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

Good evening, everyone.

You have all heard a lot of speeches already. Tom Daschle, Bob Kerrey and Tom Harkin -- and of course the President -- are some of America's great public speakers. And it's always puzzled me, but for some reason I've never received the recognition I think I deserve for silver-tongued oratory. So I won't take up too much of your time.

But I want to thank you all very sincerely for your help. You are true friends and I appreciate your help for me, for Tom, and for our Democratic Party.

Obviously this has not been the easiest year for our party. But your true friends are the ones who stick with you when there are a few clouds overhead as well as the bright sunny days. And that is why I am so grateful and happy to see you all here tonight.

I also want to give particular thanks to our President, of course. To our Leader Senator Daschle. To DSCC Chairman Bob Kerrey. And the others who have taken time out of their busy schedules to be with us tonight.

And while I am very pleased and grateful to see all of you here tonight, I would like to recognize three of our guests in particular, who have come in from Montana for the dinner.

I see our Democrats in Congress. Standing up to protect Medicare. For clean air and water. Security for working people. People like Tom Harkin. Like Bob Kerrey and Tom Daschle. And all of us here tonight.

Pat Williams, my colleague in the House, one of America's great fighters for working people.

Democrats at home in Montana -- legislators like Mignon Waterman, Greg Jergeson and Ray Peck. People like our Superintendent of Public Instruction Nancy Keenan, Mayor Dan Kemmis of Missoula and more -- fighting for Montana's schools and universities.

I see Bill Clinton and Al Gore defending education and a clean environment. The President was just out in Montana a couple of months ago, meeting with our farmers, business leaders and tribal chairs.

And it makes me so proud to be a Democrat.

Well, we've taken some bumps and bruises this year. You all know that. Sometimes I think of that famous old painting of the fife and drum corps, one with his arm in a sling, one with a bandage around his head and the other on crutches.
