The meeting was called to order by President Greg Henderson in the Gold Oak Room at 7:00 p.m.

Montana Little Symphony. Their biggest expense is for their tour, for which they requested money for buses, food and lodging and which they received only money for buses. They didn't think any cuts should be made in these areas. Another thing they needed very much was the money to rent music since their library wasn't very extensive and they needed to rent music to be able to perform more different pieces. They also felt it was very important to be able to bring in guest artists to perform and to teach master's classes; this would be beneficial to both the Little Symphony members and to UM. When asked how many concerts they give through the year, they said it was contingent on the amount of music they could rent. This year they had spent \$900 on the rental of two works; music rental is very expensive. Their tours would include traveling to Great Falls, Bozeman, Helena, Deer Lodge, Butte, and Billings. They will have to cut out some of the cities since they won't have enough money with food and lodging cut out. It was suggested that they stay in private homes wherever they were performing to cut costs, but they said it was often difficult in smaller towns to find college students' parents' homes where they could stay, as these people were more likely to want to have other students stay with them.

Wilderness Institute. This group has requested that their outside income of \$25,091 be recorded on their budget for Central Board's information.

Montana Masquers. Lee Erpenbach and Ann Taylor represented this group. Each year they present six major productions and four to six original plays by students. There are 400 students involved in plays and production while 3,140 students, 2,800 non-students, 2,000 students reached by plays on tour attend the performances - last year 10,340 were in attendance. The members of the Masquers do get credit for their work in the shows and \$17,900 is received from the administration in services and money. However, the executive recommendation is figured on matching funds, and as John Nockleby found after he tried the same thing, it won't work. If the Masquers are only going to receive \$8,250 from ASUM, they will have to raise ticket prices, which will cut down on attendance and/or they will have to cut out a number of major productions and workshops, too.

Right now they are trying to build up a solid theater audience; and without ASUM's funding the quality of their productions may have to go down, which would decrease the size of the audiences. Because of the number of people involved with the Masquers and the number of people reached by their productions, they feel they deserve ASUM's support. If they could receive \$14,000 they could continue as they have in the past; with \$11,000 they could do pretty well, though they would have to cut out some of their productions.

Opera Workshop. Sue Stanaway, representing the Opera Workshop, said that since the Jubileers, which did popular music and jazz, broke up, this group assumed their role. They do musicals and jazz works and some music written by their own members, half of which aren't music majors. In the past they have toured each year and next year they would like to do a 1,700 mile tour of Montana with their 30-member group. They would also like to be able to bring in a guest artist to work with them sometime during the next year as they have done in the past. Under 566 - Other - Costumes would be money used for musical scores, props, and costumes.

One of their members, Mary McLaine, received the World Metropolitan Opera Award, which helps bring in more people who are anxious to see them. By going on their tour, they hope to reach every small community in Montana through community organizations and high schools. They hope to go as far east as Glendive and north to the High Line.

They are hoping to do this tour during spring break.

Saxophone Quartet. Ron Coons stated that this group has existed for a year and a half. They have played 50 concerts all over Montana at music festivals. There are seven majors and seven minors on saxophone in the group and because of this group, the number of saxophone majors have tripled at UM. They put on performances in the Mall and hold concerts which are all well attended, and they play in churches, too. They have also played in Seattle. There are three quartets now and they are trying to build up a name for themselves. With the help of ASUM in paying for their tours now, they hope to eventually become well known and be able to be on their own with the audiences paying for their travelling. They said they are willing to take only \$250 to help them pay for mileage and repairs.

Faculty Reduction Committee. This committee is to be chaired by three people, Greg Oliphant, Susan Heald, and John Fitzgerald.

String Quartet. Representatives from this group, Anne Shulster and Colleen Hunter, said that there is a lot of interest in this group when they go on tour and they are very professional in their performances. Many of this group want to go on to become professional after college. They are totally dependent on ASUM next year for their funding. This year they had to charge the schools where they were playing in order to cover their travelling expenses. This year they anticipate one more string quartet and consequently will need more money. They had been partially supported by the Montana Arts Council, but that money only comes for so many years when a group is getting started and they are no longer eligible. They should be on their way to be self-supporting by this time.

University Choir. The Choir is made up of 65 activity-fee-paying students, 29 of which are also members of the Montana Chamber Choir. The Choir gives quarterly concerts at UM and tours the state; this year they are planning a three-day tour performing at high schools and in public performances. ASUM is their only source of funding. They have been representatives of UM for many years and they need continued adequate funding in order to continue putting on their concerts. They questioned the cutting out of funding for food and lodging and were told that was the policy of the committee that reviewed their budget. The \$140 in Contracted Services was also eliminated because the fee for the driver of the buses was included in the total for in-state travel.

