had both of his rushing touchdowns in the second quarter. His second scoring run made it 21-13, but Montana answered 70 seconds later when Gustafson hit Ben Roberts down the left side for an acrobatic, 38-yard score. Gustafson connected with Roberts for the two-point conversion to make it 21-21.

Wentz hit Zach Vraa from 10 yards out to make it 28-21 just 26 seconds before halftime, and Montana's deficit could have been even larger. At their own 33 with 19 seconds left, the Grizzlies tried a hook-and-lateral, but Ryan Burke's lateral ended up on the ground.

NDSU recovered and took possession, but Ben LeCompte's 44-yard field goal attempt as time expired was wide left.

After gaining 283 yards of offense in the first half, North Dakota State was limited to just 45 in the third quarter, and Gustafson's 62-yard scoring pass to Ellis Henderson, who finished with seven catches for 133 yards, midway through the quarter sent the teams into the fourth tied 28-28.

North Dakota State went up 35-28 on its first drive of the fourth quarter, going 79 yards in seven plays, capped by King Frazier's 7-yard scoring run. But the Bison would generate just five yards of offense the last 10 minutes of the game.

Wentz couldn't connect on a handoff, and Van Ackeren, who led Montana with 10 tackles, was there to recover the critical fumble. The clock showed 6:20.

Montana had first-and-goal at the NDSU 2-yard line on its ensuing possession, but negative rushes by Nguyen and Counts, followed by an incomplete pass from Gustafson, had Stitt calling on Sullivan, who was good on all three of his attempts on the day, for the field goal that made it 35-31 with 2:47 left.

CAL POLY STUNS MONTANA ON LATE FIELD GOAL

Another Saturday at Washington-Grizzly Stadium, another nail-biter that wasn't decided until the game's final seconds. But this time Griz fans went home feeling empty after watching a winnable game slip through their team's grasp.

Shortly after Montana failed to convert on a late 4th-and-inches that would have iced the game, Cal Poly's Alex Vega kicked a game-winning 49-yard field goal with four seconds remaining to give the Mustangs a 20-19 victory.

Montana, which knocked off North Dakota State with a late touchdown last week, had four turnovers and went 0 for 3 on fourth-down conversions Saturday, and scored just five points on eight second-half possessions to lose to Cal Poly for the second straight season.

It appeared Montana had made the play of the game when Derek Crittenden sacked Cal Poly quarterback Chris Brown in the end zone for a safety to put the Grizzlies up 19-17 with 3:43 remaining. All that remained was to take the ensuing possession and grind out the clock. But like the week before, the favored team was unable to get it done.

Facing 4th-and-inches on the Cal Poly 32-yard line with 1:18 left and the Mustangs out of timeouts, Montana went with its jumbo package, and linebacker Herbert Gamboa was stopped for no gain (though even a first-down run would have been nullified by an illegal procedure penalty).

Cal Poly took over and went 36 yards in 11 plays, including a converted 4th-and-2, to set up the winning field goal, which had enough leg to be good from another 10 yards out.

One year after giving up 421 yards on the ground in a 41-21 loss to Cal Poly at San Luis Obispo, Montana's defense gave up a quiet 330 and kept the Mustangs out of the end zone in the second half. But the offense was unable to reward the effort.

Montana opened the game's scoring in the first quarter when quarterback Brady Gustafson took it in from less than a yard out, one play after John Nguyen's 41-yard burst through a large hole on the left side of the line gave the Grizzlies 1st-and-goal.

The Grizzlies were in Cal Poly territory again on their next possession, but a failed pass attempt on 4th-and-1 turned the ball over to the Mustangs.

Brown, who rushed for 226 yards in last year's meeting, struck on the very next play. After faking a handoff up the middle, he took the ball around right end and ran 60 yards untouched to tie the game at 7-7.

The dual-threat quarterback was at it again midway through the second quarter. One play after running for 28 yards, he hit Roland Jackson for a 36-yard touchdown to put the Mustangs up for the first time, 14-7.

After a number of stalled efforts, Montana finally put a strong drive together late in the half that sent the teams to the locker room tied 14-14.

Taking over at its 16-yard line, the Grizzlies needed less than 90 seconds to go 84 yards in 12 plays. Jamaal Jones made like Odell Beckham Jr. on an 18-yard reception to the 6-yard line, and Gustafson hit Ellis Henderson on a short crossing route 20 seconds before the break to bring the teams even.

If the drive felt at the time like a precursor to a big second half, it didn't turn out to be. Cal Poly started to get its running game going in the third quarter, and the Mustangs largely kept the Griz offense off the field. Montana got the ball just twice in the quarter and ran only 11 plays for 30 yards.

Cal Poly dominated the quarter in every aspect but the scoreboard. Despite holding the ball for 12:25 of the quarter's 15 minutes, the Mustangs scored just three points on a 48-yard field goal that capped a 17-play drive that ate up 6:58.

With its defense giving it every opportunity to take control of the game, Montana's offense remained out of sorts into the fourth quarter. The team's first four possessions of the second half resulted in 42 yards and a pair of Gustafson interceptions.

But the Grizzlies finally got the break they needed early in the fourth quarter on the same play Gustafson threw his third pick. B.J. Nard, who had all three of his team's interceptions, was tackled and stripped from behind by Henderson, who recovered the fumble.

Gustafson hit Josh Horner for 44 yards on the next play, and the Grizzlies drove down to the Cal Poly 5-yard line before settling for a game-tying field goal with 8:52 left.

Montana forced a punt on Cal Poly's next possession and took over at its own 2-yard line with 5:31 on the clock.

Gustafson rushed for six yards to get his team off the goal line, and three straight first-down plays moved the ball close to midfield before the drive sputtered.

Had Montana won the game, Chris Lider's 57-yard punt that flipped the field and pinned the Mustangs down on their own 2-yard line would have been the play of the game, considering Crittenden shook off a block and took down Brown in the end zone on the very next play.

But Cal Poly kicked off, and Montana began the drive that didn't quite become the drive to a 2-0 start to the season. And a visiting kicker left the field a hero.

GRIZ LOSE AT LIBERTY 31-21

The Montana football team lost 31-21 at Liberty Saturday night in Lynchburg, Va., in a battle of ranked teams and in front of a record crowd of 22,551 at Williams Stadium. The No. 7 Grizzlies fell behind 17-0 early in the second quarter and never led to drop to 1-2 on the season.

Montana scored the final 12 points of the first half to trail 17-12 at the break and were two yards away from taking a lead late in the third quarter when a costly fumble ended the Grizzlies' chances of making a comeback.

The Flames (2-1) opened the game with a 10-play, 74-yard drive, capped by a four-yard scoring pass from Josh Woodrum to Desmond Rice, and led the final 54 minutes of the game.

Montana rushed 26 times for 21 yards, scored on just three of six possessions inside the red zone, went 3 for 16 on 3rd-down conversions, and had to play the final three quarters with backup quarterback Chad Chalich under center after starter Brady Gustafson was injured late in the first quarter.

Chalich led Montana on its four scoring drives -- both throwing and running for a touchdown -- and threw for 228 yards, but with the game in the balance the Grizzlies generated negative yardage over their final six possessions of the game after being within five points midway through the third quarter.

And still Montana will look at the loss like it did the Cal Poly defeat two weeks ago, when the Mustangs rallied late for a 20-19 victory. A play here, a play there, and who knows how things might have been different.

After Liberty's opening scoring drive, Montana went three and out. One play later the Flames were back in the end zone after Woodrum hit Dante Shells for a 72-yard score. A 22-yard field goal early in the second quarter made it 17-0.

Daniel Sullivan had an opportunity to get Montana on the board late in the first quarter, but his 33-yard field goal attempt missed wide left. It was the one of three possessions the Grizzlies had inside the Flames' 20-yard line that came up empty.

Five minutes into the second quarter, Montana had run 24 plays for 60 yards and no points.

But the back half of the second quarter belonged to the Grizzlies. Chalich hit Ellis Henderson for 43 yards to set up a 22-yarder for Sullivan and one possession later the Idaho transfer hit Jamaal Jones, who finished with seven catches for 168 yards, for a 70-yard scoring strike. The extra point was missed.

Montana left a number of potential game-changing points on the Williams Stadium turf. A handful came late in the second quarter when a blocked punt by Connor Strahm gave Montana possession at the Liberty 4-yard line.

A rush for one yard and two incomplete passes into the end zone later, a Sullivan field goal from 21 yards out made it 17-12 at the half.

Liberty, on 32-yard pass from Damian King to Shells, and Montana, on a Chalich one-yard keeper to cap an 11-play, 81-yard drive, traded scores in the third quarter that made it 24-19.

Griz linebacker Herbert Gamboa sacked Woodrum on the opening play of Liberty's next possession, the start of a three-and-out.

Starting their next possession on their own 45, the Grizzlies needed just two plays -- Chalich to Chase Naccarato for five yards and Chalich to Jones for 46 -- to get inside the Liberty 5-yard line.

Taking a handoff on the next play and charging up the middle, Joey Counts was stripped two yards from the goal line. The Flames recovered on the 1-yard line. It would be as close as Montana would get.

The Grizzlies forced a punt on Liberty's next possession but would lose nine yards on their own possession before punting it themselves. The Flames, on a 40-yard run by D.J. Abnar, went up 31-19 three plays into the fourth quarter.

Montana could not move the ball out of its own end on its next three possessions, but the Grizzlies still had a glimmer of hope when Tucker Schybe blocked a punt to give his team the ball at the Liberty 34 with 2:34 remaining. Montana would make it just inside the 10-yard line before turning it over on downs.

The late-game possession shined a bright light on the missed extra point in the second quarter. Had the score been 31-20, the Grizzlies could have kicked a field goal to make it a one-possession game, then, with only one timeout remaining, at least been able to attempt an onside kick.

As it was, Liberty took over up 12. Unable to rush for a first down that would have run out the clock, the Flames elected to take a team safety with 13 seconds left for the game's final points.

GRIZ START FAST, HOLD OFF LUMBERJACKS IN BIG SKY OPENER

Just four weeks after celebrating one of the program's biggest wins, Montana football coach Bob Stitt and his team took the field Saturday facing a have-to-have-it game. A pair of tough losses and a 1-2 record entering Big Sky Conference action will do that.

Playing like its back was against the wall, Montana rode a dominant defensive effort and a balanced offense to a 23-14 victory over Northern Arizona on Homecoming at Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

Montana (2-2, 1-0 BSC) had dropped its last two, to Cal Poly and Liberty, with an off week in between, and it was starting to make the team's season-opening victory over North Dakota State feel like a long, long time ago.

Montana, which outgained Northern Arizona 355-19 in the first half, built a 16-0 halftime lead, then watched as the Lumberjacks pulled within 16-14 on a pair of scoring passes less than a minute apart midway through the third quarter.

With the game hanging in the balance in the fourth, the Grizzlies put together an 11-play scoring drive that finally put the game out of reach.

Montana wasted little time jumping all over Northern Arizona, on both sides of the ball. John Nguyen's 22-yard scoring run -- one play after Chad Chalich, getting his first start at quarterback as a Grizzly, hit Jamaal Jones for 56 yards -- put the Grizzlies up 7-0 just 70 seconds in.

That run covered more yardage than the Lumberjacks would generate the entire half.

And yet Montana could only build a 16-0 lead by the break, three times settling for Daniel Sullivan field goals after driving within 10 yards of the end zone. But for 30 minutes it didn't matter, because Montana's defense was absolutely monstrous.

The Grizzlies had six of their eight sacks for the game in the first half, two coming from Tyrone Holmes, and held the Lumberjacks to 19 yards on 26 plays, 11 on the ground, eight through the air.

After Nguyen's scoring run, Montana got the ball right back when Eric Johnson forced a fumble on the kickoff return and Tucker Schye recovered at the NAU 27. The drive would stall at the 10, and a Sullivan 27-yard field goal gave Montana a 10-0 lead before NAU had run an offensive play.

Montana had a 17-play, 74-yard drive that made it 13-0 early in the second quarter and faced 4th-and-goal from the NAU 4-yard line on its next possession. The Grizzlies lined up to go for it, but a false start penalty changed those plans and brought on the field goal unit.

Sullivan's 27-yarder made it 16-0, and a halftime lead that could have been safely out of reach still felt tenuous.

Northern Arizona (2-2, 0-1 BSC) wasn't going to be held down the entire game, and the Lumberjacks opened the second half by marching right down the field. But Case Cookus's pass into the end zone from the 15 was broken up by Kendrick Van Ackeren and intercepted by Yamen Sanders.

Montana did little to extend its lead, and Northern Arizona took advantage. The Lumberjacks scored twice in 59 seconds midway through the third quarter to close their deficit to 16-14 and get things more tense than any of the 26,136 inside the stadium could have imagined at halftime.

Cookus hit Emmanuel Butler for a 57-yard strike down the left sideline to make it 16-7, and after a Chalich interception, Montana's only turnover of the game, Cookus hit Butler for a 34-yard score.

Given two more possessions to take the lead, Northern Arizona was unable to do so. The Lumberjacks turned the ball over on downs in Montana territory when Cookus's intended receiver slipped and fell, and NAU was forced to punt the ball away midway through the fourth quarter.

