LOCAL UM STUDENTS HAVE COOPERATIVE EDUCATION INTERNSHIPS

Two University of Montana—Missoula students from eastern Montana are working as cooperative education interns this semester at workplaces in Montana.

The Cooperative Education Department at UM's Center for Continuing Education and Summer Programs is administering both internships. It serves about 1,800 students a year, placing 400-500 of them as interns throughout Montana and the nation in more than 35 fields of employment.
