ZONING ORDINANCE RESOLUTION

R74-1

BE IT RESOLVED: that the Associated Students of the University of Montana will take whatever steps are necessary in order to prevent the wholesale eviction of students from dwelling in the University area land throughout Missoula.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the Associated Students of the University of Montana will take whatever steps are necessary to initiate legal proceedings against the city of Missoula in the event that present zoning ordinances are enforced in a selective and discriminatory manner (i.e. against students, to the exclusion of other tenants).

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. in the University Center Ballroom by President Tom Stockburger.

Minutes: Resolution R74-1 should be corrected to read "in the University area and throughout Missoula." Minutes stood approved as corrected.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND STANDING COMMITTEES:

Stockburger reported on the MSPA Conference held in Billings on May 3 & 4. The student lobby efforts were discussed. The smaller university units decided on having an assistant lobbyist rather than another co-director representing the group of schools.

Stockburger met with Charles F. Moses while in Billings who said the student fee situation had a good chance of winning in court. Moses stated an interest in helping on any legal questions the students at the U of M might have over the course of the year.

Budget and Finance: The committee met Monday, May 6, to set up a budget policy for the budget year of 1974-75 (H74-6). NOCKLEBY MOVED THAT CB ADOPT THE BUDGET POLICY. MURRAY SECONDED. Stockburger asked if the 10% decrease for each group was a mandatory policy. Nockleby stated that each group must expect a 10% decrease due to the financial situation. Harris stated that CB can't expect a group to take a decrease if in the past their budget was not equitably funded. HARRIS MOVED TO DELITE #2 OF THE BUDGET POLICY. HUMMEL SECONDED. MOTION DEFEATED. MAIN MOTION CARRIED.

RICE MOVED TO SUSPEND THE RULES SO THAT THE BUDGETING ORDER COULD BE CHANGED. MOTION SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED.

FRED RICE MOVED TO SUSPEND THE ORDER OF BUDGETING AND WORK BY THE FOLLOWING SCHEDULE: 1) Men's Sports, 2) Women's Sports, 3) Jubileers, 4) University Choir, 5) Jazz Workshop, 6) Concert Band, 7) Montana Chamber Groups and Little Symphony, 8) Montana Dance Co., 9) Montana Masquers, 10) Upward Bound/Special Services Day Care, and then on to the order of budgets already set up. MOTION SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED.

OLD BUSINESS.

Hogan asked Huffman to report on what has happened on the zoning ordinance issue since Mr. Moses was retained. Huffman stated that Moses is still researching the case. Konigsberg asked if it was true that Moses felt there was no chance of winning the case. Huffman stated that he must do a good job of researching or they will certainly lose the case. Konigsberg feels an urgency to get some action rolling on this case and feels the Missoula attorney might do a better job for CB. KONIGSBERG MOVED TO RESCIND THE ACTION OF RETAINING CHARLES MOSES FOR THE ZONING ORDINANCE CASE. HARRIS SECONDED.

Huffman pointed out that Moses would still have to be paid for the work he has already done. Hogan feels that perhaps the committee and CB would have better communication if a Missoula attorney would handle the case. IRION MOVED THE PREVIOUS QUESTION. OST SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED.

ALL MEMBERS PRESENT

May 1, 1974

The meeting was called to order by President Tom Stockburger in the Montana Rooms of the University Center at 7:00 p.m.

Minutes: Approved as presented.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND STANDING COMMITTEES:

Stockburger announced that the budgeting will begin Tuesday, May 7, in the UC Ballroom at 6:00 p.m. and run until midnight or 1:00 a.m. CB members can stop by the ASUM office Tuesday after 1:00 p.m. and pick up the executive budget recommendations which they should bring to the meeting. There will be no meeting May 8. May 9 meeting will again begin at 6:00 p.m. and will be held in the Montana Room series.

Budget and Finance Committee: John Nockleby, ASUM Business Manager, presented a revised report from last week. (H74-6) The committee met Monday, April 29, and decided to absorb the deficit from the Selective Service Information Center of \$1806.40. This will be paid out of the reserve account. No decision has yet been reached on the deficit of the Women's Recreation account.

