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Summer session workshops, seminars, and special programs

Summer session offerings in the Montana State University School of Education include several workshops, seminars, and special programs, Dean Linus J. Carleton announced.

A 10-week seminar, "The Administrative Process," will be in session from June 13 through August 19, the dean said. The seminar, which may be taken with or without credit, will emphasize the social behavioral aspects of the administrative process. The staff will include Dean Carleton, Dr. Raymond L. Gold, Dr. Aaron W. Harper, and Dr. Thomas Payne, all of the MSU faculty. Registrants will be able to earn three graduate credits.

A seminar on problems of the rural teacher will be in session from July 18 through July 29. Mrs. Winnafern Moore, rural school supervisor for Montana, will direct the seminar, which will stress daily schedules, unification of subject matter, and other problems of the rural teacher. The course carries three undergraduate or graduate credits.

A high school demonstration class and a grade school demonstration class will be conducted from June 13 through July 15, the dean said. Charles Mattill of the MSU School of Education will teach the high school demonstration class, and Miss Lorraine Fehrenkamp will be in charge of the grade school demonstration class. The Missoula city school system and the MSU Schools of Business Administration, Music, and Education, and the Department of Health and Physical Education are cooperating in offering the demonstration classes.

An audio-visual aids seminar, directed by D. F. Schutte, audio-visual director of the St. Louis Park Public Schools, Minneapolis, Minn., will begin Jun 13 and

close July 15. The seminar will deal with organization and administration of programs rather than with techniques, Dean Carleton said. Two or three undergraduate credits may be earned by registrants.

In addition to the basic audio-visual aids course, a film preview service will be operated the first three weeks of the summer session, beginning June 13, by Russell Steen, supervisor of the State Film Library. The library has available for viewing some 3,300 film titles, according to Dean Carleton.

A conservation education workshop will be conducted at the MSU Biological Station at Flathead Lake from July 18 to August 20. Lectures, discussions, and films will be supplemented with field trips to give registrants experience with conservation of soil, minerals, oil, timber, grasses, water, and wildlife. James Gebhart of the School of Education will direct the workshop, which offers from six to nine undergraduate or graduate credits. The staff includes J. W. Severy, professor emeritus of botany, and other Montana conservationists.

Dr. John S. Urlaub of the University of California at Berkeley, a national authority in driver training, will again direct two summer courses at MSU, Dean Carleton said. He will teach advanced safety education and driver training from August 1 through August 5. The two-credit course will give participants the latest information about traffic safety and driver training techniques. Personnel from the Montana Highway Patrol will assist in the program.

Dr. Urlaub will conduct a basic course for prospective teachers of driver training from July 18 through July 29. The University sponsors the course jointly with the Montana Highway Patrol and the American Automobile Association. Dr. Urlaub will be assisted in the three-credit course by Capt. Alex B. Stephenson, supervisor of the Montana Highway Patrol, and Sgt. Douglas Hardesty, safety director of the patrol.

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
