AREA STUDENTS CHOSEN FOR UM LAW SCHOOL PLACEMENT

Seven students from south-central Montana entered The University of Montana School of

Law in Missoula this fall.

Chosen from an applicant pool of more than 600 were Geoffrey Angel and Ashley

Harrington of Bozeman William Bieler of Sheridan, Michelle Rothschiller of West Yellowstone,

Melissa Schlichting of Columbus, and Vicki Murphy and Pamela Koch of Livingston were also

among the 75 entering students in the class of 1998.

Founded in 1911, UM's law school has drawn national recognition for its effective

integration of legal theory and practice into its curriculum. Students are required to apply their

book knowledge to hands-on experiences, Law Dean E. Edwin Eck said. "University of Montana

students not only study the theory of contract law, corporate law, and estate planning law, they

also apply their knowledge by drafting contracts, creating corporations, and preparing and

probating wills."

Students in their third year of study represent clients in one of the school's 12 legal clinics.

In addition to their regular studies, some students research and write law review articles and assist

in the preparation of legislation for the Montana Legislature.