Woodwind Quintet. As with all other musical groups, this group's purpose is to promote UM through its concerts, showing some of what comes out of UM's music department. This group also holds clinics in schools, from kindergarten through 12th grade giving the members of the woodwind quintet experience with teaching school children so they will have some idea of how they will be teaching when they are through at UM.

Campus Recreation. Jim Ball, Keith Glaes, and Howard Johnson were present to represent Campus Rec. They need the funding they requested in order to give more services to UM students without increasing the costs to them. They are also looking into more ways of receiving money through grants in order to increase services. In intramural sports, the number of participants increase each year, as shown by the following figures:

Some students participate in many events; some participate in only one.

Ball, Glaes, Johnson, and Dale Speake, the full-time secretary, are the only full-time non-student staff members. All others are students, who do such things as supervise and referee games and work at various attendant positions.

Their outdoor program is geared toward familiarizing students and making them more knowledgeable about the outdoors. They conduct seminars with this in mind, and they are attended by 1,000 people a quarter. They take overnight and days trips on skis, by raft, and on foot into the back country. They teach non-academic classes, such as rock climbing, fly fishing, and cross country skiing.

A total of 126,129 people have been in the Rec Annex this year using the handball courts, tennis courts, renting equipment, using the basketball courts, and using the weight rooms. They rent out the equipment for less than anywhere else in town. This gives students a chance to use equipment they wouldn't be able to try if they had to buy it or rent it elsewhere.

With the executive recommendation as it stands, they will have to cut down on the hours of some of the facilities and perhaps cut down on the number of participants in some intramurals. Since Campus Recreation does get about \$7 of each \$45/year activite fee from each student, they feel that those students get more than their money's worth from that \$7.

Baseball Club. Since no one was present from this club, the committee chairman who reviewed this budget explained some of the items. In-State Travel was figured on one or two trips while four trips were allowed this group for out-of-state travel.

Varsity Bowling. Rick Kelley said that this group has been in existence for a long time and is a good representative for UM, both in the men's bowling and women's bowling. With the funding recommendation for this year, it's evident that only those who can afford to go will be able to go on tournament matches. If the best members of the team can't afford to go, they will have to go with a team composed of less than their best members. Kelley said he usually pays \$30-\$100 out of his own pocket each time they travel, but he can't continue to do so much longer. Gursky said that he felt that though most groups were not satisfied with their ASUM funding this year, at least more groups were getting something this way. The policy of travel funding was to get the groups where they were going and back again, but not to take care of them while they were there. Rick Kelley said they appreciated anything they could get.

Rifle Club. The cut in item 500 - Ammo, Targets, Refreshments was made to cut out funding for refreshments. A discussion followed regarding separating ASUM funding on each line item and the funds the club had raised itself. Also, the Rifle Club asked for funding for lodging, but since it was the policy not to fund lodging, ASUM funded the mileage. ROTC had already said they would fund the mileage. This caused some discussion about the fiscal policy and the committee's policy and whether it couldn't be excepted for this group.

Boxing Club. Because they can't charge admission to their events, \$400 should be taken out of Income Other Than ASUM. They didn't know this when they made up their budget. They had planned with their budget to hird a trainer or coach, since it was hard to get someone to do it free; but they would change this to judges instead and referees. Under 912 - Equipment, they still need \$303 for equipment and that includes using what Campus Rec has that they can borrow. They still \$900 for their program, since this is a new club and needs money to get it started. Boxing has been introduced as a Center Course recently and there has been a lot of interest shown in it. This is expected to bring a number of new members into the club, since members must have some experience in boxing before they can join. The dues are \$15 a year plus initiation

fees.

Once they buy their equipment, it won't be necessary to replace it for years and next year not as much money will be needed for their program. The reason ASUMI cut down on the money for equipment was because they didn't feel they should fund then the entire amount they needed for equipment in the first year. With Campus Rec's help, they should be able to manage during the first year. The club, however, thinks that if it doesn't do well in the first year, it won't get off the ground at all. Consequently, they feel they need to have as much equipment as they can get in order to show people that they are serious and that there will be equipment to work with. The equipment is expensive, though, as shown by the price of boxing gloves which he cited as around \$35 a pair.

Gymnastics Club. Ted Polette's main objection to the executive recommendation was that they were cut in Uniforms, which would be for warm-ups. It's important that they look good when they go to tournaments since the judges count a lot on appearance. It was suggested that their club could use the warm-ups that the track team uses.

