PUBLIC FIGURES TO LECTURE AT MSU

The visiting lecturers program inaugurated this year at Montana State University, Missoula, will bring Russell Brines, Morris Ernst, and John Mason Brown to the campus during the school year, according to present plans.

Brines, scheduled to lecture at the University on January 14, is editor and manager of the Copely News Service and former chief of the Japan-Korea Associated Press Bureau. Ernst, attorney and writer, is noted for his work in the field of civil liberties. He will speak on March 4. Brown's talk is slated for April 15. The drama critic and lecturer has appeared at MSU before, having delivered the address at the 1942 Commencement Exercises.
