CAN ETHICS BE TAUGHT? FIND OUT AT UM LECTURE

MISSOULA --

Ethics expert Patricia Werhane will visit The University of Montana Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 29-30, to deliver a public lecture, speak at a faculty philosophy forum and meet with UM students.

Werhane, a guest of the Mansfield Center's Ethics and Public Affairs Program, will discuss "Can Ethics Be Taught?" from 7:30 to 9 p.m. Monday in Room 304 of the Journalism Building. The free public lecture is co-sponsored by UM's philosophy department, business school and Women's Studies Program.

On Tuesday, Werhane will discuss "Adam Smith and The Descriptive/Normative Distinction" during a philosophy forum from 3:30 to 5 p.m. in the Pope Room of the law school.

Werhane, the Ruffin Professor in Business Ethics at Darden School, the University of Virginia, is on leave from her position as director of Loyola University's Center for Ethics Across the University. She is well known for her work in business and engineering ethics and in the teaching of ethics.