The committee is working on a budget and financial policy to be followed by CB for the entire year which is required by the constitution in Article 9, Section 3. They will present a recommendation for this policy next meeting. They will also present their recommendations for the budget at the next meeting.

NOCKLEBY MOVED THAT CB ACCEPT THE REPORT OF BUDGET AND FINANCE AND AGREE TO PAY THE DEFICIT OF \$1806.40 OF THE SELECTIVE SERVICE INFORMATION CENTER. DELEGATE RON OST SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED.

Ad Hoc Committee on Single Dwelling Zoning: Committee Chairman, Doug Reisig, reported that the committee has researched the capabilities of several attorneys to work on the defense of the zoning ordinance and narrowed it down to Ron McDonald, Missoula, and Charles F. Moses, Billings. He stated that both attorneys knew of the \$1,000 allocation made for this case but could not say what the final cost might be. Moses will be sending an assistant to Missoula to discuss the case with the committee. Delegate Marcia Hogan stated that some CB members have discussed the case with Ron McDonald and he explained several approaches he might take in the case. Delegate Marion Dakin asked who would make the final decision on the selection of an attorney. Stockburger stated that the committee would bring a recommendation to CB and they would make final decision. Vice President Lynne Huffman stated that he felt the reputation of the attorney should be the qualification for deciding which attorney. HUFFMAN MOVED THAT CB APPOINT CHARLES F. MOSES TO REPRESENT THE STUDENTS IN THE SINGLE DWELLING ZONING ORDINANCE CASE. DELEGATE NILS RIBI SECONDED. Dakin and Konigsberg agreed that before choosing an attorney they would like to talk to Moses' representative. Several members also agreed that the case should get going as soon as possible. OST MOVED THE PREVIOUS QUESTION. HUFFMAN SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED. MAIN MOTION TO APPOINT MOSES AS ATTORNEY CARRIED.

Scholarships and Loans Committee: Ost reported that the committee has selected four candidates for the Buttrey's Scholarship: Teresa Sweeney, Jewel Madar, Mary Jo Zygmund, and Keith A. Maristuen.

OLD BUSINESS:

Legal Services: Mike Wisocki reported on research that he and a committee have done regarding the legal help available to students. He has contacted several attorneys around the state for aid in this question. There are two plans that could be used: 1) Pre-paid legal services, and 2) ASU1, or students in general, to establish a law office on campus.

The first plan would be an open panel group practice. Essentially it is legal insurance. For a certain premium an individual, for a 12 month period, would have pre-paid legal service.

The second plan would have to have approval of Bar Association and Supreme Court. There would be a lawyer on campus as a closed council. This would be a monopoly which the courts and Montana Bar Association are very much against. It is, however, the right of the students to do this if they wish.

Wisocki stated that these are two very separate plans, each having its benefits and detriments, and perhaps it would be best to combine the two plans. The committee is thinking that a special allocation may have to be asked of the Board of Regents. The committee needs input from CB member and the student body and asked that three additional student members be appointed to the committee.

Stockburger appointed Pat Smith, David Irion, and Kermit Hummel to the committee.

Nockleby asked what costs might be expected to pay for this project. Wisocki said that not more than \$4.00 per quarter or \$12.00 per year for a student. He did not know if this would be mandatory or optional. He said this is one of the reasons for asking for student input. Nockleby asked what type of legal services the general student might expect from this project. Wisocki stated that it would be broken down into approximately the following figures: \$100 worth of consultations per year which would amount to about 6-7 consultations; \$75 worth of office work; and about \$350 worth of civil and administrative law. He felt there should be some defense for criminal matters. The total would be approximately \$525-\$560 per year. The committee will be meeting at 1:30 in the ASUM Conference Room on May 2, if anyone is interested in attending.

Stockburger announced that a committee would be appointed to look into the matter of law students paying the activity fee and a change in ID's for law students and part-time students.