And so began the drive of the game for Montana. The Grizzlies went 61 yards in 11 plays, with the insurance touchdown coming on a bubble screen from Chalich to Chase Naccarato in the left flat. Naccarato scored from three yards out to cap the game's scoring.

Seven of the plays on the decisive drive and 45 of the yards came on rushes by Nguyen and Treshawn Favors.

The final drive was a microcosm of Stitt's play-calling for the game, which resulted in 45 passes and 44 rushes. Nguyen ran for 71 yards, Chalich finished 29-of-45 for 279 yards. He also rushed for 40.

Jones had seven receptions for 113 yards, his third time in four games this season with at least 100 receiving yards, and Ellis Henderson caught six balls for 95 yards.

Jeremiah Kose had a team-high 12 tackles, Holmes finished with 11, which included four sacks and 5.5 tackles for loss.

MONTANA MOVES TO 2-0 IN BIG SKY WITH 27-13 ROAD WIN

Chad Chalich threw three touchdown passes, and the Montana defense forced four turnovers and held UC Davis scoreless in the second half as the Grizzlies improved to 2-0 in the Big Sky Conference with a 27-13 victory Saturday afternoon at Davis, Calif.

Chalich hit Ben Roberts and Jamaal Jones for first-half scores to give Montana a 14-13 halftime lead. Chalich connected with Ellis Henderson in the third, and Jeremy Calhoun capped a 16-play, 85-yard drive in the fourth quarter with a five-yard scoring run that put the game out of reach.

"We made it a lot more interesting than we needed to. We could have had this under control a lot earlier than the fourth quarter," said coach Bob Stitt. "We were playing hard, but we were making a lot of mistakes and mental errors. We just kept grinding away in the second half and finally pulled away."

Montana won its second straight game to improve to 3-2 overall. UC Davis (0-5, 0-2 BSC) remains winless.

The Grizzlies, who would eventually run a season-high 97 plays and generate 441 yards of offense, were slow out of the gate offensively, but the defense kept the Aggies in check, including an important goal-line stand in the first quarter.

Montana went nowhere on its first four drives, and that allowed UC Davis to strike early. The Aggies went up 3-0 on their first possession and later used consecutive passing plays that covered 54 yards to get first-and-goal on the Griz 1-yard line midway through the quarter.

After an incomplete pass, Tyrone Holmes stuffed Manusamoa Luuga for no gain, then sacked quarterback Ben Scott for a three-yard loss, forcing UC Davis to settle for a field goal that made it 6-0.

Montana finally got rolling offensively on its next possession. Chalich hit four different receivers on the drive and connected with Roberts from 20 yards out to give the Grizzlies their first lead of the afternoon, 7-6. It was Roberts' second touchdown of the season.

The Aggies answered right back, going 75 yards in five plays to retake the lead 13-7 on an 11-yard pass from Scott to Derek Baljeu at 13:44 of the second quarter. It felt like the start of a shootout, but they would be UC Davis's final points.

Montana needed just 80 seconds and six plays to cover 72 yards on its next possession and took the lead for good when Chalich hit Jones with a 42-yard strike.

The Grizzlies could have extended their lead before half, but their only turnover of the game kept it a one-point game.

UC Davis's Chris Martin mishandled a punt late in the second quarter, and Treshawn Favors recovered the fumble at the Aggies' 3-yard line. Two plays later, with the ball at the one, Chalich fumbled it back.

With the Montana offense in one-score-per-quarter mode, the team's defense made sure that was enough. The Grizzlies forced turnovers on the Aggies' first three possessions of the second half.

First it was Caleb Kidder with an interception, then Ryan Johnson. In between picks, Montana went up 21-13 when Chalich found Henderson from four yards out.

The quarterback hit three different receivers for touchdowns Saturday, and that did not include Chase Naccarato, who caught 13 balls, two off the school record.

"You come out and see what they're doing, and the way they were lining up, we knew we could get Chase a bunch. He got a lot of catches and did some nice things after the catch," said Stitt. "Those guys are dynamic. They make big plays and are a lot of fun to have out there for a quarterback."

Montana created its fourth turnover of the game the opening play of the fourth quarter when Jamal Wilson forced a Luuga fumble. Kidder was there for the recovery.

Two possessions later the Grizzlies put the game out of reach. Taking over at their own 15, the Grizzlies went 85 yards in 16 plays, with Calhoun making it 27-13 with 6:28 remaining.

UC Davis turned the ball over on downs and punted on its final two possessions.

Chalich finished 29-of-49 for 265 yards. He also ran 17 times for 64 more to finish as Montana's leading rusher.

Kendrick Van Ackeren led Montana, which had five sacks and three other tackles for loss, with 11 tackles. Holmes, last week's STATS FCS national defensive player of the week for his performance against Northern Arizona, finished with three tackles, two coming on the early goal-line stand.

"I'm sure they were worried about Tyrone and did some things to cover him up," said Stitt, "but you can't block him all day. That opens things up for other guys to have some success."

GRIZ FALL TO WILDCATS IN OVERTIME

The Montana Grizzlies rallied from a 21-14 halftime deficit to force overtime with the Weber State Wildcats, but a 27-yard field goal from Josh Kealamakia broke Grizzly hearts, and broke a 13 game losing streak for the Wildcats at Washington Grizzly Stadium with a 24-21 victory.

Montana takes its first Big Sky Conference loss on the season, moving to 2-1 in league play and 3-3 overall, heading into a bye week.

Montana's hurry up offense tallied just 72 plays under two quarterbacks as UM's starter Chad Chalich left the game injured at halftime, replaced by sophomore Makena Simis, who played his first minutes for the Grizzlies.

Despite having to go deeper in the quarterback depth chart, the Grizzlies tallied 383 yards of total offense, 245 in the air and 138 net yards on the ground.

Ben Roberts had a career day receiving for the Grizzlies, hauling in eight catches for 115 yards and a pair of touchdowns. His second TD reception was a 44-yard bomb from Simis that tied the game and gave the Griz an opportunity to take home a win.

Roberts, the 6-4, 205lb baseball transfer from Missoula, now leads the Grizzlies in TD receptions with four on the season.

Turnovers with ball in hand, and turnovers on downs led to scoring opportunities going awry for Montana, with an interception returned for a touchdown late in the second quarter being a key moment for UM.

The Griz also turned the ball over twice on downs inside Dan Sullivan's field goal range that led to a critical lack of points for the home team.

Weber State came out of the gates with nothing to loose in the first quarter, pulling out a trick play -double pass on its first play from scrimmage, a 38 yard pass from Drew Batchelor to Cory Thomson. Two plays later, Wildcat running back Eric Wilkes ran in for three yards to get WSU on the board first.

The Grizzlies responded in earnest however, with two quick scores to close out the first quarter.

Chad Chalich threw the first of Roberts' touchdown passes for four yards to cap off a 12 play, 75 yard drive that took 3:58 off the clock to tie the game at seven. Roberts' four-yard TD was set up by a crucial 15-yard completion to freshman Jeremy Calhoun to bring the Griz inside the red zone for the first time on the day.

The Grizzly defense forced a three-and-out on the next drive, and UM went back to work on offense, putting together another methodical scoring drive of 11 plays and 64 yards, capped off by a four yard scramble by John Nguyen to the end zone.

UM finished the quarter with a 14-7 lead and momentum heading into the second period.

"This one's really disappointing," said Coach Stitt. "We started out exactly the way we wanted to start out offensively and had a great first quarter."

Weber State struck back in the second quarter with 14 unanswered points of its own.

Running back Eric Wilkes, who led the Wildcats with 24 carries for 122 yards, marched the visitors down the field before junior QB Jadrian Clark connected with Cam Livingston for a 15 yard score to tie the game at 14.

The next two drives for both teams resulted in punts, with the second one pinning the Griz on thier own 16-yard line. Just as the Griz were clawing their way out of the danger zone, Chad Chalich was intercepted by Cordero Dixon at the UM 30 yard line, who would return it to the end zone to give WSU a 21-14 lead just before halftime.

The Griz managed just a single touchdown in the second half when Simis saw Jamaal Jones in double coverage, and hauled one deep to Ben Roberts for his 44 yard strike. Sullivan's PAT was good, and the game was tied at 21, where it would stay until the end of regulation.

In the extra period, the Grizzlies won the coin toss to take the first possession, but Makena Simis was sacked from behind for the fourth time in the afternoon, and lost ball in contact, turning it over to the Wildcats.

Kealamakia's kick sealed the win for WSU on the ensuing drive from 27 yards, and the Wildcats went home with their first road win in Missoula in 28 years.

"Overtime was disappointing," added Stitt. "We probably should have just handed the ball off, but again, you want to try to steal one. We had set something up, and we wanted to take a look at it, but again, I didn't want to get into a field goal kicking contest in overtime either.

"Overall it's very disappointing. I feel horrible for our players. As a coach, you feel like a parent. You want to help 'em. And when it doesn't go their way it's heart wrenching that you can't help them."

Montana moves into its second bye week of the season, a feature made possible by the "FCS Kickoff" game against North Dakota State, played a full week earlier than the rest of the nation's opening day.

SIMIS SHINES IN MONTANA VICTORY OVER NORTH DAKOTA

The Montana Grizzlies entered Saturday's game against North Dakota with a quarterback who had never started before, and began the season sitting third on the UM depth chart. You'd have never known it though.

Making his first career start as a Grizzly, sophomore Makena Simis tied the UM school record for touchdown passes in a game with six, and completed 16 of 23 passes for 323 yards, leading Montana to a key 42-16 Big Sky Conference victory over the University of North Dakota.

Montana racked up 488 yards of total offense, with 162 rushing yards and 326 yards in the air. The Montana defense achieved it's goal of stopping the Big Sky's fourth best rushing attack in all plays but one, holding UND to 267 yards on the ground for the game.

The Grizzlies fell behind 7-0 when North Dakota's freshman phenom running back John Santiago ran in an 80-yard touchdown on the visitors' first touch of the ball.

But the Griz, led by the debutant Simis, would go on to rattle off seven unanswered touchdowns for the win.

Simis was the obvious choice for player of the game with his record-tying inaugural performance that put him equal with Dave Dickenson, Brian Ah Yat and Jordan Johnson for the most touchdown passes in a game with six.

Simis couldn't have thrown for six touchdowns without an exceptional corps of targets to throw to.

"It's easy when you have dudes on the outside who can create separation, and I just have to get 'em the ball. They made some incredible plays. Not all those touchdowns were in the end zone. Some they had to break a tackle and go for 40 yards. So yeah, I've got to give it to those guys outside," he added.

Jones led all receivers against UND with 139 yards, moving him into seventh on the all-time receiving list, and now sitting just six yards behind Raul Pacheco in sixth place. Seventy-four of Jones' yards came on a single pass from Simis, now ranked as tied for the 11th longest pass in Griz history.

The first quarter couldn't have opened up any worse for the Griz however. After winning the toss, UM went three-and-out on its first possession. UND capitalized in the biggest way possible, when Santiago burst through a hole and went 80 yards untouched on the first play from scrimmage for the visitors. The breakaway run put North Dakota out to an early 7-0 lead, and put Montana on the back foot to start the game.

Two stalled drives later, the Grizzlies answered back, using good field position to convert a nine-play, 54-yard drive that was capped off by a beautiful pass from Simis to Ben Roberts for a 23-yard strike.

The touchdown was Roberts' fifth on the season. After Jones and Henderson each caught a pair of touchdowns, Roberts, Jones and Henderson are now all tied at five each for most on the season.

Montana's first drive of the second quarter stalled after Jones and Roberts put the Griz in good field position again. Jeremy Calhoun was stuffed at the UND 40 and the Griz would turn it over on downs.

UND then put together a clinical 12 play, 57 yard drive using Santiago again as the weapon of choice on the ground. Nate Harris would come up with some defensive heroics on the goal line though, when he deflected a third down pass to force a 20-yard field goal for North Dakota.

The Griz answered right back in true Coach Stitt fashion, putting together a three play, 65 yard drive in 39 seconds, capped off by a 36 yard touchdown pass from Simis to Henderson in the corner of the end zone.

The Montana defense once again forced a three and out on the next series, forcing UND to punt.

Simis and the Griz went back to work, and put together a carbon copy of the previous drive, capped off by a 63-yard touchdown pass, again to Henderson, who made the circus catch, broke a tackle, and sprinted 20 yards to the end zone. The Griz then entered the halftime break leading 21-10.

If UM opened the first half in the worst way possible, the Grizzly defense opened the second half in the best way possible when UND went deep on third down and linebacker Jeremiah Kose came up with the clutch interception.

Six plays later, Simis threw his fourth touchdown pass of the game with a 12 yards strike to Josh Horner, completing a text book 55 yard, 2:07 drive, and giving the Griz an 18-point lead, (its largest lead of the season) up 28-10.

UM closed out the third quarter with Simis' 74-yard bomb to Jones, and the Griz were rolling. The deep pass capped off a quick three play, 85-yard drive in under one minute.

