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## SPAN 302.01: Spanish Phonetics and Oral Expression

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# **Span302: Spanish Phonetics and Oral Expression**

**Course Description:** In this course we will study the linguistic sound system of Spanish, contrasting parts of this system with the sounds of English. The following are our main objectives:

- 1. To study the Spanish sound system (e.g., vowels, consonants, syllable structure).
- 2. To identify which parts of the Spanish sound system are the most difficult for speakers of English in order to:
  - a. improve students' pronunciation of Spanish.
  - b. expand future teachers' awareness of typical difficulties in the acquisition of Spanish as a foreign language.
- 3. To cover a few basic theoretical concepts of linguistic sound systems in general.
- 4. To cover several topics related to Spanish dialectology and sociolinguistics.

## **Course Requirements/Grading**:

- **Readings**: Students must arrive to class prepared. It is important that students read the obligatory reading assignments *before* coming to class.<sup>1</sup>
- **Online material:** Your textbook is accompanied by an online website that includes practice exams and exercises, some of which will be assigned as H.W. www.wiley.com/college/Schwegler
- Written assignments/Recordings
  - Research project: Students will complete an original research project, which will include recording yourself and other learners of Spanish and a final paper consisting of 5-8 pages.<sup>2</sup> See the document called 'Research Project' for more information. This project counts for 20% of the final grade.
  - *Homework assignments*: There will be various H.W. assignments during the semester, 3 will be related to the final project (see course schedule below and document titled 'Research Project, others will be from the book/online site (these will be announced in class and/or presented in written form in class & uploaded to the Blackboard site). Your average score for these H.W. assignments counts for **20%** of the final grade.

- **Exams:** If you have to miss an exam (only in case of serious emergencies, for which you must provide documentation), you call/email in advance so as to reschedule the exam. Make-up exams will be essay-based, whereas in-class exams will include various types of questions (multiple choice, fill-ins, etc.).

- Quizzes: There will be 10 quizzes (marked in bold-face in the schedule below). The average of these quiz scores will count for 20% of your final grade. In-class quizzes will short (~ 5 questions) and will consist of multiple choice and/or true/false questions. If you have to miss a quiz, you must call/email in advance to schedule a make-up. All make-up quizzes will consist of short answer and/or essay questions. One quiz grade will be dropped. Quizzes will normally be given at the beginning of the class period. If you arrive late for a quiz (even a few minutes), you'll have to make-up the quiz outside of class.
- **Participation:** Your presence and participation in this class is of the utmost importance. After 3 unexcused absences, your grade will be lowered two percentage points for each unexcused absence.<sup>3</sup>
- All students must access their email and our Blackboard site frequently.<sup>4</sup>
- There will be no extra credit opportunities.
