Housing Authority - Dennis Bower from Human Resource Council

SPECIAL ALLOCATION REQUEST:

Work-study Assistance - ASUM Budget and Finance - \$200.00

Proposed Job Description and Duties:

Assist business manager, loan officer, and accountant. Various duties will include collection and record update work on outstanding student loans, data gathering for off-campus accounting systems study, assistance to accountant in converting present ASUM accounts to state system, reconcilliations and audits as necessary.

Cost Comparison:

Based upon a 20 hour week, paying the minimum wage to a staff member, versus work-study assistance, the cost comparison is:

*Proposed pay rate of assistant is \$3.00. Federal Government pays 80% of this wage; cost to ASUM per hour - .60.

Justification:

For assistance to Loan Officer: ASUM still has a number of outstanding loans whose status is unclear. The position of the "loan collection" in the Controllors Office was frozen last year. No information on loan collections has been available since July 1 of this year. We need to research each outstanding loan to see if it has been collected or if we should initiate our own collection procedures. We hope to collect between \$2,000-\$3,000 in delinquent loans.

For assistance to the Business Manager: Special reports must be prepared for presentation to the administration and to satisfy informational requests from systems developers. These often involve such tasks as counting the number of transactions for six months or compiling lists of employees for a year.

For assistance to the accountant: The State system has not been functioning since July 1, therefore, sometime in Fall quarter, all of the financial transactions since that date will have to be processed at once. Accounting work done in the later part of the summer must be redone, due to the creation of financial records three months after the close of the year.

NOTE: A position similar to this one was approved for funding last year in order to bring the books up to date, but no one was hired, as the one person who applied was asked to fill a position in the accounting office.
