Course Description:

We will study chapter 10-13 from the textbook this semester and rely on various formats designed to foster active participation of all students. These will include activities with partners, small group activities, 'team' projects, full class discussion, individual assignments, and audio-visual work. The activities will ordinarily be geared toward enhancing communicative skills in German. The language of this course will be primarily in *German*.

German 201 is oriented toward advancing your language ability to use the four basic elements of German: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The last two are emphasized (though not exclusively) in homework assignments and in chapter tests. Listening and speaking are emphasized in the classroom and with audio homework assignments. You will learn more German vocabulary and grammar in an incremental fashion, eventually working toward sentences with different types of verbs, objects, and other elementary parts of speech, based on topics tailored to acquaint you with more **intermediate language** aspects of German-speaking culture. Each chapter in the textbook builds upon the preceding one. In addition to the textbook and its ancillaries, you will encounter a variety of selected texts and materials that will allow you to practice your skills of listening and reading comprehension along with speaking and writing. Course materials will be presented so as to acquaint you with cultural basics in German-speaking countries and to help you apply that acquaintance in conversation and activities.

Learning Outcomes for GRMN 201:

This course emphasizes **intermediate development** of the **four linguistic skills**: oral and written expression, listening and reading comprehension.

To achieve these goals, the course will:

(1) Advance oral and written skills already learned.

(2) Practice newly acquired grammatical structures and a more nuanced vocabulary set for deeper writing, speaking, and listening comprehension.

(3) Read and discuss different types of texts and media formats at the intermediate level.

(4) Learn and enrich our (trans)cultural knowledge about the German-speaking countries and cultures.

The important 5 C's (listed by ACTFL: American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) in the context of learning goals for a foreign language are:

Communication:

- 1) To deepen understanding of the structures of the German language.
- 2) To expand ability to read, write, and communicate orally and in written form in German.
- 3) To be able to present and express thoughts about familiar topics and new material learned in class.

Cultures, Comparisons, and Connections:

- 4) To extend and deepen understanding of geography, culture, and history of the German-speaking countries.
- 5) To develop the ability to gain access to substantial information regarding German-speaking Europe.
- 6) To be able to reflect in target language on aspects of diversity, arts, culinary differences, demographics, current topics.

Community:

7) To become part of the larger community of learners in the classroom, other UM students of German via the German Club, and participate in events on Germany, Austria, and Switzerland.

Expectations:

It is expected that all students will be in attendance for class meetings. Since the course is intended to be largely participatory and increase your immersion experience, such **attendance will be required**. Except under unusual circumstances, if a student misses 4 class sessions unexcused during the semester, *the final grade will be lowered by half a grade*: A- becomes B+. Likewise, if a student misses more than 7 class sessions during the semester, *the final grade*: A becomes B, B becomes C, etc. It is also expected that all students will complete assigned work (both oral and written) as requested and be prepared for each class session. <u>Excusable absences</u>

<u>include</u>: documented illness, family emergencies, attendance in university-sponsored or required events, religious observation, among others, which you may consult about with your instructor. IMPORTANT: Due to Covid-19 changes might occur, and therefore good communication between students and faculty is of utmost importance. Please keep your instructor informed of any changes. Also, <u>please check your UM email and the Moodle</u> <u>page regularly/daily</u>, in case dates change for readings and assignments.
