MCH MORNING TV SERIES CONTINUES WITH WILLIAMS, BLEW, BASS
MISSOULA --

U.S. Rep. Pat Williams and authors Mary Clearman Blew and Rick Bass will be featured on morning television throughout the state this month as the Montana Committee for the Humanities continues its series of three-minute television interview programs on Montana public affairs and cultural issues.

"Montana This Morning," featured on CBS stations and affiliates throughout Montana from 7:07 to 7:10 a.m. weekdays, is a cooperative project between the University of Montana-based committee and KPAX-TV of Missoula. The programs are produced and hosted by Glenda Wallace.

Williams will be the featured guest Oct. 11-15. Oct. 18-22 segments will feature "All But the Waltz" author Blew, who grew up on a ranch in the <u>Judith Basin</u> and now teaches fiction writing and Renaissance literature at Lewis-Clark State College in Lewiston, Idaho. "The Ninemile Wolves" author Bass, of <u>Troy</u>, will be featured Oct. 25-29.

Montana Gov. Marc Racicot will be the first "Montana This Morning" guest for November.

The series, partially supported by funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities, began in early June and will continue through the end of the year. MCH Acting Executive Director Gerald Fetz is executive producer for the series.
