There is also an interest shown to us by alumni to utilize and have access to programs they participated in while students at the U of M, when they return to campus.

It is the staffs' opinion that under current circumstance that a program can be developed within Campus Recreation to serve these needs and desires.

1. In cooperation with the Alumni Association, develop and administer several recreation programs each year. Cost to be born by participants.
2. Develop a closer relation between students and alumni in recreational and leisure settings. Such as trips, tournaments, new games and educational seminars.
3. That we be allowed at times to allow alumni to use facilities and programs as space permits, at a true cost to the program user.
4. A one year pilot project to allow Alumni in the surrounding area to pay a quarterly Recreation fee for use of recreation facilities. With use of facilities such as racquetball/handball and tennis courts on a limited basis with additional fee charged.

MANSFIELD MOTION TO PASS RESOLUTION. GURSKY SECOND

Fitzgerald SUBSTITUTE RESOLUTION AS FOLLOWS: WHEREAS: A 19:1 STUDENT/FACULTY RATIO DOES NOT ACCURATELY REFLECT THE ROLE OF THE UM AS A MULTI-PURPOSE ACADEMIC INSTITUTION WITHIN THE MONTANA UNIVERSITY SYSTEM; and WHEREAS: A DELIBERATE AND MEANINGFUL REVIEW OF THE PROGRAM ROLES OF EACH UNIT WITHIN THE MONTANA UNIVERSITY SYSTEM IS A NECESSARY REQUISITE TO CUTS WITHIN ANY UNIT OF THE SYSTEM; and WHEREAS: A YEAR'S DELAY IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF AN ARBITRARY 19:1 STUDENT/FACULTY RATIO AT UM WILL ALLOW TIME FOR SUCH DELIBERATE AND NECESSARY REVIEW. THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: THE ASUM CENTRAL BOARD SUPPORT THE OBJECTIVES OF THE STUDENTS FOR JUSTICE. THAT IS, WE SUPPORT THEIR EFFORT TO INFLUENCE THE REGENTS, LEGISLATURE, AND INTERIM FINANCE COMMITTEE TOWARDS FINANCING THE PRESENT LEVEL OF FACULTY FOR AN ADDITIONAL YEAR. It will include the three statements from Students for Justice.

1. ASUM INTRODUCE THE ABOVE RESOLUTION OR AN ADAPTATION OF IT TO THE STUDENT SUMMIT IN DILLON THIS WEEKEND;
2. ASUM REQUEST CONSIDERATION OF THIS RESOLUTION BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS AND THE INTERIM FINANCE COMMITTEE AT THE SOONEST POSSIBLE DATE. WE WISH FURTHER TO INVITE ALL STUDENTS AND FACULTY TO PREPARE A COMMON DEFENSE OF THE UNIVERSITY TO PRESENT AT THE NEXT FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETING NOV. 18-19 IN HELENA;



3. ASUM LEND WHATEVER PHYSICAL FACILITIES MAY BE OF SERVICE TO STUDENTS FOR JUSTICE IN THEIR ATTEMPT TO GENERATE STATEWIDE SUPPORT, SPECIFICALLY, THE USE OF YOUR WATTS OR HOT LINE DURING SELECTED HOURS OF THE DAY SO THAT STUDENTS MAY CALL POTENTIAL SUPPORTERS FROM AROUND THE STATE, AS WELL AS THE USE OF YOUR BULK MAIL PERMIT.



RE: REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTIONAL TIME ON FACILITIES

In a memo dated 9/26/77 I requested of the Campus Recreation and Sports Committee that the Department of H & PE be allowed additional instructional time on selected facilities namely, handball, racquetball, and tennis courts as well as gymnasium facilities in the Field House Annex. Specifically, we requested that instructional time be expanded to 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. I later met with the committee explaining the basis of the request and answered questions on the matter. Toward the end of the meeting the committee voted, and as a consequence, denied my request. The purpose of this memo is to appeal the decision by the CRSC.

At the present time, and I assume by a previous agreement between the Department and CRSC, HPE is allotted 20 hours per week of instructional time on each of the previously named facilities. The time allocated is from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon Monday through Friday.

The handball/racquetball courts are available 73 hours per week for recreational use. (from 12 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday - Thursday; 12 a.m. to 9 p.m. Thursday; 11 a.m. - 8 p.m. Saturday, and 12 a.m. - 8 p.m. Sunday). In addition, H & PE uses only six of the eight courts during its assigned time which makes the remaining two courts available for recreational use from 8 a.m. to 12 a.m. daily.

On the tennis courts we are allowed to schedule classes from 8 to 12 a.m. Monday through Friday. During the Fall Quarter we hold classes at 8 and 9 and 11 on a daily basis for the first five weeks anticipating that weather conditions will pre-empt desirable instruction the second half of the quarter. In fact, the conditions for 8 and 9 o'clock classes are generally poor and attendance reflects those conditions during the fall. During the early spring the conditions are similar. Other usage of the tennis courts is as follows: 12 - 2 p.m. recreation; 2 - 6 p.m. intercollegiate athletic practice men and women; 6 p.m. until dark recreation; Saturday and Sunday recreational use each day all day.