The final Griz touchdown came on the first play of the fourth quarter. UM was set up with ideal field position when UND attempted a fake punt that was read like a book by Connor Strahm, who leveled the North Dakota punter with ball in hand for a loss of nine yards, giving UM the ball on the UND 25.

Four plays later, Simis found Jones open for a 22 yards strike that brought the score to 42-10, and the Griz were on cruise control for the rest of the game.

BIG PLAYS DOOM MONTANA IN 35-16 LOSS

All five of Portland State's touchdowns came on scoring plays of 35 or more yards, and three first-quarter interceptions and a steady game-long downpour held Montana in check as the Vikings rolled to a 35-16 victory over the Grizzlies Saturday afternoon at Providence Park in Portland.

Portland State (7-1, 4-1 BSC) led 21-10 at the half and was never threatened in the second half by a Montana team (4-4, 3-2 BSC) that struggled to get much going offensively in the wet conditions. The Grizzlies generated a season-low 294 yards of offense, just 134 through the air.

The win kept Portland State on track to challenge for the Big Sky Conference title. The Vikings, who fell 19-17 to North Dakota for their only loss, trail league leaders Eastern Washington (6-2, 5-0 BSC) and Southern Utah (6-2, 5-0 BSC) by a game, but the Vikings get a shot at both teams in November.

The Grizzlies, meanwhile, put themselves on the playoff bubble with their fourth loss. Montana closes its season with Idaho State, Eastern Washington and Montana State. The ISU and MSU games are on the road. One more loss would end the Grizzlies' chances of returning to the playoffs.

One week after creating a national buzz with six touchdown passes in his first career start in Montana's 42-16 thumping of North Dakota, sophomore quarterback Makena Simis looked a little more mortal.

He completed just 15-of-36 passes and ended three straight first-quarter possessions with interceptions. All three were grabbed by Patrick Onwuasor, who upped his Big Sky-leading total to seven.

Simis's Portland State counterpart, Alex Kuresa, was sensational. He ran for two touchdowns, threw for two more, and the fleet-footed escape artist did not once get sacked by a defense that entered the game with a Big Sky-high 24.

After the Grizzlies opened the game with a three-and-out, Kuresa got to work. Facing third-and-19 from the Montana 41, he hit Thomas Carter for a touchdown. And that would start a trend. All three of the Vikings' first-half touchdowns and four of their five scores for the game came on third down.

Onwuasor intercepted Simis for the first time on Montana's next possession, which set Portland State up in Montana territory, but Eric Johnson got the ball right back for the Grizzlies with his first pick of the season.

Montana made its way inside the Portland State 40 on its next two possessions, but Onwuasor put an end to both drives. Montana finished the first quarter with 10 passing yards.

Portland State went up 14-0 on its first possession of the second quarter. Kuresa hit Chase Loftin for 23 yards, then three plays later, facing third-and-2, the Vikings used a flea flicker to bait Montana's defenders, and the Grizzlies bit hard. Kuresa calmly hit Darnell Adams for 46-yard scoring strike.

Trailing by two touchdowns, Montana answered with its best drive of the day, going 92 yards in 10 plays to cut its deficit to 14-7 when Jeremy Calhoun went in from two yards out.

Then Kuresa struck again. The quarterback rushed three times for 65 yards on the Vikings' next possession, and his read-option keeper from 35 yards out on third-and-8 made it 21-7.

Montana caught a break late in the quarter when Chris Lider's punt hit a Portland State player and was recovered by the Grizzlies at the PSU 28. Montana would get first-and-goal at the nine, but a pair of incompletions forced the Grizzlies to settle for a field goal that made it 21-10 at the half.

Needing to get out fast to start the third quarter, Montana did anything but. Portland State went 76 yards on six plays to open the second half, with Kuresa going in from 49 yards out to make it 28-10.

On three third-quarter possessions, Montana rushed six times for five yards and completed one pass for four yards. All three ended with Chris Lider punts.

Caleb Kidder blocked a 47-yard field goal attempt by Portland State early in the fourth quarter to keep it 28-10. One PSU possession later, David Jones made it 35-10 when he got free around the right end on third-and-9 and scored from 37 yards out.

Simis scored from a yard out for the game's final points with 5:43 remaining. His score capped an 11-play, 72-yard drive. The extra point attempt never was after a bad snap.

Twice in the fourth quarter Simis was sacked on fourth down in Portland State territory, a result worse than a downfield interception. A pass, no matter how desperate, at least has a chance.

David Jones led Portland State with 165 rushing yards. Kuresa added 119 to help the Big Sky's No. 2 rushing attack (behind Cal Poly) finish with 339 yards on the ground. Simis, John Nguyen and Jeremy Calhoun totaled 160 for the Grizzlies.

Kuresa had just four completions, but they went for 121 yards and a pair of scores. The PSU defense limited Montana's two big-play receivers, Jamaal Jones and Ellis Henderson, to a pair of catches and 30 yards. Kendrick Van Ackeren led both teams with 11 tackles.

For Montana the unofficial playoffs—lose once and there will be no postseason.

FORTUNE FINALLY FINDS MONTANA

With Idaho State lined up for a potential game-winning 34-yard field goal in overtime, a few plays after Griz quarterback Makena Simis appeared to fumble away Montana's chances, a season of bad bounces, quarterback injuries and missed opportunities had its script flipped.

ISU's snapper fired the ball over his holder's head and bouncing down the turf at Holt Arena. Griz cornerback JR Nelson and the Idaho State holder raced for it and both fell on it. The ball bounced up, right to Eric Johnson, who went 40 yards for the game-ending (and season-saving?) touchdown.

It was a game Montana appeared to have in hand when the Grizzlies took a 21-7 lead early in the second quarter, but mostly self-inflicted damage kept Montana from pulling away or, in the second half, even keeping the lead.

The Grizzlies missed a pair of field goals, went scoreless on a drive that reached the ISU 1-yard line, saw the opening kickoff of the second half, returned for a touchdown by Ellis Henderson, called back because of a penalty, and won despite fumbling the ball away on their opening possession of overtime.

It was the seventh time in nine games this season Montana's opponent has scored points on its opening possession of the game. Six of those have been touchdowns.

On Saturday the Grizzlies had an immediate response. On their opening drive they went 75 yards in nine plays, with Simis doing his best Alex Kuresa impersonation. The quarterback ran for 33 yards and threw for 12 more on the drive. John Nguyen made it 7-7 when he scampered in from 28 yards out.

Montana forced a three-and-out on Idaho State's next possession, and a poor punt set the Grizzlies up at ISU's 45.

Simis hit Nguyen out of the backfield for 10 yards to the 30 on 3rd-and-five, and Jeremy Calhoun did the rest. His 27-yard run set Montana up at the three. He scored on the next play to make it 14-7.

The Grizzlies generated 172 yards of offense in the first quarter, 115 of it coming on the ground.

On its first possession of the second quarter, Montana appeared ready to go up 21-7 when the Grizzlies drove inside the ISU 10-yard line.

Facing 3rd-and-goal at the two, Nguyen was stopped a yard short of the end zone, and Montana hurried into its fourth-down play in an attempt to catch Idaho State off guard. Simis opted for a keeper, and he was driven back to the four, turning the ball over on downs.

So the defense took matters into its own hands. Gueller's short pass from his own 21 was bobbled by the intended receiver, then kicked into the air. Nelson gathered it and strolled untouched into the end zone to make it 21-7. And the rout was on. Or shoulda-woulda-coulda been.

Daniel Sullivan's 52-yard field goal attempt later in the second quarter was blocked, and Idaho State responded with a drive that kept the Bengals in the game.

Montana opened the game fast and got an electric start to the second half when Ellis Henderson took the opening kickoff 65 yards for a touchdown. Amid the celebration of a two-touchdown lead, a flag on the carpet.

The Grizzlies again got inside the ISU 10 on its second possession of the third quarter, but the drive, which featured 55 rushing yards and a 1st-and-goal at the three, fizzled, and Daniel Sullivan made it 24-13 with a 23-yard field goal.

A Nate Harris interception in the end zone thwarted an ISU drive late in the third quarter, but Simis gave the ball back three plays later when he was intercepted at the Montana 32.

Needing to make a game-defining statement of a drive, Montana went three-and-out, and Jakori Ford put ISU up 25-24 when he ran in from 53 yards out with just over 10 minutes remaining. Gueller hit Graves for the two-point conversion, 27-24. Somehow Idaho State had the lead. The Grizzlies would get to the ISU 9-yard line but no farther. Sullivan was true from 26 yards out to make it 27-27.

Montana had the final possession after Johnson intercepted Gueller's wild heave down the field into traffic, giving the Grizzlies the ball at their own 26 and 52 seconds with which to work. They would make it to the Idaho State 44 before time ran out.

Gueller hit Tyler Graves from three yards out to bring the Bengals within five, 24-19, in the opening minute of the fourth quarter. Idaho State's two-point attempt -- both of them, actually, after a Montana penalty -- were unsuccessful.

Montana had the first possession of overtime and stuck to a ground game that produced a season-high 265 rushing yards. A nine-yard effort by Calhoun set the Grizzlies up 1st-and-goal at the two and gave the freshman 98 yards on the day. Just two more for an even 100 and the lead. Simple enough.

Idaho State gave the ball to Xavier Finney three straight times to set itself up in the middle of the field. After a Montana timeout, the field-goal attempt. And the rest is a sequence for the history book.

A high snap. A scramble for the loose ball. Johnson running toward the end zone. A video review. The official signaling touchdown.

GRIZZLY DEFENSE PROVES ITS METTLE AGAINST EAGLES

The last four times Montana and Eastern Washington met on the field, the Eagles walked away victorious. Eastern scored a combined for a total of 147 points in those four games, dating back to 2012.

On Saturday, the Grizzly defense, led by a talented group of seniors who had never defeated Eastern in their careers, shut down one of the best offenses in the country in a blowout Montana victory.

In the team meeting on Friday night, Derek Crittenden made a point in emphasizing the defense started fast. Montana allowed a chunk of yards on the Eagles' first drive, Ty Gregorak's defense stepped up when needed.

"Early I thought they were moving the ball decently against us, but it was nice to see us buckle down," Gregorak said. "I really thought, 'Man are we going to give up another opening drive?'"

The Eagles drove all the way to the Montana 28 before Reilly Hennessey mishandled a fourth down snap and Crittenden scooped up the fumble. The Grizzlies would only allow three first quarter points, and the offense scored on back-to-back drives to give Montana an early lead, which forced Eastern to take to the air.

"It was key being able to get up early on them, because we forced them to throw the ball," defensive-end Tyrone Holmes said. "Our cover guys did a great job covering, and that was key in allowing us time to get to the quarterback."

In the first drive of the second quarter, the Eagles went for it on fourth down, but Homes and Crittenden sacked Hennessey to force a turnover on downs.

On the next Eastern drive, Yamen Sanders made perhaps the biggest play of the game, breaking free on a safety blitz to crush Hennessey, forcing a fumble that Herbert Gamboa returned for six.

Eastern received the ball coming out of the halftime break and fumbled after just two plays, which Montana turned into three points. Kendrick Van Ackeren intercepted Jordan West on the first play of the next drive, returning it all the way to the Eastern two-yard line.

Later in the third quarter, JR Nelson intercepted a pass and returned it for a touchdown for the second straight game, giving Montana their second defensive touchdown of the game.

Markel Sanders added a fourth quarter interception, as Montana forced a season high six turnovers in a game decided by momentum built off of big plays.

"It was just a huge momentum game where it seemed like we had it for most of the game," Holmes said. "The guys were making plays and it was fun to be out there, because we know how hard each other works during the offseason so it was fun seeing those big plays."

When fans see the 57 points on the board, they may assume that the offense ran the ball up and down the field against a weak Eastern defense. In reality, the defense is largely responsible for the high point total on Saturday.

Kendrick Van Ackeren made the most of his return to the field, as he finished with a game-high 16 tackles, including half a sack. He also nearly returned his interception for a touchdown, and just missed on another interception at the end of the first half.

Tyrone Holmes continued his dominating season, taking advantage of the pass-heavy Eastern offense and recording three sacks to extend his FCS-leading total to 14.

The three-sack performance also moved Holmes into fourth on the all-time sack list at Montana with 30.5, and he also moved up into sixth on the tackle for loss list with 42.5.

The 16 points were the fewest the Montana defense allowed against Eastern since the win in 2011. It was the first win against the Eagles for the senior class, and it came during their final regular season game at home.

"I'm mostly proud of our seniors. We have so many seniors, whether they are a starter, or they are Connor Lebsock and they come in when they're needed, I'm just so proud of this class," Gregorak said. "They've helped us win a lot of games in their four or five years here and I give them all the credit, my hats off to them."

The Montana defense stepped up their game in impressive fashion on Saturday, and they are playing well as they have all season as they prepare for the final week of the season.

GRIZ WIN, MAKE STRONG CASE FOR FCS PLAYOFFS

On Saturday at Bozeman, the Grizzlies raced out to a 31-7 first-half lead and defeated the Bobcats for the 72nd time in the schools' long-running rivalry.