MOVED AND SECONDED FOR A 10-MINUTE BREAK. MOTION CARRIED.

Handball Club. The only comments on this budget were concerning 573 - Club Projects, which reduced their two planned clinics to one. Also, concerning the material for bleachers, this tournament has not been confirmed yet, so it isn't known if they will be needing them.

Judo Club. One item was explained. 651 - Contracted Services was to pay the janitor for cleaning up after the meets.

Rodeo Club. The representatives from Rodeo Club were Duane Perretson, Paul Hampton, Marilyn Kollins, and Bill Bailey. They felt that their club identifies with this state and can help in getting students to come to UM. Since starting work on this year's rodeo, they have recruited two students from high school to come to UM next year. Last year they travelled 5,300 miles with a two-horse trailer visiting junior colleges with their rodeo show. One thing they forgot to budget for was advertising, which they will be needing next year, too.

At the Rodeo they will be having special rates for college students on a certain day to help increase interest in the Rodeo. This should bring in a lot of people to Missoula and should also bring in prospective students to UM. This club has 20 students working in it and on the rodeo when it started with only three students when the Rodeo was in the planning stages.

Rugby Club. This club is made up entirely of University students, and they have tried to raise a great deal of money themselves for their club. They belong to the Montana Rugby Union for which they have to pay union dues (566 - Other Expenditures). Some of their trips are to help them learn more about playing rugby and some of their trips, to California and Canada, are to play the teams there. They will be playing Edmonton in May this year and hope to continue to do so in the future. 666 - Insurance is to pay for insurance for the bus to California.

Soccer Club. Ralph Seirett said they could make it on \$2700, but \$1400 would not be nearly enough for them to travel, with a van and a car, and to pay for lodging and the other items in their budget. Central Board told them their lodging was cut out since this was the policy followed by their review committee; they would have to make

arrangements for free lodging themselves, perhaps through the team they would be playing. A break was called in order to try to straighten out some confusion over the amount in the recommendation for in-state and out-of-state travel. Their Seattle and Boise trips were cut out of out-of-state travel.

Serrette explained that he has been running the Soccer Team for five years and this year he is requesting \$600 to do so. This wasn't in their original request, but he was now asking for this money. He didn't want to have to run the club again without getting paid something for it.

Their request for petty equipment, which was for chalk, was zeroed out because Campus Rec said they could use some of their chalk as they had enough to cover them, too. They helped start the YMCA summer youth soccer program and it's becoming a large part of community now.

They used to referee to get money for their club, and they found they were cut as much as they raised by ASUM when they came to them for money during budgeting. They have, consequently, since then stopped raising money on their own for that reason.

Women's Ski Team. Kathy Anderson explained that half of their budget request was for nordic skiing and half for alpine. She went into more explanations about the nordic skiing than the alpine. This year they proved themselves to be competitive in nordic skiing and did approach Sharon Dinkle for funding. There were, however, turned down by her. Consequently, they once again came back to ASUM. They will be going to Bozeman, Whitefish, Butte, and Helena with the nordic team and also they will be training up at Lolo Pass and in the Lubrecht Forest. That is what their in-state travel would be used for. Last year, however, because of the lack of snow, the alpine team didn't use any of their money. This money will be left in the fund balance at the end of the fiscal year and they can rebudget it into whatever they want for next year.

Student Recreation Association. Tim Furey, Jim Burkhart, and Doug Haberman represented this group. They stated that there are 80 students involved in this group and they operate their organization as an aid to communication between all areas of recreation. They are trying to get a job file together to help recreation students in finding jobs after graduation. They try to provide for the little things that the school can't afford to do for these students. The most important thing this club does is to try to get the students to meet with professionals in their field. Their out-of-state travel would be used to go to the National Recreation and Parks Association conference in Las Vegas in October, which they would like to send 15 people to; and they also would use the money to attend the regional conference. The recommendation dropped the regional conference, and it allowed one car to attend the Las Vegas meeting.

Volley Ball Club. The petty equipment line item was funded in the executive recommendation for a net but not for balls as they have requested. Two out-of-state trips were cut from this item; also tournaments were cut down to one.

Some comments by Henderson:

The executive committee will meet on Friday at 2:30 p.m.

He hoped that the committees would meet with the groups before next Tuesday to discuss any problems in the budget that these groups were concerned with.

Next week the groups will be allowed to speak if they want but only on the motion on the floor.

Fitzgerald suggested that some policies be made concerning length of speaking time, motions concerning additions and subtractions from budgets, etc.

