ASUM SENATE MINUTES
March 30, 1994
Mt. Sentinel Room - 6 p.m.

Chair Crowe called the meeting to order at 6:02 p.m. Present: Flanigan, Crowe, Hoffman, J. Arnold, S. Arnold, Deines (6:42), Farooqui, Grant, Gregory, Hammond, Katzman, Mather (6:26), Panasuk, Redenius, Reed, Rogers, Schlosser, Tomazeli (6:28) and Yellow Robe. Excused were Bear Don't Walk, Brown and Lindsay. Unexcused was Kuntz.

Public Comment

Michael Novak and Steve Breezley reported on the student petition to allow alternative designation for the athletic fee, e.g. to the library.

President's Report (Change of order from agenda)

- a. Vice-President Todd spoke on the university system budget under restructuring (Exhibit A) and clarified the parking fee situation. A letter from Ken Willett of Safety and Security was circulated in this regard (Exhibit B).
- b. A reading file containing issues Senators should be aware of will be kept by the Senator's boxes.
- c. A virus is repeatedly invading Flanigan's computer. She requested that it not be used.
- d. Faculty Senate will meet Thursday, March 31, at 3:30 p.m. in the Mt. Sentinel Room.
- e. Flanigan reported on the Regents meeting in Havre. Fees and the academic calendar will be among the things to be voted on during the May meeting.
- f. A proposal is being considered to invite candidates to sit on committees to gain insight about issues.

10-Minute Break

- g. Senators broke into groups to discuss the following issues, which will be expanded upon in the next week: campus-wide mediation; fiscal policy/budgeting; office renovations and a centralized filing system; athletic fee oversight.

Vice-President's Report

- a. The following committee appointment was approved by Senate: Michele Collin, UC Board.
- b. Communications Intern Mary Ann Pierson talked about plans for ASUM image-building and solicited ideas from Senators for the future.

Business Manager's Report

- a. Senate approved an SPA Special Allocation request for \$100 to support the 1994 Social Justice Film Series.
- b. A Special Allocation request by the Society of American Foresters was tabled.

Committee Reports

- a. Katzman reported on resolutions discussed in University Affairs. He announced that the Student Health Advisory Committee will consider eliminating health fees that are not cost effective.
- b. J. Arnold reported the lack of student attendance at the housing ordinance subcommittee hearings and the large attendance by the University Homeowners Association.

- c. S. Arnold reported that the Library Archives Committee is writing a letter to President Dennison requesting more funds.
- d. Mather reported that only two petitions were not validated due to insufficient signatures. A mandatory informational meeting will be tomorrow night at 7 p.m. in the UC Montana Rooms.
- e. Gregory offered the following slate of recognition forms which were approved by Senate: 1st Church of the Emasculate Perception of Kount Khokula, Abridged; University of Montana Outing Club; Student Radio Organization.

Unfinished Business

- J. Arnold requested that SB141 be addressed first, since the petitioners have been waiting since the meeting's start. No objection was raised.
- a. SB141 Resolution to Support Athletic/Library Fee (Exhibit C) passed unanimously.
 - b. SB118 Resolution for a Sustainable University Center and SB119 Resolution for A Sustainable Campus (Exhibit D) were considered as a package. A motion by **Katzman-Yellow Robe** to further define herbicide use failed. A friendly amendment by **Flanigan** to change the word "limit" to "eliminate" in the third line of "Therefore be it resolved:" in SB119 was accepted. The resolution passed.

Five-minute recess


- c. SB131 Resolution to Oppose Proposed University Funding Model (Exhibit E). The author eliminated "one-time" in the second to the last line and accepted **Farooqui's** friendly amendment to eliminate "one-time" in the first line of the fourth "Whereas...." The resolution passed.
- d. SB140 Resolution for Recognition Form Changes. A motion by **Mather** to pull it from committee failed. The resolution is being sent to the Board on Member Organizations for consideration.
- e. SB142 Resolution to Oppose City Ordinance (Exhibit F). A friendly amendment by **Farooqui** to put a period after "discriminatory" in the third sentence of the first "Whereas" and eliminate the rest of that sentence was not accepted. He then offered it as an amendment, which failed. A friendly amendment by **Mather** to drop "and" in the last line of the first "Whereas" and add "and others" to the end was not accepted. **Mather-Yellow Robe** offered this as an amendment, which passed. A call of previous question by **Reed-Yellow Robe** passed. Upon immediate vote, the resolution passed.

New Business

- a. Resolution to eliminate the communications intern position.
- b. Resolution to present the athletic fee choice to the Regents.
- c. Resolution to take a position on Commissioner Baker's funding plan under restructuring.
- d. Resolution to support campus-wide mediation proposal.
- e. Resolution to change budgeting time-line in Fiscal Policy.


Thank you for the opportunity to speak before the ASUM Senate. As you requested I have provided a work sheet showing the number of additional parking spaces developed between 1983 to 1994. The work sheet also includes the net gain of 177 from the revenue bond projects. The total number comes to 1143 new spaces. Parking lot construction on already owned level land costs between \$1,000 and \$2,000 per space to construct. For parking structures the base starting amount is usually \$10,000 and up. With the possible exception of Southgate Mall no other public or private entity has matched the University of Montana's amount of parking development within a 10 year span.

In addition to the above new spaces, in 1990 we gained ownership and responsibility for maintenance of 523 parking spaces located on area streets that were vacated to the University by the City of Missoula. In order to preserve these spaces and our existing parking lots we must provide ongoing maintenance. That along with snow removal and trash pick-up accounts for considerable expenditures each year.

As I stated at the senate meeting, I value the support of the ASUM Senate and our student body. I would be more than willing to meet with you to review any part of the parking program or to again bring the subject before the senate.
