- 562 - Most of the club's publicity is done without any direct cost thru the Kaimin, the Missoulian and thru placing of "mimeo-copied" signs done in the School of Forestry. The request of \$25 will be used only for the advertisement of "big" lectures and for "special" events.  
A description of the Amateur Wildlife Photography Contest is found in the paragraphs below. In order for the contest to be advertised for an adequate response from the University students and from local people, there has to be publicity through the Missoulian, the Kaimin, and radio stations and with the use of posters.
- 670 The "most recent" policy of the Instructional Material Service is that campus clubs must pay full amount of rental for equipment. A weekly meeting usually requires a movie projector and/or a slide projector . . . and occasionally an intercom system.
- 626 The club offers one major field trip per quarter. The fall quarter field trip will take place in November and will be a trip to Glacier National Park to see the hundred's of migratory Bald Eagles and other wildlife. The winter quarter field trip will take place in February and will be on the National Bison Range for the annual "Big Game Count." The spring quarter field trip is still being planned, but possibly will be a visit to a fish hatchery. All the field trips are conveniently, economically, and environmentally done with the use of a rented bus. The bus is either rented through Bob Beach bussing in Missoula or through the School of Forestry's bus.
- 663 The arrangement for the presenting of speakers for the club's lecture series is one of the club's most unpredictable and difficult activities. The club cannot forecast what caliber of speakers we will be presenting. Thus the cost cannot be "pin-pointed."  
In the past, all of the club's lectures have been open to everyone (students and town people) and will continue in like fashion. Last year the club's "smallest" lecture brought in 60 people and the largest brought in 1,000 people. This year we are going to present a speaker who should have at least 1,000 people in the audience.  
Most of the club's speakers talk for no costs. Although, speakers who require transportation (plane or long distance) usually ask for expenditures to be covered and a small lecture fee. The most expensive phase of presenting a "big" speaker is the rental of the University Center or the school's theatre.

- 521 In order that the natural area can be presented well, slides and photos, drawings, and a description are needed to illustrate the unique significance of the area.
- 626 The amateur as well as the professional research on the area, is done on a voluntary basis. The most the club could offer to these volunteers is to pay for gasoline expenses for the trip to and from the natural areas or to government offices to obtain data. The issuing of gas money will be one of the biggest aids to the club's activity in the natural area program.
- 663 The arranging of the buying of private and public lands for natural area approval requires surty and legal work. Thus the club was hoping to step up this process. At present, the program is almost at a standstill. Most of the proposed natural areas could be easily guided through these legal aspects if professional services were available, but they are not.
