SYLLABUS Course Description

Required materials:

- 1. MUS 323 Course Pack to be purchased in the U of MT Bookstore
- 2. "Get America Singing. . . AGAIN!": Volume 1 and 2
- 3. For completion of assignments use the following materials as references: Grade 8 teacher manuals from *Making Music*, or *Music Connection* (the instructor has the accompanying CDs for these materials)

Objectives of this course:

- 1. to examine the world of musics, and explore techniques for presenting a diversity of musics to young students
- 2. to become familiar with materials and methods for use in secondary general music classes (grades 6-8)
- 3. to experience music curricula which uses an activity centered approach based in part upon the musical elements
- 4. to become aware of the (MENC) National Standards for Teaching Secondary Music
- 6. to explore good classroom management techniques for secondary general music classes
- 7. to guide the students in the preparation of personal philosophies of music education
- 8. to become more sensitive to the needs of students with diverse abilities

Assignments and exams: 1) Regular weekly assignments and/or quizzes, 2) class presentations, 3) observations of lessons which address diverse abilities and multicultural themes, 4) piano accompaniments for two selections to be sung in class, 5) organized three-ring binder to be submitted at the end of the semester, 6) one choice assignment, 7) final written exam.

Attendance and grading policy: The attendance record directly affects the student's final grade. It is taken for granted that if a student misses class it is because of an emergency situation, and the instructor will not attempt to evaluate the reason for the absence. However, a telephone call explaining the absence is required. If a student misses class, he or she is responsible for all material missed that day. An absence on the day immediately before or after a holiday is strongly discouraged. Attendance is taken during the first 5 minutes of class. In order to earn an A in this class, the student must have regular attendance, must demonstrate a respect for the importance of the course work by being an active participant, and must have earned at least 90% of the semester's possible points. Assignments submitted after the due date will be subject to a lowered grade. Presentations are to be done on the assigned day. It will not be possible to make up missed presentations.

Students with special needs: Students with disabilities or special needs should see the instructor.
