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## Plagues, People and Environment

#### Description

This class is about plagues and pandemics: Massive disease events that spread across continents and the globe. We'll look at how environments and social conditions gave rise to, and shaped, diseases. And we'll look at how those diseases disrupted, devastated and otherwise shaped human societies and groups within them. Pandemics covered will include: the Black Death, smallpox, cholera, the 1918 flu, polio, malaria, AIDS and COVID-19. We'll zoom out to look at the global dynamics of pandemics and zoom in to see how pandemics played out at the local level in places like Missoula, Montana. We'll go back in time to the roots of human evolution, and come up to the present to look at the current pandemic we've been living through. Together, we'll work on a public history project about the history of disease in Missoula.

Learning outcomes: After completing this course, students will:

- Understand key aspects of past pandemics how they changed history; how people understood, experienced and responded to them
- Analyze local history in broader historical and comparative context
- Use the past to interpret and understand the COVID-19 pandemic
- Think critically about the how history can be applied to, or used in, the present

You are welcome to inquire any time about your current response grade.

#### **Discussion/Attendance**

I will take attendance every day and you will be graded on that as well as the quality of your participation in class. Good quality participation means: Good questions, thoughtful comments and engaged and respectful listening. If you are absent, your discussion grade is 0 for that day. You can, however, make up discussion grades for missed classes. It is up to you to reach out to me to ask to make up a discussion grade for a missed class. As with the short responses, I will periodically update your discussion/attendance grade, and you are welcome to inquire any time about your current response grade.