Brady Gustafson threw for 353 yards and four touchdowns, three to Jamaal Jones, and Montana (7-4, 6-2 BSC) sent most of the 20,507 in attendance packing before game's end, looking ahead to next year. Griz fans can start thinking about next week.

Saturday's game did not start out looking like it would be a lopsided Montana victory. After the Grizzlies went three-and-out on their first possession, the Bobcats (5-6, 3-5 BSC) went 88 yards in just five plays to make it 7-0 less than four minutes in.

Dakota Prukop's 46-yard strike to Beau Sandland not only opened the scoring, it gave the quarterback his 36th touchdown of the season -- 26 through the air, 10 on the ground -- breaking the Montana State single-season record. He would add three more scores before his day was done.

Montana gained one yard on its next possession, going three-and-out again, then unleashed what Stitt likes to call "championship football." That term, defined: The Grizzlies scored on their final seven possessions of the first half to blow the game open and take a 37-14 lead to the locker room.

Montana State would come within a two-point conversion early in the fourth quarter of cutting Montana's lead to one possession, but an eight-play, 75-yard drive, capped by a Gustafson-to-Jones 17-yard touchdown, made it 51-35 and put an end to any chance of a comeback.

After Daniel Sullivan hit the first of his four field goals on the afternoon, a 44-yarder that cut the MSU lead to 7-3, Kendrick Van Ackeren stepped in front of a sideline route and intercepted Prukop for turnover No. 1.

Eight plays later, Gustafson hit Jones streaking across the field on a crossing pattern to put Montana up 10-7. The Grizzlies would keep the lead the rest of the afternoon.

MSU went nowhere on its next possession and was forced to punt. But the punt never came. The snap was mishandled by the punter, and he was tackled at the Montana State 18 for turnover No. 2. Three plays later, Jeremy Calhoun ran in untouched off a draw to make it 17-7.

It was one of many plays Saturday that was changed at the line of scrimmage by Gustafson.

Perhaps sensing that his defense was going to be unable to contain Montana's offense, MSU coach Rob Ash went for it on fourth down on his team's next two possessions, including a fourth-and-3 from the Bobcats' own 38.

Prukop called his own number and ran for 35 yards, but all but two of it was parallel to the line of scrimmage. Van Ackeren, not tricked by Prukop's change of field, eventually pulled the quarterback down a yard short of the marker, one of Van Ackeren's team-high 13 tackles on the day.

One play after Montana State's first failed fourth-down attempt, Gustafson hit Jones, who made a SportsCenter-worthy one-handed grab to make it 24-7, and the Griz were off and running. And rolling on both sides of the ball.

Van Ackeren tackled Sandland short of the first-down marker on a fourth-and-6 on MSU's next possession, leading to two words that had Montana State's fans ill at ease all afternoon: Grizzly ball.

Less than two minutes later, Gustafson hit Ellis Henderson, covered one-on-one on the right side (note to defensive coordinators: don't do that; scratch that: keep doing it), for a 49-yard scoring strike. Midway through the second quarter it was 31-7.

Prukop made it 31-14 with a two-yard scoring run, and Sullivan kicked a pair of field goals, from 32 and 24 yards out, to make it 37-14 at the half.

Gustafson had 227 passing yards and three touchdowns in the first half, and Montana rolled up 321 yards of offense.

The game felt out of reach when Calhoun scored from 10 yards out late in the third quarter and when the Grizzlies took a 44-22 lead into the fourth. Then it got uncomfortably tight in a hurry.

Montana State put together 73- and 75-yard scoring drives to make it 44-35, the second score coming when Sandland, all 6-foot-5 of him, somehow snuck unnoticed into the left flat and went in untouched from 22 yards out after catching a pass from Prukop.

Montana put the game away on its next drive, going 75 yards in eight plays -- that's championship football -- to make it 51-35. With Montana at midfield, Gustafson, in quick succession, hit Henderson for 12 yards, Ben Roberts for 23 and Jones with a scoring pass from 17 yards out. Game. Over.

Jones finished with nine catches for 132 yards, Henderson with three grabs for 91 yards and Roberts with three receptions for 48 yards. John Nguyen accounted for 134 of Montana's 184 rushing yards.

Sullivan hit his fourth field goal, from 35 yards out, in the final minute for the game's final points.

GRIZ DEFEAT JACKRABBITS, SET UP PLAYOFF REMATCH WITH NDSU

The Montana Grizzlies (8-4) roared out to a 24-0 halftime lead over the visiting South Dakota State Jackrabbits (8-4) at Washington-Grizzly Stadium on Saturday, and fought off a second half comeback from the Jacks to take a 24-17 win in the first round of the NCAA Division I Playoffs.

The Griz defense was the story however, with senior Jeremiah Kose recovering a fumble, the Griz secondary coming up with nine big pass breakups, and Tyrone Holmes once again cementing his status as one of Montana's all-time greats.

Holmes made life difficult for SDSU quarterback Taryn Christian all day long, adding three sacks to his national-best 14 for 17 now on the season, adding three tackles for loss, and two quarterback hits.

Two plays later, he found Jamaal Jones for a score on a short curl route, and a Daniel Sullivan extra point gave Montana a 7-0 lead at the end of the first quarter.

After the Grizzly defense forced another three-and-out, UM took the ball and drove straight down the field again, as John Nguyen busted off an 18-yard gain on the second play of the drive. Horner, who had a career day with six receptions for 80 yards, brought in another big reception, this one for 24-yards to get Montana within striking distance.

Gustafson then looked for the home-run ball, airing a pass out down the right sideline toward Ellis Henderson. The junior receiver rose up to meet the ball at its peak, bringing it down in the end zone and putting Montana ahead 14-0 after the PAT.

The defense continued the bend but don't break mentality on SDSU's next drive, as the Jackrabbits made it all the way down to the Grizzlies' 26-yard line. After Taryn Christian was sacked on second down, he couldn't create anything on third and long, running out of bounds at the 34-yard line.

The play set up a fourth-and-11, and South Dakota State elected to leave the offense on the field to try to cut into the mounting deficit. On a designed quarterback run, Christian was brought down at the line of scrimmage by Jeremiah Kose and Caleb Kidder, forcing a turnover on downs and giving the ball right back to the rolling Montana offense.

Sullivan knocked home a 25-yard field goal to put the Griz ahead 17-0 with 2:53 remaining in the half.

A quick three-and-out by South Dakota State gave the ball back to Montana at the SDSU 48 with 1:51 left on the clock. After a nine-yard completion to Horner, Nguyen ran for two straight first downs and brought the ball down to the SDSU five-yard line.

Freshman Jeremy Calhoun carried the ball on back-to-back plays, punching it in from the two-yard line and putting Montana ahead 24-0 at the halftime break.

Both teams started the second half very cold, as the teams combined to punt the ball four times in the first four minutes of game time. On South Dakota State's third drive of the half, Christian threw three consecutive incompletions, and SDSU settled for a Jay Carlson field goal to cut the Montana lead to 24-3.

The Grizzlies went three-and-out for the third consecutive time to open the half on their next drive, giving the ball back to a South Dakota State offense that was beginning to find some confidence and rhythm.

A huge pass down the sideline to Wieneke for 36 yards set the visitors up on the Montana one-yard line. Christian would keep it on a quarterback sneak two plays later, scoring the first touchdown of the game for South Dakota State and getting the Jackrabbits within two scores.

The fourth quarter started out with the same old story for Montana, as they lost three yards before punting on their opening drive. The defense stepped up and forced a stop, and the Grizzly offense finally got going on their next drive.

Gustafson found a streaking Ben Roberts behind the defense on the left sideline on the first play of the drive, gaining 62 yards and bringing Montana all the way to the South Dakota State 31-yard line. Another completion to Roberts two plays later gave Montana a first down on the SDSU 20-yard line.

Roberts finished the day setting a new career receiving mark with 133 yards on the day, the most of any receiver on the field.

On fourth-and-three, Christian found Wieneke for an eight-yard gain just outside of the red-zone. The Montana defense fired up again, sending SDSU nine yards backward over the next three plays to set up a fourth-and-19 with under five minutes to play in the game.

Christian took the snap in shotgun formation, as the Jackrabbits had to convert to keep the game alive. He looked over the middle and found Dallas Goedert in a weak spot in Montana's defense. Goedert hauled in a 30-yard pass for a crucial SDSU touchdown, making it a one-possession game at 24-17.

A completion to Jones set up Montana with another second-and-one situation, and again Nguyen was able to pick up the first down, forcing South Dakota State to burn their first timeout. Nguyen would run the ball three straight times for a combined 25 yards, forcing the Jackrabbits to use all their timeouts and putting the game on ice for Montana.

BISON OVERWHELM GRIZZLIES IN FCS PLAYOFFS

The Grizzlies can have August. The Bison will gladly continue to own December. North Dakota State, the No. 3 seed in the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision playoffs, jumped out to a 24-0 lead and powered to a 37-6 victory over Montana Saturday afternoon at Fargo, N.D., in the second round of the FCS playoffs.

The Bison returned two interceptions for touchdowns, scored on a 100-yard kickoff return for a third-quarter backbreaker and held Montana to 235 yards of offense, a season low.

North Dakota State, which is seeking its fifth straight national championship, won its 13th straight December game. NDSU will host either No. 6 Portland State or Northern Iowa next weekend in the playoffs' quarterfinal round. The Vikings host the Panthers Saturday night.

When North Dakota State (10-2) and Montana (8-5) met in Missoula in late August, a game won by the Grizzlies 38-35 on a 1-yard scoring run by Joey Counts in the closing seconds, Montana gained 544 yards of offense, 434 of that coming through the air.

That production was nowhere to be found on Saturday, as the Bison held the Grizzlies to 63 yards in the first half while jumping out to a 21-0 halftime lead.

After a 40-yard field goal early in the third quarter put NDSU up 24-0, Montana put together its only scoring drive of the game. The Grizzlies went 75 yards in seven plays and got on the board when Brady Gustafson hit Jamaal Jones on a left-side corner route. The two-point conversion attempt failed.

Bruce Anderson took the ensuing kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown, the only one allowed this season by the Grizzlies, to make it 31-6, and Montana, which did not move the ball into North Dakota State territory its final six possessions, went quietly into the offseason.

In the here and now, however, it's the Bison's world, at least for now.

After Montana opened the game with a harbinger of things to come -- three plays, four yards, punt -- North Dakota State, matching what it did in the teams' first matchup in Missoula, went up 7-0 on its first possession.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Easton Stick, making his seventh start in place of senior Carson Wentz, who was lost for the season in NDSU's 24-21 home loss to South Dakota in mid-October, kept the ball on a savvy read off a stretch power play and raced up the middle untouched from 49 yards out.

It was the eighth time in 13 games this season that Montana allowed its opponent to score a touchdown on its opening possession.

Montana was in North Dakota State territory its next two possessions, but both ended with Chris Lider punts. Defensively the Grizzlies forced the Bison into punts on three of their next four possessions. NDSU also missed a field goal that kept it 7-0 into the second quarter.

Gustafson's first of three first-half interceptions, grabbed by Tre Dempsey at the Montana 47 early in the second quarter, did not hurt the Grizzlies. The Bison gained five yards in three plays and had to punt.

His second interception, on Montana's next possession, was more damaging. Gustafson attempted to hit John Nguyen out of the backfield, but the running back never saw the ball, and Jalen Allison returned it 30 yards to make it 14-0.

After another three-and-out for Montana -- the Grizzlies' first-half possessions: punt, punt, punt, punt, interception, interception, punt, interception -- North Dakota State went 70 yards in six plays, going up 21-0 on a 15-yard sweep around the right end by Anderson.

It was 21-0 at the half, with the Bison outgaining the Grizzlies 210-63. Montana, which rushed for almost 800 yards its previous four games, was held to just 15 on the ground. The Grizzlies would finish with a season-low six for the game.

Down 24-0 after North Dakota State's first possession of the second half, Montana finally looked like the team that put up 57 points on Eastern Washington and 54 on Montana State.

Gustafson hit Jones for 15 yards on third-and-15 to get the drive started, then hit Ellis Henderson down the right sideline for 39 yards. Facing third-and-4 from the NDSU 20, Gustafson hit Jones from 20 yards out to make it 24-6.

After Anderson's 100-yard kickoff return made it 31-6, Montana drove deep enough to give Daniel Sullivan a 49-yard field goal attempt with 6:27 remaining in the third quarter, but his kick was wide right, and the Grizzlies would not take another snap in Bison territory.

CJ Smith intercepted Gustafson early in the fourth quarter and returned it 32 yards for the game's final points. North Dakota State, the FCS leader in time of possession, finished with 316 yards of offense and controlled the ball for more than 40 of the game's 60 minutes.

One of 17 seniors playing in his final game, Jeremiah Kose led both teams with 19 tackles. Fellow senior Tyrone Holmes, one of three finalists for STATS FCS Defensive Player of the Year, had one sack, bringing his career total to 34.5, second in program history behind Zack Wagenmann.

