DRAM 101 meets the Perspective 2/Literary and Artistic Studies distribution and is 3 credits.

Purpose

The purpose of this course is to introduce you to various aspects of drama and theatre—as an art form, a humanistic pursuit and a dramatic experience. It is an introductory course designed to enhance your enjoyment and understanding of theatre in general. It is intended to impart a general knowledge of theatre and how it functions as a multiple and multidimensional form of art. You will also develop a critical eye and the ability to express thoughts and analysis of scripts and live performance verbally and in writing. The course will be executed through readings, films, lectures, guest speakers, demonstrations, audience participation and discussion in regards to the theatrical arts.

Evaluation Evaluation will be based on the following...

- □ Daily Attendance and Promptness: One (1) absence is allowed with no penalty but you must check with instructors to get any missed assignments BEFORE a missed class.
- □ Daily Discussion Participation: Respectfully say what you think and back it up with fact.
- □ Daily Effort, Respect and Attitude: Required.
- ☐ 1 Group Project: 50 points
- ☐ 6 Writing Assignments: 20 points each = 120 points
- □ 4 Ouizzes: 15 points each = 60 points

Policy/Procedure
