The meeting was called to order by Chairman George Heliker, and committee members introduced to the witnesses.

Mr. Tom Schneider, Executive Director of the Montana Public Employees Association spoke on behalf of a constitution that spells out an employment philosophy of the State. Exhibit #1.

Jack Marlow, Secretary-Manager of the Montana Contractor's Association spoke on behalf of constitutionally guaranteeing the right of all Montana citizens to obtain and retain a job whether or not he belongs to, or chooses not to belong to a union. Exhibit #2.

Mr. Charles C. Stack, manager of a persnell management system for several years advocated a state merit system requirement within the constitution, but questioned whether the state employees should be covered. Mr. Stack testified under supoena from the Committee.

Mr. Wm. Bertsche, speaking for himself, as long time advocate of a legislative state merit system opposed any reference to a constitutional provision on the topic. He cautioned that such inclusions may be too restrictive in years to come.

Mr. Robert James, Administration officer of the State Department of Health spoke on behalf of constitutional provision for a merit system.

Mr. Larry Fasbender, Sr. spoke in support of establishing a merit system in the constitution.

Mr. D. H. Siewert, Montana Chamber of Commerce spoke in support of a right to work provision in the constitution and gave his statement, exhibit #3.

Jim Murry, executive secretary of the Montana State AFL-CIO presented testimony, exhibit 4a and 4b, in opposition to the right to work provision in the constitution.

The meeting adjourned at 5:45 p.m.