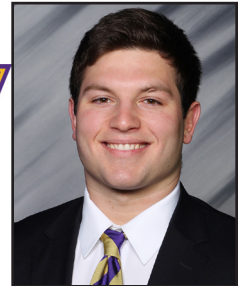

The Big Sky Conference enters its 54th year and 29th year of women's competition during the 2016-17 academic year.

Four of the current league members – Idaho State University, The University of Montana, Montana State and Weber State – have been with the league since its birth. Fellow charter member the University of Idaho returned most of its sports to the Big Sky on July 1, 2014. Northern Arizona University enters its 47th season in the league, giving the league five members with at least 40 years of continuous membership.

The Big Sky Conference welcomed North Dakota and Southern Utah on July 1, 2012 as full members. UC Davis and Cal Poly joined as football affiliate members. Eastern Washington University, the University of Northern Colorado, Portland State University and Sacramento State round out the current membership.

The Big Sky Conference was established in 1963 by six charter members – Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga, Montana, Montana State and Weber State. Those six schools formed the

foundation of the Big Sky before the league expanded in 1970 by adding Boise State and Northern Arizona. Gonzaga left the Sky in 1979 and was replaced by Nevada, which gave the league eight members. The conference grew to nine schools in 1987 with the addition of Eastern Washington.

The 1990s saw change in the makeup of the league, beginning in 1992 when Nevada departed and put the Big Sky back at eight teams. In 1996 Boise State and Idaho left and at the same time the conference added Portland State, Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge. The Big Sky maintained nine teams for five years before Cal State Northridge departed in the spring of 2001.

The University of Idaho, which was a member from 1963-96, rejoined the conference in the 2015-16 season. Idaho football will once again compete in the Big Sky football beginning with the 2016-17 season.

On Feb 25, 1963, the name Big Sky was adopted by the six presidents of the charter members as the name of the new conference. The name Big Sky originated in a novel written by the late A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont., in 1947 entitled "The Big Sky." Jack Hollowell, a former Montana advertising director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. While on a track and field trip from Pocatello, Idaho, to Missoula, Mont., legendary Dubby Holt of Idaho State saw a "Welcome to Big Sky Country" sign as his team entered Montana. Holt, and his athletes thought "Big Sky" would be a perfect name for the new conference. Harry Missildine of the

Spokane Spokesman-Review called for the newly formed league to be named the Big Sky Conference in his column dated Feb. 20, 1963.

The Big Sky sponsors championships in 16 sports, including men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, basketball and tennis. In addition, there are also championships in football, and women's volleyball, golf and soccer. The Big Sky sponsored softball for the first time in 2013. Men's golf returned as a championship sport in 2014-15 for the first time since 2002. The University of Hartford and Binghamton University have joined the Big Sky as affiliate members in golf.

In 1988-89, the Big Sky Conference first began sponsoring women's sports. The former Mountain West Conference existed from 1982-88, sponsoring championships for women's sports at the same institutions the Big Sky had men's programs. The Big Sky merged with the Mountain West in 1988, forming one league for both men and women.

Andrea Williams became the sixth commissioner beginning July 1, 2016 and replaces Doug Fullerton, the fifth commissioner of the Big Sky Conference, who retired in June 2016. Fullerton took over the Big Sky on July 1, 1995, replacing longtime commissioner Ron Stephenson, who passed away in 2011. Stephenson served the league for 14 years. Steve Belko was the commissioner from 1977-81, while John Roning held the post from 1971-77. The first league commissioner was Jack Friel, who served from 1963-71.

Williams is currently the chair of the NCAA WBCO, and is the past president of the Collegiate Event and Facility Managers Association, under NACDA. She also volunteers at several major events such as the CFP National Championship Game, Super Bowl and Transplant Games of America.

"I'm thrilled to have been selected as the next commissioner of the Big Sky Conference, and I'm excited to guide the league into the next era of academic and athletic achievement," said Williams. "I am grateful to the President's Council and selection committee for the opportunity to work with an outstanding group of institutions that prioritize the student-athlete experience and higher education."

Williams' experience competing in two sports at the Division I level have provided her with a

unique perspective of the welfare of the student-athlete. She said, "I believe in the collegiate model and the benefit sport and academics plays in the lives of young adults."

Williams earned a Master of Sport Administration in the School of Business from Ohio University in April 2016.

In her new role as commissioner, Williams will draw on her experience with the Big Ten and its progressive initiatives that have focused on member institution cooperation, broad based programming, innovative television and technology platforms and athlete health and safety, to shape and develop her vision for the Big Sky Conference.

Gene Smith, Athletic Director at Ohio State University praised Williams, "The Big Sky Conference is fortunate to have such a dynamic leader as Andrea Williams. Her NCAA and conference experience will significantly benefit all Big Sky members. A tremendous person!!! What an outstanding hire, WOW!!!"

Williams began her service for the Big Sky on July 1, 2016.

BIG SKY SWEEPS STATS AWARDS

A banner season for the Big Sky Conference ended with a national celebration of the league's best. Overall, four Big Sky football players and coaches earned national awards from STATS, as part of the news organization's 2016 FCS Awards gala in Frisco, Texas, where Saturday's FCS national championship game will be played. Eastern Washington wide receiver Cooper Kupp won the FCS Offensive Player of the Year; Montana defensive end Tyrone Holmes won the FCS Defensive Player of the Year; Northern Arizona quarterback Case Cookus won the FCS Freshman of the Year; and Portland State coach Bruce Barnum won the FCS Coach of the Year award.

Cookus finished the season with 37 touchdown passes- a new FCS record for a freshman quarterback- while throwing for 3,110 yards. Cookus led the nation in passer-efficiency, with a rating of 184.9. Barnum helped lead the Vikings to many firsts on the field in 2015, but the most significant to him was earned the Big Sky's Coach of the Year award. He did much more than just earn a postseason award; he led the Vikings to their first playoff berth since 2000, and was 5-0 against ranked teams in the regular season.

The season Montana defensive end Tyrone Holmes had was magical, as the Grizzlies upset the top-ranked North Dakota State Bison in the

opening game, before moving on to a second-round appearance in the FCS playoffs. Holmes finished the season with 17.5 tackles-for-loss, 14 sacks and two forced fumbles. Kupp finished the season with 1,642 receiving yards, on 114 receptions. The junior finished with 19 touchdowns, and eight 100-yard receiving games. Kupp also set the alltime record for yards at Oregon's Autzen Stadium. Southern Utah defensive end James Cowser and Portland State safety Patrick Onwuasor finished as finalists for the FCS Defensive Player of the Year award.

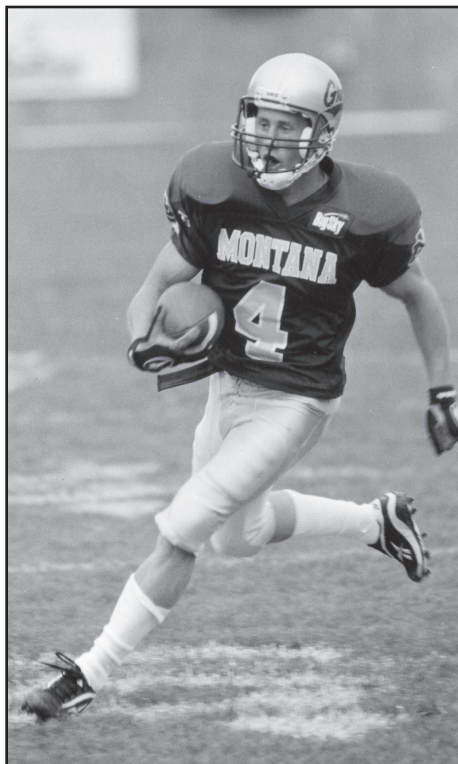

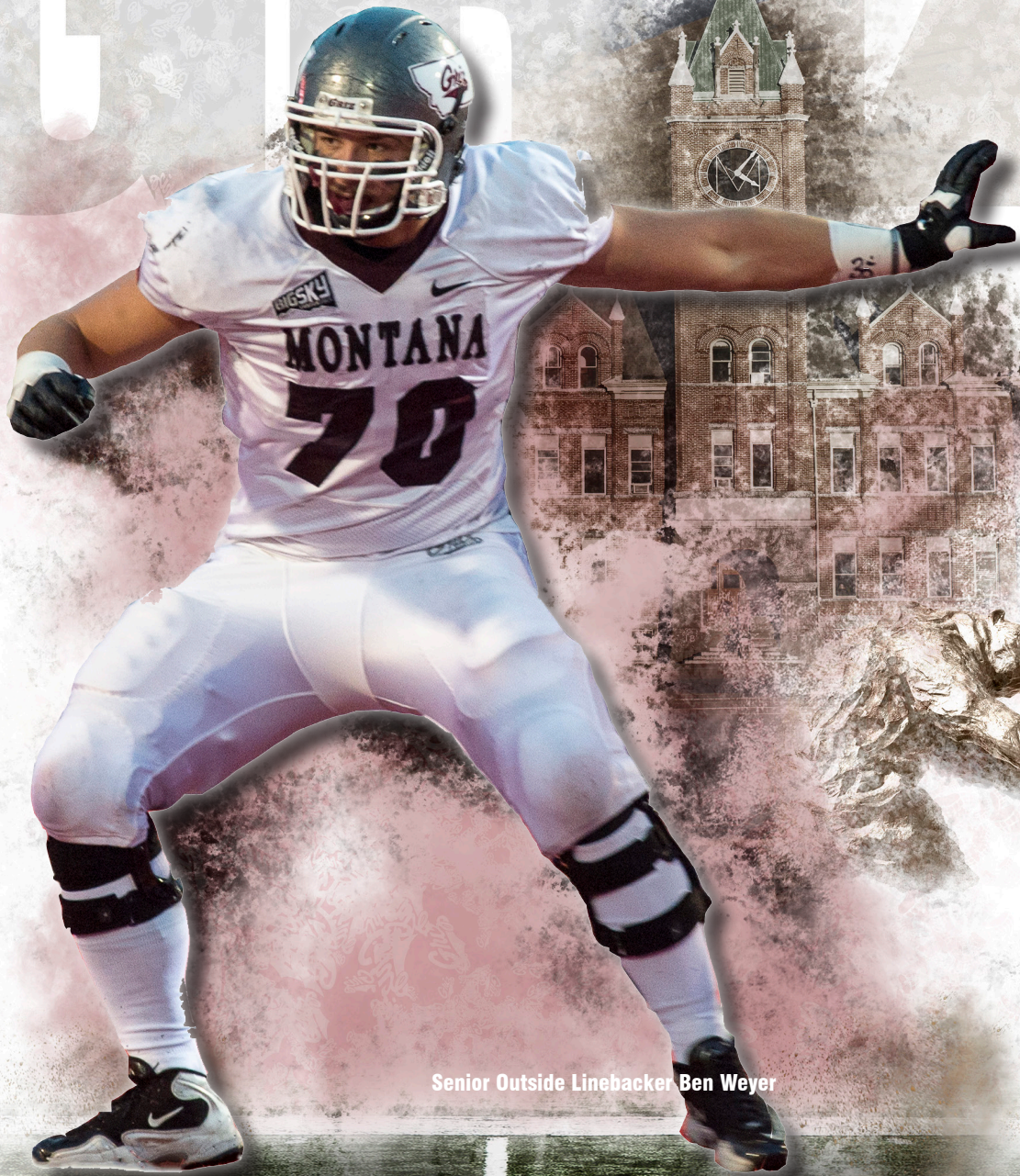

**Fred Smith
1897**

"Two years after The University of Montana opened its doors to students, the first football team was organized.

Professor Fred D. Smith, chemistry professor and former football player at Cornell University, volunteered to coach the football team. Twenty-four men turned out. No uniforms were available so many of the players used makeshift clothing."

**F.B. Seabright
1898**

"Sgt. B.F. Seabright, a graduate and former player at Stanford, was a coach in 1898. He was engaged by the university as instructor in general athletics.

Students raised an initial \$110 to help pay the coach's salary.

Charles Allard kicked the first field goal in the state of Montana at the Thanksgiving game vs. the Montana State College Aggies in Missoula. Montana won 16-0." -- *The Redbook*

**Guy Cleveland
1899**

"Prospects for a first class team were not very bright at the start of the 1899 season when Guy Cleveland took over the team. Scarce any of the old players were back and positions had to be filled with untried material."

"In the first game against the Anaconda Athletic Club, Coach Cleveland played right half-back. He made the two touchdowns and kicked goal both times to win for the varsity."

**Frank Bean
1900-1901**

"Frank Bean from the University of Wisconsin was selected as coach. A game with Anaconda failed to materialize, therefore, the only game scheduled

in 1900 was with Montana State College."

**Dewitt Peck
1902**

1903-1904**

"Hiram Conibear coached at Illinois University before coming to UM.

The 1903 team was the first university football team to be sent out of the state to compete in an athletic contest.

Coach Conibear will be remembered by University of Montana fans for at least one contribution, his 1904 team ran up the biggest score in football history against Montana State College, 79-0."

**F.W. Schule
1905-1906**

A writeup of the 1906 season by Coach Schule in the yearbook says, "as interesting and as spectacular a game of football as the writer has seen in the far west was played on the Montana field on October 19th. Our men succeeded in holding Washington State's undefeated team to the closest score made against them this season."

