Course Objectives

This course will introduce you to the theory of visual storytelling and the tools to produce quality still photo and video narratives. You will learn how to handle a digital SLR camera and create a workflow in the digital darkroom. You will learn to shoot video, record audio and edit both still and video images. The course will also focus on the ethical issues of visual journalism.

There are weekly online labs for Adobe Lightroom and Adobe Premiere, the two programs you will be using this semester. Our graduate teaching assistant has office hours where you may stop by if you need follow up to those online labs.

- To edit video using sequences to compress time
- To export video from Adobe Premiere Pro CC and to understand the program's file structure

Unless you have an acceptable reason and make prior arrangements, an assignment submitted after the deadline will lose 10% of its grade for each day it is late.

NO ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE ACCEPTED LATER THAN ONE WEEK AFTER THE DEADLINE.

If you can't meet a deadline due to illness or some other emergency, you must let me know before the deadline and make up the work within a week of the scheduled due date (or other time as agreed upon by the instructor)

All assignments are due at midnight the day before we will critique in class.

(Exception: Final Video Project)

You have two weeks after a grade has been posted to contest it. After that time, the grade will stand as posted.

Camera Equipment

Digital SLR cameras and essential equipment will be checked out to students for the semester.

You will need:

- 1. A portable hard drive of at least one terabyte (1TB) to store your digital photos and videos. You will also use this drive for future journalism classes.
- 2. A 16 GB or 32GB SDHC memory card class 10 with a read speed of 80MB/s or higher.
- 3. Optional- an SD card reader
