Resolution for Central Board Approval

RE: Group Requirements

WHEREAS the University Faculty Senate may soon be considering a proposal to inact group requirements that would

- 1 - call for the creation of a committee (Committee on General Education, COGE) that would determine what a general education class is and which classes would fit their criteria and,
- 2 - require students to take 48 credits, divided among 4 areas of the specified classes (i.e. a students choice would not be open to any class offered in a given department, but would be limited to choose among several if COGE had designated any classes in that department as general education classes) and,

WHEREAS the students of ASCRC feel the current proposal would

- 1 - create a manipulated demand for classes,
- 2 - COGE would create a forum for interdepartmental politics
- 3 - increase the already difficult and sometimes arbitrary procedure of evaluating transfer work or cause gross inequality between transfer and already enrolled students,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT Central Board supports and encourages the efforts of the students of ASCRC and recommends that faculty senate consider fully the ramifications of the present proposal and hopes it will be responsive to the voice of the students.

The meeting was called to order by ASUM President Garth Jacobson at 7:20 p.m. in the Montana Rooms.

Last Weeks Minutes stand as approved (Oct. 4, 1978.)

#### President's Report

1. New Zoning Ordinance - Guest speakers were Dick Smith, City Council, Susan Reed, newly appointed to City Council.

JACOBSON talked about the importance of the new zoning ordinance to students, especially students off-campus. He then presented Dick Smith who gave reasons why the council passed the new ordinance:

1. Much of new development around Missoula was unsightly
2. Developers were buying single family residencies, tearing them down and building 4-plexes between two or more single family houses
3. Home occupation - ie renting rooms.

Smith elaborated by saying present city ordinance says nothing about home occupation (renting rooms) but is probably illegal under present ordinance. He said that home occupation is the most controversial issue. Alternatives regarding home occupation: leave present ordinance as is, list things that are legal, ban all home occupations, allow everything, allow people to do in their homes almost anything, if this will not be damaging to the neighbors, providing standard criteria be met. Two categories of home occupation: 1. music lessons, art, seamstress; have to comply with criteria, zoning office approval, permit is issued. 2. Construction, anything possibly offensive to neighbors, have to have petition signed by 50% of the neighbors within 150' in all directions, then permit is issued. Home occupations can only be engaged in by the home occupant- Petition is not needed for renting rooms. Rooms can only be rented by a home owner, cannot rent out more than 25% of the house, off street parking for all but two cars, and not more than three renters. Main objective is to encourage and in some cases insist upon more attractive development. If new ordinance is enacted, then certain areas for multi-family units will open up, with site plan review, design review, and city council approval. Smith continued stating three things that would directly effect students:

1. Ordinance will promote more multi-family housing provided it is quality multi-family housing
2. It will redefine fraternities and sororities so that should something happen, they could be rebuilt, presently they would not be able to rebuild because of the rezoning rules
3. Renting rooms.

New ordinance would give them plan review on all multi-family commercial, industrial, and single family units, when more than three are being built by a single builder. If home occupation petition is signed by neighbors, it can be revoked by zoning officer, if it becomes too noisy, etc. Design Review does not pay attention to single family residents as long as there are proper side yards and rear yards. Smith hoped students would vote in favor of this ordinance. He explained there were three separate items on the ballot and everyone must pass. Handouts and a sample ballot are being prepared.

## Vice President's Report

1. Six Mill Levy - As of Oct. 5, \$438.00 was collected during registration. Average is 19¢ per student. One problem was the people collecting fees.

2. Door-to-door - Some volunteers already. Bozeman is still working on getting volunteers for cooperative effort in Great Falls. T-shirts and buttons hopefully by the end of the week. Buttons 50¢, t-shirts \$4.00

Tear-outs in Kaimin Thursday & Friday. Three billboards in Missoula, should be up in another week or so. Montana Power gave us \$6,000. 180,000 - 200,000 inserts into the Montana Power Bills. Thank Toni McOmber, Bill McDorman, Jon Doggett, Cary Holmquist; and everyone sitting in on the Central Board interviews. 31 interviews were done. Newman suggested looking through the applications if you did not make the interviews. Doggett felt that you shouldn't base judgement solely on applications.

JACOBSON stated that the selection candidates will be picked on Friday. At that time they will be notified for the interview by JACOBSON and anyone who wants to sit in on the final interviews. They will be Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday if necessary. Times and names will be posted.

CONRAD suggested having an executive session where everyone could talk freely about the selected candidates.

JACOBSON replied he was thinking of having the vote segregated.

3. Dismayed that board members came late to meetings, rude to the audience, possibly changing meeting time, whatever time they go at, make an effort to be there on time.

REICHENBERG felt that considering the length of the meeting, a change of time would not be good.

MCDORMAN suggested moving the meeting somewhere else, for variety.

#### Business Manager's Report

Charter flight to Chicago has been cancelled. Still trying.

Passed 2 fund balances:

\$60.00 honorarium for Student Montana Education Association

\$175.00 passed for Women's Rugby Team to out-of-state travel from fund balance.

Special Allocation from ASCRC for Kaimin advertisement to poll students on core requirements from faculty failed.

#### Old Business

Grizzly Pool Committee Report - Amy Dickstien and Holmquist met with Mr. Stetson. Stetson said that the \$3600 ASUM allocated did not even touch pool expense, only represents about 6% of the total pool budget expense. Does have income from other activities. Estimate of what he would make with 50¢ and \$10 charge would vary by quarter, \$1500 during fall and winter quarter, and \$2000 during spring quarter. Holmquist asked if students could set aside a reasonable time to where just students could use the pool. Stetson answered by saying in order to do that, it would cost him \$20,000 to rent the pool to students. For 3 quarters, it costs him \$18 to \$20 an hour to maintain the pool.



NEWMAN suggested that they were chipping in a little more then the \$3600.

ASUM allocated a certain amount to Campus Rec, \$11,000 pays a graduate assistant at the pool.

ACHENBACH said he was getting operating budget and staff expenses to help figure the cost out. No alternatives pursued as of yet.

Discussion followed.