Albion Findley 1907

"Coach Findley had been a member of the All-Western Conference team while attending the University of Wisconsin.

"Roy "Cupid" White, All-Western tackle at the University of Iowa in 1905, was selected to coach the Montana team.

The 1909 team was the first Montana football team to be undefeated." -- *The Redbook*

Robert Cary, 1910-11

"Montana was very successful using the forward pass in 1910." -- *The Redbook*

Lt. W.C. Philoon, 1912

Lt. Philoon was an All American player (center) at West Point.

A.G. Heilman, 1913-14

"This was the best team that Montana had yet produced, and Montana was undefeated and had one scoreless tie with Idaho in 1914.

Richard Howell of the Law School wrote the song: "Up With Montana" (UM's fight song) in 1914." -- *The Redbook*



Jerry Nissen 1915-1917

"The biggest game of the season and one of the biggest in Montana history came Thanksgiving Day 1915 when the powerful Syracuse University team invaded Missoula for the first intersectional game in the state.

Coach Jerry Nissen returned from the Northwest Conference meeting at Seattle in 1916 with the news that Montana had been admitted to the conference.

Coach Nissen resigned at the end of the 1917 season to join the Army. The coach had compiled a record of 14-7-4 in three seasons."

Bernie Bierman 1919-1921

"Bernie Bierman, the new coach, was an All-America halfback at the University of Minnesota in 1915.

Probably no season up to this time saw more "firsts"

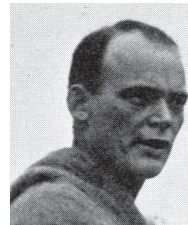
than in 1920. The Grizzlies beat the University of Washington for the only time in history. Montana's football field was moved and named "Dornblaser Field" in honor of Paul Dornblaser, the great Grizzly tackle, who was killed in action in World War I. Finally, the Grizzlies ran up their biggest score in history, a 133-0 pasting of Mount St. Charles." (Carroll College) -- *The Redbook*



J.W. Stewart 1922-1923

"John W. Stewart, a graduate of Geneva College, Penn., was selected from a list of 50 candidates to succeed Bernie Bierman.

He was to be head coach of the football, basketball and track teams." -- *The Redbook*



Earl Clark 1924-1925

"Earl "Click" Clark became the second Montana graduate to coach a Grizzly team in 1924.

Coach Clark resigned at the end of the 1925 season to accept the position of trainer at the University of Washington. He held this position until his retirement." -- *The Redbook*



Frank Milburn 1926-1930

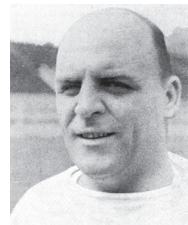
"Major Frank Milburn, a West Point graduate and winner of the Athletic Saber, emblematic of the best athlete at West Point, became head of the R.O.T.C.

and head football coach.

The 1930 season highlights were victories over Montana State College, University of Idaho and Gonzaga University.

Major "Shrimp" Milburn closed his coaching career at the University of Montana due to Army orders transferring him to another station."

Bernard Oakes 1931-1934

"Bernard F. "Bunny" Oakes, who had been line coach at the University of Nebraska for the past five years, became Major Milburn's successor as head coach of football for the 1931 season.

Robert Stansberry and Henry Blastic made honorable mention All Americans.

Bernard Oakes left after the 1934 season to coach football at the University of Colorado."

Doug Fessenden 1935-1941

"Douglas Fessenden, Fenger High School coach in Chicago, was selected as head football coach at the university in April of 1935.

"Man of the Year" was the honor accorded Douglas Fessenden by the Kaimin in 1935 for the distinguished work done by him in raising Montana to a prominent place in Pacific Coast Conference football. Fessenden proved himself to be an able mentor and won the respect and admiration of the entire school.

The 1937 season was the most successful football season since 1914. Montana won six consecutive games in 1937 which is the first time in history Montana won as many games.

The highlight of the 1939 season was the 13-0 win over the University of Idaho, smashing the Idaho jinx and giving Montana possession of the Little Brown Stein for the first time.

The 1941 football season was a successful year as well, UM going 6-3. 1946-1948 (14-15)

Douglas Fessenden returned from the Army Air Corp in time to take over his duties as head football coach.

Montana enjoyed a successful 1947 season winning 7 games and losing 4 and defeated Washington State College and the University of Idaho on their home grounds.

Fessenden resigned in 1948 and the following year received his doctors degree in Physical Education from Columbia University. Fessenden had the best win and loss record in football of any university football coach up until that time." -- *The Redbook*



George Dahlberg 1945

"George "Jiggs" Dahlberg from the University of Montana coached football for the 1945 season.

Dr. J.E. "Burly" Miller, faculty athletic representative ruled that the University of Montana, "must follow pre-war Pacific Coast Conference rules." -- *The Redbook*

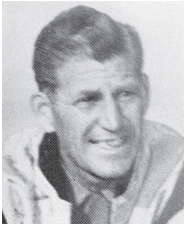


Ted Shipkey 1949-1951

"Ted Shipkey began his coaching stint at the University of Montana in 1949.

The passing combination of Ray Bauer (end) and Tom Kingsford (quarterback) in 1950 was one of the best in University history. Montana withdrew from the Pacific Coast Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference which is also known as the "Skyline" Conference.

Ted Shipkey resigned as football coach in 1951." -- *The Redbook*



Ed Chinske 1952-1954

"Edward Chinske became the next UM head football coach in 1952.

Richard (Dick) Imer was selected for All-American honors in 1953. Imer and Joe DeLuca were chosen to several All-American teams in 1954." -- *Redbook*



Jerry Williams 1955-1957

"UM's fund-raising arm, the Century Club, got its start in 1955, the same year as Head Coach Jerry Williams arrived.

Aside from the fact that Stanley Renning was considered one of the greatest sophomores to ever appear in a Grizzly uniform, the 1956 campaign was a dismal one.

Coach Jerry Williams, who had played professional football with the Philadelphia Eagles, left UM to be an assistant coach for the Eagles."

Ray Jenkins 1958-1963

"Ray Jenkins' first year as football coach was a poor debut with an 0-10 record, the worst in Montana history.

The Grizzlies came up with their best passing attack in 10 season during 1959, a campaign that also marked the end of a 15-game losing streak when the Grizzlies scored a 12-0 upset over Brigham Young.

Terry Dillon was selected and played in the East-West Shrine game January 1963.

The 1963 football season was unsuccessful - winning one game and losing nine. Ray Jenkins resigned at the close of the 1963 football season."

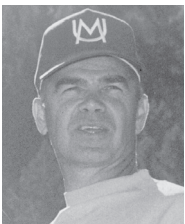

Hugh Davidson 1964-1966

"In 1964 Hugh Davidson become the new head coach. The Terry Dillon Award was established for the most valuable player on the football team.

Davidson resigned at the end of the 1966 football season." -- *Redbook*



Jack Swarthout 1967-1975

"Since assuming the duties of both head football coach and AD at UM in 1967, Jack Swarthout put a drive into the school's athletic program which had

not been seen in Missoula for several years.

Montana won the Big Sky Conference championship in 1969 for the first time since conference football began in 1963.

Coach Swarthout and his staff received considerable praise for the excellent job of coaching Montana to its second consecutive undefeated regular season play in 1970. The team played in the Camillia Bowl, losing to UND 31-16. There were several Grizzlies selected to various All-American teams in 1971.

Swarthout resigned as football coach at the close of the 1975 season. He chose to return to high school teaching and coaching at Capital High, Olympia, Wash. Swarthout left UM as the winningest football coach in the University's history with a nine-year record of 51 wins, 41 losses and one tie. He won two consecutive Big Sky football championships (1969 and 1970)." -- *The Redbook*



Gene Carlson 1976-1979

"The 1976 football season opened with Eugene Carlson as the new head football coach. Carlson inherited the coaching staff of the preceding administration (Jack Swarthout), as

well as the offensive system (Wishbone or Texas Y). However, Gene made some changes in the offense formation."

Carlson was an alumnus of UM and was a very successful high school coach in Great Falls prior to coming to the University of Montana. A greater success was expected by those in power so Carlson resigned at the close of the 1979 season." -- *The Redbook*



Larry Donovan 1980-1985

Larry Donovan was selected to replace Gene Carlson. Donovan was a graduate of the University of Nebraska and came to Montana from the University of Kansas where he had been an assistant coach.

The 1981 season was positive, as Donovan was rebuilding the football program, and 1982 saw the Grizzlies in a first-round playoff game at Idaho along with winning the Big Sky Conference title. However, the next three seasons had more L's than W's, and after the 1985 season, Donovan, and most of his coaching staff, did not have their contracts renewed for the 1986 season.



Don Read 1986-1995

Don Read is Montana's all-time winningest coach. He came to Montana from Portland State in 1986.

Read never had a losing season as head mentor to the Grizzlies. In Montana's 96-year football history. Also during his 10-year tenure, he was 10-0 against the MSU Bobcats. The Grizzlies advanced to the playoffs five out of the 10 years he coached, winning the Division I-AA (FCS) national championship in 1995. He was also selected the Division I-AA Coach of the Year in 1995 and coached Dave Dickenson, the 1995 Walter Payton Award winner.

During his tenure, the Griz had an overall record of 85-36, and his 85 overall wins at UM and 54 Big Sky victories rank him second in conference history.



Joe Glenn 2000-2002

Joe Glenn came to Montana after a very long, successful 11-year career at Northern Colorado where the Bears won back-to-back NCAA Division II national football championships in 1996 and 1997.

In Joe's first year as head coach at Montana, he won the Eddie Robinson Award, given annually to the I-AA (FCS) coach of the year. He was also the Big Sky Conference's coach of the year. That year he took the 13-1 Griz to the Division I-AA national championship game, where the Griz lost to Georgia Southern, 27-25.

Glenn repeated the trip to the title game in 2001, this time winning the championship, beating Furman 13-6. The Griz were once again conference champs for the second year in a row. The Griz were co-conference champs in 2002.

Glenn was hired as Wyoming's 30th head football coach Dec. 12, 2002 and is now the head coach at South Dakota.



Bobby Hauck 2003-2009

Bobby Hauck became Montana's 33rd head football coach in Jan. of 2003. He came to UM from the University of Washington where he was assistant coach. Hauck graduated

from UM.

Hauck had a successful head coaching career at Montana, taking his teams to the playoffs all seven of his years here, appearing in national championship games in 2004 and 2008, and the semifinals in 2006.

He had 80 wins at UM. Hauck was selected the Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year in 2006, 2007 and 2009. He was a finalist for the



Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award in 2009. He had nine players selected to the all-conference first team in 2009, and Montana led the conference in rushing offense, scoring offense, total defense and scoring defense that season.

Along with his head coaching duties, Hauck also coached special teams. He was the AFCA Regional Coach of the Year in 2009.

Hauck took over the head coaching position at UNLV in December of 2009.



**Robin Pflugrad
2010-11**

Robin Pflugrad came to Montana from Oregon.

Pflugrad was a mentor in the prestigious PAC-10 Conference for 13 seasons with stints at Oregon,

Washington State and Arizona State. He has coached at the collegiate level for 28 years.

Pflugrad had a two-year overall record of 13-6 as head coach at Montana.

Pflugrad also coached at Montana from 1986-94, working quarterbacks, wide receivers and running backs during his first stint at UM.

He was one of 20 finalists for the Eddie Robinson Award, given to the FCS's top mentor.



**Mick Delaney
2012-2014**

Mick Delaney was 24-14 in his three seasons as the head coach at UM. His 2014 record was 9-5, and the Griz advanced to the second round of the FCS

playoffs.

Mick retired after the 2014 season.

His 24 wins were the seventh most in school history. He was the 35th head coach (since 1897) at Montana.

He completed his seventh season overall at Montana. From 2008-11 he was UM's associate head coach and oversaw the running backs. He was named a finalist for the Liberty Mutual FCS Coach of the Year in 2013.



**Bob Stitt
2015-Present**

Bob Stitt enters his second season at the helm of the Montana Grizzlies football program in 2016, after leading the Griz back to the NCAA FCS Playoffs

for the 23rd time in school history during his 2015 inaugural season.

Stitt's Grizzlies went 8-5 in his first season and finished the season tied for 2nd place in the Big Sky Conference with a 6-2 league record. A highlight of his first season as a Grizzly includes an upset of defending National Champion North Dakota State on ESPN.

