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### BILL OF RIGHTS COMMITTEE HEARING January 12, 1972, Missoula, Montana Bob Campbell, Acting Chairman

Citizen suggestions were solicited at the Missoula meeting held at the University Center at the University of Montana. The citizens attending were well prepared, and the following is a summary of their concerns and proposals:

#### DISCRIMINATION

One of the most frequent suggestions was the addition of a provision prohibiting discrimination and specific suggestions were received from the American Association of University Women; the Montana Federation of Womens' Clubs; Womens' Club of Missoula; Missoula Business and Professional Womans' Club; Missoula Soroptimist Club; and Theodor and Eunice Shoemaker.

#### ENVIRONMENT

Another area of concern is a provision in the Bill of Rights to protect the Environment. The following individuals and groups presented proposals for an environmental addition to the Bill of Rights: William P. Cunningham, School of Forestry presenting the Public Trust Doctrine outlined by Bill Leaphart in the Winter 1972 Montana Law Review; Patti Meier for GASP; Don Aldrich; Mavis McKelvey for the League of Conservation Voters; and the Western Montana Fish and Game Association.

#### RELIGION

Two suggestions were received favoring and one opposing present restrictions of state aid to non-public schools.

Other suggestions included:

- -- Equal Rights for 18 year olds.
- -- Provision on Juvenile rights.
- --Opposition to the Preamble in the Model State Constitution.
- -- An expanded right to bear arms.
- -- Public access to use of state lands.
- -- Open Governmental meetings.
- -- Recorded voting records for all state agencies, commissions and legislative bodies.

#### DISCUSSION:

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Mr. Dahood welcomed the citizens and introduced all members of the Committee.

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Mr. John Frankino was the first person to speak. He is director of the Montana Catholic Conference. His intent is to serve the common good of all the people in the state. He wants to: 1. offer the services of the Conference to the Committee. 2. re-submit documents to the Committee which were previously sent in, and 3. introduce a representative on religious liberty. He introduced:

Reverend James H. Provost, Chancellor of the Catholic Diocese, who presented a written statement. He recommended to the Committee that the Constitutional Convention delegates replace the existing state provision for religious freedom with language from the First Amendment to the United States Constitution. He does not advocate any state aid to non-public schools. Reverend provost stated that his group wanted Article XI, section 1, repealed and the Montana Bill of Rights changed because he feels that it would possibly mean the loss of federal funds in the future. He stated that the only aid parochial schools receive now is in the form of library books and the hot lunch program. He admitted also that it would be an entanglement of the church and state if they received state aid, as has been stated by the federal supreme court. He also feels that the wordiness in the present Constitution is confusing to some. Reverend Provost also feels that there is some question as to the availability of public facilities for parochial activities, meetings, etc.. Using the church's facilities is not always practical as is won't accommodate large enough crowds. He stated that the Committee will be presented appropriate language from an attorney. Mr. Dahood asked for thoughts on prayer in public places. It is his feeling that public officials should not dictate where prayer be deemed appropriate.

The Committee was in recess from 12:00 until 2:00 P.M.

Mr. Robert T. Miller presented a written statement.
Mr. Campbell asked if he thought freedom of access and information should also be examined. Mr. Miller said yes, and in particular we should have open access to public records. Mr. Remington, editor of the Independent Record stated that he would submit language to the Committee regarding an open access provision. There may be a problem with open access depending on how a pending

case turns out with the IAB. Mrs. Eck asked if it would involve opening records which might be persona., and if si, we should not endanger the right to privacy. Mr. Dahood stressed that we must maintain a balance of the freedom of the press and the right to privacy. In the doctor-patient, lawyer-client, etc. relationship, it is the professional that would be investigated. Mr. Remington will advise Mr. Foley that the Committee would be interested to see him.

Mr. Robert D. Watt stated his support of Proposal #13. 25 years ago, when he was a member of the legislature, he presented the fact that conditions were changing the population had increased - education needs had increased. He stated then that if this segment (18-19 yrolds) were excluded from society, there would be serious results (hippies, flower children, drug users) Mr. Campbell asked if it could change the feeling of unresponsiveness toward the government to give people this age rights in our society. Mr. Watt stated - definitely. Mr. Foster also thinks people can assume greater responsibilities at a much younger age now, and that they are more knowledgeable. Mr. James inquired if 18 year olds still in high school would still be required to abide by the dress codes as set forth by the schools. Mr. Watt felt that this is only a superficial value. The possibility of 18 year olds holding public office was brought up, and we felt this should be taken up with the education Committee.

Roy Crosty, Jr. testified as per his written statement. He presented several books containing material which he stated is leaking into our state Constitutions. He feels that some of these ideas are Communistic.

Mr. Campbell asked if he would accept "The Spirit of Our Creator" in the Preamble instead of "Almighty God". He stated that this would satisfy him, just so a Creator or God is mentioned in the Preamble. He stated that the young people were upset that God's name had been removed from the Preamble. He is very concerned about the type of Constitution which is planned in Model State Constitution.