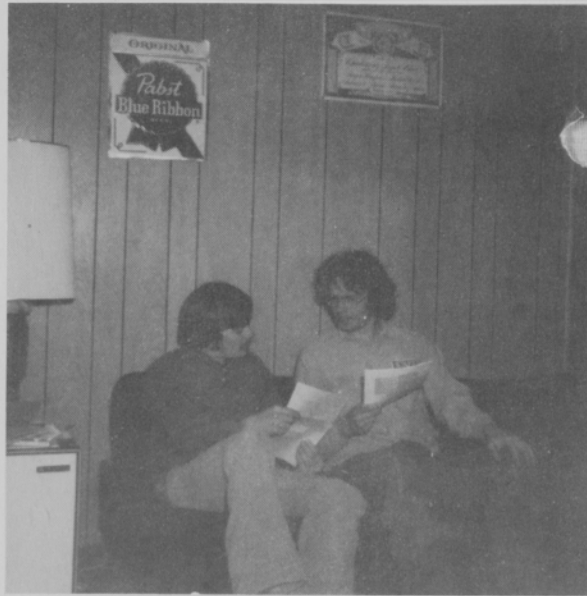

Recreation—The Need in Our Society

Involving people in meaningful leisure activities is the emphasis of the park and recreation profession. Professional workers in this field help people in our highly specialized, mechanized society find means to express themselves and their interests.

As people's incomes rise and their amount of leisure time increases, the demand for recreational activities resources and facilities also increase. People have the time and money to invest in recreational equipment, to travel to parks and resorts for hiking or fishing, to attend spectator sports events, take creative classes, or participate in art festivals. Population growth has made conservation of natural resources and park development increasingly important. Recreation programs are becoming integral parts of correctional institutions, retirement residences, and rehabilitative centers.

By contributing to the values which enrich people's lives, recreation is taking its place with education, work, and religion in serving the fundamental institutions of society.

The Academic Program

The Recreation curriculum is housed in the School of Forestry. The program is designed to provide the student with a diverse background in the physical and social sciences. Requirements include classes from such areas as natural science, education, sociology, psychology, business administration, economics, speech, dance, and forestry. Within the curriculum itself there are two major options. Students have a choice of majoring in resource management and/or programming.

After accumulating 183 credits of academic class work the student culminates his education with a 12 credit field work/practicum in which the student secures a full-time position with an existing recreation agency for a period of ten weeks. Practicums are designed to allow the student to apply theory and concepts learned in the classroom to actual situations in the field.



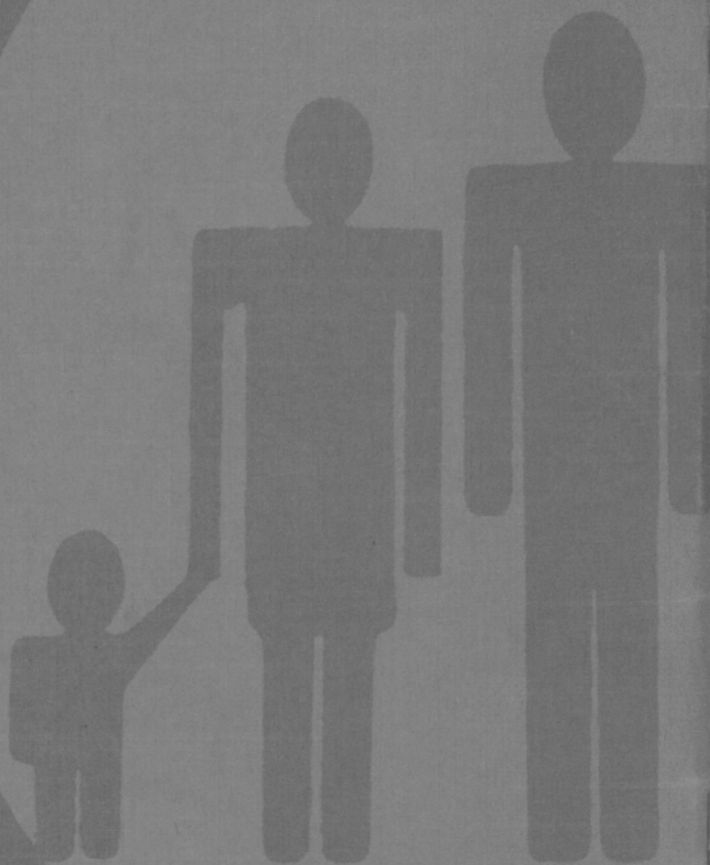