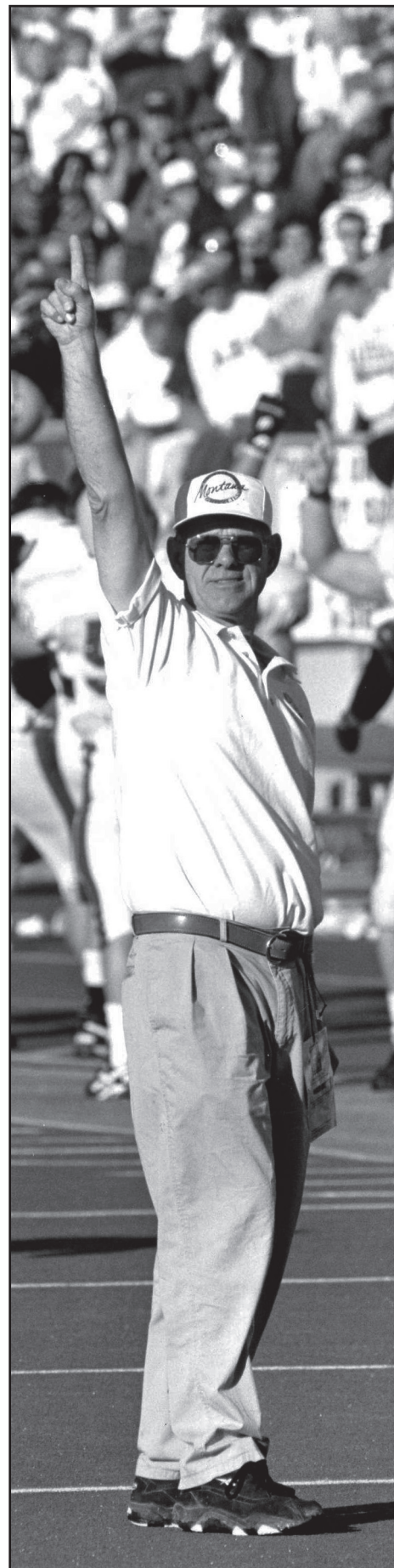

The Griz' first round opponent in the 2015 NCAA playoff season was South Dakota State; Montana won 24-17, setting off a rematch with the North Dakota State Bison in the second round.

2015: STITT LEADS GRIZ TO PLAYOFFS IN INAUGURAL SEASON

In their first year under head coach Bob Stitt, the Grizzlies made yet another appearance in the NCAA FCS/DI-AA playoffs, extending the school's record number of postseason appearances to 23, and advanced to the second round of the FCS playoffs.

The Griz finished the 2015 season at 8-5 (6-2 BSC) in Fargo, North Dakota, after falling to eventual National Champions North Dakota State 37-6 in the season's rubber match between the two FCS powers. Montana defeated NDSU 38-35 to open the season on ESPN in Missoula.

Before earning a trip to Fargo, the Grizzlies defeated South Dakota State 24-17 in the opening round of the playoffs at Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

Montana finished the regular season on a three-game win streak, and with the return of starting quarterback Brady Gustafson from injury, dismantled two of the team's biggest rivalries in the last two weeks of the season, defeating Eastern Washington 57-16 in Missoula, then traveling to Bozeman and defeating Montana State 54-35.

The winning streak was good enough for the Griz to claim a share of second place in the Big Sky Conference, and earn an at-large bid to the playoffs, where the NCAA selection committee awarded UM a home game against South Dakota State on November 28.

FIRST ROUND: Montana 24-South Dakota State 17

The No. 16 ranked Grizzlies scored all 24 of their points in the first half and held off a late rally by the No. 10 Jackrabbits to claim their third first-round win in three years.

The Griz racked up 293 yards of total offense in the first half alone, and finished with 434 yards, 295 of which came in the air for Brady Gustafson who went 24-39 and passed for a pair of touchdowns.

The Grizzly defense proved the difference maker, with Tyrone Holmes taking three sacks and Jeremiah Kose recovering a fumble to thwart the Jackrabbits' comeback.

SECOND ROUND: Montana 6- NDSU 37

On the flip side of the coin, the Grizzlies gave up 24 unanswered points to open the second round playoff game at the Fargodome against North Dakota State.

The Bison returned two interceptions for touchdowns and delivered the final blow to the Grizzlies with a 100-yard kick return by Bruce Anderson immediately following the only touchdown of the day for the Griz.

NDSU would carry on to win the program's fifth-straight FCS National Championship.

2014: GRIZ ADVANCE TO SECOND ROUND PLAYOFF GAMES

Montana extended its record number of appearances in the division I-AA/FCS playoffs to 22.

Montana dominated on both sides of the football, and the result was a 52-14 victory over the visiting Toreros in a first round NCAA FCS playoff game.

The Grizzlies scored on six of their first eight possessions in the first half and held the Toreros (9-3) of the Pioneer Football League scoreless, to jump to an insurmountable 38-0 halftime lead. The Grizzlies then scored on all four of their possessions in the second quarter.

Sophomore running back John Nguyen started UM's second quarter scoring onslaught by scoring on a 60-yard punt return, which was



his first TD return and the longest punt return of his career, and gave the Griz a 21-0 lead.

UM tallied two more unanswered TDs on scoring throws of 18 and 12 yards by senior QB Shay Smithwick-Hann to redshirt freshman receiver Josh Janssen (with 7:37 to go in the third quarter) and senior wide-out Kevin Berland.

USD finally scored with 6:05 left to play on a scoring pass from halfback Dallas Kessman to freshman wide receiver Justin Priest from 27 yards out. Priest scored again on an 11-yard touchdown throw from junior QB Trey Wheeler.

The Grizzlies out-gained the Toreros 315 to 17 in total yards, and had 18 first downs compared to USD's one. Most of Montana's starters played in just the first half.

The second time was not the charm for the unseeded 12th-ranked Grizzlies, as comeback-minded Montana lost for the second time in 2014 to the 4th-ranked Eastern Washington Eagles in a second round NCAA Division I FCS playoff game at EWU's Roos Field.

It was the final game for third-year head coach Mick Delaney, as he had announced recently that he would step down at the conclusion of the 2014 season. Montana ended its season with a 9-5 record and went 6-2 (tie, second) in the Big Sky Conference.

The Eagles (11-2) were led by junior quarterback Vernon Adams Jr. who passed for two touchdowns and ran for another, while senior halfback Quincy Forte rushed for 128 yards and a TD. Host EWU had defeated UM 36-26 earlier this season in a Big Sky Conference game on Nov. 8.

The Grizzlies had kept their comeback chance possible with 6:29 remaining, when QB Jordan Johnson connected with senior wide receiver/halfback Travon Van on a 30-yard touch-down pass, cutting EWU lead to 10 points (30-20).

Montana then stayed in the game when it stopped EWU on a fourth down conversion on

an interception of Adams by junior linebacker Jeremiah Kose in the end zone. But, on UM's next play from scrimmage the Eagles put the game out of reach, as safety Todd Raynes picked off a pass and returned it 40 yards, giving EWU a 37-20 lead and the final points of the game, thus ending Montana's chances to advance further in the playoffs.

2013: MONTANA WINS 10 GAMES EN ROUTE TO 21ST BERTH IN PLAYOFFS

Montana won seven of its last eight regular-season games and earned an at-large berth into the Football Championship Subdivision playoffs, its 21st in school history.

The host Griz lost 42-37 to 11th-ranked Coastal Carolina in the second round.

The 10-3 Grizzlies were led by three senior linebackers, who all ended their careers ranked among UM's all-time leaders in career tackles. That dynamic trio consisted of Jordan Tripp (fourth, 335 total tackles), Brock Coyle (12th, 293 TT), and J.P. Kanongata'a (17th, 269 TT).

Junior end Zack Wagenmann had a team-high 16.5 tackles for loss and was a first team All-Big Sky Conference pick for the second season in a row.

UM also had stellar seasons on offense by running back Jordan Canada, wide receiver/returner Ellis Henderson, and quarterback Jordan Johnson. Canada rushed for 1,062 yards and 16 touchdowns; Henderson racked up 1,008 receiving yards and 145 TDs; and Johnson passed for 3,387 yards and 32 touchdowns.

2012: GRIZ MISS PLAYOFFS FOR THE SECOND TIME IN THE PAST 20 SEASONS

For the just the second time in the past 20 seasons the Grizzlies did not advance to the FCS playoffs. Montana finished 5-6 overall and had its first losing season in 27 years (since going 3-8

in 1985). It was also the first time in 20 seasons that the Griz have not finished first or second in the Big Sky Conference.

In October of 2012 Montana dropped out of *The Sports Network's* FCS Top 25 poll for the first time since 1998. That ended a run of 195 straight appearances, dating back to the Nov. 2, 1998 poll.

2011: MONTANA ADVANCES TO FCS SEMIS FOR THE 20TH TIME

The Grizzlies returned to the playoffs after a one year hiatus, advancing to the FCS semifinal, and suffered a 31-28 loss to host, top-ranked, and undefeated (14-0) Sam Houston State. It was Montana's 18th playoff berth in the past 19 seasons and 20th overall. UM has won (or shared) 13 of the past 15 Big Sky Conference championships.

Montana out-scored the Kats 14-3 in the second half and advanced the ball to the SHSU 49-yard line on its final drive, but was forced to punt, and Flanders rushed eight times for 63 yards, including a 22-yarder on a fourth down, to ice the victory.

The Griz defense held SHSU to two total first downs in the second half prior to the Bearkats' final drive. Halfback Tim Flanders led SHSU, rushing for 287 yards on 26 carries, and led a potent ground attack that amassed 383 yards.

Senior linebacker Caleb McSurdy led a defense that featured nine senior starters, and he was named the Big Sky Conference's MVP on defense.

Record-setting senior kicker/punter Brody McKnight booted a league-record 210 PATs. Jabin Sambrano, also a senior, became just the second player in school history (the other one was "Will Bill" Kelly in 1926) to score a touch-down rushing, receiving, and via punt and kick-off returns in a season.

Second-year head coach Robin Pflugrad was named the Big Sky's "Coach of the Year," as the Griz went 11-3 overall and placed first in the league with a 7-1 mark. NOTE: Montana would later vacate five wins, Big Sky title, and its participation in FCS playoff games due to NCAA violations, finishing with an "official record" of 6-2.

2010: PLAYOFF RUN HALTED/REYNOLDS ENDS HIS BRILLIANT CAREER

It had to end some time, and unfortunately the first time in 18 seasons that Montana did not advance to the playoff was the final season of the illustrious career of halfback Chase Reynolds. Reynolds ended his record-breaking career by setting school records for total touchdowns (59) and rushing touchdowns (52), and was ended up only four yards short of the record for career rushing yards with 4,067, and he set all of those standards in just three seasons.

The Griz suffered a huge setback early in the year, when senior quarterback Andrew Selle suffered a career-ending injury in the fourth game of the season against Sacramento State.

2009: ANOTHER TRIP TO THE FCS CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Montana played in the FCS championship game for the second year in a row and seventh time in the last 15 seasons, but second-ranked Villanova rushed 51 times for 351 yards in a 23-21 Griz loss. It was the top-ranked Grizzlies' only loss (14-1) of the season.

UM's road to the title game was a difficult one. The Griz trailed 11th-ranked South Dakota State by 27 points (48-21) with 5:40 left in the third quarter, but out-scored SDSU 40-0 on their way to a 61-48 victory. A week later UM forced 10 turnovers and crushed 12th-ranked, visiting Stephen F. Austin 51-0 in a quarterfinal contest.

Montana's semifinal against fifth-ranked Appalachian State and quarterback Armani Edwards was a classic. The game was played in front of a national audience on ESPN and came down to the last play. Selle floated a 25-yard TD pass to Sambrano with 1:31 left to give the Griz a 24-17 lead. However, Edwards drove ASU to Montana's 3-yard line, but his last-second TD pass was broken up, and the Grizzlies earned their seventh trip to the title game.

Mariani broke numerous receiving and return records, and Reynolds tied his own single-season record by rushing for 22 TDs. Selle passed for 28 TDs. Linebacker Shawn Lebsock and safety Shann Schillinger ended their careers as two of the leading tacklers in school history. Head coach Bobby Hauck, who left UM for UNLV following the 2009 season, advanced to the FCS playoffs all seven of his seasons as the head man, and won or shared seven league championships.

2008: MONTANA PLAYS FOR ITS SIXTH NATIONAL TITLE

Despite losing 14 starters, Montana made it to the FCS title game for the sixth time, losing 24-7 to Richmond in Chattanooga. In the first round Montana handled Texas State 31-13. In the quarterfinals the Grizzlies avenged an early-season league loss (45-28) at Weber State, defeating the 10th-ranked Wildcats 24-13. In the FCS semi-final game Montana had its biggest playoff road win ever, beating top-ranked James Madison 35-27.

Senior quarterback Cole Bergquist passed for 3,156 yards and 28 touchdowns, and wide-out Mike Ferriter finished his career ranked ninth in school history with 2,089 receiving yards. Reynolds rushed for a (then) school-record 22 touchdowns. The defense was led by strong safety Colt Anderson, a Buck Buchanan Award finalist, who was Montana's leading tackler with 129 stops.

2007: 15TH FCS PLAYOFF APPEARANCE IN A ROW

The Griz made their 15th playoff appearance and their 18th overall, which moved them past Eastern Kentucky for the most in division his-

tory. Montana suffered a rare home loss in the playoffs, though, a 23-22 setback to Wofford.

Senior defensive end Kroy Biermann became Montana's first ever Buck Buchanan Award winner. Senior halfback Lex Hilliard set a record with 50 career rushing touchdowns, which Reynolds would break three seasons later. Kicker Dan Carpenter set FCS career records with 75 field goals and points scored by a kicker with 413. Senior linebackers Tyler Joyce and Kyle Ryan finished second and sixth in UM history with 352 and 304 career tackles, respectively.