Mr. and Mrs. Francis Mitchell are concerned with the citizens' access to the government. They presented the Committee with a "right to know" proposal. They feel

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this is the only way to improve accountability and accessability to government documents. He believes it is the right of the citizen to have access to legislative committee meetings. Mr. Hanson asked how many members there were in this organization - 500. Mr. James feels that the phrase "any document" is too broad. Mitchell - the good outweighs the dangers for the citizen. It is the burden of the officials to accept this risk.

Mrs. Mitchell - it is based on the premise that all citizens will act responsibly.

Mr. Steve Coldiron - Montana State Low Income Organization - His organization will support the right to know provisions tempered with the right to privacy. He feels that legislative decisions shouldn't be made behind closed doors.

The hearing adjourned at 4:55 P.M.

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Delegate Virginia Blend presented a written statement on discrimination because of sex. She also spoke on her Proposal, #10, equal rights, also emphasizing that along with freedom comes responsibilities.

Delegate Mae Nan Robinson presented her proposal, #32, also on discrimination. She does not think any person, man or waman should be discriminated against because of superficial qualities. Her proposal would supplement #10 by increasing the applicability of the discriminatory prohibition of an equal protection clause to include private discrimination.

During the afternoon session, the Committee heard Barnie Reagan. He was in favor of repealing Ordinance I, Section 2, relating to Indian lands. Reagan asserted that the state disclaimer was no longer necessary.

Mrs. Francis Satterthwaite spoke in favor of incorporating the spirit of the Ordinance to allay suspicions of termination of the reservations or undue interference with Indian affairs.

The Committee then went into joint session with the Natural Resources Committee to hear Federal Environmental Protection Agency officials support strong state constitutional provisions on the environment, a strong preamble, the public trust doctrine and the citizen suit. Testifying for the EPA were Mr. Keith Schwab, Dave Wagoner, Robert DeSpain, Irwin Dickstein, and Leonard Campbell. They also felt that a clean environment and a good economic development are compatible.

Chet Blaylock was acting Chairman for today's meeting Today was a joint hearing with the Education Committee. The first to testify was Robert Jovick, Frank Dudas, and Wayne Gildroy, representing the Montana Student Presidents' Association. They presented a copy of a book on "Recommendations for Constitutional Revision and Implementation" a copy of which is attached. Mr. Dudas, representing the Associated Students of M.S.U. also spoke for them. A copy of his statement is attached.

Next to speak was John Christensen representing the Associated Students of the U of M. He said there should be free public schools for everyone. Delete the restrictive age limits of 6 - 21. He felt it was unfair to send some children to kindegarden while other couldn't afford to go. He also felt there should be a student on the Board of Regents. The imput now is not serving the total purpose because the student does not have a vote. He said the number of ex-officios on the boards should not turn into a political hassel. The Board of Regents are very seldom on campus and they must get there more often.

Stan Juneau speaking for the Indian Club at Eastern Montana College felt there should be Indian people or Indian educators on advisory boards of Montana Education. He felt it should be mandatory that there be an orientation period for all educators and educational administrators for the prupose of orienting these people into the Indian community life.

Calvin Herrera also speaking for the Indian Club testified. He said they wanted a course in Indian Culture introduced into the Public School systems. Now it is taught that the Indians are only savages. He said the Indians have a beautiful culture which has been degraded by the public schools system.

Clara Lee McMakin from the Indian Club spoke next. She said the whites have a better chance of getting jobs even though an Indian as gone through school. She said give the Indians a chance to live and support themselves.

Dale Kindness from EMC speaking for the Indian Club said they wanted to see a section in the Constitution guaranteeing equal education opportunities. He felt there should be Indian members on the school boards according to the number of Indian students. This would give them a voice in their own education and future which at present is practically nil.

Rayola Adele Eder from E.M.C. spoke next. She talked about the social-economic issues. She said many Indian families don't have T.V.'s, radios, books, etc., so they be expected to keep up with what is happening. She said in many schools faculty-student relations aren't what they should be.

Frank LaMere from EMC testified next. He is a sophomore in pre-law. There are 185 Indians attending E,C and they are trying to get something going. He said one main problem was that most of them had attended religious schools and they felt they were in prison. The schools in Montana aren't involved with community happenings. Equality is being demanded in the constitution.

Leroy Berven representing the Association Students of University of Montana felt that the Superintendent of Public Instruction should be appointed by two boards. The board members to include a student member.

John Murphy a student from U of M spoke next. A copy of his statement is attached. The main two points stresses were a student on the Board of Regents with voting priveleges and two boards of education with complete atonomy.

Tom Daily also a student said that in addition to two boards and an appointed superintendent he felt higher education should be divided into trade type schools, teaching hard sciences, chemistry, etc leading to specific occupations and the liberal arts program.

Patricia Denny an elementary education student at the U of M spoke next. She said there is a necessity for the constitution to provide for two Boards. Not so that the Board can spend more than 95% of its time on higher education, but so that it can spend more than 5% of its time on public education.

This concluded the hearing.

The Committee then met for a few minuted to discuss the Romney Hearings. The reason for the hearings are: (1) to get a summary of the committees work (2) highlight certain issues (3) to get public reaction and (4) for publicity purposes.

Mrs. Cain volunteered to act as a liason between Local Governemnt and our committee.
