# ASUM CENTRAL BOARD MINUTES

Mount Sentinel Room

November 28, 1984

7:00 p.m.

The ASUM Central Board meeting was called to order by Phoebe Patterson, ASUM President. Members present were Baer, Brown, Campbell, Crilly, Elison, Henderson, Hense, Johnson, Johnston, Keyes, LeHeup, LeSueur, McGuire, Mercer, Miller, Reich, Stack, Sullivan, Winslow, Sauter, Gullickson, and Whiteman. Desmul and Jahrig were excused.

The minutes of November 14, 1984, were approved as written.

## President's Report

1. A clipboard with handouts from the last CB meeting was found in the Mansfield library. If you misplaced it you can pick it up in the ASUM office.
2. The Outdoor Resource Center is sponsoring a Gravity Sports Film next Tuesday night, December 4. Tickets are \$3.50 in advance and \$4.00 at the door. Five different films will be shown on climbing and outdoor adventures.
3. Legislative task force had a meeting on November 27, with area legislators. A great deal of time is being spent by all constituencies on this campus working toward the legislative effort in Helena next quarter. Patterson informed the board that she has some information available on the budget if anyone is interested, please contact her.
4. On Monday, December 3, there will be a meeting in Helena discussing the student liability insurance issue. Patterson will report back to the board at the next week with an update on what happens in Helena.
5. The next Board of Regents meeting will be held in Havre on December 13-14. The Regents will be presenting their recommended budget for the University system at this meeting. Patterson invited interested CB members to attend the meeting.
6. The ASUM Student Conduct Code revisions have been presented to Mary Beth Kurz and will be brought before Faculty Senate in the near future. Mary Beth Kurz will be representing Main Hall and Patterson will represent ASUM on any differences that may arise. Patterson requested that if she has a conflict in time, with the Faculty Senate meeting, she would like to have a CB member representing ASUM. Members interested in representing ASUM at the Faculty Senate meeting should contact Patterson as soon as possible.
7. The ASCRC proposed Exit Writing Exam is still in the committee stage. Central Board will be kept informed on its progress. It is Dr. Bilderback's hope that Central Board will be allowed to review and approve ASCRC's final proposal.

8. The December 5, Central Board meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. It is proposed that the meeting will be kept short so that members will be able to attend the Crosby, Stills, & Nash concert at 8:00 p.m.
9. The ASUM Christmas party will be held Saturday, December 1, 7:00 p.m., at Pam Grier's house. All CB members are invited to attend.
10. Crilly - Hense

Motion to ratify Monte Koch as one of two ASUM Lobbyists to represent ASUM at the 1985 State Legislative Session in Helena. Discussion followed. Upon vote, motion to ratify Monte Koch passed.

11. Baer - Hense

Motion to ratify Polly Burton and Cynthia Kaasa to Day Care Committee, Joe Kelly to Student Health Committee, and Peggy Panarella to Campus Development Committee. Upon vote, motion passed.

#### Committee Report

Jeff Weldon, Legislative Committee Chair, reported the issues for the legislative session that are now being researched by the committee. They include: work study, incidental fees, stadium resolution, the business building, revenue search, and tuition tax credit (see Appendix A). Weldon reminded the board that ASUM will be represented in Helena by two lobbyist and an intern. He also stated that he, as well as the lobbyists, will be reporting to Central Board throughout the session.

Weldon presented the board with copies of the Regent's 1987 Biennium Total Budget Request, Montana University System (see Appendix B).

Central Board was presented with a list of Missoula area legislators (see Appendix C). Weldon encouraged Central Board members to contact these elected officials to establish a working relationship and let them know that we are concerned with what happens to the University of Montana.

Weldon reported that the Legislative Committee is now in the process of selecting an intern for the Legislative Session. The intern will be working with the two ASUM Lobbyists and Senator Van Valkenburg. Application will be accepted until December 4, with interviews being held December 5.

#### Old Business

13. Regarding the Board of Regent's memo concerning the tuition increase, Crilly wanted it clarified the the tuition increase is to take place next academic year not this year.

14. Sauter read a statement from Desmul, Student Health Committee Chair, regarding Blue Cross coverages. Blue Cross of Montana does offer dependent care. The policies available provide for a good range of benefits at a competitive price. Information on Blue Cross policies can be obtained at the Blue Cross office in the Student Health Service or at registration.
15. LeHeup reported that it is acceptable with MontPirg to separate the use of election facilities. Patterson has given the proposed ASUM Bylaw Revisions dealing, with ASUM elections, to the Constitutional Review Board for review and recommendation. Central Board will deal with the revisions after hearing back from CRB.

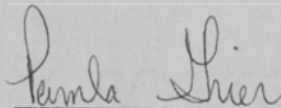
Comments