2006: A TRIP TO THE SEMIS

Montana just missed playing for its sixth national title in the past 12 years. Host Montana defeated 22nd-ranked McNeese State 31-6 in an FCS first-round game, then knocked off visiting and No. 10-ranked Southern Illinois 20-3 in the quarterfinals, but were edged (19-17) out to third-ranked and visiting UMass in the semifinal game which was televised nationally on ESPN2. Hauck became the first Griz mentor in history to win four Big Sky titles.

After losing at 16th-ranked Iowa in its opener, Montana won 11 straight games and finished 12-2 overall and 8-0 in the Big Sky. Hilliard, a 2006 Walter Payton Award candidate, was lost for the season due to an injury in fall camp. Senior quarterback Josh Swogger threw 17 TD passes, while senior receivers Eric Allen, Ryan Bagley, and Craig Chambers combined for 147 catches and 17 scores. Halfbacks Reggie Bradshaw, Brady Green, and Thomas Brooks-Fletcher combined for 19 rushing touchdowns. UM's young defense was ranked ninth in the FCS in total defense, allowing 226.4 yards a game.

2005: GRIZ LOSE IN FIRST ROUND

Montana was 8-4 overall and received an at-large bid into the playoffs. UM was led by Hilliard who rushed for 1,322 yards – the second highest total (at the time) in single-season history. The ninth-ranked Griz hosted a first-round home playoff game, losing 35-21 to 10th-ranked Cal Poly. Montana had defeated Cal Poly 36-27 in Missoula earlier in the season.

2004: FIFTH TRIP TO THE FCS TITLE GAME IN THE LAST 10 SEASONS

Montana was 12-3 and advanced to the FCS championship game for the fifth time in the last 11 years. Senior quarterback Craig Ochs passed for 3,807 yards and 33 touchdowns and set a league record by completing 68.7% of his passes. Hilliard tied the school record for touchdown runs with 17, while senior wide receiver Jefferson Heidelberger had the second most receiving yards in single-season history with 1,240.

In the playoffs the host Griz handled their first three opponents at home relatively easy, beating Northwestern State (56-7), New Hampshire (47-17), and Sam Houston State (34-13). The title game was a 31-21 loss to James Madison. Sadly, the championship game was played on a field that was a quagmire, as the grass playing surface had recently been re-sodded.

2003: BREAK PLAYOFF RECORD WITH 11TH IN A ROW

Montana broke the FCS record by making its 11th consecutive playoff appearance, eclipsing the mark of 10 that it had shared with Eastern Kentucky (10, from 1986-1995). The Griz re-



ceived an at-large bid into the playoffs, losing a 43-40 double-overtime thriller to visiting Western Illinois in the first round.

Senior kicker Chris Snyder set four NCAA career FCS records, scoring 394 points and converting 182 PATs. He also set a single-season school marks by scoring 123 points and connecting on 126 consecutive PATs. Senior defensive end Tim Bush finished his career as Montana's all-time career leader in sacks (32.5) and tackles for loss (48.5).

2002: TIE FCS MARK FOR CONSECUTIVE WINS

The Griz started the season with 10 wins in a row, and, combined with 14 straight wins the year before, tied the FCS mark for consecutive wins with 24. The streak began on September 22 of 2001, with a 30-0 home win over Western Washington, and was halted on Nov. 16 of 2002, with a 30-21 setback at Eastern Washington in a game played in Spokane's Joe Albi Stadium.

Montana tied Pennsylvania, which had 24 wins in a row from 1992-95, for the longest winning skein in the division. The Griz also set the record for most consecutive Big Sky wins (25) and most league victories on the road with 13 in a row.

Senior quarterback John Edwards was named the Big Sky's co-MVP on offense and senior safety Trey Young was tabbed as the league's defensive player of the year.

Montana defeated Northwestern State 45-14 at home in a first-round playoff game, but lost 24-20 at McNeese State in a quarterfinal contest.

2001: SECOND NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Montana won its second national championship by defeating Furman 13-6 en route to a 15-1 record. Edwards engineered a 16-play, 99-yard scoring drive for UM's only touchdown in the game. Halfback Yohance Humphery, Montana's all-time career rushing leader, gained 142 yards on 30 carries in the game and UM's only touchdown on a 2-yard run, which culminated its 99-yard scoring drive. The Griz defense limited the Paladins to 121 yards rushing and forced three turnovers. Furman's only score came on a Hail Mary pass as time expired. Humphery wrapped up his illustrious career with 4,070 career rushing yards.

The Grizzlies' 15 victories set a school record (which still stands as of 2013) for the most wins in a season.

2000: THIRD TRIP TO THE TITLE GAME

The Griz earned a trip to the championship game for the third time in six seasons, losing a heart-breaker, 27-25 to Georgia Southern in Chattanooga. Starting senior Griz quarterback Drew Miller was injured late in the first quarter, and Edwards, a sophomore, was called into action.

The Griz trailed 20-3 at halftime in rain-soaked Finley Stadium, but took a 23-20 lead early in the fourth quarter on a scoring run by Humphery. The lead was short-lived though, as Eagle halfback and 2000 Walter Payton Award winner Adrian Peterson broke loose for a 57-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter for the game-winning touchdown.

1999-97: GRIZ LOSE THREE STRAIGHT FIRST-ROUND GAMES

Montana dropped three first-round playoff games during this time, but in the 1999 season it set the Big Sky record with its seventh straight FCS playoff appearance, breaking the old standard of six that had been set by former Big Sky member Idaho from 1985-90.

In 1999, visiting Youngstown State, coached by Jim Tressel, kicked a late field goal for a 30-27 win. In 1998 Montana suffered its worst playoff setback ever — a 52-9 drubbing at Western Illinois. Montana's three-game playoff losing streak in the first round started in 1997 with a 19-14 setback at McNeese State.

1996: MOSS TOO MUCH IN QUEST FOR SECOND TITLE IN A ROW

Montana reeled off 14 straight wins to advance to the title game, and for the second year in a row they played at Marshall. Future NFL standout Randy Moss led Marshall with four touchdown catches in a 49-29 win.

It was the first time ever that two undefeated (14-0) teams had squared off for the title. In the championship game, Griz sophomore quarterback Brian Ah Yat set (then) playoff records for pass completions with 36 and total plays (67). Senior wide receiver Joe Douglass set a playoff record with 13 receptions, and he also set Montana single-season standards with 82 catches for 18 touchdowns (both still school records), and had 1,469 receiving yards, in UM's 11 regular-season games.

1995: FIRST NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

The Grizzlies won their first national championship with a last-second, 22-20 come-from-behind victory over host Marshall in front of an FCS playoff-record crowd of 32,106 (which still stands) in Huntington, West Virginia.

Walter Payton Award-winning quarterback Dave Dickenson passed for 1,219 yards and 11 touchdowns in Montana's first three playoff games, when UM out-scored its opponents 163-14. In their first three playoff victories, the host Grizzlies beat Eastern Kentucky (48-0), Georgia Southern (45-0), and Stephen F. Austin (70-14).

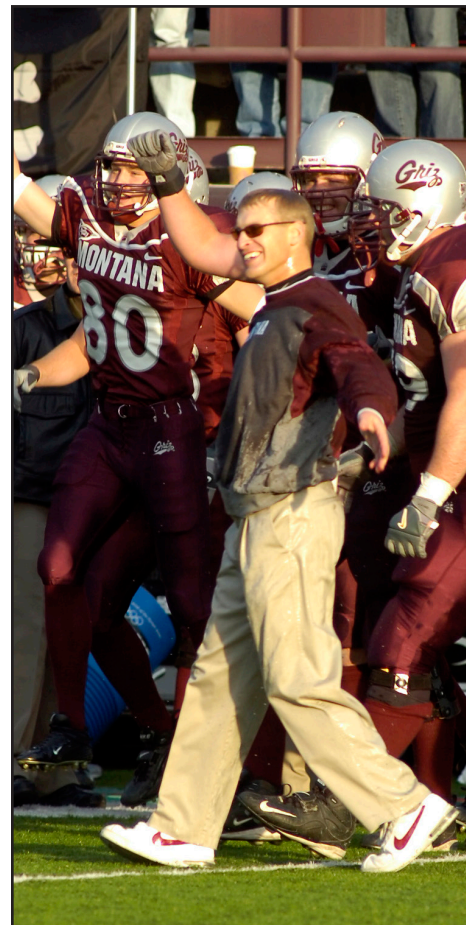
In the title game, Dickenson orchestrated a 12-play, 72-yard scoring drive, culminating with a 25-yard field goal by Andy Larson with 39 seconds left for the game-winner. The big play in the winning drive took place on a fourth-and-three from the 50-yard line, as Dickenson connected with senior wide receiver

Mike Erhardt for a 20-yard gain and a crucial first down. Senior wide receiver Matt Wells scored both of Montana's touchdowns (24, 1). Montana set playoff records (at the time) with 125 first downs, 137 pass completions, 197 pass attempts, and 1,703 passing yards.

1993-1994: A PROGRAM ON THE RISE

The host Griz squeaked by Northern Iowa 23-20 in a 1994 first-round contest, and then edged visiting McNeese State 30-28 in a snow storm on a 37-yard field goal by Larson with eight seconds left to play. Unfortunately, Dickenson was re-injured early in the McNeese win, and he was not able to play in the semifinal — a 28-9 loss to host (and eventual national champion) Youngstown State, which was also coached by Tressel.

In 1993, Montana rolled to a 10-1 regular-season record, with its only blemish a 35-30 loss at Oregon. After the loss to the Ducks, the Griz reeled off nine straight wins and won their first league title since 1982. The season ended in a 49-48 first-round shoot-out loss to visiting Delaware, as the Blue Hens scored with 55 seconds left to play. The Grizzlies' 93 victories in the 1990's were the second most in I-AA (Youngstown State won 103).

1989: GRIZ HOST PLAYOFF GAMES FOR FIRST TIME

Montana hosted and won its first playoff game in school history, beating Jackson State 48-7 in the first round. The Grizzlies defeated visiting Eastern Illinois 25-15 in the quarterfinals, and then lost 45-15 to eventual national champion Georgia Southern in Statesboro in the semis.

FIRST TWO PLAYOFF BERTHS: 1988 & 1982

After a six-year hiatus, in 1988, the Griz earned their first at-large bid into the playoffs, losing on the road 38-19 to fellow Big Sky member Idaho. Montana's initial trip to the playoffs was in 1982, when it won its first Big Sky title since the 1970 season. Despite winning the league championship the Grizzlies had to travel to Moscow, Idaho, losing 21-7 to the Vandals.

1969-1970: MONTANA PLAYS FOR A PAIR OF COLLEGE DIVISION TITLES

Montana played for the College Division national championship in 1969 and 1970. The Griz went undefeated and untied for the first time in school history at 10-0 and won their first-ever Big Sky title in 1969. Both years Montana advanced to the Camellia Bowl in Sacramento, Calif., but, missing many starters because of NCAA's rules on junior college transfers, the under-manned Griz lost 30-3 to top-ranked North Dakota State in 1969 and 31-16 to the same team a year later.

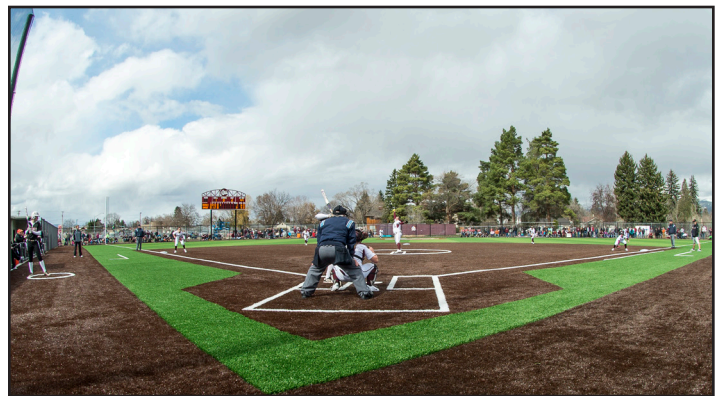

UM offers 15 intercollegiate programs in men's and women's basketball, cross country, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, football, women's golf, soccer, softball and volleyball. Women's softball began its inaugural season in the spring of 2015.

The Grizzlies/Lady Griz compete at the NCAA Division I level and are eligible for postseason competition, except for football, which competes in the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (formerly called Division I-AA), that employs a playoff system.

Montana is a charter (1963) member of the Big Sky Conference, which celebrated its 50th anniversary recently and is headquartered in Ogden, Utah. There are now 12 schools in the Big Sky Conference plus two football only schools, Cal Poly and UC Davis. The 12 schools are: Eastern Washington, Idaho, Idaho State, Montana, Montana State, Northern Arizona, Portland State, Sacramento State, Weber State, Northern Colorado, North Dakota and Southern Utah; the last two entered the conference in the 2011-12 season. Men's golf was added in 2014; however, Montana does not participate.
