Course description, Objectives, and Expected Outcomes

This course introduces you to major North American short story writers of the second half of the 20th century. Generally, we will discuss two or three stories/author so that you can learn about not only the stories but also the author. The textbook selected for this course aims for that goal.

When we discuss a story, we will examine various aspects of short fiction, such as plot development, narrative style, tone, perspective, literary devices, and contexts. We will also learn about the author's beliefs, craft, and background to see how they help us understand his or her fiction more profoundly.

After completing this course, you will be able to

- -gain an overview of the North American short story since 1945
- -analyze and interpret short fiction critically and insightfully
- -appreciate diverse, multiethnic voices in literature
- -employ interdisciplinary approaches to reading a text
- -analyze works of art with respect to structure and significance within literary and artistic traditions, including emergent movements and forms; and
- -develop coherent arguments that critique these works from a variety of approaches, such as historical, aesthetic, cultural, psychological, political, and philosophical.
