MONTANA POLL SHOWS RACICOT STILL POPULAR MISSOULA --

Gov. Marc Racicot's marks for job performance remained high at year's end, but

Montanans were less complimentary of their congressional delegation and other national leaders,
according to the latest Montana Poll.

For this edition of the Montana Poll, 410 adult Montanans were polled statewide Dec. 7-11.

The University of Montana Bureau of Business and Economic Research conducted the poll.

Eighty percent of Montanans polled said they approved of Racicot's handling of his job.

That's the highest rating he's received in the Montana Poll since he took office in January 1993, according to Susan Selig Wallwork, director of the poll. Ten percent disapproved of his performance, and the other 10 percent were undecided.

Montanans continued to be less complimentary about their congressional delegation, Wallwork said.

Fifty-four percent approved of Sen. Max Baucus' job performance, an improvement from June, while 31 percent disapproved.

Approval of Sen. Conrad Burns' performance was 47 percent, compared with 49 percent at midyear, but 38 percent disapproved of his performance, a 12-point increase from June.

Forty-six percent approved of Rep. Pat Williams' job performance, slightly more than at

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midyear, while a third of respondents disapproved. Twenty-one percent were undecided.

Montanans' 42-percent approval rating of President Bill Clinton was roughly the same as in June, Wallwork said. His negatives increased to 54 percent, however, up about nine points from midyear, and only 5 percent of respondents were undecided.

U.S. House Speaker Newt Gingrich continued to receive the least favorable performance ratings from Montanans, Wallwork said. Twenty-two percent approved of his performance; 65 percent disapproved, up more than 20 points from midyear. Thirteen percent were undecided, compared with almost a third in June.

The poll added two new categories this time: Democrats in Congress and Republicans in Congress. Democrats had a 36-percent approval rating; Republicans, 38 percent. Their disapproval ratings tied at 52 percent.

Republican officeholders tended to receive their highest approval ratings from fellow Republicans as did Democrats from fellow Democrats. The exception was Racicot, who received a 79-percent approval rating from Democrats and 87 percent from Republicans in the state.

Each official had pockets of greater approval throughout the state, Wallwork said. Racicot, for example, received higher approval from east of the Divide, with 84 percent overall and 86 percent in the northeast. His highest approval rating, 96 percent, came from Lewis and Clark County, his county of residence and the seat of state government.

Baucus did slightly better in the west, 57 percent, and northeast, 55 percent, than he did in the southeast, 51 percent. His Butte-Silver Bow County approval rating was 76 percent; for Lewis and Clark County, it was 65 percent.

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Williams also did better in the west, especially in strongly Democratic Butte-Silver Bow

County, where he scored a 72-percent approval rating.

Burns did slightly better in eastern Montana than in the west, with 50 percent approval in

the east, 42 percent in the west. But his highest approval rating, 58 percent, came from Flathead

County in the west. Yellowstone County residents were almost evenly divided about his job

performance -- 42-percent approval vs. 46-percent disapproval.

Clinton did best in Butte-Silver Bow County, getting 68 percent there. But he also did

well, 56 percent, in Yellowstone County, hardly a Democratic stronghold.

Gingrich did not do well in any major areas of the state.

The Montana Poll's statewide sample was drawn using the bureau's two-stage random

sampling process that generates a representative cross section of Montana's adult population. Its

random digit telephone sampling program generates a statewide sample of telephone numbers.

proportionate with the distribution of households in the state. A second random sampling

procedure is then used to select one adult respondent in each household, taking into account the

number and gender of adults in the household. The total sample (all respondents) has a potential

maximum error margin of plus or minus 5 percentage points. The error margin for any subgroups

or areas in the state would be larger depending on the size of the group.