I recognize that all of our physical education, athletic and recreation facilities are heavily used and that there is a very legitimate contention of interest for all facilities.

I believe, however, that there is, at the present time, an inequitable distribution of time allocated to H & PE in view of the fact that we have a large service and majors program. We do not, for example, have any time available in the facilities after 12:00 on which to schedule classes for our majors. Such a situation, in my judgement, is unreasonable and I am sure that we are the only department on campus that does not have access to needed facilities for our professional program.

My appeal for a more equitable time allotment on facilities is based on the fact that we need additional time to better develop our program and meet student needs. We would like to extend the instructional time to 3:00 p.m. daily and have control over those facilities until that time. Should we not schedule classes at specified hours during that time span we will be most happy to turn it over to recreational use.

I will be happy to meet with you on the matter should you deem it necessary.

We, Students for Justice, are of the opinion that the University of Montana has traditionally been and is even now the central preserve of liberal arts for this state. We also believe that if this tradition is abandoned presently, the task set for it will no longer be carried out with the integrity deserving of it, if at all, and Montana will be without adequate means to transmit and propagate its own cultural heritage, let alone that of the nation and the world.

Five weeks ago this year's Students for Justice began meeting to "brainstorm" for alternatives to the dreary prospect of 67 faculty cuts. We were fearful that such extensive cuts over such a short period of time would essentially and irreversibly destroy U.M. as a quality institution. Of the options which initially seemed at least feasible--the elimination of the faculty's C.O.L.I. or a special session of the state legislature--the first seemed unfair and inadequate while the second seemed a task too awesome to perform. After some outside consultation with members of the legal profession a further option emerged. The Board of Regents could approach the Legislative Interim Finance Committee for an authorization to overspend the University System budget, allowing us to retain for an additional year threatened faculty members. The Interim committee could not allocate funds per se, but they would write an appropriations bill for the 1979 Legislative session reimbursing the regents for their over-expenditures.

Even before the recommendations of Program Review were made we were petitioning students to help us urge the regents to take this course of action. The recommendations having been made, our intent was only reinforced. The Program Review may be justly faulted on two accounts, one methodological and the other substantial. First, the shortness of its duration required that it be almost entirely "numbers driven" -- "legislative intent", or the regents' conception of it, insures this; secondly, the restriction of Program Review to just one campus fails to consider the problem. <sup>of program duplication.</sup> For years both the legislature

and the regents have stressed the idea of complementary rather than redundant programs. This cannot be even approached without something like a system-wide program review first. Evident even without such a review is the fact that U.M. had the only adequate liberal arts facility in the state, and that very area is the one "sentenced" by Program Review most pervasively. Montana would have dangerously weakened its only sound link with our national, cultural and world heritage.

Aside from these considerations we students have the particular concern over the effects all of this may have on our legitimacy as candidates for both graduate schools and professional positions across the country and in the state of Montana. It is often the case, we understand, that there is a certain amount of discrimination against universities from which tenured faculty have been released on shaky grounds.

We recognize that, generally speaking we are perceived not as coming from "this school" or "that department" but from "the University of Montana". As members of "the University of Montana" we are charged by our tradition with the responsibility of, among other things, being the liberal arts center of Montana. Students for Justice is trying to get all the separate schools and departments together to act like "the University of Montana". The option we have outlined is a longshot, to be sure, but it is the only remaining one. We thus submit the following, our petition to the regents, for either your endorsement or in slightly altered form, as a resolution to be voted on as soon as is possible:

"We the undersigned are concerned with the pending deterioration of the quality of education at U.M. In the face of drastic and most likely ill-placed faculty cuts, we firmly request that you apply to the Interim Finance Committee for an extension of the University budget. This extension would allow threatened faculty members to maintain their present positions until a thorough Program Review can be completed.

"We feel that a Program Review is necessary, but unless adequate time is given to the process, it cannot conclusively and rationally review an entire university."

In support of this proposal we further request that:

- 1) A.S.U.M. introduce the above resolution or an adaptation of it to the Student Summit in Dillon this weekend;
- 2) A.S.U.M. request consideration of this resolution by the Board of Regents and the Interim Finance Committee at the soonest possible date. We wish further to invite all students and faculty to prepare a common defense of the university to present at the next Finance Committee meeting Nov. 18-19 in Helena;
- 3) A.S.U.M. lend whatever physical facilities may be of service to Students for Justice in their attempt to generate statewide support, specifically, the use of your watts or hot line during selected hours of the day so that students may call potential supporters from around the state, as well as the use of your bulk mail permit.
